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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

As I write this midst all the preparations for Christmas it seems strange to be planning already for Lent and Easter - and yet thinking and planning ahead needs to be done. This is indeed a reflection of life itself. We never 'stand still' and although we often say and feel "when I've achieved that... or organised that... life will be plain sailing" - it rarely is. There is always more to do and the unexpected to cope with.

Our Lenten sermon course is aimed to help us cope with some aspects of this journey through life.

At our 10am Communion Services we shall be seeking to gain more from our worship by exploring in detail the meaning of Holy Communion. A series of six sermons is planned on themes taken from the action of the liturgy - Preparing, Sharing the Peace, Offering, Breaking, Giving, Going. The Communion Service is the main source of spiritual sustenance for many Christians. It is important we make the most of our worship together - to the glory of God, the benefit of others and our individual spiritual growth.

To enable us to keep to our normal pattern of services and fit the sermon course in before Easter we shall be starting the morning course on the 9th Sunday before Easter which this year falls on 22nd January.

The evening sermon course will again be based on a book. The book, which falls neatly into six chapters, is "Journey to the Centre" by Christopher Bryant (published by Darton, Longman & Todd, 1987 @ £2.95). It is subtitled 'Explorations in the Realm of the Spirit'. Fr. Bryant who died in 1985 belonged to the Anglican Society of St. John the Baptist (the Cowley Fathers) and was widely known as a lecturer, retreat-conductor and author. This course will begin on the Sunday before Lent, 5th February.

As in previous years a Parish Quiet Day is being planned for the first Saturday in Lent, 11th February, and more details will be available from the Chruch soon.



A YEAR OF OPPORTUNITIES

Writes the Bishop of Doncaster

I am told that bargains are available at the January Sales although I have always tended to avoid the Sales myself; even more so now that they start on Boxing Day. That does not prevent me from wishing you the best of buys as you crowd into the stores. Clothes and household goods that cost the earth before Christmas are around at half the price. I hope you find them.



Sales always remind me of that glorious God-given invitation in Isaiah 55 - "He who has no money, come buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price." Whatever the shops may have on offer, God provides better bargain opportunities for his people than any salesman.

I believe that God has many bargain opportunities ahead for us, not only in January but right through 1989: opportunities for spiritual growth, for renewed service and care for others, and for the sharing of our faith. So let us make it our business not to miss them.

You will find them in the context of your personal circumstances and in the life of the local christian community; but as far as my comments are concerned I want to emphasise that plenty of opportunities are there for spiritual growth, service and sharing of faith within the wider witness of the Diocese.

Our 75th Anniversary is going to provide us with an opportunity for a corporate act of thanksgiving and affirmation. **Sunday. 30th April** will see a Thanksgiving Service in the Cathedral at 6.30 p.m., and a fortnight later on **Pentecost Sunday** at 6 p.m. the Bishop will be preaching to us all on Radio Sheffield.

Next Year's Diocesan Pilgrimage is to Hexham (British Rail permitting, via the Settle Railway!): on the feast of St. John the Baptist **June 24th**.

Then in the Autumn, we begin our preparation for the Decade of Evangelism. Three major celebratory events are planned. They will take place in the Octagon Theatre on the Monday evenings of **October 16th & 30th** and **November 13th** at 7.30 p.m. Please book these dates firmly in your Parish Diaries, as we want every Parish represented. With the three themes, "Fire for the Journey" "Light for the Journey" and "Food for the Journey", we are praying that God will give us greater vision for the 1990's. We shall be circulating more details in the near future.

This letter is in danger of becoming a Diocesan Calendar, so I shall resist from referring to further events; although there are many other good things in 1989.

It is sufficient for me to say that this coming Year is the year of opportunities: God's opportunities for us. At the end of his first letter to the christian church in Corinth, Paul tells them of his experience: "A wide door for effective work has opened to me". 1989's doors are open for every christian in the Diocese of Sheffield.

Trustee Savings Bank Secondee: Community Links Officer

On the 26th September, 1988 Mr. Brian Shipman, Branch Manager of TSB Heeley, was seconded to work as a Community Links Officer with the 'Faith in the City' unit of the Diocese of Sheffield. This secondment post is intended to last for two years, after which time Brian will be taking early retirement, and forms part of an overall strategy in response to the Archbishop's Commission on Urban Priority Areas ('Faith in the City'). He is 51, sings tenor in the Cathedral Choir and is also a soloist singer for many societies and having a substantial repertoire in Oratorio.

His main duties as a Community Links Officer will be:

- (a) to develop links between areas in South Yorkshire and in the South of England which are economically well-resourced and areas in South Yorkshire which are economically under-resourced.
- (b) to develop educational and other resources to enable these links to be opened up and to grow.

A specific task being undertaken at the present time is in connection with the production of a video featuring the Dioceses of Guildford and Sheffield which, hopefully, will be completed by the end of 1989. Discussions have already taken place and proposals made for a Synodical Partnership between Sheffield and Guildford Dioceses.

In close consultation with the Faith in the City Development Worker and working with UPA's which are developing projects or ideas, he will seek out appropriate situations for links and enable those involved to develop their thinking on the possibilities for these. Where and when practicable, he will also seek to respond to initiatives from UPA's who come forward with ideas for links and to help them to develop these.

He will also make contact with people, churches, groups and organisations who live in areas with economic and social resources which they feel place them at an advantage to UPA's.

Disaster Averted

Last year was quite a year for St. George's Parish Church, Doncaster, for the church won an award of £250 in an energy saving competition, and the congregation were kept warm in their newly heated pews for the first time in many years.

They did not however bargain for the fire which struck the church late one night. Had it not been for the prompt action of a passer-by, and the expert attention of fire crews, there would have been no church left to keep warm. A disaster of the proportions of the fire at York Minster was averted, although because of the damage and the effects of thick black smoke, the church could not be used for a few days until it had been cleaned up. Services were held as usual in nearby St. George's House. St. George's had a narrow escape, but is no stranger to disastrous fires - 123 years previously the old St. George's was completely burnt down, and the present church built to replace it.

Rotherham Holiday Aid

Rotherham Holiday Aid began as an initiative from the Rotherham Branch of CHUG (The Christians Unemployment Group) and is now supported by local Churches, Travel Agents, Health Visitors, Social Workers, and Rotherham Metropolitan Borough Council. The aim is to help some of the poorest families in the Borough of Rotherham to have a much needed holiday.

The Public Launch is at the Arts Centre in Rotherham on Thursday 26th January, and it is hoped that the scheme will commend itself to the whole community.

After that date, all Travel Agents in Rotherham will have newly produced leaflets for their customers, so that as people book their holidays, they have the chance to help others in need in their own community to have a break.

Grants will be made from the National Charity The Family Holiday Association, after application from local Health Visitors and Social Workers. SAVED IN THE DESERT



A PRE-WAR car breakdown in the heart of the Sahara must be one of the least likely examples of the hand of God at work.

But the car driver was a widely-travelled French journalist and lecturer, Raoul Follereau, who was crossing the desert to visit Tamanrasset, site of a monastery founded by his compatriot, the Trappist monk Father Charles de Foucauld. Follereau's life was saved by nomadic Tuaregs, among whom were many lepers.

A decade later, in the darkest years of Nazi persecution, Raoul Follereau was forced to seek asylum in a Lyon convent. Coincidentally (as the agnostic might say) the Mother Superior was proposing to build a leper hospital in the Ivory Coast.

As soon as peace returned, Follereau devoted all his time and effort to the lepers' cause. Over the next ten years he gave 1,200 lectures throughout the world. In 1952 he addressed the United Nations Assembly and sent a personal appeal to the leaders of the superpowers, Eisenhower and Malenkov. World Leprosy Day was established two years later.

But Follereau was still not content. He now asked the world powers to devote the equivalent of one day's expenditure on armaments to the health and education of lepers. The United Nations adopted this principle in 1963.

RIPPLES OF SORROW

LAST JANUARY a man died as a result of a heart attack. The ripples of sorrow move ever outward as even now the news gets around. The ripples rebound from the perimeters of my world, and come back in the form of condolences.

The logical part of me says he is at rest, that his life would not have been worth living if the heart condition had curtailed his one great love, his garden.

The Christian part of me says he is at rest, awaiting the day when we will be together again.

None of this can yet cancel out the sense of loss, the intense pain that comes with someone departing this earthly life.

So for a while I will be selfish, and cry out 'why?' For a while I will trust in God to be patient with me while I work through my grief, and come to terms with it. Acceptance of God's will takes time.

For you see, that man was my father. And I love him.

On seeing the shoulder flash 'Church Army' he commented, 'I knew things were bad in England but to have an official army to guard the Church is quite amazing!'

A FUNNY THING HAPPENED TO BARRIE BRIGGS ON THE WAY TO THE FORUM....

Several years ago, whilst in holiday and making a return visit to Greece, I gazed at the ruined temple of the goddess Athena. After speculating on what she might think of the modern capital city named after her, and the revenges she might have taken on the 18th century vandals (the military, of course) who wrecked her 2000 year old shrine, I turned to leave the famous Parthenon of Athens.

Descending the footpath from the Acropolis passed the Areopagus where St. Paul made his speech to the 'Men of Athens', thankfully recorded for us by a qualified shorthand writer - how else could it have got in the Book of Acts? - I finally, and leisurely, reached the Ancient Roman Forum or market place, now only a ruin since they didn't build quite as well as the classical Greeks. Sitting on one of the ancient stones with her baby on her knee was a gypsy woman, and, for some reason I had a slight feeling of...anticipation?.... premonition?....I wasn't sure.

The gypsy people of Greece live in the countryside; they are very poor and spend most of the daylight hours doing menial jobs or begging in the cities - especially when tourists are around. The majority of Greeks don't like this, regarding begging for alms as demeaning to the nation. Nevertheless, here was this woman who could have been any age between 20 and 40 years, holding out her hand towards me, her baby in her lap with its legs bound in the ancient fashion.

"Kyrie eleison mu et ma bambina," or something which sounded very much like that. Were my ears deceiving me? Kyrie eleison...me? Many times in our communion services in England had I recited those words, as well as the English version "Lord, have mercy." Asking for mercy and deliverance from whatever troubled me at the time.

"Kyrie eleison mu et ma bambina," she repeated, my muddled brain trying to come to terms with a person using that ancient litany but asking mercy of ME!! I automatically felt in my pocket, found some loose change and placed it in her outstretched hand muttering, equally automatically, the ritual response, "Christe eleison"... Christ have mercy. She completed the litany as our eyes met and her fingers closed over the money, "Kyrie eleison".

I moved on, realising that something had passed between us, but not knowing what, or even if the woman was aware of it. Over the years, though I cannot remember what 'my' gypsy woman and her child looked like, I have thought of them often; related that brief incident to many things I have heard people say and seen them do - until I came to an understanding of what was revealed to me that day.

Recently I was, yet again, reminded of the incident whilst reading a short article about a man called R.M. Benson who was born in the early 19th century. He founded the Society of St. John the Evangelist - more affectionately known throughout Christendom and beyond as the 'Cowley Dads' - a monastic order which one could place about halfway between St. Bernard and St. John of The Cross (that's between a loving, caring and worldly order and one of extreme discipline and asceticism). Father Cary, a follower of Father Benson's, is quoted in the article as inviting us to change our viewpoint and look at the world from Calvary instead of looking at Calvary from the world. In a sermon entitled 'God is Love', Father Benson had this to say:

"We are formed in his own likeness. He must see his love reproduced in us, and so we rejoice in his love. Men fell away from likeness into sin, and so became the object of divine pity - not of mere pity, such as might be given to inferior beings, but of love which might raise a man out of the state of sin to the sweet reciprocation of it."

And later in the same sermon:

"May God give you grace to live in continual experience of the love of God, not as something too great to bear, but as the power whereby we rise to live in the presence of his heart, in the power which is immortal."

This is what I understand St.John to mean in his Gospel when he quotes Christ as saying,"I have made your name known to them and will continue to make it known, so that the love with which you loved me may be in them, and so that I may be in them." (17:26). And also, "...I have sent them into the world, and for their sake I consecrate myself so that they too may be consecrated in truth." (17:18/19)

This is how I came to understand the lesson I learned from the Greek gypsy woman who asked me to have mercy on her and her child. In a very mild way I was being placed on the Cross of Calvary to look at the world instead of gazing up

and asking for salvation for myself. The best I had been able to think of was to give her a little money in exchange for a profound truth - I was by far the richer than she for the encounter, but perhaps she knew that.

"Your life in Christ makes you strong and His love comforts you. You have fellowship with the Spirit and you have kindness and compassion for one another."

This text from Phillippians 2 was used by the Vicar in his funeral tribute. Kindness and compassion were two of Betty's most respected and loved qualities. She gave herself to the service of Christ in the community of His Church; and drew strength from its sacraments.

Many people have described how Betty was the first person to make them feel welcome - in the church, in Totley. Yet Betty's friendship extended beyond words of welcome and some have known her genuine support and concern in times of need and crisis, often unobstrusive and known only to them. Others have described her role as a peacemaker, putting herself out to heal rifts and tension. Perhaps these qualities had developed as she herself had come as a stranger from Belgium, and had endured the hardship of wartime in occupied Antwerp.

Soon after her arrival in Totley, Betty began to involve herself in many of the activities of All Saints, holding office in the Ladies Club, the Ladies Working Party, the Mother's Union, the P.C.C. and Standing Committee. For her the delivery of the Magazine was more than just a regular duty as she took an interest in every recipient on her round, stopped to chat with them and encouraged them in the faith.

Within the wider life of the Church she was a representative on the Dore & Totley Christian Council, and also a staunch supporter of the Children's Society.

Her love of others, her love of God, her love of All Saints - its worship, and its sacraments, will continue to be an inspiration and example to us all.

Greetings from Sierra Leone and particularly from Bo Diocese.

In our last Link Letter we mentioned that Tony had been requested by the Bishop to raise £25,000 plus towards the building of an Administrative Complex for Bo Diocese. Well, since July 1988 we have been greatly blessed by various local people which now means that:

- a. we need to purchase less bags of cement.
- b. another local builders' merchant has said that he will sell us any building materials at <u>cost price</u> (a fantastic saving) and
- c. there has recently been a devaluation of the Leone to the £1 sterling in our favour. Our new extra building money needed has been reduced down to £11,358 only.

Recent visitors to the Diocese were representatives from the Mother's Union in London to visit the Mother's Union in Bo and Freetown Diocese. We spent a very varied and interesting week whilst they were with us, visiting places and projects with them. On the lighter side, we all thoroughly enjoyed the traditional dancing displays and entertainment, with everyone joining in at the end with Sierra Leone exuberance. We are very grateful for the provision by CMS of a four wheel drive vehicle which has now arrived. At this season, the rains are gradually decreasing and leaving their usual legacy of potholes and broken roads, so the 4WD is appropriate just now.

Tony has also recently completed three years of part-time correspondence study for the "Certificate of Christian Studies" for St. John's Theological College, Nottingham. he recommends the course to anyone who wishes to broaden and deepen their knowledge of the Christian Faith.

Pam has one speech therapy patient at Bo Hospital since last week and one or two enquiries that need to be followed up.

The full-time manpower of Bo Diocese has recently had a 'shot in the arm' with the completion of theological training by three new young men, plus one other who has been appointed Youth Worker, all four will be made Deacon possibly towards the end of Advent. Please pray for their future Ministries. Also the Diocese has another three men starting at Theological Hall in Freetown, please pray that they will settle down quickly and be able to absorb the many varied subjects they will need for their future Ministries.

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Recent publicity and discussion has surrounded the film 'The Last Temptation of Christ'. At the beginning of Lent we, as it were, focus on the first temptations of Christ, as He sought in the desert region to work out the pattern of His mission and ministry.

There was the temptation to turn stones into bread. The desert was littered with pieces of rock that looked like bread. Jesus' own hunger put into His mind the temptation that if He could satisfy the hunger of the crowds they would follow Him for all they could get from it. But this had been the way of others. His was the call to self-sacrifice, to using spiritual values and resources to overcome the difficulties in our lives and the problems of our world.

There was the temptation to throw Himself from the Temple in a spectacular demonstration of His power and His Sonship. This however would produce followers lacking true faith and convction. They would need signs and wonders to keep them convinced. The danger here is in seeking to manipulate God to do what we want - rather than in seeking only His timing and His will. Jesus resisted this temptation too.

The third temptation to control the whole world in return for worshipping Satan, is really a temptation to compromise and to seek short cuts to power and authority. The world will not be changed simply by adopting the way of the world. The Christian faith must strive to promote and demonstrate new standards of love, brotherhood and justice. This path may lead through opposition and suffering, but it is the way of Christ.

We are all concerned for our world and with what we can do to hasten the coming of the kingdom of God. Let us learn from the example of Jesus Christ in the desert and seek to be guided by the same Spirit in all our decisions.

MONEY MATTERS

Over recent months there have been a number of Appeals in response to particular world needs. These were Sudan Relief £498, Bangladesh Flood Relief £209, Aid Armenia £182. In addition the P.C.C. followed the annual practice of giving away 10% of All Saints' income - £2000 distributed amongst 22 charities. The Ladies Working Party, through its various fund-raising events, including the Christmas Fayre, has given £550 to 11 charities; and the Ladies Club has likewise distributed £80 of its subscription funds.

Over the Christmas period the Christingale Service raised £357 for the Children's Society, the Young Saints "Celebration of Christmas" raised £53 for the Martin House Children's Hospice, and All Saints' School Carol Service a further £53 for the Bishop's Urban Aid Appeal, which also received a £450 share from the Garden Party.

The donations above amount to £4432 which is slightly more than the £4140 spent on organ repairs during August. We are most grateful to all how have contributed to these causes.

We were also grateful to receive a legacy of £8496 from the estate of the late Jack Burton. By the terms of his will this sum is earmarked as a contribution to some future capital fabric need - be it a new roof, a larger hall kitchen, toilet and disabled facilities at church, a new heating system, a peal of bells...well, there's no harm in dreaming!

In 1989, if we are to keep up this level of charitable giving and meet our everyday running costs, it is still important to consider increasing our own individual contributions. Higher inflation and a change in the law about V.A.T. and charities will increase our outgoings, and the reduction in income tax decreases the amount we receive from convenants.

WE ARE THERE



writes Bishop David

We are there - the Church of England that is with Vicar, Parish Church and Congregation - in every nook and cranny of England. That is our proud and just claim. And we do add that in very many places we have always been there. Over and over again the Parish Church is much the oldest building in the neighbourhood. Nineteen of our Churches get a mention in Domesday Book and a number of others are as old and older.

But I've been having a thoughtful, "emotion recollected in tranquility" re-read of "The Church in the Mining Communities". This little book is sub-titled "A reflection on the experiences of parishes in the Diocese of Sheffield during the Mining Dispute 1984/5". Copies are still available from the Diocesan Office at £1 each, and it deserves both a first and a second read. First time through inevitably you argue with the authors. No one is going to agree with everything they say. But on a second reading you can't help asking searching questions about the parish in which you live or work. What does it mean to be the Parish Church? How can we strengthen the faith of the congregation with policies that touch on baptism, stewardship and liturgical innovation and yet still remain a spiritual home for all parishioners? Does it matter that great sections of the local community are almost entirely absent from the worshipping life of the local Church? In short, is being there enough?

IS BEING THERE ENOUGH?

Another double statistic is running through my head: 80% say they believe in God and 2% go to a Church of England Church on Sunday. What keeps the 78% out? This report shows that in very many mining parishes there was no preaching and teaching directly relating to problems of living through this bitter conflict and at least hints that the congregations were glad that this was so. Might it therefore be true that we clergy lack the skills to relate the Christian Gospel to the real problems that are uppermost in people's minds and hearts? And that our congregations (the 2% that is) collude with us in pretending that religion can be kept safely apart from life? The accusation is constantly made that the Clergy are preaching politics and - it is sometimes added - thus driving people away from the Churches. All the evidence that reaches me suggests that the precise opposite is the truth: Nearly all our sermons are related to problems of personal piety, or matters significant to the internal life of the congregation or issues of current ecclesiastical controversy.

If these are not high on the list of interests of the 78% of believers in God who stay away from Church might this be what keeps them out? Of course we don't know the answer and I am not asking for "politics from the pulpit". But I do believe that the foundation of our decade of evangelism must be a total determination that we must not only be there - but there with a message and a life that relates to the daily concerns of the whole community that makes up the parish.


WE MUST BE THERE WITH GOOD NEWS FOR TODAY

An Ostrich Church is inevitably a Blind Church. And a Blind Church can give neither leadership nor vision to its local community. And an Ostrich Church doesn't hear much either! A major part of our preparation for evangelism must be listening to both our neighbours and to our own hearts. Thus we can learn the real needs of the people of our day. Then we need the courage to so break the Word of God that its unchanging truth can flow in unfamiliar words to bring a healing joy to the multitudes who had long ceased to expect to hear us speaking with them.

Growing

Representatives from every parish in the Deanery of Doncaster, along with many others were present at the Blessing by Bishop David, and the Laying by Mrs. Hilda Sibellas, of the Foundation Stone of the new extensions to St. Wilfrid's Church, Cantley, Doncaster.

Extensions at St. Wilfrid's are nothing new, for it was extended and restored in the 19th century and again in 1905 to give more space for the people of a growing parish. The parish has continued to grow enormously, and the present extensions when completed will enable the church to seat 250 people, and provide ancillary



facilities. Meanwhile the people of St. Wilfrid's and the parish are enthusiastically and prayerfully raising the £200,000 + necessary for the work. The architect is Mr. Donald Buttress, a recognised authority on the work of Sir Ninian Cooper who was responsible for an earlier restoration and extension.

GOING LIVE WITH BIRTHDAY MESSAGE

To mark the 75th Anniversary of the Diocese this year, Bishop David is hoping to preach in every Parish Church in the Diocese...and all at the same time. He will do so with the kind assistance of BBC Radio Sheffield with an outside broadcast of the Bishop's sermon from a special service at Sheffield Cathedral which could reach an estimated congregation of around 20,000 dispersed throughout the 220 parish churches of the Diocese tuned in to hear the Bishop before continuing with individual services of celebration. Diocesan Communications Officer, the Revd. Roy Arnold says: "We visualise congregations tuned in on individual transistor radios or else through more elaborate relay systems. We might just have to make some special arrangements for parishes out on the Humberside fringes of the Diocese. We are most grateful to Radio Sheffield for their help."

It was in the early summer of 1914 - just a few months before the onset of the First World War - that the Diocese of Sheffield came into existence. It was formerly part of the Diocese of York. May 1st is the actual Anniversary of the Diocese and also of Sheffield Cathedral which was prior to that date Sheffield Parish Church.

On Sunday, 30th April the Rt. Revd. Simon Burrows, Bishop of Buckingham in the Diocese of Oxford is to preach at a special Thanksgiving Evensong at the Cathedral. His grandfather was the first Bishop of Sheffield. The second special service - at which Bishop David will preach via the Radio Sheffield wavelengths - will be on WHIT SUNDAY, PENTECOST, 14th MAY. There are also plans for other special services and the Bishop has asked every parish to have either a Parish Party or Coffee Evening ideally on WEDNESDAY, 3rd MAY as a special birthday event for the Diocese of Sheffield and to raise £75 (or more) for the Bishop's £MILLION APPEAL.



Sheffield and District Organists' and Choirmasters' Association - SADOCA for short, has started a trend! Amongst the priorities for the coming years are finding ways of encouraging young people to learn to play the organ, and taking steps to preserve organs, especially when they are in poor condition. THINGS YOU PROBABLY DON'T KNOW ABOUT WORLD MISSION

SO FAR SO GOOD . . .

- The Christian Church is growing faster, worldwide, than at any time in history.
- 2 24,000 new members are added to the Christian community, world-wide, every single day.
- 3 1,200 new churches are established around the world every week.
- The Church in Africa grows by 16,400 people every day.
- At the beginning of this century Latin America had 50,000 Protestants. By the end of the century there will be 100 million.
- 6 The Church in Korea has more than doubled in 10 years.
- 7 There are now almost eleven thousand missionaries world-wide sent out by non-western countries. This is double the UK mission force and could triple in size by the year 2000.
- Pespite vicious persecution, the Church in China has grown to more than 50 million believers.

... BUT NOT GOOD ENOUGH

- 9 2,236,000,000 people more than 4 in 10 of the world population — have yet to hear the Good News about Jesus explained in a way that they can understand.
- Of the 12,000 distinct "people groups" each with their own language and culture 1 in 4 still do not have a viable church.
- 4 out of 5 Protestant Churches in the UK have no-one directly involved in overseas mission
- There are more people selling Avon in the USA than there are missionaries world-wide.
- Only 1 out of every 171 full-time mission workers are active among cultures where the gospel has yet to penetrate.
- Only 1 in 19 of the world's languages have a translation of the whole Bible.
- The rapid growth of the Church in many countries has created a desperate need for Bible teachers, administrators and helpers.
- The only way that 1,700,000,000 people in 45 Communist and Muslim countries can hear the Gospel is through Christian Radio.

NEVER A DULL MOMENT

A book that recently appeared on the Church Bookstall carried the title "101 Things to do during a Dull Sermon" (Monarch Publ. £1.95). It accepts that sermons are great... most of the time, but when the Vicar has had a bad day and the minutes grind by, surviving to the end can be a tough business.

The book was not on the Bookstall for long and we suspect the Vicar bought (or confiscated) it!! However some of the activities can be revealed.

You could begin with the very simple "Twiddle your thumbs" to the more advanced "Twiddle your neighbour's thumbs". More dramatic contact with your neighbour is "Slap your neighbour, see if he/she turns the other cheek. If not, raise your hand and inform the Vicar".

For the agile there is the pew crawl: "Start from the back of the church and try to crawl all the way to the front, under the pews, without being noticed." A similar exercise is to "Blink and squint dramatically and get down on your hands and knees". When those around enquire what the matter is, tell them you have lost a contact lens. Whilst they are searching, crawl quickly towards the door.

For those wishing to remain in their places, you can try a "yawn" and see how contagious it is, or "hum a hymn tune" unobstrusively and see how many people join in. For further confusion "pass a note to someone called Bernie, but first make sure there is no-one called Bernie in your congregation". If you want to be quietly occupied, "try counting the hairs on your head" or "calculate from the Vicar's stipend how much he is making for each minute of the sermon", or "if a day in God's sight is a thousand years, how many years would the sermon be taking?".

There are, of course, several show-stoppers. "If you are at a liberal church, come forward to be 'born-again' towards the end of the sermon, that will really throw things into a tizzy. It may even start a revival!"

If you want to find out the other 90 activities then buy the book - it should soon become obvious to the preacher who owns a copy!

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

This month we again focus on some of the most unusual happenings in history - a mystery that has significance for us all, and about which we are called to make a decision now. I refer to the accounts of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ in Jerusalem around the year A.D.30.

Do we feel the death of Jesus - for his death is authenticated by historical evidence - was but a fruitless sacrifice by a misguided man? A good, upright man who was betrayed by a follower and executed after a mock trial in an age when life was cheap. However Jesus said to his disciples -"The Son of Man will give his life as a ransom for many." Behind his death somehow he claimed was the design of God's redeeming love.

Crucifixion was the most cruel and shameful of all kinds of death, involving unbearable thirst, stabbing pain and a slow lingering death. Yet the man who hung there was entirely innocent and somehow through his action he claimed to take the blame for our sin and all its consequences.

The Cross of defeat became the Cross of love and victory. The power, the teaching of this man had immense effect in the centuries that followed. For the Cross was not the end of the stcry - rumours, happenings, the appearance of amazing confidence and courage in his earlier depairing followers, a rapidly growing new movement that has never abated from that day. The Cross of defeat became a worldwide symbol of new hope and new life.

This is our faith. There are unanswered questions, but faith that is 100% sure is not faith. Forgiveness, love, new hope, new life are our Easter presents - may we grasp them and value them more deeply amidst the confusion and disorder of our world's life today.

CROSS and CROWN

The Bishop of Doncaster Writes:-

Have you noticed how, in casual conversation with a new aquaintance, one of the earlier questions asked is nearly always - 'And what do you do?' It is a useful way of making the running and avoiding an embarrassing silence.



I think however it illustrates an underlying attitude which is characteristic of most of us. We assess people's worth by what they **do**: not by what they **are**. It goes some way to explain why, when we feel uncertain about ourselves, we rush into even more activity by way of justification.

It is an attitude that spills over into our christian perceptions. We judge the quality of our own and other people's spirituality by the brownie points we or they are currently scoring.

There is no real excuse for idleness nor are we to be content with incompetence. God forbid when so much is crying out to be done. Yet it is only too possible for busyness to mask a terrible emptiness of spirit.

Of all seasons of the Church's Year, Lent is a reminder that God does not look on the outward appearance, but that he looks on the heart. It is a time to reflect, not so much on what we do, but on what we are in Christ. I have a liking for that descriptive command of Jesus in John Chapter 15, in the wording of some of the older versions, when Jesus says - 'Abide in me'. It is that deep enduring relationship with our Saviour that makes us, individually and corporately, what we are in Christ. We are affirmed and spiritually fed. We learn daily what it means to abide.

And paradoxically what we are in Christ depends not only on who he is, but gloriously on what he has done. I love Easter and its Resurrection emphasis but I love Good Friday too. In the mystery of Christ's death, God has acted in forgiving love.

Let us rest in Christ in this Lenten month. Let us return to the Cross on Good Friday, ready to rejoice in Christ's Risen Life on Easter morning.

As many of you will know Billy Graham is returning to this country in the summer. Although the focal point of his visit will be meetings in London, live transmissions will enable his ministry to be used across the country.

As far as South Yorkshire is concerned, these can be seen in Sheffield, Doncaster and Barnsley between 26 June and 1 July.

I am well aware that some of you may have hesitations about this style of evangelism; and of course it is only one of the ways in which the Gospel can be presented. It is nevertheless an opportunity that should be taken very seriously. I might add that the proof of the pudding is in the eating. Not long ago I had the privilege of chairing an ACCM Selection Conference. One of the most refreshing and vigorous of the recommended candidates was an ex-miner. He came to faith in Christ during Mission Sheffield in 1985!

HOW THE CHURCH IS FACING THE NEW RURAL REVOLUTION

Ever since the war, the countryside has been undergoing a revolution - often almost imperceptible, but in reality gradually changing the fundamentals of rural life. Based on the technological advances that have enabled farmers to increase food production steadily throughout the period, this revolution is a quieter one than the sometimes agonising challenges faced in the city: but it is just as profound in its effects on rural life. Recognising this, the Church of England's Archbishops earlier this year set up an inquiry to look at the problems and opportunities that this revolution is presenting the church in the countryside.

COMPLEMENTARY

Entitled the Archbishops' Commission on Rural Areas (ACORA), it is a response to the changes which have occurred and which will continue to occur, and is complementary to 'Faith in the City'. Parishes all over the country are responding to that in their support for the Church Urban Fund, and this is to be welcomed.

DIFFERENT SCENE

The depopulation of rural areas caused by this agricultural revolution would have left our villages empty and decaying had it not been for a corresponding influx of people who wanted to live in the countryside and yet whose work was essentially urban in nature. At the same time, there are new attitudes towards conservation and a greater perception of the ecological balance needed to ensure an acceptable future for our rural areas as needed for the world itself. At the more immediate level, there has been a re-grouping of public services and changes in the nature of rural transport. The economic changes which have resulted are making the rural scene quite different from what it was a mere generation ago: for many, there is a new prosperity and a new pleasure to be gained from living in the countryside. for others these changes have brought hardship and concern.

ASSESSMENT

It is against this highly mobile background that the Church of England has had to review the nature of its own presence in each village and consider the best use of its ordained manpower. Pastoral reorganisation has led to the grouping of parishes into one benefice and the demonstration of a need for greater lay

participation. Furthermore, village congregations have been faced with a legacy of ancient churches, sometimes with seemingly impossible demands for repair and maintenance. These village congregations are themselves different from those of 20 or even 10 years ago, as the social pattern changes. The time has indeed come to assess the rural Church and to learn about its challenges and how best it can respond to them.

SHEFFIELD VISIT

Members of the Commission are visiting every Diocese in England, and Sheffield was the second Diocese to be visited. The visitors to this Diocese met at Barnburgh, near Doncaster with the Revd. John Woods, the Bishop's Rural Advisor, and clergy and laity from rural parishes in the Diocese.

After meetings with Bishop David and Diocesan Officers, they visited the sixteen rural parishes in the Diocese and were extremely grateful for what they saw, heard, and learnt from their visit. They were particularly interested in the impact of the urban situation on the rural situation in a Diocese which only has 10% of its parishes in a rural context - quite the opposite of a Diocese like Lincoln, where urban parishes are in a minority. Rural parishes in our Diocese cover large areas of land, but with relatively small populations, and they present a different range of opportunities and problems than the urban scene.

Not Angels, but Anglicans!

The Focolare Movement began just a couple of years before the Revd. Lawrie Jenkins. Vicar of St. Aidan's, Wheatley Hills, Doncaster, was born. Not that he knew about it then. His links with Focolare began in 1972 in Leeds and have grown ever since.

Focolare, meaning the fire in the hearth round which families gather, representing the fire of the Holy Spirit, is an international and ecumenical movement for renewal in the Church founded by Chiara Lubich in 1943. Its members are both lay and clerical. women and men, young and old. Annual gatherings of members take place, and Lawrie has found himself meeting with other members of

the movement in Bangor, Hull, Welwyn Garden City and Liverpool. This year was different. The Annual Gathering for the whole of the British Isles and Europe took place just outside Rome overlooking the Pope's Summer Residence (some Americans happened to be in Rome too!). Amongst about 1,000 members of the Movement gathered together, the English Anglican contingent was small, but nonetheless, the Pope in one of his general audiences, with all the members of the Movement present, had special words of welcome for them in his introductory remarks. As he walked around the crowds, he spoke personally with them. saving how good it was to have them there in Rome. all the way from England (He no doubt remembered a saving of one of his predecessors who saw English slaves in the market place in Rome and resolved to convert the English!).

Whilst staying in Rome, Lawrie managed to renew some old friendships, meeting again with friends from Spain, Yugoslavia, Sicily and Malta who had like him managed to make the trip to Rome - only four days long, but a meeting to remember.

Vineyards in the Desert

John Bouch, Lav Training Officer in the Diocese has written to every parish to introduce a training programme which can be run during the course of a weekend. Set up in response to commonly expressed concerns about the apparent scarcity of leadership skills in Urban Priority areas, the programme gives an opportunity for those taking part, to spend a considerable amount of time together in thinking about how they may more effectively become the Body of Christ. GOD ABROAD

How much value do we attach to other faiths? Do we reject other faiths as being wrong or at least as being not as right as Christianity?

As Christians, we believe that the Word became incarnate in Iesus Christ. But that this is so does not discount the possibility that the word has been made manifest in many different ways, and has been revealed at different times and places in a way that is understandable and acceptable to the cultures concerned.

Religion has and does often play a significant role in the conflicts which cause so much human suffering and hatred on our planet. Appreciation rather than condemnation is what is needed. We should welcome and embrace others who have a vision of the Truth, for there is only one Truth, and a more complete understanding may be had by giving due consideration to each human glimpse of God throughout time and space.

All faiths are not alike. To think otherwise would be naive. There are major differences both between and within faiths. At a personal leval, however, there is a surprising degree of commonality.

Below I list quotes from five individuals, summarising what their faith means to them. Try naming the respective faiths before looking at the answers, which are to be found at the bottom of page 10.

- 1. My main aim of this life is to lead a peaceful and helpful life, and to serve humanity in any way I can, and not to be a hindrance to anyone. That is the aim of my life, and I try my utmost to achieve this aim.
- 2. Peace and harmony and tolerance and compassion and generosity: I think these are the things; and I think these are very, very important - and honesty: honesty for yourself and for others, without any discrimination, without colour or creed. And compassion has to extend not only to human beings, but beyond all human beings to all creatures.

- I wouldn't have said this a few years ago, but I think I'll say it now, that if you reduce the whole of it, as they say, to a few words, it's Love thy neighbour as thyself. That incorporates and takes in the real ethic.
- 4. I would say that the real characteristics are accepting things, and giving, caring, loving, about everyone, not just about your own family: I think it must include everyone that you come into contact with, that you must care always to care, that's the important thing.
- 5. Without my religion, my belief, my faith, I would'nt be a human being at all: I would be just as useless as a weed in my garden. It's my belief that keeps me up. I walk in the street sometimes, and many people look at me and say a lot of things which they shouldn't say, but I forget all about it, because my religion says, Tolerance, patience, obedience. I take every other fellow as a human being. So my religion is important to me. It is because of my religion that I survive.

The quotes are taken from WORLDS OF FAITH, by John Bowker-a highly readable and informative little book.

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
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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

In primitive societies where the practice of birthday celebrations goes by default, the older generation often do not know how old they are. Without a regular reminder facts get forgotten and milestones marking our progress through life become indistinct.

Early next month we celebrate two birthdays in the life of the Church. One is the 'Birthday of the Church' on Pentecost or Whitsunday (14th May). We keep it on that day because on the Feast of Pentecost, in the power of the Holy Spirit, the disciples first preached the Gospel to others. The purpose of the Church is to witness. The Latin for Church is "Ecclesia" which means "those who are called out". The Church consists of those 'called by God in order to call others to Him.'

The second birthday is that of the Diocese of Sheffield - inaugurated 75 years ago on 1st May 1914. To a place like Totley which has belonged in succession to the dioceses of Lichfield, Southwell, Derby and Sheffield these celebrations may seem un-noteworthy. JESUS' PURPOSE

I was particularly struck recently by reading a passage from "Through the Year with David Watson". It contains a quotation from his Pastoral Letters. He writes:-

"What was the purpose of Jesus' coming into the world?

First, he came to save - not to judge. He lived in this sinful lost world for as long as we allowed him to. In the end, it was not that he rejected us because of our faults and failings, but that we rejected him. He suffered and served - and that's what his followers are called to do. So if you are tempted to pull out of your church situation, because you find the faults and failings of others hard to bear - remember Jesus Christ.

Secondly, Jesus came as a wonderful counsellor, perfectly fulfilling the name given to him hundreds of years before (Isaiah 9:6). And when he left the earth physically, he promised that another counsellor would come and be with his people for ever (John 14:16).

Thirdly, Jesus became poor for us - deparately poor - "so that you through his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9) - rich in faith and love, joy and peace, and all those priceless qualities which money cannot buy. Truly to follow Jesus means accepting his lifestyle so that others may live.

Fourthly, Jesus came as the Prince of Peace. In God's eyes the quality of our relationships is more important than the rightness of our particular convictions. As Christians, we are often bad at learning how to disagree; but we do need to remain in harmony. "Make every effort to keep the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace" (Ephesians 4:3). If we cannot experience and demonstrate the reality of this in Christ, what have we to offer to the rest of society, with its fractured relationships? We are to be peacemakers rather than peacelovers and this is a painful calling, but it's what we should be involved in if we are true followers of Jesus."

No further comment from me seems to be necessary!

Bishop David writes:

JESUS' WAY

The parable is at the heart of Jesus' way of teaching: The story is told; the mind and the heart of the listener engaged; the question asked - "Who then was neighbour to him that fell among the thieves?" A message of love is told in a loving way that respects the integrity of the persons involved.



Another parable, the parable of the Grand Inquisitor invented by the Russian novelist, Dostoevsky, highlights the difficulties we Christians have found in following the Jesus way. It is a long story but at the heart of it is this. "In the days of the Inquisition our Lord returned to earth and visited a city where it was at work. There is great joy in that city but the aged Inquisitor has Him arrested. The speech that follows takes place in the dungeon.

"You have come", the Inquisitor tells Jesus, "to spoil our work. In the Wilderness you were offered the three things by which men may be controlled: Bread, Authority and Mystery. You were to make Bread. People will follow him who gives the Bread But you would not! You were to assume Authority. People will obey him who rewards the obedient and punishes the disobedient. But you would not! You were to work some Marvel. People will believe in him who is wrapped in Mystery. But you would not! People were to believe in you out of love and devotion or not at all. We have had to correct your work or there would be fear to believe in you." The story ends like this: "The Inquisitor ceased; and still the Prisoner made no reply, but rose from where He sat, and crossed the Cell and kissed the old man on his bloodless lips. Then the Inquisitor opened the door; "Go" he said. The Prisoner passed into the night, and was not seen again. And the old man? That kiss burned in his heart, but he did not alter his opinion or practice."

All religions face the temptation to achieve their spiritual purpose by evil means. Christians are not exempt and the record of all denominations who have had secular power is dreadful. We can only repent. But in our weakness today, when we have not the power to kill and torture in the name of a loving Christ, we remain constantly tempted to go down another road than that pointed out to us by Jesus. In a world of violence and arrogant certainties I pray that all Christians may be brave enough to follow Jesus' Way. The parable lets the listener make up his own mind.

May God guide and bless us all.

BRITISH FOOD & FARMING — A YEAR OF CELEBRATION

1989 was chosen because it is the 150th anniversary of The Royal Agricultural Society of England and also the centenary of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. Agriculture is now the major industry in this country and now produces nearly all our food requirements that can be grown in this climate.

However, this Year of Celebration, is not an occasion to pat ourselves on the back but rather an opportunity to create a better understanding between those who live in our towns and cities and those who live in the rural areas.

For this reason churches, of all denominations, have been asked to participate and in this diocese we too are planning to play our part.

The rural parishes have twinned with urban parishes and it is hoped that as many as possible from our urban parishes will join in the special services which have been arranged.

The next of these is the Rogationtide Parade which will be led by The Bishop of Sheffield and will be held on SUNDAY, APRIL 30th at HIGH MELTON commencing at 10.45 a.m., lunch will be available after this service.

A series of Rural Drives are also being planned. The Drives are planned around the parishes of Bilham and Barnburgh with Melton-on-the-Hill: The United Benefice of Fishlake, Sykehouse, Kirk Bramwith, Fenwick and Moss: The Marshlands: The Deanery of Laughton and the Parish of Greater Snaith.

Booklets for each of these Drives is being prepared setting out the route, the churches you can visit, the places of interest on the route, special events taking place during the summer and details of the local hostelries. These booklets will be available in a pack and will be free to everyone who is interested. It is hoped that during the coming summer and autumn people will come out and follow these Drives and join in the special events which have been organised.

China Bound!

An exciting Youth Exchange is being planned with the Church in China, and the United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel is anxious to promote growth in relationships between the younger generations in the British and Chinese churches, so much so that the Society has agreed to contribute £1,000 - £500 towards a young person going to China ansd £500 towards the return visit.

The idea for the exchange, the first part of which is about Easter time 1990, came from the Conference for World Mission, the British Council of Churches, and the Friends of the Church in China. It is hoped that the party will be made up of 15 young people (aged 18-25) who are committed to work in their local church. Visits to both urban and rural churches will be part of the programme, as well as some sightseeing. Study Project Funding by EIG

More than £15,000 will be made available this year to fund study projects selected under the award scheme launched by the Ecclesiastical Insurance Group in its centenary year. 1989 marks the second year of the Bursary Awards to encourage

Bursary Awards to encourage valuable in-service training for the clergy. Gloucester-based EIG announce that a total of 18 projects, out of the 50 applications received, will now be given funding from the scheme.

The winning projects which, under the scheme, must show potential for real benefits to the Church itself, as well as the community it serves, are once again varied and exciting in scope.

This year, again, our own Diocese has had a winner in the Revd. David James, Vicar and Rural Dean of Ecclesfield, who is awarded a Bursary to prepare training materials specifically for lay people. He wishes to produce practical guidelines, blending both theology and modern counselling techniques.

The EIG Centenary Awards judging panel was headed by the Bishop of Hull, who presented the awards. Commenting on the winners he said: "Again, the judges have been impressed by the number and quality of applications received. This selection of 18 winning projects reflects the Church's determination to continue to address community issues of real concern."

Not a first for Sheffield!

The Editor's desk has been piled high with correspondence from the Doncaster and District Organists and Choirmasters Association about the claim of Sheffield's Association to have been the first to publish a booklet about Sheffield's organs. Indeed Sheffield's Association was the first to publish about Sheffield's organs, but they were well and truly beaten by the Doncaster Association with the idea! For they did the same thing for Doncaster way back in 1969/70, and their booklet was considerably revised and enlarged and updated in 1984. The Doncaster Association's booklet gives loads of interesting information on both organs and organists from the 16th century right up to 1984. Mr. Ted. With only a few weeks to go to the end of its first year, the Bishop's fMILLION APPEAL is on target with a quarter of the amount already given or promised. The £276,000 mark was passed at the end of February, and already one of the projects earmarked for aid - the building of a new church and community centre to replace St. Bartholomew's in the shadow of Sheffield's Kelvin Flats complex - is now in progress. As are extensions to the Church of St. Wilfrid, Cantley, Doncaster, where funding on a grant/loan basis has been promised. The extensions will enable the church to cope with the large increase in population in recent years and to provide for the needs of the community.

The Bishop's Appeal - to finance in large and small ways Church of England and ecumenical building projects throughout the Diocese of Sheffield was launched in April last year. Since then 1.200 individuals have contributed or covenanted large and small amounts, together with donations from parishes and organisations. And more is promised. The Deanery of Hallam has pledged to raise £300,000 towards the new St. Bartholomew's, Netherthorpe, All this was part of a package of good news delivered to the clergy of the Diocese at recent special meetings. although he was also keen to give a gentle reminder to individuals and parishes which have not vet contributed. "The fact is" said the Bishop "We need the money. And if 5,000 people had responded instead of 1,200 we could have wrapped up the Appeal this year and had a service of thanksgiving".

"The opportunity and the joy of helping one another must inflame and excite every parish" added the Bishop (the Rt. Revd. David Lunn).

Projects all over the Diocese of Sheffield will benefit in part from the Bishop's Appeal and plans are already well advanced for the building of a new (ecumenical) church on the Manor Estate with combined community facilities and it is hoped eventually to build a new parish church to serve the fast-growing area of Swallownest between Rotherham and Sheffield.

Part of the £1 million being raised by the Bishop's Appeal is also pledged as the Sheffield contribution to the Church Urban Fund - the national fund set up by the Church of England in the wake of the Archbishop of Canterbury's "Faith in the City" report. Sheffield Diocese have been asked to contribute a total of £300,000 to the Church Urban Fund, but, in fact, a good percentage of this has already found its way back to Sheffield and South Yorkshire through the Church Urban Funding for projects under way.

Light in the Darkness: Denaby Miners' Chapel

A shaft of light reaching down into every roadway and heading, part of Cadeby's winding wheel, rings and supports, lumps of coal and a 'miner's lamp' tower...these and much more have been given a home in the Miners' Chapel. All Saints Parish Church at Denaby Main has become the cradle for a very timely and significant development in the story of mining in South Yorkshire. Church and Chapel are in the middle of the village, across the road from the sites of the former Denaby Main and Cadeby Collieries. It is a touching place.

The unity and strength of a mining community are held in pictures of the Denaby Evictions and the Cadeby Disaster. The equipment brought to rest here after years of torque and tension is a reminder of the mining still going on elsewhere. Perhaps knowing about the past in this uncertain present will create courage and pride for the future. Such a promise is vital in a community that now has little support through local employment. For Reg Davies, Vicar of Denaby, the Chapel says "mining is a worthy, worthwhile and dignified occupation". A Book of Remembrance is being opened. Arrangements for people's names to be entered will be announced. Reg hopes that people who visit here will be inspired about the mining of coal and God's purpose for them now.

The commitment of local people, practical help from people in the industry and the building trade, and the interest of artists and writers mean that everyone can acknowledge all that has happened. Some events call for gratitude, others for sorrow; but the Miners' Chapel is a mark of hope for a new future as it lifts up miners and mining work to God in truth and love. One of the hymns written for the Opening Service has been inspired by Isaiah 43.19, "Watch for the new thing I am going to do...a road through the wilderness...and streams of water there".

Bishop David dedicated the Chapel on Easter Day, 26th March 1989, the day when "from the darkness came light".

Sheffield Diocesan Decade of Evangelism **GET READY!**

Bishop David has called the Diocese to a Decade of Evangelism which he will launch at a Diocesan Festival on Sunday, 10th June, 1990 at Doncaster Racecourse.

To help prepare for the Decade, there are to be three evening celebrations at the OCTAGON CENTRE, SHEFFIELD UNIVERSITY, on MONDAYS 16th and 30th OCTOBER and 13th NOVEMBER, 1989. It's hoped that every parish in the Diocese will be represented on each of these evenings. The three themes for the celebrations are: Fire for the journey, Light for the Journey, Food for the Journey, and a competition (details have already been sent to the parishes) has been organised for sketches and songs which can be included in the programme. Missions to Seamen Scheme

A Voluntary Service Scheme is offered by The Missions to Seamen to Christian students, usually between the ages of 18 and 24; after 'A' level studies or after university before starting work. It is an opportunity to give and learn at seafarers' centres around the world.

Starting in September and normally lasting a year, in some cases two, or exceptionally three, the scheme is often used as a testing ground by those considering entering the church, but just as often young people who wish to devote a year of their life to Christ return home to take up entirely different professions.

The Missions to Seamen was founded in 1856 and was affirmed at Lambeth last year as being the Anglican Church's outreach to merchant seafarers worldwide. It is estimated that two thirds of the world's merchant seafarers are from developing countries. They spend long periods of time away from their families and friends, sometimes a year or more, and modern cargo handling equipment ensures such quick turnround of ships nowadays that often there is little or no time for shore leave. They can experience problems with non-payment of wages, unsafe conditions, poor quality food, and can easily be made to feel insignificant, without value and outside normal society.

The Missions to Seamen seeks to redress this situation by proclaiming God's love by word and deed to seafarers and by promoting their wellbeing in every way through its network of chaplains and seafarers' centres throughout the world. A student assistant joins this network at some of the larger port stations and gives help in ship visiting, conducting sightseeing tours, (clean driving licence required), arranging sporting events, visiting seafarers in hospital, helping with worship, serving in the bar and shop, arranging international telephone calls, arranging video shows and practical work such as gardening and cleaning. He/she is given free board and lodging, pocket money, free travel to and from destination and three weeks' holiday a year.

The nineteen students on the scheme last year were posted to ports including Brisbane, Dunkirk, Fos/Marseilles, Fremantle, Goole, Kobe, Liverpool, Mombasa, New Orleans, Port Hedland, Rotterdam, Seaham, Singapore, Southampton and Yokohama.

As one said: "I certainly learned a great deal from the seamen, a great deal about charity and care for others as well as getting glimpses of problems far deeper than I had ever experienced. I had to find out how to offer myself unconditionally to people rather than imagining that I had something which they needed."



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
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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

On the next page you will find a new symbol of Christian Unity reproduced. Since 1985 and the "Not Strangers but Pilgrims" consultations, a fresh impetus has been given to the movement towards Christian Unity in this country. The British Council of Churches which the Roman Catholic Church has always declined to join, is to be replaced by a new body "Churches Together in England" acceptable to all mainstream denominations. Through 'C.T.E.' all churches will be able to speak as one for the first time.

The scallop shell is an ancient symbol of pilgrimage. Within the shell is the sign of the 'Cross and the Ship' - the first symbol of the ecumenical movement. The ship represents the whole church, the Cross the centrality of Christ to our faith and worship. The new symbol conveys the idea that the path to Christian Unity is a pilgrimage we are engaging in together. Like Chaucer's pilgrims, we come from different backgrounds, with different personalities and gifts, but we journey towards a common goal, and as fellow-travellers we can learn from one another, come to know each other better and grow closer in our relationships.

Many feel that the only credibility the Christian Faith can have with the world at large is to succeed in becoming united. How can the divisions of the world be healed by the Gospel if the Church cannot heal its own divisions? Unity in Christ is the key to mission - and the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity one of the most important observances of the year. This year it coincides with Christian Aid Week - and there is something very appropriate about this. Through our prayers we shall not only be seeking to promote unity among fellow-Christians, but be seeking to identify and become one with those whose life-style and circumstances demand our compassionate response, understanding and practical help.

The Picnic and the Service on Saturday 20th May, the Daily Services during the week, and the Christian Aid collection provide us all with opportunities to join in. Do come and take some part in these efforts!



"TOGETHER FOR PENTECOST"

Writes the Bishop of Doncaster

Congratulations to Doncaster for being chosen as the first Northern Railhead for the Channel Tunnel. It is a significent achievement and augurs well for the future in terms of both investment and jobs. With the coming of the single European Market in 1992 one hopes that the region's skills will be fully recognised. Being a distance away from South Eastern battles over routes we are able to say that it is high time good sensible Yorkshire people



were given an opportunity to show the rest of Britain, let alone Europe, their quality.

A single European Market is I suppose something of a misnomer, as the countries participating will be those within the Common Market Group; but by contrast it is increasingly the case for the Churches that there is a single European Market for our common Christian Witness. During May, as it happens, a quite remarkable event is taking place within a Christian context. A European Ecumenical Assembly is being held in Basel from 15-21 May. The Reformed, Lutheran and Orthodox Churches will be there, as will the Anglican Church. For the first time since the Reformation the Roman Catholic Church is to be fully and officially involved with a very substantial representation.

All this is a reminder that we should be aware of our European Christian Heritage and our oneness in Christ with our brother and sister christians in Sweden or France, in Bochum or Hattingen, in Rome or Geneva.

Do not forget Pentecost Sunday. Don't forget it for the straighforward reason that we need a constant and particular waiting on God for the enabling power of the Holy Spirit. As we prepare for the Decade of Evangelism we should remind ourselves that the first major evangelistic endeavor was prompted on the day of Pentecost, not by human publicity or through training in Evangelism, but by the Holy Spirit. We need publicity, training, preparation. We need not doubt that; but if the Church is to be effective it must be the Holy Spirit's decade, not ours.

I am sure we shall not forget this Pentecost for another and quite special reason. At 6 p.m. on May 14, there will be a Broadcast Service of Dedication from the Cathedral; and the Bishop will be using this unique opportunity to preach to the Diocese. So tune in to Radio Sheffield; and as we dedicate our lives in prayer, may God's Holy Spirit take the Bishop's words to speak to us through them.

Ten years on....

Beryl Rayner writes about the Boat People:

"Many of us recall recent television news coverage of the 'repatriation' to Vietnam of 'boat people' who had left as refugees - the expressions on their faces were not easy to forget. We may know too of the present plight of thousands still living in cramped conditions in camps in Hong Kong.

We may not be so aware of the excellent work undertaken in Sheffield by the Northern Refugee Centre, opened in 1983 under its Director, Michael Seear. Situated in Yew Lane, off Fitzallen Square, the Centre provides a full social programme including 'Over 60's' and Youth Clubs; teaching is conducted by volunteers in a wide variety of subjects, and its advice and counselling services are highly valued by refugees for the help given with the many problems they face.

Dependence for finance is largely on charitable trusts, though representation continues to be made to both central and local government. The state, suitability and security of tenure of their present premises are causing some concern.

Considerable support was given by individual churches and church members, particularly when the Vietnamese first arrived here, but the response to a recent appeal for £50 each from churches in Sheffield was disappointing.

Representatives of the few churches who did donate were invited to a joyful celebration of the Chinese New Year, and treated with generosity and great hospitality.

I commend to you all the need for our continuing support in prayer and practical financial help in the name of Christ."

Health and Wholeness

Hazel Cranwell was a participant in the National Clergy Wives Conference held recently in North Yorkshire and writes about her visit.

"The Clergy Wives Conference at Scargill was attended by Stella Jockel, Jessie Mathews and Hazel Cranwell, who went as diocesan representatives.

Scargill is a pleasant setting for a conference and the meeting, together with eighty very different and powerful women was an amazing, enlightening and uplifting experience. There was a sense in which one no longer felt alone, but of belonging to a sisterhood, especially in Chapel when eighty female voices were lifted in song.

The theme of the conference was "Health" which was looked at from all angles. Some interesting thoughts and new insights emerged. For instance, we often talk about people living longer, but this is not essentially true. What is true is that few young people die from infection and disease and people are living a full life span.

We need to pay closer attention to what we eat and what models of health we present to our children. Women are smoking more and this leads to further increases in lung cancer.

There were very interesting speakers and the conference was well run. The food was not very exciting but company and delightful surroundings made up for this. All three of us felt glad we attended."

The programme will be varied, including 'standards' from the old swing band days - Glen Miller, Count Basie, etc. And there will be a cross-section of more modern big band writing too - the sort of thing you can hear on Monday nights on Radio 2.

This kind of concert is probably a 'first' for All Saints'. But we hope the 'Saints will come marchin' in' with their support on the night. 'I can promise you an excellent performance', says the Vicar of Rotherham, the Rev. Stuart Brindley, 'and you'll be helping towards the £600,000 or so we shall be needing for restoration and re-ordering work at this gem of a parish church.'

Synod Digest

THE DIOCESE OF SHEFFIELD is to enter into a partnership with the Diocese of Guildford. This was the major decision at the March meeting of Sheffield Diocesan Synod. After an excellent debate voting was 76 in favour of the link, and 22 against with 6 abstentions. Those against the partnership, including at least one unrepentant southerner, were anxious about the possibility of coachloads of folk from the Diocese of Guildford being bussed around Urban Priority Areas "up north". Those in favour, including at least one repentant southerner, urged the partnership on the grounds of increasing understanding at all levels of Church life. An amendment, proposing that partnership costs be split fifty/fifty was rejected.

RURAL ADVISER: YES. There was wholehearted support from Synod members that the appointment of the Bishop's Rural Adviser, be extended for a further 5 year period at the end of the current term in June, 1990. The post is held by the Revd John Woods.

EVANGELISM ADVISER: NOT YET. But a "hold" was put on the appointment of an Adviser on Evangelism (proposed by the Committee for Mission and Unity). Canon Mike West proposed "next business" on this one, with the effect of blocking any further debate for the time being. He did not do this, he said, to wreck the idea of such an appointment, but in order to give Synod members and Mission and Unity, more time to consider the appointment.

UNITY GO-AHEAD. The two Canons (rules and regulations) of the Church of England were noted, as duly promulged and executed at the last Sessions of the General Synod. Canon B43 regulates a range of matters concerned with the participation of Anglican clergy in the services of other denominations and Canon B44 covers issues arising in areas designated as Local Ecumenical Projects.

Reporting the meeting of SHEFFIELD DIOCESAN SYNOD held in Herringthorpe, Rotherham on Saturday, March 11th, 1989. From the Diocesan Communication Officer, the Revd Roy Arnold.

DECADE DETAIL: The Bishop of Sheffield proposed "that there be a Decade of Evangelism in the Diocese commencing with a Gathering of the parishes at Doncaster Race Course on June 10th 1990", and everyone agreed.

REPORTS were received from the Bishop's Council, from the Diocesan Finance Committee and Professor David McClean and Mr. Leslie Fletcher dealt with questions arising.

QUESTION TIME brought questions on future debate on "Salvation and the Church" (the latest document produced by the Anglican Roman Catholic International unity discussions). It was reported that debate would be encouraged later in the year when a Study Guide would be available. Anxieties about the Maseno North Link were aired and will be debated at some future stage. No progress was reported on the appointment of a new Adult Education Officer for the Diocese, and a question was asked about whether or not members of the Diocesan Staff could or could not be permitted to be elected to Parochial Church Councils. The answer seemed to be that it all depends, but there was obvious difficulties in Diocesan Staff members serving on Diocesan Synod under regulations of the Charity Commissioners.

ELECTIONS: Mr. P.W. Allott was appointed to the Bishop's Council as a lay representative and Mr. David Wilson was appointed to the Diocesan Board of Patronage.

IN THE CHAIR for the first time at the March meeting of Diocesan Synod was the Revd Gordon Taylor, as the new Clerical Vice Chairman of Synod...and very well he did too. The NEXT MEETING OF SYNOD will be June 17th 1989 at Snaith.


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ALL SAINTS SCHOOL NEWS

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
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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Later this month Sheffield will be taking part in the Livelink Mission in which the message of Billy Graham at Wembley will be beamed live by satellite to many towns across the country. Due to modern technology he will be speaking to more people in one evening than St.Paul did in all his years of missionary activity. However, many who come will be there because of the personal invitation and encouragement of a friend. 



THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE

Writes the Bishop of Sheffield

The Creeds that start so splendidly with God end with us! "The resurrection of the body and the life everlasting" proclaims our Christian belief that the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ means that for us death is a gateway to life. But a certain vagueness about what this means can take the edge off this particular piece of 'Good News', Astonishingly



some Christians - so the pollsters tell us - don't believe in 'life after death' at all. Others so spiritualize the idea that somehow in the future life will be so swept into the Godhead that we lose our identity as surely as does a drop of water falling into the sea. Others again have their visions of the hereafter so earthbound that the future life sinks into an infinite extension of the better moments of this life. And yet others make the absurd attempt to tie into the Christian tradition ideas of reincarnation. For this 'Life' that lies beyond the grave to have meaning for us it must have three distinctive qualities. First it must be clearly the same life on both sides of the experience of death. If in the "new" life we had no memory or knowledge of the old life it could have no meaning for us. As an excercise in Divine bookkeeping we might count as the same person but without the unifying bond of memory that could have no significance for us.

Secondly we must be able to meet with, and recognise, friends old and new. Surely this is what the phrase "resurrection of the body" is really about. We become ourself through our meetings with other people. Our 'body' gives us identity and individuality. And that individuality and identity makes it possible for us to enter, even in this earthbound life, into an almost infinite variety of relationships with others. Without those whom we love heaven couldn't be heaven. Without the possibilities of giving and receiving love and affection we wouldn't be human and we wouldn't be "made in God's image and after his likeness".

Yet, thirdly, this new life is a 'spiritual' life that escapes from the limitations of our present physical existence. We enter here into matters beyond our experience. We know the constraints of time and space. we cannot imagine growth without change. Most of our relationships are in some sense exclusive and we find it hard to see how it could be otherwise. For most of us our consciousness of the presence of God is so imperfect that we can't grasp what it will be like to "know even as we are known".

All this has revelance for the debate about the nature of Christ's Resurrection. The Gospel account of the Risen Christ is curiously different from that given, for example, of the crucified Christ. Gerald Priestland has used the word 'ragged' of these appearances of the Risen Jesus to his disciples. Many in every age would have liked a fuller record. But I've come to see, in the little we have, the mysterious providence of God. For we are told the three things we need to know. Firstly that this is the same Jesus as the Jesus who had travelled with his disciples from Galilee to Jerusalem and had been crucified 'outside the City wall'. The empty tomb, the marks in his hands, the varied greetings to the disciples, all in their different ways make this point certain. Secondly it is made very clear that the Risen Christ remains a person with a real individuality capable of making, sustaining, and renewing friendships. In this way he re-establishes his personal leadership of the Church - it is to be the Church of Jesus Christ. But thirdly, we are left in no doubt that this is a risen, and not a resuscitated, Christ. Despite the all-important continuities the Risen Christ in his spiritual body does transcend time and space and sees the beginning for that relationship with his disciples, however numerous, however scattered, and in whatever bit of time they may be, that is to be the pattern for the Church's life.

Much about the Resurrection still arouses our curiosity. But I believe speculation here to be fruitless. We have been told what we need to know and with that I can be content.

Jesus lives! thy terrors now
Can, O Death, no more appal us;
Jesus lives! by this we know
Thou, O grave, canst not enthrall us.

Alleluya!

HAPPY ANNIVERSARY

Sheffield Cathedral was packed to the doors on April 30th, with representatives from almost every parish in the Diocese to mark the occasion of the 75th Anniversary of the Dedication of the Cathedral and the inauguration of the Diocese. Preaching at the service was the Bishop of Buckingham, the Rt. Revd. Simon Burrows, grandson of the first Bishop of Sheffield.

Bishop David welcomed Bishop Michael Adie of Guildford to the service, and spoke of his hopes for the link now established between our two dioceses.

Bishop David led the congregation who had come from far and wide, in an Act of Dedication at the beginning of this Anniversary Year.

O God who has guided and strengthened your Church with the gift of the Holy Spirit: give us the help of the same Spirit in all our life and worship, that we may expect great things from you, and attempt great things for you, and show to the world your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ; to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be honour and glory, now and for ever. Amen.

The Right Revd. Stewart Cross

Bishop David expressed the thankfulness of the whole Diocese in his words at the Choral Evensong at the Cathedral in thanksgiving for the life and ministry of Stewart Cross, Bishop of Blackburn and former Bishop of Doncaster from 1976-82, who died on 6th April, 1989.

Many parishes and individuals in the Diocese have cause to be thankful for the part that he played in their lives during his time here. Michael King, Tower Captain of All Saints, Darfield near Barnsley, reports that a half-muffled peal of their eight bells was rung after the news of his death, for Stewart Cross was a bell-ringing Bishop. When he first arrived in the Diocese, after the dedication of the rehung ring of six bells at St. Nicholas, Bradfield, he joined in with the opening celebratory session of ringing. Several years later, having dedicated two new treble bells at Darfield, he climbed the tower steps and rang one of the new bells, with members of the local company at the ropes of the other seven.

As we express our privilege in having had Stewart as part of our lives, we extend our love to Mary and their family.

Another look to the future in the service was offered by the presence of the Bishop of Guildford - visible evidence of the forging of the link between the two dioceses which is now taking place.

The service was a blend of old and new - some 1662, some 1928, and some ASB. The music too reflected this with some special items from the cathedral choir and hymns old and new for all to sing. All this was a happy compromise in a diocese which represents as many different views about everything as does the Church of England at large. Truly it was a magnificent occasion and we were happy to make the most of it. As the Bishop so rightly pointed out, not all of us will be around to celebrate the centenary.

NEWSLETTER FROM SOUTHERN AFRICA

I am now over half way through my work as a Project Trust volunteer at this school for physically handicapped children in Umtata. I have had many opportunities to get to know the people and places of South Africa.

The first was when I helped transport the children back to their homes for the Christmas holiday; some to very isolated parts of Transkei.

The second opportunity came when we were sent on 6 weeks' leave for the Summer holiday. We began by sampling South African life in Durban then hitch hiked to Lesotho where we went on a 3 day pony trek in the wildest parts of the country. Next I hitched to Cape Town to join the other volunteers. We went to Midnight Mass led by Desmond Tutu on Christmas Eve and climbed Table Mountain at 3am to see the sun rise on New Year's Day - a truly wonderful experience. Then I went North to Jo'burg - past the mine heaps of the Transvaal, where a Sheffield knife grinder called Samuel Marks established many of the gold and diamond industries. Sheffield's steel is famous even in the Transkei, and so back at school I have made a display on Sheffield and the origins of the steel industry.

The new school year began with new classes and new subjects to teach. While bringing the children back to school I fell ill with typhoid. After several weeks in hospital I have now returned and am coping with science, hobbies, art, singing, table tennis and pottery.

My future plans include working with an organisation called "Operation Hunger" to help feed the growing population of rural Transkei, and finding more ways to help the children whom I find absolutely fantastic and well worthwhile teaching. Once again I would like to thank my sponsors for making these experiences possible.

IN PERSPECTIVE

Occasionally the calm even tenor of religious life and thought is shattered by the odd explosion, some would say whimper depending on the depth of feeling aroused by these outburst. I refer to Bishop Jenkins' Easter thoughts and views on the resurrection, and Salman Rushdie's novel, "The Satanic Verses". Certainly the Bishop's words are almost forgotten, though at the time they exercised our minds which is good; that it did not affect our faith whatever views we hold is even better. I did not expect otherwise, we are not that sort of people. What is annoying is those people who rush into print at the drop of a hat (preferably belonging to a newspaper editor) pontificating on matters spiritual, and whose private lives may not be above reproach. We have no time to indulge in such luxury, we try to lead a Christian life guided by the Scriptures. 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
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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Over this last month we have witnessed on our television screens the amazing scenes of protest by the people of China followed by the horrifying massacre. In a couple of months we shall no doubt be reminded of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the start of the Second World War which included within it both holocaust and Hiroshima.

One effect of the Second World War was a determination that these things should not happen again. People should not be slaughtered because of their political or religious beliefs, their racial or national ties. Sadly so many events since, and the events of China last month, show how far the world is from this ideal.

Yet I believe the future will show that those who died for freedom, justice and democracy did not give up their lives in vain. We can look back on the many martyrs in the early years of Christianity. At the time some may have wondered why they were wasting their lives in this way. Yet nothing anyone does is lost on future generations. Every act and thought has its effect. The more significant the action the more influential it will be. There is a sense therefore that the peaceful protests in China were made for us and future generations.

As we think of the tragic outcome of recent events, let us remember that the crucifixion was the prelude to resurrection and the ultimate purposes of God can never be defeated.


BROWNIES

The Bishop of Doncaster writes:-

This month a group of men and women start their ministry in the Diocese as Deacons. As they exercise that ministry in their parishes, they will be acutely aware of the pristine whiteness of their clerical collars. If my own early experience is anything to go by they will also be under the impression that all and sundry have eyes fixed on their distinctive attire. (It hardly needs to be said that in reality the passing population's eyes are more likely to be focussed elsewhere!)

Another group are beginning their ministry as Priests; conscious of the humbling privilege of presiding at the Lord's Table over the eucharistic feast.

We all need praying for; but our newly ordained Priests and Deacons are in particular need of prayer. We remember them on the day of their ordination but we must continue to do so in the opening years of their ministry. What happens to them, what they learn and what they experience, will in large measure shape the future direction of their service for the Kingdom of God.

Do not forget to pray for the other clergy in the Diocese either. I don't ask this out of false sense of clerical importance. Clergy are part of the laity, members of the baptised community. Nevertheless if the clergy fail to be what God wants them to be, the life of the Church in the wider community is seriously hindered. We must pray that those ordained to the sacred ministry continue to be effective pastors and teachers, prophets and servants; above all faithful practitioners of the presence of God.

We are delighted that Bishop Ian Harland is to be the new Bishop of Carlisle. It can be said with suitable modesty that his many years in the Sheffield Diocese provided him with good preparation. We were greatly blessed through him and so will the Diocese of Carlisle be. Our love and best wishes go with him, Sue, and the family as they move in the Autumn.

On a much sadder note Graham Bewley, Vicar of Kimberworth, and previously Vicar of St. John, Park, died in May after a long and difficult illness. It is sometimes said that the Church of England doesn't produce clergy who are characters in the way it used to. That is not entirely true. If ever there was a character Graham was one; but a character for Christ. Outspoken, loving, committed, with a passionate concern both for evangelism and social justice, he made a lasting impact on anyone who knew him. On reflection I do not associate sadness with Graham. He has entered into the joy of his Lord, Gill, Rachel, Claire and Andrew will be in our prayers.

The Revd. Tom Dixon's first curacy was at St. Mary's, Bramhall Lane, Sheffield in the mid 1930s. Hard days in the city. He returned to work on the Manor for five years in the 1950s. Guests in Birmingham



Five people from the Readers' and Pastoral Workers' Course recently spent 48 hours as guests of the parish of St. Cuthbert's, Castle Vale in Birmingham.

The parish has 34 tower blocks and some low-rise housing, and a population of about 14,000. Although only 8 per cent are of Caribbean origin, the congregation of 70 is half black and half white. Parishioners acted as hosts. On the Saturday, visits were made to a Sikh gurdwara and the Polish Catholic Centre, and then to the Bull Ring shopping centre, teeming with Birmingham's multi-racial population.

In the evening, there was a barbecue for Christian Aid. Members of the group were given a real opportunity to experience a multi-racial society and to think about South Yorkshire's minorities.

Signs of hope in the midst of hate and fear.

Inner-city Belfast was the place where a group of eight from the Readers' and Pastoral Workers' Course in our Diocese, spent five days in May. They had gone to discover how Christians there live out their faith. The Revd. Sue Oakley reports on how they came away uplifted by the people they had met.

"Our base was the Columbanus Community of Reconciliation on the Antrim Road, and from there we visited parishes and projects working in inner-city communities. Another ecumenical community - Cornerstone - was our first visit. Here we were shown that the mere fact that Catholics and Protestants can live happily together can be a powerful witness for reconciliation to a divided community.

As we visited Church of Ireland parishes (Anglican) in Glencairn and Whiterock, the Shankill Road Mission (Presbyterian) and St. Peter's Cathedral (RC) in the midst of the Divis Flats, we met ministers and congregations struggling with many problems similar to those in our own parishes - but with the added dimension of fear and violence. One minister discribed the privileged position of the clergy in being free to speak out against violence and racketeering without fear of reprisals (he refered to his dog-collar as bullet proof!).

In areas where unemployment was very high (more than 75% in some places) the churches and projects were involved in schemes to provide employment and also community care, youth clubs, literacy work etc. - even health education. They are working to restore self-esteem and confidence to areas individuals and communities which had lost heart in the troubles. Although some of the schemes worked across the community divide, ecumenical relationships - because of the hostility between the two communities - had to be handled with great sensitivity and were usually only on an individual and informal basis).

The situation in Belfast is one with no easy answers and the fear that each community has of the other is very real (something brought home to us by our Catholic driver being terrified of driving us into a Protestant parish). Though the road blocks, armed soldiers walking down ordinary streets, barbed wire and high fences everywhere shocked us at first it was even more shocking to find ourselves getting used to them. But what impressed us most were the signs of hope, courageous and patient people working towards reconcillation and sharing God's love and peace in very practical ways with people surrounded by hate and fear."

During this month, Sheffield will be the scene of a Media Awareness Project workshop for training leaders from the Dioceses of Bradford, Sheffield and Wakefield. Now in its second year, this ecumenical project (known as MAP) is the brainchild of "Christians in the Media". This committee felt that there was a need to reinforce the knowledge which the public has about the good and the bad influences that the many forms of the media have upon it. The Mothers' Union was found to be the most suitable Christian organisation, with a grass-roots network, able and willing to act as the central agency for the programme. The MAP Trainer for the workshop is Cindy Kent, who first became known in Sheffield in the 1970s when she worked for Radio Hallam.

Good News from Rotherham.... and not so good

Rotherham Holiday Aid, the project that aims to help disadvantaged families in the Borough of Rotherham to enjoy a holiday, recently announced good news - that £5678 has been allocated by the Family Holiday Association to enable many Rotherham families to have a family holiday together this year. "This is tremendous news" said the Chairman of Rotherham Holiday Aid, the Revd. Raymond Draper Rector of Wickersley. "I hope it will encourage all those who have supported us since our launch in January this year."

But the bad news is that funds for this year have now run out, even though the need is still urgent. An appeal has gone out, in and around Rotherham, and the Treasurer at AA Travel, 1 All Saints' Square, Rotherham, S60 1PW is hoping for a generous response. The project is an idea worth copying elsewhere.

54 YEARS ON

The Revd. Bernard Croft, an old boy of the Diocese, now retired and living in York, visited Sheffield during the month of our 75th Anniversary celebrations. He reflects about his visit:

"It was Whitsun Week 1989. From the bus station I made my way to the Cathedral where I had been made deacon. Earlier that day I had gone out to Woodhouse, the place where I was born in 1910, and where I had been confirmed by Bishop Burrows who was to ordain me eleven years later. Four years older than the Diocese, I can claim to have been born in the Diocese of York to which I returned in 1986 and where in York itself I have made my retirement home.

Inside the Cathedral I read the memorial tablet to Bishop Burrows again and thought back to that Trinity Sunday morning when he had taken his ordinands down to the cathedral in two taxis. Looking down the nave from the chancel I could see three or four people at prayer in different pews. It brought to my mind John Russell Darbyshire, Vicar and Archdeacon of Sheffield, another key figure in my own calling. One of his chief concerns as Provost was to make the cathedral a place for private as well as public prayer. The story goes that when asking the then head-verger one day whether he noticed many or any people making use of the church for this, he had received the reply "Yes, Sir, I've caught one or two of 'em at it." Like Bishop Burrows, Provost Darbyshire was a true man of God: preacher. scholar, musician and poet.

I came out of the cathedral into the bright sunshine with a renewed sense of thanksgiving for it and for the much more modest church in that typical parish of the Sheffield Diocese where I had spent my younger days. And for those men who had served them so well - and I could not leave without a thought and prayer for their successors who shoulder similar burdens with a faith as brave and prayers as strong."

CONNIE STANSFIELD 1985 - 1989 The Vicar's Address

In preparing this address, I fell to thinking of what Connie might want to have said to us on this occasion. Whatever it might have been it would have contained words of encouragement, words of care and concern, words of determination - all said with a twinkle in her eye, and no doubt with a humourous anecdote at her own expense.

I also thought that of all those present here today, I am perhaps the least appropriate person to be speaking, having only come to know Connie after her 90th birthday. She had already given 50 years of service to this church following the move to Totley from her native Lancashire. I am the last in a line of incumbents of All Saints to have benefitted from and valued her wisdom, her wit, and her support.

Her service to individuals, to the community and city, and to this church was given willingly, and out of great concern for those she served. It was carried out with great enthusiasm and determination. She was a founder member of the W.V.S. in Sheffield in 1937, and following the outbreak of war was the 'Rest Center Organiser' for the city during its trauma of blitz and bombing. She was a member of the Inner Wheel for 50 years, and a member of the Standing Conference for Women.

Her work for the Church included both Diocesan and parochial activities. She gave 30 years of service to the Moral Welfare Committee and the P.C.C., as well as helping, supporting, and 'baking' for all the everyday events of parish and community life.

All this vountary activity stemmed from her genuine concern, interest in and love for people - and I am sure Connie would prefer to be remembered most for her friendship and her faith which touched the lives of so many individuals from all walks of life, who have cause to be thankful to her.

With her own family today - her daughters, her grand and great-grandchildren, those here from All Saints who knew her as part of our Church family - a mother to us all - express our gratitude for all that she has been, and rejoice at the new life she has entered into in the kingdom of God.

Her parting words to us might have been words of encouragement -

- to go on growing in our Christian Faith
- to go on offering our friendship, love and interest to all

and simply - to go on, and not give up!

Connie's deep faith came from her continuing Christian commitment; her lively mind, eager to question and think through her beliefs; and also the strength she knew from her personal relationship with God.

This is our way forward too, - to be committed; to learn and grow; and to enter into a deeper relationship with God through prayer and obedience.

From this strong foundation, Connie was able to offer genuine friendship and good counsel to others. She made herself available as a confidence and guide.

Our Christian faith should also inspire us to follow her example, and thereby bring hope and encouragement to others.

From the experience of her advanced years she would have exhorted us not to give up - in the spirit of this poem which she wrote out year after year in her new diary:-

Age is a quality of mind.

If you have left your dreams behind

If hope is cold

If you no longer plan ahead

If ambitions all are dead

Then you are old.

But if you make of life the best And in your life you still have zest If love you hold No matter how the years go by No matter how the birthdays fly You are not old!

Finally she might perhaps have left us with the concluding verse of our Bible Reading from I Corinthians 15:-

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, stand firm and steady, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing in the Lord your labour is not in vain."

So today we give thanks for Connie's life, we mourn her loss but we celebrate, too, that eternal life which she has entered and to which we too are called - our inheritance of The Kingdom of God.

THE RAIN IN SPAIN

This title came to mind when I was listening to Thora Hird's desert island discs. The song is from "My Fair Lady", the screen adaptation of Shaw's Pygmalion", where the professor transforms a cockney flower girl's strident voice to one of polished culture. Thora told of her visit as a child to her aunt, who kept a corner shop. The aunt gave Thora watercress sandwiches and exhorted her to "eat em all up, they're good for you, lots of iron in 'em", in a typical northern voice. When the shop door bell rang, Thora's aunt brushed aside the curtain dividing the house from the shop, and spoke in a most mellifluous voice. So Thora thought her aunt had one voice for watercress sandwiches but needed a different one for customers.

In the early days of Primitive Methodists, preachers who were of homely stock, whose prayers and sermons were couched in earthy fiery dialect, earned for themselves the title of "ranters". They caused wry amusement to any educated elders but were endured with tolerance and understanding. Similarly when we pray we should not worry too much about disjointed phrases, lengthy pauses or grammatical errors. Our Lord will listen with tolerance and understanding too. (Of course practice makes perfect, and there is always someone in need of our prayers!)

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

August is the traditional holiday month and many will be going off on some kind of break away. Part of the preparation and packing is deciding what we really need to take - usually trying to reduce our baggage to a minimum weight to avoid excess at the airport or having to carry heavy cases across railway stations. If you undertake a cycling or walking holiday only the key essential items of clothing and equipment can be packed. If it is a more leisurely holiday by car we can put in most of what we like. Even then it may be wise to ask - is it really needed? Cars can break down!

This can remind us about the journey of life we are all engaged on. We are here on earth for a purpose; our life has meaning and a goal, and the things we possess should be those which can help us to fulfil that purpose and reach that goal. Often we tend to let our homes get cluttered up with things we do not need for our "journey", and we waste valuable time looking after them or tidying them from one cupboard to another. Going on a self-catering holiday makes us realise how little we really need to live on day by day and how much more time we thereby have for recreation. Simplicity and the sharing of our possessions are hallmarks of Christian discipleship.

The message of the Bible is that material possessions are an encumbrance to spiritual growth. The liveliest Christians of our generation are amongst the poorest of the world's population. The so-called Third World is reminding us of insights of our faith we have neglected. Man's life does not consist of the things he possesses.

We are all guilty of possessing too much, of allowing material things to impede our spiritual progress. Let us give some thought this holiday month to how we can adjust the balance, and so travel light on our journey to God.

Get Ready Get Set Get Praying



August is the best month of the year for reflection and for good resolutions: Let us all make some time this month to reflect on that faith, hope and love which must undergird evangelism.

FAITH: "Go, make disciples" Jesus tells us. We have a gospel to proclaim. A Christianity of which 'Mission' is not part is hardly thinkable. Yet there is a harsh judgement from Jesus on the Pharisees' evangelists: "who travel over sea and land to make one convert...and make him twice as bad as they are themselves" (Matt. 23.15). There is an infinite variety in the way, in obedience to Jesus, we make disciples. The root always of evangelism must be a faith which links the revelation of God in Jesus and the world in which we live. And here the Advertisers and Businessmen are blind guides to us. Irrespective of the quality or usefulness of what they have to sell they devise a campaign designed to part us from our money. They needn't believe in what they are selling! Our August reflections should be on the reality and truth of our faith. And those of us who are called to preach and teach must make sure that there is coherence, breadth and truth in our preaching and teaching. I'm certain that the effectiveness of evangelism is closely linked to the strength of a Church's faith. But to put a profound and complex matter into shorthand - that can be a 'liberal' faith, an 'evangelical' faith, a 'catholic' faith or, indeed, any presentation of Christianity that comes from the heart and truthfully presents the Gospel of Christ.

HOPE: We need to keep asking the same question. Is my Church a place where salvation - that is health, wholeness and life - is to be found? Is it a place of Hope? I'm certain that the congregation is the key to evangelism. Where worship is a tedious chore, where nostalgia reigns, where there is no expectation for tomorrow, where there is no hope, of course there can't be evangelism! But again this doesn't mean there is a simple model for a congregation. The self-evident truth that many people - including good Christians and many who seem to long to become Christians - will travel miles to avoid the cheerful brightness of the so-called 'live' Church needs to be remembered. Worship preaching, and human fellowship, all touch profound levels of our personality: these things cannot be simplified to a single blueprint. But there is all the difference in the world between those who meet in hope, confident that God has brought them together to serve and meet with their Risen Lord and those whose worship is hope - less.

LOVE: Jesus, as he meets with people, can be angry, sad, and even rejected. But he is never indifferent and always there is love. The saddest sights are a Church which does not seem to care about the people of its neighbourhood, and a community that is either against, or indifferent to, the Church in their midst. Could the people of our parish - or even the younger people of our parish - possibly think that we don't love them?

Reflection leads to prayer and we rise from our knees ready for action: Get Ready, Get Set, Get Praying this August.

Summary of Sheffield Diocesan Summer Synod, Saturday, June 17th, 1989 at Snaith ... the Revd. Roy Arnold, Diocesan Communication Officer reporting.

Synod Digest

A STRONGLY WORDED MOTION from the Deanery of Attercliffe condemning Government plans to introduce the Community Charge (Poll Tax) next year was narrowly defeated (by one vote, 28 to 29) at the Summer meeting of Sheffield Diocesan Synod. Declaring total opposition to the Poll Tax and branding it as a "fundamental attack on the less well-off in our society, on Local Government, democracy and civil liberties" the motion drew sharp criticism itself and also support. Attempts to tone it down or even block a vote being taken were resisted by Synod but the motion was ultimately defeated. The Bishop of Sheffield said that in one respect, he felt sure the Poll Tax could provide a distinct boost to answerability in Local Government but he found it, nevertheless, iniquitous and the proposed charge should ease the burden of the rich while increasing the tax burden on the poor. It would be absolutely necessary to keep a close watch on the rights of the poor.

A STRATEGY FOR PAROCHIAL BUILDINGS is to be the aim of the Diocesan Pastoral Committee. The topic was given an introductory airing at the summer Synod by the Provost of Sheffield, the Very Revd. John Gladwin. His report was well received although the Bishop pointed out many of the pitfalls along the way. How many church buildings do we need in the Diocese of Sheffield? Which must be saved? Which need adapting? Which should be got rid of or made redundant? These will be some of the questions tackled in future months by the Pastoral Committee.

WORLD STUDENT GAMES. The Archdeacon of Sheffield, the Ven. Stephen Lowe, must have thoughthis luck must have run out when coming to the microphone to ask for a special grant of money, just after Synod had been having one of its periodic moans about the "excesses" of General Synod spending and increases being asked for by the Diocese. As it happens the Archdeacon - in asking for £3,000 over the next two years (£1,500 in 1990 and £1,500 in 1991) to provide financial support for chaplaincy work at the World Student Games in Sheffield and South Yorkshire - scored an easy win and took the Gold. Other finance will be supplied for this work by the World Student Games Company, other denominations, and the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England. The work of chaplaincy is being overseen by Sheffield Council of Churches.

FINANCE MATTERS. Financial moans and groans were given an airing after the Diocesan Secretary, Mr. Tony Beck, had presented his Forecast of 1990 Diocesan Income and Expenditure. Given the last word on this subject for the time being, Mr. Leslie Fletcher, Chairman of the Diocesan Board of Finance, warned Synod members about being too ready to vote yes to new proposals. Earlier he had presented the Report of the Finance Committee, which was received, and Mr. Michael Chadwick of Watson Wheatcroft, Chartered Accountants moved the adoption of the Annual Report and Accounts for 1988. The same firm were duly appointed auditors for 1989.

REPORTS from the Bishop's Council and a wide range of Diocesan committees were received. Dr. Margaret Lyons urged the need for balance in the numbers of Clergy and Laity as Chairman of Diocesan Committees, having noticed a tendency for a clergy take-over. Adwick-le-Street Deanery Synod asked if there were any plans for Churches to give help following major incidents involving death and injury. The Archdeacon of Sheffield answered that several matters were in hand on this issue following the Hillsborough Disaster in the wake of which he specially thanked clergy and Laity who had been so ready with their help.

THE NEXT MEETING of the Diocesan Synod is Saturday, November 18th, at Waltheof School, Sheffield.

Parentline

Sheffield Parent Lifeline was one of the first ever telephone help lines started way back in 1978. It aimed then, as it still does to offer understanding and a compassionate listening ear to anyone who is finding the demands of being a parent too much for them.

For many years, Parent Lifeline has been associated with Organisations for Parents under Stress, and over the past year or two, with increasing publicity available in the national media, it has been felt that potential callers would find it easier to locate the

service if all affiliated groups had the same name. So the name has been shortened to PARENTLINE, but the same service is offered to parents under stress, whenever they need to talk something over with others who are parents themselves and understand the pressures.

The crisis line number remains the same Sheffield 726575 and the hours 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 7.30 p.m. to 7.30 a.m., seven days a week. The office in C.V.S. House, Division Street, Sheffield is open every weekday morning for anyone who would like to speak to someone personally.

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Ted Day 1905-1989

Ted Day who died in Doncaster on May 29 had worshipped at St. Jude's, Hexthorpe, where he had lived and where he had been churchwarden for twenty one years up to 1982. Ted was well known for his interest in local history and was co-author of several books on the subject. His knowledge of, and deep commitment to the life of the church was equally extensive, and he always used his talents in the service of his church. Although an elderly bachelor, Ted always saw the importance of the church's work with children and was a loyal supporter of the Junior Church. Ted lived his faith and was trusted for the soundness of his advice and respected for his honesty. St. Jude's and many other people are thankful for his life. May he rest in peace and joy.

The Revd. John Selwyn Hall

Rector of St. Helen's Thurnscoe since 1983, he died on 24th May, 1989 at the age of 45 years.

He served his title in Christ Church, Doncaster from 1967 to 1970 and a second curacy at St. Mary's Barnsley. He became Vicar of Staincross, then of St. Helen's, Athersley. For a short time he assisted at Parson Cross before moving to Thurnscoe.

John overcame his nervous disposition by his great love for people. He would go to great lengths to help those in distress. The friendships he made while training at Lichfield have continued to this day. Everybody appreciated his sense of fun and his zest for living. He obtained a B.Sc. degree from the Open University.

John always seemed to be searching for something beyond himself and his parish. Let us hope that he has now found that elusive object of his search. Our love to Valerie, his wife, and to John's parents and family. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

Father Charles Sunderland 1905-1989

Father Charles Sunderland was widely known, loved and respected throughout the Diocese, having been ordained here in 1947 and having served the whole of his ministry in this Diocese first in Goole, then in Sheffield. During those many years in full time ministry many people came to know and trust him, and he was hardly less than full time when on his retirement he moved to live in the Parish of Parson Cross and began yet again to make new friends. Prior to that he had served at St. Catherine's, where the new church had been built in his early days there. There were few people on Parson Cross who did not recognise the description of the elderly priest with white hair who walked everywhere. He was a man of prayer, and of great sympathy and action, joyfully visiting a tremendous list of those in need, those handicapped and those who sought his care. He will be remembered with great thankfulness for his priestly ministry and for his way of life, which has been an example and an encouragement to all who have known him throughout his life. Rest eternal grant to him, O Lord, and let light perpetual shine upon him.

It's a Long Way...to £20,000 The Long Walk September 13 - 24

The Revd. Richard Atkinson. Team Vicar of St. Swithun's Manor and the Revd. Bill Bazely. Team Vicar of St. Bartholomew's, Netherthorpe plan to walk the 214 miles from Sheffield to our link Diocese of Guildford to raise money for the new church and community centres for their parishes. People who live in the parishes will be walking too, and the target is to raise £20,000 in eleven days. When Bill and Richard reach Guildford, via Derby, Coventry, Oxford and Reading, they will take with them greetings not only from their parishes, but from the Diocese, for the Diocesan Synods of Guildford and Sheffield have agreed that there should be a link up in some way, and The Walk confirms that link.

MARCHING FOR JESUS ACROSS THE NATION

Last year over 4000 people took part in the March for Jesus in Sheffield City Centre. This year the organisers hope to double that number for the 'March for Jesus' at noon on Saturday 16th September. The 'March' in Sheffield will be linked with 44 similar marches taking place at the same time in centres across Britain, from the Shetlands to Jersey and involving about 4million Christians. The purpose of the 'March' is to proclaim Jesus as Lord, and that His growing Church is here to bring His love into our land.

During the six weeks leading up to 16th September two Torch Marches one from John O'Groats and the other from Lands End will set off to converge on London. The torches will be carried by Christian leaders of all backgrounds as the Torch March passes through their area. The purpose of the walk will be to pray for each part of the country in turn and to symbolise the spread of the Gospel, for it is proposed that young people will light their own torches from the Torch March Flame and run with the light back to their own villages and parishes.

The young people's <u>Torch Run</u> is part of the international TARGET 2000 GREAT COMMISSION TORCH RUN which began on Easter morning 1988, when a torch was lit on the Mount of Ascension outside Jerusalem. For 18 months its flame will be carried to every continent, representing the spread of the Gospel, past, present and future. It represents young people committed to reaching the world by the end of the Century.

The Torch March will be passing through Sheffield on or around the 5th September - walking north to south on the A61.

ENGLISH CHURCH CENSUS

On October 15th every one of the 38,000 churches in England will be invited to take part in a comprehensive survey of churchgoing. The Census will measure trends in churchgoing, and explore some of the factors which influence the religious life of England. Church membership and attendance data will be collected, and analysed by age and sex, as well as by denomination, churchmanshop and location, showing how trends in our changing society are reflected in the churches.

A national census of church attendance was organised around the year 1850, giving returns for one particular Sunday. Copies of the results then are available from Record Offices.

DRAMATIC ENDINGS TO THE SUMMER TERM AT ALL SAINTS' SCHOOL

The penultimate week of the Summer Term was Sheffield Arts Week, which made life even more hectic than usual at the end of the school year. Our own productions of the Wizard of Oz (performed by the Infants) and the Pied Piper of Hamelin (by the Juniors) took place on two days during that week. Thank you to all the members of All Saints' Church who attended; many of you have told me how much you enjoyed it. The confidence and self-assurance of the children always astounds me, and certainly this is one part of the English section of the new National Curriculum which our pupils will pass with "flying colours".

The J4 children also performed with pupils from King Ecgbert's School in a Drama demonstration called"Living Pictures". This took place by the Bandstand on the Moor on one morning and was repeated on another morning in King Ecgbert's School. We also joined with King Ecgbert's School and its feeder schools to put on Art Exhibitions with work from each others' schools.

Our Sports Day on Friday 30 June had to be postponed because of rain, and was held on Monday 3 July in glorious sunshine. Again a very enjoyable time was had by all.

At the time of writing the Leavers' farewell barbecue and the Leavers' Assembly are still to be held. I am sure we will all enjoy hearing from the J4 children their memories of our School. (We usually find them fairly amusing too!) Mr. Michael Goater who is the adviser for King Ecgbert's and Silverdale Schools will be giving the talk at that service.

I would like to thank the staff of the school who give me such loyal support and work so hard. At present they have much extra work to do with the implementation of the National Curriculum. However they believe, as I do, that the children who are pupils in our school at the moment must be given the same opportunities as past pupils. It has been hard work producing our musical plays at this time - but when we saw the happy faces of our pupils at the end of the Concert, we knew that it was all worthwhile.

WORDS OF CONTEMPLATION

The text for this month is:

"Come with ME by yourselves to some lonely place where vou can rest" (Mark 6:31)

The watchword is COME WITH ME

I picked up and read Robert Warren's new book "In the Crucible" because of the local interest in St Thomas' Crookes. I am now sure that it is a very important contribution to a deeper understanding of contemporary church life. The book records the principal events which have contributed to the "miracle of St. Thomas". This is not only the complete

rebuilding of the church (and paying for it) but also the dramatic growth of the congregation and its outreach to young people. On a normal Sunday more than 1000 people worship at one or other of the four main services.

Dramatic though they are, it isn't the achievements that are important, but rather the principles which have been followed in allowing the Holy Spirit to lead. First and foremost has been the importance of prayer by the whole church both individually and corporately. Each step has been checked scripturally to ensure that the answer to prayer has been of God rather than of man. To use a phrase of which Robert Warren is fond, they sought "God's Agenda". With confidence that God would show the way ahead when it was necessary, they were able to step out in faith often quite unaware of the eventual outcome. Looking back there is thankfulness that God's grace has indeed been sufficient. Looking forward it is exciting to await what will unfold in God's purposes. The book is relevant to Totley. Not that we should expect to imitate or follow the pattern that has been right for St. Thomas'. It is relevant in helping us ask whether or not we are fully aware of "God's Agenda" for us. We cannot dictate to God what it ought to be, but we can prayerfully and earnestly continue together in seeking out God's will and purpose in this place. It might be a much more exciting and important destiny than we have yet perceived. Reading "In the Crucible" might very well encourage us and open up new horizons.

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
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THE VICAR'S LETTER

For groups there is another study booklet (20p each) suitable for four separate study sessions.





For example, our Watchman's salary has not been paid by the Ministry of Works since August 1988. It is good that he has a night job otherwise he would be in serious trouble financially. Recently his third wife gave birth to his first son, a very happy occasion in his family. Pam has been helping at a small unit for mentally handicapped children. The Unit sometimes does not open at all because of staffing problems. Please pray for its continuation as it is the only such facility in Bo. There is a need for local interest and support and the Town Chairman is trying to get a support group together - but it's a slow job. Members of the Mothers' Union met recently for a training course & Pam was invited to join in. Members of the different branches don't meet often because of distance and transport difficulties. The course leader was Sheila Masper from Mary Sumner House and everyone enjoyed her course. Our neighbour, Hannah, felt that there should be a Bible Club for the children or Bo during the vacations. Pam helped with craft groups, making visual aids and is secretary to the committee. The response was very encouraging and the activity will be continued with 2 more weeks in the Summer vacation. Please pray for helpers and materials and for guidance as we meet to decide the content and theme of the weeks.

Join us in praying that the Spirit of Christ will continue to flow through the hearts and minds of those involved in these various activities.

Pray for the Peace of the World

Says the Bishop of Doncaster



Fifty years ago this month Britain went to war with Nazi Germany. Those of us who were around at the time can still recall the prim and slightly ineffectual voice of Neville Chamberlain making the announcement and the mixed sense of apprehension and unreality with which we listened to the broadcast.

If 1939 is memory for the older generation; for everyone else it is only history. Being of the generation that experienced the war I am only too glad that it is history and that we have lived since 1945 through the longest period of peace in Europe that Europe has ever known.

We are wise if we do not forget that the memories of an older generation are memories of reality. The Middle East, Afghanistan and the recent Iranian-Iraqui conflict are terrible evidence that wars still happen; and that in a fallen world peace isn't necessarily a natural condition. That means, in my judgment at least, that we have to have adequate defence both for our own protection and for the protection of others. And it also means a willingness to address the causes of war - the dark forces at work in any society.

We must do what we can to influence governments and institutions and the kind of people who hold the key to change, whether it is industrialists or trade unionists or teachers. We can campaign for personal morality or corporate behaviour; and we should.

The problem is that unless we are engaged ourselves so much of what we say or do is either gesture or empty phraseology. Talk of maintaining moral standards of affirming justice and peace has no meaning unless it has meaning for us where we happen to be. It is little use pontificating about personal morality if I falsity a tax return; or calling for a just society if I take advantage of the person next door. Peace like charity begins at home.

Christians also have the particular responsibility of giving peace a God context. It is God who is the God of peace who made the supreme act of reconciliation in sending his Son to reconcile the world to himself. In that supreme act of reconciliation nations can be reconciled; men and women can be reconciled; and you and I can be reconciled to each other.

I shan't be surprised if we are treated to a number of articles in newspapers and to a variety of radio and television programmes reminding us of what happened half a century ago. Indulge in nostalgia, either first or second-hand, if you will; but never forget the reality. Thank God for continuing peace in Europe and pray that Europe will never know war again; and pray for the peace of the world.

I hope Parishes have their representatives ready for our three Celebrations on October 16, October 30 and November 13 at the Octagon Theatre in Sheffield, as we move into our preparations for the Decade of Evangelism. Pilgrimage is a vogue word in christian circles these days and it is none the worse for that. Pilgrims need fire, light and food for the journey. God willing we shall find all three; and a vision of his future for us.

German Link

A one and a half hour service with a breakfast of coffee and open sandwiches - all starting at 8 o'clock on a Saturday morning. Then a session which went on for a good bit of the rest of the day. That was the June meeting of the District Synod of the Evangelishce Church of Hattingen-Witten, our Diocese's link in Western Germany.

Five clergy and three lay people from this Diocese were there, making our third annual contact with mainland European Christians.

Two years ago, Grant MacIntosh, Nick Jowett and Stuart Brindley were in Hattingen. Last year their hosts - Klaus Sombrowsky, Fred Sobiech and the man who is now the Superintendent Minister of the District, Ernst Voswinkel - came to Sheffield and Rotherham with three of their laypeople. This year it was the third get-together.

Having got to know each other pretty well, we felt the time had come this year to do a bit of serious study together. Three of the clergy from our side had prepared papers to present over there, all under the general heading of 'Knowing God'. Grant's sub-division of the subject was 'Knowing God in Faith', Stuart's 'Knowing God in Worship' and new-comer to the group Richard Pamplin's was 'Knowing God in the World'.

In preparation for this we had all visited three Churches in Sheffield Diocese to talk with clergy and lay-people about the themes. Each of us had chosen a parish which could be described as 'evangelical' - Conisbrough, Crookes, Fulwood one which is 'catholic' - Cantley, Goldthorpe, Greenhill - and one which would be more difficult to categorise - Broomhill, Maltby, Manor.

Presenting the problems of holding all these strands together in one Church brought both amazement and hope for our German friends! Clearly, we did not fight shy of presenting some of the problems - how to cope with the different views on the ordination of women, for example.

Though we thoroughly enjoyed our discussions, there is no doubt about the tiredness we felt at the end of the week. This was no holiday, despite the generous hospitality of our hosts!

Without exception, the District Synod and many of the individual parishes voted for the formal establishment of a District-Diocesan link with Sheffield. European unity must not be simply an economic affair nor a matter only for politicians. Anglo-Lutheran talks have already taken place and there is the so-called 'Meissen' statement which has been approved by both Churches.

Sheffield could be in the vanguard of its implementation!



THOUSANDS WILL MARCH FOR JESUS

ON SATURDAY, September 16, tens of thousands of Christians are expected to gather in 44 centres. As they assemble around midday they will be linked to each other by land line; they will pray for the nation, praise God and proclaim the Christian gospel. Then, at 12.45, they will all take part at the same time in a march of witness.



Marches are being organised in Shetland, Guernsey, Belfast and 41 towns of Wales, Scotland and England. 'March for Jesus across the nation' is part of an eighteen month, worldwide Torch Run, in which a flame of witness is being carried through every continent. Saturday 16 will be the culmination of six weeks during which Christian leaders have taken part in a prayer walk across Britain.

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
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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I must admit to being a great lover of our ancient English Cathedrals. I feel myself drawn to their atmophere and beauty, their history and their worship. These feelings were certainly heightened by a year as a student living in the Cathedral Close at Durham in a room a few yards from the rear entrance to the cloisters. I was in that great Norman Cathedral every day and somehow felt part of the momentous events those walls had witnessed, linked, too, with the historical personages of its past. Each cathedral has its own special associations, like Worcester with its links with King John, Charles I and more recently Elgar.

Yet in addition to famous visitors to our cathedrals, I gain greater encouragement from the unknown craftsmen who laboured to build them. The main Norman body of Durham Cathedral took over 40 years to build, almost two working generations by the life-span of the age, and without the advantage of electric power and accessible scaffolding. Many gave a lifetime's skill to something they never saw completed. It was the vision that was important to them. In our age when we so often seek immediate results we have something to learn from those craftsmen of the past. As we look to the future, it is the vision directing our lives that in a sense is vital, rather than anything tangible to show in the present. This should encourage us.

Perhaps this is also true of Cathedral worship. I have attended inspiring Choral Evensongs when only a few people have been present. Yet this heightens the sense that our worship is primarily directed towards God rather than manwards. This indeed may highlight our whole approach to life - with God as our primary relationship and our need to serve Him first and others through and in Him.

As Christians we need to renew our vision and steadily work for its achievement. We need to focus on God and let all else be seen and experienced as part of that perspective, content to let its fulfilment, its timing and the completion of His purposes rest with Him.

Last year we set up "Attercliffe Deanery Aid", a fund to help relieve poverty in this part of Sheffield. It was one response to the changes in Social Security legislation which replaced "single payments" with loans which those on benefit income can ill afford to repay. The response was immensely encouraging and the very considerable sum raised has been invested to provide a permanent income; thus avoiding a constant (and in the end, debilitating) fund-raising drive.

However, the relatively small investment <u>income</u> needs supplementing in view of the very considerable demands which confront us. So we are asking you to consider giving a part of your own income by way of a regular standing order to "ADA". This money would be passed on directly by way of grants to applicants. We feel that this will not only provide us with a much more viable disposable income, but will also serve to do a certain amount to redistribute income from those of us enjoying relative affluence. We felt last year, and still feel now, that there is a profound immorality in cutting taxes (the richer you are, the bigger the cut) while at the same time making life much more difficult for the poorest in our society, who have little hope of a changing situation to sustain them, by insisting that they repay any money they need to borrow for the basic necessities.

We are applying for charitable status, and when that is granted we will ask if you would be willing to covenant your standing order so that we can recover the tax paid on your contribution as well. For the moment we would ask you to make a permanent standing order payment in favour of "ADA" as your way of helping the poorer members of the community in Sheffield.

LOOKING AFTER NUMBER ONE

(The following letter is reproduced in full. Comments please).

The Editor. Dear Sir,

Recently, on behalf of third world christian writers, Christian Aid published a book entitled "The Road to Damascus". The basic thrust of the book suggested that Western Christians & Churches had become hard and uncaring towards those less fortunate, in their pursuit of wealth & comfort. Indeed the book went on to imply that the western churches gave tacit aid & succour to governments that encouraged individuals to look after number one, and damn the rest.

A familiar sour grapes cry? Not a bit of it. Right on cue comes this little gem from the Sheffield Diocesan Synod, I quote "A strongly worded motion from the Deanery of Attercliffe condening Government plans to introduce the Community Charge (Poll Tax) next year was narrowly defeated by one vote (28 to 29) at the Summer meeting of Sheffield Diocesan Synod. Declaring total opposition to the Poll Tax and branding it as a 'fundamental attack on the less well-off in our society, on Local Government, democracy and civil liberties' the motion drew sharp criticism itself and also support. Attempts to tone it down or even block a vote being taken were resisted by Synod but the motion was ultimately defeated." After the Bishop of Sheffield had made known his own reservations concerning the Poll Tax, the middle class churchmen still closed ranks, and protected their pockets.

Whilst most of us surely understand the need for a more equitable means of collection of local revenue, taxation has always been based, (in recent years at least) on a person's ability to pay and that surely is in line with christian thinking. At least it was, until we were in receipt of the new doctrine as proposed by this current Government.

Many people have asked me recently "What difference will the changes in the Education Act make in a Church School with regard to Collective Worship?". The answer is that it isn't going to make very much difference at all. Indeed it is much easier for us - the decisions about worship in a voluntary aided School are made by the Chairman of the Governors and the Headteacher, who have to take into account to whom the School belongs. So obviously we plan Christian daily Acts of Worship in our School as we are a Church of England School. However we do not make our worship Anglican - it is very ecumenical, though we sometimes hold services in All Saints' Church.

In County Schools, the Headteacher is responsible for the organisation of collective worship and these daily acts of worship are to be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character but must not be distinctive of any denomination. The word "mainly" may be taken to mean that during a term the majority of the acts of worship (not all) may be broadly Christian. The guidelines note that an act of collective worship of a broadly Christian character need not contain exclusively Christian materials. Many Christians quite wrongly believe that all County Schools must now have Christian Assemblies, and this is not the case. Indeed with other members of the Education Committee of the Sheffield Council of Churches I have spoken to clergy and other interested parties about what the Act really says, not what many Christians think it says!

Finally, I hope that our pupils know that they are in a Church School, but not in the way shown in the cartoon alongside this article!

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Elderly residents in a previous parish used to recount their memories of the "passing bell". This referred to the ancient custom of ringing the Church bell to inform the community when anyone died - so many times for a man, a woman or a child. This practice is immortalised in those lines of John Donne:-

Any man's death diminishes me,
Because I am involved in Mankind;
And therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls;
It tolls for thee.


These words express a feeling of corporate identity with all that happens around us - especially at key moments. The death of someone else reminds us of our own death leading us to ponder the true purpose of our lives.

Likewise the Baptism of a child should underline the significance of our own baptism and our growth in the Christian Faith. A recent discussion of the Church Council encouraged both the occurence of Holy Baptism in main Sunday Services and also congregational participation when held at other times. The "Occasional Offices" - baptisms, weddings and funerals have always been seen by the Church as public events - occasions for members of a community to support one another and also enable individuals identify with the meaning of the event in their own lives.

Identifying with others not only at 'rites of passage', but in many other circumstances, enables us to express true concern. We ponder - "It could be my son that is chronically ill; my daughter who has disappeared; my husband just made redundant; my mother knocked down; my relationship that has failed." So we are led to a more caring and sympathetic response to others.

As we rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep we fulfil our Christian calling to be members of one another.

WORKING TOGETHER IN CHRIST

The Bishop of Sheffield writes:



Forgive some autobiography! "To live is to change", said Cardinal Newman, "and to be perfect is to have changed often". I've changed more than once in my attitude to Church Unity and now I'm changing again.

I strongly supported the Anglican-Methodist proposals of 1968 and have no doubt that the Church of England's failure to support them was a tragic error. Indeed, I am sure that when the religious history of this country this century comes to be written that will be seen to be the greatest missed opportunity. But from that failure I have learned three truths. The first is simply that I believe those proposals attached too much importance to "institutional union". As a few of you will remember the Scheme was in two stages: the first brought about a unification of ministries and the second was going to ensure that there was a really united Church. We were told repeatedly that we must not go for Stage One unless we were ready for Stage Two as well. I think that was a mistake. The second is more important: in matters of religion we can agree to differ but we can rarely, if ever, agree to compromise. Let me illustrate what I mean. I believe that the proper person to celebrate Holy Communion is a priest ordained by a Bishop. Most Methodists (and some AnglicansI) would consider such a statement close to superstition. And though Roman Catholics would agree with me they couldn't - if they are loyal to the Popes agree that I was a Bishop and the people I ordained priests. None of us are likely to agree that we have been wrong in our historical beliefs in areas such as this. There aren't mid-points at which a deal can be struck. Yet we can live and work together united by our obedience to Christ our Lord. Thirdly, I came to believe that for England, and the Church of England, talk of unity that ignores Rome would be, in the end, destructive.

These were some of the reasons that made me believe that the Covenant proposals of 1980 onwards were a misguided journey into a cul-de-sac.

And I have to admit when the "Inter-Church Process' first began to trundle along my enthusiasm was distinctly muted. I feared we were about to be hi-jacked by the enthusiasts into another Covenant debacle. But I was wrong. I see now that by seeing each other as indeed 'Churches together in pilgrimage' the proposals we now have do make it possible to move from "ecumenism as an extra, which absorbs energy, to ecumenism as a dimension of all that we do, which releases energy through the sharing of resources".

These proposals, to which the Roman Catholic Church is fully committed, make it possible for the Churches of this country to work together in Christ. Faced as we are with a situation in which Christians are a minority and there is growth in both secular unbelief and non-Christian religions we must have a simple way of speaking for Christ together and for working together, These proposals are particularly important in what they could do for Christianity in South Yorkshire.

I'm hopeful that they will clear away a good deal of ineffective ecumenical clutter and replace it with a simple structure that recognises both the reality of our divisions and that faith in Christ as our Saviour which we have in common.

I dare to hope that the fruit of this "Inter-Church Process" will be a real working together of all the Churches in the Decade of Evangelism.



The Bishop of Doncaster Writes:

From All Saints' Intake, Doncaster

The Communion of Saints was a phrase that mystified me as a child. It seemed to be a reference to those translucent figures in the windows round the church all taking it into their heads to have a Communion service together. They had little connection with the rest of us worshipping in the pews.

Those brought up in the Catholic tradition take the Saints more seriously than I ever did and that is undoubtedly a plus. Stories of the lives of some of those remarkable early christians are a reminder that the Church's history and tradition have been a continuing witness to the Gospel.

There is a danger either way nevertheless in envisaging Saints as a rarified breed; for sainthood is not confined to those who have been given that designation by the Church. Every christian is a saint, set apart for the service of God.

All Saintstide is more than a celebration of a small list of select individuals. It is an affirmation of the whole company of the people of God in heaven and on earth: the Church Triumphant and the Church Militant in communion with their risen Lord.

This awareness ought to be a source of encouragement to any christian community. Even in the smallest of congregations, as they worship, the worshipping few are part of the worshipping many. Out in the wider community our witness is enhanced by the witness of the saints in heaven. That verse in the Letter to the Hebrews in which the writer tells his readers that they are surrounded by a cloud of witnesses is primarily concerned with emphasizing that our eyes are on the men and women of faith who have preceded us, not that their eyes are on us. Together with them we bear witness to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith.

So our witness has a heavenly connection; and as we prepare for Advent that is worth recalling. It is possible that earlier generations heard a little too much on the subject of heaven. Sermons on pie in the sky were a questionable antidote to the grimness of conditions in which they had to live. One might add that life for a good many people is far from easy in contemporary Britain; to say nothing of the poverty and suffering in other parts of the world which defies our western European imagination. Yet without the heavenly connection what real hope as a christian to offer? It is the eternal love of God, revealed in Christ that makes sense and gives meaning to twentieth century time.

The General Synod returns at this November's Session to the subject of the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood. The Revision Committee has looked at the proposed legislation and it will present the fruit of its labours. After the General Synod has dealt with the Revision Stage, the legislation will come to the Dioceses for their consideration. I can only ask for your prayers that the Synod will show grace and sensitivity in its debating, and wisdom in its response.

Full House for WAOW Meeting

Mrs. Alison Humphreys reports:

It was standing room only in Sheffield Cathedral on the evening of Tuesday, 12th September when over 300 people from across the diocese came to demonstrate their concern about the issue of the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood. They came, also to be informed so that they should feel better able to discuss the matter with others. The subject is so complex, touching on all aspects of our faith, that the speakers, John Gribben, C.R., and Cornelia Oddie had a demanding brief. It was a beginning, though, and made everyone mindful of the need for learning and prayer in the coming months as the time for decision in the Church of England draws nearer.

The Changing Face of Coal

Electricity Privatisation is having a dramatic effect on the Coal Industry. Two people from British Coal and the National Union of Mineworkers will be explaining why at a Training Day for Staff and Members of Churches on Thursday, 16th November, 9.30 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. This is to take place at St. Andrew's Methodist Church Hall, Wheatley, Doncaster.

The Bishop of Sheffield, in our Coalfield Diocese, will be present to suggest some moral implications of these major changes.

After lunch the subject will turn to safety procedures, including the response of local churches. Hopefully, this will never be of immediate relevance, but it is important to emphasize that clergy in colliery parishes are named on the emergency call-out list. The day will conclude with a visit to the Doncaster Mines Rescue Station.

Award Day

The Revd. Geoff Hollingsworth of Rawcliffe, near Goole went to Lambeth Palace during October to receive from the Archbishop of Canterbury, a scholarship award from the Davey Memorial Trust of the SPCK. Each year two awards are made nationally for post graduate research, and Geoff's award is to enable him to study for an M.A. in Theology at the University of Hull, which he will begin in October 1990, part-time for two years. Geoff was obviously delighted with the award, and much appreciates the support of SPCK.

Leading Lights

At the end of September and Church Urban Fund Week, there were many celebrations nationally, within the Diocese and in the Parishes.

One of the representatives of the Diocese, Mrs. Stella Allen of St. Thomas and St. Margaret with Wincobank, went to Coventry cathedral for the thanksgiving service for the Fund. She reports how moved she was to be part of a huge congregation from all over England, packed into the cathedral. Amongst many other things she learnt that the Fund is not purely for the building and rebuilding of churches, but also to help the needy, the homeless, drug addicts, and to provide counselling for the training of the unemployed as well as very many more worthwhile projects. Of the target of £18 million, since April 1988 £12 million has been pledged. Indeed something to be thankful for!

Meanwhile in Sheffield Cathedral about sixty Parishes, represented by groups of both adults and children, brought gifts amounting to over £6,000 for the Bishop's £Million Appeal (part of which goes to The Church Urban Fund). The Cathedral resounded to children's voices as they presented the gifts and lit their Church Urban Fund candles which they had brought from their parishes. Following the short service, children and those not so young, including Tony Davis, Development Adviser to the Bishop, who had co-ordinated the evening, were entertained in the Cathedral Hall by "Swamp Circus" presenting their new circus show. A very worthwhile evening.

It was the same story in the Parishes, including Rawcliffe. The Vicar the Revd. Geoff Hollingsworth is always asked "Where's that?" "Is it in our Diocese?", to which the answer is a firm "Yes." At the end of September, the two local schools at Rawcliffe and Rawcliffe Bridge presented a concert in the Parish Church of St. James with the theme of 'Light in the City', looking at Light and Hope. It consisted of songs by the choirs, and drama and readings, and every family present received a candle which had been beautifully transformed by the ladies of the church into floral arrangements. The candles were lit and the children holding them formed a cross shape in the church. The lights were dimmed, it was going dark, the candles shone, as did the faces

of the children holding them, and everyone reached for their handkerchiefs, but they also gave generously and £120 was raised.....and all from a small rural village. The local newspaper picked up the story, and Rawcliffe is now in print as it deserves to be.

At St. Paul's, Wheatley Park, Doncaster, Harvest coincided with Church Urban Fund Week, and so the church decided to get together with members of the community to make its Harvest Thanksgiving a week of celebration of the gifts and talents in the locality. There were displays and demonstrations on every conceiveable 'gift' including Crafts, Music, Arts and Do it Yourself! St. Paul's is an Urban Priority Area, but has no doubt that people there have talents to share. As a respondent told the original Archbishop's Commission "Faith in the City": "Don't ask what the Church can do for the inner city; ask what the inner city can do for the Church". It is the experience of St. Paul's that it can do a lot!

Father Geoffrey Bostock explains some of the background of the Parish and hopes for response to the advert from home and away!

"In the middle 1930's a Religious Community for Men in the Church of England - the Society of the Sacred Mission - the Kelham Fathers - came to the new estate of Parson Cross, Sheffield to begin part of their outreach and mission among the people who were being moved into Parson Cross from all places of Sheffield.

The Society of the Sacred Mission saw very much their work to be the work of prayer and action and from those days - fifty years ago - we pattern our ministry and our prayer at St. Cecilia's. The Kelham Fathers were very quickly joined by a Religious Community for Women in the Church of England the Community of Saint Mary the Virgin - The Wantage Sisters. Other friends of the Community came to join with Father Roseveare and in our early annals people like Lady Mabel Smith and Lady Ferrers were very active in the work and ministry of the Mission Team here at Parson Cross. The Kelham Fathers ministered in this parish for very nearly 25 years. Father Richard Roseveare was appointed to be Bishop of Accra in 1952 - after a serious illness he returned to England and died here in 1972.

Today Saint Cecilia's is still a power to be reckoned with in the community on Parson Cross. Our outreach today is very much through our Family Social Club and through the regular prayer and disciplined way of life of priests and people in this parish.

Our staff today is but a pale reflection of those early days of ten priests and ten sisters. Today there are but two priests and one Church Army Captain whose prime responsibility is for young people in the parish. At the moment we try to maintain the prayer through the day using the Divine Office as our basis for prayer and our work among young people is growing very quickly. Our register suggests that about 150 children come into contact with us each

week. We have access to the schools and on all occasions of holiday we try to mount Holiday Clubs for the young people.

In Bible terms, the harvest is plenty but the labourers are few and we would wish to look ahead from a very wonderful fifty years to the future. Those early days of Father Roseveare were such that men and women felt the call of God to share in the life here with the Kelham Fathers. We believe such is the case looking ahead to our fifty first and sixtieth and seventieth year. The community committed to the way of the Lord should be no weaker than in those early days - should be no less enthusiastic than the days of the Kelham Fathers. Our aim is unchanged - our aim is to proclaim Christ to the people of Parson Cross where so many of our social problems are to be found spoiling people's lives. The work began fifty years ago, we believe must go forward engaging men and women of our own age to work together in this mission.

We reach out to the Community at Parson Cross through our Family Social Club and plans are in the making for the building of a Day Centre for the mentally ill, for children of single parent families and for our work among young people."

It's a FIRST!

The Northern Province Parsonages Committee Secretaries meet each year in conference, and for Brian Cook from our Diocese it was a good conference. Not only because it was a very practical meeting for those who deal with parsonage housing, but because Sheffield Diocese came away with a First!

Each secretary had been asked to take plans and photographs of two recently built new houses in their diocese. These were then judged by all the secretaries, and Sheffield came 1st in the shape of Wath Vicarage, and 3rd with Christ Church, Gleadless.

Pity the competition organised at the conference was only informal, and there weren't any prizes - but it just shows how Sheffield Diocese can lead the field!

The Coal Industry and the Church

The Revd. Tony Attwood, Coalfield Chaplain with Sheffield Industrial Mission looks at the Coal Industry and the Church over the past eighty years, and asks readers to look ahead to a strong partnership in changing times.

A UNIQUE PARTNERSHIP

How times change! Three or four generations back many of the the deep mines were just being sunk. Wherever Collieries were planned around Doncaster, arrangements were made to build a mission church. In 1912 the then Archbishop of York opened the Church of Ascension in Maltby by saying "it is given in profound gratitude for the services which our miners render to the whole community". Along with the development of the Coalfield a new co-operation between the industry, the community and the church was born. In few other situations has there been such long-standing potential for close ties between people's work, their beliefs and daily life.

Today ministers and priests of different churches are in touch with many people at local pits. We are working together to take seriously the necessary provisions of the Emergency Scheme. If they are needed, the staff of the local churches should know who to see, where to go and what they might do to help. This is just one of the ways in which we are taking part in building the relationships that will strengthen our communities for generations to come. The Archbishop's wish is still the aim, that people "should have every opportunity for fulfilling a truly human life".

In all the activities of the mining industry there are many, many people and events to commemorate. People's life and work in coal can be recognised more widely here and further afield. This is not to look back, but rather, to find hope for the future. We are going to need technical skills, human understanding and community solidarity as never before. What could we do to mark the unique partnership of industry, community and the churches since the formation of the Coalfield Church Extension Committee in 1910?
