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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Entry into a New Year, and the New Decade of 1990's, prompts us all to reflect on similar moments from the past. The year 1940 holds for me my earliest childhood memory - evacuated from the London blitz to a wooden holiday bungalow in a Norfolk seaside village. I had the chance to go back to the village last year -50 years on. Needless to say there had been many changes.

Gone was the station with its short smoky train; gone were the shiny buses with their wooden destination boards. Gone was the chauffeur-driven Rector - he had finally succumbed after 55 years in the same parish. Almost gone was the road from the village to the bungalow due to cliff erosion which had eaten half of it away.

However the bungalow named "Sunrise" was still there. As there was no one in residence at the time, I quickly peeped through the windows. To my amazement nothing had altered - there were the same furnishings and old metal bunk-beds my brother and I had used, the same old kitchen sink and units my mother had worked at, the same books on the shelves. It was indeed a step back into my memories and I felt there could be few everyday places left in England just as they were 50 years ago.

We all like to think there are permanent features in life, but in fact "Sunrise Bungalows" are the exception and most things are subject to continual change. Indeed everything does change. The pattern of life exists through the coming and going of people, events and things, just as even the most solid of objects are known to be made up of an endless movement of particles.

The steadfast Love of the Lord is linked to the ceaseless activity of his Holy Spirit. The eternal changelessness of God is reflected in all 'the changes and chances of this fleeting World'. This New Year let us be assured that whatever change we face all things are working together to fulfil His purposes.

"GOING WITH GOD" and "TURNING POINTS

These titles relate to two important Study Courses for 1990. The first has been produced by the Diocese of Sheffield to equip Christians for the 1990s as we concentrate on a Decade of evangelism. It draws on the life of Moses to focus on six characteristics of God - 'A God to be worshipped', 'A God who calls', 'A God of purpose', 'A God of power', 'A God who rescues' and 'A God of justice'.

The second course is a series of five studies produced by the "Not Strangers but Pilgrims" Inter Church Process working towards Christian Unity. The weekly themes which are being taken up by national and local radio during Lent are 'Turning Around', 'Turning the Other Cheek', 'Turning Point', 'Turning Upside Down' and 'No Turning Back'. This course is seen as an opportunity for local churches of different denominations to find practical ways of moving from co-operation to full commitment to one another.

The first course will begin in mid-January and is to be linked to a set of Daily Study Notes and a morning Sermon Series commencing on Sunday 14th January. Home Study Groups are planned to start that week on Monday evening, Tuesday afternoon, Wednesday and Thursday evenings. If you can't go consistently at the same time - feel free to move amongst the groups. Full details on church notice sheets - or contact the Vicar.

The second course will be organised ecumenically during Lent. Those wanting to take part please look out for leaflets in Church at the end of this month, and if you can offer your home for a group - please contact Marjorie Snowdon (362822).



THE EARTH IS THE LORD'S

The Bishop of Doncaster writes:

We are all going green these days; both Government and Opposition, and politicians of every hue, are keen to tell us how green they are. Commercial firms aren't far behind either. Aerosols claim to be ozone-friendly. Fast food chains are leaving their additives behind. As for the rest of us, we are getting more litter conscious (at any rate I devoutly hope we are) and moving if we can to lead-free petrol.



The Church of England was recently accused of getting onto the ecological bandwaggon. As it happens I am glad to say that we were on it long ago; indeed before the bandwaggon itself entered general public awareness in this country. I still have my copy of an excellent report - 'Man in his Living Environment', produced in 1970 by the Board of Social Responsibility as a contribution to European Conservation Year. 'The ecological attitude is still far too unfamiliar even amongst scientists' says the Report. 'It is markedly absent amongst those responsible for the development of industrialised urban society. They too easily plead immediate economic gain and in the process impoverish the earth and destroy what is irreplaceable.' Things are changing; but sometimes one can't help wondering by how much.

God is course has always been ecologically green. Genesis 1 bears eloquent testimony to that: 'God saw everything he had made; and behold it was very good.' Sadly by contrast humanity has shown ungreen tendencies from the beginning. I don't pretend to understand the mystery of the Fall, although I think we realise only too well the extent to which sin is reflected in our attitude to God and in our attitude to each other. I am not so sure though that we are sufficiently aware that it is also reflected in our attitude to creation. If it is true therefore that we need to be reconciled to God and to each other through Christ's redemptive triumph over sin on the Cross; it is also true that God has a redemptive purpose for his whole created order.

Our responses to our awareness of that purpose for the created order may well have differences of emphasis. I hesitate to suggest that any of us have a precise blueprint of what the well-intentioned green christian ought to be saying or doing. It is clear enough, for example, that the deforestation of the Amazonian rain-forests and the unacceptable methods of animal slaughter are to be condemned; but it doesn't necessarily follow that we should abandon coffee drinking, or that we should all become vegetarians.

What we surely have to do is to recognise that care for the environment is much more than contemporary social fashion. It is part of our christian stewardship as it always has been. Loving our neighbourhood and caring about the neighbourhood of others is a very positive way of witnessing to God's love. As we approach the Decade of Evangelism, it is part of the wholesome background to any sharing of faith.

Look around you in 1990. God grant that you may see and show in what you do that the earth is the Lord's; and that through Jesus Christ, God has a saving purpose for those who put their trust in Him.

Synod Digest

A summary of the meeting of Sheffield Diocesan Synod, meeting in Sheffield on 18th November, 1989, by the Revd. Roy Arnold.



CHILDREN IN THE WAY, THE IMPORTANT General Synod Board of Education report, got a warm welcome at the Synod as it had done in the deaneries. Only one of the set resolutions for discussion - that relating to forms of Eucharist suitable for children failed to gain approval when it was defeated both in the House of Bishops and the House of Laity. A following motion from Laughton Deanery urging "sensitive and imaginative consultation with the young themselves about worship and their general participation in the Church" was carried but a further motion from Ecclesall Deanery on "full sacramental participation preceding a mature profession of faith" (communion before Confirmation in other words) did not find sufficient Synod support and was not put to the vote.

FINANCIAL MATTERS took up much of the time at the November Synod. Main area of debate was around the Budget for 1990 which was eventually approved...a total amounting to £2,964,290. Along the way two motions - one from Wath and one from Doncaster Deaneries - seeking to trim the Budget were given a good airing but were eventually defeated. "This Budget does require a large increase in quota payments" warned Mr. Leslie Fletcher, Chairman of the Diocesan Board of Finance, but he pointed out that £25,000 had already been trimmed

from the Budget and that it covered no new work: just the continuance of the work of 1988 and 1989. "It is just that that work is costing more" he said. This plus an increase requirement from the General Synod, plus more needed to cover the cost of Community Charge costs by the clergy were factors involved in the Budget increases. An attempt to register disapproval of the General Synod's handling of its affairs (especially with regard to Church House, Westminster) by the Revd. D. Drye (Doncaster) was not carried.

REPORTS from the Diocesan Stewardship Adviser, Mr. Douglas Hurley about his work, and one from the Revd. Stuart Brindley (Rotherham) on the visit of a group from Sheffield Diocese to Hattingen-Witten in West Germany, were warmly received.

AN ADVISER IN EVANGELISM (part time) is to be appointed. A full time appointment - as urged by the Deanery of Hallam - was narrowly defeated. Shortage of time defeated discussion of Ecumenical Structures in South Yorkshire and on the future of the Diocesan Link with the Diocese of Maseno North in Kenya.

CHURCH ACTION FUND (a special fund set up several years ago to further the general work of the Church) may now be used, according to merit, for applications from Church-aided schools. At present most grants from this Fund go to support the work of parish churches for major items of repair etc.

IN THE DEANERY SYNOD ELECTIONS 1990, it was agreed by the Diocesan Synod, that the current membership of two persons per parish (with one extra for parishes having an Electoral Roll over 300) should be the agreed figure for 1990.

THE NEXT MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN SYNOD will be March 10th, 1990.

80 Year Honours

In the Autumn of 1909, a young probationer treble, K.D. Kingsley, joined the Choir at St. George's Church, Doncaster under the direction of Wilfred Sanderson and with the bonus of a choral scholarship to Doncaster Grammar School.

At the end of last year Ken Kingsley clocked-up 80 years singing at St. George's, and as part of his celebration chose the music for the day on the Sunday of his anniversary.

A very distinctive touch was added to the occasion by Magnus Black, the present organist who wrote an anthem, which was sung on the day, in honour of Ken's long and distinguished service.

John Oddy

He was for some years Vicar of Ardsley and Rural Dean of Wath serving for some time as secretary to the Diocesan Evangelical Union. He moved to be Chaplain to the Anglican community around Toulouse and Bordeaux. He then undertook a term as an A.C.C.M. secretary. He died in the post of Vicar of Roxwell, Diocesan Director of Ordinands and Canon of Chelmsford.

His prop-forward figure served him well on the rugby field in college days, but gave a lie to the idea of the need for a with-it image to be a success among young folk. He was greatly loved by young people up and down the country. John lived and died in the service of his master Jesus Christ, we who knew and loved him thank God for that privilege.

FIRST THOUGHT OF IN THE DIOCESE OF SHEFFIELD then taken up by the worldwide church!

Bishop David in his letter to the parishes commends JUNE 10th, 1990 to their prayers and action "The name DAYSTAR 1990 has, I believe been given to us by God. I welcome it very strongly - and some of the reasons for that I've spelt out in the Christmas Meditation in December's issue of the Diocesan News".

The Revd. Roy Arnold, Diocesan Communications Officer could not believe his luck, and his sudden promotion when he read the Bishop's words - for it was from him, as he was day dreaming in his study one day that the name first came.

Inspiration

The logo has been produced and already it has stimulated some thought amongst at least one group within the Diocese. At an all-age learning event at St. Francis Church, West Bessacarr, the logo, newly released was used to give inspiration for their banner-making on the theme 'Send out your Spirit O Lord, and renew the face of the earth.' The Revd. Derek Turnham, Executive Officer for DAYSTAR 1990 reports that for some considerable time, a team of about fifty people have been beavering away at the arrangements for the day - from music to transport, from worship to fun and festival, and a whole host of other things in between. And Bishop David has written to clergy and parishes outlining his hopes for this launch of the Decade of Evangelism.

Memories

DAYSTAR 1990 is not a copy of Pentecost '84, but those with memories of five years ago will remember the 15,000 people gathered from all over the Diocese, on that glorious June day worshipping. And they'll remember that new feeling of encouragement and confidence given to so many individuals and parishes.

And the purpose of DAYSTAR 1990? To round off the 75th Anniversary Year of the Diocese, and to launch us confidently into the Decade of Evangelism.

A BOOK AT BEDTIME?

If you want just a little book to read at bedtime why not try the letter written by Jude. You can find it as the last but one book of the Bible and it has only one chapter of 25 verses. Like so many books in the Bible there is some doubt as to who Jude was and when it was written, but it is at least a strong possibility that Jude was a brother of Jesus and the date may be as early as many of the other epistles.

Whatever the background the book has the familiar account in brief of the history and the troubles of the Jews. But, and this is reserved for the last few verses, there is encouragement to persevere and an assurance of the love of God and the power of the Holy Spirit as "you wait for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ to bring you to eternal life". Then a two verse call to action and a doxology and ascription "To the only God our Saviour be glory, majesty, power and authority, through Jesus Christ our Lord."

Why not try it? Very often Bible passages have different messages for different people so perhaps there is something special here for you!

MUSIC. POETRY AND PROSE



HANDS TOGETHER, EYES CLOSED!

Many of us were taught as children to put our hands together and close our eyes when we pray. This tradition has a lot to commend it as an aid to concentration and perhaps as a mark of humility as we increase our awareness of God's eternal presence. It is however very possible that, as we get older, the habit sticks, but the logic behind the action becomes obscure. We might overlook the fact that our aim is, or ought to be, concentration and humility.

Much could be written in developing the ideas of aids to prayer but this short piece is on one point only. Some people (and this includes members of our own congregation) have found that when they pray the Prayer of the Grace it is helpful to look around at the people for whom they are praying "The fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all evermore". For them it is a specific reminder that, althought this is a personal prayer, it is a request for the benefit of all of us and for our relationship one with another. Such a reminder is as valuable as other aids to concentration and of itself the prayer of the Grace is a humble prayer.

Of course each of us much make our own judgement in this issue but it is worth airing the question because those who close their eyes traditionally for this prayer may be totally unaware that others take a different view of the opportunity. All of us whether favouring open or shut need to be as realistic as we can about our prayers because in and through them we are approaching God. That must be our common aim.

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The end of this month marks the beginning of Lent - Ash Wednesday falls on 28th February this year. It is a season when traditionally Christians review their lifestyle in terms both of their need for spiritual growth and the spiritual discipline that is a necessary part of it.

In his book "A Celebration of Discipline" (Hodder Christian Paperback), Richard Foster considers the aspects of disciplined Christian committeent under three headings:

- 1. The Inward Disciplines
 - of meditation, prayer, fasting or self-denial, study.
- 2. The Outward Disciplines
 - of simplicity, solitude, submission and service
- 3. The Corporate Disciplines
 - of confession, worship, guidance and celebration

I commend the book to you as one that has an appeal to a wide spectrum of Christian, not to mention Anglican, persuasions or Churchmanship - and one which we could all learn from and seek to apply in our lives this LENT.

If the word 'discipline' is one we are uncomfortable with, perhaps because of associations from school and childhood, we can remind ourselves of the calling of those first 'disciples' of Jesus. Learning from Him, trying to live in obedience to His guidance in our lives is that sure path to 'spiritual growth' - our full maturity in Him.

Let us this Lent seek to travel further along this path. Let us look at our inner lives and our outer lifestyles in the light of the example and teaching of Christ.

From the Bishop of Sheffield:

DEARER ELECTRICITY **PLEASE!**

This month it's Question and Answer time. Please battle through patiently. The answers matter to a lot of people.



- Is the price right?
- "Yes" says the buyer, "if it's cheap enough". "Yes says the seller, "if there is sufficient profit".
- Is it then always right to get things cheaper (and/or the profit greater)?
- Of course not. A lot of things would be cheaper if we kept slaves.
- That's an extreme example (and anyhow some economists argue that wage-slaves are better for business than real slaves). What other things might convince us that cheapest isn't always best?
- It's a long list! Each of us should make our own list.
- What would be on your list?
- National Security ("Dig for Victory" in wartime and the Common Agricultural Policy in peace are meant to ensure that our fifty million people have enough to eat whatever the price): Health and Safety at Work (unlike our ancestors we try not to let people's health be destroyed by their working conditions). A decent life style (work for all: no children sweeping chimneys; and sufficient to pay for an honourable retirement for the elderly) and Help to threatened communities (Shipyards in Belfast and Sheep on the
- You are really thinking about coal, aren't you?
- You guessed. Over and over again the demand for cheap goal has proved disastrous.
- Q Can you give examples.
 - Yes. In the past the price was paid in the neglect of safety and scandalous wages. The Colliery Disaster was almost part of a way of life. The cycle of too much coal, falling prices and lowered wages was constantly (and disastrously) repeated.
 - But that's ancient history. Isn't it different today?
- Yes, it's worse. The clamour for cheap coal favours Open-Cast (despite the hurt it does to the neighbourhood) over Deep-mined Coal, encourages the abandonment of collieries in which there has been great investment and in which there is still a lot of accessible coal, and takes away work from whole towns and villages.
- But if foreign coal is cheaper shouldn't we insist that British Coal is on sale at the same price?
- It can't be done or only if we paid the same wages as South Africa, had children down the mines in the same conditions as in Colombia and had open-cast seams like Australia! (Of course when we've closed all our pits and have to get our coal from abroad, we'll not find it cheap any longer.....).
- But shouldn't we then buy the coal where it is cheapest even from abroad?
- No. No. No. (Please read this article through again for the reasons for this).
- Won't that make electricity dearer?
- Probably. But note that so far the rapidly falling price of coal, though it has led to the loss of many good pits, hasn't shown itself in cheaper electricity! But before we fix the price of electricity we need to get the price of coal right! Even if that means saying "Dearer Electricity, Please!".
- Shouldn't a Bishop be writing about God and not the price of coal?
- Genesis 2:15; Genesis 4:9; Luke 10:36; Matthew 22:39, etc. etc.

CHURCH URBAN FUND IN THE DIOCESE DENABY AND CADEBY MINERS' MEMORIAL CHAPEL

'It's our Chapel' - quoted by the Vicar of Denaby on meeting a miner from Manvers Main Colliery. This is one example of the area's affection for and pride in the Memorial Chapel, which started in 1987 and opened at Easter 1989 after much commitment and effort by the Vicar of Denaby, colliery and union representatives, the local authority and other groups.

The Chapel serves a range of purposes. It is a living proof that mining is a worthwhile, worthy and dignified occupation. It signifies an active concern for the community and the Book of Remembrance records appreciation for the workers and families of the past. It is also a centre for pilgrimage and for community action.

The loss of the two pits, Denaby in 1968 and Cadeby in 1986, had a devasting effect on the local economy but the great unity of spirit, endemic in mining communities, has ensured that out of adversity there arises dignity and a determination to provide a future for the children of the area.

The Chapel is a memorial to the coal industry including, within its Cadeby Pit firebrick walls, part of a working wheel from Cadeby, a mahogany altar encasing, a one ton piece of coal from Manvers Main, arched sections from Cadeby Pit, illustrative stained windows and miners' personal possessions. The Miners' Lamp Tower provides light for the Chapel as well as representing the miners' safety lamp and the Chapel cross is cut from Cadeby Quarry - limestone had a close association with mining practices.

The Chapel is attached to the new parish church rededicated in 1979 after fire in 1977 had damaged the building erected in 1975. There is a strong link with the very supportive Roman Catholic church community.

The total cost of the project was £23,500 with £6,000 provided by the Church Urban Fund (CUF) with other contributions from the Local Authority, the Diocese of Sheffield and other local sources.

The CUF involvement reflects the wide range of projects which receive support. Through the commitment of local people, practical help from the coal industry and the building trade, the interest of artists and writers, the whole community is involved in sustaining the memory of the past and creating hope for the future.

MRS DORENE SEWELL

We were very sorry to learn of the death of Mrs. Dorene Sewell; she finally lost her long and courageous battle against cancer on Sunday 7th January.

Dorene taught in the South of England before going to Uganda to be Principal of a Teacher Training college. It was in Uganda that she met her husband Bill. In 1973 they returned to England, and on 31st October she began teaching at All Saints' School. During her time here she worked in both Infant and Junior Departments, with special interest in Music, Country Dancing and Environmental Education. Dorene was very hard-working and enthusiastic, and her quiet and gentle but firm manner won her many friends amongst staff, pupils and parents. Indeed she was one of that rare breed of humans of whom nobody has ever heard a bad word spoken.

Whenever she came back she was very interested in developments, and it was obvious that she had a very real love for the school and its pupils.

From one of his books 'Prayer at Night - A Book for the Darkness' the following passages are reproduced as an appetiser to all his writings. They are his interpretation of the Lord's Prayer, and three Beatitudes.

Eternal Spirit. Life-Giver, Pain-Bearer, Love-Maker. Source of all that is and that shall be. Father and Mother of us all. Loving God, in whom is heaven:

The Hallowing of your Name echo through the universe! The Way of your Justice be followed by the peoples of the world! Your Heavenly Will be done by all created beings! Your Commonwealth of Peace and Freedom sustain our hope and come on earth!

With the bread we need for today, feed us. In the hurts we absorb from one another, forgive us. In times of temptation and test, strengthen us. From trials too great to endure, spare us. From the grip of all that is evil, free us.

For you reign in the glory of the power that is love, now and for ever. Amen.

Peace: Miserable are those who are at war with themselves, who spread evil and division and hatred, seeking to dominate others: they breed their own downfall and they never know trust and friendship. MAURICE'S RESPONSE TO THE WORDS OF PRINCE CHARLES A copy of a letter sent to Buckingham Palace.

His Royal Highness Prince Charles,

4th January 1990

Sir,

I am one of countless people who have been saddened by Your Royal Highness' criticisms of the Alternative Service Book of the Church of England. There can be litle argument that the English of the Book of Common Prayer is good literature and the familiarity of so many of the words and phrases has much to commend them as valuable to grasp in times of need or difficulty, but the Alternative Service Book was not compiled merely to try and improve upon the literary style of Cranmer and his predecessors.

One of the most difficult problems facing the Church at the present time is the separation of the "Church-goers" from the rest. We all need to worship God to the best of our ability and this is not a prerogative which we can keep to ourselves. How can we help others to worship God and share with us the privilege of knowing His presence with us in all the circumstances of life? Certainly the Book of Common Prayer is no longer the bridge which we need for that purpose. The effort to find a more satisfactory approach may not be the ultimate that will eventually be found but it is the result of profound study, diligent work and earnest prayer. To call it "crass" is most regrettable and untrue.

Another aspect which must not be neglected is that there is a most welcome growing together of Christians from many different backgrounds, traditions and languages. We welcome this and it fits entirely with the teaching of the New Testament (Ephesians 2. 19.). It also fits with the present day understanding of our global concerns in that, more than ever before, we now feel part of a truly world-wide community. This "earth-shrinking" process has accelerated in the twentieth century and we need to keep pace with it in church matters. Obviously people from other nations and people from other denominations do not have the same Book of Common Prayer as the Church of England so if we insist on it too strongly we hinder the process of growing together, whether with other denominations within our own country or with other nations who have accepted the Christian Faith.

We need to remember that the forms of the Prayer Book which emerged in the sixteenth and sevententh centuries were themselves attempts to bring the worship of the Church within the understanding of a larger number of people. In an earlier age Latin was the language of the Church. Before that it was Greek. Rather than be like a record stuck in a groove we need to meet the challenges of the times and surely that is what the Church of England tried to do by the 1980 publication and by such further revisions as may be put forward in years to come.

In many parishes the church is struggling to demonstrate its relevance to those who find the church is superfluous. Ours is one such parish and our task has been made harder by Your Royal Highness' criticisms of the Alternative Services Book. This is not a selfish point of view but one which stems from a genuine desire to see the Church fulfil its role as the Body of Christ in a world which all too easily rejects Him.



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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Ever since the diplomatic activity of Terry Waite, as Archbishop's Envoy, came into prominence, it has also highlighted the varied work undertaken by Church Army officers. The Church Army acts very much as a handmaid of the Church of England fulfilling many roles and also filling gaps in the work, mission and caring outreach of the Church.

Church Army officers can be found at work in parishes, prisons, hospitals, barracks, factories, community centres, housing projects, old people's homes and hostels for the homeless - not only in this country but throughout the world. The main thrust of the Church Army's work is in evangelism and in social care. It promotes new initiatives and is concerned to work alongside those in difficult situations and with those with no faith.

The Church Army seeks therefore to make the Decade of Evangelism a reality by encouraging individual Christians to use their gifts and abilities in the most effective way. They have devised their own project entitled "Faith 4 2000".

We shall soon have little excuse for being ignorant of the work of the Church Army as they are moving their national Training college from London to Sheffield in 1991. As part of their introduction to the City and our introduction to them, sixty students and staff of the College will be at work in Sheffield from 9th-19th March. Their stay will begin with a Service in the Cathedral at 7.45pm on Friday 9th March to which all church members are invited. As part of their visit we shall have a Church army preacher at our 10am Service on 11th March, and a discussion evening on Tuesday 13th March at 8pm in the Church hall which I would warmly commend to you all.


SOME AMERICANS

"Lead us Not into Temptation"



writes the Bishop of Doncaster

Temptation is a word that seems to have changed its significance. If yielded to: it used to be the case that dire consequences were assumed to follow. For erring offspring banishment upstairs and bread and water were part of the proceedings.

Nowadays temptation has instead a smiling face; and we are encouraged to yield as often and a frequently as possible.

I do not think banishment and bread and water did much good and it is foolishly repressive to ge uptight about the lure of harmless pleasures. Cadbury's Milk Tray or a Sunbed in the garden, far fror leading us into misery, are far more likely to relax us and make us easier to live with. I do not believ either that we want to be totally critical of consumerism. If it results in better standards of living in th community as a whole consumer choice is to be welcomed.

The real problem goes deeper. There is a lurking assumption that if you want something you are entitle to have it. Fulfilment and satisfaction stand as rights in themselves. Sometimes the dubious caveat is use - if it harms no one else. It is dubious for if you harm yourself you harm humanity; but more often tha not self-interest is the only criterion being applied.

It is hardly unexpected to find that christians are not immune from the self-interest of society; and in subtle way christians are more vulnerable than most. For they can give their self-interest convenier spiritual labels. Why should they be ill; for God has given them a right to health. Why should tw christian people exercise physical restraint in their relationship, for God has given them a right to love. It they have been blessed, surely they have a right to be rich. The list is endless.

Lent has many virtues, and one of its virtues is to put questions against so many assumptions. Instead of self-interest it preaches self-sacrifice; and it exposes into the bargain the real character of surrender to temptation.

Lent does more than that; for Jesus temptation in the wilderness is a story of victory rather that surrender. That is the main point of his experience. Jesus, fresh from his endowment with the Spirit at his Baptism, faces the sacrificial call of his Father's purpose. The Devil tempts him to find an easier way in order to deflect him from the path of obedience. The temptation is fruitless and in the power of the Spirit Jesus begins his ministry.

Lent is a time of enormous encouragement for christians. Temptation can be recognised and overcom in the power of the same Spirit and through the victory of the Cross.

Lent is of course also a time of preparation. Every parish received on the First Sunday in Lent th Bishop's taped message. As we move into preparation for Daystar and look at what God is calling us to do in the coming Decade, what the Bishop has said will provide a great encouragement.

It's still not too late to get into the excellent Study group material prepared for our Diocese to help everyone get ready for Daystar 1990 and the Decade of Evangelism. Called "Going with God" the study course, prepared by and for the Mission and Unity Committee, there is material suitable for adults, for young people and for children. Taking Off!

January was a busy month for Bishop David. Busy laying foundation stones for two new churches in Sheffield. Busy dedicating a new church hall in Doncaster, re-dedicating a re-roofed and re-ordered church also in Doncaster, and dedicating a re-ordered church in Rotherham. Comments the Bishop "It was a great fortnight. As anyone who has done it knows, anything that involves bricks and mortar is very hard work and takes unbelievably longer than anyone thought possible. All this building work is astonishing and good reason for thanksgiving and even just a little pride and boasting."

It was on January 20th that the Bishop unveiled a foundation plaque at St. Bartholomew's, Netherthorpe, Sheffield where the huge Victorian church has been demolished and is being replaced by a new church and community centre, and later the same day he dedicated the new church hall at St. Mary's, Doncaster.

A week later the Bishop was at the re-ordered St. Paul's Ferham Park, Rotherham, and then laying the foundation stone of the new St. Swithun's Church on the Manor, Sheffield. Only a few days afterwards he was at St. Aidan's, Wheatley Hills, Doncaster, where almost a year previously a freak squall with estimated winds of 90 m.p.h. removed half of the copper roof covering over the nave and severely damaged the building. It seems that the high winds, combined with the shape of the roof made it lift off like a glider. The Revd. Lawrie Jenkins, Vicar of St. Aidan's was heard to comment afterwards that he was Vicar of the largest hang-glider in the world! Not so anymore for the reroofed church now has a more conventional roof, not prone to taking off.

Commenting on the Bishop's busy fortnight to the local press, the Revd. Roy Arnold, Diocesan Communications Officer said "this great burst of building energy in the Diocese represents much more than a matter of bricks and mortar. Behind each of these building projects there lie months and years of dedicated fund raising and more importantly the vision to get these church buildings right and fitting places for worship activities in the 1990's, and the building up of community work by the church in South Yorkshire.

Flower Power - how many daffodils?

Everyone is invited to the Northern Frontier District of the Diocese at Rawcliffe, near Goole, to visit the attractive village and the church on the village green at their Daffodil Festival.

Around the church is planted a quarter of a ton of daffodils, bought with generous donations from local people who gave in memory of loved ones.

There's a special Easter Songs of Praise at the church on Sunday, 15th April at 6.00 p.m. at which a Book of Remembrance and oak bookcase will be presented for blessing, and on Monday, 16th April, the church will be open all day for a flower festival of daffodils, with displays sponsored by local organisations within the parish, the Parish Records and refreshments. In the evening will be a concert by Frank Ella and the Marshland Singers beginning at 7.30 p.m. All proceeds are for Raise the Roof.

When daffodils are in flower why not visit Rawcliffe? But especially at Easter.

Long Memories?

Even though they have long memories at Wickersley near Rotherham, there is no one left who remembers the Institution of the first Rector at St. Alban's by the Archbishop of York in 1240 A.D. But they'll certainly remember the 750th anniversary of that first institution, for in February this year, a packed church heard the present Archbishop of York preach to celebrate the occasion. To coincide with the anniversary there is an Exhibition of Mediaeval Wickersley on Saturday, 3rd March 1 - 5 p.m. at St. Alban's School, Morthen Road, Wickersley, to which all are welcome.

Holiday Aid

Rotherham Holiday Aid has "taken off". This unique partnership project which links community, business and church groups in the Borough of Rotherham has raised £5,000+ in its first year, enabling 19 disadvantaged Rotherham families to enjoy a much needed family holiday. The project aims to raise £7,500 during this year to enable between 25-30 families to enjoy a break. More details of its work are available from the Revd. Raymond Draper on Rotherham 543111.

He tells in a popular style the stories of ordinary people in Nigeria whose lives have been changed by Christ's miraculous intervention in response to prayer.

The Diocese of Sheffield and the Church Urban Fund St. Mary's Bramall Lane

- Community Care

Doreen has never worked, came from a difficult family background and after two years in Communicare she is now training as an auxiliary nurse. Terence, long term unemployed, is now a driver in full employment. Two examples of the successes of Communicare who cater for up to 40 volunteers each week and 15/20 per day.

Thanks to funding from the Church Urban Fund (£30,000 over 3 years) the Paul Getty Trust (£5,000 annually for 3 years) and other trusts, Communicare employs a team of four, one part-time, to supervise a busy print room printing 24 house magazines and with regular orders form the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, Oxfam, Barnados etc. There is also garden work and woodworking with regular orders for bird boxes, window boxes and benches.

The project has developed from an initial scheme in 1983 initiated by the then Vicar, with costs met by the then Manpower Services Commission. When funding was run down it was decided not to continue with Employment Training support mainly because the volunteers who use the centre weekly need immediate support and restoration of self confidence rather than a planned programme of training. As a Voluntary Project programme the volunteers only receive bus fares and refreshment. As the number of Day Centres in the city is reduced and the reputation of St. Mary's spreads, there are increasing demands on David Wilson the manager, Hilary, Helen and Sue. The problem is finance not space. The church through its Parochial Church Council provides support and expertise, for example in keeping accounts. The project is a model example of the aims of priorities of the Church Urban Fund, building on the existing presence of the church, opening up church buildings to community needs and addressing major social problems - in this case unemployment.

CONGRATULATIONS to John Lawry on obtaining his PhD. the title of his thesis was "The application of Flow Cytometry to the study of breast carcinoma". This was a part-time PhD - the work being done in John's spare time, during working hours, at evenings and weekends!

Flow cytometry is a powerful tool in the clinical and research laboratory. It is used in Cancer Research and in the diagnosis of AIDS and leukaemia. John's project discovered that Flow Cytometry can diagnose a tumour, predict patient survival and detect very low numbers of cells.

The Flow Cytometer Unit is run by John Lawry is situated in the Medical School of the University of Sheffield, and is funded by the Yorkshrie Cancer Research Campaign.

INTO THE ARCHIVES

Documents and registers relating to All Saints' Church have recently been checked and listed by an Archivist from the new Sheffield City Archives on Surrey street.

These include the Register of Baptisms, Banns & Marriages from 1924, numerous Faculties from 1948, Annual Meeting minutes from 1924, PCC Minutes from 1937 and accounts, and various documents and agreements relating to the Church building and site. The earliest records are the Minutes of the progress, problems and plans for the cosntruction of All Saints' Church.

For their future safekeeping and wider availability it is proposed that most of the Records are deposited on loan to the City Archives. Restriction is placed on records less than 30 years old and these can only be seen by the public with prior consent from the Church.

The Archivist also listed the historical records at All Saints' School. Most of the material there predates All Saints' Church and includes Log Books and accounts from 1877, as well as documents relating to the earlier Church School of 1822 on Totley Hall Lane. It is proposed that these are also deposited in the Archives Department.

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

In the meeting the life of All Saints' over the past year is reviewed, its finances scrutinised, grievances aired, future plans discussed and officers appointed. A covenant can be waived in the event of your moving away, becoming unemployed, leaving the Church etc. Without the £2985 received in 1989 as an official tax rebate from the Government, the Church funds would have been strained, and the amount available to give to other charities would have been reduced.

"MYSELF"

I have to live with myself and so I want to be fit for myself to know. I want to be able, as days go by, Always to look myself straight in the eye. I don't want to stand with the setting sun And hate myself for the things I've done. I want to go out with my head erect -I want to deserve all men's respect. But here, in the struggle for fame and self, I want to be able to like myself. I don't want to look at myself and know That I'm bluster and bluff and idle show. I never can hide myself from me. I see what others may never see. I know what others may never know. I can never fool myself - and so Whatever happens, I mean to be Self respecting, and conscience free.

The above lines were written by an unknown 8th Army soldier in Tunisia, published in the Sheffield Telegraph 2 August 1943, and taken from the Clarion handbook of 1944/5.

"Years ago, when I was a curate in Birmingham, I used to visit a very unhappy lady. Mrs Bennet (not her real name) was elderly and suffered from arthritis. However the real cause of her unhappiness was not ill health.

Mrs. Bennet's husband had left her when she was still a young wife. He had 'gone off' with another woman. Year by year, month by month, day by day, Mrs. Bennet had kept alive a burning hatred of her husband and the woman he had gone to live with.

Who am I to judge the hurt she had suffered. How could I possibly assess blame between Mrs. Bennet and her husband.

What surprised me as a young clergyman, was that Mrs. Bennet expected me to side with her hatred. Her husband was an adulterer, she said, the other woman was immoral, she said. Surely the Church which teaches moral standards and preaches purity would condemn him as readily as she did.

It became obvious to me that the Church's image was that of 'upholder of morality' and 'guardian of purity'! For Mrs Bennet, at least, this was the essential teaching of Christianity. The Church was to do with rules, standards and moral regulations.

The truth, which I was never able to persuade Mrs. Bennet about was, and is, that an essential plank in the Church's teaching is FORGIVENESS. The New Testament is filled with this teaching. It is not Christian to bear malice and practise unforgiveness over the years.

And ironically, Mrs Bennet was a witness to this teaching which she could never practise. She was unhappy. Her sense of righteousness did not bring joy to her - quite the opposite - it made her extremely miserable,

Forgiveness is good for the forgiver as well as the forgiven."

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I have been asked to reproduce as my letter, part of the challenge I offered at the recent A.G.M.

For many years now there have been five strands in the life of the Church of England - all valid in their own terms.

- 1. The Evangelical, emphasising personal conversion and a strong Biblical basis to faith and life.
- 2. The Anglo-Catholic emphasising ritual, symbolism, and acraments in its worship and practice.
- 3. The Traditional the middle path that has reflected much of English culture and worship over the centuries, and some its abiding qualities.
- 4. The Charismatic emphasising spiritual renewal and a rediscovery of the work and gifts of the Holy Spirit.
- 5. The Liberal concerned with an openess to the truth of modern scholarship in interpreting the Bible and our Faith amidst the complex, changing and often radical situation of society today.

Unlike some Churches in the city whose strength lies in emphasising one strand, All Saints' seems to include them all to some degree! Why can't our variety be our strength - different strands can be bound together to provide flexibility and greater strength and enhance our worship.

If we are honest many of us would like to influence the direction All Saints' takes in terms of our own personal preferences. Yet the call of Christ is to unity in Him and a love for each other that overflows to and attracts an indifferent world. The vision we need at this point in our Church's life as we enter a Decade of Evangelism is to seek that oneness and that love...

- a) by affirming and respecting each other as fellow believers.
- b) by valuing and being prepared to listen to and seek to understand and learn from each other.
- c) by being prepared to work together to build up the Body of Christ offering our individual gifts of time, talents and treasure in His service.
- d) by seeking to weave those varying strands into a strong rope which we can hold out to others.

THE PRINCE & THE PRAYER BOOK

We print an extract from a letter by Barrie Briggs.

"I don't think the Prince is attacking the <u>principle</u> of the ASB at all, but if you look at his general life, work and interests it is not difficult to see a continuous thread. Prince Charles has, quite obviously, a deeply spiritual aspect to his nature. The one thing that he has consistently tried to do, as befits a person of his position and influence, is to lift the spirit of the people onto a higher plane. His work amongst many of the deprived of our benighted land is evidence of this, as are his comments about architecture, the use of language and so on.

A few comments on the Prayer Book and its alternative may add a little fuel to the heat of the fire. Cranmer's Book was set in the classical language of an earlier time, not in the vernacular language of 1662, and this was deliberately done. Firstly, everyone, young and old alike, was familiar with that language. Secondly, times in the 16th century were changing (it is a habit they have) and people need to anchor their spiritual language and thought in more timeless values. What better than the classical language of a slightly earlier period? Thirdly, Cranmer's book was not written for everyone, after all most people could neither read nor write and those who could had been taught to do so in that same classical language. Use of Latin was beginning to decline even then. As with HRH, what Cranmer and his contemporaries sought to do, and this has never been a new idea, was to lift the spirit of the people above the everyday mess of their lives." * * * * * * * * *

A DECADE OF EVANGELISM

An article in "The Reader" magazine by Gavin Reid makes some important points about the Decade of Evangelism. "At the end of the day evangelism - the sharing of the message and meaning of Jesus - is meant to be a mark of the authentic Church.... We are meant to be the people who make sure that Christianity keeps moving out into other peoples' lives and through cultures and nations".

He makes the point that there is no programme of activity which is handed down to us but that we, in each individual group of Christians, have to do what seems right to us in "making Christ known to the people of His world". His comment on that quotation from Lambeth 1988 is: "That rules out the Church acting within its institutions. It means that the call from Lambeth is to the individual people of the Church in their daily occupations". He goes on to say "We need to pray for the spread of the gospel into the lives of those who have not yet seen its truth and urgency".

On the subject of worship, he recalls the amazing growth of the Christian faith in South America. He quotes Dr. Eddie Gibbs: "When I wanted to learn the secret I found I needed to go no further than their Church Services. The atmosphere of expectancy before a service began was only equalled in one place in Britain that I could think of. That was the Kop at Anfield just before Liverpool ran out to play! "

On teaching he asks "How much are we equipping the members of our churches to be proud of Christ and all that He is and has done? How else can we expect to meet the Bishop's call that we should see "every Christian as an agent of mission"?

He has strong words for us - they are truly a challenge!



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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Many of the older generation will recall how in their childhood Ascension Day was marked by a holiday from school, or a picnic, or hymns sung from the Church Tower. It was a Festival of the Christian Church as clearly marked in its observance as Christmas and Easter. Nowadays only a minority of Christians make a practice of worshipping on Ascension Day - though each year I hope I may be proved wrong, please note our Service at 8pm on 24th May!

Although part of the change is due to secularisation of society, another reason may well be that the concept of Ascension in our space age became more difficult to grasp with its language of Jesus going up to heaven. The Ascension will always remain a mystery but it was necessary that some kind of event should mark Jesus' last appearance to His disciples. It would be unthinkable that the appearances of Jesus should grow fewer and fewer until they finally stopped. There had to be a moment when the Jesus of earth became the Christ of Heaven, and this had to be conveyed to the disciples in a way they could understand in the imagery of their generation.

For the disciples, too, it marked a time of great change. The One on whose presence they had depended in the flesh, was now forever independent of space and time. Now they knew the loving presence of their Lord was always with them - nothing could separate them from Him who was now Lord of all.

So we celebrate on Ascension Day the great mystery - that He who is Lord of All loves us as individuals and can enter into our hearts and lives by His Spirit. The ruler of Creation cares for each one of us in a special way.

After ten years I still mind most about the parishes and their people: I could live without Synods and Boards and Meetings. I could survive the disappearance of the Diocesan Office and Diocesan Officers (though it and they do a hard-working and efficient job). My heart is with the parishes - their churches and

people - past, present and future. It is in the parishes that we see the Christian faith handed on century after century. It is in the parishes that we see the Christian life today being lived, prayed and taught. It is in the parishes and only in the parishes that we see tomorrow's Church coming to life.

Because of my commitment to the parishes I am (unreasonably) proud of "Rivers, Rectors and Abbots"* This is the first volume of an eight volume (or thereabouts) history of the parishes of the Diocese of Sheffield. It only covers the most northern part of the diocese - Snaith, Goole and Marshland but it is a fascinating story that illuminates the history of every parish. If you love your parish get a copy!

After ten years I'm more committed to Evangelism. It is not enough to be quietly faithful. We must witness to what we believe in such a way that it brings the Good News to those around us. And so Daystar 1990, June 10th at Doncaster Racecourse, matters immensely to me. The two things I'm minding about - the parishes and evangelism - come together. The people of our parishes - I dare to hope for 20,000 of you - worship as one so that we can step out, united in faith, hope and love, into the Decade of Evangelism. Please don't let anything (or anyone) keep you away.

And, after ten years, I mind, in the way I've always minded, about Truth - God's truth. That needs another letter. Here it is simply an excuse to advertise the four talks I'm giving in the Cathedral on 22nd, 23rd, 24th and 25th October. Their overall title is "Great is Truth..."

Lastly, I must say it, I mind about my One Million Pound Appeal. You can see what is getting done from the inside of this Newsletter. About one-in-ten of our active church members and the people on the electoral roll have made a gift or covenant and I'm very grateful. It has got us well on the way. But I long for everyone to play their part. So if you are one of those who haven't yet consciously made a thank you gift for your faith and your parish, I'd be obliged if you gave now. "The Lord does love a cheerful giver!"

After ten years I'm delighted to be writing to you once again as your Bishop. Pray for me as I pray for you.

"Tell the Good News of Jesus"



writes the Bishop of Doncaster

A Decade of Evangelism is an admirable thing; but a question that often gets asked is 'What does evangelism mean?' It is argued that it has different meanings for different people; and for this reason cautious spirits wonder whether we are giving the exercise too high a profile.

I am not too worried if it has different meanings for different people; with the obvious proviso that the evangelistic message must have a genuine content. God has put us in different situations and our circumstances are bound to have a bearing on what we say or do when we share the Gospel.

It is important it must be said to place our evangelism in the widest setting. God's good news of redemption is for the whole of his creation in which God is already present. Mind and body need transforming as well as spirit Society is much more than a collection of individuals. You could say that Mission and Evangelism are inseparable.

It is necessary to take Church growth seriously too. If Churches don't grow where shall we find the resources in terms of membership to respond to all the challenges which society puts before us? Church growth is also a reminder that there is corporate character to evangelism. We are inviting people to become part of the body of Christ.

There needs as well to be a strong commitment to personal evangelism. If we have experienced the fullness of new life in Christ our love for others will be such that we shall not be able to keep the Gospel to ourselves.

Whatever our differences of emphasis, there is one indisputable element in evangelism which I neither need nor wish to qualify. Evangelism is about Jesus; what actually happened in history through his birth, life, saving death and resurrection; and what can happen today as we identify with our risen Lord. When Philip came across the Ethiopian Eunuch reading Isaiah, Luke informs us that Philip 'told him the good news of Jesus'. We can do no better.

As to evangelistic method; I find it hard to improve on D.T. Niles famous definition: 'one beggar showing another beggar where to find bread.'

So thank God for the Bishop's lead in giving evangelism the kind of priority that is much more than a one-off effort or even the preoccupation of a decade; a priority that is part of the normal witnessing life of the Church.

Synod Digest

Social Responsibility

Synod members agreed (53 in favour and 38 against) the appointment of a Social Responsibility Officer for the Diocese of Sheffield. The Bishop explained that this would be a part-time post, probably attached to a clergy job as part of the Team Ministry on the Manor Estate, Sheffield. Thanks were expressed to Bishop Kenneth Skelton for heading up a Working Party reporting to the Diocese on Social Responsibility issues. As recommended in their report further work is to be done to look at closer working relationships between the Social Responsibility Committee and Sheffield Industrial Mission, and also co-operation between various officers working in Social Responsibility issues is to be examined.

Hattingen-Witten

Closer links between the Diocese of Sheffield and the Church District of Hattingen-Witten in West Germany were endorsed by the Synod; the links to be reviewed in 1995. Through this link it is also hoped to connect up with Christians in East Germany.

Christian Unity Issues

These were highlighted by the visit to the Synod by the Roman Catholic Bishop of Hallam, the Rt. Revd. Gerald Moverley) who introduced the major Anglican-Roman Catholic report "Salvation and the Church" (now commended by the General Synod for discussion at all levels of Church life). Earlier, Synod members backed the Churches Together in Pilgrimage Process which this year will replace the present British Council of Churches set-up. Welcome was given by the Diocesan Synod to the setting up of the South Yorkshire Ecumenical Council and the South Yorkshire Church Leaders' meeting. The financial implications of this work (one third to be paid for by the Church of England, one third by the Roman Catholics and the remaining third by the other denominations) were accepted as was the proposal that further consideration be given to the job description for a proposed Ecumenical Officer to further the work of the whole Process.

Brief Report of the meeting of Sheffield Diocesan Synod at Rotherham on Saturday, March 10th, 1990 by Rev. Roy Arnold, Diocesan Communications Officer



Maseno North

Despite several impassioned pleas, Synod members decided that the Diocesan link with Maseno North (the Diocese in Kenya) should be wound up in 1991, whilst expressing thanks for the opportunities in partnership which the link has provided. The feasibility of a new link with an overseas diocese will be examined by the Mission & Unity Committee.

Church Schools

There was support in the Synod in March for the idea of the cost of Church Schools in the Diocese (that is of the remaining 15% of the cost which fall to parishes with an Aided Church School) being met - where necessary - out of Quota payments made by all the parishes of the Diocese. Still on the educational front, it was agreed that the post of Assistant Director of Education (Children & Youth) be extended until September 1995 when the present holder, Miss Sally Tate, leaves to get married later this year.

Welcome

was given to the new Deputy Diocesan Secretary, Miss Margaret Barlow, who takes up office in May, and also to the new Diocesan Registrar, Mr. Peter Rothwell. A presentation was made to the retiring Registrar, Mr. Paul Ward. The Registrar is the chief legal adviser to the Diocese.

THE NEXT MEETING of the Diocesan Synod will be June 2nd in Doncaster.

Half-time Score: Appeal

Eastertide - festival of New Life in the Christian Church - is a super time to let you know of the new life which is now flowing in the Church of England in South Yorkshire at this present time; some of it is due to the generosity of Churchfolk in their giving to the Bishop of Sheffield's £Million Appeal which - this very month - reaches its halfway mark. Here's the story so far: the half-time score.



Giving Update

So far 1,680 individuals and 150 parishes have given to the Bishop's £Million Appeal (up to February) a total of £430,000. This figure includes promised future donations and tax refunds on 414 covenants. In addition there are now firm commitments from a small number of parishes for a further £200,000, so the real half-time score is £630,000. This is an excellent and encouraging effort even though it means that many individuals and some parishes have not yet contributed to this special appeal.

Getting On

The money raised so far isn't just sitting around: it is already being used and work is already forging ahead on two major Church building projects in the Diocese. Substantial grants have been spent or promised so far for the new Church and Community facility at St. Bartholomew's, Netherthorpe, Sheffield, and for the new St. Swithun's Church and Community Centre on Sheffield's Manor Estate. In both instances the congregations of these Urban Priority Area parishes are pushing ahead with their own vigorous fund-raising programmes, and both Churches - it is hoped - will be completed by the Autumn of this year.

And finally...

Meanwhile...

Money raised by the Bishop's Appeal has unlocked money from other funds and this is, in turn, has enabled generous loans or grants to be made to parishes throughout the Diocese for their own urgent projects. Norwood, Tinsley, Laughton, Handsworth, Ecclesall, Campsall, Clifton (St. James), Gleadless, Millhouses (St. Oswald), Thorpe Hesley, Treeton, St. John's Park School, Adlingfleet, Wheatley (St. Mary), St. Paul's, Wordsworth Avenue, Malthy, Rossington, Kilnhurst, Fishlake, Wheatley Hills and Barnby Dun are all parishes which have benefited from monies unlocked by the Bishop's Appeal. Meanwhile other major projects are in the pipeline for actual direct assistance from the Bishop's Appeal like those at St. Hilda's, Thurnscoe and for the provision of a brand new church for the people who live in the Swallownest area of Rotherham. Aid was given to St. Paul's, Masbrough for their project now completed.

One difficulty...

One genuine and understandable problem which has confronted the Appeal organisers throughout has been that - so far - projects in Sheffield have received the lion's share of Appeal support. This in turn has maybe prompted the question in Doncaster, Rotherham, Goole and stations in between: "What's in this for us?". Whatever the answer the Church in this Diocese is THE BODY OF CHRIST with all the different limbs and organs of the body - in Sheffield, Rotherham, Doncaster, Goole and YOUR PARISH wherever it may be - contributing to the wellbeing of the whole. And God, the Bible tells us, loves a cheerful giver. But another answer is this: that the Appeal money is simply spent in response to requests and needs, and so far no major projects (other than those already mentioned) have ben tabled. Applications large or small are awaited.

Plans

Plans are in the pipeline for major fund-raising events later this year. These include a Diocesan Summer Fair on the forecourt of Sheffield Cathedral (July 14th), a Grand Auction at the Cutler's Hall, Sheffield (August 27th) and concerts by the noted Christian folk-singer George Hamilton IV in both Doncaster and Sheffield in November. Full details of all these events and a major Diocesan-wide fund-raising event - aiming to reach out into all the community - will be published in forthcoming editions of "Sheffield Diocesan News". Keep your eyes peeled and book the dates above in your diary today.

Well: finally it's up to me and you to lend our Bishop a hand. Just think, if every Anglican in this Diocese (let alone their friends and neighbours who may claim to be C of E) with their names on their local Church Electoral Roll gave just something to this Appeal (even as little as 20 pence a week for the next two years...the price of a First Class Stamp or a bar of chocolate) this appeal would be home and dry. So – now we've reached half time - maybe you would like to send in your donation, or maybe you would like to put on some special effort like a Coffee Morning or a Sponsored Swim with proceeds to the Bishop's appeal. How about it? Covenanted giving helps a lot because we can claim back a refund on your giving from the Inland Revenue. But whichever way you might want to give, YOUR HELP RIGHT NOW will help a lot!

This week I was reading a biography of Archbishop Tutu; I also read two full columns and a half page in two newspapers, on religious matters (a rarity indeed). Usually two quarter columns must be thought excessive - they rarely exceed two inches.

It was not "Sermon on the Mount" stuff, but speculation as to the next Primate of All England. The contenders (sounds like a boxing report!) being Evangelicals, Anglo-Catholics and Liberals. It appeared to me that these factions' didactic discussions ignored the people out there, the people we want include the Church (see St Matthew 25 vv 31 to end). As Archbishop Tutu says, "the voiceless ones": the sick (NHS problems), the mentally ill (shunted from hospital to 'community' care), the homeless, the poor, the jobless. To quote Archbishop Tutu again, "When two sides are in conflict and one of them is considerably stronger than the other, to be neutral is not just and fair and impartisan, because to be neutral is in fact to side with the powerful."

In one article three likely Evangelical bishops/"runners" were given. One has a pastoral emphasis and I think he would be a popular choice in and out of church circles. One is an academic, well versed in ancient religious culture. The third bishop's forte is writing hymns where he changes thee to you. (There must be more pressing problems than new hymn books!) His smooth microphone manner and elegant dress sense when conducting these praise hymns so impressed this writer that I suggest a bet on him at 50-1. YES, the bookmakers will lay you odds!

Lest I should be accused of being negative, here are three Evangelists, not Evangelicals - there is a difference, who I admire: Archbishop Tutu, Archbishop Trevor Huddleston and the late Bishop Joost de Blank. The two latter were once of Stepney, which is why I should like Dr Runcie's successor to come from the same stable. I'm backing Bishop Jim Thompson of Stepney.

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

For many people summer outings and holidays often include the opportunity to visit other churches. For some this can be joining in the worship at a parish church that has become like a 'second home' as they return to a familiar holiday haunt year after year. They are recognised and welcomed back. For others it is a 'one-off' visit to a church near their holiday accommodation. The worship may be similar to their home church or differ quite markedly. There may be parts that appeal and others that do not.

I think it is important we experience other styles of worship and see how other parishes are interpreting in their activities their vision of the Christian Faith at this time. Outside worship and the welcome we may, or may not, receive - we can learn much from looking at the bookstall, the notice board, the magazine, and the general appearance of the church. The Church is an organisation in which good ideas are freely shared and not patented, so if you see something which you feel might benefit All Saints', bring it back to share - whether it is an order of service, a magazine, a notice sheet or statement of accounts, or an idea in welcoming and worship.

For other people their holiday visit to a church is simply as a tourist to look round a building with historic or literary association. For some of the more famous parish churches their annual visitors number in the tens of thousands. The 'top twenty' include such churches as Stoke Poges, Haworth, and nearer home Hathersage and Eyam. Not long ago I visited Eyam Church preparing a worksheet for a visit by pupils from All Saints' School. Displayed there was the 'dream' reproduced on the next page. I hope it gives as much food for thought to other visitors as it gave to me. I share it with you.

Do go to visit some other churches this summer - not only to look but also to learn.

WHERE we have learnt to love and accept one another as we are.

WHERE what happens outside the life of the church is seen to be of as much improtance to God in his world as what happens inside, and both are given attention.

WHERE the inner strength of Christians is built up so that, no matter whether the immediate environment is secular or Christian they feel secure enough to make their contribution; alone or with others. Where this inner strength enables them to withstand social pressures and realize their God-give abilities to take initiatives and make choices.

FINALLY,I dream of a church here on earth where Christians realize that they are part of the local body of Christians, who are part of the whole national body of Christians, who are part of the whole international body of Christians, who are part of the body of Christians throughout all ages. A rich variety of all sorts, but all HIS. To the glory of God, Amen!

READ THIS! PLEASE!

says The Bishop of Sheffield

NOT DEAD YET

"Haddaway upstairs" says the new 'Georgie' widow to her daughter, "and see who it is lying there, for it can't be your Dad". This was in the days when the deceased was laid out and the neighbours all called to pay their respects. It was all the kind things they were saying that convinced the widow they couldn't be talking about the husband she knew only-too-well.



As I read the endless obituaries and analyses of the Church of England in the papers I know how she felt. In their talk of "falling numbers", "apathy". "lack of belief". "division", "lack of confidence", I don't recognise the Church of England as I know it very well indeed in this Diocese of Sheffield. It is to nail these lies that I want every member of the Church to join with me at Doncaster on Sunday, 10th June. Three phrases sum up what it is all about:

1 A COVENANT RENEWED

The idea of a 'covenant' - a solem agreement between God and His people - underlines the history of our faith in both the Old Testament and the New Testament (the word 'testament' means 'covenant'). We are the people of the new covenant. That new covenant was sealed by the death and resurrection of Jesus our Saviour. Every Holy Communion reminds us of our place in this new covenant. And especially that at Doncaster this 10th June. For, from time to time, throughout history, God,s people have met together to renew their Covenant with God and each other. For me, Joshua Chapter 24 foreshadows Daystar 1990! I want everyone of us to be able to say "The Lord our God we will worship, and His voice we will obey". That will be a covenant renewed.

2 A FELLOWSHIP PROCLAIMED .

"One family we dwell in Him" we sing. But even within the Diocese we don't know each other very well. Sheffielders can appear uncertain if there is life outside their city! How many of you can name and place the 200 Churches of the Diocese? We are working together for Christ. But we would work together better if we loved each other more and we would love each other more if we knew each other better. There is going to be plenty to do at Doncaster - and everything we do, whether it is light-hearted or serious, is designed to help us to get to know each other better. We are all good talkers. On this day by talking to strangers we make certain they are strangers no longer. We'll go home tired and happy with a host of new friends and a fellowship proclaimed.

3 A MISSION UNDERTAKEN

The preacher at Daystar 1990 is going to be John Finney. After ten years as Adviser in Evangelism in Southwell he has just become The Church of England's Man for Evangelism. We've asked him to come so that everyone who is there knows that Daystar 1990 leads into the Decade of Evangelism. The task before us will be set out. We undertake the Mission that God is laying upon us. During the day I will give authority to Dennis Lennon to be our Adviser in Evangelism. he is coming to us from St. Thomas, Edinburgh, to help us make sure that for every parish the Decade of Evangelism is a Decade of Evangelism. It will, I hope, be a wonderful start to Dennis Lennon's ministry with us to meet with a multitude of Christian people eager for the work of evangelism, glad that there is a mission undertaken.

Be there! Please be there! Your absence (and the devil is giving you, I don't doubt religious reasons for staying away) will hurt you and, more important, hurt the rest of us. It is no good saying afterwards "I wish I'd gone". So please be there so that we can stand together before God resolved to serve Him not just in the coming decade but for ever.

Football's Thanks to Church......

As a special thank you to the clergy and Church workers of Sheffield who rushed to the scene of the Hillsborough football disaster to care for the families and friends of victims, Sheffield and Hallamshire County Football Association have presented the Churches with a surprise gift of £25,000 which is to be used as a fund to provide holidays and financial backing for clergy in need of time out from the pressures of the normal routines of ministry.

Welcoming the gift the Bishop of Sheffield, the Rt Revd David Lunn comments "It is a remarkable and very welcome gesture". He and other Christians leaders from Sheffield received the cheque for £25,000 from Sir David Hill-Wood (Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Football Association) and Mr. Geoffrey Thompson (Secretary of the Sheffield and Hallamshire County Football Association). The money in question is part of the surplus funding produced by the 1989 F.A. Challenge Cup. The special fund which it will form will cover the clergy of all the major Christian denominations and officers of the Salvation Army.

Clergy and Church workers were early on the scene after the Disaster, caring for families and friends of the victims both at the local hospitals, at the temporary mortuary at the ground and in the weeks and months following that April Saturday. Some of the families are still in frequent contact with clergy in Sheffield and, as a small part of the healing process, after the disaster, the special memorial services held at Sheffield's Anglican and Roman Catholic Cathedrals will be long remembered

CHASING THE DRAGON

Quite a number of people have commented on the recent television interview between Alan Whicker and Jackie Pullinger when his world tour included her Christian work with the drug addicts in Hong Kong. Alan Whicker's bemused questions were no match for the powerful testimony of changed lives in the power of Christ.

Amongst Jackie's team of volunteer helpers who never leave the side of those withdrawing from addiction is Ruth Evans whom many know from her younger days at All Saints'. In a recent letter she writes:

"It is 3am and I am at Tai-O first stage house on Latan Island doing night duty. I am in the 'New Boy' Room. The three new boys who have been here less than ten days are now asleep. My job is to pray and help bring the kingdom of God into this place.

Much of my time over the last year has been spent at Hang Fook Camp, the nerve centre of the St.Stephen's Society. My job at camp was to run the Tuck Shop. Not wildly spiritually exciting you may think, but a time where God had opportunity to teach me so much of how to make disciples. The second lesson I learnt here was that in order to "Go and make disciples" you must be a disciple yourself! The first lesson I learnt was the bigness of the grace of God, his mercy and the overwhelming patience he has with those he has saved from the pit.

I have been involved in ministry at the Walled City meetings when the men, still on heroin, first come to receive Jesus and receive gifts from the Holy Spirit. Hang Fook Camp is the second stage house where much maturing in Christ occurs. As helpers we are always on hand to encourage, to pray, to get alongside the men. This can take many forms from helping on the daily work programme i.e. in the T-shirt printing factory, digging the garden, painting, or going together taking rice boxes to the people who sleep on the streets.

Hang Fook Camp is home to a 400 strong church and I have been used in leading worship at two of the housegroups and running a bible study fellowship group for the Filipino helpers. This led me to have the opportunity to go to the Philippines for $2\frac{1}{2}$ weeks as part of a team, teaching at 'Youth with a Mission' Schools on the Holy Spirit and His Gifts. I thank God for his goodness to me."

The announcement of the new Archbishop of Canterbury approaches with speculation in the Press. I recently read a magazine article listing eleven 'hopefuls' - well not exactly as two did not want the job. Their views on several subjects were given together with the writer's own comments and also the odds offered by a national bookmaker.

Now bookmakers are nobody's fool, otherwise they would be out of business, and after reading the article the odds seemed ominous, fearing the wrong man would be chosen. Of the favourite at 2 - 1, the comment was "a brilliant Church politician, ambitious and competitive, but no great theologian". The others were at varying odds with varying accomplishments and deficiencies. One was considered to be "the brains of the Church of England, the man with the best leadership temperament, but a cold unapproachable manner". A cruel comment on another was "many see him as a bit of a joke". It was with dismay that I read the comment on the last candidate with the greatest odds - a rank outsider at 20 - 1, " fellow bishops are said to consider him to be both wise and holy, a man of God!" It struck me as odd that the others did not receive these attributes, perhaps they were taken for granted.

We know that many other qualities are needed - the ability to lead; to hold the differing strands of the Church together; to be forthright; to withstand political and media pressure - but a man who is 'wise and holy' will surely have gifts that will prevail over these other problems and command support. I should like to see them given a chance.

The Crown Commission takes recommendations from the Diocese of Canterbury, the Archbishop's Office, and the Prime Minister's Office. The Chairman is a Prime Ministerial appointment. We must pray that the two names presented are indeed the right ones from which the new Archbishop of Canterbury is to be chosen.

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

Whether we feel it is a good thing or not the world of the market-place has now invaded most areas of life. Those unaccustomed to budgeting and finance whether in local government, education, health services or social work are being made accountable for the costing of their work and urged to shew that their functioning is good value-for-money. Alongside this there has also been the introduction of such management techniques as development planning and annual staff assessment. Each member of staff is encouraged to set goals for the future year and critically review how successful or otherwise their past year has been.

These influences have not been without effect on the life of the Church. Our own diocese is carrying out a pilot scheme of clergy assessment and the attainment of clear objectives of ministry within each parochial setting. Parishes are urged to review their administrative structure and use of resources, both in terms of plant and people, to make sure all activities are cost-effective. Good stewardship means getting the best out of what we have.

We can also use these theories of "market forces" to reflect on our personal Christian lives. We can plan goals of spiritual attainment and mission - such as consistent Bible Study; longer times of prayer and meditation; consideration of with whom to seek to share our faith, whom to encourage to join us in worship, or to whom to go in helpful service and loving care. Then we should be prepared to review how far we have achieved our goal, how effective our Christian lives have been, and are we giving good value for the talents God has given us?

The Decade of Evangelism should involve us working at effective forward planning, yet such plans are only truly effective if they have their starting point with "me"!

BELFAST VISIT "In your light, Lord. May we see light."



On the morning of April 26th a small group, made up of four people from the second year of the Pastoral Workers and Readers Course, together with three members of St. Peter in Chains Roman

Catholic Church in Doncaster, and the Lay Training Officer gathered on Sheffield coach station to begin our journey to the Columbanus Community in Belfast. This was a repeat of the visit made by members of the course last year, with the added encouragement of being joined by our Roman Catholic friends, and again the aim of the visit was to discover how Christians living in difficult places manage to make sense of the experience in the light of the Gospel. I guess that even those among us who had visited or lived in Belfast before were as unsure as the rest of us about what to expect, but the violent images drawn from press and television coverage of events in the province must have been lurking in the backs of our minds.

The Columbanus Community of Reconciliation is a small ecumenical community on the outskirts of Belfast, dedicated to fostering reconciliation between the denominations and the divided communities. It was founded by Fr. Michael Hurley, a Jesuit, and currently includes in its membership two Jesuit priests, one Anglican and two Roman Catholic nuns, and a Presbyterian lay-woman and an Anglican lay-man. It bases its life around a daily Eucharist (which is not shared and so remains both a cause of great pain and a potent symbol of the reality of division within the Body of Christ) and evening prayer. The Community house acts as a focus around which people may meet and work may be done.

As we were taken to various parts of Belfast we began to encounter a community in which lives have clearly been damaged by the consequences of the "troubles", yet we met still more people who had responded in concern, care and love, and we heard about a variety of attempts to respond creatively and actively to the needs of the individuals and communities around them. We recognised places such as one might see scattered around the communities of South Yorkshire where there is overt poverty and deprivation, and in which we heard stories of faith, hope and love. We saw high walls and barricades dividing the city, slogans and murals proclaiming territorial rights, and got used to seeing helicopters hovering over housing estates, armed police and soldiers; and we heard people explaining how there were initiatives and religious communities in which Catholic and Protestant alike shared and worked together for good. In a place dominated by division (more economic and sectarian than religious), we frequently heard it said that, in a strange way, much of what was now possible would have been unheard of before the present troubles began, and people talking with a convinced hope of when they might come to an end.

As a group of lay people, we found out what happens when a group of Christians is brought together and has to share the shopping, the catering, and each other's company, as well as trying to come to terms with a mass of new information and ideas. Then there is the whole dimension of worship, prayer, and ministry to each other. Taken as a whole the experience was extremely powerful and the lessons not likely to be quickly forgotten; on a more concrete level it may be that our new understanding will provide a basis for links between people and churches both in the Diocese of Sheffield and in Belfast, and between the people in our Anglican and Roman Catholic Dioceses of Sheffield and of Hallam.

What then did we leam? We came home having discovered a great deal about ourselves and each other, about the commonality of the faith which we as a mixed group of Anglicans and Roman Catholics shared. Hardly surprising we found that Christians in Belfast are engaged in social action, prayer, and mutual support of each other. We were all conscious of having received a wonderful welcome and of having been among friends and fellow workers in Christ. In one respect these are all things we already knew and we did not have to go as far as Belfast to discover them, yet it is in the nature of pilgrimage that sometimes one has to make the journey away in order to recognise what already is close at hand. In another sense though, the situation in Northern Ireland is very different from ours and does show things up in a much starker light, and so the insights gained there help us to see our own circumstances more clearly.

Face to Face

Gill Timmins representing the Lay Chairman of Doncaster Deanery Synod was one of those who met with representatives of the Diocese of Guildford recently at Swanwick Conference Centre in Derbyshire. She writes of the 24 hours spent together - thirty five people from each Diocese:

"In print, a Sheffield-Guildford Partnership doesn't exactly drum up great enthusiasm, but face to face it's a vastly different matter. That was one of the discoveries we made at Swanwick. Bishops, Archdeacons, Rural Deans, Deanery Lay Chairpersons or their representatives and Diocesan Staff from the two Dioceses explored strengths and weaknesses and enjoyed each other's company. No major decisions were taken, but faces were put to names, and a growing understanding and friendship now exists. It's on that knowledge of each other that we can build. The partnership is growing. Already our two Cathedrals are linked, and fifteen parishes. Barriers are being broken down. There's a growing understanding of what it must be like to have to travel for 11/2 hours to work from Surrey, or what it must be like to be unemployed in South Yorkshire. Bridges are being built between North and South. The way forward is clearly through parish links, and to get people to see each other, not just in print, but face to face.'



One amusing note came from Leslie Fletcher, Chairman of Sheffield Diocesan Board of Finance, who saw one participant from Guildford being pretty handy with paper and felt-tips, writing down comments from one group meeting. The weather being hot everyone was in shirt sleeves. It was before introductions had been made, and Leslie, not one to miss an opportunity, asked if the writer was a clergyman. When "yes" came as the reply, Leslie quickly said, "If you're as handy as that with paper and pen, we can always offer you a job in the Diocese of Sheffield!"

It was an offer that perhaps won't be taken upbecause Leslie had made it to the Bishop of Dorking!

Start Praying... suggests the Bishop of Doncaster

One of the difficulties that besets both our Editor, Gordon Taylor, and other contributors to the Diocesan News is that material has to be in well in advance. This issue will appear after Daystar but it has to be written beforehand. So writing in faith I know that God will have blessed a memorable day and called us out as individuals, parishes, and as a Diocese to a renewed commitment to share the Gospel.

That must mean that we are in the business of activity - activity of various kinds: whether it is encouraging a more authentic pattern of work and service in society or witnessing in a new way to the saving love of Christ.

Active we have to be and must be: but activity on its own is far from enough. As well as speaking, we have to listen; and sometimes christian service is best expressed by waiting on other people's timing rather than by busily setting our own agendas.

Nowhere is it more important to wait and listen than in our dealings with our heavenly Father; and I make no apology for returning to the subject of prayer.

If the Church is to be renewed for evangelism and mission we must always begin by consciously seeking God's face; discovering what he wants us to do and to be for him. We shall need a fresh assurance of his forgiveness and that will keep us near the cross. We shall need a confidence in the Gospel that will cause us to walk closely with our risen Lord. We shall need the resources that God has freely made available for us in the Holy Spirit.

There are lessons to be learnt in the school of prayer. I think modern christians are often less well versed in the arts of prayer than many were in previous generations; and sadly we have to confess that we are less well disciplined.

Whatever other lessons there are to be learnt: there is one basic and very simple one. Start praying! Like the learner swimmer there is no substitute for taking your feet off the bottom of the pool and launching yourself into the water.

I believe that if God is going to use the decade of Evangelism in the Diocese, prayer must be at the heart of all that we try to do. The Mission and Unity Committee, with the Bishop's full support therefore suggest that on Saturday December 1st, the eve of Advent, people across the Diocese should set aside time for particular prayer; and that every Church should be open for such prayer on that day. We also hope to have in three centres in the Diocese a short morning 'retreat' which will enable people to meet together for reflection and meditation.

We don't want to confine any call to prayer to that occasion alone: or to delay special endeavour in prayer until then. Nor do we want to turn prayer, which is essentially grace, into any form of merit. We believe however that a day of this kind will be an encouragement to give prayer its proper priority.

It may seem a little premature to write about it now; but with this degree of advance notice I know you will be able to set the day aside.

His caring nature extended to concern for community ventures - he gave active support to Transport 17 and was on the editorial team of the "Totley Independent". His artistic temperament gave him a good appreciation of literature and art. In earlier years he took part in amateur dramatics - and his love of photography developed into the skill of drawing, painting and calligraphy by which we particularly remember him and through which he gave such pleasure and delight to many people.

Bill grew into the Christian Faith later in life, being confirmed when he was 70, and he remained a regular communicant at All Saints'. In all aspects of his life we valued Bill's friendly nature, gentle understanding, healing quality, youthful outlook and his enriching spirituality.

As a testimony to this we reproduce below the text of his last piece of calligraphy, written before his final hospitalisation:

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The beginning of next month will mark a significant change in the ecumenical strivings of the denominations of our land. The British Council of Churches, which was formed in 1942, will be dissolved to be replaced by a new grouping called "Churches Together in England" - (C.T.E.). Similar groups will be established for Scotland and Wales and brought together under the umbrella of the Council of Churches for Britain and Ireland - (C.C.B.I.). The new groups will have a much wider range of churches than were in the British Council of Churches - including the Roman Catholic Church.

This new initiative largely follows from the Lent Course of 1986 - "What on Earth is the Church for?" Over a million Christians took part in the study groups and the response showed an overwhelming concern for churches to come closer together, but in a unity which allowed for the rich diversity of religious experience to be expressed. This led to representatives from all churches meeting at Swanwick in 1987. From their discussions issued a Declaration expressing the conviction that all churches at every level should have a clear commitment to each other in common evangelism and service to the world, and in a search of the unity for which Christ prayed.

The emphasis on commitment at all levels is important. About ten years ago there had been attempts to unite different denominations together on a national level. The Anglican-Methodist proposals failed and the only new grouping was that of the Congregationalists and Presbyterians forming the United Reformed Church. The new movement does not envisage any individual churches uniting in such a way but rather all Christians journeying together, committing themselves as pilgrims to follow faithfully and prayerfully a path towards unity, even though the stages ahead are not clearly defined.

All congregations of every church will be joining in an Act of Prayer and Commitment on Sunday 2nd September to dedicate ourselves to the cause of co-operation and unity in the places where we live and work.

The new gutters should be in the same style as the original and not modern plastic.

The cost of doing this work, in materials alone, will be around £3000. To provide essential scaffolding around the sanctuary exterior will be approximately £1000. These are items that have to be provided. We cannot put them off till next year.

A group of three or four willing helpers are required to help replace the lower level gutters; to lift and position and to "dab on" a final coat of paint to seal the joints. This will help to keep the fitting costs down to a minimum. The whole job will probably take 2/3 weeks.

So, if you see scaffolding, platforms and planks around the church, hopefully in September, you will know what is happening.

In the near future, modifications to the church hall are planned. In particular, the provision of a disabled toilet for which we hope to receive a grant to offset the costs of around £1000. According to the local Fire Inspector, who recently visited the hall, we should provide another fire door exit to comply with modern fire regulations.

The Archdeacon of Sheffield visited the church last year and his suggestion of clearly defining the boundary of the church land on the Polytechnic side of the south lawn was reiterated by the Rural Dean's visit this year. The cost of defining the boundary by erecting a fence in character with the church surroundings, in materials alone, will be around £600.

As you can gather, there is considerable expenditure and work to be done on the fabric on the church, some needing immediate action. Other work could be delayed, but this means costs will rise and other priorities could take over.

C. Job Churchwarden

I believe in praying for everincreasing capacity to love and serve them and for greater worthiness to be loved and served by them in return. I believe in sending out a prayer to the Father to draw to me those who are meant to help me and to be helped by me, in order to express my life together with them.

I believe in asking my Heavenly Father for only that which is mine to have, knowing that when the right time has come it will be made manifest. I believe that the chief essential of life is to keep in touch with the Father, and let the VII. Divinity that is in me manifest through me. I believe that the whole world about me is full of beauty, joy and power, even as it is full of God, and that I can share it and enjoy it if I attune myself to my Divine Plan and am inwardly open toward God and outwardly helpful toward men. I shall ask my heavenly Father and Friend, who dwells within me and who has given me this vision of life, to give me His help in its realization and to help me share it with others that it may bring peace and happiness to many.

A NEW JOY

Not many weeks ago I was rushing round the supermarket with my trolley and asking myself - "Why am I so crazy trying to fit so many things into my life?" Life is very hectic trying to run a home and a school and finding time for worship and friendships. Instead of feeling sorry for myself I decided to look at the positive aspects of being a woman today. I am not a 'women's libber' but I do feel modern women have so much to be thankful for. No longer need there be a choice between family and career if we wish to have both. Indeed my daughter and her friends have been told that as medical students they should not be embarking on the course if they do not intend to continue practising as doctors when they are wives and mothers.

We live at a time when our lives are every bit as fulfilled as any man's. We have many advantages over men, by our very nature we can bring so much joy to the lives of others, and in doing so we become happy and joyful ourselves.

Many years ago when my father died I was given a book to read which was very helpful. It is called "A New Joy" and is written by Colleen Townsend Evans. She is an American, and although I find many American women authors brash, there was much in this book which I have found helpful over the years. It is based on the Beatitudes and asks what they can mean to a modern Twentieth Century woman. I should like to quote a few passages.

"Happy is the woman who is generous with her love and understanding. She knows that it is not so much what she does but what she is, that is really important to her loved ones. And when the voice of need is uttered, however feeble it may be, she hears it, she listens, she comforts, she supports, she gives her love generously. Because she becomes part of the lives of those she loves, and because her happiness comes from her generosity, she receives even more than she gives."

"Happy is the woman who is honest with herself, with others and above all with God. This woman has given over every conscious area of her life to God, and has asked Him to reveal to her the inner areas of fear and bitterness that need to be healed. Between her and her fellow human-beings there is no barrier. In her there is no tension, for

"Happy is the woman who is used by the Lord to warm and enliven the human spirit . . . and whose life becomes her daily witness to his immeasurable goodness."

I think this book is still in print, but if not, I should be happy to loan my copy to anyone who would like to borrow it.

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Sometimes this magazine may come through your letterbox to land on the mat with some of the many "mailshots" we are sent today. We receive tokens to tempt us to try the newest taste, privilege offers for property overseas, and rich rewards for returning our winning numbers. Modern technology has the means to make these communications personal - they are addressed to you my name, you have been specially selected, it is outside your house in Totley that the winner's car will be parked, and into your bank in Sheffield that the cheque will be deposited.

In some ways there is no comparison between a mailshot and the words of Scripture, yet the message of the Bible, whilst available to everyone is also addressed to us individually and it also contains the promise of rich rewards. It is part of the power of the Bible that it can speak to us on a personal level. The same passage read aloud in Church can convey different insights to different people about their lives at that moment. The Word of God is living, searching and revealing, and being open to this spiritual process can enrich our lives in a way no material prize could ever do.

Often these material prizes are presented with a choice for the winner - a luxury car or an exotic holiday; or an annual amount for life; or a large lump sum. A glance at the actual winners will see they always opt for the lump sum. This reflects our response of wanting everything now, an attitude we regard as wrong. But is it always so? Scripture exhorts us that the time is "now". "Now" is the time to respond and believe the Gospel.

Next time you pick up your junk mail, be reminded to look for your personal message in the pages of the Bible.

Churches Together in Pilgrimage

We all feel at home in our own particular Parish Church. At least it is my hope that we do. That is entirely as it should be; for it is sad if any christian lacks a true sense of belonging to Christ in the fellowship of his or her own christian community.

There is more of course to christian belonging than belonging to our own local Parish Church. There is a universal character to our christian relationships. That is reflected certainly in the life of our Diocese and in the special role of the Diocesan Bishop as a focus of universality and unity; but it is also reflected in the wider witness of our sister churches both here in this country and across the world. Whether our fellow christians live in Rotherham or Goole, Sheffield, Doncaster or Barnsley or in South Africa or Sri Lanka, we are gloriously and wonderfully closely related.

Increasingly we find ourselves at home with our friends in other Churches: recognising a oneness with each other which makes us more than simply christian neighbours. We've shared occasions in each other's worship, prayed and worked through our faith together in each other's homes. In some parts of the Diocese we have taken the further step of entering into a more committed partnership in a Local Ecumenical Project.

If this local friendship with christians in other Churches in our area is to grow, this development too needs a wider dimension. In the recent history of interchurch relationships in this country that wider dimension has not been easy to discover. The British Council of Churches, which achieved a good deal more than many have been willing to give it credit, nevertheless failed to capture either the mind or interest of the Churches in the way that had been hoped. The Union Scheme between ourselves and the Methodist Church lacked a sufficient majority support in the Church of England; and the Covenanting proposals did not prove to be the way forward either.

It is not necessarily the case that Churches should abandon reunion attempts - the Methodist and the United Reformed Church are in the business of considering a possible reunion at the moment - but it hardly seems likely to be the best way forward for the major denominations at present.



The scallop shell was a symbol of medieval pilgrimage. Pilgrims to Santiago de Compostela in northern Spain wore a shell on their hats. The cross and the boat together are symbols of the modern movement for Christian unity, with the church represented by a boat or an ark.

It is more than encouraging therefore that a major new initiative is being launched this month which shows every sign of being a substantial step in the right direction: and we in our Diocese need to be fully aware of it. What is new about this fresh initiative is that for the first time the Roman Catholic Church is fully involved with the other Churches: and a number of black led Churches are also active participants. What is also new is that behind the initiative is a real determination on the part of the Churches to work and decide together as Churches, rather than simply leaving somewhat marginal decisions and action to a British Council of Churches.

So 'Churches Together in England' is being launched on September 1 a week later on September 8 a 'Council of Churches for Britain and Ireland'.

Time will tell whether this new initiative will fulfil the hope being placed in it. It must be more than institutional although no member of the Church of England in their right spiritual senses should do other than take the Church as an institution seriously. It must be moved and led by the Spirit of God. It must have vision, capturing our hearts as well as our heads.

If it does, God willing, it will lead to a deeper and wider unity among christians as we do our best to be witnesses to Christ not only here in the Diocese but also in the nation.

are the catchwords which are behind the Diocesan Decade of Evangelism and the morning of prayer in three centres of the Diocese on Saturday 1st December this year. St. Mark's, Broomhill, Sheffield, St. Paul's, Masbrough, Rotherham, and St. Wilfrid's, Cantley, Doncaster will be open from 10.00 a.m. to 12 noon with visiting speakers. The Diocesan Mission and Unity Committee are hoping that parish churches will be open on that Saturday morning as well so that everyone will have the opportunity of joining in with the morning of prayer, wherever they happen to be.

Welcome German Visitors

The Revd. Grant MacIntosh, himself a fluent German speaker has visited Germany several times, and has been part of a growing friendship between the German Church and our own Diocese. He writes about this month's visit to the Diocese of Sheffield, by members of the German Church District of Hattingen-Witten:

"This month from Monday 24th September to the 1st October a group of 40 German Christians are to be here as our guests. Approximately 30 of them will be lay people. Will you, please, make them feel welcome if you meet them while they are here? The vast majority of them will be accommodated in parishes of the Diocese outside the city of Sheffield. Thank you for the offers of hospitality which have come in from Armthorpe, Bolsterstone, Bradfield, Brampton, Dinnington, Kilnhurst, Owston, Rawcliffe and Rotherham to date.

As a Diocese we are marking the occasion with a service of celebration and welcome in Rotherham Parish Church on Tuesday, 25th September at 7.30 p.m. when David our Bishop will be present.

Among the German visitors will be included some members of their equivalent Mothers' Union as well as a Youth Worker, an Industrial Missioner, a Y.M.C.A. Youth Worker and a Church Organist. All are interested to know how we live and work and do things as Christians. The German Church District is similar to Rotherham and Doncaster. They too have experience of growing unemployment, of local coal mines having closed down and of a shrinking steelmaking capacity. You will be able to speak to most of them in English.

Earlier this year in March we passed resolutions at our Diocesan Synod to welcome authorised developing contacts between ourselves and the German Protestant Church District of Hattingen-Witten in Germany's industrial Ruhr area from where our visitors are coming. We agreed to support all efforts to establish firm relationships with these German christians and through them to seek contacts with East German

Have you heard of Meissen yet? No, not the fine East German porcelain. As far as we Anglicans are concerned it is the name of a document in English and German the content of which is to be the basis of immediate closer unity discussions between the German Protestant Church and the Church of England. At General Synod in York in July 1990 Meissen was accepted unanimously by the House of Bishops as one essential way forward. We intend to spend a little time looking at it together while our visitors are here."

New Hospital Service by S.C.C.C.C.

When 82 year old Joe went to visit his sister in the Northern General Hospital, he arrived to find that she had died earlier that afternoon. He was devastated - they had lived together all their lives and their only relative was a nephew in Newcastle. The nurses made Joe a cup of tea, then took him to the bus stop to catch the bus home. They were as upset as Joe: they knew the house would be empty when he got there and that he would have to 'phone his nephew for help with the necessary arrangements.

This is an increasingly common situation for people to find themselves in - especially the elderly - and Sheffield Churches Council for Community Care, at the request of the Northern General Hospital, have just recruited and trained a group of volunteers to try to alleviate this problem.

The volunteers will be prepared to accompany the bereaved person home, make them a cup of tea and telephone their family, if required. They will ensure the person is safe and able to cope and will be available to go back to the hospital with them if necessary. Volunteers will stay until, say, the daughter from Derby arrives to take over.

The aim of the service is to provide short term support for bereaved relatives immediately after the death of a patient, particularly where there is no immediate family support available. The rota will cover 24 hours/7 days a week and be under the close supervision of Revd. David Equeall and Revd. Linda Shipton, the hospital's two whole time chaplains.

The new service begins this month and initially will cover only certain wards at the hospital. Because the service is not involved in counselling or long term support, Elizabeth Holloway at S.C.C.C.C., 69 Division Street, Sheffield. S1 4GE (tel: 759452/757310), will be pleased to hear of churches or groups who offer bereavement support in their local areas, so that the information about their existence can be passed onto their volunteers, and so provide an even fuller service.

Diocesan Lent Book 1991

With an introduction by the Bishop, six contributors from across the Diocese have shared in writing a Lent Book for 1991. The Book is intended for personal devotional reading, week by week; but it is also conveniently suitable as a Lent Course. Parishes looking for material for a Lent Course next year should therefore bear it in mind. It is hoped that copies will be available by mid-November.

Celebrating Rotherham

Don't forget the Concert at All Saints', Rotherham by Lillian Boutté from New Orleans, Louisiana, the birthplace of jazz, on SUNDAY, 28th OCTOBER at 8.00 p.m. Stuart Brindley, Vicar of Rotherham is hoping for a packed church that night, and tickets are available from him (phone Rotherham 364341) or from the church - price £4.00, or you can pay on the door. It will be a night to remember and demand is expected to be high.

Walkley Community Hall Project looks for funds...

St. Mary's Church Hall at Walkley was built in 1905 - as a temporary facility. By 1986, not surprisingly, it had become unsafe, and a group of eight local representatives formed a committee which started the ball rolling for the replacement of the hall. At first, there was no money, and no real experience of starting off such an ambitious project, but there was plenty of enthusiasm and imagination, and with a great deal of hard work, the old hall was finally demolished in 1989, and the foundations laid for the new community hall. So far towards a 'materials only' cost of £102,000, nearly £70,000 has been raised (the labour costs are carried through the Government Training Programme for the Construction Industry). Peter Thackeray, Chairman of the Community Hall Project reports that work is well under way, and the building could be finished by mid 1991. But the pressing problem, as ever, is finance. The money for the materials raised so far is expected to be spent by the end of this year, with the possibility of the work coming to a standstill, to the detriment of the project, the church, the community, and the young men working and training on it. "But" says Peter, "our commitment is that despite frustrations, the project will be completed, although total funding has not yet been achieved."

The enthusiasm and the imagination continues in Walkley for the new Community Hall, let's hope that the finance falls into place as the much needed building nears its completion.

Canon Sorby Briggs

Canon Sorby Briggs, who died in July is remembered with respect and gratitude by many in the Diocese of Sheffield. His whole ministry was in this Diocese, serving as a curate at St. George, Sheffield, Vicar of Walkley, Rural Dean of Hallam, Secretary of the Sheffield Diocesan Board of Finance, and Rector of Wickersley, during which time he was made an Honorary Canon of Sheffield Cathedral. Ability and dedication were the marks of his ministry and he was wonderfully supported by his wife Kathleen who died in 1974. In Wickersley, where he served for 23 years, he laboured long to build up the Body of Christ after the difficult years of war. He was a tireless visitor, a popular preacher and an able administrator, giving strong encouragement to the young people of the church. With others he was responsible for building a new church school in the parish. In a long ministry he earned the respect and affection of the whole community. (R.J. Draper)

Canon W.T. Bryant 1902-1990

We record with sadness the death of Wilfred Thomas Bryant, who was ordained Deacon in 1930, and came to Sheffield in 1936 as Church Missionary Society Secretary. He served for twenty years as Vicar of St. Mary's, Doncaster, and then to Harthill, and Rural Dean of Laughton. Up to his retirement in 1985 he was Chaplain and Governor of the Shrewsbury Hospital. Joint Work Consultancy

Interim progress report

In the three pilot deaneries of Adwick-le-Street, Attercliffe and Laughton, there are potentially 65 clergy or those holding the Bishop's Licence who could opt to use the new Joint Work Consultancy Scheme. Of these, 11 are in process of moving or retiring. It is encouraging that out of the remaining 54, 27 had asked for a Work Consultant by the end of June. It is also interesting that 16 of these asked for a lay Work Consultant, and 11 asked for a clerical one.

Already, an independent evaluation of the Scheme is in process and is being undertaken by Mr. Albert Richards, a Baptist layman and a Research Associate at the University of Manchester's Institute of Science and Technology.

A meeting for the Work Consultants is planned for mid September, to help them in their task. Absolute confidentiality has been maintained and only the administrator of the Scheme, Miss Margaret Selby, knows who has chosen to take part.

A GLIMPSE OF THE KINGDOM

BRITISH RAIL has been running a staff training programme in which people who do not usually meet are brought together to share tasks. Signalmen and drivers, booking clerks and technicians learn one another's needs and problems.

In one of the training sessions each member, in turn, is blindfolded and given the experience of being guided round a station, by another member, so as to learn the needs of a blind passenger.

Often, as a result of such training sessions, solutions are found to long-standing problems, and barriers are broken down.

Part of the task for Christians in their workplace may be to enlarge their own vision and that of their colleagues. This does not mean losing our immediate loyalties and responsibilities, but steadily to set them in a wider perspective.

For belief in the Kingdom of God implies a view of human community and its potential, A view that will alert people to their responsibilities, both corporate and individual, to turn visions into reality.

The kind of training course British Rail has been doing does not turn everyone into general managers, nor does it turn Waterloo station into the heavenly city. But it does enlarge everyone's vision.

It is interesting to reflect, as we read the Gospels, how much time Jesus spent on enlarging people's vision, and how many people's difficulties stemmed from refusing to have their vision enlarged.

The risen Christ told his disciples to meet him in Galilee. Galilee - that word is loaded with significance. The other day I travelled with two very senior Christian friends on the train to London and, just to pass the time, I asked them, "When I say the word Galilee, what images are evoked in your minds?". The woman said "lakes" and the man said "barren hills". No doubt this is true. But Galilee for the first three Gospels, for the synoptics, is the place that Jesus chose for most of his ministry. It is where he was affirmed. It is where he was also persecuted. It is where he carried on with his healing and his teaching.

The liberation theologians of Latin America call this the Galilean Option of Jesus. He deliberately did not choose Jerusalem or even Judah, but Galilee; poor, rural and neglected. "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light" and, of course, the prophet is speaking of Galilee (Isaiah 9.2).

Galilee was the first bit of territory of the land given to the people of Israel to be colonised by the Assyrians. When the Assyrians took it, in the 8th century BC, they exiled many of the people - the inhabitants of Galilee - and brought in and settled other people from different parts of their empire which stretched to southern Iran and what is now Afghanistan.

Galilee stands for oppression and being oppressed. It is poor. Can any good come out of Nazareth?

But then it was also Galilee of the Nations. It was multi-racial and multi-cultural. Most of those encounters of Jesus which I believe alerted him to the significance of his mission, the universality of his mission, took place in Galilee. The Roman centurion and the Syro-Phoenician woman symbolise Galilee of the Nations, and these people represented not only different races but also different faiths.

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
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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I recently took part in a day's course presented by the Mission Advance Research Centre - normally abbreviated to M A R C. The theme of the day was 'Change'.

The work of M A R C is mainly twofold. One aspect is to research and collate statistical evidence about Church affiliation, patterns of worship, social trends, etc., and the Centre was responsible for the National Church Census last Autumn. The other part of its work is in training or retraining those involved in ministry to enable them to be more effective in the midst of the kind of changes highlighted by their research findings.

Whether we would wish it to be so or not, one thing we can be sure of is that things will change. We cannot <u>not</u> change. Without change the lack of stimulus in life would cause discontent and decay. Without change there would be no personal growth in us as individuals. Change brings with it a mixture of feelings such as - loss and hope, risk and reward, excitement and confusion, conflict and confidence. By accepting rather than resisting the process of change, we can influence it for the better.

In Church life this means thinking out clearly the purposes to which Christ calls us today, and the goals by which we can fulfil His purpose. This will include prayerful forward planning and training. The insight of M A R C is that planning and training for the future is much more effective if we can see the reality of where we are now, and where we want to go in the future - and some form of parish audit or assessment is recommended.

In preparing for our Decade of Evangelism in Totley we need to plan some specific objectives and the steps necessary to achieve them - otherwise we shall all be very busy in December 1999!

Please pray about our local response to the Decade of Evangelism and how, in the words of St. Paul (Ephesians 5:16) we may redeem the time to the full.

Following demob his work in departmental stores finally brought him to Sheffield as a fashion buyer for Atkinsons. He enjoyed cricket and rugby, and was an umpire for many years at Totley Rise Cricket Club. He began the cricket team at the Heatherfield Club where he had been a member since its inception 17 years ago, and has been Treasurer in recent years. His friendly, caring and perceptive nature was appreciated by all who knew him.



ABOUT TRUTH

writes the Bishop of Sheffield

- 1. Appropriately for so grand a subject I'll begin with five somewhat solemn statements:
 - i) Without belief in truth itself, there is no sure foundation for learning and living.
 - We must trust in, and be loyal to, the truth (and the truths) in which we believe.



- iv) Both when we are ignorant and also when we know we must respect the truth in others even when we think they are wrong.
- v) In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. All things were made by Him. In Him was life; and the life was the light of men.
- 2. Let us continue with five rather more practical statements about truth and the Christian Church:
 - Many seekers after truth have found the truth in Jesus Christ and this is the unshakeable ground of their faith.
 - Many people keep back from faith in Jesus Christ because they do not believe that the things that Christians believe can possibly be true.
- iii) For many people, since they believe that Churchgoers (and the Clergy) are insincere in their beliefs, the Church is not the place where they seek the truth.
- iv) We would be wrong to claim that within the Church and her Scriptures is all truth. The Bible is not the sole encyclopedia of knowledge.
- v) The Word was made flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth.
- 3. From these varied propositions I draw three conclusions of very varying importance:
 - i) For our evangelism to be effective we must not only be proclaiming truth and speaking the truth, we must also be believed generally to be a company of truth seekers. The Church must not become a place of refuge from uncomfortable truths. It must be - and be seen to be "the pillar and ground of the truth" (1 Tim.3.15).
 - ii) If we do believe St. John's teaching on the Word then we need not fear the truth. Keeping ourselves (or others) in ignorance cannot be the right way to protect Christian truth.
 - iii) The Bishop of Sheffield's October lectures* have a part to play in the Decade of Evangelism. May they be used by all lovers of truth both within and without the Christian Church.
- *The Bishop of Sheffield's Lectures have the general title "Great is Truth". They take place in Sheffield Cathedral on four successive nights, Monday Thursday, 22nd 25th October, at 7.30 p.m. They will be followed by questions and then some informal discussion. I keep changing their titles but the subjects are fixed thur:

Monday, 22nd October, The World and Truth

Tuesday, 23rd October, The Bible and Truth

Wednesday, 24th October, The Church and Truth

Thursday, 25th October, Me and Truth

They will be, I believe, informative and enjoyable. Do come!

There are restaurants spilling over onto the pavement, where young and old while away the hours, just watching the world go by.

At the end of a busy day in Jerusalem, or perhaps after venturing further afield to Bethany or Bethlehem, north to Galilee or South to the Negev, St. George's offers a warm welcome home - considerate staff, a comfortable room and a good meal.

Guests are always welcome at the daily services of Holy Communion and Evensong, and to join any of the activities held in The Close.

Children are very welcome at St.George's - and head straight for the garden pond to watch the goldfish and frogs. Herod Antipuss and Cookie also offer feline entertainment around the grounds. The garden provides a good spot for bar-b-q's, but is more usually enjoyed for its quiet and calm, where you can sit, enjoy the colourful flowers, birds and butterflies - and just 'be'!

The overall cost of replacing the gutters is being kept to a minimum by the amount of work we are doing ourselves. The overall cost is estimated, at present, at just under £4500. Would you like to sponsor a section of guttering or downpipe? For 3 inches of guttering it would be say £5 or £20 for 1 foot. Please help if you can. Contact the Vicar or churchwardens.

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Although I regularly purchase the "Church Times" I must confess there are parts which remain unread by the end of the week. However the short section entitled "100 Years ago" is always a must. In reading those letters or reports of a hundred years ago, they sometimes have a familiar ring as if they had related to events of a week ago, although more often I am struck by the heated debates over issues we now look back on as almost ludicrous. We wonder how Christians then could be so bigoted and narrow!

Yet this leads me to ponder on what readers of the "Church Times" in a hundred years will make of our current discussions and practices.

Perhaps they might question . . .

- . . . what was the fuss over women priests all about?
- . . . how odd that clergy lived in tied-accommodation, and were never assessed to see how effectively they were working?
- . . how shortsighted we were in not giving sacrificially to ease the needs of those in the inner city and the third world?
- . . how foolish of Christians in one locality not to work together in mission and pastoral care, and not to pool all their resources to achieve something really worthwhile?

At least they could read of some good news on the last issue. A Church of Cathedral-like proportions is being built in the centre of the City of Milton Keynes. This City Church will be shared by five major Christian denominations - Anglican, Roman Catholic, Methodist, Baptist and United Reformed. The Church will accommodate about 600 people and will be surrounded by a circular cloister and landscaped courtyards with buildings which will include a Centre for Integrated Living and a Centre for Voluntary Organisations.

This is a good piece of news which gives us encouragement as Christians to work together towards the 21st Century.

An Opportunity for Prayer



writes the Bishop of Doncaster:

This month, after an introduction of the issue in the Diocesan Synod, Deaneries and parishes will start to give their serious and thoughtful attention to the question of the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood. I don't want to suggest that many haven't already been doing so; but we move to particular local discussion and Deanery voting: with the matter returning to the Diocesan Synod for their vote in November 1991. That will be followed by the General Synod vote in February 1992.

We all realise that there are deep differences of conviction on this question; and, coupled with conviction, strong feeling. It seems to me therefore to be of the greatest importance that we approach debate and voting in the most responsible way.

That means in the first instance that we should approach the issue theologically. I am not implying that everyone should become amateur theologians overnight. It is much more a recognition on our part that all ministry, ordained or lay, is about God and his servant purpose for the Church. Of course we are influenced by cultural attitudes and secular pressures; for we live in the real world, a world through which God speaks to us. Yet we must be careful to distinguish between the leading of the Spirit and contemporary fashion; and fashion can be either of the progressive or reactionary kind.

In the second place, we must approach the issue sensitively. It simply will not do to be dismissive of the people with whom we disagree. We have to listen to and respect each other. It is only the foolish who are patronising. There are some very deep feelings and concerns on both sides of the debate.

And thirdly we must be mindful of the unity of the Church. I do not intend to enter into the business of predicting the outcome; which in the end thankfully is in God's hands rather than our own. Whatever happens a substantial ministry of healing will be needed. We must hold on to each other and remember our oneness to Christ.

Nor should we at the beginning of a decade of Evangelism allow one issue, however significant for the future life of the Church to dominate. God has given us a wide agenda. We have to serve in a society which cries out for a greater awareness of the redemption and reconciliation already achieved in Christ.

For this there is no better focus for the Church than prayer. May I remind you of the Day of Prayer for the Decade on Saturday December 1. There will be short morning 'retreats' in three Churches in the Diocese: at St. Paul, Masborough; St. Mark, Broomhill; and St. Wilfrid, Cantley: from 10 a.m. until 12 noon. All are welcome at any of them; but we hope that every parish will endeavour to have two representatives at the most suitable centre for them. Please keep your own Parish Church open for prayer on the Day as well.

Sheffield Family Conciliation Service

Each year in the City of Sheffield 300 couples separate or divorce and at least 5000 children are involved in marriage breakdown. Sheffield Family Conciliation Service (14-18 West Bar Green, S1 2DA) is a service which helps separating, divorcing or divorced couples to discuss questions about the future, especially regarding their children. People who are on Legal Aid may find that Legal Aid pays for a visit to the service, others are asked for £10 per visit if in fulltime employment, for less if in part-time employment, or for nothing if unemployed. There is not a long waiting list for an appointment with a member of the service, all of whom have a background qualification in social work or marriage guidance, with additional training and experience in family conciliation. Appointments are during office hours, not during the evening. Contact the Family Conciliation Service on Sheffield 752227.

Sheffield/Guildford Link



The link partnership between our Diocese and Guildford is growing. So Brian Shipman was able to report to the small committee set up by the Bishop's Council two years ago to encourage the partnership. Already the two cathedrals are learning from each other and twenty parishes are enjoying the fruits of formal links, with many more making the first tentative steps to forming a link. Churches in both Dioceses have discovered how much they can learn from each other, and many friendships have been formed despite the distance which separates Sheffield from Guildford. The Revd. Richard Atkinson, of the newly opened St. Swithun's, Manor, a parish in which Guildford has taken a great deal of interest is one of those who knows just how far it is between the two Dioceses, because along with others, he did a sponsored walk all the way to Guildford.

'Well done so far; but there's still more to be done'

Four years on from Faith in the City the Archbishop's group have produced a progress report. It is called Living Faith in the City. It tells of what has happened and points to more things to be done.

The Church Urban Fund has been started. Over 200 projects have benefited from it. The church now has a special Committee for Black Anglican Concerns. There is a Link Officer for Urban Priority affairs in every diocese.

The Government has made a public commitment to the problems of the inner city. Many important groups have put urban matters onto their agendas. Yet the report says that movement has been slow. In some cases - health, housing and poverty - the position is worse than before.

The church must do some hard thinking about its response to the city. It must work on its theology. The ideas in *Patterns for Worship* point a way forward. Where parishes have looked critically at their work in Audits, this has helped. More parishes should try this. The Church must give more attention to the needs of black people and the place of women.



Where the report looks at social and economic life, it finds a growing gap. Hundreds of thousands of fellow citizens lack what others regard as normal. Many have no purpose in their lives. Carefully changing the wording, the report says we must look at matters of 'Order and Law'.

Partnership has grown with many different groups. Links have been forged with other denominations, between parish churches and dioceses in different areas of the country, but there is a call for more.

The report ends with suggestions for further progress. There are lists for the nation and all parts of the church. Audits, lay training, support for the community and for schools are four of the nine 'priorities for further action' suggested for the parish church. As Christians, the report challenges us to do more.

The Revd. Alan Davis, previously of this Diocese and now Archbishop's Officer for Urban Priority Areas, encourages the use of a new Study Guide which will "help church members come to grips with the challenges posed by the report." Designed for use in four meetings, "Living Faith in the City: What it's all about?" also includes a Bible Study and some ideas for worship. It costs 80p with reductions for bulk orders, and is available from the Revd. Alan Davis at Church House, Great Smith Street, London. SWIP 3NZ or from Church House Bookshop.

BLACK AND WHITE

"The Bible has been hi-jacked by ecclesiastics, there is more in it about justice than about the church" - an observation of a priest or a missionary in Latin America? preaching Liberation Theology at risk to health and life, where the many are oppressed and live in abject poverty, or the utterance of a priest in South Africa, sometimes called Black Theology, where apartheid condemns the native population to a secondclass existence. It is accepted by a native archbishop of South Africa not as a separate belief of the scriptures, but addressing these same teachings to the present day. To many in these countries and in the Third World, Liberation Theology is their only hope of a better life. Christian Aid, C.A.F.O.D., and other charities must seem as answers to their prayers. Do not be deterred from giving to these charities because Liberal Theology is not to every politician's liking, whose vocal opposition is stronger than the opinion of the oppressed.

This Theology is not new, witness the deliverance of the Israelites out of Egypt, and when incidents occur in these faraway countries of which we know little, judgment is hasty and ill-advised, prone to error. But in developed countries there is need for Liberation Theology, if only for those whose sins are greed, selfishness, racism, disregard for those less fortunate, for they are in bondage to their own philosophy: "He who puts chains on the body of another, shackles his own soul". (Col. R.G. Ingersole). Actually the opening lines were part of an address to the Industrial Mission by Alan Storkey, an economist who teaches ethics to a North London Anglican Theological College; he should know about GOD and MAMMON. For us less academics, the Bible is our guide; it is how we interpret it.

PASTORAL WORKERS' COURSE

As part of the Pastoral Workers' Course, I spent a day in the Don Valley, looking at the effects of unemployment on the area and the positive ways in which people have made the effort to help themselves. One of the projects, SOS Thurnscoe, made a particular impression on me. Women, and men, were attending classes to improve all aspects of their day-to-day lives. It saddened me to hear recently that, because of cuts, two of these classes have had to be stopped. I asked Kate Bouch, the co-ordinator, to tell us more about the project. She writes:

SOS THURNSCOE (a project of the Dearne Valley Venture) is a community group which meets Mondays, Tuesdays (afternoons only) Wednesdays and Thursdays. Its projects include "Nearly New" sales, a basic education class, a craft session, low budget cookery and "Look After Yourself" sessions run by local health visitors. It is very likely that the group will soon be welcoming a professional worker from the local authority's Under Five Support Team to begin work with pre-school children and their parents. The "Nearly New" project enables the group to pay its own rent and some of the other running costs, but SOS is run very much on a shoe-string budget.

Until April of this year, the group was fortunate to have a tutor for craft work funded by the local Community Education Service. It had also just started a "low cost" sewing session with a "specially selected" tutor. Both tutors were lost at a sweep when all non-vocational classes were cut because of rate-capping.

A small grant from the Dearne Valley Venture Council enabled us to keep on the craft tutor for the summer term. Since then the group has been very fortunate to have the services of the craft tutor free. It is felt that this is unfair to her. We would also like to start up the sewing sessions again ... but ... we need money ... Please can you help?

There will be a Coffee Evening to support the project on 3rd December from 7.30pm at 113 Green Oak Road, with Bring & Buy, cakes and a raffle. Please come along if you can.

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

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

As we approach Christmas and reflect again on the Birth of our Lord Jesus Christ, I want to remind you of one phrase which occurs three times in the Gospel story - "Do not be afraid".

They were words said to Mary as the angel announced the special responsibility that was to be hers in giving birth to a child who would be called the Son of God. To fulfil her divine task Mary would, however, be empowered and guided by the Holy Spirit of God, so she need have nothing to fear.

The same words were spoken in a dream to Joseph as he was deciding out of considerations of respectability to set aside his marriage contract with Mary now that she was expecting a child that was not his. Yet Joseph was needed by God to protect this child, and he was not to worry what people might say about him or think about the situation.

The message - "Do not be afraid" - was also given by an angel to the shepherds in the fields of Bethlehem. They were simple working folk fearful of feeling out of their depth in an event of great spiritual significance. Perhaps they were worried about the effect it could have on their lives. Yet their simple obedience would give them a reassuring sign of God's presence and enable them to experience, not fear, but wonder and joy.

Today, we could well fear the responsibilities that the challenge of true Christian commitment may make upon us. Isn't God asking us too much? Can we cope anyway? We, too, may worry about what people think if we take a stand on certain issues, or 'go all religious'? Our reputation matters to us. We are also hesitant to expose ourselves to the full process of spiritual growth. We might be born again ? Could we face up to changes in ourselves, our attitude and our lifestyle?

The message of Christmas is "Don't be afraid!" because God is present in the midst of all the activities and circumstances of everyday life and we can draw on His Power, His knowledge and His Peace to fulfil His purpose in our lives.

May the true Blessing of Christmas be yours,

From the Billions to the one

writes the Bishop of Sheffield

Fifteen billion years ago, they tell us the 'Big Bang' set our Universe on its way.

The Sun (which, by the way, is going to disintegrate dramatically in another five thousand million years) is but one of about one hundred billion stars that make up our galaxy. They seem to think (and we have to

take it on trust from the experts) that there are certainly billions of other galaxies stretching away from us immeasurably (literally) far.

Reaching back from this incomprehensibly vast scale of things, with feet firmly on our world, we then find that we are sharing this planet earth with more than 5,000 million other people.

This astonishing and terrifying scale of things leads easily to despondency, despair, and an overwhelming sense of the insignificance of the whole human experiment and so, too, of our own life. Shakespeare's Macbeth, it would seem, was exaggerating when he claimed "It is a tale told by an idiot, full of sound and fury, signifying nothing"!

Yet this is the background that has made me understand more clearly than before how wonderfully, lovingly, generously right was the way that God chose to come to our help.

The vast scale of creation frightens and defeats us. Yet the living out of a human life is most certainly an inevitable consequence of our birth! We may not fully understand the mysteries of either birth or death but most certainly we can relate to such profound matters from some base of personal experience. And that we do cope at all with the business of living is because we can digest, arrange and organise from a human perspective the bewildering amount of information that comes to us through our own senses.

And so it is that by taking our humanity to himself and entering into our world (which, of course, is also His world) God is able to come to us through our own experience and in a manner that we can at least begin to understand.

The advice that is running through my mind this Christmas comes from the Shepherds in the fields "We must go straight to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened". Whatever else you do this Christmas make sure that you have time to go with them for there you will find "Mary, and Joseph, and the babe lying in the manger".

Stand with the Shepherds looking into that stable-cave and you will find yourself standing on a very firm piece of ground indeed and with a light shining that is bright enough to break through the surrounding darkness.

Centuries ago Job in his distress asked the question "But where shall wisdom be found and where is the place of understanding?"

Christmas gives us the answer.

New General Synod

Eight elected members from the Diocese of Sheffield joined hundreds of other newly elected members at the first meeting of the new Synod which met last month in London. The Diocese was represented by four members from the House of laity, Mrs. Alison Humphreys, Prof. David McClean, Mr. Jonathan Redden, and Mrs. Janet Vout. The four Proctors in Convocation, elected by the House of Clergy, were Canon Derek Gibbs, Revd. Susan Hope, Revd. Stuart Matthews and Revd. John Packer (names in alphabetical order). They were joined by the Bishop of Sheffield, the Bishop of Doncaster, the Ven. Stephen Lowe as representative Archdeacon, and the Very Rev. John Gladwin, Provost.

All hands on roof!

On Sunday, 16th December at 9.45 a.m. the Bishop of Sheffield will be at St. James' Church, Rawcliffe to lead the moming service and rededicate the new church roof. The old one has lasted quite well, the church being built in 1842. When the Revd Geoff Hollingsworth became Vicar at the back end of 1989, the church architect stressed the urgency of a new roof. Fund raising had been going on since 1986, and work on the interior of the church had been done too, but from August, 1989 it was all hands on deck and a tremendous push was made by the congregation and many local families. The work on the new roof, costing £38,000, was started in July this year and completed in September, within a year of the architect's report. Everyone in the village is delighted and looking forward to the rededication, and hoping that the new roof lasts as long as the old one!

Danensian Choir have it taped

The Danensian Choir was founded in the early 1960s by the educationalist and broadcaster William Appleby. It specialises in the performance of English Cathedral Music and is based in Doncaster. With their Director of Music Vernon Hoyle and Organist Christopher M. Wren, the choir have recently recorded a cassette of English Cathedral Music, produced by Priory Records. Abroad thoughts from home

The Revd. Canon Colin Hickling, Vicar of Arksey and Honorary Lecturer in Biblical Studies at the University of Sheffield, was part of two important celebrations in the Autumn - one was Harvest Festival at All Saints' Arksey, and the other was a little further afield....

Sheffield Greetings

Sheffield might, perhaps, have been in Outer Mongolia for all that most people know in that mountainous and superbly beautiful area south of Belgrade which is the heart-land of Serbia. But not any more. On September 30th last, greetings from the Sheffield Diocese, as well as from Leicester and Lambeth Palace, were conveyed to a congregation totalling some two to three thousand Serbs in a remote mountain village called Gradac ('Grah-dats'). The occasion was remarkable. The tiny monastery at Gradac, a small cruciform church with a range of modest domestic buildings beside it, was founded in the thirteenth century by Helen of Anjou, the French princess who married King Urosha I of Serbia (Itself a surprising alliance across the breadth of most of Europe). By the middle of this century it had become a ruin. But in 1963 the Communist government began a restoration which is now nearing completion. These last stages owe everything to the persistence and fund-raising skills of Mother Maria, formerly of Wantage but now an orthodox. During the Liturgy and subsequent rites of reconsecration Mother Maria - a lady whose stature does not, it is true, permit a retiring role - was to be seen everywhere - up the hillside to ring the monastery bell during the epiklesis, on the veranda of the guest-house attending to some last-minute matter, and wherever else she might be needed.

Magnificent and Informal

The scene throughout the day was the usual Serbian Orthodox blend of the magnificent and the informal. Four Bishops, twenty priests and four deacons served the open-air liturgy (an Anglican presence was constituted by a visitor in choir dress modestly stationed in a comer of the podium); but there was the predictable scurrying to and fro of acolytes moving chairs or handing a thurible to a nun for refuelling. The British Ambassador's car stood splendidly beside the church for an hour or so while His Excellency chatted to Mother Maria and the Bishop behind it all, Bishop Stefan of Zica (once a student at the 'old' St. Augustine's, Canterbury); all around them the cheerful Serbian crowd moved happily about its business, or dealt with the aftermath of a lunch party laid on by the locals for a full 800 guests (a prospect that might daunt even the Mothers' Unions of South Yorkshire.)

Notable Occasion

It was no surprise, of course, that the Serbian flag was in evidence rather than the Yuglosav one, and that a dramatic presentation about Serbian history struck a strong nationalist note. The visitor, at least was aware that not so very far away, in the Serbian enclaves in Croatia, this pageant and these songs would have a less carefree ring. But the politics of the situation were not overpressed. The English visitor finally left the scene conscious that this had been a very notable occasion - the first of its kind (restoration of a monastery to be brought into immediate use) since the War. He left with regret and a determination to come back. A little wistfully, he reflected that even Harvest Festival at Arksey would lack a little something by contrast with the celebrations of just one week before.

'Don't forget the driver'

Well, this time we didn't forget him. Twenty-odd years ago, they did. My mind went back to a visit of Germans from our twin town of Solingen when I was Vicar of a parish in Blyth, Northumberland. Their youth orchestra came for Easter - all forty of them. We'd arranged accommodation for all the young musicians but only when they had all been distributed to their hosts did we realise we'd forgotten al about a bed for the bus driver. He ended up at our vicarage - and very happy we were to have him.

This time we also entertained young Jurgen Hampf, the driver of the coach which brought twenty-six representatives to Sheffield Diocese from our twin Church District of Hattingen-Witten. The other members of the party spread around to the homes of hosts as far distant from each other as Bradford and Rawcliffe. The bus was parked here in Rotherham as the mid-point. Jurgen got to know the main roads around the Diocese a good deal better, I dare say, than many of us know our own area as he went to and from Sheffield Cathedral to Doncaster and beyond, picking up his passengers for event after event.

ROTHERHAM RECEPTION

The first major get-together after their arrival was a buffet supper at St. Barnabas', Broom Valley. An excellent Rotherham reception was accorded them before they went on to All saints' Church to join in a welcome in worship.

The Eucharist was celebrated with bits in English and bits in German. The language mixture came to its pentecostal climax with the Lord's Prayer being said simultaneously in both languages. Some of the British people present spoke in German and a good many of the Germans in English.

Bishop David preached an outstanding sermon - in English.

We took them to York for the day on the Wednesday and visited the Mother Church of the Province. The Dean had laid on a German-speaking guide who conducted us around the Minster's treasurers with expertise and humour. The organisers were grateful to five parishes which entertained our guests on the Thursday. So as to present them with the variety of Church life we split the group into two. One half visited the two Sheffield parishes of Manor and St. Thomas', Crookes. The others went to the Church School at Deepcar and then on to the ecumenical centre at Bolsterstone and the country parish of Bradfield.

DONCASTER STUDY

Friday saw us deep in study.

The Roman Catholic 'Maridon' centre in Doncaster was our venue for four presentations on different kinds of ministry. The Revd. Hilary Jowett spoke about women's ministry. Bishop William talked of the ministry of a bishop, The Ven. Stephen Lowe told us what everyone ought to know about archdeacons and Mr. John Bouch led a discussion on lay ministry. Stephen had a lot to tell also about the progress of 'Faith in the City'. Pastor Klaus Sombrowsky (who shared the Peace with us at 'Daystar' in June) reckons that the Church of England is way ahead of the German Church in having produced such a report. We were more than ready at the end of all that for one of Mrs. Anne Persson's fabulous spreads at tea-time.

UNITY AND FRIENDSHIP

The Meissen agreement between the Church of England and the Protestant Church in Germany was discussed by a smaller group meeting at St. Stephen's, Eastwood. The agreement calls for a commitment to full, visible unity between us. We are hoping that our three years of friendship with clergy and laypeople from Hattingen-Witten may play an important part in bringing this unity nearer.

We are very grateful to the individual hosts and the host parishes for their kindness and generosity. I am sure they would agree that the visit was mutually rewarding.

We hope that a party of similar size to this year's German group will be able to go from Sheffield to the Ruhr District next June to join tens of thousands of German Christians at the their 'Kirchentag', the great Church Assembly.

COLERIDGE HOUSE CARER RESPITE UNIT

Many frail and disabled elderly people are being looked after at home by relatives or other informal carers. Coleridge House is a small (12 bedded) unit run by the Community Nursing Service, which offers respite to overstressed carers, by taking elderly dependants in for regular two-week stays.

The Unit provides a high standard of nursing and social care on an individual basis, maintaining the normal routines of dependant while encouraging them, where appropriate, to take a more active role. Carers can ring up or come in and have a chat at any time, and a support group provides a forum for carers to share their difficulties with others in the same situation, and with nurses who have direct experience of the people involved. The emphasis is on partnership in care, enabling, as far as possible, carers to continue caring at home and dependants to avoid long-term residential admission.

Demand for this service far outstrips the Unit's capacity, but during the three years that it has been open, over 390 families have benefitted. Some 115 are currently on the list. Of these, 62 dependants are women and 53 are men; amongst the carers are 47 wives, 32 husbands, 21 daughters, 9 sons and 6 other relatives.

Sister Maureen Ibbotson (whose daughter attended the Church School) has supplied this information about the work of "Coleridge House" which is situated in the grounds of the Northern General Hospital, but is quite independent from it.
