

ALL GOD'S CHILDREN

"All God's Children" was the title of a Report debated by the November General Synod, which emphasised the vital importance of outreach to children. The recent church Census revealed that well over three-quarters of the nation's children were not in direct touch with the Church. About one million young people are linked to the Church in some way, and a proportion of these are part of the 800,000 children who attend Church Schools.

Speakers in the Synod debate stressed the following points:-


- that the responsibility for helping children to become part of the Church lies with every member of the congregation;
- 2) the importance of Church Schools, in that they are usually in the best position to provide a base for Christian outreach in both rural and city areas;
- 3) the need not to think of the children as the "Church of tomorrow" for they are the Church of today and it is important to cater for them as much as for anybody else.

Obviously point 2) is of special interest to me, and indeed, I hope, to everybody at All Saints' as the Church School here belongs to you. It is important that we do everything possible to maintain our position here in Sheffield. Nationally 20% of primary children are educated in Church Schools - in Sheffield it is only 5.4%.

The third point recurred again later in the Synod when the members supported a motion proposing the drafting of Eucharistic Prayers which would be suitable for use at Communion Services with children present. Such prayers were to be shorter and couched in terms which were simple and vivid. However they were not to be childish, for children enjoy learning to be adult and participating in an adult world, and dislike being "talked down to". Making general worship more suitable for children also requires the reciprocal encouragement of children to conduct themselves in ways helpful to adults. "All-Age Worship" is indeed a giving and a growing situation for all ages.

I am sure a simpler Eucharistic Prayer would also be welcomed and valued by those "young in faith" who find even the A.S.B. quite wordy and obscure in parts. I suspect that part of the appeal of "school services" to adults is their clear and direct presentation of a facet of our Christian Faith, and also that

ALL CHANGE?

asks the Bishop of Doncaster

1991 has been a year of unbelievable changes; and there is little doubt that 1992 has its own candidates waiting in the wings. Candidates will be waiting in the wings in no uncertain fashion as aspiring new hands and old stagers mount the hustings for a General Election in the next few months. Whether or not we move in the direction of a single currency or a federalist future, the single market in the European Community brings its own hazards and opportunities. We are all longing to see a settled peace in the Middle East; to say nothing of tensions in other parts of the world.

I don't want to attempt an analysis of these changes or to attempt to say in which direction we should move. In a nearby parish to one in which I served there was an incumbent who, on the Sunday before a General Election, had a habit of telling his congregation how they should vote! As to Europe - I have recently attended a European information Day. I realised as a consequence that I am less than an authority on the subject; although it made me a more convinced European.

What I do want to say nevertheless is that it is important for christians to have and retain a christian perspective on events. One aspect of this must be a genuine belief in the possibilities of social improvement; because God has a redemptive purpose for the whole

of his creation. It is not so much a matter of slogans: more a deliberate concern for action in particular situations. There is racism in our society. There is a breakdown of family life. We cannot be satisfied if long-term unemployment is creating an underclass.

Another aspect is the recognition that there is such a thing as a christian perspective. For a good many people nothing can be taken as read. Nothing has the quality of 'givenness'; and the result is that if there is no givenness, no framework of reference, that life soon loses its meaning.


Christians surely do not, and surely do not theologically, leave everything to process. Through scripture and in scripture we find testimony to the fact that God has spoken and spoken supremely in Christ. We have just rejoiced in the wonder and miracle of the incarnation this past Christmas. God has acted definitively in Christ in history. That is the framework for our view of the world and for our perception of society.

It is because the Word became flesh that we are truly human: and the world has the potential for redemption. So in Christ we can both respond to change and stand firm in the face of change as God leads his people through every day of this coming year.

Joint Work Consultancy

The Scheme, which started in April 1990 on a voluntary and experimental basis in the three Deaneries of Adwick, Attercliffe and Laughton, will have been extended to the whole Diocese by April 1992. In the Scheme, all who hold the Bishop's Licence to officiate are offered a trained Consultant (commonly a lay person) to help them to review and appraise, on a confidential basis, their ministry in all its aspects and thereby to clarify goals and to achieve effective use of resources, notably time. To date some 55 Consultants have been recruited and trained and they offer a varied and impressive range of professional skills and experience, now placed at the disposal of the Church in a most vital area of need. The Scheme is a good example of the effectiveness of clergy - lay collaboration in supporting those who face the complex demands of parish and other forms of ministry. Joint Work Consultancy is not just a friendly chat; it seeks to establish a framework for serious review of goals and performance and to do that in a way that affirms the person in his or her ministry. A continuing evaluation of the process and its outcomes will ensure further development as experience grows. REFLECTIONS ON GENERAL SYNOD

The Revd. Richard Atkinson was recently elected by the clergy of the Diocese to serve on the General Synod. He went to his first meeting during November last year and reports what he heard and saw.

"As a very new member of Synod, the November sessions were a time of initial reactions and reflections. These included surprise at the amount of time given over to legislative and financial business (at times very inward looking); the discovery that relatively few people are able to speak in any debate, and that a few speak often; amusement and occasional bewilderment at the procedural tactics some Synod members appear to see this as their mission in life; and pleasure in discovering that a few more people I know were members than I thought was the case.

All God's children

Overall it was not the most stimulating of synods, but it started well with a debate on the report "All God's Children". Subtitled "Children's Evangelism in Crisis", it is a call to the whole church to take seriously the task of reaching out to the young. Whereas before the war two thirds of children had contact with a Sunday School, today only 14% of children under 15 are in a church related activity on any Sunday. The report calls on the Church to counteract those influences in society which are gaining a hold of the minds of the young, by providing exciting and fun-filled activity.

The report challenges the dominant trend in recent years for the Church to concentrate its work on families with children. Whereas this was itself a reaction to the apparent failure of the Sunday School system (vast numbers of children never made it into adult church life), it can now be seen to compound the failure by further reducing the church's contact with the country's children. To engage with the missing 85% of children, activities that reach out - whether clubs, uniformed groups, school activities or whatever - need to be made a priority.

Synod overwhelmingly received and welcomed the report, and called upon the whole church (and church schools) to co-operate in the task.

However, whilst I was left feeling grateful for the analysis of the situation, and the challenge to do something about it, I was also left wondering how it was to be implemented.

Children's Prayer

The focus on the young continued with the passing

of a motion from the Coventry Diocesan Synod which asked for a Eucharistic Prayer (amended in debate to "Prayers"), for use at services with children present. In this debate the need for language that was accessible and pictorial was stressed.

Seeds of Hope

In view of the rocky reception at previous Synods of items to do with racism, it was pleasing to see Synod positively welcome a report called "Seeds of Hope", presented by the Committee for Black Anglican Concerns. The report - a survey of practice in different dioceses in combatting racism reveals a range of action from the few dioceses that have paid officers, to those who are doing nothing. It is a gentle report - maybe too gentle - but it is another step towards getting the Church of England to own its past failure to welcome black members and to face up to its need to properly listen and reach out to black people in our society. The Archdeacon of Sheffield called for Diocesan Staff to receive racism awareness training and for the church as a whole to implement an equal opportunities policy.

Sheffield Input

The major Sheffield input was from the Provost who introduced a debate on the report "From Power to Partnership: Britain in the Commonwealth and the Church of England in the Anglican Communion". It was a disappointing debate in which neither of the two different elements were examined in any real depth. Whilst in both the Commonwealth and in the Anglican Communion, there is a need for Britain and the Church of England, respectively, to work towards partnership, it was not easy to hold the two parts of the report together.

U.N. Observer

It was a discovery to find out that the Anglican Communion has an observer at the United Nations, in the shape of the Right Reverend Sir Paul Reeves. His was an unexciting address, albeit on an important topic. Reviewing the present changed world order, he examined the hopes for a new role for the U.N.

Archbishop's Priorities

In his Presidential Address, the Archbishop of Canterbury commended three priorities for the church: 1. building confidence in the message and work of the church. 2. responding to the challenge of evangelism. 3. deepening our internal unity. He then mentioned three factors essential to our success in achieving these priorities which included the discovery of new resources flowing from our confidence in the Gospel, improved communications and deep spiritual roots.

Other Business

Private members motions allowed Synod to applaud Mr. Major's moves to cut third world debt, and called for further debt release. Unfortunately another motion on housing and homelessness was adjourned until the next sessions.

Tour to Israel and Egypt

In 1988 a group of twenty four people from churches around Thorne, near Doncaster went on a tour to Israel. Some of them are now planning a return visit to Israel for October of this year, 1992. The tour will be from Saturday, 24th October to Sunday, 1st November, staying in Jerusalem, Tiberias and Tel Aviv and visiting many biblical sites. There is also an optional extension to Egypt until Friday, 6th November to see the pyramids. Where did the rose go?

On the Bishop's Chair in St. Hilda's Church, Shiregreen, Sheffield, tucked into the crook of the crozier on the coat of arms is a rose. The Vicar, Fr. Roger Bellamy wonders if there are any other examples in the Diocese of the coat of arms with the rose included, or is it peculiar to St. Hilda's. When, he wonders, did the rose cease to be part of the arms?

Legislative Business

Legislative business included the revision stage of the Draft Incumbents Vacation of Benefices (Amendment) Measure, which attempts to make the 1977 Act more pastoral. The only amendment not accepted, after comment from David McLean, was the suggestion that in cases of breakdown between incumbent and people, there should be a ballot of electoral roll members.

And Finally....

A new stage of liturgical revision was embarked upon, and in part this will be a look at how to bring together the variety of services and texts which are presently in circulation. Will there be just one book or many? In the Synod debate there was a stress on the need for core texts and poetic language that would get into people's hearts and minds."

BIBLE READING NOTES

Bible Reading Notes are very useful all the time but inevitably every now and again something strikes one as special. A recent commentary on the first chapter of Revelation grasped the reference to lampstands. Verse 20 tells us that:- "The seven lampstands are the seven churches".

But we are lampstands too! A lampstand is there to carry a light. It doesn't matter how grotty the lampstand is; it doesn't matter whether the room it is in is tidy or clean or not; it doesn't matter just exactly where it is placed, it can still fulfil its function as a carrier of light. In short, whatever the condition of the lampstand it is its function which is important and it is its function which justifies its presence.

The light that we carry is the light of Christ. To be operational all maps are connected to the mains and to a common grid - to a common source of power. So it is with us. The source of power which allows us to be a light to the world is the power of God within us. It is the light of Christ which shines. It is our privilege to be a lampstand so that that light can shine wherever there is darkness and need.

But if a lamp is shining it gets warm. So too with us. If God's light does shine out through us we too shall be warmed. It is thrilling to know that, whatever our imperfections may be, whatever our sin, whatever our state of health, wherever we are God's light can shine through us. As we let it shine so are we warmed and comforted - just simply by the knowledge that we are

doing God's will.

The gospel reading on Advent Sunday (Matthew 25: 31-end) is my favourite reading; read it for yourselves again, it is applicable to what follows. It also coincided with Pauline Perkinton's appeal for Norman House, and with the Meadow Well Estate, North Shields riot, being the subject of a BBC2 programme. Pauline we know, did not visit a prison ("when in prison you visited me"), but visit she did, resulting in her appeal for help to show, and share, care and compassion for these unfortunates by providing practical aid that would boost their morale, to show "out there someone cares", "we really count". The Meadow Wellriot illustrates vividly what lack of compassion, to a certain extent what lack of funding, with high unemployment (with its attendant deprivation, misery, forlorn hope and depair) can produce. A local T.V. station did give a cash grant, the woman chairman took some of the teenagers swimming, most likely to one of those luxury leisure centres they had only seen from out side.

Money was also spent on a 5-a-side football strips (canny folk these Tynesiders) - you get two teams for 10 strips but only one team for 11 strips. The local paper was to take photographs, very exciting - "our photos will be in the paper", they said; they too thought they really counted. The chairman, with a touch of affection, commented "they were so proud", but yet again it was disappointment, another blow to what little selfesteem they possessed, for after standing around all day in their strip - NO ONE CAME.





The Bishop of Sheffield writes

SUNDAY IS SPECIAL:

- 1. Sunday is special for Christians. On that First Day of a new age, the Lord Jesus Christ defeated death and met again with His disciples. Ever since Christians have made Sunday, the first day of the week, a special day by making sure, that, come what may, "The Lord's people are in the Lord's House, at the Lord's Service, on the Lord's Day".
- 2. Things we don't do on a Sunday: Kill, Steal, Lie, commit Adultery, etc., etc. That is whatever is wrong on Monday and Saturday is wrong on Sunday. Sunday doesn't have its own special list of Don'ts! (But see below).
- 3. We need a day of rest a day that is different. This is in the Maker's instructions for human beings and most of us know from experience that if we keep the engine running continuously troubles soon start. That Rest Day in Europe since about 400 A.D. has been Sunday. This remains so, I understand, throughout the European Community. I can't see why we should want to be odd man out. And, if there is to be a Rest Day, the State (which is you, me, and our neighbours acting together) must regulate it. Otherwise we lose it to the "get-rich-quick" boys. We value leisure, peace and quiet, too highly to let them be destroyed by so-called "market forces" (i.e. the right of a few to make money out of us). And the most vulnerable people in our community need the State (i.e. us) to protect them against exploitation. We have laws to protect our Rest Day at present. Our Government's readiness to allow them to be ignored is scandalous and dangerous: if 'Big Business' can rewrite the laws to suit themselves which of us is safe? But, no doubt, we need new and better laws and we need them now.
- 4. Should then Christians fight to stop people shopping at all on Sunday? Buying a Garden Gnome strikes me as about as innocent a Sunday leisure activity as I can imagine! Many Christians (including myself) won't think shopping an appropriate Sunday activity and some will believe it to be downright wrong. But that doesn't mean we have to man the barricades to stop the rest of the world wasting its money!

ON READING THE HONOURS LIST

There is the MBE, OBE, CBE, KBE and DBE, awarded mainly to those in the more mundane jobs: the policeman, fireman, postman, nurse, midwife, the voluntary worker for charities; for the rarer positions: for service to the pig industry in Scotland, for service to the shell-fishing industry and, in contrast to research workers in medicine and industry, university heads, or for political services (that is, to the party in government).

One of the highest awards - a knighthood - was to Dr. Magdi Yacoub, the eminent professor and heart-transplant surgeon. Some of these highest awards, however, are devalued when given to the highest echelon of civil servants - it comes with the job; "with the tea-trolley" is a frequent comment. In all, a microcosm of society.

But what about this? A BEM, the keykeeper Holm of Papa and Knap of Homar, Orkney, Scottish Office. There are not many of them, but in inverse proportion to those given to the church, a definite division of the spiritual and temporal, for out of the hundreds of curates, priests, rural deans, archdeacons, canons and bishops, the church is recognised by only four awards: OBE to a retired minister for services to the Methodist Church, MBEs to a retired head verger of a cathedral and a retired chaplain to the House of Keys (Manx Parliament), and for the Church a BEM to a chauffeur of a bishop. No doubt the argument will go "the aforementioned curates, priests, etc. are expected to be good and to do good, it's part of their job" (vocation actually) "they are only doing their job", but that applies also to all the others (just doing their jobs).

We all know of those deserving an award as recognition of their selfless service to others and the public - we don't need a medal to tell us. We and those very few who just, just might harbour a thought of an honour can take solace in the saying "Virtue is its own reward".



MAKING THE MOST OF LENT

Dear Friends,

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday (March 4th). It has traditionally been a time for reviewing our intake of sweets or chocolates, and our consumption of cigarettes. These have all been directed towards bodily activities. However, as the psychologists rightly remind us, we are made up of mind and spirit as well as bodily flesh. So, in Lent, we need to give equal attention to each part of our make-up. Can I offer you a few suggestions . . .

Our Minds:

Stimulation can come from reading a Christian book or some new part of the Bible with the help of notes. This can be done individually or perhaps sharing with a member of our Church. We can also join one of the ecumenical Lent Groups to study "Living the Good News" (details in Church).

Our Spirit:

During Lent, try to spend a bit more time each day in prayer - it might mean getting up a little earlier. Perhaps you could use Lent to compile a Prayer Note Book, including all members of your family, together with Church members, organisations, neighbours, topics from the news, etc. spread these names out over a week. We invite you to come more regularly to Church; at Holy Communion, perhaps you could pray for individuals as they go up to the altar. Some of you might like to write your own meditation for Lent, based perhaps on a favourite Bible text.

Our Body:

Shake off the winter lethargy by getting out (if you are able) to call on those unable to get out - we will gladly give you some names. Perhaps you can give some help to those who work with children, Young Saints, or the elderly (Green Oak Day Centre).

I hope these suggestions are helpful. Finally, why not join us at our Parish Quiet Day on Saturday, March 7th - details and Booking Forms in the Church. I hope you each have a meaningful Lent.

Now don't say "this is 1992", for its message is still clear and applicable to today. Just look around the tragedies of nations and individuals that could have been averted had Christian ethics prevailed. Mind you, there would be occasions when the Christian ethic was not to our liking - that is when the waverers and doubters opt out.

End quote: "Love thy neighbour as thyself - that's what politics should be about" - David Jenkins, Bishop of Durham.



OBEDIENCE TO THE LIVING GOD

The Bishop of Doncaster writes:-

I have never been a great one for fasting. It has been a traditional practice of course; not only during Lent but also prior to receiving communion. It was revived in the nineteenth century, as far as the Church of England was concerned, by the Oxford Movement. It also happens to be in vogue in some quarters among those in the contemporary renewal movement.

It has respectable precedents - indeed the most respectable of all. Our Lord's own fasting was a Spirit-given preparation for his public ministry and his sacrificial death. Neither I nor anyone else who claims to follow Jesus has any excuse for not looking at the possibility seriously.

We must be careful however that any practice of self-denial is true to its essential purpose. Fasting has some claim to being a means of strengthening the spiritual life by weakening a desire for the sensible pleasures of the world; but it is not to be either a piece of escapism or an exercise in merit. I think I am right in saying that its chief aim is to bring the life of the christian or the christian community into obedience to the will and purpose of God.

Now obedience is not a fashionable word, to put it mildly. Understandably the whole tenor of our society is for personal fulfilment and community development: for freedom to be ourselves and to find out for ourselves. We don't like being at the beck and call of small-minded or limited personalities; and christians of all people don't want to be in thrall to a caricature of God made in the image of a local pope.

Yet there is no avoiding the fact that obedience is a theme which has a large place in the Scriptures and in the life and tradition of the Church. It can't be explained away as the cultural conditioning of the past or a product of a patriarchal outlook. It is an emphasis which has at its heart obedience to the living God.

Perhaps I ought to exercise this discipline of fasting from time to time; perhaps this Lent I ought to encourage you to do the same; but rather more importantly we need a modest refresher course in the school of obedience and the servant ministry of Jesus. It is not so much a question of obeying Bishops (looking at the Church of England, that will be the day!) or of following my less than convincing example. It means rather turning our eyes to look at the one who lived in lonely solitude for forty days, facing temptation and triumphing over it; in order that he might live a life of obedience to his Father's will.

And the joy is that in our obedience to a gracious God we find the freedom and fulfilment that always otherwise eludes us.

Tails of the Unexpected

David English, writing in St. Mark's, Mosborough Newsletter recounts a cautionary tale for teachers from thirty years ago. It had been a difficult morning, thirtyfive boys and girls of ten can be very exacting - so on the stroke of 12 noon I was looking forward to a relaxing lunch time and a re-charging of batteries for the afternoon session.

It was then that I felt a tug on my jacket sleeve and young Jamie said "Can I bring it then this afternoon, sir?" "Of course, you can", I said, not really understanding what 'it' would be. I enjoyed my dinner, and, as always, in good time wandered down the garden path to the school yard to be greeted by a group of excited school children shouting "He's brought it, sir" and by golly he had - a young piglet jumped out of the sack and disappeared into school, the children in hot pursuit. After it was captured, the class, teacher and piglet were in place for the customary calling of the register. What was to be done with the pig? That was easily accomplished with a few desks strategically placed, and lessons proceeded to the occasional gruntings of an amazingly well-behaved pig. Whatever the children learned that afternoon, no one learned more than the teacher - namely, make sure you hear the question properly BEFORE you say 'yes'.

Mission by Water

"I trust", he says "that the Bishop sailing from Goole on 30th May will have a safe voyage - unlike that of an old friend of mine (the Revd. John Foster, Curate of St. Peter's, Abbeydale in my young days in Sheffield) who told of being stranded on a sandbank at Goole on starting out on a cruise."

Last Lap for Bishop's Appeal

John Gladwin, the Provost of Sheffield has been asked by Bishop David to co-ordinate the last lap of the Bishops' £Million Appeal. In a recent letter to the parishes, the Provost says that it has been agreed to bring the Appeal to a formal conclusion at Pentecost, Sunday, 7th June, with a major Diocesan celebration in the Cathedral at 6.30 p.m. It is hoped that every parish in the Diocese will be represented, and that the £1 million target will have been reached.

"We are all greatly encouraged" writes the Provost, "by the huge efforts which have been made across the Diocese. There is much to be thankful for in every way. Many parishes and individuals have stretched themselves a long way in support of the Appeal. £800,000 (4/5th of the target) can be assured by June, and it has come almost exclusively from giving by the members of the church in the Diocese of Sheffield".

Launching the last lap of the Appeal, the Provost hopes that the £1 million target will be reached. That will mean that having met our obligation to The Church Urban Fund of £300,000 (we have already received from the Fund over £400,000 of grants), there will be over £200,000 to spend on work throughout the Diocese.

In getting ready for the 1992 drive, and the last lap of the appeal, the support of every parish in the Diocese will be needed, and reaching the target would give the whole Church in the Diocese a great boost.

Not long to go to Pentecost, 7th June.

PASTORAL WORKERS' AND READERS' COURSE

As some are aware, last year I began the first module of this two/three year course. Having now completed this, I would like to share the main areas of discussion and study with you.

The title is called 'Church and the Community', and initially we were involved in identifying our perception of a community.

We all live in many different communities i.e. home, work, street, parish, town, city etc. How we witness our faith, both as individuals, and as a corporate Church within these communities, are areas all Christians need to constantly analyse.

I was involved in a Parish visit to St.John the Baptist Church, Wales, Nr.Rotherham. As some others in the group were involved in the visit here, many questions were raised that evening, some of which I list below.

- 1. What degree of lay participation is there?
- 2. Is there any shared worship with any other denominations?
- 3. What are the policies of serving newcomers and children?
- 4. What is the outreach policy?
- 5. Does the Church involve itself in the local community?
- Does the Parish Magazine relate to the local community?
- 7. Does the Church serve the community?

Finally, I include copies of two studies I have found helpful.

1. The Edge of Glory

In the Celtic way of prayer, the divine glory was intertwined with the ordinariness of everyday life. They believed that Christ comes to us in many guises and we should be ever open to his call.

This prayer, taken from David Adams' book "The Edge of Glory", challenges us to see Our Lord in all things.

You are the caller You are the poor You are the stranger at my door.

You are the wanderer The unfed You are the homeless With no bed. You are the man
Driven insane
You are the child
Crying in pain
You are the other who comes to me
If I open to another you're born in me.

2. Read: Luke 10 v 25-37

"We need the kind of church which serves people where they are. It is the style of life of the church community which will decide for many people whether they join or not.

Every local church likes to believe that it has a welcome for everyone. But many onlookers have concluded from what they have seen that there is a welcome only provided they fit in our ways". ("Bias to the Poor" - David Sheppard).

- 1. Read the two passages above.
- 2. Do you agree/disagree with David Sheppard?
- 3. What kind of image do you think the local community has of our church?





FROM THE VICAR

TOWARDS A MORE CARING COUNTRY AND WORLD

Dear Friends,

By the time you receive this magazine, Election fever will be in overdrive. You may be feeling heartily sick of the whole media coverage and wish it were all over! Despite this "hype", could I urge you to do two things ...

Firstly, please don't be overcome by apathy and fail to vote, for it is a Christian's duty (and privilege) to vote. Please spend some time in prayer before casting your vote.

Secondly, try to get involved in the political discussion meetings prior to Election Day. As a Christian, be prepared to challenge the local candidates about the issues you feel are important. My twin concerns focus on Education and the Health Service for pastoral reasons. Our Church School is now growing in numbers, and yet, owing to budgetry restrictions, we are unable to afford to appoint the additional teacher for the autumn. Our staff will, as always, do their best, but our children would benefit more from smaller classes and more teachers. This is a common problem for many schools, so let's challenge our prospective M.P. about this issue. I am equally frustrated about the state of our Health Service. Alison. aged 18, (whom I visit weekly) desparately needs lung transplant surgery. She was moved from Sheffield to the Freeman Hospital, Newcastle, where she settled well with good support from the Chaplain. After various tests, visits to the theatre, and being high on their list for surgery, she was suddenly whisked back to Sheffield because "they want her bed". Imagine the distress and frustration this has caused Alison and her family. On the other hand, excellent treatment, care, and support, have been given to other families, so all is not bad. However, there is room for improvement in the Health Service, so why not challenge our prospective M.P. about this issue.

If we don't get involved, and use our vote, we can't really complain if our country and our world becomes less caring about the things that concern our family and other families.

IRENE had lived on The Grove for 55 years and was well known at the Green Oak Day Centre, as well as locally where she worked at the newsagents on Dore Station for many years. She was a trained hairdresser, running her own business at Heeley. She died peacefully at home.

BETTY Cantwell was Pauline Perkinton's Aunty, and had been a widow for 20 years. She was a true Yorkshire "character", often outspoken, but greatly loved by her many friends at the three clubs she attended. She had worked hard all her life, but retained her faculties to the end.

JOHN came to Totley, on retirement, from Birmingham and Doncaster where he had been a commercial traveller. He served with distinction in the "Desert Rats", and loved all kinds of sport. He and his wife were very close and it was a devastating blow to him when she died last year. She had nursed him through recent illness, from which sadly he never fully recovered. He was the "perfect gentleman" and a superb neighbour who will be greatly missed.

DOROTHY had the unique distinction of being the first house-keeper to the first Vicar of Totley and lived at 37 Sunnyvale Road until Mr. Hutton's death. She then moved with Mrs.Hutton back to Derbyshire (she was born at Ridgeway) and married Robert at Mosborough Church. They came to live in Vernon Road after marriage, and Dorothy was a regular member at All Saints. Failing health confined her to home in recent months where she has been visited by Church members. Clergy and Readers have taken Communion to her, but she always missed coming up to our Church. She suffered a severe stroke from which she never recovered.

THE FIRST LETTER OF ST. PAUL TO TOTLEY

During this winter's meetings the members of the Men's Fellowship have each presented their version of a letter which St. Paul may have written to Totley. At their last meeting they agreed to share them with All Saints' News, and the first is by Maurice Snowdon.

Chapter 1

From Paul to my brothers and sisters in Totley: Greetings and may the peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

I rejoice to be able to write you this letter for I learn that you have a new shepherd amongst you and this could be a very great period in your lives. It is not always good when someone new comes amongst you but I am sure that in this case you will make the most of the opportunity which is now yours.

It is always right to look over the past situation and to give thanks to God for the many blessings received. Truly we have all got much to be thankful for, and a thankful heart is very becoming to one who follows our Lord Jesus.

It is also right that we should remember that our present blessings are because of God's providence to us and that, without Him, we would sink to the lowest depths of depravity. Of our own strength we could have achieved very little and it is only by the grace of God that we are capable of recognising His work in us.

We can learn from mistakes which we have made in the past but it is an error to think that we can go back and correct those mistakes. We have to learn from such experiences and look forward to the future with renewed strength, confidence and insight. Then we can, with God's grace, make the most of the opportunity which now opens out before us.

So you are at a turning point and looking to the future. It is good to remind you that you and your future are in God's hands. It is only with His help that you can move forward to complete the course which He has set before you. Naturally you want to know what that course will be, but you must remember that God will reveal it to you only when it is necessary for you to know it.

What is required of you, and this is where your new shepherd can help you, is to be open to whatever the future holds. This may be hard, as it has been hard for me, but the prize is great.

The most necessary thing for now is that you take care to have the right attitude in all your dealings with other people. It is more than likely that God's will for you will be revealed through the words or actions of other people and you must be ready to discern them.

This needs humility and I have written before (see Col.3.12 and Phil. 2.5-8) to other brothers about this. You would do well to read again all of those other letters for many of them would be helpful to you now.

Others are Archbishop Trevor Huddleston, CR, fierce opponent of evil apartheid; Archbishop Desmond Tutu, no less a fighter for freedom; Bishop Jim Thompson, Bath and Wells, for sustaining the traditions of great Stepney bishops; and my favourite, poet John Betjeman, churchman and lover of church liturgy an architecture. You, too, must have collected, over the years these imaginary pin-ups. It is comforting and inspiring to recall them occasionally and, what is more, your walls will never be the same!

NOW IS THE TIME FOR ALL GOOD MEN TO COME TO THE AID OF THE PARTY

The Bishop of Sheffield Writes:

Well no it isn't. It's not "the Party" that needs our aid but our very good friend Democracy herself. Common sense has never really given her much chance. One of Shakespeare's pert kids makes the point well:

Son: "And must they all be hanged that swear and

lie?"

Lady Macduff: "Every one."

Son: "Who must hang them?"

Lady Macduff: "Why the honest men."

Son: "Then the liars and swearers are fools for there

are enough liars and swearers to beat the

honest men and hang them up."

The Experts in Political Theory aren't that keen either. Plato, the first and most influential of them (writing way back in 400 B.C.), though he saw Democracy as "an agreeable form of anarchy" in which "anyone is allowed to do what he likes", was certain that inevitably, and fairly speedily it ended in despotism.

The Church too has been a distinctly luke warm supporter. The Bible knows nothing about Democracy and tells us to obey the Emperor. "The Divine Right of Kings" has been an article of faith of many otherwise apparently intelligent Christians. And within the Christian world right-wing despotisms, however awful, have never lacked steady Church support.

But you and I, who have the extreme good fortune of living in a Democracy know, if I may coin a phrase, that Democracy is King. Despite all its faults, it gives us a lot of freedom and only a little anarchy, with much liberty and only occasionally tyranny. We can all have some say in our nation's affairs and even with our oddish electoral system, cumulatively every vote counts. But Democracy can be no healthier than her citizens. She needs morality and goodness in the people if she is to flourish.

In fact "the Party" (and the politicians) far from needing our help can be the enemy. In their zeal for victory at the polls they can debauch the electorate by appealing to self-interest instead of the common good. Cynicism is the killer of Democracy. Once the politicians believe the electors can be bought, an election becomes an auction. Contempt for governments chosen in such a way opens the door to the "honest dictator" and Democracy is dead.

The remedy is in our own hands. We must make it clear that we are not 'for sale'. Be certain to cast your vote in accordance with your conscience and for the well-being of all. Honest caring electors are the saviours of Democracy. Vote well!

Synod report from Roy Arnold: Diocesan Communications Officer. Recording Diocesan Synod Meeting on March 7th 1992.

Financial challenge faces Church...

With the current economic recession badly hitting the work of the Church Commissioners the Dioceses and parishes of the Church of England are starting to feel the pinch. The Church Commissioners - who handle the central finances of the Church of England- are this year going to lop £4 million off the amount they allocate nationwide to the Dioceses for the payment and housing of the clergy, and more stringent cuts are promised for the next few years.

The implications of this were spelt out at the Synod for Church of England folk in the Diocese of Sheffield by the Bishop of Sheffield, the Rt. Revd. David Lunn who, in common with the other Diocesan Bishops serves as a Church Commissioner. He explained that the income of the Church Commissioners had been badly hit by the recession in that much of the money they handled had been invested in farmlands and latterly in property. Both these areas of investment had been badly hit. Added to this subsequent drop in income was the problem which the Church Commissioners had in having to find so much money to pay the pensions of retired clergy.

The actual funds of the Church Commissioners were not likely to get any less, said the Bishop, but nor were they likely to increase. The result was that clergy might not be getting any substantial pay rises for the next few years. And it was likely that fees for special church services such as weddings would be on the increase, so as to meet some of the financial shortfall. The Bishop said he felt there was little value in reducing the number of clergy "I'm convinced that we need fulltime stipendiary people to really do the job" he said. He did not favour any "recipes for withdrawal and defeat". Nor did he favour the other option of ordaining less men and women to the Ministry. It would be "a terrible disaster" not to bring new life and fresh ideas into the Ministry and general work of the Church. "In the end we need to commit ourselves to maintaining a fulltime stipendiary workforce as at present" said the Bishop who said that perhaps one idea would be to reduce some of the centralisation of funding so as to make parishes realise the cost and value to them of their clergy.

Earlier Synod members had elected the Revd. Stuart Matthews (Sprotborough) to fill a vacancy on the Bishop's Council for the Archdeaconry of Doncaster.

They also agreed to set up a Diocesan Advisory Committee to look after the matters related to the repair, maintenance, refurbishment and renewal of church buildings.

There was time for a brief look at Synodical Government - 20 years old this year - and after an enlightening impressionistic presentation about the work of the general Synod by the Revd Richard Atkinson. Synod divided into groups to discuss the work of the General Synod. Their written findings will be revealed at a future date.

A motion from Doncaster Deanery about the work of Diocesan Officers - asking for reports about what officers were doing and what they planned to do provided perhaps the liveliest debates of the Synod but in the end Synod members agreed that the question be not put.

THE 1992 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

We were delighted by the good attendance for David's first Annual Meeting, and we were encouraged by the quality of debate and discussion.

At the Vestry Meeting (prior to the A.G.M.,) Elsie Mayson and Angela Waite were unanimously elected Churchwardens. Retiring Warden Cliff Job was thanked for his years of loyal service and hard work. The Vicar presented him with a NIV Bible on behalf of the congregation.

At the A.G.M., after receiving apologies and approving the Minutes, Cliff gave a report on the Aims and Objectives Survey carried out after last year's A.G.M. Copies of the results were distributed. Robin Carter and Chris Booth, who had been nominated as Deputy Wardens, were (after a spot of procedural dispute) duly elected to the P.C.C. Some of the remaining vacancies on the P.C.C. were filled by Terry Dixon, Peter Purkiss, Maurice Snowdon and Alan Walker - each having been duly proposed and seconded. We welcome all these to their new responsibilities, and thank all retiring members.

The splendid A.G.M. booklet had previously been available (thanks to Ann Ruthven for production and our Guides for stapling). This contained brief reports from all our Organisations together with the audited Annual Accounts. After valuable discussion, these reports were accepted with grateful thanks for all the work involved.

The "Future Pattern of Services" was then discussed, following the 5-month evaluation period. The Vicar in his report, had stressed that "no Church can function as a loving Christian family unless every member gives due honour and regard to others". He also quoted Bishop David's recent comment to his Clergy - "no congregation can ever hope to satisfy every individual members' wishes regarding hymns, tunes, Services or Sermons". It was clear that most people present felt happy with the present pattern, but there did appear to be less provision for those not Confirmed, especially friends whom we would like to bring to All Saints. After wide-ranging discussion, it was proposed, seconded and carried, that we introduce Morning Prayer at the 10am Service on the First Sunday of every month, starting after Easter. On the First Sunday, Evensong will be replaced by Holy Communion. The new monthly pattern will be as follows:





"You are more than Alive; You are LORD."

Dear Friends,

The Easter message rings out loud and clear for those who have faith - "Jesus is Alive, He has Risen". Yet what does it mean for those who are unable to find work? What does it mean for those who care for the sick or the aged? What does it mean for those recently bereaved? What does it mean for the mentally ill and all who cannot cope with the pressures of the modern world?

I came across this helpful meditation the other day which I think helps to answer those questions and others that people ask from time to time . . .

You are not only risen and alive, you are Lord. You reign over this whole universe. You stand over and above all that is best in life: You stand above all that is worst as the ultimate victor; You stand above all powers and authorities as judge; You stand above all failure and weakness as forgiveness and love. For you died and your life is now hidden with Christ in God. When Christ, who is our life, appears, then you also will appear with Him in glory." (Collossians 3: 1-4).

"GEOFF" Dixon was born at Hillsborough and brought up very strictly. However, this didn't hamper him from becoming a friend to many, chiefly through his work as a Fireman (for 12 years) and then latterly as a local collector for various firms. As Brigade Chaplain, I was particularly honoured to take his Service which was attended by some of his Fire Service colleagues.

ALISON had tremendous courage, coupled with a firm Christian Faith, which both strengthened her and those of us who visited her in hospital these past three months. I know that I have been humbled through my friendship with her. Rev Michael Woodhead (a family friend for many years) has written this tribute . . .

A Picture of Alison

Today is very much a day for memories; each of you here this afternoon will have your own memories of Alison. Memories are precious; do treasure that special picture of her that you have; maybe a Sunday morning here in church or at Young Saints in the Hall, or perhaps helping at the garden party ... a picture of Alison that will always be with you.

I want to share with you now another picture of Alison, one that will always stay with me. Several weeks ago I went with a friend, David Ward, to pray with Alison. While we were praying David had a picture of Alison beside a stream; the sun was shining and it was very much a picture of peace and contentment. I believe that is what Alison is doing now, and she is not alone - the Lord himself is with her by that stream.

Some of you may well be asking this afternoon Why? Why did this have to happen? A young woman with her life before her? Why couldn't she have a transplant? Why wasn't she given a chance? Why? I have to say to you that I don't know why. I, like many of you have been shouting at God and asking him those same questions. I don't know why. But what I do know is that Alison will have no more suffering; no more gasping for her next breath, no more pain. She is with Jesus by that stream, in the sunshine, happy, at peace and waiting. Waiting for the day when Jesus shall return to this earth and

she will be re-united with all those she loves. What a day that will be!

We who remain behind have our grief and sadness and pain, and it's hard. But we have God's promise that for all who trust in Jesus death is not the end but the beginning; the beginning of a new life, a life free from pain and suffering, a life that is eternal. If there is no life after this then the Christian faith is meaningless and I have nothing to say to you this afternoon. But thanks be to God that we do have his promise, we shall live again. We will grieve for Alison, we will weep with Les and Dorothy and Ann Margaret, but don't let your head drop or your faith falter, she wouldn't want that be assured, we shall see Alison again by that stream and dangle our feet with her in the water.

I am unable to find words to express my appreciation for all the thoughts and prayers offered up to Our Heavenly Father for our family, except to say
"So many, many hearts have need of prayer",
so let us continue to pray for one another.

The Bishop of Doncaster writes:

'The powers that be are ordained of God'. We may be less familiar these days with that majestic quotation from the Authorised Version; but even in more mundane translations of the Bible, Paul's claim in the thirteenth chapter of his letter to the Romans sounds pretty incredible.

I rather wish as a consequence that it gave me an episcopal hotline so that I know in advance the result of the election. That however has been denied me; and at the time of writing this letter I have no idea if the Majors are still gracing 10 Downing Street, or whether the Kinnocks have taken up residence.

Going further afield it is a very difficult assumption to make. Reflecting on brutal dictatorships, incompetent and corrupt administrations, self-serving political or commercial interests: is one really saying that these are ordained of God? Haven't human beings the right and duty to do their best to redeem the evil and create hope?

Well of course they have and none more so than Christians; whose faith requires a recognition of the fact that their own ultimate answerability is to God. Even so Paul's comments provide us with two important biblical principles. The first is that if the powers that be are ordained of God they are also answerable to him. It is part of the Christian's duty to remind not only the state but all those in any position of authority of this solemn requirement. Micah's message to Israel is a universal message 'What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God'.


The second principle is that we need to have more confidence in recognising the hand of God in every society's activities; and not least, after an election, in our own. Christians are believers in a proper ordering of our nation's affairs; and thank God we are in the business of social renewal and reformation too.


An exciting time lies ahead for the Diocese at the end of this month; as the Bishop makes the journey from Goole to Sheffield "Mission Afloat". We hope to see people congregating at the appropriate places on the canal bank. Make sure you bring your interested friends; for in this Decade of Evangelism this is so much more than an in-house journey. It is a Bishop fulfilling a part of his ministry which has been a priority since the earliest times: to be a missionary Bishop sharing the faith. As our Bishop shares the faith with those who listen it will encourage all of us to do the same.

Also available this month to be used widely is a single issue Diocesan Newspaper. 'ALIVE' is its title; for Christ is alive and that is what we are in him. Don't leave your parish copies at the back of the Church. Take them home and give them to your friends and neighbours.

The photographs, all by Sam Tanner, concentrate on people and their relations with each other, in areas where there are projects supported by the Church Urban Fund. The Church Urban Fund works with those suffering from poverty. Building on the work of the Church, the Fund supports practical projects in urban priority areas, helping local people to meet their spiritual, social and economic needs.

Of "Faith in the City?", Sam Tanner says: "The photographs attempt to make visible the immense problems people face in run-down, neglected urban areas - lack of jobs and decent housing, and a lack of care and hope. They also try to show how the Church Urban Fund has helped provide small-scale, local solutions."

It's a powerful photographic exhibition, well worth a visit.

By Hook or by Crook





THE ANGLICAN STEWARDSHIP ASSOCIATION - A NEW APPROACH

The Church's Task: The main task of our church is to win people to the Christian faith, to help them to understand the gospel of Christ and to commit themselves and their lives to God. Church membership calls for participation and action by us all, not just a few. So it is that we have asked the Anglican Stewardship Association to guide us over the coming months in the introduction of a Thanksgiving and Pastoral Link Project.

Real Faith in the Real World: This project will enable us all to re-examine our relationship with God and our response to Christ. The stewardship of money is an integral part of Christian teaching and is specifically included in the basic stage of the project. However, our project is not based on the financial needs of the church but on the need of every Christian to practise stewardship. It will help us to live a real faith in the real world, and so to witness more fully the love of jesus.

Consult: Firstly, we want to activate everybody in our Church and consult with them about basic attitudes to faith and life. We shall call this our Members' Attitude Study. A church visitor will bring you a questionnaire, which you will be asked to complete and put into a sealed envelope without your name so that your answers are anonymous and you can say exactly what you think. All the replies will be evaluated independently outside the parish. There will be a written report which will be brought to you.

<u>Discuss</u>: Secondly, there will be discussions about the findings in small groups throughout the parish, thinking about ways forward for us to renew our gratitude and commitment to God. Following on from this we shall all be invited to a Thanksgiving Service at which we shall have the opportunity to complete a Thanksgiving Card indicating our intended giving to God's work through the church each week during the next twelve months.

Care: Thirdly, immediately after the Thanksgiving Service we shall begin our programme of Pastoral Link visiting. In the Pastoral Link everyone in the family of the church will be visited, in a friendly, informal way, four times a year. This network of caring and communication will help our feeling of community and strengthen us as we seek God's will for our church in the coming years.

Goodwill: With the goodwill of us all our Thanksgiving Pastoral Link will develop and grow as we develop and grow, opening up 10.

an exciting prospect for the future.

SLIMMING AND FASTING

Little did I realise when I harboured thoughts that the Bible has an answer to, or at least a pertinent observation on, present day living, but I have, by a roundabout route, concluded that slimming (and isn't that fasting of a kind?), going without certain foods and luxuries we normally enjoy can be related to the Good Book. The season of Lent and the comments of Professor William Barclay D.D. in his book "the gospel of Matthew" add strength to my view: "fasting is good for your health", "it is possible where we live to eat, instead of eating to live", (e.g. adverts in newspapers and magazines invite us to sample super food in super eating places). However that is not to forego the occasional meal with friends or families.

"Fasting preserves us from becoming slaves of habit; that which ought to be a pleasure becomes a necessity", Tony Crosland said. "What one generation thinks is a luxury, the next thinks it is a necessity". One eastern religion annually observes a daily fast from dawn - when it is light enough to distinguish a white thread from a black thread - until sunset. The only proviso, that if a person for health's sake must eat, they must ma good the breach of fasting by giving alms to the poor.

Now where the eastern religious person gives alms to the poor for eating, charity fundraising sponsored "slims" give to charity for not eating or indulging. The custom still prevails among present day church members that should they break a private vow, they also give to charity or to the church.







INTEGRATION



NEW WORDS FOR OLD

Genesis 2:18 got it wrong! So we need a new word -short, pithy and memorable - to sum up all that we share in our common humanity: a word that we know beyond ambiguity and doubt speaks for us all whatever our sex, whatever our age, whatever our colour. In Genesis 1:26-27 we had the word we need -"Man": "let us make man in our image, after our likeness. So God created man in His own image; male and female He created them". There we have the beginnings of a vocabulary that makes both the points of distinction and the points of identity that are within our experienced reality: we are all human; males are different from females; and if we - males and females alike - are made "in the image and after the likeness" of God then we have to recognise that female language is as appropriate as male language in our struggling attempts to circumscribe our experience of the Godhead.

Then in Genesis 2:18 it all begins to go wrong. "Man" becomes "the man" and poor Adam on his own needs a companion Eve. The consequences have been far-reaching ever since the attempt to use the one word "Man" both for our inclusive humanity and for the male part of that humanity has resulted in at best confusion and some hurt and at worst a seriously flawed understanding of the relationship of women to men. For it must have encouraged the foolish false belief that the male is the


typical human and the female somehow something less. And so too the foolish false belief that the typically male activities are more important than those of the female - "Woman's work" they murmur dismissively. And from this develops the idea - surely equally foolish and false - that the woman must proclaim her equality by behaving like a male and that if a man can somehow cope with and enjoy the skills that are generally considered to belong to the woman he is "effeminate" and that this is a term of abuse! What a mess!

When we move to the language of theology and devotion our difficulties increase. Central to our faith is the belief that God within the womb of Mary took to himself our humanity. Jesus is the God-Man, the Word was made flesh. In all this we are staying with the vocabulary of Genesis 1:27: "male and female" are both within that humanity which our Lord has entered and so redeemed. No one I imagine (though you never can tell!) has ever suggested that He died so that all males can be forgiven! Yet Jesus is not a man-woman. As he is truly a Jew, truly lived in Nazareth, he is truly a male human being. But we can't believe that this maleness of his is in any way an essential part of the work of our redemption. It is simply part of the givenness of the events. God chose to act in that way, in that place, at that time. And for this we can only offer our thanks.

In the current disputes on the ordination of women to the priesthood this confusion over the word "man" leads both sides, I rather rashly assert, to talk nonsense. To say that because "God became man" all priests must be male gives an entirely unjustified significance in the scheme of redemption to the maleness of Jesus. But on the other hand to say that because the whole human race has been redeemed through the incarnation of Jesus the Church must open every office to any human being, young or old, male or female, makes us unhelpfully blind to the reality of the distinctions within our humanity.

St. Paul and Archbishop Cranmer (and in some ways even the compilers of the Alternative Service Book in 1980) didn't seem to think there was a problem. Without difficulty they used "man" in both ways and assumed the congregation could make the necessary adjustments. Presumably neither thought it odd to address a mixed congregation as "Brethren". Reluctantly, I've come to see we can't go down their path. In ordinary speech today "man" and "men" have come to refer only to males and I don't think we can win our way back to the older usage. The clamour for "inclusive" language is often irritating. But to defend the old forms can seem to involve us in the defence of a pattern of relationships in which women were kept subservient and this must be wrong. The Christian understanding of creation and redemption commits us to finding a pattern for men and women living together in which the keynotes of our equality, our individuality, our mutual responsibility and faithfulness all come to be understood. What's in a word? A great deal sometimes.

THE FIRST LETTER OF ST. PAUL TO TOTLEY

Chapter 2

Do not be misled into thinking that God only wants you to influence the life of the church in Totley. Many of you have contacts through work and through other people you know (with a wider sphere of influence). You should be ready to minister in that wider sphere whenever the opportunity presents itself.

Nevertheless, it is important that you remain untarnished by your wider contacts. In many places there is a problem because so many people hold to faiths other than that taught by Christ. It is sometimes fashionable to suggest that such faiths are merely another way of understanding the true nature of our heavenly Father.

It is, of course, true to say that none of us in this world fully comprehend the nature of God but our Lord Jesus taught us very clearly that He is the way through which we should gain that comprehension. It is also true to say that there are many sides to the nature of God and that others may see sides which are obscured to us. Neither they nor us, however, can expect fully understanding without the help of our Lord Jesus Christ.

It is therefore very important that you develop the right relationship with those who hold fast to different faiths. Of course you must love them for they too are children of God and you must respect them as such. The fact that they are in error, however, must not be ignored although it may not be your place to tell them so. It is again a question of humility.

That which causes me most concern, however, is the reputation which the whole of your society has gained for materialism. I am sure that there is some truth in the reports which I have received.

Do you not remember our Lord's teaching about materialism? He gave many illustrations about the problems which riches bring and then showed us quite clearly that all we need in this world will be provided by the God who loves us!

Why then do you worry so much about temporal things? Why are they so important to you?

It seems to me to be a denial of the faith which we have in the teaching of our Lord to assume that we can always have wordly comforts. Their pursuit is insidious and gets in the way of the development of our spiritual life.



Dear Friends,

OUR WORSHIP

By the time you reach the end of this letter, you will be telling yourself that the Vicar of Totley has no thoughts and ideas of his own, as I have yet again 'pinched' most of this letter from another Parish Magazine!

One of the nice things about going on holiday is the opportunity it affords to worship in other churches. I seriously want to encourage all of you to go to Church when you are on holiday, as it does show us how effective (or otherwise) those Services are, and it gives us a yard stick by which to measure our own. Those of you who are on our Church Council will know only too well how many meetings are devoted to examining some aspect of our Sunday worship, and how frustrating that can be if your particular view of how it should be is not accepted. Be not dismayed, read these words from Cirencester Parish Magazine

"We have to recognize that many people find the Church as an institution, offputting, and our worship, whatever form it may take, difficult to understand and follow. With regard to the first of these two, we have to see the church primarily as a gathering of christian people who come together to worship God and to gain strength as they seek to serve Him in their daily lives in the world. Like any human organization it has its failings, for which we need to make allowance. As an institution, the Church is never able to fully represent the views of all its members. There will be things which all of us find difficult from time to time, but that is the nature of such a large organisation and, if we are realistic, it is difficult to see how things could be otherwise. Turning to our worship, there are some who feel that everything should be simplified to such an extent that everyone can follow easily. Whilst there is obviously a need to do this on some occasions, to do so regularly would mean that we were unable to adequately feed those people who require something deeper. The sense of mystery and other-wordliness is one of the elements which we must preserve in our worship since it reflects that part of the nature of God himself. We must realize that anyone coming into church as a relative newcomer will feel strange, perhaps out of place, and even uncomfortable. There are many situations with which we are equally unfamiliar, such as a court of law, in which we would experience similar feelings. So, there is a situation in which things are similar to All Saints. May we be sensitive to the needs of all who worship with us.

THE ORIGINAL CROSS OF THE BIBLE

According to the traditions of the early church the original cross was made of four kinds of wood; to represent the four corners of the world - the upright shaft of cypress, the cross piece (arms) of cedar, the headpiece of fir, and the footrest (suppedaneum) of boxwood. According to another early legend, the two latter woods were olive and palm, and in other, still older, legends of the East (of greater probability) of one wood only. According to some legends, the aspen* was used, and according to others the mistletoe before, as a punishment, it dwindled into a small parasitical shrub from having been a full grown tree.

*A Scottish tradition is that aspen leaves are never at rest because the cross was made of the aspen or "trembling poplar" wood.

THE WOMAN PRIEST

I had heard of women priests (who hasn't) and now, right in front of me "taking" the funeral service at a local crematorium was - a woman priest.

After the usual service the family stood in the bright morning sunshine exchanging family news, and in their midst this woman priest was attentively listening; then one of the women pointed out to the priest the other womenfolk: "This is my sister", "and this is my other sister and her husband and son". There were relatives from afar and these also were pointed out. I thought how comforting and quietly strengthening was her presence - it was quite noticeable among the women present - she was a sort of senior member of the family. In conversation later she told me more and more use was being made of women priests in cases of emotional stress and cases of all manner of abuse. I can quite well believe it.



The Heavens are telling the Glory of God

writes the Bishop of Doncaster



Astronomers in America have recently been making some remarkable discoveries. What they claim to have found is evidence of the birth of the universe; how the stars and galaxies were formed. The Cosmic Background Explorer Satellite has apparently detected huge ripples of matter at the edge of the universe; and it all ties in with the 'Big Bang' theory of origins. While claims of this kind need caution and further confirmation, this latest piece of research could well be a major scientific find.

I suppose one of the questions that is likely to be asked is - "Where does all this leave God? Are scientists bowing him out of his universe?"

With suitable humility I might observe that I don't think God is unduly worried; because the idea that there is a basic conflict between science and religion, between God and our observation and understanding of the world he made, is false.

In the Nineteenth Century the explosion of knowledge in the physical sciences and the growing accuracy of method and measurement led to the belief that there was an increasing body of data marching remorselessly on to unlock all the secrets of the universe. While the temptation remains to view the application of scientific method as the only reliable guide in an uncertain world, Einstein and quantum physics have given these earlier nineteenth century certainties more than pause for thought. The laudable aim of unlocking secrets continues unabated and the laws of physics are a constant; but at present it seems that models of reality are as far as we can go in discovering physical reality itself.

The point is that material research, however valuable to human well-being, can never be ultimate. The Astronomer Royal has recently observed that research in astronomy to evolve a 'theory of everything' in the material world does nothing to militate against the existence of God in any work that has been done; if anything perhaps the reverse.

I think the greater danger that contemporary christians face lies not so much in a faulty reaction to the appropriate reliability of the disciplines of science it lies much more in making the inevitable relativism of material knowledge a kind of criteria by which we judge religious belief. Of course we want to be on our guard against bogus certainties; but christians must surely question those voices, even within the Church, that tell us everything in the christian's life of faith is provisional too. God is not provisional. Nor is his purpose. Nor is Christ's incarnation, his sacrificial death, and his resurrection. I also believe that moral order has an eternal dimension.

Of course our present understanding of God's purpose is limited and as fallen finite beings we can only see through a glass darkly; but one day it will be different when we can have the glorious privilege of seeing Christ face to face and knowing even as we are known.

For the moment, as I look at the stars, for me there is mystery and awe. I'm not terribly musical or as highbrow as some people like to pretend to be. Yet whenever I listen to a magical choir singing Haydn's Creation, I can't help joining in. For the heavens are telling the Glory of God.

Worldwide Anglican Encounter Salvador, Brazil 1992



In March, 3 intrepid women from Sheffield Diocese set off to Brazil for a conference entitled "A Celebration of Life for a Reign of Justice and Peace". It had grown out of the last Lambeth Conference, when it had been decided that the Anglican Communion should do something to mark the World Council of Churches' Decade of Women.

Revd. Jan Hardy, Deacon of St. Paul's, Wordsworth Avenue, Jennie Richardson, Northern Networking Officer for the Evangelistical Coalition for Urban Mission, and Margaret Selby, Deputy Director of Ministry managed to raise sufficient funds to go. The Conference was held in Salvador, where the Portuguese first landed in the sixteenth century. It was the centre of the slave trade, and today 80% of its inhabitants are of African origin. It is a city with many favellas, built on any spare land, with any materials to hand, by those driven from the countryside to the city by poverty and

It was an apt setting for a Conference, which aimed primarily to focus on how women could help to bring about Justice and Peace, especially in those areas where women are the chief sufferers, and the principal burden-

There were representatives from the whole Anglican Communion, from most of the countries of the Americas (including representatives of 42 indigenous tribes), Australia, the Far East, Africa - but only 7 from England.

The six days of the Conference included plenary sessions on subjects ranging from 'Justice and Peace' to 'Breaking Down Barriers', and there were about 60 different workshops from which to choose. These gave the opportunities to listen to women working in a vast variety of different situations, where poverty and discrimination is present. There was also a visit to a favella.

We returned with a wide vision of the great variety of people who are gathered into the Anglican Church, with their varied needs and concerns, and with many questions about how women in South Yorkshire can work together more keenly in pursuit of justice and peace.

Toy Library

'Friends of St. George's', based at St. George's Church of England First School in Doncaster, support a Toy Library initiated by the Teaching Support Service. The Toy Library is designed to encouraged home/school links and to make good quality toys easily and readily available to nursery, reception and pre-school children from the catchment area served by the school.

Members of the community and parents of school pupils have joined forces to offer this weekly service and to raise funds for its continuation. The aims of the Toy Library are to stimulate and improve the manipulative and language skills of the children, to encourage co-operative play and to provide opportunities for children and parents to care for and be accountable for the toys they borrow.

The estate on which the Toy Library is based is small and geographically isolated by busy roads and a railway line. The area is starved of amenities, having no community centre, church hall, library, chemist or surgery. Shops are basic and the bus service is poor. In recent years unemployment has had a noticeable effect 60% of the children in school receive free school meals and many households exist on Income Support.

It was therefore considered important to try and establish a way of supporting parents and the Toy Library provides opportunities for the development of parenting skills and also gives access to toys beyond the financial reach of many families. It has fostered links between young parents, the school and the wider community and the service is already showing great benefits to the young children in the area.

ALL SAINTS SCHOOL

This year is 100 years since the Totley Railway Tunnel was completed, although the first train didn't pass through until 1893. To celebrate this event the children in school are doing work about the tunnel. We had Brian Edwards, who has written a book about the tunnel to talk to our pupils and show them slides.

One fine June day the whole school accompanied by the staff, the Vicar and around 15 parents, grandparents and friends walked from School across the hills to Grindleford. We looked at air-shafts for the tunnel, and the number of hills we had to climb made us realise why the railway track could not be put overland and why there was a need for a tunnel to be built.

We had a lovely picnic on the hills near Longshaw, and fun and games. Then we walked down to Grindleford Station and caught the train back to Dore Station, travelling through the Totley Tunnel.

It was a lovely day and work done by the children will be on display on our 'Open Days' on 29th and 30th June.

The following is some writing done by the youngest children.

Rowena Ward (aged 7)

On our walk to Grindleford, when we had just started, we saw some air-shafts, the nickname for them is pepper-pots. They lead into the Totley tunnel. We came to celebrate that the Totley Tunnel was finished 100 years ago, in 1892. The people who built it were called navvies, they lived in Totley Rise. The navvies childen came to our school.

Rachel Dean (aged 7)

On Tuesday we went to Grindleford. We saw an air-shaft, then we set off again. When we came to a field, we stopped to have a drink then set off again. It was really foggy at first. The reason we went was because we were celebrating that the Totley Tunnel was finished 100 years ago, but trains did not go through until the next year. The navvies children went to Totley School, the navvies built the Totley Tunnel. It was one of the longest tunnels in the country. We walked over the Totley Tunnel, it was very bumpy.

Michael Woolvin (aged 7)

When we went on our walk to Grindleford, we saw some air-shafts. The reason for the walk was that the tunnel was finished 100 years ago this year. The navvies lived at Totley Rise. Paul, an Apostle of Jesus Christ by the will of God, to the Church of God at Totley; Grace and Peace to you who are living nearly 2000 years nearer the Day when our Lord Jesus Christ will be revealed from Heaven than was the case when I ministered on Earth! I rejoice in your faith and love in these end days when the delusion of which I spoke in my epistle to the Romans (Chapter I) has gripped so many of your contemporaries, with the attendant lifestyle I described therein. You strive to keep yourselves from this lifestyle while not condemning (rightly) those who have given themselves to godlessness, lust, crime, cruelty, violence, destructiveness, etc. Yet I am concerned for you, for it appears that the righteous judgement with which Our Lord Jesus will judge all evil at His appearing, is so played down that you are in danger of a lopsided faith and appear to proclaim God as ultimately accepting everyon This is quite contrary to the teaching of all the Apostles besides myself (and I remind you that I received my Gospel not from men but direct from the Lord) and also contrary to Our Lord Jesus' teaching which is recorded in the books you call Gospels.

This failure to proclaim the severity of God alongside His gracious mercy, is not honouring God. Indeed, it sounds as though you do not trust God's judgement! Remember all judgement is committed to the Son, Jesus Christ, who being both human and Divine is more than qualified to judge. Also you lessen the non-believer's opportunity to enter the salvation Christ died to make, for it is often the fear of judgement that first motivates a person to listen. Clearly such a fear can only be the initial response but it throws into vivid clarity the gracious loving mercy of God in Christ, in dying the death of the cross on our behalf. The fear and the love of God really convicts with authority and power. It also creates Christians who love the whole nature of God, holy, righteous, just, true, gracious, merciful, loving and faithful.

There is another matter that causes me concern for you. In my day I wrote concerning my brother Jews, proving to them from the Scriptures (your Old Testament) that God had always intended to bring in all the nations to be His People. However, I also wrote that blindness (that is spiritual blindness in not recognising Jesus Christ as their Messiah), had come upon the Jews for a time only, that they would be restored to all God's purposes for them as foretold in the Prophets, and so all Israel, both natural and grated on Gentiles, would be "saved".

The Old Testament Prophets foretell that God would restore Israel to her land, that He would bring them from North, South, East and West and from the uttermost parts of the Earth. Clearly the restoration from Babylon (before Christ) did not fulfil this. Isaiah even foretells their restoration while they are still "blind", which of course they still are.

At the time of my ministry on Earth, it was unclear how this return to the land was to be fulfilled as the dispersion of the Jews into other lands following the destruction of Jerusalem had not occurred. However, that is not only now ancient history, but their survival through nearly 2000 years of persecution is also history, as is their present restoration to the land of Israel. With a few exceptions, the Church of the present time has failed to appreciate the significance of this fulfil ment of God's Word. We are now back to the situation that prevailed when I was preaching the Gospel. It is now possible for the appearing of the Lawless One, of whom I warned the Thessalonians and must now warn the Totleyonians, who will set himself up as God in God's Temple (the latter has still to be rebuilt).

I advise you to read my second Epistle to the Thessalonians, my Epistle to the Romans, chapter II and Matthew's Gospel, chapter 24 (as it is in your New Testament) to get the picture. In short, the "Lawless One" will win great support in the world and will appear to usher in a period of world peace and security. He will be ruthless with those who do not toe his line; Christians will be persecuted. He will break an agreement with Israel and bring many nations' armies to attack Israel. It will be A.D. 70 all over again but with a difference. The Lord Jesus will return with great power and glory and will destroy the Lawless One and all who side with him. Then the eyes of blind Israel will be opened, they will recognise Jesus to be their Messiah, they will repent. Jesus will reign on the Earth in a new world order with all His people as described by Isaiah in his chapter 2, verses 1 to 5. There will be no real peace until then, but you already have the peace that passes understanding, that peace with God through faith in Our Lord Jesus Christ. Endure the coming time with patient endurance and do not be deceived, for Jesus said "He that endurs to the end shall be saved".

The grace of Our Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

Go out ...; proclaim the Good News to all creation. Whoever believes ... will be saved."

(Mark 16.15 JB)

Individual responses of course were confidential and we cannot make any comment on the total picture until we hear from Carol Sims, but it was a most encouraging start to our project. Please hold the project in your prayers so that we may continue to be obedient to the leading of the Holy Spirit.







Suffering.... a gateway to glory.

writes the Bishop of Doncaster



I have had cause recently to reflect on some verses in the eighth chapter of Paul's letter to the Romans; and in particular on those remarkable words: "I consider the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed."

We are, or ought to be, only too conscious of suffering. Near at home in Northern Ireland; in what was Yugoslavia; and across the world from the starving in the Sudan to the boat people of Hong Kong. We live in a time of anxiety for our Church and in a troubled society; and many of us are on the receiving end of personal distress, which few others seem to understand or want to share in.

Now suffering has to be tackled. James in his letter for example isn't too keen on those who see a brother or sister ill-clad and in need of daily food - and who do nothing about it. There is also a healing ministry of wholeness in which the Church is engaged.

However it is not the actual tackling of suffering with which Paul is concerned. Rather he is saying that there is more to suffering than suffering. He tells us that christians are heirs with God and fellow-heirs with Christ, provided we suffer with him. I don't know fully what suffering with Christ means; but is it far from the mark to suggest that in his suffering Christ has put himself in an incarnate partnership with us? The world isn't on its own and nor are we. No one cries alone: for Christ cries with them.

Then in the verses I have mentioned suffering is presented as a gateway to glory; to freedom from the bondage to decay, to an entry into the glorious liberty of the children of God.

Suffering has a devastating habit of re-ordering priorities; and for christians it can bring an acute realisation of the passing character of much that occupies us. The fragility of our condition is a passport to an awareness of an eternal hope.

One significant consequence of this awareness is that it profoundly affects our approach to evangelism. We don't approach people with any sense of superiority. We meet our neighbours as fellow-sufferers and walk with them to the Cross where Christ who has suffered for us all has died; and then in his resurrection we see the sign of God's coming glory.

In this connection, you may remember that last year we kept St. Francis Day as a special day of prayer across the Diocese for the Decade of Evangelism

This year I hope that many parishes will do the same. St. Francis Day falls on Sunday, October 4th; and so there is an intriguing opportunity to bring St. Francis, a Harvest Festival, and prayer for the Decade together!

A prayer leaflet has been prepared again for personal use; and also some suggestions for use in Sunday Services. Parishes will be sent copies early this month. The prayer leaflets are well worth ordering.

From strength to strength

The Revd. Canon Trevor Page, Diocesan Director of Ordinands and In-Service Training, has been doing his sums. He reports a 75% increase in those training for ordination from this Diocese, since September 1991, when there were 12 in training. This month, September 1992, the number has increased to 21 in training (they do not all complete their training in the same year).

"This evidence of richness in our diocesan soil" writes Canon Page," is accompanied by another promising trend, there is greater variety as between young and old, single and married, and the average age is moving down. We have a healthily broad range of candidates."

The increase in numbers of those in training means that Sheffield Diocese can be optimistic about being able to have home-grown candidates to fill most of the places for deacons allocated to the Diocese by the Advisory Board for Ministry, a number which in recent years has varied between 5 and 7.

There is every sign that this trend of increase in numbers in training from Sheffield Diocese will continue, although national figures for those in training for ordination, due to be released shortly, are expected to show only a slight increase.

Canon Page reflects on this new situation for the Diocese of Sheffield by saying, "I suppose it is the old story, that those who come from the back of the field are best placed to surprise themselves."

Pat Needham to retire



At the end of September, Pat Needham retires after 34 years of ministry in the Church, 28 of them in the Sheffield Diocese. She was born and brought up in Beauchief. She and her family were deeply involved in Beauchief Abbey, so much so that her father, who was on the committee, was nicknamed 'the Abbot'.

After 4 years of teaching P.E. at Abbeydale

Secondary School, Pat was sent by the DLMA (Diocesan Lay Ministry Advisor), Helen Roberts to train in Birmingham. After that it was working first as a Parish Worker, and then after 1987 as a Parish Deacon, in 8 parishes, one of them in the Lincoln diocese.

She began in Oughtibridge, wearing a cap and (kneelength) gown. After 3 months, she ran the parish for 18 months, during the first of 4 interregna in the course of her ministry. Then it was St. Mary's, Handsworth followed by Aston where she was working with the new young curate, Desmond Camelley Unofficially, she had the care of Aughton church. This was followed by 10 years part-time at St. Chad's, Norton Woodseats, while she looked after her father, and then 6 years at Boultham, Lincoln. She returned to the diocese to St. Peter's, Warmsworth, and now her final parish is, again, St. Chad's, Norton Woodseats, where she is also Chaplain to Beauchief Abbey.

Pat's 34 years of ministry show how far the Church has moved in a comparatively short time. She was among the first of the 'new wave' of women in the '60s, who, unlike their predecessors, were no longer content, as she says, "saying 'yes sir' to the vicar, and doing visiting and children's work". She has worked 'under' or 'with' a variety of clergy, and until quite recently, has never been certain how much she would be allowed or required to do.

Sometimes she was expected to sit in the congregation with the arrival of a new vicar, (sometimes just for the Eucharist), sometimes she was given a stall of her own. Sometimes she ran the parish during an interregnum, and then 'was slapped back again' by the new incumbent. Sometimes, she was given a church to run, or expected to baptise, bury and assist at the Eucharist, at other times she was not allowed to preach in the parish church because the incumbent 'didn't like women's voices'.

In her final parish, she has worked in partnership with the vicar Ernie Hume. 'It is a good note to finish on', she says. Pat will continue to live in Norton Woodseats in her retirement, and for a few years, will continue as part-time chaplain to Beauchief Abbey.

Life begins at 40

This may well prove to be significantly true for St. Paul's, Wheatley Park, Doncaster a little later this year. St. Paul's celebrates forty years in the community of Wheatley Park.

It was on 13th December, 1952 that the church was dedicated by Bishop Leslie Hunter with the mayor of Doncaster, Councillor E. Hubbard in attendance. As the "daughter church" to St. Mary, Wheatley, it remained a part of that parish. In 1982, St. Paul's became a conventional district church.

Now in its fortieth year, St. Paul's stands poised to become a parish. With the support and encouragement of the Deanery of Doncaster it has applied for that status and it is hoped that the application will be completed in time for the Anniversary Celebrations over the weekend 2nd/4th October. A very fitting birthday present.

Events planned for the weekend include an illustrated talk on the history of the area together with reminiscences of local people, a Community Gala Day organised by St. Paul's Action Network and opened by Sir Harold and Lady Walker, the local M.P. and his wife, and a Birthday Service at which Bishop David will preach and the current Mayor of Doncaster and Leader of Doncaster Council will be present.

The celebrations will conclude with a beating of the bounds which will involve the use of a barge to negotiate the northern parish boundary. Memories of an earlier expedition by barge!

As part of its application to become a parish, St. Paul's has agreed with St. Aidan's, Wheatley Hills to annex a small portion of the latter's parish. This will include that well known beauty spot, the sewage works. The incumbent of St. Paul's, Graham Creasey, is contemplating becoming a chaplain there and wonders whether this would be a first!?

New Organ for St. Matthew's

The new organ at St. Matthew's, Carver Street, Sheffield, is to be dedicated on St. Matthew's Day, 21st September, at 7.30 p.m. There will be a Solemn Eucharist with procession and blessing and dedication of the new organ by Bishop Kenneth Skelton followed by a buffet in St. Matthew's Hall.

The new organ by Goetze and Gwynn is based on the English organ of the 17th and 18th centuries, and is one of only two of its kind in the country. The Organ Appeal for the new instrument is only £10,00 short of its target of £50,000.

DISCUSSION STARTERS

The questions below are "discussion starters". These are based on the thoughtful answers given to the questionnaires and give the parish the opportunity to develop its strategy. A full, open and tolerant discussion of these topics will produce much of value, especially if all taking part <u>listen</u> carefully to what others have to say.

- 1. Answers to Q1 Evangelism give priority to personal witness and community participation as ways in which the Church can bring people to the Christian faith.
- a) What is the Church? Is it the clergy? The people? The building?
- b) How can the Church best communicate the gospel to the community? What should the respective roles of the clergy, individual witness and community participation be in this?
- c) Does All Saints' Church have a sufficiently strong Christian fellowship as a basis for outreach into the community? If not, how might this base be strengthened?
- 2. Answers to Q2 $\underline{\text{Worship}}$ show awareness of social change and express concern at the relevance of faith and worship in today's society. The image of church services and churchgoers is thought to be off-putting.
- a) Are our services and activities relevant to modern life?
- b) Why do you think the Church presents an off-putting image? How may this be changed?
- c) Should worship be more enjoyable? Might people be encouraged to take a more active role in Church worship?
- 3. In Q3 \underline{Prayer} and Q4 $\underline{The\ Bible}$ the majority of people experience \underline{great} value in prayer but far fewer read the Bible regularly. Some find problems with it and yet Christian teaching is given a high priority in Q8 Christian service.
- a) The Bible is a central part of our worship but is it relevant to modern life? How might the Bible be made more easy to understand?
- b) About which matters of faith do we most need to be taught?
- c) With which other methods might we learn more about the Christian faith in the 1990s?

- 4. Answers to Q6 Everyday Life stress the influence of faith on attitudes and actions both in the home and outside of it, though some find it can cause tensions within the family at times. Family Christian Life was given the highest priority in Q11 Children and Young People.
- a) How might we be helped to communicate our faith to those close to us?
- b) Is a large part of the Church's work done by a few people? How might others be encouraged to become more actively involved?
- 5. Answers to Q7 <u>Giving</u> show a majority in favour of regular giving through the Church, though others preferred some other form of giving. Some stressed that they wanted to give to charities as well.
- a) What effect might it have on people both inside and outside the Church when the Church is always short of money? How might this affect its mission?
- b) Read St. Luke 18:vv 18-25 and 21:vv 1-4. Is Jesus being unrealistic in his attitude to giving money? How are we to respond?
- c) How might we develop a spirit of generosity both through the Church and to the wider world?
- 6. In answers to Q11 <u>Children and Young People</u> and Q1 Evangelism, great importance is given to contacts and work done with young people.
- a) Why is there a lack of resources for youth work in spite of its being given a high priority? How might this problem be overcome?
- b) How might we improve communications and relationship between the older and younger generations at All Saints'?
- c) What are some specific ways in which we might encourage young people and teenagers to come to Church regularly?
- 7. Most people thought that the Church should discuss and take action on \underline{Social} Issues Q10 and ways of caring outreach were considered a priority for the Church in Q12 General.
- a) Does the Church care adequately for the lonely, elderly and sick? What can be done to help them?

- b) How might we support and encourage the Church's involvement in wider social issues such as world poverty and human rights?
- c) What steps might be taken by the Church to become more actively involved with the community generally?

The football season is upon us again and earlier this year Canon Collie picked up a copy of "The Sun" newspaper in a restaurant and was surprised and delighted to find an article about Christian football players. Here are just three of the accounts:

Defender Brian Irvine was just 18 when he found God. The Aberdeen player is now 26 and his faith is every bit as strong.

Brian says: "Every time I walk out on to the pitch I am playing for the greater glory of God and not just for myself. I am definitely a born-again Christian. I was brought up in the Church of Scotland but I began to visit other Churches, meeting other Christians and reading the Bible. Now my whole life is centred around God. He gives me great strength in whatever I do. I believe he knows and cares for us all, whether it is playing football or doing anything else."

Midfielder Bernard McNally stands by his faith by refusing to play for West Bromwich Albion on the Lord's Day.

Bernard says: "I have to stick by my beliefs. It would be wrong for me to play on a Sunday. I always pray that by watching me someone might see something good about being a Christian." Bernard turned to Christianity after a girlfriend encouraged him to attend a Brethren church. Now he

and his wife, Karen, worship every Sunday even if West Bromwich are playing. Bernard, 28, says: "I thank God for giving me the ability and strength to play football. I have got used to fans calling: 'Come on, Bernie, get your Bible out.'"

Newcastle United ace Gavin Peacock became a Christian after he saw how his mother's faith in God had changed her life.

Gavin, 24, says: "I found God when I was 19. I was playing for QPR then and still living at home. My mum, Lesley started going to Church and told me she had made a commitment to keep God at the centre of her life. After that I started to see changes in her attitude. Things that made her upset before didn't any more, and she seemed so content. God even helped her give up smoking!" Gavin, a Methodist, has had no problems with his team mates. He says: "Occasionally they take the mickey, but they respect my faith."



During October we shall reach the climax of the Thanksgiving phase of this project. Sunday, 25th October is the day set aside as Thanksgiving Sunday and we are expecting a very full church at 10.00 a.m. for the Service on that day. During the service there will be an opportunity for each one of us to make a fresh commitment as to how much money we will give to the church. Compared with the homeless in our own country we are blessed with warmth and shelter; most of us have sufficient money to buy essential food and all of us have the opportunity to experience the presence and the love of God in our lives. Often we have also to be very thankful for the love of family and friends and hopefully, we can all give thanks for the fellowship within our Church.

If these and other considerations make us feel thankful we then have to consider our response. With truly thankful hearts our response will be shaped with the whole of our lives - all we do and all we say - in every situation in which we find ourselves. The pledging of a part of our income to the church, whilst a very important part of our response, is only a part. We shall be giving some priority to this part at our Thanksgiving Service but this is only a beginning. We must go on from there and live and work according to our understanding of the gospel - the way in which Our Lord Jesus Christ wants us to respond.

October 25th is a climax indeed but it is a springboard from which the life of the church in Totley will grow. With your prayers and your response we can surely expect that the Holy Spirit will guide us into fresh pathways and give us even more cause for rejoicing in the future.

A WRONG DECISION

writes the Bishop of Sheffield

"The powers that be" St. Paul tells us, "are ordained of God" (Romans 13:1). This means that though we by our

votes can choose our Government, its authority to govern comes from God and for how that authority is used it is answerable to Him.

Amongst the many responsibilities of the Government is a responsibility for public health and a responsibility too for public morality. Unfortunately it is allowing its concern for the first to do great harm to the second.

AIDS is a terrifying disease - not least because there is no sign of any cure. It is right that the Government should do all that it can to prevent its spread. The decision was taken that this was to be achieved by the preaching of a gospel of "safe sex". That was a wrong decision. And now it is insisted that this must be a compulsory part of the education of every child between the ages of 11 and 13. This too is a wrong decision. There is a terrible irony here. For we know that there is a certain way to curb the spread of Aids. The Christian teaching is that marriage is the union of one man and one woman for life and that all sexual intercourse outside that relationship is wrong. The acceptance of that teaching would end the spread of Aids. But the "safe sex" campaign by assuming total freedom in matters of sex encourages in the strongest possible way the idea that such freedom is normal and right. Anything goes provided that "precautions" are taken. And now that message is to be brought to the 11 year olds! Sex education in schools must be within "the framework of moral values". But to escape that modest (and very proper) restriction this new compulsory teaching on HIV is to be part of the science curriculum. Public morality is to be sacrificed to public health.

Since the 1960's freedom in sexual relationships has become a generally accepted part of the western way of life. It is difficult to be convinced that this new teaching has significantly increased human happiness. The Aids panic has swept away the last element of public restraint. And now the Government itself is encouraging even our children to believe that a rich and varied sexual experience is the norm for everyone from childhood onwards. It is rather as if we were to improve road safety by abolishing the Highway Code and building our cars like tanks! And of course the Christian teaching on sex within marriage is seen as an irrelevance. Will it get a mention in those "science" lessons?

We Christians are not without blame. Inevitably, we share in the general outlook of the world in which we live and, rightly, find it hard to condemn our friends, our neighbours, our children, ourselves. Yet there is a positive Christian teaching which sees all our sexuality as a sharing in the divine creativity and finds its fulfilment in a loving marriage. We need to teach and live our faith in these matters with greater urgency and confidence.

THE NEXT BISHOP OF DONCASTER

Downing Street anounced during August that the next Bishop of Doncaster is to be the Ven Michael Gear, at present Archdeacon of Chester in the Diocese of Chester. He will be consecrated Bishop on March 2nd at York Minster.

Bom in Southend-on-Sea but with his schooldays spent in New

Malden he had already felt himself called to serve in the Ordained Ministry of the Church in his sixth form days. National Service was looming and he actually attended (successfully) a Selection Conference (to decide on his suitability for the Ministry) while on Embarkation Leave before setting off for army duty in Malaya.

Returning from the Army he went to study at Durham University obtaining his BA in 1959. Theological training was at Cranmer Hall Durham and he was ordained in 1961 in the Diocese of Rochester to serve as Curate of Christ Church, Bexleyheath. In 1964 he became Curate of St. Aldate's, Oxford and then moved to the North of England in 1967 to serve as Vicar of Clubmoor in the Diocese of Liverpool.

His next move was even further afield when he moved to serve in what was then Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) as Vicar of Avondale, a suburb of the Rhodesian capital Salisbury. (71-76). He retains a deep interest in Central and Southern African affairs and has been back to visit that part of the world a few years ago.

He returned to England in 1976 to become a Tutor at Wycliffe Hall theological college, Oxford and then in 1980 moved to the Diocese of Chester to become Vicar of St. Michael's, the parish church of Macclesfield, Cheshire. During his time in Macclesfield (just over the hills from South Yorkshire) he served as Rural Dean of Macclesfield and Team Rector of the Macclesfield Team Parish. In 1988 he became Archdeacon of



Chester.

The Archdeacon is 57 years old, and is married. He and his wife Daphne have two daughters (Susan - 27 and recently married - and Sally - 25 and just about to go back to University for further study). Mrs. Gear, who comes from Durham, is a schoolteacher.

An occasional golfer, Mr. Gear is also interested in photography.

The Gears hope to move to South Yorkshire around February and they will live in the general Doncaster area in a home which, as yet, is to be built.

"I am looking forward very much to working in the Diocese of Sheffield. While realising the great demands of the job I am already encouraged by what I see of the life and vigour of the Church in South Yorkshire" says the Archdeacon.

He will succeed the Rt. Revd William Persson who retires as Bishop of Doncaster towards the end of the year. Interestingly Bishop William was another "export" to South Yorkshire from the Diocese of Chester where he served as Vicar of Bebbington and Vicar of Knutsford before becoming Bishop of Doncaster in 1982.

The Bishop of Sheffield: the Rt. Revd David Lunn comments: "I am confident that in Michael Gear we have the man with the gifts and experience the Diocese of Sheffield Needs".

Date for Youth Leaders

A group of Youth Leaders from the Diocese were fortunate enough to be able to attend "Eagles' Wings" - the first Anglican National Youth Leaders Training Weekend in London earlier this year. They returned keen to share something of what they had learned with Youth Leaders in our own Diocese. They have planned a Diocesan Training Day for all who are involved in Youthwork, at Sheffield Cathedral on Saturday, 27th March, 1993 from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. Special speakers are

planned as well as a 'Market Place' where leaders will be able to get advice on what resources are available to them both locally and nationally. Workshops on music, drama and games are already arranged, but the organising committee would be pleased to hear from any youth leaders who have particular ideas about what could be included in the Conference, which is for people from all over the Diocese. Contact Sue Pegg on Sheffield 886800 or Arthur Paine on Sheffield 306902, if you've got any requests or bright ideas for the day.

Argentina Link

This October we shall be welcoming three visitors from the Anglican Church in the Diocese of Argentina (writes Sheffield Diocesan Communications Officer: the Revd Roy Arnold). They will be on the return exploratory expedition, looking into the possibility of forming a New World Link between our two Dioceses to augment our European Link with Bochum and Hattingen-Witten in Germany.

Earlier this year the Archdeacon of Sheffield, Mrs. Anne Watson from Anston and I visited Argentina on behalf of Sheffield Diocese. Our main stay was in the bustling capital city of Buenos Aires: with a population of 10 million, twenty times bigger than Sheffield (England's fourth largest city). Buenos Aires is a city of contrasts: in parts it looks like Paris or Rome, but around the outskirts there are shanty towns as in other major cities of Latin America. 75% of the population of Argentina live in Buenos Aires but out beyond the sprawling city the Pampa spreads mile after mile. I flew over it on my way inland to Cordoba, Argentina's university city and from there I travelled on by car to Los Cocos, a resort town in the Cordoba Hills. That is where the Revd Roger Hogg lives and works with his wife (Patricia) and three children. Third generation Anglo-Argentinian Roger speaks fluent English and Spanish, but he has never visited the United Kingdom. He will be one of our visitors from Argentina this October, together with the Revd Horacio Garcia (who doesn't speak Ingles) and Joyce Illingworth who even speaks Yorkshire because she comes originally from Leeds but has worked in Latin America for many years. This October we hope to show them as much as we can of the Church of England at work in the Diocese of Sheffield. If you should meet them on their travels the simplest thing to say is "bienvenido" which is Spanish for Welcome.

Mosborough Crafts

At the end of 1990 the Church of St. Mark's Mosborough had to close the doors of its Church Hall for the final time. The Hall was used by many organisations in the village as well as the Church. When erected in the 1920s it was only a temporary building, but it withstood sixty-five years of wear and tear before it was considered unsafe for further use. 1990 saw the formation of SMARF (St. Mark's Alteration and Restoration Fund), to raise money for a new roof, and convert the lower part of the Church into meeting rooms, kitchen and toilet facilities. On SUNDAY, 11th OCTOBER, 1992, a CRAFT FAIR is to be held at MOSBOROUGH HALL HOTEL from 11 a.m. - 4p.m. Hundreds of handmade gifts will be on sale, with Fragrances, Christmas Preparations, Glass Engraving, Homemade Cakes and Produce and many others. Homebaked Refreshments will be available all day. All proceeds are for SMARF. Why not enjoy a lovely day out in superb surroundings, and get some Christmas presents as well.

GREETINGS FROM KENYA

In August eight of us from Sheffield visited Kenya for 3 weeks. After an 8-day safari to 4 game parks, we drove north-west to the Dioceses of Maseno North and Nambale, which until recently have been linked with the Diocese of Sheffield. Bishop James Mundia of Maseno North and Bishop Isaac of Nambale had arranged a programme for us.

It was a tremendous and humbling experience and we all returned feeling how poor we were in comparison with the Kenyan Christians. Wherever we went we were greeted with great warmth, friendliness and love. It was their earnest desire that links with Sheffield should continue. Though it wouldn't be easy to help in a practical way all they asked for was our prayers and the chance to keep in touch.

Nowhere have I come across such faith as even the poorest people showed and they never ceased to praise the Lord for his goodness to them. No meal was taken without grace being said, no journey undertaken without God being asked to keep us safe and then thanks were given for our safe return. Each day began and ended with prayer.

Two years ago, when the young Kenyans visited Sheffield, I hosted Tom Kipkemoi and John Machariah and this year I was fortunate to see both of them and to stay in Tom's home on Mt.Elgon for 3 days. The whole family turned out to greet my friend and me with song, a typical welcome wherever we went, and we became one with the family.

During our stay on Mt.Elgon we visited 3 churches, all of a wattle and daub construction with earthen floors, simple benches for the congregations to sit on, no shutters or glass in the windows to keep out the wind and rain, and corrugated iron roofs which made the buildings hot in summer and leaked when the rains came. A step led to each sanctuary which were furnished with a table and two chairs. But in spite of bareness and lack of facilities, joy shone on everyone's face; there was a great spirit of unity and the hymns, prayers and sermons all expressed confidence in, and love for, God.

We have so much to learn from Christians there. God comes first and the church is growing rapidly.

Finally, everyone sent their love and greetings to All Saints' and especially so from Kaptama, Tom's church, and the two other churches of Kapsokwany and Chesito. Please remember them in your prayers and it is my hope that the link we already have may continue and that God will bless and protect all our friends there.





ON PREACHERS

Sometimes an incident can occur that strikes a chord of memory of a similar happening of the past - a case of deja vu, "we have been here before"/"it has happened before". A new book recently reviewed about life with the late John Collins, written by his wife, set off the following train of thought. Canon John Collins was a passionate and active nuclear disarmament campaigner, and leader of the famous Aldermaston marches of the 1960s. His view did not meet with unqualified endorsement by all of the established church, the reviewer goes on to say. Official christians cast doubts (what would be called smear tactics today) about his christianity. He was, they suggested, a politician in clerical dress, a worldly leftie, possibly a communist or communist dupe.

Back in the 1920s in the South Yorkshire area, the Reverend T.E. Pickering, an Anglican priest dubbed the "tramp preacher" (he had no parish as such), held crowded open air meetings, expounding his hard-hitting christian views on every aspect of the terrible conditions of the time. He too was labelled a communist, arrested on several occasions to spend the night in gaol. Later he became vicar of the sweet sounding Stainton-cum-Hillaby, near Maltby, from where he carried on his pungent christian views in letters to the now defunct Sheffield Telegraph in its original form. He later took a parish in Canada.


Today, the church is more respectable, more sedate, certainly less radical, to the point of being bland and uninspiring — so our critics say. And again, nearly 2000 years ago, the greatest preacher of them all had to withstand carping criticism and niggling sniping by Pharisees and Sadducees who were too busy interpreting the letter of the written law and not the spirit of the law. The reviewer ends "men whom the most sardonic atheist could not help respecting and admiring — George Bell, John Collins, Mervyn Stockwood, Donald Soper and George McLeod — it's hard to find such mend today — I wonder why"?

We must find the answer and should we be so fortunate as to find such men showing the characteristics of the above mentioned they should not be stifled because they do not conform.

SHEFFIELD DIOCESAN NEWS NOVEMBER, 1992

The Bishop of Doncaster writes:



This is the last time I shall have the opportunity to contribute to the Diocesan News. I wish I had some profound words to pass on to posterity; but as is usual on these sort of occasions, words fail rather than coming to the rescue. It has been a marvellous pleasure and a humbling privilege to serve in the Diocese these past ten years. There is so much for which to be thankful. We are greatly blessed in the Bishop's leadership. There are signs in every part of the Diocese of growth and life; and personally speaking Ann and I have made a multitude of friends. Of course there are challenges to face and nothing is perfect, least of all a Suffragan Bishop. I am more aware of what I have left undone than I am of what I've done; but thank God for the Diocese of Sheffield, clergy and laity alike, and for every aspect of its witness.

This month the Church of England takes a decision on the ordination of women to the Priesthood. Everything that might be written on the subject seems to me to have been written; and I won't help matters by writing much more. It is a profound and significant decision, whichever way the vote goes, with considerable consequences. There are however two particular requests I want to make. Both are obvious and I make no apology for that. Please be very much in prayer on Wednesday November 11th as the debate and voting takes place. Secondly, please continue to pray afterwards particularly for those who will feel vulnerable and defeated. There are no quick or easy answers for them; and a period of quiet reflection will be best for us all. None of us are lords of the Church. Christ is. Waiting on God and resting in him is a better course than a false elation or a sense of rejection.

Recently I had occasion to dedicate a Mothers' Union Banner; and I found myself for the first time in my ministry preaching on a text from the Song of Solomon. If the early Fathers were able to take the song as an allegory of Christ's love for the Church, I thought for once I should take the risk and do the same. The text, I hardly need to say, was 'His banner over me is love'. The picture of the young man, guarding his beloved with a love like a banner waved over her and enfolding her, is a moving one. The love of Christ is a banner over all his people. God grant that we might be his standard bearers taking his love to the world.

IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF BISHOP KENNETH

Palm Sunday

A church bell rang over the woods and the river valley. The sound was faint, in marked contrast to the huge 100ft statue. High up on the cliff, dominating the view for miles, this commemorates Artem, the Ukrainian Bolshevik leader of the 1920's. The church bell persisted, its ring no longer muffled by ideology. It was a new day with the freedom of fresh opportunities and unfamiliar, harsh choices. It was Palm Sunday, in the Donbass Region - north of Donetsk, Sheffield's twin city.

New Connections

We were in Ukraine at the invitation of the Donetsk Trades Union Centre, six members of Sheffield Trades Union Council and an industrial chaplain. The international exchange revealed many common interests, among them the future of employment and health and safety. People were surprised to see our meeting interrupted by the arrival of an orthodox priest. He had come to talk about the awakening of religious life. Many new connections were now possible between belief and action. One colleague served as a city councillor, a new Cathedral was being built, people wore crosses openly and spoke freely about their faith. He told me of the care the churches gave to people in distress - injured miners and families bereaved by accidents at the many local pits.

Singing Miners

Later a group of miners who are members of the Baptist Church spoke about the challenge faith gave them at work. They knew people who had been taken to the Gulags, and never seen or heard of again. These friends are also building a new Church. They would love to come and visit us with their "Ark Group" of singers. They are keen to raise funds so that their building can continue. If you are interested in helping to arrange travel, accommodation and activities for ten visitors next summer, please contact Tony Attwood immediately. To begin with £5000 is needed for their fares!

Keeping the Link

Bishop Kenneth Skelton was in Donetsk for Easter 1991 with the Sheffield Philharmonic Choir. Early this year I was there to see what's happening to their coal industry. Major changes and job cuts are facing their miners too. The impact will be very severe. Donetsk is a mining city in a mining region. Amidst all the upheaval, the presence of Christianity is increasingly respected. People are wary of the Church - they didn't let on that they had a chapel on the pit top - but they wanted to talk about prayer and a vision for their lives. Bishop Kenneth had spoken of resurrection and hope; it was a great joy to witness these signs. Who will visit next and further these links?

'A Continent of Coal'

Asked to give a message for Easter on Radio Donetsk, my greeting "Christ, our Morning Star" will have given some listeners cause for thought! Five weeks of travel in five countries are captured in a slide presentation and commentary. Visits to Gliwice, Doncaster's twin town in Poland, and Auschwitz are included, together with Brussels, and the Braunkohle and Ruhrgebiet (Herten and Hattingen-Witten) areas of Germany. Mining Turn-over

Many of our churches and congregations are here because of coal. Indeed the Sheffield Diocese was formed as the population increased with the development of the mining communities in the new South Yorkshire Coalfield. Within living memory a physical and cultural revolution occurred. Soon its impact will have altered again as more parts of the area become former mining communities. In 1912 the then Archbishop of York spoke of the Church's "love and care for the mining people". How can we show that love and care now?

The meeting is part of an occasional series on topics related to working life and arranged at various venues by the Industrial Mission in South Yorkshire.

This talk was first given in connection with events to commemorate the Sixtieth Anniversary of the 1931 Bentley Colliery Disaster last November. It is an excellent example of the kind of close partnership which is so characteristic of our area, but which so often goes unoticed - partnership in good times and bad between management and workforce, industry and community. Everyone is welcome: you can be assured of a fascinating evening.



CHURCH SCHOOLS "THE BEST"

Church of England aided primary schools are among the most effective in the country, according to Professor Peter Mortimore, deputy director of London University Institute of Education. He was speaking at the annual general meeting of the National society, the organisation which established most of the 5100 Anglican aided schools in England and Wales.

Professor Mortimore, formerly head of research at the Inner London Education Authority and professor of education at Lancaster University, has been involved in studies of school effectiveness for 20 years. He is now Britain's leading expert on it.

Research had demonstrated that most Church of England primary schools performed well academically and had maintained high standards of discipline and behaviour, he said. They were also perceptibly caring institutions and were successful in encouraging pupils to adopt Christian values.

Church schools tended to have a stronger sense of mission, were intellectually ambitious for their pupils and were keenly aware of the dignity of individual pupils and teacher. The combination of these factors accounted for the success of church primary schools. The comparatively few Anglican secondary schools were less markedly successful, he said.

Dr. Mortimore urged everyone concerned with church schools - parents, parishes, staff and governors - to decide what outcomes they wanted from their schools and plan to achieve them. Recent evidence had demonstrated that "stakeholders" could make a real difference to the effectiveness of individual schools.





AFTER WEDNESDAY . . .

Dear Friends,

I can already hear you saying to yourself ... which Wednesday is he on about? As far as our Church of England is concerned, WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 11th will become a red-letter day. That was the day on which members of our General Synod (Bishops, Clergy and Laity) voted on the issue of the Ordination of women to the Priesthood. It was necessary, for the vote to be carried in favour of the motion, to have a two-thirds majority in each House. In the House of Bishops, 75% voted yes; in the House of Clergy, 70.4% voted yes; and in the House of Laity 67.3% voted in favour. So it was a close vote by the Laity. The Legislative Committee of the Synod has now to report to Parliament, who will decide whether the measure is "expedient". This is by no means a foregone conclusion. However, if it is passed (in both Houses of Parliament) the Royal Assent could be given before the summer recess.

My reason for writing about that Wednesday and the vote is two-fold. Firstly, it is important that parishioners are informed about important issues. Secondly, I am very anxious that we do the right thing following the voting. As I see things, the main task of the Church is to PRAY. We need to pray...

- ... for those who genuinely feel unable to accept the outcome of the voting, and are feeling hurt at this moment. Please pray that their future might become clear.
- ... for those who are still confused by the voting and are not sure about the decision that has been taken. Please pray that God will speak clearly to them.
- ... for those women who are Deacons, and whose ministry feels more valued than before. Please pray that they may face the future with true humility.
- ... for all the Congregations of our Church of England. Please pray that a spirit of tolerance, love and understanding may prevail.


Finally, I ask your prayers for our Bishops. Please pray for Bishop David that God will direct his path in the months that lie ahead. Please pray too for Bishop Bill(and for Anne) as they leave us for their retirement. We praise God for their work amongst us.

May God guide and bless His Church, and us as members of

BIBLE SUNDAY - DECEMBER 6th

John was an excellent skipper. I'd sailed with him a number of times and I had every confidence in him even though he classed me no more than a cabin boy. When some distant piece of land was barely distinguishable — even to him — his calm confidence was usually expressed in the phrase, 'all will become apparent'. Sure enough, as we approached the coast, it gradually did.

But could he be wrong? Just this once? Those were questions I secretly asked myself as the breeze freshened, the sails filled, the boat keeled and the light became dimmer as the clouds covered the sinking sun. Darkness at sea can be a help as well as a threat. The loneliness is more severe but distant lights become clearer. I spotted a light near the horizon and it gave me hope — except when I realised it was moving and there was still no sign of a shoreline.

I went below to make a hot drink, glad to be out of the noise of the now strong and gusting wind. As I placed the mug in the skipper's hands I said, with as much calmness as a brave 9 year old glued to his first horror film. 'Do you know where we are?' 'No,' said John — and my heart sank, a metaphor which in itself didn't instil a great deal of confidence. After a pause, which I later suspected was deliberately impish, John added, 'but I know where we've come from and I know where we're going'. Of co. se, one eye ever alert to the whole 360 degrees of the horizon, the other on compass and chart, John had the situation well in hand.

All became apparent and later, in the safe hospitality of the harbour, John enlarged on some basic rules of seamanship. 'Respect the sea, make a plan before you set out, trust your instruments and never be unnerved.' 'Easier said than done,' I thought.

The Christian life is not simply putting your sails to the wind, exhilarating as that can be. There have to be ground rules, there has to be nerve and confidence, and above all we need to know where we have come from and where we are going. That's exactly what the Bible does for us. But, like the chart on the boat, it's no good giving it a cursory glance every now and again. That way it will look confusing. There has to be regular reference so that, however, fearful the conditions or however bewildering the surroundings, there can remain a quiet confidence and strength.



REFLECTIONS ON COAL



- 1 Round One has gone to the People of England. With our fellow citizens of Scotland and Wales we've made it clear that we want the Pits to stay open. Yet that has done nothing to solve the main problem: you can't eat coal: it only makes sense to bring it up out of the ground if there are customers prepared to buy it and use it.
- 2 The Price of Coal. I like the definition of a cynic as someone who "knows the price of everything and the value of nothing". I'm not a cynic so I start my pricing of coal up Swaledale looking at the sheep! If we insisted on buying our meat where it was cheapest the Yorkshire Dales would be a farm free wilderness. And then down memory lane perhaps I remember that we are an island, the war and even that long-running bogey-man, "the balance of payments", National Security, the well-being of towns and villages, the overall well-being of the economy just as things price lamb, so they must also price coal.

3 But we mustn't forget that

- (a) As a nation we live by trade. And that means that our manufacturers must have electricity that is no dearer than their competitors.
- (b) God has put His world into our hands: we must take care of it. If "acid rain" were the price of coal would it be too high a price.

4 A policy for Coal

- (a) A guaranteed market for British Coal so that British industry and British Homes have a guaranteed energy supply.
- (b) And if this means Government action to
 - (i) stop Coal imports.
 - (ii) stop Electricity imports from France.
 - (iii) stop the wasteful use of Gas in Electricity generating
 - may that action be taken soon.
- (c) Renewed commitment to research into better and cleaner ways of using coal.

And what you may say has all this has to do with the Bishop of Sheffield this Christmastime? I answer that we are God's People and it is God's Coal! That first Christmas God entered into our human experience and in so doing made it very clear that this is indeed God's world in which we live. I wish you all a very Happy Christmas - and a good coal fire!

The Revd. Stuart Brindley writes:

'I just never thought the people would be so open and friendly.' That was what the coach driver said after he had been with us in the Diocese a few days. For him it was a first visit to Britain. For a good many of the 36 strong party from our Partner Church District of Hattingen-Witten it was a second or third time here. And for Klaus Sombrowsky it must have been the sixth or seventh visit. There is no doubt this thing is growing!

It all began with three clergy from Sheffield Diocese going across to Hattingen in 1987 to explore the possibility of a relationship. Since then there has been an official group visit each year - by us to them or by

Gradually we have got to the point where we can mix our programme richly. This time not only did we experience yet again the richness of the hospitality at Bishop's Lodge where Bishop Bill and Mrs. Ann Persson entertained us on the Friday night. We also did some hard work - very hard work, actually! - studying a book on the Epistle to the Galatians. It was by a German theologian called Ebeling. How many of us found it 'enabling' and how many found it 'disabling', I'm not sure! But it was something of a relief to discover that the Germans found it just as heavy as we

The week was full of highlights. And it's difficult to pick out which was the brightest. Let me summarise the

whole programme and you can say what you would most have liked to join in.

There was the study day, held at the Roman Catholic Carmelite Friary at Tadcaster. Marvellous example of inter-Church co-operation, that! There was the talk with Bishop David at 'Bishopscroft' on issues facing the Church of England at the present time; the afternoon with Provost John Gladwin in the Cathedral where 'social responsibility' was the theme; the morning spent in a marvellous Old Folks' Home at Bentley, Doncaster, with the town's Director of Social Services and some of his colleagues; the reception in Doncaster Mansion House; the visit to York Minster; the Harvest Supper at Brampton Bierlow; the visit to the Dearne Valley project; and the final service in Rotherham Parish Church with Bishop William preaching.

Next time perhaps you could join in!

Most of the credit for organising the programme and for ensuring its smooth-running must go this time to Grant Macintosh of St. John's, Abbeydale.

What's it all about, though deep down?

Maybe 'leaven' would be a good 'Stichwort' or slogan.

Here were lots of us meeting with thirty-six of them and coming more and more to the realisation that it wasn't actually 'us' and 'them' at all. We're parts of one 'us-family'. From our different lands with different languages and different traditions, socially and theologically, we managed to perceive our unity in love. Is this part at any rate of what the Church as a whole should be seeking to do in the new Europe acting as a model of acceptance and co-operation for all Europeans?

We like to think so!

God's Coal, Amen???

The Doncaster Coalfield has a stay of execution, until the results of three months review of the Colliery Closure Plan are announced in the New Year. The Plan would mean the extinction of deep mine coal production - our basic industry. Churches have united in joining the general unanimous opposition. After all we are here because of the coal-mining which led to the creation of many of our communities, parishes and churches.

Decades worth of electrical power is about to be written off in terms of its coal equivalent. It will not be long before we rue the day. How shall we explain this action to our children?

Increased demand for other sources of fuel will surely mean higher prices, and perhaps shortages. The manner of the announcement bore no regard for people, families and communities. Even the investment to burn coal more efficiently and cleanly has been abandoned. This Coalfield Diocese, led by our Bishop, says loud and clear "this will not do".

'God's Coal' celebrates the work of the Coalfield Churches Extension Scheme. It was published to mark the eightieth anniversary of the beginning of that work and first sold at the Diocesan Eucharist to launch the Decade of Evangelism. A new book will set out the Church's response to the present crisis. As someone from Malby said, "people on the High Street asking shoppers to sign the petition - this is the Churches Together in Evangelism". Watch this space for further details.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The "Soup Wagon" has been running for about a year now, going out seven nights a week all year round, to three main areas of Sheffield - Kelvin flats, Broomhall and Devonshire Green.

The aim of the wagon is to provide soup, bread and most of all friendship to the homeless, alcoholics and others who frequent these areas. The good news is that it is a success, particularly at Devonshire Green where not only have relationships been developed, but people have been welcomed into church life and become Christians.

The "Soup Wagon" is "front-line" evangelism and about six churches in Sheffield staff the wagon: Kings Centre, Sharrow-vale Christian Fellowship, Walkley Baptist Church, St.Thomas' Crookes, Dore & Totley Housechurch and Christchurch, Fulwood; but our aim is to get as many different churches involved as possible.

The volunteers who go out with us find that the experience is not just one of giving, but of receiving and learning a great deal for themselves personally. When you are faced with someone who has absolutely nothing in this world and no hope, you realise just how rich and blessed your own lives are. It is thrilling and challenging to know that you hold the keys of God's Kingdom itself, and that there is a world out there dying to enter in.

We have found the response to our work completely humbling, the gratitude of these needy people to the little we give is overwhelming; their openness to the Gospel is refreshing; and their plight is heartbreaking. We have never felt threatened or fearful, rather we are looked after by those we meet, and we find there is a wonderful sense of humour — we meet quite a few characters out there!

The volunteers come in all shapes and sizes, some outgoing, some quite shy and quiet - just like the types of people we come across each night, so really anyone can become a volunteer, the only criteria needed is to have the love of Jesus in your hearts.

At 19 years, Eric Collier rejected a bright future in the legal profession in England in favour of working in a trading post in the wastes and wilderness of Northern Canada. He married a part Indian girl, Lillian, and later with their two-year old son, two horses, cart, tent, tools and provisions and with a grant of 150,000 acres, plus a lot of faith, went to lead the life of a trapper. Together they built a log cabin and as you can well imagine had many stirring adventures. He was, as they say today, "ecologically sound" (nature lover to you and me).

His proudest achievement was to restore two beaver-built dams, using beaver methods, to rescue the surrounding area from a swamp so that he could irrigate and cultivate the land to provide certain crops for his horses and family. His reward was two pairs of beavers (the gift of the local government inspector) for each dam to breed more colonies and as a bonus bring back the wild life to their former habitat.

Here is an entry from his diary:

"In England the morning service in church was as much a part of Christmas as turkey and plum pudding. But there are no churches in the wilderness - not in our part of the world. But just the same the wilderness need not be devoid of religion. Though there is no hassock to kneel upon, no choir to sing "Little town of Bethlehem", no parson, pastor or priest to preach a sermon from the pulpit, one has but to stand amid the deep calm of the forest for only a few moments to understand there is a creator of all things bright and beautiful and that his presence is everywhere at the same time. (Similar sentiments but expressed somewhat differently by a 7-year old Russian girl on a T.V. programme who replied, when asked who or what is God, "God is air" meaning He is everywhere). There in our one-roomed cabin at the headwaters of Meldrum Creek this late Christmas afternoon (1931), the sun about gone, night closing in, I knew and Lillian knew that we were as near to Almighty God as we'd be were we kneeling in some pew, faces in the palms of our hands."

SUDAN KILLINGS

Over 100 Christian men in Sudan have been crucified by Muslim soldiers, reports Christian Solidarity International.

Baroness Caroline Cox, who visited Sudan on behalf of CSI, has appealed to United Nations to intervene on behalf of 250,000 "civilian hostages", largely Christian, who are under siege in the city of Juba.

The area around Juba has been mined to prevent citizens escaping. The people live in churches and a football stadium because their homes have been destroyed. In some parts of Sudan there is no food or medicine.

Depsite the suffering, Christians continue to plant churches. But they are baffled by the lack of support from the church worldwide. "Why doesn't the Christian community in the rest of the world raise their voice on our behalf?" asked one pastor. "We are strong in Christ although we are hungry and thirsty and dying of disease, and we will take our cross to show the world that we are christians. But the people who are killing us do so in the name of Islam."
