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

WHO CARES NOW?

The provision of a Welfare State in Britain over the last few decades has made it all too easy for us all to expect to have adequate housing, health care, education, support in our old age, etc. The increasing economic crisis in our country, along with new ideas of enabling the best provision of care, means that many changes are being made. Stella and I went as representatives of All Saints to a conference looking at Care in the Community — what is needed, what is provided by the Health Authority, Family & Community Services and by voluntary agenies, and what changes are being made as a result of new legislation which places financial responsibility for care wholly on local authorities. The money provided by government is inadequate — Sheffield will be some $£2\frac{1}{2}m$ short of the estimate.

We heard the personal stories of the needs of a woman caring at home for her husband who has Alzheimer's Disease and her elderly mother; of a woman running a home for five mentally handicapped men; and of a middle-aged man who is schizo-phrenic and lives with his elderly mother. We heard how the Health Authority and Family & Community Services are moving away from institutional care provision to localising their services, aiming to co-operate better with one another and the local communities to enable care to be available at local leve The emphasis is always to be on the needs and wishes of each individual person and how they can best be listened to and met.

If the Christian view of society is not one where some give and others receive but one in which we enable each other to do both, then we all need to be prepared to be more aware of one another, to speak up more for those who cannot speak up for themselves and to act more where we can to help one another. The underlying thought which ran through the Conference was in this quotation from Micah 6 v 8:

"This is what the Lord asks of you, only this, that you act justly, that you love tenderly and that you walk humbly with your God".

We are very fortunate in this area in all that is done in co-operation between the local authority and local people, particularly in provision for elderly people, of whom we have the highest proportion in Sheffield. Changes in the structure are to be made, though, and Churches Together in S17 are planning a mini-conference to be held locally soon. Watch out for local advertisement of this and be prepared to come, to speak and to act to strengthen the well-being of our local community.

THE C. of E. IN 1993

I believe in the Church of England. Let me try and tell you why!

1. First because it lives within that Apostolic Church which was founded by Jesus Christ. At every ordination, licensing, or institution of a new Vicar the Bishop has to read these words from the "Declaration of Assent":



"The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church....it professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds. Led by the Holy Spirit it has borne witness to Christian truth...in the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, the Book of Common Prayer, and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons."

No one can exercise any ministry in the Church of England until they have "affirmed their loyalty to this inheritance of faith".

Ours is no modern, home-made religion; nor, of course, is it a distinctive "Church of England" religion: it is the Apostolic faith brought to us through the centuries in the Apostolic Scriptures, the Apostolic Creeds and those "Orders of Bishops, Priests and Deacons" which, claims the Prayer Book Ordinal, "from the Apostles' time there have been in Christ's Church".

- 2. But this "Apostolic Faith" is not simply a museum piece. "The Church is called upon to proclaim" this faith "afresh in each generation" says that same "Declaration". The criticism that the "Church of England is worldly" I take as praise if it means that we have a ministry and a gospel that meets the real needs of people living in the world today. A Christianity that can only be lived in a "Galilee Theme Park" is not much use to anyone! But to both "maintain our loyalty to this inheritance of faith" and also "to proclaim it afresh" is not easy. In a rapidly changing and frightening world if we cannot present the unchanging Christ on the rock of the Church's faith we have no Gospel to proclaim. Yet to use that same unchanging Christ as a bastion for ancient injustices is blasphemous. The tension involved in this double commitment focuses today on the question of the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood. To some our "inheritance of faith" clearly leaves no place for such an innovation, whilst others a faith that even appears to discriminate against women cannot be the Gospel of Jesus Christ. For now, we can only agree to differ whilst uniting in both our "loyalty to the inheritance of faith" and in our determination to proclaim afresh the Gospel with even greater vigour and clarity. A hundred years hence the historians will either marvel that we found something so obvious so difficult, or use us as an awful warning of the power of the Spirit of the Age to divert the Church from the clear truth shown both in the practice of Jesus Christ and the Creation-revelation of men and women as different!
- 3. Though the Church of England makes no claim to a 'faith' or 'ministry' that is in any way different from that of the universal Church, it does have a distinctive outlook (or ethos) and it is this that makes many Church of England people feel that, however awful and infuriating their Church might be, they could not be happy in any other. Three facets of this outlook are especially important to me.
- First is our readiness to see everyone as a "child of God". We are all on a pilgrimage with the God who has made us and so the people who don't even know they've started on that journey are as important to God (and so also to His Church) as the person who is very active and committed member of the Church.

Secondly is our acceptance of faith as a very personal and individual matter. The Church's faith stands strong and clear but each of us must grow into its fullness as is right for us. faith is a gift and not a weapon.

And thirdly is our belief that God has made us for Himself and it is our greatest privilege to be able to share here on earth in the worship of heaven.



Coal, Housing and Cash...

A brief summary of Sheffield Diocesan Synod which met on November 6th 1992 at St. Thomas, Crookes, Sheffield. The Revd. Roy Arnold Diocesan Communication Officer reports:

CONGRATULATIONS were extended to the Bishop of Sheffield by Synod members for his leadership over the crisis in the Coal Industry. Earlier the Bishop had said "Round One went to the people of England" but he was clear that the battle for the ongoing life of the Coal Industry was far from won.

HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS were the topics of a major report from the Diocesan Social Responsibility Committee and others. Sections of the report were commended for study at parish, deanery and diocesan level. "It is no good the

Church bleating on about moral and spiritual values to people who have nowhere decent to live" said the Archdeacon of Sheffield, the Ven Stephen Lowe.

FINANCIAL MATTERS. The Diocesan Budget for 1993 was approved and Synod members authorised the Finance Committee to expend a sum not exceeding £4,133,575 in 1993. The Revd. Jim Moore reported to Synod that plans to build a new Diocesan Office at Eastwood, Rotherham had been dropped because of the current economic situation and the continued fall in the value (and costs) of office space. The Planning Group would continue to search for office space, in the meantime.

A NEW SYSTEM to replace the Parish Quota was introduced by the Archdeacon of Doncaster, the Ven Desmond Carnelley. A Parish Share of 15% of the parish's recurring income plus a Parish Ministry Contribution was what was proposed, but, this scheme has gone back to the drawing board after the Archdeacon of Sheffield expressed anxieties about increases being asked for from some Urban Priority parishes.

CHRISTIAN GIVING. A new Diocesan Giving Initiative is to be launched and was introduced by Mr. Nicholas Hutton, the new Vice Chairman of the Diocesan Board of Finance. Every parish will be asked to appoint a Parish Giving Director; there will be a training programme for clergy and others; every parish will be asked to produce an October budget and there will be a Diocesan Parish Renewal and Giving Day. Mr. Douglas Hurley (Diocesan Stewardship Adviser) has a new title: as Christian Giving Adviser. The new Giving Initiative was unanimously agreed by the Diocesan Synod.

IT WAS AGREED that (under the Church Representation Rules) each parish should elect two lay representatives to Deanery Synod membership with a third member allowed where parishes have more than 300 on their Electoral Rolls. District church councils are allowed one representative each.

Friends of the Church in Western Kenya

The group of "friends" has been formed by people who felt that although the official links with the dioceses of Maseno North and Nambale in Kenya have now ended, nevertheless, relationships which had already been established at parish level should be continued and strengthened. This initiative has been spurred on by a recent visit to our Christian friends in Western Kenya by a party of eight people from various parishes in the diocese of Sheffield. It was felt that other parishes may also be interested in developing links with Christians living out their faith in a very different sort of situation to our own.

The aims of the group are:

- (1) to assist parishes in the Diocese of Sheffield which might wish to develop or consolidate links with Christians in parishes in Western Kenya;
- (2) to increase understanding, through such links, of , each other's churches and ways of life;
- (3) to enrich our spiritual lives by sharing experiences with Christians living and worshipping in a different cultural environment, and to support each other in prayer.

Ann Faulkner and Peter Maguire (Psychological Medicine Group, Christie Hospital, Manchester) have produced some very important work based on 10 years of research into normal and abnormal reactions to bereavement.

Following Dr. Maguire's presentation to the Bereavement Forum AGM Ann Faulkner will run a workshop based on this material, which will give statutory and voluntary workers clear guidelines for assessing the nature and severity of their client's grief reactions, and noting where further work is needed. This will be a good opportunity for a wide range of workers to explore how they can bring the benefits of this original research into their work.

The Diocesan Board of Education wants to encourage as many people as possible to take part in the preparatory discussions so that all views and ideas are taken into account.

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

THANKSGIVING AND PASTORAL LINK PROJECT

Following the very successful Basic Stage of the Project and the joy of Thanksgiving Sunday at the end of October we are now turning our attention to the Pastoral Link work. The first Pastoral Link Letter has already gone out and the second will be distributed by our visitors around the middle of February. Our aim is to build up the fellowship of the Church so that we might all play a greater part in the building up of the Kingdom of God in Totley. Initially this will depend on greater understanding and possible discussion between the visitors and the households which they visit. If these contacts lead into wider contacts within the church they will have achieved a useful purpose. At the heart of the matter lies the question as to how each one of us can give of our best to building up the whole church. Where are our skills, talents, aptitudes, inclinations? How can these be used to glorify God in Totley? Are there any stumbling blocks which need to be negotiated?

Later in the year we shall be seeking to extend the number of households who are linked together in this way. The initial list compiled earlier in 1992 contained about 180 households but the number of families who have connections with the church in some way or another is obviously greater than this. One of the limitations as to how fast we can extend this list depends on the number of visitors we have. It is accepted as important that no visitor has too many households and obviously also we want them to be reasonably convenient and local. The consequence of this is that we are looking for more visitors to come and help. There is a meeting planned for visitors on Tuesday 9th February in the Church Hall at 8pm. If you would like to consider the possibility that you would do some visiting please come along. You will be very welcome.

At its meeting on 14th January the P.C.C. will be discussing the reports of the discussion groups which were help in the Autumn. Many interesting and valuable comments were made and they will help shape the life of the church in Totley for years to come. We hope to include a fuller report in future copies of All Saints' News as well as some of the future Link letters.

A little girl putting on a nurse's uniform (white apron and huge red cross) and wearing mother's high-heeled shoes, is image making - she is a nurse; a little boy wearing football strip is Brian Deane or David Hurst - he too is image making, while those cycle safety helmets make him a Nigel Mansell. Teenagers with vivid shell suits must be Daley Thompsons or Linford Christies. Image building is not confined to those aforementioned; it applies to present day politicians, actors, actresses, authors and business tycoons when they are advised what hairstyle, what colour suit or dress looks "good" on them, and what voice is most acceptable and impressive: it is known as a "make-over".

However, when we read of "man being made in the image of GOD" it is difficult to comprehend, and it is rather of his Son of which our image is made. It readily means we have the opportunity to be like him, if we accept his teachings, virtues and values: that is what it means to be a christian.

Our "guideposts" are the ten commandments and Paul's letter to the Corinthians:

". . . so faith, hope and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love".

It means living, or at least trying to follow, these precepts day in, day out in every aspect of our living. It sounds like a life sentence, and so it is, but the rewards are great.

GOING TO GROW







EIGHT out of 10 churches have less than 120 people attending. But according to the Rev. Paul Simmonds, Head of the Adult Training and Resources Department of CPAS, these 'small' churches are strategic centres for evangelism.

'A large number of small Christian communities provide a Christian witness in every little population centre and neighbourhood', he suggests in the introduction to the latest CPAS Handbook, *Growing the smaller church*.

And a major factor in growth, he argues, is a church's willingness to plan for it. Growth 'needs to become part of the bloodstream of the church. Unless we are willing to allow growth, nothing will happen.'

Dimensions of growth: upward, inward and outward.

The book, published by Marshall Pickering (£5.99) sets out principles for growth based on the Brixton experience. Among the first is a readiness to assess the effectiveness of church structures and to change them if necessary.

Another is the one illustrated above. A growing congregation needs three dimensions: upward to God in prayer and worship, inward in fellowship and pastoral care, and outward in social concern and evangelism.

Here is another insight into our Pastoral Link Project.



The Archdeacon of Doncaster sends a message to the diocese for 1993...

CARRY ON LEARNING!

Exactly two years ago, in the Diocesan News for February 1991, Bishop David challenged us all to become 'Keen Disciples in a Learning Church'. Across the diocese quite a lot has been happening since then.

PROGRESS

First a 'colloquium' was held in October 1991 when Bishop David shared his ideas with a group of people who attempted to sort out how they might work out in practice. In January 1992, Rachel Rolfe, newly appointed as (then) Assistant Director of Education (Adult), began to enthuse individuals and parishes with these ideas. In the Spring, consultations were held with all the clergy, and then with clergy and laity from interested parishes. A resource group began to write, material which parishes might use. Training days are being held to look at the general principles of 'Keen Disciples' and the use of the resource material.

So far twenty one parishes have offered to try it all out. Some will be embarking on their second course this Spring.

Each parish has a consultant to help them on their way.

WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?

'Keen Disciples' is not a different method of adult learning, or a new approach to working with children or teenagers. It is an attempt by parishes to give an opportunity to their congregations whereby all of them can learn more about their Christian faith at the time when most people are already gathered together - on Sunday morning.

People of all ages, either in separate age groups, or together in mixed age groups, consider basic themes (usually based on the ASB lectionary) integrating this learning within the normal Sunday service. The twenty one pilot parishes have been working on blocks of material lasting four or five weeks at a time.

They have discovered that their initial apprehensions have changed to enjoyment, enthusiasm, excitement. Learning can be fun!

It is Bishop David's vision that in due course, all the parishes in the diocese will take up this challenge, to provide planned participative learning as part of the normal pattern for all congregations and all ages, throughout the year. Those who come later into the scheme can learn much from those who have shown the way.

DISCIPLES MEANS LEARNERS

and Christian disciples should go on learning throughout their Christian life. Every time we leave church we should have learnt something new about our faith, about our Christian discipleship and responsibilities, and have been challenged to think further.

If this has not happened to you of late, perhaps your parish should be taking part in the 'Keen Disciples' initiative. Why not ask your Vicar?



Trust welcomes growing support for Church Heritage

Support for the Historic Churches Preservation Trust has increased by 20% since the launch of the Friends of the Historic Churches Preservation Trust scheme twelve months ago. The growth in support comes as welcome news to the Trust, which has been working hard to promote a greater awareness of Britain's church heritage.

The prospect of undertaking major repairs to the church fabric is all too often a severe blow to a parish, especially when the congregation is already struggling to meet its quota. Understandably, there is a temptation to cut corners by using cheap materials and in some cases dispensing with the services of an architect.

The grants and interest free loans awarded by the trust are intended to help meet the cost of repair work and to promote renovations which meet acceptable conservation standards. The Trust hopes that this will help safeguard the architectural quality of our historic churches, which many find so spiritually uplifting.

Friends of the Trust receive the Historic Churches Review, which contains lively and informative articles on all aspects of church heritage, as well as details of tours and events taking place around the country. 80 Years on...

This month, the Sheffield and District Organists' and Choirmasters' Association starts its 80th year of activity. Russia - Children's Bibles Strain Warehouse Capacity

The Bible Society reports that more than half a million Children's Bibles (illustrated Bible story books) will soon have been printed in Moscow. Already 300,000 Children's Bibles have been printed by the New Model Printing House, and 100,000 by the Children's Book Printing House. A further order for 200,000 is currently being processed, half of which will be distributed through the Bible Society in Russia, and the other half sent to other Bible Societies where there is a need for the Children's Bible in Russian.

These large amounts of Scripture are testing the storage limits of the Bible Society in Russia's new warehouse, and there is now serious consideration to obtain more warehouse space elsewhere to hold the quantities of Scripture that are being requested.

The Society of the Holy Cross - SSC

The Society of the Holy Cross (Societas Sanctae Crucis) is the oldest society of priests in the Anglican Communion. It was founded in 1855 by Fr. Charles Lowder and five other priests who felt called to serve God in parish and mission work within the context of Catholic priestly discipline, devotion and brotherhood.

SSC has around 1,000 priests throughout the Anglican Communion. Most of the brethren are grouped into Chapters which meet regularly for prayer, study and discussion.

The objects of the Society are to strengthen and consolidate the spiritual life of its members according to Catholic belief and practice; to maintain and extend the Catholic Faith and discipline, and to defend truth against error, to unite its members in a spiritual bond of mutual charity arising from their common faith.

The Mass is the centre of the life of the brethren, and a disciplined spiritual life is regarded as vital to each priest's response in the call to personal holiness. So the Rule of Life envisages a daily Mass, the ordered recitation of the Divine Office, daily prayer and study, an annual retreat and regular use of the Sacrament of Penance. The brethren seek to live out the discipline of the Crucified Saviour in every aspect of life, and, through their teaching and pastoral care, to help others to do the same.

A priest who is interested in joining the Society should first seek permission to attend Chapter meetings. Then, if he wishes to proceed to membership, he must be proposed by two members of the Society who know him well. If his nomination is approved he would then proceed to election at a Synod of the Society.

Yours Faithfully - The Church of England

A new video about the Church of England, "Yours Faithfully - The Church of England", a 28 minute film will be available this month. Designed as a resource for the thirteen thousand parishes in England, it sets out to show the breadth and depth of the Church's life and work. "We believe it will interest a wide range of audiences, from individual church members, baptism and confirmation preparation groups to parish evangelism planners," said Patrick Forbes, the Church House Broadcasting Officer.

"We can see the video used in Church schools and colleges, and in reference libraries. At around £10 a copy, I believe that many church members would benefit from having their own copy and using it to introduce something of their faith to others." Study notes will accompany the video to enable it to be used creatively in parishes, deaneries and dioceses.

The video was commissioned by the Communications Unit at Church House. Video Rosemary Rankin, from Christ Church Brixton, being fifteen submissions were received. 'BoxClever The Church of England" Productions' were awarded the contract, and have



makers were asked to tender for the project, and over interviewed by James Wynn for the video "Yours Faithfully -

been filming in places as far apart as Gateshead and Shepton Mallett. They have recorded contributions in both urban and rural parishes, and have talked to the Secretary General of the General Synod, Philip Mawer, and to the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. George Carey. Well known broadcaster Brian Redhead has contributed the commentary.

"I believe this video will be a rich contribution to the Decade of Evangelism," said Patrick Forbes.

A Fascinating Shrove Tuesday Custom...

A fascinating Shrove Tuesday custom from Brampton Ellis Church Junior School is reported by Headteacher, Mr. B.N. Sampson as they prepare for Lent 1993.

Pancake Bell

The School Bell is known as "The Pancake Bell", although there is no doubt that it was used to summon children to school. On Shrove Tuesday, this year 23rd February, it is part of our tradition for the school bell to be rung between 11 a.m. and 12 noon by every pupil in the school. It is a custom handed down over many generations and is even recorded in the school log, books. Unfortunately the log books in the school's possession (now kept in the Local History Archive Department of Rotherham Library) only commence in the 1850's. However it is recorded on 1st February, 1863: "Shrove Tuesday - as usual the flag was hoisted on the gymnastic apparatus and the children were dismissed at 11 o'clock having holiday in the afternoon. In accordance with custom here, the school bell was rung from 11 till 12 o'clock."

At least for 200 years

According to verbal tradition supported by teachers, the "Pancake Bell" has been rung on Shrove Tuesday for two hundred years with the exception of the World War Two years. This could certainly be possible since the original bell is dated 1791. Unfortunately on February 11th, 1986, this particular bell broke from its

mounting whilst being rung by Thomas Catling of Class 2P. It fell to the ground and shattered into three pieces. Made locally of cast iron, it had on it the inscription in latin "Ad Scholam Discipulos Voco" - meaning "I call the pupils to school". It was made at a foundry in Wathupon-Dearne, and had a crack in it which had been repaired on some previous occasion.

A past age

It is highly likely that there existed a school bell prior to 1791, as the school was founded in 1711, and the original buildings were rebuilt in 1791. It should be remembered that in April 1791 Napoleon was appointed an officer in the French artillery; Captain Nelson was unemployed until he received a Mediterranean command in 1793; Mozart and Haydn were composing music; Wordsworth was 21; and the first convicts had just settled in Botany Bay.

A new bell was made by Hogan Brothers who have a foundry near Kelham Island in Sheffield, to replace the broken one. This time the bell was made of bronze, and was dedicated in October 1986, in plenty of time for the following year's Shrove Tuesday custom. The Earl of Scarborough, Chairman of the Ellis Trustees handed over the new bell to the Headteacher for safe keeping. At the same time the housing for the bell was moved to the rear of the school so that the children could see it and hear it...and ring it every Shrove Tuesday. Long may the custom continue...but do the children still have the afternoon off to enjoy their pancakes?

SHOULD CHILDREN BE SEEN AND NOT HEARD?

It will be no secret to most members of All Saints Church, that I see one of the many aspects of my role as Headteacher of the Church School, as looking after the interests of children (and not just those who , attend our school), in the life of the Church, and particularly trying to ensure that they are actively involved in Worship.

Sometimes, I find it would be useful to be in two places at once - one of these occasions was on Sunday 20 December, when it was necessary for me to attend the Main Morning Service at the Cathedral, as the School's Christmas Crib was being used in the Service, and some of our children were taking part; this meant that I had to miss All Saints Christingle Service.

However, I found that the Sermon preached at the Cathedral by the Provost, the Revd. John Gladwin. absolutely superb, and I enjoyed discussing it with him afterwards. John is extremely happy for me to quote some of the points which he made, in this article.

Firstly he made the point that the connecting theme of his service was children. The crib Service which was being held to celebrate the birth of the child -Jesus, had involved a goodly participation by children. But it was a service for everyone - not a service just for children. The child Jesus brings all of us to God, adults and children alike. Children experience the Love of God just as much as adults do.

Christmas is one of the two most important Christian Festivals, which adults and children alike celebrate. As adults we cannot worship the child Jesus at Christmas and then behave as if children cannot and do not experience the Love of God. It is vital that we allow children to show us the Love of God in their lives, by being involved in worship.

John sees the importance of children being seen to participate in the celebration of Christmas at the Cathedral, but he believes that children must be allowed to share in the Ministry at all times as well as Christmas. Is is because of this belief that he chooses to use the Crib figures made by children for their Service and display, rather than commercially made ones.

We talk about children being seen and not heard, but as adults we do need to hear and see what children have to share with us. All of us have the child in us, we have all been children and we should not loose our childhood but let it become part of our adult life.

Being a gifted Preacher, John put over these points much better than I have done here. On behalf of the children who are members of All Saints, can I please ask those whose childhood is in the past to accept our children's participation in our life and worship. We should question the pattern of our worship, our services should be for everyone and include a contribution from all age-ranges.

However, it is important that the children do their part, they must be seen and heard in the right way, they should show their respect for the other members of the congregation by trying very hard to be reverent in worship, and not to rampage around the Church.

Parents, it is important that you teach your children to behave in an appropriate way - they are not born knowing how to worship anymore than they are born knowing how to use a knife and fork. They have to be taught this along with everything else. I say this, not only as someone who has spent 21 years teaching 4 - 11 year olds, but as a mother who can remember all the joys and tribulations of bringing up children - including teaching their appropriate behaviour for worship.

OUR CHURCH SCHOOL

On the LEA Closure list again....not if I can help it! Most of you will now know that we appear on the

latest list of possible Schools to be closed in 1994. Our Governors have met, and our parents are currently meeting, to decide on the way forward. We can either -

- a) Do nothing, and see our staff and pupils scattered all over the city without any quarantee of a place in a Church School. This we surely cannot think of.
- b) Form an Action Committee and put together publicity material, petition forms, posters, etc. and encourage everyone to write letters to MPs and the LEA, in the hope of persuading them to think again.
- c) Continue to apply for Grant Maintained Status. This will, if accepted, give us funding from London, and could result in our being better off financially.

I think you would all wish us to pursue options b) & c). At heart, we would all like to have local funding and local LEA support and accountability. However, if Sheffield LEA won't look after our interests, then, in order to keep our CHURCH School open, we will have to seek national funding, and hope and pray that the Government will keep their Election promise to give parents "Choice in Diversity" for their children.

Please do all in your power to ensure that Totley All Saints School continues to stay open and provide the kind of Christian education that the parents of (at the moment) over 115 children feel is important. Keep up the good work!



TOWARDS A NEW DAWN (Or is it to be the Knacker's Yard?)



During May 1992. I was given the opportunity to address the congregation at the 10.00 am service to explain a little of the workings of the Church Urban fund, and the Bishops Appeal.

I gave 3 examples of ways in which money, given under these 2 funds was being used in our diocese and elsewhere, to help the unemployed.

Since I spoke to you, the situation has become much worse. Unemployment is still rising, mortgage repossessions continue and more businesses have gone into liquidation.

Government figures for the unemployed admit to a total of 3 millions, and if the method of computation for 1979 is used, the figure is more like 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ millions. Among that number, are a great many who have not worked for more than a year, apart from all the young persons who may go through adulthood without ever working. When I left school, the problem wasn't finding a job, but which one to choose! Obtaining a degree no longer carries the bonus of almost certain employment. It has been suggested that 1993 will be the worst year ever, for graduate unemployment.

We are now witnessing the evolution in Britain of an underclass, without hope, for whom the notion of low tax economy has no meaning. (incedentally, the low tax economy is a myth, with the massive increases in VAT, and another rumoured for the next Budget among other indirect taxes, we now pay more in percentage terms, per capita , than in 1979)



I have been made redundant more than once, but I always managed to find work quickly. The situation was different then, we actually had a manufacturing base left in this country. It is no surprise to find that for the first time in our history, we actually import more manufacturing goods than we export. For a trading nation, that is the road to disaster! Although, after redundancy, I was always quickly re-employed, I have experienced a little of the anguish it brings. But I can only guess at the scale of bewilderment, deprivation and depression, caused by family breakdown, or having to survive in one room because of mortgage re-possession; even leading to suicide in some cases, as a result of long term unemployment.

During the last election campaign Neil Kinnock said "It's not the soap boxes people stand on that matter, but the cardboard boxes they live in".

Somewhat earlier, Norman Lamont said "Unemployment is a price well worth paying to reduce inflation".

Surely this was one of the most callous statements ever made, by a government minister. How would he and his family manage on £70 + per week I wonder?

Much easier still, before the '39 - '45 war, I believe the great Mahatma Gandhi on being asked by a western news reporter, "What do you think of western civilisation?" replied, "I think it would be a good idea". What would he say today I wonder?

The Church is someway into its' Decade of Evangelism, what a powerful example, and a major act of outreach, if the Church could harness its considerable influence and energies in this Decade of Evangelism, to redress the ravages caused by unemployment. Again I go back to Gandhi, when confronted by a Christian evangelist, he said something like, "Before talking to my people of the Bread of Heaven, give them bread for their bellies". To paraphrase Mr Lamomt, surely a little higher taxation is a price well worth paying, to reduce employment.

Those of us fortunate to be in employment, should be happy to pay more in direct taxation, to enable the Government to provide more funds for the local government, Health & Social Security services, and to stimulate investment in training, retraining and education.

Surely the failed experiment of the British version of Reaganomics is at an end. The notion that persons who have more disposable income as a result of favourable direct tax allowances, would allow the extra money to "trickle down" to the poor and deprived is almost laughable, human nature doesn't work like that! Where are the long heralded "Green Shoots" of a resurgent economy? Now is the time for the great body of the laity in the Church to take the initiative, instead of leaving such issues to our Archbishops, Bishops and Senior Laity.

For the love of God, is there anyone out there who will join with me and write to our MP Irving Patnick, John Major and Gillian Shepherd — the Employment Secretary, in an attempt to make this the principle issue during the coming twelve months and beyond.

We have seen the popular groundswell of sympathy that can be generated by an obvious injustice, and here I refer to the threatened colliery closures, and how such pressure can force Government to think again. Maybe from such small beginnings at All Saints, Totley, we can stir this same national conscience and generate pressure that Government cannot ignore.

Perhaps you will consider this just "pie in the sky", idealism, that is your prerogative, but I wonder how many more of us will have to be consigned to the social knackers yard, before we wake up to the realisation that we are verging on a permanently divided Britain?.......Robin Carter

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A recent study of roads and traffic conditions in E.E.C. countries including Britain, Germany, France and Italy showed that conditions in Britain always came bottom. So reports the Institute of Advanced Motorists. Among other matters, the study looked at vehicle speeds.

"The people carrying out the study on Motorways were alarmed by the speed of traffic and the variations in the speed of commercial vehicles. both of which contribute to accidents congestion."

"The study showed that 84% of large commercial vehicles travel between 76 and 83 mph - except up any sort of gradient; then speeds drop to 30 to 50 mph and many then overtake, forcing other traffic into the third lane or, in the case of many roads with only two lanes in each direction, causing traffic jams. This means that commercial vehicles are underpowered or possibly overloaded."

"The study showed that 93% of cars travel at between 85 and 94 mph on motorways, whilst coaches average 80 to 90 mph."

"Accidents become inevitable with these speeds. the volume of traffic and other factors peculiar to Britain."

"THE UNITY OF THE SPIRIT IN THE BOND OF PEACE"

I'm haunted by some awkwardly phrased lines from the 17th Century poet, George Herbert:

But thou wilt sin and grief destroy That so the broken bones may joy, And tune together in a well-set song Full of his praises Who dead men raises

Fractures well cured make us more strong" and by the phrase Paul uses when, in writing to the Ephesians, he begs them "to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace".

George Herbert brings us an Easter message. It is because God has raised our Lord Jesus Christ from the dead, because we dare to call the Friday on which He died "Good Friday" that the hope that "broken bones may joy" is not just a mindless optimism. Joyfully we serve and trust the God who brings to both the world and the Church light and life and healing.

St. Paul is trying to explain to the local Church at Ephesus, (and so to every Church) how God's purpose and plan for the healing and unity of humanity is rooted in their life together. This is spelt out in Chapter 4:1-16. We can "grow up into him who is the head, into Christ" (v.15) because "grace was given to each of us" (v.8) "for building up the body of Christ" (v.12). But none of this can happen if we are not leading a life "worthy of the calling to which you have been called" (v.1). And that means "patience", "forbearing one another in love", and being "eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (v.2-3).

Always amongst Christians there has been a tension between those who want a "broad" Church in which God's grace can slowly transform most sinners into saints and those who want an ethically and theologically correct "Church of the Saints". In Ephesians Paul is clearly a "broad Church" man. And he recognises that this makes it hard to



"maintain the unity of the Spirit". Clearly this is a supernatural unity maintained, between those of different nationalities and different understandings of what Christ has done for them, by grace showing itself in that "forbearing one another in love" of which he speaks. The "unity in the Spirit" is that unity which makes it possible to speak of the "One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church".

Both St. Paul and George Herbert speak to the needs and condition of the Church of England today. By St. Paul we are reminded first that the "unity of the Spirit" within the Church is something of a pre-condition of the going forward of God's saving work in the world. It is tragic that so often in the past comparatively trivial matters like the date of Easter or the precedence of Bishops have broken that unity with appalling long term consequences. But we also learn from Paul that the maintenance of the 'unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace' is no easy or simple task. It needs in us heroic and supernatural virtues!

And George Herbert gives us great encouragement. For out of division and hurt can come a greater good. "Fractures well cured make us more strong".

My faith in the Risen Christ:

"Strengthened by having bowed to death,

By having burst the grave"


gives me courage to believe that, if we are willing to "forbear one another in love" (making allowances for one another because you love one another), the Church of England can be a place from which can be seen to shine that "unity of the Spirit which is the bond of peace".

CHURCH CHARITY THAT HELPS PEOPLE IN POVERTY IN ATTERCLIFFE DEANERY

Attercliffe Deanery Aid is a small charity that gives grants and second hand furniture to people in the Deanery of Attercliffe, and which aims to publicise their needs, so that they are not forgotten. It was set up by Revd. David Thomas in 1988, but it is not solely an Anglican venture, it has the active support of Roman Catholics, Methodists and the Salvation Army.

People are referred to ADA by agencies such as Social Services, Health Visitors, Advice Centres, and, though rarely, clergy. ADA will only give grants or goods where people have tried the DSS and the Local Authority first. We find that there are huge gaping holes in the "safety net" of provision by central and local government. People come to ADA because they do not have the basic necessities for daily life: cookers, beds, etc and sometimes money for food.



The needs of the people who come to ADA are always greater that the resources we have. Currently we give grants amounting to approximately £600 per month. We do need more money. We particularly value regular monthly giving by covenant, even if it is only a very small amount each month. It helps us to know how much we can expect to give each month, and because we are a registered charity we can claim back income tax on covenanted donations. Please consider helping ADA.

St. Alban's Church School at Wickersley near Rotherham has for several years been involved in a local history project and has collected a large number of old photographs which depict village life over the years. Amongst other things, the school has organised the transfer of Parish Records onto computer disc, and pupils have interviewed a number of elderly residents, and have tape-recorded their memories of Wickersley during the years of this century. ALL SAINTS' SCHOOL FIGHTS CLOSURE PLAN



By now many of you will know that Sheffield Education Authority has proposed the closure of our school, along with 15 others in the City. You will, of course, be aware of the fact that All Saints' is the only Church of England Aided School in the whole of the South West of the City. We have pupils not only from Totley but all areas in the South-West.

The School had been identified by the Sheffield Diocesan Board of Education as their priority project for expansion because of its growing success in attracting pupils. In October 1992 a plan had been submitted to the Department for Education for building development, and this was supported by the Local Education Authority.

Following its announcement in January, the staff, governors and parents are fighting the closure proposal. We are also considering the possibility of applying for Grant Maintained Status.

We have received letters from many people, including messages of support from the Bishop, from many Churches in the South-West (Anglican and other denominations) including the Cathedral, from the local M.P.Irvine Patnick, Councillor David Heslop, the Liberal Democrats, and the Tottey Residents Association. One of the encouraging aspects has been the number of ex-pupils who have contacted me - some from many miles away - after seeing the School featured on B.B.C. "Look North".

We have a very active group of people working for the future of the School, and they are certainly maintaining a very high profile. At the time of writing a group of parents are due to appear on a Y.T.V. Discussion Programme, a 5 year old pupil is to hand over letters from the children to the Prime Minister, and some of our pupils are to lead all the processions at the Civic Service at Sheffield Cathedral to celebrate the City's Centenary.



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

Dear Friends.

A small group of interested folk from our congregation met with me to talk about, and then pray about, the issue of healing in the ministry at All Saints. We shared experiences from other Churches as well as what had been a previous practice here. It became very clear that we should proceed slowly and carefully, because there was plenty of evidence that where a congregation had rushed into one or more aspects of the healing ministry it had eventually floundered. Five of us were challenged on this at a recent Shared Ministry Conference where a go-ahead Huddersfield Parish had taken nearly three years to set up what was now a much-valued shared healing ministry.

I am not suggesting that we should take three years here, but following private discussions with a number of clergy involved in the healing ministry, with their lay folk, it has become clear to me that two things are needed, namely ...

- A team of lay folk who feel called to this ministry of healing; who feel that God has given them some gift in this area. So, I ask that each one of you should pray about this and then, say between now and Easter either have a chat with me or write a few lines in a letter to me. I have already received one or two, so please don't feel that your contribution is unimportant.
- 2. Having got a team together, some basic training seems to be required, so that we together study and pray about what it is that God wants us to do here, in the total ministry of healing.

Above all, we must never loose sight of the truth that it is GOD who heals, and we are simply humble instruments to be used by Him May God guide us all in this vital work for Him,

P.C.C. UPDATE AIMS AND OBJECTIVES A short Report from the January meeting

We gave the entire meeting a consideration of the statements and suggestions submitted from the Autumn series of House Meetings. It was agreed that certain of the suggestions could more easily be dealt with by the various existing Committees, viz: Mission, Fabric, Pastoral Care. It became clear that we needed to form a Worship Committee. as well as provide a forum for children and vouth workers to meet from time to time. The Vicar was asked to chair these. It was agreed that all Committee meetings could be 'open' to members of the congregation who might have a particular interest in the items being discussed. A list of Key Words seemed to come out of those House Groups: -

TOLERANCE - less selfishness over forms of services, etc.

FRAGMENTATION - we need to aim to draw closer together.

WELCOMING & FRIENDLY - to each other and to less regular attenders.

GENUINE - we need to be ourselves. COMMUNICATION - needs to be improved at all points.

TEACHING - our faith is central to all our concerns.

From our meeting, we agreed to select TOLERANCE as being our Key Word for Lent. (How are we getting on with that, I ask?) We then seemed to b left with a clear set of AIMS AND OBJECTIVES:-

- To understand the Christian faith better
- To show concern for non-Christian members of our family
- To develop the worship at All Saints
- To encourage a deeper knowledge of the Bible
- To create a social policy for All Saints
- To improve our communications (externally and internally)

We thank you all for your valued contributions to those House Meetings, and we trust that you feel w are taking your suggestions seriously.

OVERWHELMING VOTE FOR ALL SAINTS' SCHOOL

The ballot, conducted by the Electoral Reform Society, for the parents to make their decision about whether to proceed with opting for Grant Maintained Status, produced a remarkable result. There was a 98% turn out with 98% of those votes going in favour of opting for Grant Maintained Status. The Department for Education (Schools Branch) have stated that statistically this is the best result ever achieved in a school ballot throughout the country.

This was a tremendous vote of confidence in our School and all it offers to our pupils. The parents are clearly united in support of the School and are working enthusiastically together to produce a successful outcome and to secure the long-term future of the School.

The vote means the School's application for Grant Maintained Status can now be submitted for a Government decision, but in the meantime we still continue to contest Sheffield L.E.A.'s local decision to put the School on its closure list and thereby remove the choice of a Church Aided School education for pupils living in the South West sector of the City.

Those of you who attended the recent Consultation Meeting will remember that the main argument put forward by the Sheffield L.E.A. Officers for closure was that other schools in the area had surplus places. They accepted that All Saints' School was popular and full but they felt by closing the School and distributing the pupils to other schools it would solve the problem of their surplus places. As you can imagine it was not an argument that found favour with those present!

We are grateful for your continuing prayers and support for the School. You are also welcome to join us for our <u>Easter Service</u> on Tuesday 6th. April at 9.30am in the School Hall. We are delighted that the Bishop of Sheffield will be present at that Service and then spending the rest of the morning in School.

CATHEDRALS AND CHURCHES

It would be difficult to find any of either of the above that do not have at least one distinctive feature that delights and endears, be it Salisburys 360 foot spire. Durhams mighty tower, or the tiled patterned roof with the Imperial Austrian Double Eagle theron, and for good measure it's 445 foot spire of St Stephens cathedral in Vienna. Not all churches, cathedrals were built to the glory of GOD, some were built as a thanks giving to THE LORD. St Charles church in Vienna, commemorates the ending of the plague. 

Our Schools

All Saints School clearly provides a much valued service, and is the choice of a number of parents both within and outside our parish. Christian parents have not only a right but a duty to ensure that their children receive a Christian education. We must not act, however, as if this is only provided by a Church of England school. Our children also learn of God and His love through Sunday School, perhaps most importantly through home life but also in state schools. Our older daughter frequently comes out with things she has learned, stories she has been told and songs she has sung during religious education or assemblies at Totley County Primary School. This, we should add, is not dry knowledge taught divorced from application to everyday life. We were deeply touched to learn that her whole class had prayed for her sister while she was critically ill in hospital. Christianity is seen in action in all sorts of places, and we must show proper appreciation for the rôle of Christian teachers in state schools – who, we perhaps should add, are represented in our own congregation.

KESTON COLLEGE


As a Church, All Saints has for many years set apart 10% of its income to support various worthwhile causes, from local to international. was discussed at a PCC meeting (which determines which causes to support and by how much) that information should be put in the All Saints News as to what some of these causes do. This is the first of such articles, and the subject is Keston College, so named because its HO are in an old College building at Keston Kent. It originally came into being through the efforts of the Rev. Michael Bourdeaux, who visited Russia in the 50's or 60's and found the Church very suppressed. He agreed to try and be the Voice in the free world for the suppressed church, eventually obtaining the use of Keston college where archives were built up containing information on persecution of people for religious beliefs, and copies of all "underground" Church and Christian publications (called samizdat) printed on secret presses in Russia and other Communist countries.

Keston college gained a high reputation for this, supplying information to the media and various authorities. Lists of people imprisoned, their sentences, etc. were supplied to supporters for prayer support. Communist governments became very conscious of world opinion, some sentences cut by early release, or improvement in the treatment of prisoners resulted. Most of all, the Christians under these conditions knew they had a voice which was being heard in the world; they were not abandoned, alone. This work continued for years; we have supported Keston from this period.

Then came the sudden collapse of the European Communist systems and, with it, a sudden collapse of Kestons income as supporters obviously thought that Keston's work was done. Actually however, Keston was in a unique position to help the Churches in ex-Communist lands, due to its intimate knowledge and contacts. The Churches there are in great need due to several factors, the economic and organisational collapse and chaos in the countries, the lack of Church 'Charity' organisations and staff with know-how, because such had been forbidden and non existent for 70 years.


Despite Kestons own cash crisis, they opened an office in Moscow with minimum staff. The office (not yet in a permanent home) is being widely used as a source of advice and a key channel of communication with other Christian groups working in Moscow. Thames Television used the office to guide and help them this February in making their films on religious life in the former Soviet Union.

Besides wanting to develop the Moscow office, Keston are trying (as yet unsuccessfully), to sell the premises in Kent and consolidate their research and records at Oxford, where they will be far more conveniently available to students, both from exconveniently available to students studying religious persecution in other lands. The records of the Churches under Communism have a great deal to teach, help and encourage others currently suffering persecution. This is a very strategic and vital work which we, in our freedom and multitude of helpful Christian organisations, cannot support too much. D Nixon

People of the Cross and Resurrection



The Bishop of Doncaster writes:

The phrase "a symbol of the opposite" appears in the last line of a poem by Maurice West in a book called New Christian Poetry. The poem, about the Cross, ends with the words

"An instrument of death became a symbol of the opposite"

Make no mistake, the symbol we place in our churches and round our necks is a miniature of death. It depicts a place of punishment and the end of life.

Why is Jesus on this instrument of death? The simplest way of expressing it is by the words 'to bring us to God'. The clear testimony of Scripture, tradition and of countless lives confidently affirms...'He died to bring us to God'.

"Through the Son, God decided to bring the whole universe back to himself. God made peace through his Son's sacrificial death on the cross, and so brought back to himself all things both on earth and in heaven" (Colossians 1: 20)

To those who can see it a remarkable change takes place. The place of death becomes the place of life, our life, all life. The Cross is a symbol of the opposite, of life coming from death, hope from despair, triumph from failure, love from hate and a new beginning from a sad and painful end.

It is this life from death that is proclaimed in our Easter worship. We join together in the centuries old cry 'The Lord is Risen, He is Risen indeed!' The message from the empty tomb, 'He is not here; he has been raised, just as he said' rings out from the past and comes to us afresh this Easter-tide, so that we can worship and serve him joyfully and willingly as the people of the cross and resurrection.

As people of the cross and resurrection we are called by the risen Christ to proclaim, live and share in the truth that in all kinds of ways, and in all kinds of circumstances the truth of life from death, hope from despair and new beginnings from sad and painful endings is real and possible.

The Holy Week and Easter story is not only the inspiration for personal faith and corporate worship, it must also be the inspiration for mission. People of the cross and resurrection are a missionary people, for God is a missionary God.

In a way Daphne and myself have been going through a death of the familiar and the beginning of the unknown as we left Chester and came to this Diocese. We are tremendously grateful therefore for the warmth of the welcome we have received, the practical help that we have been given and above all the prayers of so many people. We look forward to getting to know you and to sharing with you in your worship and mission as people of the cross and resurrection.

May all of us come to know in a deeper way the love and presence of the risen Christ this Easter time.

"They want your Trade, Not your Charity"

"After my father died and before I got a job in the garments factory my family often went without enough to eat. I have to work very long hours, but at least it gives some hope...a feeling of self-respect. With my wages I have bought food for my sister's baby and tin sheets to keep the rain out of our house'.

Garments worker, Bangladesh

We've heard of the poverty trap, but many poor countries are caught in a trade trap - they are encouraged to earn their keep, then the rich countries apply high import tariffs on their products.

For a number of reasons, clothes and textiles have provided a ladder out of the trade trap. They now account for over a quarter of Third World manufacturing exports, compared to less than 5% for the rich countries. But barriers to this trade cost the Third World \$50 billion a year - nearly as much as all Western aid put together.

Imports from Third World countries are blamed for redundancies in the British clothing industry, yet 80% of textile imports come from other rich countries. Three Weeks in Pakistan

SINCE MOVING TO ROTHERHAM IN 1985, Matthew Joy, Vicar of Masbrough, Rotherham, has wanted to visit Pakistan, homeland of many people who live in the parish.

Earlier this year the chance came. A local

headteacher, Les Shaw, was planning a visit. The help of Rotherham Councillor Nazir Ahmed was enlisted as guide and interpreter. With support from Bishop David and the Church Missionary Society the journey began. Matthew gives his impressions of the Church of Pakistan...

"The first place we visited was Lahore, where we had a long conversation with the Bishop, and visited one of the Cathedral schools.

LASTING MEMORIES

Most of the Pakistanis in Rotherham originate from Mirpur in Azad Kashmir, and we spent a most memorable week there in an area which has very few christians. One lasting memory will be the visit, after a three hour drive, to a Roman Catholic family who proclaimed their faith with a large cross on the front of their house - they were the only christians for perhaps 60 or 70 miles around. The priest visited them once a month.

Whilst we were going to visit a house which belonged to a Rotherham family, even though they weren't there, someone recognised me, and the word went round "Father Joy is here", and about a dozen people appeared, all of whom knew me from Masbrough.

WEEKEND

Then on to Islamabad and Rawalpindi Unlike the weekend in England, in Pakistan it is on Thursday and Friday. Since many people are not at work or school on

Fridays, many churches hold services on that day as well as Sundays. I was able to attend an English Communion one Friday morning in a new church in Islamabad. It had been opened only three months before.

In Rawalpindi I was privileged to have two fascinating conversations with the Revd. Dr. Charles Amjid Ali, a very dynamic intellectual scholar at the Christian Study Centre. He is internationally known, and last year was the first black visiting professor at Stellenbosch University in South Africa.

Whilst we were there, we also visited Taxila, an ancient city of Buddhist origin, which St. Thomas is reputed to have visited on his way to South India.

SUNDAY COMMUNION AFTER WORK

Finally Les and I went to Multan, a place full of Islamic religious shrines. We stayed there with the Bishop and his family. The Sunday Communion in the Cathedral was a very moving occasion, at 4.30 p.m. after work and school, being attended by nearly two hundred people of all ages. The service was of course said and sung entirely in Punjabi.

Christians in Pakistan need our prayers; they feel very isolated in an Islamic society, and are constantly afraid that persecution is just around the corner. But Nazir pointed out to me that Muslims in England feel exactly the same! It makes you think!"

The Family Mediators Association

was set up to provide a much needed opportunity for divorcing couples to work with a solicitor and counsellor, to sort out all the matters arising from divorce. This includes financial arrangements, disposal of property and equally important, sensitive consideration of issues around the children.

The gains from this method of resolving family disputes are immeasurable:

- 1. Both partners involved are present, so it is more efficient. No more expensive solicitors' letters to gather information.
- Recognition can be given to the couple's distress, freeing them to be calmer when making important decisions about their future.
- Financial advice is available from the solicitor partner.
- Future life decisions will be easier because of the more thorough ground work laid at this crucial turning point in their lives.

This is not a free service. Couples are asked to pay for each session, on average four. Although the overall cost might be as much as £400 per person, this is very much cheaper than the average cost of £1500 per person that is charged by traditional solicitors. Another consideration is that Legal Aid cover is being significantly reduced after April 1993, so the rates at which solicitors charge will rise, at present they are kept down as legal aid cases are charged at a lower rate.

Family Mediation arises out of a desire to negotiate with compassion and forgiveness, rather than use a more adverserial approach so common in the courts. It is advisable for couples to cover themselves legally by employing their own solicitors to check over their agreement for their own protection. Apart from this there is no need for separate representation.

Divorce is with us, we cannot ignore it. This is an opportunity to make it more bearable for all concerned.

A PARABLE FOR 1993 (TAKEN FROM 'CHAPTER & VERSE' - SHEFFIELD CATHEDRAL MAGAZINE)

'On a dangerous sea coast where shipwrecks often occur there was a crude little lifesaving station. The building was just

a hut, and there was only one boat — but the few devoted members kept a constant watch over the sea, and with no thought for themselves went out day and night tirelessly searching for the lost.

So many lives were saved by this wonderful little station that it became famous. Some of those who were saved, and various others in the surrounding area, wanted to become associated with the station and give their time, money and effort for the support of its work. New boats were bought and new crews trained. The little lifesaving station grew.

Some of the members of the lifesaving station were not happy that the building was so crude and poorly equipped. They felt that a more comfortable place should be provided as the first refuge for those saved from the sea. So they replaced the emergency cots with beds and put better furniture in the enlarged building. Now the lifesaving station became a popular gathering place for its members. and they decorated it beautifully and furnished it exquisitely, because they used it as a sort of club. Fewer members were now interested in going to sea on lifesaving missions, so they hired a lifeboat crew to do this work. The lifesaving motif still prevailed in this club's decoration. and there was a liturgical lifeboat in the room where the club initiations were held. About this time a large ship was wrecked off the coast, and the hired crews brought in boatloads of cold wet and half-drowned people.

They were dirty and sick, and some of them had black skin and some of them had yellow skin. The beautiful new club was in chaos. So the property committee immediately had a shower house built outside the club where the victims of shipwrecks could clean up before coming inside.

At the next meeting, there was a split in the club membership. Most of the members wanted to stop the club's lifesaving activities, because they were an unpleasant hindrance to the normal social life of the club. Some members insisted upon lifesaving as their primary purpose and pointed out that they were still called a lifesaving station. But they were finally voted down and told that if they wanted to save the lives of all the various kinds of people who were shipwrecked in those waters, they could begin their own lifesaving station down the coast. They did.

As the years went by, the new station experienced the same changes that occurred in the old. It evolved into a club, and yet another lifesaving station was founded. History continued to repeat itself, and if you visit the sea coast today, you will find a number of exclusive clubs along that shore. Shipwrecks are frequent in those waters, but most of the people drown....

I hope that the above parable speaks to us all. pray that the mission of the Church, will flourish. Pray that God will show us best how this can be done, and how we may be faithful to our calling to Mission and Worship......Christopher Smith (Many thanks to John Collie for supplying this article)

It was great fun! Some of the children wobbled a bit while they were hoping. They had to use their arms to help them balance.



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

FROM THE VICAR

RESURRECTION LIVING

Dear Friends,

What a marvellous Easter day! Despite the damp climate, we had a record number of Communicants, and it was particularly encouraging to see many families celebrating our Lord's Resurrection. For me, it was the most Joyful worship of my whole ministry. Thank you to all who helped to make it so.

I spent Easter Monday in our garden, until a thunderstorm drove me into the greenhouse, so we now have all our broad and runner beans potted up. Gardens and Easter go together. It was in a garden that Jesus made His first Resurrection appearance to Mary Magdalene. However, He didn't linger in the garden, He urged Mary to go and convey the good

news to the disciples.

It is right and wonderful in our minds to visit that Easter Garden and worship our Risen Lord, but we musn't linger too long 'in the garden lest we become sentimental about the Easter event. The Gospel story we considered on Easter Day (which John included in his Gospel to underline the reality of Christ's Resurrection) ends with a clear commission from Jesus to Peter to "Feed my sheep". Similarly, there is urgent pastoral work for us to do for our Risen Lord in this Parish. We re-commissioned a team of Visitors on Pastoral Link Sunday last month, but there is still need for more folk to accept Christ's commission.

You/We may not be able to write like John; you/we may not be able to go top the ends of the earth like Paul; but like Peter, each one of us must, in our own way, feed Christ's sheep who have gone astray. The Christian family will never grow in Totley if we simply sit back and hope for a

miracle without us getting involved.

May God enable each one of us to experience the joi and strength of the <u>living</u> Resurrection


GREEN OAK VIEW.

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UNFAIR CRITICISM?

My first reaction when reading the letter from Beth and Chris Booth in last month's magazine was a feeling of sadness and hurt, but at that time I didn't consider that it was my responsibility to respond to it - after all it wasn't from the Head of Totley County School.

However after a conversation with Beth and Chris in which I asked them in what way we have not acted "in an honest and fair way" and how in our protest to keep Totley All Saints School open we have "implicitly denigrated other schools in the process", I was told that what I have written in defence of All Saints School had done this. I have re-read all the articles which I have written and cannot find anything which should be interpreted in that way. If others can point out to me the relevant sections I would be grateful and more than ready to apologise for any pain or offence. In the light of these remarks I now feel that it is my responsibility to respond!

Apparently John Hoare (Diocesan Director for Schools) also caused great offence by his sermon in support of church schools when he preached on Education Sunday. I think it is a sad state of affairs if the Diocesan Director cannot speak with any enthusiasm about church schools in a parish which has one of its own.

On no occasion have I or John Hoare said that there are no Christian teachers in county schools. Indeed for thirteen of my twenty one years as a teacher or headteacher I worked in county schools and do not consider that I was a poorer Christian. John Hoare was the head of a county school before taking up his present post. Perhaps it is because we have had experience of working in church and non-church schools that we speak as we do.

I can certainly appreciate the feeling of freedom one has as a Christian working in a church school environment compared with how I felt when working in a county school, although I was always fortunate to be in schools where there were other Christian staff. It would be naive to pretend that it is the same religious environment for staff or children in what are different categories of school. That is why it is important to fight to retain the choice. Far from denigrating Christian teachers in county schools I appreciate the difficult position in which they find themselves and I have helped to support them through my membership of the Education Committee of the Sheffield Council of Churches. as we have held day conferences to offer support to Christian teachers, and to Christian governors in county schools.

During the campaign to save All Saints school we have been very careful not to mention other schools. It is our fight against the city council and has little to do with other schools. Sadly last month's letter has re-opened wounds of two years ago, inflicted during the upset of the proposed amalgamation of All Saints School and Totley County School as a church school. It was because of all the hurt at that time that we had been anxious to fight the city council and no one else. All Saints school needs the love and support of the church to which it belongs at this difficult time. Please remember this in your prayers.



From The Bishop of Sheffield

Bad Business



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"Just listen to me" said the crafty Dutchman to the King, "and we will both grow rich". The King - Charles I - listened and the levels of Hatfield Chase were drained. The result was a disaster for everyone. The King lost his lands, the Dutchman went bankrupt. No one asked the advice of the people who lived there. For centuries they had peaceably made skilful use of the rivers, lakes, meadows and woods of the "Royal Forest" and now they were robbed of homes and livelihood.

"Just listen to me" said the Mining Expert to the village Squire, "and we will both grow rich". And, alas, the landowners of South Yorkshire listened. There was coal under their land and would not the steamships of the world always need British Coal? In the 20th Century as in the 17th the result was a disaster. The newcomers who flocked to the new mining villages found few of their hopes fulfilled. Stainforth, Armthorpe and Moorends were never quite Eldorado or even the Klondyke. And, again, no one thought of asking the people who lived in these villages what they thought of the destruction of their communities. (Destruction too strong a word? Not really. Stainforth, Askern and Maltby in 1930 were utterly different from what they had been in 1910).

"Just listen to me" said the Privileged Electricity Generator to the Minister, "and we can all grow rich". And the Minister listened. "Close 31 pits, burn as much natural gas as was needed, import coal and French nuclear electricity (never mind the balance-of-payments) and miraculously we will all have cheap electricity". And what about the people of the mining villages of Hatfield Chase - Dunscroft, Stainforth, Moorends? Well, of course, in 1992, as in 1625 and 1910, no one seemed to think about them.

And outside those charmed decision-making circles of experts, economists and politicians, do we not all know the result will be another economic disaster and dearer, not cheaper, electricity?

"Just listen to me" said the Economist to the Politician, "and the whole country will grow rich. All we need is enough unemployment to ensure economic stability and prosperity".


And the Politicians listened. We have three million people being paid not to work. Does anyone now promise that this will ever grow more than marginally less? We are made for work and surely the world (and our own country) needs all the varied gifts and skills which God has given to the men and women He has made "in his image and after his likeness".

The disasters of 1625, 1910 and 1993 all shout the same message: People first! If the price of our present lifestyle is going to be even two million unemployed we have to say that it is too high a price. And if the politicians and economists murmur that it is inevitable then we will have to find new economists and new politicians.

SYNOD NEWS

Schools, Shares and S. America: Synod's Springtime Session

An in-depth look at the work of Sheffield Diocesan Board of Education: approval of a Parish Share system to replace present Quota and a guarded yes to linking with the Diocese of Argentina were among the items at Sheffield Diocesan Synod, meeting on a perfect Spring day at Treeton on March 6th, writes Revd. Roy Arnold, Sheffield Diocesan Communications Officer.



STRATEGIES FOR EDUCATION is the title of a new strategy document prepared by the Diocesan Board of Education and looking at the role of the Board, at current issues in the educational field, at religious education and worship in schools, at Government policy including opting out procedures. It was, in fact, this latter area which caused most comment in the debate which followed. On this issue the Board (to quote their report) "does not advocate one particular policy at this time for all its schools but will continue to seek to co-operate productively with the Local Education Authorities as equal partners in the promotion of education'. Some 7,000 children attend 45 C of E schools in the Diocese of Sheffield in five LEA areas. The Revd. Hilary Jowett (Ecclesall Deanery) was among those anxious about the ethical and equity angles of opting for Grant Maintained status. The Bishop welcomed the practicality of the document. "The day to day work of Education is not easy, particularly when some LEAs forget that there are Church Schools". Synod members received the Report and endorsed the nine proposals set out in the document. They went on to receive the FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT and to approve the 1993 BUDGET OF THE SOUTH YORKSHIRE ECUMENICAL COUNCIL.

TO FUND QUINQUENNIAL INSPECTIONS OF CHURCHES - the five-yearly checks on Church buildings - each parish is to be required to set aside sufficient sums (commencing with at least £100 this year) to pay the fees for professional surveys of the fabric of their church buildings as required under the Inspection of Churches Measure of 1955. From Church Plant (the buildings) to Church Planting (the people) Synod moved on to support a Motion from Tankersley Deanery to set up a Mission Extension Fund to be administered by the Mission and Unity Committee to encourage new initiatives (such as planting new church congregations in areas without Churches) within or between parishes.

A JOINT CONSULTANCY SCHEME has been set up for the clergy of Sheffield Diocese "a process whereby a person, with and through a consultant, is helped and encouraged to carry out self-appraisal of their role, function and performance in the work they do." Miss Sandra Newton and others gave a presentation about the Scheme which is free, voluntary, confidential, annual and skilled.



DIOCESAN QUOTA (it was agreed) is to be abolished and replaced with PARISH SHARE of 15% of parish recurring income plus PARISH MINISTRY CONTRIBUTION representing the cost to the Diocese of a parish's ministry less diocesan grant towards that cost. This was the scheme temporarily sent back to the drawing board by the November Synod. The Archdeacon of Doncaster said that since then the Finance Committee had met on various occasions. Now slightly modified the scheme was returned to Synod as "totally and utterly simple". The Archdeacon of Sheffield said that a national review of quota systems was under way and that "if a visionary new idea comes forward combining potential and justice" it would certainly be looked at. The Bishop said that increased clergy stipends in the future would have to be financed by the Diocese: that is the giving of the parishes. "We have got to face the fact that if we are going to have resident clergy (and properly paid) then each year quota (parish share) is going to go up more than it used to

ARGENTINA LINK. Synod members agreed (35 members in favour and 26 against) to the proposed Companion Dioceses Link between the Diocese of Sheffield and the Diocese of Argentina. Two days earlier the Anglicans of Argentina meeting at their Diocesan Council in Buenos Aires had also agreed to the Link which will be for five years and will operate on a budget of £5,000 per annum. As a tidying-up operation Synod members agreed that the four appointments of the DIOCESAN TRAINING TEAM (the Training Officer, the Children's Work Adviser, Youth Officer and Adult Education Officer) should all be authorised for five years as from September 1st, 1992, in other words bringing them all to a common starting point.

Revelations about new Bishop...

A congregation of some 2000 people at York Minster (on Tuesday March 2nd, 1993) heard fascinating revelations about the new Bishop of Doncaster, the Rt. Revd. Michael Gear. The beans were spilled by the Bishop of Chester, the Rt. Revd. Michael Baughen, in his sermon at the Minster service where Michael Gear was consecrated as Bishop. "Michael Gear is useless at do-it-yourself" said the Bishop of Chester "And he is a lover of Coca Cola and bananas".

Bishop Baughen has his inside information from having worked with Michael Gear over several years during which time Mr. Gear has been serving as Archdeacon of Chester. At his consecration he swapped his title from "Venerable" - the Church title of an Archdeacon - to that of "Right Reverend", the title of a Bishop in the Church of England.

Two Michaels were consecrated as Bishops at the service. Michael Gear to serve as Bishop of Doncaster and Michael Langrish to serve as Bishop of Birkenhead in the Diocese of Chester. It was another Michael - Michael Baughen - who preached and said "I think Michael must be the name of the month".

He spoke warmly of Michael Gear and said "He has a real love for people and for the Christian Gospel". It was, he said, a real privilege to serve as a Bishop and

to be able to take the Christian message to a very wide audience and to be "called to be a communicator". There would, he said, be times of frustration and a real need specially to make time for prayer and to take time off "time to put your official robes and put on your jeans". One special job of Bishops, he said, was to speak to people who felt outcasts and with the massive threatened loss of mining jobs in South Yorkshire and shipbuilding jobs at Cammell Laird in Chester Diocese and with 3 million unemployed, more and more people were feeling themselves to be outcasts. There was a need, therefore, to earth the Christian message in the realities of life and specially "to avoid mouthing words of love without any reality behind them."

The Bishop of Sheffield, the Rt. Revd. David Lunn and the Bishop of Chester presented the Bishop-elect to the Archbishop of York for Consecration.

On a cold grey day York Minster was filled to overflowing with friends and wellwishers of the two new Bishops. Folk had travelled from all parts of South Yorkshire, Cheshire and Coventry Diocese to attend the service which commenced with a procession of clergy from these three areas. There was a large gathering of Bishops present and the Bible readings were taken by the Bishop of Liverpool, the Rt. Revd David Shepherd and by the Bishop of Durham, the Rt. Revd. David Jenkins.

Bishop Michael and his wife Daphne were officially welcomed to the Diocese of Sheffield, at the Cathedral on the 11th March when people from all the parishes came together for a special service.

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

There are so many different languages in the world that even if we were very clever we couldn't hope to learn more than a few of them — but Jesus knows our language...he speaks everyone else's language too.


His gospel can be translated into every possible dialect and tongue because, whatever words are used, that gospel is the same. It is for all people — everywhere.


Jesus speaks to everyone in his own language.

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
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



At our memorial Service on June 27th we shall remember all recently bereaved families, together with the following from our Memorial Book:-







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EYES TO SEE

WHAT a miserable day! I'd planned to take the day off to paint the gutters of my house — and what happened? It rained. It didn't simply rain: the sky was overcast and it was pouring down. I abandoned my plans and set off for work; I was not in a good frame of mind.

Yet as I drove across our local Common I was overwhelmed by a sense of greenness. The rain had enhanced the colour of the trees. The sky was grey and the trees were rich shades of green. Suddenly life seemed so much better than it had a few minutes earlier:

My problem is very common: I'm inflexible and self-centred. If I'm going to be happy, then it's got to be on my terms. In the example above my happiness was dependent on painting gutters on a certain day, and having my plans disrupted made me unhappy.

My plans seemed more important than the opportunities for happiness that surrounded me. Viewed objectively this is both pathetic and very funny. All too often our happiness is marred by such trivial things.

As I drove across the Common I was filled with the realisation that God is good. A little earlier I had cursed the rain, but now I saw that it was good: it had given the trees the rich beauty that I was admiring.

God is good and so is the world that he created. By living blinkered lives we miss many of the opportunities that God gives us for happiness. Much of the pain and suffering we feel is selfinflicted.

If we hold on to the realisation that God is good and loves us, then we can understand our lives anew and find great joy in all that surrounds us.

The Bishop of Doncaster writes:

A Message from the Margins

Judging by the sale of books of prayers and poems, more and more people are turning to Celtic spirituality for their inspiration. The wise ones don't do it to escape from life as it is in the 1990's but because they are finding something there which seems to be of real value and importance for today's society and church. According to Ian Bradley's book, 'The Celtic Way', one of its attractions is that it was "environmentally friendly with positive attitudes to nature and constantly celebrating the good of creation". I can see how that rings bells with some of the important issues that are of real concern to our society, but I suspect we have more to rediscover from them than just a proper response to God's gift of and energising presence in his creation, crucially important as that may be,

What strikes me about Celtic spirituality was the lifestyle of those who produced it. In a very real way their lives were marked by an immense insecurity. They were very much people who lived on the edges of existence. They lived under the threat of powerful forces that they were powerless to defeat. They lived close to homelessness, poverty and hunger. More and more they became the people of the margins. Geographically on the margins of Britain, socially on the margins of influence and security. Yet out of this was forged a faith with a remarkable sense of hope, that grew out of a very deep awareness of the continuous presence of God in whom they had placed their trust.

"Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend or stranger."

These familiar words from Saint Patrick's breastplate which convey the sense of Christ's presence also point to another attractive and challenging part of their Christian way. This has been described as being "primarily concerned with relationships between people rather than seeing people as crowds to be organised".

I think I am beginning to understand the appeal of Celtic spirituality. As we live in a region that has its share of both green and pleasant land as well as communities passing through life on the margins, our worship, witness and mission can reflect the continuous presence and hope of Christ and the value and the quality of human relationships.

Such a spirituality emerged in spite of the conditions of their day, but perhaps more importantly, it emerged from and in the conditions of their day. And that really is a sign of hope.

He also participated in student missions from Oxford and Cambridge, giving extended Bible Studies which stretched the minds and stirred the imaginations of those who heard them.

It took time to get to know him, the gruff rather authoritarian exterior belied the deeply compassionate and honest man he was. He leaves a widow, Margaret, to whom he was happily married for almost 50 years, and a daughter, Lin.

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BEALING SUFFERING,

Thank you Terry for your thoughts on healing (All Saints News, May) which I read with interest. Yes, we should all have faith that The Lord can and does heal, but we must also remember that God's ways are far above our understanding, and His way of healing, may not be just to take away our aches and pains or more serious illnesses. Surely one way of looking at death itself is to see is as "the ultimate healing", yes God loves us, as he also loved his Son, but he did allow Jesus to suffer in order that His greater glory might be made manifest.

Saint Paul undoubtedly had great faith, but he prayed three times for physical healing and did not receive it. Yet Paul was spiritually healed and strengthened in that he was able to accept his physical weakness and put his trust in the strength of Christ (See 2 Corinthians 12 verses 7 - 10) "My grace is all you need, for my power is greatest when you are weak...For when I am weak, then I am strong".

Even though St Paul was not physically well, The Lord used him as a vessel through which others were healed, and Jesus promised that all of His disciples (ourselves included) would be able to perform wonders in His name. Let us pray that some of our number will receive the Holy Spirit and feel called to the ministry of healing in our church, and that we shall, indeed, witness miracles, but remember that healing occurs by the grace of God as well as by faith.

Let us also endeavour to be able to praise The Lord in all situations, trusting that whatever does or does not happen according to our wishes, it is all under the control of our loving Father, who uses joy, faith, love and suffering to reveal His purpose.



Birds of a Feather

The following article first appeared in the "Anglican Digest" at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, Greenboro, North Carolina. We are grateful for the observations of the ecclesiastical ornithologist accross the waters ...

Ecclesiasticus criticus.

This is a rather common species of bird that inhabits most parishes. It is a close cousin of the Ruffled Grouse because it is easily ruffled and makes grousing noises when disturbed. It rarely joins in the activity of the flock, but hops around on the edges and utters critical cries that sound something like, "Why-did-they- do-that?" or "They-should-do-something- about-it!" Sometimes it leaves the flock altogether, but sooner or later it turns up to utter its odd cries. Often it builds a well-feathered nest, and the other birds tend to respect it.



Gregarious conferencius.



This bird is attractive upon first sight. It likes to travel. It flits from flock to flock, and its favorite jaunt is the large bird conferences held throughout the country. It will often neglect its own nest and young to attend committee meetings, where it may chirp loudly about what it thinks, or thinks others should do. It becomes enthusiastic about group action, but never does anything because it is too

busy going to another gathering.

Pegasus fidelius.

This animal is not exactly a bird, but a relative of the horse family. It is distinguished by its rounded and worn back, deformed by its willingness to carry heavy burdens over the years. The female of the species predominates in



most parishes. It hardly ever utters a cry, but it is always found where the greatest amount of work needs to be done and carries more than its share of the burden. Great care must be taken of this useful creature, for its back can be broken by willingness. Cases have been known where one slight straw has broken the back of the willing pegasus fidelius. Once this happens, it never again assumes burdens but lives in quiet solitariness and moans, "I've-done-my-share."

Backward-looking-dodo

Though this bird is an odd creature, it is not a rare one. It is prevalent in parishes over 25 years old. Its head is turned backward most of the time-it wants to see where it has been. It is disturbed by changes. When other birds start to build nests, it gives great cries of alarm that sound like, "things-are-not-what-they-used-to-be." It lays no eggs, because that would change its life and cause it to look to the future. Some normal birds change into backward-looking dodos when they reach a certain age.



Dropit.



This bird has multiplied rapidly in the past generation. It lives mostly in the suburbs, and its principal activity seems to be dropping and picking up its young. As a result it seems to have developed an uncanny sense of timing. It can drop its young at a church and return an hour later to pick them up, with almost split-second accuracy and consume several cups of coffee in the meantime.

Loyalus laborus.

This bird provides basic structure in an otherwise flighty flock. It has no distinguishing call or markings, and is often mistaken for the common sparrow because of its humility and modesty.

While the rest of the flock flits here and there and leaves for warmer climates, the loyalus laborus stays put and pecks away at whatever needs to be done. If any attention is called to its work, it makes a chirping noise and quickly hides itself amongst other birds.

Some ecclesiastical ornithologists claim to have seen on occasions, a golden nimbus about its head.

'MUMMY! MUMMY!'

'MUMMY, mummy!' David pulled his mother's skirt and cried again: 'Mummy, mummy!' His mother continued her conversation — and David continued pulling at her skirt in the hope of receiving the attention he longed for.

He deserved immediate attention, didn't he? He was the centre of the universe and it was natural for everything to stop for him. Hopefully he cried again: 'Mummy...'. Before he could finish he was laughing and giggling: in an instant he had been lifted in the air, upended and was now dangling by his feet like a bat. He was now ecstatically happy.

My description of David is that of a fairly typical five year old child: demanding, clinging, and with an immense capacity for happiness.

'LOVE ME - NOW!'

As he pulled at his mother's skirt he felt increasingly unloved because he did not get the response he was demanding. Yet throughout her conversation she was aware of him: David was her child and she loved him deeply.

However, a child has to grow and gain increasing independence and freedom if it is to become a responsible and well-adjusted adult. Small children don't understand this and expect their slightest whims to be attended to by their parents.



Ultimately our response and responsibility to our children is to promote their long-term happiness.

In our relationships with God we are very similar to David. We all too often believe that God is there to smooth the way and tend to our smallest (and greatest) wants. If the response is not immediate we feel that God doesn't care or even that there isn't a God.

HOW GOD CARES

But this isn't true. God cares and loves us more than we can ever imagine, and it is our child-like perception that holds us back from recognising the greatness of his love.

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

Dear Friends,

It was a very salutary experience spending a whole, very hot, day in an admissions ward as I did recently. As a very impatient patient, I had to wait my turn as Doctors and Nurses coped splendidly with the many cases brought in for observation. Some had overworked; others smoked too much; some had breathing difficulties; others (as with me) had worried and chased about too much. I received a good '50,000 mile service' and sent home to rest ... and write letters! However, this valuable experience has taught me two lessons:-

Firstly, as the chorus "Trust and Obey" reminds us, I have to trust HIM more; to let go and not worry about every little problem effecting our Church, our School and our Hall. The money will come for the work ... thank you to those who have already promised gifts and loans ... and we shall get our G.M. Status for our School. My problem (and I see it in many Clergy) is that I set very high personal standards and then try to meet the various high standards set by others. Surely this is only striving for what man requires, rather than seeking God's perfection. We shall have to learn to 'let go and let God' take control of our lives.

Secondly, I have to remember that I am not self sufficient. I must not try to be the omni-competent Vicar. We are blessed at All Saints with many saintly and gifted Christians who must be enabled to use their gifts. Never feel that your gifts are not needed here; simply offer them to God ... and then to the Church Wardens! Clergy (and many others who work with people) don't want to let others discover their weaknesses and shortcomings. Yet we are all vulnerable because we are weak Human Beings. As Christians, we should echo the words of Paul to the Corinthians - "For the sake of Christ I am content with weakness ... for when I am weak, then I am strong"(2 Cor. 12:10) So, whatever gifts are lacking in me, I must trust that God will supply them to our Parish through you offering your gifts.

Indian Evangelical Mission

The following is an extract taken from a letter we received from Theo and Diana Srinivasagam.

28th IEM National Convention May 7 - 9 in Madras.

"What do you want to talk about?" the Field leaders were asked at the Planning Meetings in November. A Discussion followed on training local leaders, who have had some or no education, and no Christian background.

This departure from the usual reports was certainly more profitable. Spiritually too, many of us were challenged to pray more effectively and persevere in the face of difficulties and persecution.

Persecution is all too real for some believers and missionaries who have suffered violence and loss in the village situation, especially in our Mayurbhanj mission field in Orissa.

Violence and loss has occurred in other situations too, as group hates group, and fanatical 'nationalism' takes hold. But that hit the headlines as cities burned and people were killed. Some of our city workers were kept in by curiews. This volcano threatens still. Pray for the Indian people, whose great variety of languages and cultures and religions should be her asset, not her damnation.

One enjoyable task was to dedicate the new National Office building of the Child Evangelism Fellowship in India, in Bangalore last November. As chairman of the CEF Board for a few years, Theo has been rewarded by this and other good advances in the work. After one more Board meeting, he will hand over to someone else.

Handing over to someone else, is something I, Diana, would like to do. I have made a long list of all the things I do and am seeking guidance from our Heavenly Father as to which to cut out, delegate or simplify.

Family responsibilities however, cannot be delegated, so it is good to know that my father is well, and that my sisters keep an eye on him. Theo's parents are also doing amazingly well.

A holiday in June is hopeful. We don't know where to go to though!

Dear Friends.

As I sat in an intercollege meeting in Selly Oak Missionary Training College last September, I realised I had not been in a minority group for some time. There were 300 of us from around the world, 30 of us British. We sang "All People That On Earth Do Dwell" simultaneously in 6 languages. Our experiences here have been alongside people from many cultures and ways of life. In Nigeria we shall be in a minority by ourselves when we go to Church, bargain at the market, or walk in our home area.

Sitting amongst people from different nations, we have learnt as much relating to them as from formal lectures. Kasozi from Uganda has been brought up to regard war and hardship as normal life, and was amazed to discover that I had never held more than an air rifle. Living with people who have different outlooks on life makes mere head knowledge seem shallow.

As I sit here now, 2 terms done. I wonder about the things we have learnt. Does the Nigerian Anglican Church really use 1662 BCP. Choir boys, Anglican Chant and other 'Un African' things? BCP with dancing in the aisles during collection they said. We'll soon see!

Sitting here in the English Springtime, we contemplate arriving in Lagos at 5.00am and 85 F. We have had our injections and anti-malaria tablets, and it's now time to pack. We know that the Nigerian elections have progressed with less violence so far. We pray for Nigeria and it's people. The elections are planned for the Summer.

Please pray for us as we settle to a new climate, culture and lifestyle. I will be training clergy and other church leaders. Jo will be teaching in school, and also Emily and Stephen. We sit with our last cup of tea, with the envelope for this letter ready, the farewells done.


The legend is that when Emperor Decius had his own statue

UPDATE ON SCHOOL CLOSURE ISSUE

On June 11th the Local Education Authority amended its decision to press ahead with plans to close 14 Sheffield Schools, including All Saints School. This plan has to be ratified by the City Council - but in view of the lack of commitment to Church Schools shown by the majority of our city councillors, we do not expect any last minute changes. Sadly the impression given by the media on the 11th, was that the schools would close. This is certainly not the case - the plan has to go before the Secretary of State for Education, schools cannot be closed without his approval.

Consequently the next stage is to send in our objections to the Government, and these have to be submitted by August 28th. By the time this magazine is available, I expect we will have produced a leaflet which will tell anyone who wishes to help, how to go about it - who to write to and the most useful points to make. If you would like to help us, please contact me at school (361934) and I will give you a leaflet. As term finishes on July 23rd, and I am only in school for some of the time during the holiday, it may be simpler to contact my home (308428) during August.

What we are really hoping is that All Saints School will be granted its Grant Maintained Status early in the Autumn Term.

At this difficult time, our pupils, staff, governors and parents all heed your support and your prayers.

From the Bishop of Sheffield:

Some Church of England Snapshots



- 1. "Not Angles but Angels" said Pope Gregory of the fair-haired English captives offered for sale in Rome. And he resolved to send his friend Augustine to Britain so that the Anglo-Saxon invaders could be brought within the fellowship of the Christian Church. The Venerable Bede tells us the whole story memorably with Augustine at Canterbury and Aidan in Northumbria eventually bringing all the different peoples of these Islands to unity within the Church of Jesus Christ. There are many snapshots here! All this in the 7th century when the Churches of Constantinople and Rome were still united. We were part of Christendom and our most effective Archbishop was Theodore who came from Tarsus in Turkey and gave England ecclesiastical unity centuries before it became politically one kingdom.
- But by AD 1500 the men who ruled the Church from Rome were very different indeed from the great St. Gregory.
 Through the centuries the popes had often used their steadily increasing powers to reform the Western Church. But by 1500 power politics had forced the papacy to fight only too successfully the clamour for reform.

Printing made the Bible accessible to the people as never before. And the Church of which they read in the Bible seemed very different indeed from that or Renaissance Rome! The Bible and the new nationalisms of northern Europe were a heady brew that brought about a reformed but tragically divided Europe.

So my second snapshot is of Thomas Cranmer carefully translating the old books into a new English Prayer Book more in keeping with "the godly and decent order of the ancient Fathers". This Prayer Book made it clear that the Reformation did not change our faith: it preserved the faith of the Apostles and the Scriptures with the ancient unchanging creed and Cranmer declared too in his Ordinal that the traditional orders of Bishops, Priests and Deacons, which had been in the Church "from the Apostles' time" were "to be continued and reverently used and esteemed in the Church of England". But we said a firm 'No' to the Pope's claim to absolute authority over the Church.

3. My third snapshot brings us to Sheffield - or at least to a Sheffield man - Robert Sanderson. Born in 1587, he had lived through the Civil War in England and seen how much of Europe was reduced to a wildemess by the Wars of Religion. With the restoration of the Monarchy and Church in 1660 he became Bishop of Lincoln, and it was he who wrote the preface to the revised Book of Common Prayer. His aim he tells us is to produce a book that will be "accepted and approved by all sober, peaceable, and truly conscientious sons (which in those days meant daughters too) of the Church of England". He has seen the trouble that too much zeal in religion can cause. He writes, in the last months of his life, with a vision of moderation, reason and peace.

Each of these "snapshots" underlines a part of the Anglican tradition: Apostolic, scriptural, reasonable. I believe we need them all and should not apologise for the variety it brings to the life of our Church.

The matter is well summed up in the declaration that is used every time a new Vicar begins his work in a parish:

"The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church...It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, the Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons."

Though we don't always find it easy to be both faithful to the past and responsive to the needs of the present (as some of our present disputes show) yet I believe that the Church of England is a chosen vessel of God for the preaching of His Gospel and deserves our loyalty and support.

Church Bells and Bell Ringing

The Christmas card picture of a choirboy or a monk swinging on a bell rope is far from reality! Church bells are a traditional English sound. We all expect to hear bells rung at weddings and we usually hear them them in films and plays as a sound effect to evoke a religious setting. When Terry Waite was released from his captivity at the end of the Gulf War the bells rang out across the country. But have you thought what is involved in bell ringing?

Bells are hung for change ringing in over 5,000 towers in Britain. There are only a few towers overseas. Change ringing usually involves between 5 and 12 bells, each bell being rung by one person. Bell ringers therefore have to ring together as a band. Traditional English "change ringing" developed over several centuries, involves each bell being rung as part of a well defined sequence. Tunes, in the normal musical sense, are not usually rung on English church bells. During change ringing each bell, weighing several hundredweight, turns in a complete circle so skilled engineering is required to install and maintain a ring of church bells.

Bell ringing is a worthwhile hobby. It is undertaken by young and old, men and women, and does not require strength or musical ability. The team spirit is great and opportunities exist for participation in local and national competitions and more informal events. It provides a worthwhile service to the church in a unique way.

HOLD THAT MOWER!

CHURCH people are unwittingly destroying valuable wildlife habitats on their doorstep, says the latest edition of the Churchyards Handbook From Church House Publishing, £7.95.

Many people criticise churchyards with long grass and unkempt appearance, say the authors, but they are not meant to look like lawns. There are some villages where not a single blade of grass...may grow more than an inch'. Even gravestones are sacrificed 'to the omnivorous mower'.

Henry Stapleton, Dean of Carlisle, and his co-editor Peter Burman call for a compromise between neglect and obsessive tidiness. Regular cutting of grass beside paths, and cutting the rest only occasionally, keeps the proper character at minimal expense.

ANCIENT LAND

In many places the churchyard is the sole surviving remnant of ancient, herb-rich grassland, enclosed when the church was built, if not earlier. Even the town churchyard, crowded with monuments, provides a haven for wildlife and flowers. The Church of England has about 16,500 yards in its care.




The book points out that the commissioning of a tombstone is an opportunity for a modest but significant work of art. Old tombstones, it suggests, should not be moved to stand around the walls. Memorials in marble are not recommended because this material is 'wholly unsympathetic to the character of the English churchyard'.

And the bats? Bats are not often found in belfries, says the Churchyards Handbook. Bell towers are usually too dusty and too noisy for their comfort. Bats prefer churches and churchyards. It is illegal to harm them or deny them access to their roosts.

Remembering seafarers on Sea Sunday

July 11 is Sea Sunday, when we are asked to remember seafarers and the Anglican Church's ministry to them through The Missions to Seamen.

Ninety-eight per cent of the UK's trade is carried by sea, but seafarers, on whom we all depend for our daily needs, can easily be forgotten.

Seafarers come from many different countries, including of course, the UK. But today more are from developing countries in Africa, Asia and South America. Many of them work long contracts on ships thousands of miles from their homes in order to support their families.

Being away from home and family for long periods at a time makes seafarers feel lonely and isolated and they can go for weeks without getting ashore.
