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

From the Vicar...

A YEAR OF WELCOME

Dear Friends,

A very Happy New Year to you and yours.

Of course you will be thinking that every New Year should be thought of as another opportunity to welcome people into the life of the Christian Church. Absolutely right...so how is 1997 going to be different?

Quite simply, we have plans set for three special periods of welcome. This will form our response to Bishop David's "Open Door" evangelistic challenge to each Parish in his last year as our Bishop.

We plan to 'launch' the year with a Prayer Breakfast on Saturday, February 1st. This will lead naturally into our Lent Study Programme when, as individuals. we shall renew a 'Welcome to the Lord' into our daily lives.

Saturday, April 12th will then be our PARISH DAY (led by the Revd.Mick Woodhead) when we shall attempt to renew our 'Welcomes to one another'- a unique opportunity to become a more close-knit Christian family. The months following will be taken up with House Groups to enable us to deepen our faith and trust in one another.

From September to December, we shall, with God's help seek to show 'Welcome to our neighbours' by inviting them into our Home Welcome Groups, sharing our faith with them, and attempting to answer their questions. By this, we shall attempt to be a true 'Missionary Congregation'.

By the end of the year, we shall hope to be able to give a genuine Welcome to the New Born King. Will you commit this venture to God in your prayers, and be fully involved in every aspect of the YEAR OF WELCOME?

P.S. The Chairman of our Mission Team, Gordon Grayson, has outlined the Years Programme in more detail elsewhere in this Magazine. Perhaps you might cut it out and keep it for your prayers.

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
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Training

No, this is nothing to do with locomotives.

Governments in a multitude of countries strive to make provision for their National work-force, and for those who wish to join that work-force, to get trained. Numerous schemes are set up to encourage participation in training courses. Employers also seek to get their staff on training courses in order to keep them up to date and in trim for the work. Likewise, many employees apply to go on training courses for the same reasons.

It may surprise you - perhaps it will even delight you! - to hear that the Clergy and Readers who preach at All Saints are going on a training course on "Preaching". There is an organisation entitled "The College of Preachers" with which I have some connections. We are exceedingly fortunate that the Director of the College is coming to Totley to give us a day's training on Saturday 25th January. This will be an all-day event. All in the Church may hope that the quality of our preaching will be improved as a result. (He might even blow some bees out of some bonnets!)

What sort of training are you involved in to keep your Christian discipleship up to date and sharp-edged? I have been horrified by the numbers of people I have met whose last piece of Christian training was a Confirmation Course, all too often given to them when they were far too young even to begin to appreciate what they were going in for. For most of them, that was upwards of 30 years ago. Since then, they have relied on a weekly 10 minute top-up through a Sunday sermon. No wonder their discipleship is blunt, their faith soggy and without a cutting edge.

If you get a Church full of people like that, you end up with little more than a social club. Is this what Jesus expects from his Church? St. Paul urged the young Timothy, who came from a Christian home, to study

(or to be eager) to show himself worthy of God's approval.

Now, there are many ways to study. But belonging to a disciplined House Group is one of the best. Or to take on reading some worthwhile Christian books; a biography or two, a commentary on one or another book of the Bible (only make absolutely certain that it is written by a respected Christain scholar), a book that realistically and with a sane approach searches into some of the great and wonderful Christian doctrines. Any or all of these would help to blow out some bees and really would contribute to sharpening up discipleship.



(Acts of the Apostles)



The process for appointing a new Diocesan Bishop is now well under way and I thought you should know what is involved and how the system works. Before a final decision is made, three groups of people are involved in seeing that proper consultations are held as widely and as thoroughly as possible. They are the Diocesan Vacancy in See Committee, the two Appointments' Secretaries and the Crown Appointments Commission.

VACANCY IN SEE COMMITTEE

The Vacancy in See Committee is made up of those elected by Diocesan Synod and ex-officio members. A new committee is formed every time a new Diocesan Synod is elected and only meets when the need arises for a new Diocesan Bishop to be appointed. With the announcement that Bishop David will be retiring this summer, our Vacancy in See Committee began its work. We met twice, in November and again in December, and have completed the tasks for which we are responsible. The main tasks of the committee were to prepare a brief description of the Diocese and a Statement setting out the needs of the Diocese and also to elect four of its members to serve on the Crown Appointments Commission. Following a long and wide-ranging discussion about our Diocese, including all aspects of life covered by the Diocese, the Description and Statement of Needs has been written and sent to the Crown Appointments Commission. At the December meeting, four people were elected to represent us on the Crown Appointments Commission when it meets sometime in the next few months. Please remember them in your prayers as they take part in the next stage of the Appointment.

APPOINTMENT SECRETARIES

The Archbishops' secretary and the Prime Minister's secretary met with us at our November meeting and they spent two days in the Diocese during December when they met a whole range of people representing business and industry, civic and community life, as well as people from our parishes, lay and clergy, various Diocesan groups and church leaders from other denominations. All in all they will have met and listened to about 120 people. From this they will write their own report for the Crown Appointments Commission, having put in a tremendous amount of work on our behalf.

CROWN APPOINTMENTS COMMISSION

When all the material is ready, the Crown Appointments Commission will meet for the purpose of submitting two names to the Prime Minister. He then recommends one of these names to the Queen who appoints the next Bishop of Sheffield. It is important to remember two things about the Prime Minister's choice. First, that he has the fullest information about the Diocese and about the two candidates before him when he makes his recommendation to the Queen. The second thing is that the Crown Appointments Commission believes that both of the names they send to the Prime Minister are suitable people to be appointed as the next Bishop of Sheffield.

The Crown Appointments Commission will be meeting for two days for a time of worship, reflection and discussion, with as much information as possible about the Diocese and possible candidates. Please pray for them, the members who represent the Church of England as a whole and the four people representing our Diocese; they offer their wisdom and experience in the service of Christ, His Church and the Kingdom of God.

With all of this in mind, I nearly forgot that we are at the start of a New Year, so here is a quote about appointing a new Bishop and the start of a New Year.

"For all that has been - thanks. For all that will be - yes."

Situation Vacant

Bishop David announced at the Synod meeting in November that he would retire on 31 August 1997. The procedure for filling the vacancy immediately swung into action. Since then the Diocesan Vacancy in See Committee has submitted a Statement of the needs of the Diocese to the Crown Appointments Commission and has elected four of its members to join the Crown Appointments Commission when it comes to discuss names of candidates who would be suitable for consideration for the appointment.

If anyone has advice to offer on what qualities might be needed in the new Bishop, or, indeed, names to suggest, they are urged to write, as soon as possible (and no later than 12 February 1997, Ash Wednesday) to our representatives c/o Diocesan Church House, 95-99 Effingham Street, Rotherham. S65 1BL, in envelopes marked "Private and Confidential". The date of the Crown Appointments Commission's meeting must be kept confidential. It will be meeting some time during the weeks leading up to Easter. At the time of the NEWS going to press, the names of our four representatives were not known, but they will be published as soon as possible.

A First for Yorkshire...

The M.U. is proud to announce that for the first time in its history the new Honorary Chaplain to the World-Wide Mothers' Union is from this Diocese. The Right Reverend Michael Gear, Bishop of Doncaster has accepted this appointment and was present at the World-Wide Council in London in November. This is an important position in our society and we offer him our prayers and good wishes. His wife Daphne has worked for the M.U. for many years and is at present Honorary Vice-President for the Diocese of Sheffield. We wish them both well.

Time for Barnsley

If you live in the Barnsley area, if you have a concern for Barnsley, if you are shocked that Barnsley is at the top of the list when it comes to unemployment, drug abuse, teenage abortion, etc; then you will be encouraged to know that the churches in Barnsley are as concerned as you are - and we are doing something about it.

10th May, 1997 will see two prayer initiatives - the like of which Barnsley has never seen before! From 12 noon to 12.30 p.m. there will be prayers at twelve centres on the Borough boundary. (Interdenominational groups will have walked to these centres during the morning.) Then in the evening there will be a prayer rally at the football stadium).

German Ecumenical Link Celebrates 10 years in 1997!

Our first official exploratory contacts as a Diocese with the German Church District of Hattingen-Witten in the Ruhr began in 1987. Next year our German Christian friends have invited us to visit them again to enjoy an enthusiastic welcome in their homes and to experience an extra special celebration of this relationship which has grown over the years in all sorts of unexpected ways.

Three of our Bishops have already visited and have preached there, one of whom attended V.E. commemoration services last year, preached and took part in a march and vigil for peace. The Christians were profoundly moved by what he had to say. The Archdeacon of Sheffield has also paid a short visit and impressed them with his concern for Social Responsibility. We have much to learn from each other. Contact between Mothers' Union members and the German equivalent have begun. Some German Parishes would love to explore Parish to Parish links. Brampton at present is the only one to have an official link with St. George's, Hattingen.

In October '96 we had a memorable and very successful week's visit from our German ecumenical partners in the area from Doncaster to Goole, thanks to the wonderful hospitality of the clergy and lay people there.

Our return visit is scheduled for Spring Bank Holiday week, Saturday, 24th May to 31st. We hope to travel by coach on the ferry from Hull to Rotterdam, leaving Hull 6.30 p.m. Friday (23rd). Precise costs for the week are not possible yet, but will be attractive and value for money. If you are interested to join us, please let us know immediately. Opening Church Doors

Making churches more accessible to local communities will be made easier thanks to a new practical guide published by The Children's Society.

Opening Our Doors gives practical advice on all the issues a church needs to address when considering becoming more involved with residents and community groups in its parish. From ethical and legal issues to advice on funding, architecture and planning permission, the book focuses on working within communities facing high levels of unemployment and social tension.

"This books offers a fresh approach, which, while recognising that so many churches are part of our national heritage, does not mean that they should remain unaltered," said Rt. Revd. Dr. Michael Nazir-Ali, The Bishop of Rochester who wrote the foreword. "Church buildings that are under used can become a valued asset and a base from which the Gospel can be acted out."

The book includes several case studies of parish churches which have opened their doors as well as advice on setting up charities, play groups and developing links with community and single interest groups. The authors highlight the need to be sensitive to the treatment of worship space and provide a framework for planning and proceeding with change.

Preaching the Gospel

"The good news of Christ must be preached by word and by action. But go into the world and preach the gospel: Use words if you have to" (St. Francis of Assisi).

That would appear to say preaching by action holds preference over preaching by words. Certainly preaching by action is more easily understood. Gospel action is directed mainly to those outside the church at home or abroad who sadly are in need of our love and care. This was painfully apparent by the awful condition of a Rumanian Orphanage and prompted All Saints to break with tradition. Our Harvest Festival gifts were given to ease their problem.

The day after the County School had held their Harvest Festival I had occasion to enter the church. There behind the altar were piles of baby powder, baby soap, and baby food - in fact everything a baby needs. There was more in the choir vestry. I stood and gazed in awe and wonder. I said to myself "this is what it is all about". And Matthew's words made the scriptures come alive. Chapter 25 vv 35-40. "For I was hungry and you gave me food. I was thirsty and you gave me drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me. I was sick and you visited me. The righteous will answer him 'when did we see you hungry and feed thee, or thirsty and gave thee drink? And when did we see thee a stranger and welcome thee?' And the King will answer them 'Truly, I say to you as you did it to one of the least of these bretheren you did to me'."

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CANDLEMAS.

We do not regard Candlemas as so important a date as Easter or Christmas but nevertheless it has great significance in the Church Calendar. Always on February 2nd, it is that mysterious forty days again - this time after the Christmas season. Specifically we commemorate the Presentation of Christ in the Temple and this is a cause of rejoicing. With that in mind the 6.30 p.m. evening service on February 2nd - a first Sunday evening - will be a Praise Service. A full church would be a wonderful way to mark the occasion!

But there are several themes associated with Candlemas. Not least is the continuation and perhaps the climax of the idea of light which we pick up in Epiphany. Jesus is indeed the light of the world. So we plan to use candles at this special service and use the contrast between light and darkness to help us see what difference Jesus makes to our lives. Another theme is purification because these forty days marked the end of the traditional period after the birth. It is an opportunity for us to offer ourselves and pray that we too might be purified and made more fit for service for Our Lord.

We are familiar with the words of Simeon as he greeted the baby Jesus. They are used often in the words of the Nunc Dimittis. But Simeon went on to prophesy about the hard times that would follow and this shadow anticipates the season of Lent which closely follows. At the end of Lent, of course, comes the Passion of Our Lord and all that means to us. So Candlemas represents a turning point in the Christian Year when we begin to bring the Cross into sharper focus. This is all the more reason why we should mark this special day and take this particular opportunity of celebrating the presence of Jesus in our midst. See you in church on Feb 2nd!



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

IMPACT

What is it?

IMPACT is a broad based communities organisation (BBO) bringing together very diverse groups in the Sheffield and Rotherham areas to enable people to act together on issues that threaten community and family life. It will seek working relationships with those with the authority and power to effect change and deal with issues identified by its communities.

Who is involved?

28 groups across Sheffield and Rotherham, including 12 Anglican; 5 Roman Catholic; 4 Methodist; 1 Mosque; the Islamic Society of Great Britain; the Black Community Forum; and 4 local community groups. Other groups are joining.

What issues are being tackled?

- Police Community Consultative Groups
- · Traffic issues; Sheffield and Rotherham
- Unsafe parks at Parson Cross
- Deteriorating Shopping Precinct at Parson Cross

BBO Working Across the UK

The six UK groups: Bristol; Merseyside; North Wales; Black Country; East London; and IMPACT have been working with the Foreign and Commonwealth Office on the cultural and racial sensitivity of Entry Clearance Officers towards Asian and Black Britons on their re-entry to Britain. BBO leaders will run a training day for Entry Clearance Officers.

Influence beyond the UK?

The Foreign and Commonwealth Office has also agreed that BBO leaders monitor the work of Entry Clearance Officers. Leaders will sit in on interviews at different Visa Clearance Offices around the world. At the public launch in October, a member of the Bristol Sikh community told how effective this had been in India, and of its value to his community.

Three Words of Welcome... and a warning

Following his welcome of IMPACT at its October launch, Sheffield City Council Leader Mike Bower wrote of IMPACT...

There is something rather special about the way this secular organisation recognises that people in their religious faith have a great deal to contribute to the well-being of our communities. And I rejoice at that.


And a word of warning. 'Woe', says the scriptures, 'when all men speak well of you'. Well they won't! The more effective, the more successful you are, the more determined will be the cynical criticisms, the suggestions of some ulterior purpose, that you're up to no good. And I think you'll have to learn to live with that, and to expect that, and yet somehow or other to grow stronger and more determined because of that criticism.

Well done, and good luck."

IMPACT at Gleadless Valley

"Constable Road, Gleadless is a narrow road, a Junior and Infants School on one side, a row of shops opposite. Buses often mount the pavement, people have been hit - including the 'lollipop' lady and children. Several attempts over 10 years to tackle the issue had led to nothing. The IMPACT group at Gleadless Valley parish organised traffic surveys, negotiated with the two bus companies, the police and the Passenger Transport Executive, who all agreed a one-way system.

The last hurdle is still to be won - the Highways Department of the City Council who are putting

LENT GROUPS.

As in previous years Churches Together in S17 are organising a series of ecumenical discussion groups during Lent. These will begin during the week beginning Monday 17th February and go on for the five weeks before Holy Week. They are offered in various people's homes and being led by members of our different congregations.

The course which is to be followed is "Called to be One" and it will offer an opportunity to examine the common ground which the churches have between them and how we can further develop our ecumenical relationships. Since members of the different churches in the area will be taking part it is more than likely that each of us will learn something new.

In past years some 70 or 80 people from different churches have joined in these groups and they have found them to be enjoyable and instructive. This year should be no different provided the groups are well supported. To join it is necessary to complete the slip at the bottom of one of the leaflets which are in church and then go along to your chosen venue at the time you have chosen. You are advised to buy one of the workbooks which are available at a cost of £1.25 as this will serve to remind you of the material under discussion.

It is particularly important to join a group this year because this will fit in with our "Year of Welcome" of which you will be reading much more. We do hope for large numbers at all the advertised venues and if necessary we will arrange extra groups to cater for the demand!

I.O.U.

Not very long ago many people were sent to prison because they were in debt. These days debt is a trauma for some people, but is also apparently the sign of a healthy economy. So a great number of people want us to be indebted to them. Insurance companies, building societies, banks, shops, credit card companies, motoring organisations, and loan sharks, try to persuade us to borrow money from them to buy things we don't need at prices we can't afford. In fact it is probably impossible nowadays for us to be in a position where we neither owe anything to anybody, nor are owed anything by anybody.

We may have a lingering feeling that it is wrong to be in debt. we want to be independent, paying our own way, beholden to nobody, but only Robinson Crusoe could have truthfully made such a claim. Because even if we could claim to be self-sufficient financially, we could never claim to be self-sufficient in a social sense. If I could somehow quantify my dependence on other people, and theirs on me, I doubt if I would find that I have a credit balance. And I know that a balance sheet of my indebtedness to God would show me permanently in the red.

The season of Lent is a good time for taking stock, trying to assess the state of our religious and social balance sheets, with "Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us" as an essential tool. The first requirement is our acceptance of the existence of sin, and in acknowledgement of its power in our own lives. Sin is much more than a question of right or wrong; it is a failure of a relationship, not the breaking of a law.

Repentance should be our response to this; it is the desire to restore the relationship, by a willingness to admit our responsibility for the failure and to do all we can to put it right, even if that is painful. Repentance, just as every other part of the Christian life, is based on love, not on fear or punishment, or on wounded pride, or self-contempt. We need a great deal of honesty and of courage to face the details of our sins. (cont..)



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


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P.C.C. UPDATE.

Probably the most significant item discussed at the January meeting of the P.C.C. was the Year of Welcome which is planned for 1997. Details about this will emerge elsewhere but there is a feeling of warm anticipation of what is going to happen in the Parish.

Of course there were the usual things being said about the state of our finances but more will be made known about this when the 1996 accounts are presented at the Annual Parish Meeting on 13th March. Also on the financial front the fees for weddings and funerals for 1997 came up for review and these were approved.

One of the interesting items which needs some publicity concerns the Charitable Giving which will be undertaken in 1997. We have a number of charities which we normally support but this is the time for making suggestions about others if it is appropriate. Yet again the point is being made that we should support our favoured charities by prayer and concern as well as by financial contribution.

On a point of safety, attention was drawn to the use of the church boiler house as storage space. It is intended to have a skip and throw away all the debris so if anyone has anything of value stored there, please remove it now.

Although the meeting was comparatively (!) short there were a number of other items of wider interest. Mention was made that steps are in hand for appointing Joan Stratford's successor at the church school. The need to attend to the lighting in the church brought a discussion about long-life lamps. Another modification which we might be hearing more about (!) was the installation of a sound system.

On a longer term basis the growing threat of child abuse has brought guidelines from the Diocese and the P.C.C. is responding to these. We all have the feeling that "this couldn't happen here" but we need to make sure that it doesn't! It is recognised that the work that is done with the young people is amongst the most important of the things that we do.

Can we please use a small space in the Magazine to say how grateful we are to all the people who have congratulated us on our Golden Wedding. We had a wonderful week-end and it was all the more special because we were able to share it with so many of our "extended family" in the church and in the community. It truly seemed right that the climax of our celebration was to join together in worship and to give thanks to God for our years together. To be able to bring so many of our natural family into this wider fellowship was a privilege and a joy. Thank you.



THE QUEEN'S SPEECH 1997 An Election Wish-Dream!



"My Lords and members of the Commons,

My ministers believe that the people of this nation are its greatest resource and that therefore it makes economic, social and political sense that their first priority is to bring to an end the scandalous waste of that resource that results from the massive unemployment of recent decades. Others have argued that economic revival must come first and that out of the resulting prosperity and growth sufficient jobs will be created to end unemployment. The history of these last decades, my ministers maintain, has proved that this theory is false. Every citizen has the right to work for a living wage and thus to serve the whole community. Full employment, they believe, will precede and make possible permanent economic revival. And though my ministers will do all that they can to encourage the growth of that manufacturing industry on which so much of our international trade depends, they recognize that the technological changes of recent years mean that this is not the area through which we can end unemployment. But in every part of the country they see Schools and Hospitals desperately understaffed; they note with dismay a steady decline in the standard of care of the elderly and the sick; on every side they see the consequences of the neglect of our public buildings; we see this most shamefully in our school buildings; our children deserve better. There is an infinity of work waiting to be done. And we need houses.

Many of my ministers are old enough to remember a time when it was unthinkable that in this country the homeless should be found sleeping in the streets. They are appalled that so quickly this intolerable scandal has become acceptable. In the next few days they will bring measures before you designed to end this unforgivable evil.

My ministers recognize that good homes and good schools undergird the life of this Country. They believe, to use an old fashioned phrase, that "Righteousness exalteth a nation". They welcome the fact that we have become a multi-faith and multicultural community. They have no desire to curtail

individual freedoms. Yet they do believe that they have a duty to use some of the power that in a democracy is given to the Government to bring in measures designed to strengthen marriage and the family. They believe we have a duty to give our children the vital background of stable home life.

My ministers have sufficient confidence in the programme that they set before you to quote Karl Marx: "From each according to his abilities; to each according to his needs". This means that they are determined that the selfishness of the few shall not destroy the well-being of the many. They will shortly bring before you measures to curb "benefit fraud" and crime. This will include the re-introduction of identity cards.

Members of the House of Commons. We live in a wealthy nation. But the radical changes my ministers have in mind will inevitably involve some radical redistribution in this national wealth. They believe that the results of the recent General Election make it clear that the nation as a whole is no longer willing to accept a situation in which a few become very rich indeed and the number of those excluded from the full life of the nation by poverty steadily increases. One of the important measures in the emergency budget that will be brought to your house next week will be, as forecast in the election manifesto, an increase in the basic rate of Income Tax of 5p in the pound. My ministers believe that this will be widely welcomed as the price that has to be paid for full employment, good homes and good schools and hospitals.

My Lord and Members of the House of Commons,

I pray that the blessing of Almighty God may rest upon your counsels".

(Ah well! "Your old men shall dream dreams" says the prophet Joel. And this dream should at least be on the nation's agenda).

The Politics of the Real World

The Revd. Charles Hedley is Diocesan Development Representative and writes about particular preparations as the General Election draws nearer:

If you have not already heard of the "Real World Coalition", then look out! You may soon hear of it as the General Election draws closer. "The Politics of the Real World" is the title of a book published by over thirty leading voluntary and campaigning organisations in preparation for the election. These charities, which are concerned with social justice and the environment (they include Christian Aid CAFOD, and Church Action on Poverty), have got together to contribute their expertise in different areas and produce what they call "a major statement of public concern".

Worth Getting Hold Of

The book is well worth getting hold of. It reminds us that the 1992 election was fought on the issue that al recent elections have been fought on: the short-term fixation on tax levels. The next election agenda is unlikely to be very different but will have a few extra items added: the economy, crime, health, education and Europe.

Too Materialistic

Recent opinion polls have confirmed the feeling of disillusion with our political system that many people have talked about. The polls also tell us that most of us believe that society has become far too materialistic. It will not be too easy to push such issues as poverty, social justice, and the environment onto an election agenda which is already mapped out by the major parties. This is what the "Real World Coalition" intend.

Raising Issues

Although the Coalition does produce a twelve point programme, what is more important is not whether you agree with that programme, but their determination to change the agenda for the forthcoming election. They are not concerned so much with party politics, but with making sure that important issues are raised, and then, whatever government is elected, they intend to act rather as the conscience of the government. After the election, coalition members will vet winning members' parliamentary voting record to see if they honour their pledges.

A Just World

What lies behind their thinking is the recognition that social justice, the relief of poverty and respect for our environment are not just altruistic ideals, but very much in our own interest.

This is very much in tune with the ideas in the Old Testament that a just world is in our own self-interest and that if we do justice and act with righteousness we "will live long in the land". Tackling the issues of poverty and social justice are essential to our health as Christians and as a nation.

Getting Prepared

This article is about getting prepared for the election when it comes. Unfortunately the Bible seems to have more to say about the drawing of lotteries than about the running of elections! It does, however, prod us to take seriously our roles as citizens and to see that God's agenda is not always the same as the one presented to us by politicians whatever their party affiliation.

Social Responsibility Committee Pack

The SRC is producing an election pack which is being circulated to all parishes. So ask your incumbent about it. The pack will contain, among other things, information (from the Council of Churches for Britain and Ireland) about planning general election meetings, some more information about the Real World Coalition and some questions which you might like to put to candidates and which we hope will, help you to broaden the agenda as you make up your own mind.

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
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
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Richard Fitzroy 'Roy' Johnston

THE MINISTRY OF WOMEN

The ordination of women to the order of Priest caused some division in the Church of England. However, this division was miniscule compared with that which was threatened! For example, only about 350 male priests, not the 1,000 that were expected, left the C of E on the issue.

I repect the position of those who opposed it at the time of the debate, and the reducing number that still do. Personally I support women's ordination. My chief reason for doing so is that I believe it to be in line with the New Testament Church.

Of course Jesus picked men for his band of disciples, who came to be called the Apostles. He couldn't possibly have done anything else in the social and religious climate of his day without killing at birth the ministry he came to exercise. To have included women would, at that time, have been a cause of total scandal and outrage to all around.

But women formed an integral part of his team and he elevated their status way beyond that which was normal. As the church grew and developed beyond the confines of Jerusalem and its Jewish base, we find women in even higher profile, although discretion was still called for in order to prevent offence to an unlightened society. (After all, that society called Christians cannibals because they ate the "body" and the "blood" of Christ.)

Eventually we find St. Paul writing that by faith and baptism we are united with Christ and consequently in the Church "there is no such thing as Jew and Greek, slave and freeman, male and female" (Galatians 3: 26-29). Paul took the opposites in religion, status and sex, and said that in Christ the distinctions simply do not exist.

We are still working out the implications of this. But if it is true - and who would dare to say it isn't?-it seems to me to be equally true in regard (continued ...)

Totley Residents' Association

Totley doesn't have a Parish Council. Perhaps we ought to have one, but that is a separate debate. The nearest thing at the moment is the Totley Residents' Association, which exists for the benefit of all who live in Totley. There is nothing which generally concerns the people of this area which is outside the scope of what the residents' Association can discuss. Furthermore, the Association is not without influence with our local councillors and with other outside bodies, so it is not just a talking shop!

You may already know something of what the Residents' Association does. The monthly *Totley Independent* prints about 850 copies per issue. The annual Totley Show is run by the T.R.A., as also is the summer Sports Day. There are about six free evening talks in the Library every year and an event is run every year for the benefit of local senior citizens. There have also been one or two other special events like an Open Meeting when the Police were invited to discuss some local traffic problems.

Perhaps there are other things which such an organisation should do? Perhaps you have a view on some of these things? The T.R.A. is run by a committee which is only too anxious to know what it is that people want. There are also vacancies on the committee, so it is open to anyone interested to influence the decisions which are made about all these matters.

Our church - All Saints - talks about reaching out into the community. Quite a lot is done in various informal ways, but the T.R.A. respresents a channel through which more can be done. Historically the church played a major part in setting up the T.R.A. twenty years ago, so there is adequate precedent for church people playing a bigger role in what is going on today.

Of course the Residents' Association is not the only channel through

which community action can take place, but it would be a pity to waste what is already available. It is not in danger of crumbling, but more support from individual members of our church would be very welcome. This support could be in a variety of ways, but perhaps the above will give you some ideas. Can you respond?



EASTER

THE END RESULT



Fairy Stories used to end "and they lived happily ever after" but that was wishful thinking. Endings are important and that is why it is interesting to consider the ways the four Gospel writers end their account of the Easter story.

MARK for instance ends with the words "Trembling and bewildered, the women went out and fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid". Was there a lost ending, was it left unfinished, or what? I have always thought that it speaks of the consequences of the resurrection as being something we 'write' with our lives. We are to be players and not just spectators of the Easter drama.

LUKE ends with Jesus blessing the disciples "and he parted from them then they worshipped him they stayed continually at the temple, praising God." For Luke the outcome of Easter is worship and praise from which will come spirit empowered mission to all the nations.

MATTHEW ends with a choice and we have to make a decision. One alternative is to join the mission of those sent out with a lie (the soldiers) "the body was stolen". Jesus is and remains dead. He will not disturb us, nor our world, life can go on as usual, the poor remain poor, injustice and death triumph and our universe remains closed to the Divine. The other alternative is to live the mission of the disciples of the risen Lord, making new disciples and living the obedient life in every aspect of human existence.

JOHN concludes with a memorable conversation and a memorable question "Peter, do you love me?" A breakfast meeting after a night's fruitless fishing sees Jesus reiterating and restoring his call to Peter to ministry and service. A meeting with the risen Lord raises questions about the quality and reality of our love for Christ.

The Gospel accounts of the ministry, crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus end with a challenging variety of consequences which are well worth our fullest consideration and action as followers of Christ. They challenge us to face again what it means in practice, as individuals and as a parish, to be 'players not spectators' in a life of ongoing worship and praise, choosing the mission of the truth "Christ is Risen' and not the mission of the lie and to do so as those who love Him more than anything else.

This Easter may we live his risen life, bring life to others and give light to the world.

Giving goes up in every Diocese ... including Sheffield

Every Diocese in the Church of England saw parish income increase between 1994 and 1995. Latest statistics - just available - show that direct giving across the Church rose by 5.2% which is 1.7% above inflation. And despite not being one of the most affluent of areas covenanted giving in the Diocese of Sheffield in 1995 reached £6.90 per subscriber - the fourth highest in the Church of England.

Since 1984, direct giving over the whole Church of England has increased by around 40% in real terms,. In Sheffield Diocese - which stretches from the City of Sheffield out to Rotherham, Doncaster and on to Goole - total planned giving in 1995 reached a total of £2,794,000 in 1995 compared with £2,550,300 in 1994. Mr. Derek Lane, Christian Giving Adviser in the Diocese of Sheffield commenting on the figures said: "I think the giving in the Diocese of Sheffield is absolutely remarkable!"

P.C.C. UPDATE.

Being on the P.C.C is a serious business. Issues which affect the growth of the Church in Totley are discussed as well as issues which might well influence the personal faith of any one of us. Since we are approaching the time when we can vote new members onto the P.C.C. it is worth stressing that membership is a privilege and needs to be considered prayerfully by every one of us.

We do have our lighter moments though. At the last meeting the Treasurer reported that he had a request from the Charity Commissioners to wind up the William Green Charity. Reading from a bundle of papers he told us that this used to be worth the princely sum of 12 shillings per annum for giving bread and succour to the poor. No one seems to have any idea where the money actually comes from and certainly there is no sign of any money now. Since William Green died in 1786 it was agreed that the Charity be closed!

One of the items under discussion was the forthcoming Annual Parish Meeting. It was important to establish agenda items for all the important items of business.

We also discussed charitable giving plans for 1997. We identified a number of charities which we would like to support. We recognised however that more is involved than just sending money. All the charities we support ought to have someone in the parish who can keep us abreast of the work which they are doing so that we can support through prayer and interest as well as money. Offers would be welcome! Also we recognised that other charities may need our support if we can manage it.

The report from the Deanery Synod was particularly interesting as it gave information about the activities of some of the "problem" churches in our deanery. It made us realise that there are positive signs of spiritual growth even though some of the churches mentioned have very little resource - either financial or in numbers of congregation. We have so much for which to be thankful and so much to learn!

to the ministry in the Church. We have had women Deacons and women Readers in the Church's ministry for ages. Now we have women Priests. Soon we will have women Bishops, as some other parts of the Anglican and other Communions already have.

At the end of the day, the right to officiate in any parish church is given to a man or a woman by the licence of the Bishop, not by the status of the individual. Non-ordained men and women as well as ordained men and women are equally entitled to administer Holy Communion if they hold a licence from the Bishop.

I look forward to the day when this is accepted in all our parish churches and in every Christian denomination. I get the impression that most who worship in All Saints', Totley, do the same.

There're about a dozen permanent members of staff around the Lewisham Hospital Casualty Department but the pupil and student nurses are coming and going every eight weeks. Then there is the tremendous number of patients passing through every day, 365 days of the year!

It's been a really good form of Outreach/ Witness, call it what you may. Christian patients, doctors, physiotherapists, secretaries, policemen see the "Fish" and a conversation ensues. "Which church do you belong to?" etc. with, in some cases, other members of staff (not Christians) 'listening in'.

People who don't recognise the significance of the badge say, "That's a nice badge, is it a fish?" I can then explain what it means, why I wear it and that I'm a Christian. It seems a natural sort of witness.

Actually a drawing of a fish is one of the earliest Christian secret signs and used by Christians meeting in the catacombs of Rome. The initials of the words (in Greek) Jesus Christ, Son of God, Saviour make the word Ichthus which means fish.

You hear of fishermen bragging about the "big one that got away" – well this fish is really small fry – but it's here to stay!



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

Allow me to tell you about a wonderful creative service that I had the privilege of attending about four years ago.

"SUNDAY NIGHT LIVE"

This is the name given to an innovative cabaret style presentation, produced monthly by members of Greenhithe Parish Church.

The warm church hall is the venue and the audience is made up of local people who might feel out of place in the church building itself. There is no admission charge and by going in you are not committing yourself to anything. The advertising states "if you dislike church or have never attended church, this is for you".

Sunday Night Live is a one hour stage presentation using music (classical and contemporary), live band, drama, video and visual media. The aim is to encourage the audience to look at everyday issues and problems of life and for the Church to bring help, support, encouragement and show the relevance of Jesus Christ.

Some of the areas explored have been "Is there life after life?", Disaster area - "Why doesn't God stop disasters?", The greatest gift of all, "I'd like to believe in God, BUT!" and Jesus - Man or God?

Comments received about Sunday Night Live have included:

"You won't catch me going to church, but this is different."

"It's great, it really is. It's nothing like what I expected!"

"I thought it was going to be a typical boring church service, but that was the best church thing I've ever been to. I'll certainly come again and bring my friends."

I believe Greenhithe has shown the way and as part of our vision for mission and the "Year of Welcome" we as a church should think very seriously and pray earnestly about the idea of producing something similar of our own for the people of Totley and Sheffield.

LIBERATION

About fifty years ago the word Liberation suddenly acquired a new topical freshness. Village by village, city by city, and nation by nation, people in Europe were rejoicing because they had regained the freedom that had been denied them for years. Our newspapers and newsreels had photos of Allied soldiers being welcomed with flowers and wine and kisses by happy French, Belgian, and Dutch communities.

There was soon another, darker, side to Liberation as the ghastly existence of the concentration camps was revealed to us. Their occupants also experienced Liberation but it was a rather different experience, which could not find expression in exuberant rejoicing.

In fact the exuberance could not last for anyone. There was still an acute shortage of food, and other difficulties to be faced. Sometimes liberation produced new problems, concerning the way people had behaved during the days of the occupation by the enemy. But they were free! Whatever happened in the future could not take this away from them. And the exuberance would sometimes return. A friend of mine used to go to Belgium every year to take part in the annual ceremony of Liberation in a little village which he and his mates had freed in 1944. There was a non-stop party, and again the flowers were thrown, the wine flowed, and the kisses were exchanged. Everyone was reminded how precious freedom is, and the cost that sometimes has to be paid for it. My friend never saw the village, because he had paid for its freedom with his eyes.

On the first Easter Day Jesus's friends knew the exuberance of Liberation, as they discovered that their friend was back with them. They were free from fear, and doubt, and sorrow, just as he was free from the grave clothes and the tomb. For the time being that was enough, and their response was utter happiness. The disciples rejoiced so much because they had previously grieved so much. Now gradually they had to discover what they were free for, which was even more important than what they had been freed from. They had been liberated so that they

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

could become God's people, doing his work, speaking his words, and spreading his message. The happiness would always be part of their experience, even though it would be accompanied by difficulties, and sometimes pain.

Easter Day can be the same kind of experience for us, as we are reminded of the sheer joy that should be ours, because Jesus is always with us, risen, unrestricted, unlimited, setting us free to be his people. But Easter cannot be separated from Good Friday, for Jesus paid the price of our freedom by his death. We have to experience the sadness of Calvary, before we can sing the Easter Alleluias with real conviction.





THE RESURRECTION

DID JESUS RISE from the dead?

It has been said that the resurrection of Jesus Christ and Christianity stand or fall together (1 Corinthinas 15.14). This month we examine afresh some of the facts.

Documentary evidence

1 Corinthians chapter 15 was probably written about AD 55 and many of the generation of people who heard and knew about the death of Jesus of Nazareth would still have been alive then. Paul lists several appearances of Christ after the resurrection. (see also Acts 1.3).

Anyone who wished could have checked out the evidence by talking with eye-witnesses.

Alternative explanations

From earliest times various theories have been put forward to explain away the resurrection of Christ.

The theft theory (Matthew 28.11 - 15)

The disciples hid his body and then spread a tale about resurrection. *But* could nearly 2000 years' faith be founded on deception?

The swoon theory

Jesus did not die on the cross, but swooned and later revived in the cool tomb. *But* could someone in such a condition do that described in Luke 24.13 and John 20.19,26?

The hallucination theory

The disciples had visions of the departed, an experience common to many who grieve the loss of a loved one. *But* what about Thomas (John 20.24 - 29)? One or two people may have hallucinated at the same time but *five hundred* (1 Corinthians 15.6)!

The women went to the wrong tomb

But could the disciples and angels have been wrong as well? (See John 20.2-8; Matthew 28.6 and Mark 16.5.6)

All the theories come unstuck at one point or another leaving only one satisfactory explanation - the Lord is risen indeed! In spite of the compelling evidence men and women refuse still to believe.

Jesus's prediction

The resurrection was not an optional extra tacked on to a tragic story of betrayal and death in order to turn it into something better. It was an essential part of the same mission Jesus came to fulfil. He had predicted his suffering and death; He had also predicted rising again (Mark 8.31).



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

From the Vicar...

Dear Friends,

'SETTLERS' or 'PIONEERS'?

By the time most of you receive this Magazine, we shall have elected a Political Party to govern us for the next 5 years. I hope you will pray for them, as well as our local M.P., that they may be guided by God in the many decisions they will have to make.

The concept of 'Settlers' and 'Pioneeers' was introduced during our recent Parish day by the Revd. Mick Woodhead. Those able to come were asked to complete a personal assessment sheet, containing statements such as...'I can organise well, clearly and efficiently' or 'I love to talk to others about Jesus'. A score from 0 to 5 was needed for each statement, and when totalled up, we found ourselves to be either 'Settlers' or 'Pioneers'.

Mick explained that 'Settlers' were those who (in the Westerns) set up camp- organised things and showed some pastoral care. 'Pioneers' went out from the camp and broke new ground, lived a bit dangerously and had positive leadership qualities. We discovered that in the life of every Church **both kinds** of folk are needed. On that day, out of 65 participants, 41 thought they were 'Settlers'; 21 seemed to be a mixture of both (like me), and only 3 judged themselves to be brave 'Pioneers'. Perhaps this is par for most congregations!

The challenge, both for Church and Government, is to encourage the 'Settlers' and pray for more 'Pioneers' who will give strong Christian leadership and preach the Gospel by word and action in every community, including our own.

May God richly bless you all.

SHEFFIELD CHURCHES COUNCIL FOR COMMUNITY CARE

This title is quite a mouthful, so the group has become known as "S4C's" or S.C.C.C. However cumbersome the title, the work achieved is very much worthwhile and All Saints' congregation is glad to be able to support the work financially and with time and effort.

The best known aspect of the work locally is the Good Neighbour Scheme. Anyone needing a friendly helping hand can ask for a volunteer helper and the organisation to allow this to happen is provided by S.C.C.C.C. Ann Powell from our congregation is deeply involved in this and can be contacted either to ask for or to offer help.

Other schemes offered city-wide are After Care Schemes serving the major hospitals, an Accident and Emergency to Home Scheme, a Bereavement Support Scheme and an Escort Scheme which allows elderly patients about to leave hospital to view suitable nursing homes.

To allow all these schemes to happen S4C is constantly recruiting volunteer effort and training people in the basic skills they might require. Help in the community is something that is very worthwhile, as many previous volunteers have found. There is a special request out now for more volunteers in all these areas of activity. This is especially needed in some of the deprived parts of our city. Can you help? Would you like to know a bit more about what is involved? You are invited to contact S4C on 275 9452 or 275 7310. The office is at number 8 Backfields in the centre of Sheffield if you prefer to drop in sometime. They will be pleased to hear from you!

<u>Hymn Books</u>: The hymn books removed from church are currently being stored pending final disposal. If you know of any church or any group who would be interested in acquiring some of these books please speak to Maurice Snowdon very soon. We have put a deadline of the end of June for the disposal of any unwanted books.

P.C.C. UPDATE

It was fitting that the first meeting of the P.C.C. after the Annual Parochial Church Meeting should be preceded by a Communion Service. Not only did it help to bind the new and old members together, but it served as a reminder that, above all else, the P.C.C. is about God's business. Perhaps this helped the newly formed Council off to a good start for we had a harmonious meeting which seemed to cover a lot of ground.

After welcoming several new members there were some quick-fire arrangements like appointing a Vice Chairman (Elsie Mayson), representative on the Standing Committee (Gordon Grayson), and so on. Once again finance loomed large on the agenda, especially when the Treasurer reported that the income from all sources for the first three months of the year was more than £1,000 less than the outgoings. Stewardship is obviously a matter which will attract more attention in the months to come.

In addition to the problems of keeping the books, reporting and designating of accounts is going to have to change slightly. This may not make much difference to the parish in general terms, but it has to be sorted out and there is likely to be a difficult period of transition. Inevitably, after only a short P.C.C. meeting in March, there were several items of correspondence. It was agreed to send £50 to All Saints', Cotgrave, who have had a serious fire and appealed to other churches with a similar dedication. There was also a letter from Whirlow Grange Conference Centre, which will be explained in a separate magazine article. the Ladies Club drew attention to their space problems when they met. The J-Team were asking for money so that they can continue the good work which they are doing.

It wasn't actually said at the meeting, but of course any member of the parish can get any topic which they wish raised at a P.C.C. meeting. Correspondence is welcomed either to the Vicar or P.C.C. Secretary.

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
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A PENNY PER MILE FOR T.17

REFLECTIONS OF A HEADTEACHER

On the Parish Day we enjoyed a stimulating and interesting time, planning our future outreach at All Saints' Church. It is obvious that a very exciting period lies ahead, and along with many others I will be praying for God's guidance for the Church in this matter. However after this summer I will no longer be around to be part of this, as I retire as Headteacher of All Saints' School at the end of the academic year. My last Sunday at All Saints' Church will be Sunday 20th. July.

Inevitably I am going through a period of reflection on my 12 years working at the school and being involved with the Church. On my appointment the Diocesan Authorities expressed their concern regarding what they saw as a weak relationship between the Church and the School. My brief was to work with the new Vicar, the Revd. Stewart Rayner, to make everyone in the Church and Parish aware of the fact that they had a Church School, and to integrate and strengthen the mission of both Church and School. In fact the words of the Diocesan directive have always remained vividly with me "make this school the flagship of Christian Education in the South-West of the City". I think I can say that we succeeded!

Over the 12 years I have made some very special friends at the Church - and I hope to keep in touch with them. I have received so much love and support from so many people that at times I have felt quite overwhelmed. However I realise that I must have led a very protected life as a Christian prior to 1985, for I had never had the experience of some fellow Christians wanting to believe the worst of me and seeking to undermine my work. I found this hard, although on reflection even that has been an important part of my Christian education, to realise that those in positions of leadership within the Church - such as Vicar, Headteacher, etc. - are not always treated lovingly by their fellow Christians. To have to hide the hurt and act in a pleasant way with people within the Church family who have wounded you is not always easy.

Happily most of my reflections have been positive. I had tremendous help and support from Stewart Rayner in the early days of my Headship, he was a very hard-working and committed Chair of Governors, who contributed a great deal to the school, when it was struggling to grow and develop. In recent years that role has been equally well filled by John Lawry, who has worked particularly hard in establishing the school in its Grant Maintained Status in 1994. Latterly too, David Benson has been around to offer his pastoral support and friendship.

The 12 years have also seen tremendous growth - both in pupil numbers and in the size of the building. Our numbers have risen from 70 in 3 classes to 184 in 7 classes from September 1997. This has necessitated a well-designed internal conversion of the Victorian block, and by inserting an upper floor it has given us the space for two extra classrooms and increased toilet, washroom and shower facilities. An extension to the front of the school has provided two additional offices and an enlarged entrance. Hopefully by the end of this term the new Library will be built.

During this term we will be holding various events to which you are invited. Do come along - you will be very welcome!

"Get up an go time - and that includes you."


Such might have been a conversation between some of Jesus's friends and disciples.

Certainly, Good Friday seemed to be a disaster area. All they had hoped for, all they had banked on seemed to vapourise in the sordid mess of death by crucifixion. They didn't then realise, indeed they couldn't possibly have realised that the death at Jesus's crucifixion was the death of the power of sin over human life; it died because Jesus took it with him to his death.

Easter Sunday was the day for shocks. They had seen him die. Now they saw him alive again. he wasn't a myth. Nor was he a ghost. He was the same Jesus, but raised to life again by the power of the Father. He walked with them. He ate with them. No doubt about it. What Jesus had done on Good Friday was a total success. Not even death, supervised by the might of the Roman army, could destroy him. He lives for ever. Even the 20th century with all its avowed sophistication cannot alter that historical fact.

50 days later comes the Power Day. It is dated 50 days after Passover; in Christian terms, 50 days after Easter. It is called Pentecost (this year it is on 18th May). For us, it is the anniversary of the day when the Spirit of the risen Lord Jesus was released into the lives of all those who, from the heart, call Jesus "Lord". And once that Spirit was received the disciples got up an went - to the ends of the earth with the news: "Jesus lives!". No disciple remained at home. They all went. The news was too great to be suppressed. The power given to them could not be suppressed either. For it was the power of the Spirit of Jesus.

That power, that Spirit of Jesus is given to us today in whatever ways God chooses. But if we receive the Spirit then we too are similarly equipped to pass on the news that "Jesus lives". John N. Collie

Into the World of All

The problem of taking the Gospel into all the world is not so much the distance you have to travel. but the different worlds of people you meet as soon as you start. Two recent experiences brought this home to me; the first world was only four feet away, on a railway train and the other involved worlds that are thousands of miles away.

The 30's something World.

On a train to London I became fascinated by three people in the 30+ age range, talking about their world. They talked about their work, holidays, friends, favourite TV programmes and so on. I got a glimpse of their values, world view, life style, agendas and priorities. I then began to wonder what they would make of their local church's values, agendas, priorities and life style, in the light of their own. Could they possibly step from their world into ours?. What would they make of it? Were we worlds apart?

The Other side of the World.

Selly Oak, Birmingham gives a remarkable opportunity to meet Christians from all over the world. I spent three days there on a conference, as part of the preparation for the Lambeth Conference in 1998; a coming together from all parts of the Anglican Communion.

Amongst the staff and students I met - a Japanese priest, a Korean student, clergy from various parts of Africa and clergy from India. We shared together, both in the sessions of the conference and in the many informal conversations, how the Gospel, lived, expressed and proclaimed by Christians from our western world met the world of Africa, Asia and South America. Beneath it all was the shared conviction that the Gospel is never confined to one particular culture, for the Gospel is concerned with all people in time and

We explored the difficulties encountered in allowing the Gospel to become really a part of a world that is different from the world of the west. There was also the chance to discover how the churches were becoming and have become truly the church of the culture to which they belong.

In the Beginning.

Of course there is nothing new about this. It is all there at Pentecost and onwards, Peter faced the problem when asked to share the Gospel with Cornelius. They came from different worlds. The first Christians debated whether Gentiles should become Jewish before they could become Christians. Would they have to give up their culture and take up a Jewish Christian one in order to be a Christian? Fortunately they concluded that no they did not!

It seems however that we are slow to learn from the story of the first Christian mission of going into the world of all.

Open Doors.

The 'Here and Now' Live programme is under way. It needs to be open to all and it needs all of us to help people have the opportunity "to hear in our own tongue the wonderful works of God" (Acts 2:6). How tragic if it is just a gathering of the 'faithful'. People need to be invited and accompanied by friends. It is part of that great commission to go into all the world, which means going into the would of all. It reminds us of the challenge that sometimes the Gospel becomes over identified with our cultural expression of it, which means for them - the Christian door is closed.

SYNOD DIGEST: REPORTING DIOCESAN SYNOD, MARCH 8TH, 1997 UNITY THUMBS UP

Christian Unity was high on the agenda at the March meeting of Sheffield Diocesan Synod. Members had before them the Report "Called to be One" from Churches Together in England. Despite fears and misgivings about the Report expressed by the Bishop of Sheffield, Synod members endorsed the Report and its main thrust.

After noting the Report they reaffirmed the commitment to the goal of visible unity and the value of local ecumenical co-operation, both in Local Ecumenical Partnerships and less formally. They welcomed bilateral initiatives to visible unity in England (e.g with Methodists etc.) seeing these within the context of commitment to "all round ecumenism" while recognising that on the Unity Front much more still needs to be done.

Dr. Mary Tanner, Secretary of the General Synod's Council for Christian Unity spoke to the Motion and said it was her belief that "Ecumenism is not an optional extra." The "Called to be One" process - although complicated - was a way of reconciliation and healing. As a process it sought to clarify ecumenical issues by calling member churches of Churches Together in England each to define their understanding of the terms Church Unity and Visible Unity. In questions (to Dr. Tanner) and debate which followed the Bishop questioned why the Called to be One process had started before the full benefits of Churches Together in England had been felt. He felt that the goal of visible unity was a snare, improbable of achievement before the Second Coming of Christ. Nevertheless he was happy to work with brother and sister Christians while still accepting one another's faults and failings. The Rev'd Richard Oakley (Doncaster Deanery) asked how the process made any sense when the Church of England itself was so divided over the issue of the Ordination of Women. The only two lay members who spoke - Mrs Jill Timmins (Doncaster) and Mr Ken Gale (Ecclesall) - who proposed the Motion on behalf of the Diocesan Mission and Unity Committee - were far less half-hearted about the process, as indeed the whole Synod proved to be when it came to voting on the Motion.

A PROGRESS REPORT on the "Working as One Body" process (also known as the Turnbull Report) aimed at re-organising the central structures of the Church of England was given by the Archdeacon of Sheffield (the Ven Stephen Lowe). He outlined the "much simpler structure" of central organisation proposed by the Report with clearly defined roles for the House of Bishops, the Church Commissioners, the General Synod and Pensions Board together with the proposed Archbishop's Council. Final approval of the Report by General Synod is likely in February 1998.

THE ANNUAL REPORTS of Diocesan Committees provided the final item on the March agenda. The Bishop of Sheffield paid tribute to the work of Assistant Bishop Kenneth Skelton as Chairman of the Diocesan Advisory Committee. There were questions about Faith in the City Committee visits to Urban Priority Area parishes, about photographs of Vicarage interiors before and after occupation by the clergy and about pastoral re-organisation in the Barnsley area. There were congratulations to the Redundant Churches Committee on the sale of St. Stephen's Eastwood, Rotherham.

THE NEXT MEETING OF SHEFFIELD DIOCESAN SYNOD will be Saturday June 7th at the Yorkshire Residential School for the deaf in Doncaster.

This Synod digest is the last by the Diocesan Communications Officer, Canon Roy Arnold. The Diocese and Readers of the News send him good wishes on his retirement, as did Bishop David in his remarks at the Synod in Rotherham.



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
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WHIRLOW GRANGE CONFERENCE CENTRE

Whirlow Grange was established in 1953 as the Conference and retreat centre for our diocese. Since that time it has been used extensively by the Diocese, other Christian groups and by secular organisations. To quote the Friends' leaflet it is "a place of meeting - a setting where people can explore their relationship with God, with themselves and with one another". Weekend, midweek and day conferences are arranged on a variety of aspects relating to our faith and its working out in practice. Many of these are open to individuals and a programme is displayed on the church notice board. The Centre can also be used for private functions - wedding receptions, celebrations meals, etc. and as bed and breakfast accommodation.

Some years ago the "Friends of Whirlow" organisation was set up to give support to the Centre through prayer, active interest, financial backing, and publicity. Some fundraising events are organised to provide the Centre with some of the extra comforts that might otherwise not be available. There is also a monthly Bible Study at 10.30am (coffee from 10am) on the first Thursday of each month. Friends pay a small annual subscription and receive details of the programme and the prayer needs of the Centre.



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

C.C. were pleased to welcome Dave Fenton who is the Officer at Christ Church, Fulwood. He was able to great deal of his experience in integrating the into the worshipping body of the church. It is topic of great importance in Totley and we need a strategy urgently so that we attract and the problem of use of us who have been around a bit in the public of members of the P.C.C. are meeting again to push forward some ideas so more will be heard of this but meanwhile we can all pray for God's guidance in this sphere.

This throws into relief the need for all organisations to budget carefully so that our financial affairs can be kept under control.

The Deanery Synod report was largely concerned with information from other neighbouring churches. It was good to hear encouraging news from some of them. A working party is being set up to consider the future strategy for the Deanery. It will report in 1998!

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
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Muslim countries no Headteachers would be found undermining Islam

Another issue which gives me cause for concern is how the fear of being accused of child abuse affects every day contact with our pupils in school. I have always been a Head who has comforted a distressed child with a hug. I have sat and nursed reception children who might have been tearful at leaving a parent in the early days of their school life. My children know that they can come to me for the sort of treatment they would receive in a good home. The whole ethos of All Saints School is one of a big Christian family, but nowadays teachers are advised to avoid all physical contact with children, and one can understand why this advice is given, when we live in a world where one can so easily be accused of wrong-doing, and where people are so ready to believe the worst of others.

Of course there are still many positive things in schools today. but they do tend to be overshadowed by the negatives.

MOZAMBIQUE - HERE WE COME!

Liz Powell has written to say that she is joining the REAP (Riverside European and African Projects) project to Mozambique from July 29th to September 11th. She asks for support in the form of our prayers and finance. The P.C.C. have agreed to send £100 but the total cost is in excess of £1000 so there will be retiring collections on the first two Sundays in June.

One aim of the project is to construct a classroom extension at the Maforga Christian Mission and some of the money is needed for this. The team will also join in the work of the Mission and spend some time assisting at the orphanage. Fuller details are on the notice board in the Church Hall.

ANYTHING TO DECLARE?

We think it is a good idea to buy goods that are 'duty free', because they do not cost as much. It seems almost miraculous that at an airport we can acquire exactly the same bottle of gin as we could buy at the local supermarket, but for a fraction of the cost. Nobody seems to mind except the supermarket perhaps. It is not smuggling, or tax evasion, but perfectly legal. We benefit from the transaction because we have not had to pay the duty. Therefore duty is a bad thing, and our lives are better without it; or so it seems.

The same outlook can be applied to other aspects of life, as well as shopping. People think that the less part that duty plays in our lives the better, if by duty we mean the idea that we are under an obligation to behave in a certain way, which may be contrary to our own desires. It is so much easier to lead a duty free life.

The promises of the Scout and Guide Associations have a different view of duty, since they are both based on the idea that duty is the real basis of their movements. "I promise that I will do my best to do my duty to God, and the Queen." It is a view that found its expression in the lives of many of the heroes and heroines of history. (Are we allowed to have heroes and heroines these days?) I own a slightly bad-tempered note, hastily scribbled by the Duke of Wellington, saying that he has more than enough duty to perform without undertaking any extra. He was 81 at the time, but still driven by the same sense of being under an obligation to his country that had enabled him to achieve his great victories.

No society or cause or religion can prosper if it does not produce people who are willing to do their duty; to behave in accordance with a set of rules and a code of conduct which may conflict with their own personal wishes. The Catechism expresses it very clearly in terms of Christian duty to God and to our neighbours, as an extension of the Ten Commandments.

But although duty is a necessary element in our decisions about what to do, and what not to do, it is not enough. As a former colleague of mine

Keen Disciples in a Learning Church



Retirement brings reflection: sometimes despondency at things undone (the Ground Elder - unfairly nick-named Bishop's Weed - still holds its own in the garden despite a seventeen year long campaign of destruction) but sometimes an unchanged confidence that I was (and am!) on the right track.

In February 1991 (in an article with the splendidly catchy title "Lent is for learning and Easter for Joy" I wrote "I will do everything I can to persuade the people of the Diocese of Sheffield to become **keen disciples in a learning Church.**

"Disciple" is the key word. Those who followed Jesus became his disciples for they believed that he had, for them, the words of eternal life. And "keen" is the right word to describe the quality of that discipleship: they were bold in believing, and courageous and determined in their learning. Believers today, as then, are called the disciples of Jesus. And our understanding of our discipleship is inadequate if despite our fervour in praise, our boldness in proclamation, our persistence in prayer and the strength and clarity of our faith, it does not extend to keenness for learning. Too often we've fallen into the trap of thinking that learning is safely left to children in Sunday School, new beginners in Confirmation Classes, or to those 'Adults' who happen to enjoy 'Education' and Study Groups. The truth is that a disciple must long to learn and so we who are disciples are committed to a pilgrimage in truth that is, at its shortest, life long.

This explains why, from the beginning, the Church has been a learning and teaching Church: a fellowship within which we come to understand the meaning of the teaching of Jesus for us, His disciples today. Almost invariably when we meet for worship we hear the Scriptures (and especially the Gospels) read and then their meaning for us is expounded in the sermon. But too often preachers and listeners have conspired together to prevent us making much of this core activity of the Church. On an average Sunday we don't always look like 'keen disciples in a learning Church'.

There are a number of villains here: the Church herself is not blameless in allowing so much else to creep into the liturgy that the two basic reasons for our assembling - bible reading and bread breaking have become swamped in a variety of other bits and pieces. A congregation too, if its desire and expectation of learning is low and its pressure on their preacher to spend his time on more popular activities is great, can stop the learning process even in a 'successful' parish. And we preachers can also sit too lightly to the responsibilities given us by our calling to be ministers of the word."

Has much changed since 1991? In some places yes: there have been serious efforts to take seriously the learning needs of an all age congregation. I welcome all such experiments. I believe too that the traditional sermon - the expounding of the written word of scripture so that it becomes a living truth for today can be an effective method of feeding us hungry souls. We need a greater commitment to, and expectation from, the Sunday learning opportunity and experience. And if we were to be remembered for only one thing I would be happy for it to be those six words: Keen Disciples in a Learning Church.

MORE REFLECTIONS OF A HEADTEACHER

Over recent months I have spent a good deal of time reflecting on the changes which have taken place generally in the country's primary schools. Of course there are the changes which get a good deal of publicity such as the National Curriculum, which was introduced in the late 1980's, and then changed every year until 1995, which involved school staff in lots of extra work. If only it could have been carefully thought out and implemented when it was near to being workable!

However other changes worry me much more. concerned about the attitude to Christianity in schools. It is very easy for people living in this area of Sheffield to be unaware of negative influences on pupils by the approach of some Headteachers in this City. We are fortunate in that several of the Heads around here are practising Christians and those that aren't, do not undermine Christianity in their schools. But conversations which I have had over the last 12 years, and comments which I have heard made at meetings worry me Some Heads will "bend over backwards" to greatly. accommodate other religions and will be very caring and sensitive to the worshippers, but these same people have no time for Christianity in their schools, and are quite unsympathetic, and are at times scathing to practising Christians. Some even seem pleased if they are criticised for their failure in areas of R.E. and Worship during their OFSTED Inspections! In the light of these experiences I was not surprised to hear on the radio, a recent report has suggested in the year 2000 there will be more practising Muslims than practising Christians in this country. I am quite certain that in



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
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

We made further substantial progress towards long term financial stability. Our investment performance was exceptional, with a total return (capital and income combined) of 17-1% – better than 99% of other funds.

We are very grateful that parishes and dioceses have shouldered a growing proportion of the cost of stipends and will share the cost of clergy pensions from 1998. This has relieved the pressure on us to produce income and enabled us to rebalance our assets for better future capital and income growth. The Commissioners' income could never be enough to meet the growing cost of pensions, as well as a high proportion of clergy stipends, so parishes' increased giving is essential if we are to fulfil our historic trust to support the Church's ministry in the neediest areas.

The clergy Pensions Measure comes into effect from 1998. It provides for a new funding partnership. We will continue to





Our primary responsibility is the financial support of the clergy nationwide, particularly in areas of need and opportunity, providing money for clergy stipends, pensions and housing.

pay for all existing clergy pensions and pension rights earned up to the date of change. Parishes and dioceses will pay for pension rights earned in the future. We expect to spend above one-third of our capital on pensions over about 60 years. We will spend about £60 million between 1998 and 2002 to help dioceses phase in the impact of the cost of pension contributions. The income from our remaining capital will help to provide extra stipends support focused on the parochial ministry in the needier dioceses, as well as the statutory payments due to most rectors and vicars. It will also pay for bishops' ministry and stipends for some cathedral clergy, who we have a legal duty to support arising from our strong historical connections. We

plan to provide a minimum of £20 million per annum towards stipends, rising in line with stipends from 2003. Together, these measures lay the foundation for a renewed partnership for funding the Church's nationwide ministry.





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

From the Vicar...

Dear Friends,

GETTING AWAY FROM IT ALL!

School holidays here again...families will be dashing around putting together all the necessary bits and pieces that are needed for the average family holiday. Tenters and Caravaners will be checking pegs, awnings, gas, water and waste containers, and batteries; Bed and Breakfasters will need maps and books giving details of farmhouses, etc; Hotel types need to ensure that all bookings made are confirmed; those going to Centre Parks or some Holiday Camps will need to do the same; and Walkers and Bikers will need to check their boots, bikes, rucksacks, and... the Kendal Mint Cake!

Why all this frenzied activity for just two or three weeks? Is it all worth it in the long run? "Of course it is" you all say....until the packing and the sorting gets on top of you, and the children persist in getting in the way! Yet, once you arrive at your chosen destination, or begin your chosen activity, all that preparation does seem worth while.

AGENT OF CHANGE

Sharing and office with Mary, a woman who was charged with the responsibility of 'changing the culture' amongst the admin and clerical staff within a small department of three separate buildings in the health service was an interesting experience that others may well relate to.

Paula was a very experienced personal secretary to an established consultant and was senior to two other secretaries in the adjacent office. She used an old style word processor and had an electric typewriter on standby by her right arm (for typing envelopes). She became very flustered at the thought of the new Microsoft word system and would only consider going on a course that excluded junior staff members.

Pat, always smiling and pleasant, and twenty years younger than Paula was desperate to convert her temporary contract to full-time and eagerly applied for courses that would smooth the process. She was keen to adopt the new system, since she was using one of Paula's old typewriters. Lacking in self confidence she had grave doubts that she would be good enough to effect the change personally, yet could see great benefits it could bring.

Petra, also pleasant and easy in manner got on very well with her office mate Pat and although close in age they worked for different departments. She had a new computer with all the up to date software and could easily correct any work to a very high standard. Her self confidence, speed and accuracy were enhanced by the new system which enabled her to communicate directly with her manager, to monitor his every movement through an electronic diary and send copies to his laptop for direct approval. She had plenty of time to assist Pat with her work, but was not allowed to let her use her departmental equipment.

The general trend was towards the new equipment and nothing less than every department 'on line' at the same time would be possible since each department must enter their bed occupancy and staffing figures daily through the system and be analysed through a network of like machines.

Mary had to effect the change in this as well as two other departments simultaneously. She was new and had no knowledge of admin and clerical work, knew nothing about the staff and had previously failed in a management position in another department. Previously unwell and supporting a dependent relative she was on more than one occasion reduced to tears as each personal slight landed on her doorstep from her new staff and their supporters. As the system came on board the staff grew more hostile and attacks became more personal.

The system was fully operational within a years but Mary had by then begun her long term sickness. No one would wish to return to what is laughingly referred to as the days of chalk and slate, nor give Mary credit since she was instructed to effect the change by others. The complaints about Mary's style disappeared as she was buried along with the hatchets in the grave and no polite person should speak ill of the dead.


UGH!

How does the spider get into the bath? Some people insist that it climbs up the waste-pipe, and they always keep the plug in the plug hole to prevent such unauthorised entry. It is pointed out to them that since the spider is unable to climb up the sloping sides of the bath, it is unlikely to be able to climb up a vertical pipe, they insist that the pipe is coated with a layer of soap which gives the spider's feet enough grip to get up. The presence of water in the u-bend need not be an insuperable barrier, if you are convinced that a spider can hold its breath while it swims round the bend. Just what the beast is doing in the waste-pipe in the first place is rather obscure. My mother always held that it is useless to keep the plug in the plug hole, since any self-respecting spider can easily lift the plug by bracing most of its feet against the grating, and pushing with the other ones.

The theory that spiders live in the overflow pipe, and sometimes lose their footing as they emerge, before they reach the safety of the bath surround, is not worthy of serious consideration. Another explanation is that spiders sometimes for unknown reasons fall off the ceiling. If they make a soft landing on the floor, they can scuttle away unseen. It is only when they fall into the bath that their presence is noted.

If you consider that the bath occupies an area of only about twelve square feet (fairly small compared with the total floor area of the house) it suggests that there is a fairly constant drip of spiders in every room. So it would be possible to produce a formula giving the total number of spiders falling throughout the house during a day, based upon the frequency with which one specimen is found in the bath. On the other hand, it maybe that it is only the occasional particularly stupid spider which loses its grip. Another theory is that the inhalation of bath essence fumes renders some particularly susceptible specimens incapable of climbing polished surfaces, and that the healthier specimens scramble out without difficulty. In both cases the survival of the fittest will ensure that such stupidity disappears within a few million

ADAM'S CHILDREN

With time and prayer the Bible gets better and better! Here we dare not be content with half measures. All racism is of the Devil. We Bible-believing Christians have no choice: we must be in the front line of the battle against racism. For we know that we are all Adam's Children.

AND BROTHER TO THE OX

Genesis Truth too compels us to be "green". For it reminds us that we share with the rest of the natural creation the privilege of having been made by God. That writer knew nothing of Charles Darwin and Evolution, but he did know that there was a linking ladder between the "plants yielding seed", "every living creature with which the water swarm", "every winged bird", "cattle and creeping things" and us humans. And Adam is given responsibility for the whole of our planet. We are in this Garden to "till it and keep it" - not to destroy it.

Thank you for your friendship and kindness all these years. May God guide and bless you always.



NEW BISHOP OF SHEFFIELD

The next Bishop of Sheffield is to be the Rt. Revd. Jack Nicholls who is at present Bishop of Lancaster in the Diocese of Blackburn. His appointment was announced by Downing Street on Wednesday June 18th. He will succeed the present Bishop, the Rt. Revd David Lunn who retires at the end of August.

Bishop Nicholls (53) is a Lancashire man having been born and brought up in the Rossendale Valley. He was educated at Bacup and Rawtenstall Grammar School and Kings College, London. For most of his ministry he has worked in the Diocese of Manchester first as Curate at St. Clement with St. Cyprian, Ordsall, Salford - the original "Coronation Street" parish - and then for nine years as Curate and later Vicar of All Saints and Martyrs, Langley - a large council estate to the North of Manchester where he says "the people taught me how to be a priest". In 1978 he became Director of Pastoral Studies at the College of the Resurrection, Mirfield and five years later was appointed a Residentiary Canon of Manchester Cathedral. He became Bishop of Lancaster in the Diocese of Blackburn in 1990.

Bishop Jack (as he prefers to be known) has been closely involved in the fostering and developing of vocations to the priesthood of the Church of England both in the parish, at theological college and as Director of Post Ordination Training in Manchester. He has been closely involved with Parish Missions, retreat work and Spiritual Direction particularly of the clergy. He has ordained women to the Priesthood in the Diocese of Blackburn but has always been keen to

listen to those opposed on this issue. "The important thing is that we hold things together" he says. This year he will be leading a Mission in the Diocese of Blackburn and in Bloemfontein, South Africa. In addition to his Diocesan responsibilities he is Warden of the Community of St. Mary the Virgin, Wantage (an Anglican Convent) and he has been President of the Lancaster and District Homeless Action Service and President of Age Concern Lancashire.

He is co-author of "A Faith worth sharing? A Church worth joining?". He enjoys music (mainly pre 20th Century) especially classical and baroque. He used to sing but gets little opportunity now and he enjoys history and "watching rubbish on T.V....mainly films".

Bishop Jack is married to Judith and they have four children: Antony (26), Michael (23), Rachel (19) and Clare (18). They have one grandchild - Jack - who was born in 1995. Mrs Nicholls works as a Nursery Nurse in a Primary School. At present she is learning Sign Language and recently made her debut as a member of a local Signing Choir. Antony works at the Midland Hotel, Manchester; Michael is doing post graduate studies at UMIST, Rachel is studying "Physical Theatre" at Salford University and Clare is taking her A Levels hoping to go on to Manchester University.

The Bishop hopes to take up his work in Sheffield in the New Year. In the intervening months (after August 31st) the Bishop of Doncaster - the Rt. Revd. Michael Gear - will have pastoral oversight of the Diocese.

Some years after my own retirement, and when , Hilda and I moved to Dulverton Hall in Scarborough, who should be one of the first residents there to welcome us but John Pears, with his characteristic smile, his gentle nature and his sincerity. Many people will remember John. His chaplaincy work in Sheffield Hospitals over 15 years was legendary, and the people of St. Cuthbert's, Fir Vale remember him lovingly. 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
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P.C.C. . UPDATE.

The item on the agenda which took most time was to do with the Development Plan. As a result of a discussion in the previous month and also some letters addressed to the P.C.C., the Standing Committee has offered to undertake a major review of the Plan and to report its findings to the September meeting of the P.C.C. Subsequently several dates in July and August have been earmarked for this task.

In another sphere the P.C.C. received a report on the present position over the developments on the College site and the ways in which it will affect the church. The future of the land which we know as the South Lawn will have to be decided soon but also it was recognised that the building of houses so close to the church creates an opportunity for evangelism that is a real challenge.

There was a report on Stewardship in the parish - a topic that will have to be addressed again in the very near future. Also the treasurer reported on modifications which are necessary in our accounting procedures - measures which don't actually produce any more money but give the treasurer more work to do! The Diocesan Secretary has recommended that 1/3 of the church capital should be invested in Equity funds and 2/3 in Fixed Interest funds - this again is more work for the treasurer!

A copy of the Bishop of Sheffield's address to the June Synod is available from the P.C.C. secretary on request. One small but very encouraging item is that a regular men's meeting has begun and is planning to go on meeting on Tuesday evenings. This is in addition to the meetings of the Home Groups which the Mission Team are planning.

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

Dear Friends,

SOMETHING BEAUTIFUL FOR GOD.

The deaths of Princess Diana and Mother Teresa have caused us all to look again at our lives. The words of Jesus "Whatever you did (or did not do) for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did (or did not do) for me" must now challenge us all.

Princess Diana (despite her wealth) had experienced tremendous sadness, rejection and tragedy in her family life. What love and care she had missed in her life, she transferred to others in her work amongst the outcasts of our society. Her acts of compassion (many of which only came to light after her death) were spontaneous responses to that suffering, rather than any dutiful outworking of her public position. As a recent 'Church Times' Leader commented -"If she had a personal motive for her public works, it was not the desire for fame (of which perhaps she had more than enough) but out of a need to love and be loved." Ric Gray's letter in this magazine affirms that she did 'something beautiful for God.'

Mother Teresa was without doubt a humble, devoted disciple of Jesus. Billy graham said "she was one of the most humble and sweetest of God's servants"; Archbishop George Carey said that "Mother Teresa was a truly inspirational servant of the gospel of Jesus Christ." She died in the Calcutta that had been the base for her life's work of love and care for the homeless, the hungry, the outcast and the diseased. We pray that the R.C. Church will quickly move to bestow the title of Saint upon her. for that is what she truly was..doing 'something beautiful for God.'

The deaths of these two women should challenge us to live our lives as Jesus Christ did. Show others today that you love them; tell them what they mean to you, so that you will have no regrets if they die suddenly. Live your life reaching out to others, as Diana and Mother Teresa did do supremely.

May God bless us and help us to do just that.



DIANA, PRINCESS OF WALES **REST IN PEACE AND RISE IN GLORY**


None of use finds it easy to accept the tragic death of a woman in her prime and especially a young mother. We feel a sense of injustice, and maybe anger. We want to ask WHY?

Christians don't have easy answers to these difficult questions. We do, however, believe that there is an answer. We believe that it is found at the cross of Jesus, where a young man, near enough the same age as Diana, suffered and died. We believe we have there a window into the heart of God. He loves us so much that He gave Jesus to die for us. We also believe that our loving God is with us in our own suffering. We are confident in believing these things, because the Cross is only part of the story. We also believe that Jesus was raised from the dead and is alive forever. That he has conquered death itself. That death is now the gateway to life eternal. We also dare to believe that in some way God is able to bring good from suffering.

None of these things means that we shall know any less grief at the loss of one we have loved, respected and admired. Diana has been delivered from her suffering, and she is now with the Lord. We are sure that she has inherited the promise of Jesus, "Where I am, you may be also". We are sure also that the strong love of God will hold her and keep her and us now and forever.

The Rev. Tony LLoyd, Executive Director of the Leprosy Mission. travelled extensively with Diana, Patron of the Mission. She told him during one of many discussions about Christianity, "I could not get through life without prayer". As God's people, we commit ourselves to praying for her family and especially William and Harry, and to reaching out to the hurting people in our society with Christ's compassion.

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
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

P. C. C. UP-DATE.

P.C.C. meetings seem to get longer and longer but we were all conscious that we had achieved a lot at the September meeting. The first item was to warmly welcome Yvonne Twelvetree and Alan Burt as co-opted members. Then we went on to discuss the Development Plan. The modifications introduced will help to improve communication in the parish. In the coming months it is hoped that everyone will find their own personal slot or slots if they have not already done so. It will help us to become a more vibrant, active and forward looking church. The plan was discussed in the light of papers from the Diocese discussing Ministry Teams. The concept of ministry is so important that a separate page is given to it.

The P.C.C. agreed to support Ric Gray in his course which has just started. Money is being sought from various grant making bodies and of course many of us will personally want to support him and his family in whatever way we can but the church will make up the money required for the first years' tuition fees. Our treasurer was authorised to open a special account and will be pleased to receive money to fill it so that we can fulfil our intention.

Another issue requiring help from the congregation at large is the problem of staff for Young Saints. There is a very serious shortage which actually threatens to close down this important activity amongst our youngsters. Fortunately there was one volunteer from within the P.C.C. but more help is still needed - and urgently!

Also on the ecumenical front we agreed to try and persuade the Sheffield Council of Churches to become Churches Together in Sheffield and to avoid duplication of mailing and information.

Renewing the Cathedral

In the short time I have been here, I have grown very fond of the Cathedral. Ours is an endearing intriguing building, much loved by many in Sheffield for whom it is still t'owd church. I rarely go into the nave without finding people sitting quietly there, lighting candles or saying prayers.

The fact that it is not a premier league building and not on the heritage tourist track releases us to discover, I think, what is really of the essence of being a cathedral.

The Howe Report defined it as being "the seat of the bishop and a centre of worship and mission". We are trying to explore how that insight, embodied in our mission statement, can become more of a reality.

You often hear it said that the church isn't buildings: it's people. That is only half the truth. We all need sacred space to resort to in order to revisit our lives, find healing for our broken selves, begin to see things as God does.

Every church building is a sacrament in stone of God's presence in the life of the world. It is a sign of his mission. It shapes the attitudes and experiences of those who come into it, not least the faith community for whom it is the regular focus of prayer. That is especially true of the cathedral building which is so visibly a symbol of 'public faith' in the city centre.


So we want to be sure that our building will continue to be an affective symbol of presence and tool of mission into the new millennium. A whole raft of maintenance tasks is now becoming urgent. The lantern will be rebuilt and new stained glass installed next year. The nave floor needs to be taken up so that the underfloor heating system, now in a state of terminal decline, can be replaced. The organ is at the end of its useful life and beyond repair. The hall needs thorough refurbishment so that the Breakfast Project can operate effectively from there.

The Cathedral's Development Group has been debating how this maintenance agenda can be turned into an opportunity to enhance the building. Its 'vision' for the building has now been accepted in principle by the Cathedral Council and work on drawing up detailed plans is about to begin.

Briefly, the aim is to enhance the church by putting down a new floor in stone, simplifying and renewing the furnishings so as to

create a greater sense of freedom and space, and creating a new high sanctuary by bringing the high altar forward s that it is central to the space east of the tower, with a new *cathedra* behind it.

We also intend to install a new organ with a west-end nave division and a choir section underneath the tower. (Unt then, because of the deterioration of the pipe organ, a Copeman-Hart digital organ is to be introduced at the end of the vear.)

All this will not only renew a beautiful interior and enable us to celebrate the liturgy more effectively. It will also make the building more serviceable for the needs of the people who use it. At the same time, we are proposing to improve disabled access from the Narthex, and to extend the hall by building an additional floor at the nave level and opening up access from the Church, and creating there a first-rate educational facility with the needs of school groups especially in mind.

This far-reaching project will only be achieved with the goodwill and encouragement of those who care for the Cathedral. That means the people of the city, its own worshipping community, and above all (because of what a cathedral essentially *is*) the Diocese. We are working on a presentation of our thinking that will give everyone a chance to see what is envisaged.

The arrival of a new Bishop is an auspicious moment at which to be laying down the plans for the future. His views of the Cathedral and its mission will be crucial. But ultimately, the Cathedral belongs to you, the people of this Diocese. So I hope that you will let us know what you believe about your Cathedral and how its building should be developed for a new century.

FROM ROSSINGTON WITH LOVE - LAND FOR DUMBUTU

An urban priority parish in Doncaster has bought a piece of land near the city of Serrakunda in the Gambia.

The people of St. Luke New Rossington have purchased the land for £2,600 so their adopted village, Dumbutu, can establish a compound there.

Now, they have launched an appeal for the extra £2,403 which is needed to buy materials for dwellings on the barren, dusty land.

Spearheading the project are the Walker family who worship at St. Luke's - Michael has twice been out to Dumbutu taking aid to the needy people from friends in Rossington.

Thanking all who have raised money for the compound, his wife, Mandy says: "Absorb what this means for the people of Dumbutu.

"A group of poor rural villagers, struggling to survive in the harsh jungle of West Africa, will now own land close to the city where they will be able to go for education, medical attention and employment.

"They will not have to pay out their meagre coins to sleep on someone else's floor - it will be Dumbutu land for ever."

It is hoped that other parishes will feel moved to support the appeal - the government has the right to confiscate the lands if the people fail to erect buildings.

So far, the Walkers have received £12 to pay for three bags of cement, but much more money is urgently required. Perhaps, as well as contributing cash, you could send items with Michael when he returns to Dumbutu in November.

I must take this opportunity to express gratitude to Canon Gordon Taylor, who has edited this publication so well during the past 14 years.



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The article by Ric Gray in the September Magazine (A Passion for Jesus) needs to be followed up. Ric has taken this step of faith and our prayers and good wishes go with him as he prepares himself for greater opportunities for ministry which will surely come to him. However we need also to support him in practical terms and, for most of us, that means money. To be most effective we need to get this right. (See also P.C.C. Up-date)

Needless to say all money will be welcome however much the amount. Neil Hayden has opened a special account in the church funds to hold everything which we can give to him for this purpose. Because the church is recognised by the Inland Revenue as a charity such money can be increased by recovery of tax in those cases where the donor pays tax.

There are three basic ways of giving in this tax efficient way. A covenant for four years requires that an agreed sum of money (which can be quite small) is paid regularly every week, month, quarter or year. The requirement is that the church books need to identify such payments with the donor who must therefore give either through periodic cheques or standing orders.

The second method is a deposited covenant whereby a single sum of money is paid to the church. This is then effectively regarded as a loan until the fourth year and the church can recover the tax on a quarter of the total amount each of the four years.

The other method is known as "Gift Aid" and this only applies to amounts of £250 or over. Such a payment would be a one off payment but the big advantage to the church is that the tax can be recovered immediately without waiting until the end of the financial year.

In any of these cases the important point is that the covenant papers must be completed before the payment is made. The Inland Revenue are quite firm about this so we would encourage everyone thinking about helping Ric in this way to speak to one of us first.

Do pleae pray earnestly as to what you can do to help Ric and his family in this way.



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

ON HEAVEN

"The mystery of heaven to us is a closed book" Tony Banks, Minister of Sport said on being appointed. "It is like going to heaven without having to die first", and there probably lies the answer. But that does not prevent some according heavenly status to earthly situations. Some are ridiculous, but others are almost worthy of being heavenly. Vide, the dictionary "HEAVEN" - "THE ABODE OF GOD AND THE BLESSED": "THE PLACE OF SUPREME FELICITY." I hope that what follows belongs to the latter meaning.

I have an O.A.P. widow neighbour who has spent the past year or so with her sister in Berkshire at the local hospital nursing her sister's husband all day and every day, feeding, cleaning, washing, etc. Her sister lived in an isolated spot, with no bus service (my neighbour has a small car). Time took its toll on them. My neighbour suggested she move to Sheffield; the sister agreed. My neighbour contacted councillors and the housing department, but as she was not homeless, could do nothing. However, a local housing association offered a bungalow in Sheffield in an area where Pakistani and Indians were in a majority. That was no calamity. My neighbour's sister had spent several holidays in India, and had times been happier would have retired there. Her acceptance began a frenzy of activity by my neighbour. She scrubbed floors, etc., put up curtains, had carpets fitted, bought kitchen furniture, and was at hand to put everything in its place.

Now her sister's husband is at home, a home carer calls daily. My neighbour still goes every day - it is only at Darnall. In telling me this, I said "My word, you're well up the ladder to heaven." She replied. "I guess she (her sister) thinks she is already there." On asking a retired priest for his view on heaven, he replied "Heaven is where Christ is." Well, having read this, what do you think? The least that can be said is that it adds credence to the aphorism "The Lord finds ordinary people to do extraordinary things."

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


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CHURCHES TOGETHER IN S17

CALLED TO BE ONE

The Lent Study Groups this year discussed a number of ways in which the local churches might work more closely together. Several of the suggestions already happen; some have been made before and rejected or deferred, but it has been suggested that the list should be offered to Magazine Editors for publication in whole or in part and an invitation given for further comment. Please give these to either the Vicar or Maurice Snowden.

- 1. Periodic or occasional joint Sunday evening services (especially at major festivals) on a rota basis. The services to be in the manner of the host church.
- 2. Requesting each church to prepare a policy statement as to how they would be prepared to seek greater unity with other denominations.
- 3. Offer regular CTS17 reports to the individual church councils or committee.
- 4. To explore the possibilities of responding together to the social needs of the community.
- 5. The formation of an inter-church choir.
- 6. Further encouragement of Childrens' Mission and holiday programmes.
- 7. Further encouragement and extension of the ecumenical prayer activities which already take place.
- 8. Change the name of CTS17 to something like "The Church of Christ in Totley".
- 9. CTS17 should concentrate on responding to and co-ordinating the initiatives of individual churches rather than seeking to impose committee ideas.
- 10. Seek further ways of social co-operation as well as spiritual.

Churches Together in S17 (continued)

- 11. An open-air service (or services).
- 12. Erection of a large cross at Easter somewhere visible.
- 13. Witness walks silent on Good Friday and joyful on Easter Day.
- 14. Exchanging congregations on specific Sundays (say 12 at a time).
- 15. Share a Christian Youth Leader.
- 16. Changes to the Holy Week joint service to include more for getting to know each other followed by worship and also to hold the service on different days to enable more people to participate.
- 17. A shared programme of Marriage Preparation.
- 18. Greater sharing of Magazine material and possibly a joint local 'insert' or magazine.
- 19. A shared "drop-in Coffee Shop".
- 20. Greater co-operation through the uniformed organisations and possible sharing of school assemblies.
- 21. Sharing of help where individual churches have special needs.
- 22. Sharing of what we already do, e.g. breakfasts, meetings, etc.

PRISONERS OF THE PAST, PRISONERS WITH HOPE



This month's title was prompted by the fact that 16-22 November is Prisoners' Week. It gave me the chance to draw your attention to the fine ministry being exercised by the Prison Chaplains in our diocese, both full-time and part-time, and also the many church people who give active support to them in their various prisons.

HOPE FOR THE FUTURE

The prison population in our diocese is 2,600 and rising. In England and Wales the number is 62,500 and is increasing at a rate of about 200 per week. Whilst the prison population has risen dramatically over the years, the staffing levels have been reduced; a fact which bewilders and dismays those who actually have to make the system work.

This has had its affect on the Ministry of Prison Chaplains. The reduction in Chaplaincy levels at some of our prisons has affected the level of pastoral care and support needed by prisoners and their families. Where Chaplains worked collaboratively with the uniformed staff and the probation service to provide offending behaviour programmes, resources are no longer available.


The Chaplains, along with many others in the Prison Services, ask for our support in demanding that our prisons are not just places that exist because of a person's past, but are also part of the community which offers prisoners some kind of hope for the future.

There are a number of issues which demand the political will to be faced and resolved.

We cannot go on ignoring overcrowding, the length of time prisoners on remand spend awaiting trial, how we deal with those who have some form of mental illness and young people given a custodial sentence. We know that there are no easy solutions for complex situations but that does not mean a humane society can leave things as they are. A way must be found to make things better.

THE GOSPEL AND HOPE

The theme of Prisoners of the Past, Prisoners with Hope also reminded me of one of the most powerful addresses I



heard during my time in Southern Africa at a Congress on mission and evangelism in Durban in the Apartheid era. The speaker was Dr. Alex Boraine, a former President of the Methodist Church in South Africa. To him the problem of the past in South African history and church life lay in a Christian unwillingness to pay the price of repentance and change. He spoke of his own pilgrimage of discovery which led him to a deeper understanding of the truly rounded nature of the Gospel and his grasp of the truth that we must not separate the personal and social dimensions of the Gospel. I end with some quotations from his address in Durban:-

"I begin to see that there is indeed the general truth of the gospel once for all delivered to the saints. But it only becomes real in the particulars of a given situation.

"For example, you can't talk about justice without talking of acting justly. You can't talk about mercy unless you are also talking of merciful deeds. You can't talk about love unless you are talking of loving someone or some community specifically.

At that point, I began to learn the meaning of the incarnation. I suddenly realised that this Jesus was indeed alive, and that his cross was made of wood. I saw that he couldn't be locked up in my heart or in my language or in my church or in my colour, or in my culture. He would break loose again and again, and disturb me. At that point a great barrier broke down between the secular and the sacred. I needed to learn the costliness of the gospel. I needed to learn that we do violence to the gospel when we present it as something cheap."

The Heart of the Matter

A New Institute in Sheffield

Education never ceases. In an ideal world, it is never just about "getting through" a course or particular stage. It is not a functional activity, but a lifelong process. Moreover, it has a wider purpose to do with individuals and their citizenship, and how society is best able to reflect upon itself and move forward. Education is for the enrichment of lives. 'An education which is not an education of the heart,' wrote Aristocle, 'is no education at all'.

The Lincoln Theological Institute is now established in Sheffield. A designated College of the University, it exists to promote research and teaching into contemporary, church and society. The Institute has grown out of Lincoln Theological College, which trained ordinands from 1874 to 1994. Following its closure, the library was transferred to the new site in Wilkinson Street, nestling amongst a number of other University buildings and Research Institutes.

The need to study religion and society is perpetual. Some of the greatest and most damaging conflicts in the world have been shaped and influenced by religion. Yet religion can bring peace and reconciliation. Church attendance has allegedly declined in Western Europe in recent decades, yet faith in God - believing without belonging - persists and continues to flourish. Phenomena from New Religious Movements to the mass display of 'civic religion' at Princess Diana's funeral, seem to counter the proposition that society is becoming more secular. Religion remains an integral part of much social life, and continues to influence and inform a wide range of issues, from healthcare to politics, through to morality and polity.

The Lincoln Theological Institute for the Study of Religion and Society is a resource for both the University and the Diocese. A considerable part of its work will be to develop postgraduate and postdoctoral research projects related to issues in religion and society. Project Directors, Fellows and students will collaborate on a range of issues that will often have a direct bearing on how churches reflect on their work. There will also be publications, seminars and conferences that underpin this aspect of the Institute. A taught MA on Religion and Society is also being planned (details to follow).

In addition to the University work, the Lincoln Theological Institute is also planning to run some courses that will have a wider appeal. An 'Autumn School' at the Cathedral is being inaugurated in

1998 (Wednesday lunchtime, from September 16th to October 28th). the first 'School' will be on the subject of 'Conversion', and will look at the phenomena in different faith traditions, as well as examining the psychology of conversion and some narratives of notable converts. Contributors to the series will be drawn from Universities all over the country, with the lectures pitched

at an accessible level. In due course we hope to expand this type of work, possibly in association with the University Department of Continuing Education.

THE HUB OF THE BUILDING

The Library is the hub of the building in Wilkinson Street. We have over 20,000 volumes and periodicals, covering doctrine, patristics,

history, philosophy, liturgy and ministry. We are fortunate in that we have been able to develop the library on the new site without increasing charges for membership. Applications are welcome from now, and clergy of the diocese are able to enrol for free. Caroline Dicker is the Chief Librarian, and will be pleased to deal with all enquiries. The library is open during weekdays (closed from 1p.m. to 2 p.m.)

I am delighted to be part of this diocese, and that the Institute is located in the City of Sheffield. I trust you will find it a valuable resource. I hope to visit local deaneries in due course, to talk more about the work of the Institute. I also hope that the diocese, in turn, will encourage and support the different types of work the Institute undertakes.

With a new Millennium approaching, deeper and broader understandings of religion and society are of vital importance for the shaping of our futures. Our education here will not just be a matter of the mind, but as Aristotle reminds us, of the heart also.

When I was Chaplain at Lee Abbey I used to do a tour each winter of some Schools, Universities, Colleges and Theological Colleges.

On one such tour I visited Kelham Theological College here in Yorkshire and was welcomed on arrival by one of the students whom I had met previously. It was good to see him again and as we walked through long corridors to the room where I was to stay we chatted amicably and caught up a little on each other's news.

Gradually I became aware of the total silence in the place and the fact that there seemed to be just nobody else around. I remarked on this to my friend, and he replied "Well, at the moment the College is holding its daily period of silence." Immediately I apologised for talking to him. But he said "Oh that's perfectly all right - I'm on O.D.S."

I said no more - I couldn't even begin to understand what he was talking about! We reached my room in silence, and once inside I asked him "What is this O.D.S.?" It stood for "On Divine Service".

He then explained that when a visitor arrived at the College all the normal rules of the College were suspended for the member who was meeting the visitor, because the visitor - whoever he or she might be - was to be treated as if they might be the Lord himself. The visitor was to be received with full honour and respect and in no way to be made subject to any of the rules which applied to the daily routine of the house.

I find myself as impressed by that now as I was when it happened to me nearly 40 years ago. When I got home I told my wife what had happened and I also reported it to the other members of the Lee Abbey Community of which she and I were also members. We have never forgotten it. We have tried, not always with great success, to apply it to those who have rung the bell at our home, whether they be family, friends, parishioners, or, as often happens in "open" vicarages, people totally unknown to usand we could tell you some eye-opening stories about how this worked out with the last group!

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
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
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P. C. C. UP-DATE.

The two topics of discussion last month which occupied most time were to do with money. The Legacy Account in the church funds has so far been held on deposit with the Church of England Central Board of Finance. It was agreed that this was the preferred way of holding the money but that some of it should be invested in the C.B.F. Investment Fund and some in the Fixed Interest Securities Fund. The exact proportion between these last two will depend on advice which is being sought from the C.B.F. The problem is to keep a balance between optimising the income from the interest and preserving the capital value for future use. Consideration of these points leads us to be thankful again that this money is available to the church through the generosity of past worshippers.

The other item of financial significance which took some time was the future of the strip of land on the south side of the church between the beech hedge and the Hallam University drive. It is possible that the developer on the University site might be interested in including this land in the development but this is by no means certain. If we were offered a sale would we accept? It is not an easy question and many other questions spring from it — such as what would we do with the money and what, exactly, would be built on the land in question. No decisions were reached but clearly members of the P.C.C. need to know what other people are thinking because the question might become real and urgent in the not too distant future.



P.C.C. UP-DATE.

Not every meeting of the P.C.C. gets a cleaning demonstration in the middle of the proceedings. The reason for this was the decision to purchase a new vacuum cleaner for the church and, like the Parkinson's bicycle shed, it took quite a lot of time.

However there were more costly things on the agenda for this is the month in which the budgets for the next year are examined. All the proposals were approved although it is anticipated that, unless special appeals are made, the expenditure may exceed the income. As always the contribution to the Diocese by way of Ministry Contribution and Parish Share is a major slice of the expenditure but the P.C.C. were determined that local initiatives should not be starved of funds.

The other financial topic which absorbed a lot of time was the annual detailed review of charitable giving. There are always contenders for limited funds but the total giving from P.C.C. funds was targeted at 10% of income as usual. The details of this spread will be in the Annual Report in the Spring.

Perhaps the most important topic though was an emergency discussion about the future of Young Saints. There is a desperate shortage of leadership and staff such that there is a real threat to the functioning of Young Saints. A special meeting for prayer and discussion was convened for November 27th so more information will be available after that. Meanwhile it was stressed that this is indeed a concern for the whole parish.

Another emergency was addressed by discussing the robing of the servers. The present cassocks have been in use for more than 30 years and showing it! In addition the range of sizes available does not match the present needs so before long we shall see the servers in newer garb.

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
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

NEWS FROM NIGERIA

Steve & Jo & Family have sent another letter recently. The first part was very sad, as, following the death of Princess Diana, the whole issue of tragic road deaths was brought to the surface. Steve comments that death (and death on the roads in particular) is a very common occurance in Nigeria. He writes. 'The expressways (main roads) are the most dangerous. sadly, this week (Oct 4th) we have the funeral of a very young clergyman who died in a head-on collision between a small bus and a big lorry. Only two people survived. For our Bishop it knocks him hard at a tme when his youngest Son is battling for life against a mystery illness in Enugu. At the time of writing he is trying to get a visa to come for tests in England.'

Steve's brighter news is about the creation of two new Archdeaconries in their Diocese. This will doubtless cost more to the Parishes, but should help with the pastoral care of such a vast area. Finally, he adds..."On the home front we are all well. The rains are almost over and the sweat season is underway again until the Harmattan arrives with the dry air from the Sahara in Deccember." Thanks Steve...we could do with some of that dry air here!

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Brenda Lewis hits the nail on the head about the Princess of Wales. In common with many others, she voices her question of why a young child dies of a painful illness. May I be allowed to offer a few thoughts towards an answer?

Brenda's question has exercised the human mind for time immemorial. In a word, it is the problem of undeserved suffering of all sorts which itself affects people of all ages. The book of Job in the Old Testament is not a piece of history; but it is a very powerful treatise on undeserving suffering. Read it and see.

Nobody has yet answered the question. I doubt if they ever will. But perhaps it is worth remarking that:-

- 1. We live in a world where undeserved suffering is part of our human lot.
- 2. God is not the instigator of <u>ANY</u> suffering. It is a terrible blasphemy for anyone ever to suggest it. Knowing what we do of the heavenly Father, can we possibly imagine a God who decides at his own whim to inflict suffering on this person and to spare that one? It is quite monstrous. One wonders what sort of a god people who talk like this are thinking of.
- 3. Being a Christian or indeed a person of any religion does not provide immunity from the consequences of being a human being (see 1 above).
- 4. What God in Christ does promise is that in our suffering, as in our successes, he is present, supporting us in suffering and sharing in success. He is never absent. But he never promises a magic wand of escape for any of us.
- 5. Even Jesus suffered.

TINSEL AND TEARS

I have always loved Christmas. I remember how, as a small boy, I would wake on Christmas morning and feel the weight of a pillow case on my feet. I would lie still for a few minutes while I enjoyed the unusual sensation and try to guess what it might contain, until at last I and my brother would jump up and gleefully explore our pillow cases. I cannot remember that the contents were anything but perfectly satisfactory, and the rest of the day followed the same pattern. We did the simple things we always did, going to church, visiting, or being visited by, relations, having our dinner, playing family games. There was nothing but happiness as far as I was concerned.

It was only many years later that I discovered another aspect of our family Christmas. My mother was a young widow with three small children, and a very limited income. (There was no such thing as a widow's pension for her in those days.) She spent Christmas Eve, once the three of us had gone to bed, filling the pillow cases, and crying the whole time. She was always afraid that her tears might fall on one of the presents and make a mark on it. If it ever happened we never noticed, since we were far too much involved in our happiness. We took everything for granted. The idea that sacrifice or grief or pain could ever be part of Christmas was quite beyond our comprehension.

Over the years since those far off days I have continued to love Christmas, but my understanding of it has changed. I remember one Christmas when a party of us were making the traditional tour of our village, singing a carol at every house. At one house we had been specially asked to sing "Once in David's royal city". A nine year old boy, called David, was dying of leukemia there, and this was his own request. For some of the singers it was the hardest thing they had ever to do, but we sang it, and David heard it and smiled. In spite of the pain and the grief a lot of us felt the presence of the Incarnate Lord Jesus that Christmas, and were more aware than ever of the reality of the power of love in that village square as at Bethlehem. In a strange way it was a happy Christmas, even though David died on Boxing Day.

God's Mission Statement

A Saviour is born

Born for who? Just for the Church Certainly not? Just for a particular class, economic group, race or part of the world? Certainly not.

God so loved the World. His love and salvation is for all the world, all of creation, all people, for every aspect of life and for eternity. His love and salvation is so real and so near that you can see it, touch it and feel it...it is flesh and blood. A Saviour is born. He is part of our life and experience. Not as a tourist but a resident. Not a visitor but a local.

That means Christmas is not just something to celebrate, even though we should and do. It can only be truly celebrated if we allow its truth to shape our lives as Christians and our life as the Church.

Jesus is God's mission statement made flesh. As his people, the body of Christ, we are His mission statement and that defines our life, agendas and priorities.



A Church with a Mission



As much as I welcome and applaud all that is happening regarding ministry teams, and I do, I pray that we will be as comfortable with and committed to the naturalness of the idea of every member mission. By that I mean both as individuals and as congregations and the diocese.

That means a willingness to do some hard thinking about our life and priorities, a glad acceptance of new priorities for resourcing and an openness to changing our attitudes and ways of doing things in the diocese and in our parishes.

The Partners in Mission process of the Anglican Communion, through whom we are linked with Argentina, has drawn up a list of principles for mission partnerships, as part of a worldwide commitment to restructuring churches for mission.

These principles contain many useful pointers, which can be equally applied to us as a diocese.

I thought it worthwhile highlighting some of them at our November Synod and sharing them with you, slightly modified for the diocese...

- (a) Local
 - The responsibility for mission in any place belongs primarily to the church in that place.
- Mutuality We affirm the oneness of the people of God. In this relationship each person and parish is valued, affirmed and respected
- Stewardship
 We see our resources as jointly owned and held in trust for the common good of the diocese.

(d) Inter-Dependence

We need one another. We are incomplete if our diversity is overtaken by narrow parochialism or party spirit.

(e) Learning

We all have something to share with and learn from each other in fulfilling the mission of the church.

(f) Integrity

We recognise that we are equally called by God so we can be open and honest with each other in love.

(g) Solidarity

We are part of one another and committed to one another. What touches one parish touches all parishes. No one must be left to struggle alone.

(h) Ecumenical

We see the Diocesan Mission as part of the mission of all God's people. This implies exploring ways of sharing in mission together with other churches in our area.

These point to a change of attitude taking place as the first step for action. Small beginnings in becoming more and more God's Mission Statement, in deed and word. Christmas is a story of a small beginning, we celebrate the birth of a baby and worship the Saviour of the World. May He give us hope and courage now and in the year to come.

Making an IMPACT!

Five hundred people turned out to the Autumn Assembly of IMPACT (Communities in Partnership for Action) in Sheffield. They heard the Chief Constable pledge his and his officers' support for the development of Police Consultative Groups, where local people and police work together and discuss issues they face and agree methods of working on them. The work of IMPACT, to enable communities to work with those in authority to bring about sustainable change, was endorsed by the Chief Constable Richard Wells, the Master Cutler Paul Tear, the new Sheffield City Council Chief Executive Bob Kerslake, and the Chair of the Church Urban Fund Grants Committee, Granville Gibson. The Church Urban Fund has just awarded IMPACT £30,000 over the next two years.

In the Gleadless Valley area, the wish of the community for a one way system on Constable Road continues to be frustrated. In a street with a row of shops and a school, buses and other vehicles regularly mount the pavement. A video of the extent of the traffic congestion and threat to public safety was shown which clearly highlighted the problem.

A proposed code of conduct for local authority officers on community consultation was handed to the Chief Executive. This had been drawn up by local people as a result of their experience working for better facilities at Colley Park.

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MINISTRY TEAMS.

This was the title of a bundle of papers from the Diocese following the special Diocesan Conference on July 5th. The word "Ministry" has become an "in-word" so it is not inappropriate to ask why.

The most common use of the word hitherto has been to describe the special functions of the clergy and in most cases that means the stipendiary clergy. More recently many pressures such as shortage of clergy, shortage of money, social considerations and the like have shown that there are many and growing gaps in the work which the church ought to be doing. This has caused people to have another think about the role of the laity and that means all of us!

It actually means that people have gone back to the Bible to see what Jesus had to say about such matters and how the early church responded. We find, for example, that Jesus chose 12 men of no educational or qualified background to be His closest associates. He sent out 72 disciples to do his work for him without giving them the benefit of "dog-collars". The models of the early church that we find in Acts and the Epistles reveal the deep involvement of ordinary people in all the church affairs.

Considering the present day it is therefore no bad thing that the laity are being called upon to play a greater part in everything that they can do. The most appropriate collective word for these actions is "ministry". We, as laity, as men and women together, are called upon to exercise our ministry. This means using those talents that God has given us as well as our time and money so that the Kingdom of Heaven becomes a reality. The Provost, Michael Sadgrove, gave a wonderful address on the subject (a copy is available) and a key sentence seemed to be "If God's ministry is to love His world, bring about reconciliation and create 'koinonia', then that is what we are all about in our own ministries as well". He went on to say "Ministry is about giving birth to signs of God's life in the world". That seems to me to be a task for all of us, whoever we are.






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
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We are now over six months along our journey since the wonderful Parish Day and Service of Commitment, and I believe God has prompted me to ask some searching questions.


