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

#### From the Vicar ...

Dear Friends.

Depending on your mathematics, as you read this we will be entering the last year of the millennium. In twelve months time, the millennium moment will have passed. We will have occupied our unique spot in history by being the first generation ever to observe such an anniversary. Having said that, it is of course all very vague. Shouldn't the new millennium start in 2001? Wasn't Jesus born in 5 B.C. anyway (or was it 9.A.D.?)? And for how many people is the celebration of the millennium to do with Jesus, or is the whole thing much vaguer, and really an excuse for a mega-knees-up of some kind, which only has a very shadowy reason behind it.

Certainly for the Rhodes family I have no doubt that the new start we are making here in Totley will be of far greater significance in our lives, and perhaps the lives of others as well, than the passing of the millennium. I also have more than a sneaking suspicion that whilst God is very interested indeed in human affairs, and in the new starts that we are able to make, it has nothing to do with the way we choose to measure time. After all, different eras have chosen to measure it differently anyway, and today in Chinese culture the counting of the years is quite different from ours. And He is above and beyond time in any case. His ways are not as our ways, and His thoughts not as our thoughts.

Which brings me to a matter which I am sure is of real significance. If I were to be asked what are my hopes and dreams for the coming years in Totley, the answer would be simple. That many who do not know Jesus in a genuine personal way, may come to do so, and that those who do may grow and deepen in that relationship. The new beginning that really counts is the one we make when we enter into such a relationship, and Jesus begins to fill and shape our lives. Our time is lived to its best and most fulfilling, when we do so in co-operation with Him.

Never mind the accuracy or validity of the millennium. Will this be the time of your life when you take Jesus more seriously than you ever have before - so that whatever you may be doing at the very end of this year it really is Jesus who is at the centre of your life?

May the last year of the second millennium (and the first year of this new chapter in the life of All Saints') be one in which you "know Him more clearly, love Him more dearly and follow Him more nearly" than you ever have done before.

#### A DIOCESAN STRATEGY

During last summer, Bishop Jack issued his "Vision" for the Diocese and established a group to detail a strategy which would bring that vision into reality. The group have now issued a draft report and are open to receive comments up to 20th January prior to submission of the final report to Diocesan Synod in March.

This draft report is over a hundred pages long so takes some time to read and digest. Copies have been sent to the Readers, Wardens, Deanery Synod representatives and P.C.C. Secretaries and Treasurers. We do not plan to have a local meeting to discuss the report but any of the holders can show or describe to you what is included. If you then wish to comment, please let me know so that I can send your comments off by the due date.

In recommending the draft, Bishop Jack says,"It is full of good things though none of us are expected to agree with every detail". He also asks us to, "pray it through, listen to one another and to God so that together we can co-operate with His vision for the Diocese of Sheffield and see the green shoots of resurrection in the springtime of the next Millennium". Many of the required actions affect the way in which the Diocese will arganise itself for moving forward. In that sense they are mostly for others but all church members are asked, "so to shape their living and worship together as to attract at least one new person to their faith community over the next five years".

No doubt a great deal more will be said in the months to come as to how the various proposals will affect us but this first step is interesting and challenging.

#### DI AND THEO'S CHRISTMAS LETTER

Dear Friends.

We bring you greetings for Christmas and the New Year. Praise God for His precious gift of His Son. Thank you for your prayers and letters. We do appreciate them, even is we don't reply very much.

In choosing the **next General Secretary**, Theo asked for the opinion of the senior missionaries. Finally it was evident to all, including the Board, that Victor Sitther was the one of God's choosing. Victor started his missionary career in Papua New Guinea and has been based at HQ for many years. He has already been in leadership in different capacities. He is doing a 3-4 month course in church administration and management in the UK before he takes over the work of GS on February 9th 1999. Praise God for this provision.

Praise God for answered prayer for serious problems in the Mission. This has been a much better year for us in leadership, but **Raja Mohan Doss** passed away on August 31st, of lung cancer. He had been Theo's right hand man. Selina, his wife, is finding her own role in the Mission now, after having worked so closely with her husband all these years. Pray for their two teenagers, a girl and a boy.

Since the Hindu fundamentalists have gained more political power in India **persecution** has been on the increase against Christians, especially in northern India, during the past year or so. Several of our Mission fields have been affected.

In order to start Community Health work in the Koya tribal field we had purchased land to build a base centre. But **the Lord had better ideas** as we were suddenly offered a small school nearby going at a reduced rate. Not only that, but a church overseas provided all the money to buy it. The original land is being used to build a hostel for tribal children.

The lecture block at the **Training Institute** will be ready for use next year we hope, and praise God, **He has provided all the funds** for the building. It has to be furnished. About 30 trainees went through the training from July to November. A new batch will start in January. There are many people applying to the Mission.

Just after Christmas last year a young missionary, Grace, who had just had her first baby suddenly went down with **kidney failure.** Her father gave his own kidney for transplant last April but this has slowly failed. She is and out of hospital and is very ill now, despite regular dialysis. She and her husband and baby remain IEM missionaries as part of our family. Praise God for the many people who have given towards the massive bills. In May 1999 we will have the **IEM missionaries triennial Conference** 

**and National Convention.** During that time, when nearly all the missionaries will be present, the official hand-over to Victor Sitther will take place.

Praise God for His provision of work with the India Missions
Association for Theo when we leave IEM at about the end of April 1999.
He has chosen to do jobs which best suit his gifts and experience, which are also likely to include some travelling. I hope we will not be as busy as we are now. I am likely to end up organising at home. We will be based in Bangalore. Other invitations, like speaking engagements, are likely to come. (We have already been asked when we can come to lecture at IEM's Training Institute next year!). In addition, Theo would like to write books on Indian missions.

Diana's medical work can only be delegated in parts as the planned handover to another doctor fell through. Please pray about this.

God has provided for our "retirement" and we hope to be able to **buy a flat** in the future, but will move to rented premises in February probably. You can still use this address until further notice. IEM hope to go on e-mail in the not too distant future.

Hiring a cook about a year ago did ease my (Diana's) workload and yet I still felt far too busy. I discussed this with the pastor and we prayed over it. Just a few weeks later Appa, Theo's father, passed away after a very brief illness. Having access to a computer in the office has also made correspondence much easier. Now, though I am busy all the time, the pressure has largely gone. Praise God.

Theo's father had two brief spells in hospital this year and passed away quickly on June 5th. Only during the Memorial Service, when family members shared their memories of him, did I begin to appreciate that he was truly a very keen English teacher and a valued College Principal. "If Appa said, 'Let's go for a walk,' I knew it would be an English lesson," said Theo. Amma, Theo's mother, has chronically swollen legs due to heart failure needing some treatment and needs a walker to get around the room, but is basically house-bound. She reads a lot, so is not much trouble to us. She is mentally alert.

We want to **thank you** all for your prayers for us during the length of our missionary career and hope that you will **continue to pray for us** as we change to other Christian work in missions.

#### Half Way House

It occurred to me the other day that Christmas 1998 marked the halfway point of my three-year degree (BA (Hons) Biblical Studies and Evangelistic Ministry) course at Cliff College. It doesn't seem a moment ago when David Benson asked me if I had considered full time Christian Ministry and the way was opened up for me to study at Cliff. The second (Diploma) year has been far more practical than the first and as well as writing essays and book reviews I have been away a lot more along with other students on placements and supporting churches with their mission. Among many experiences, I was privileged to work alongside the Pastoral Care Team at Preston Royal Acute Hospital and have recognised the value of ministry in the modern hospital to staff and visitors as well as patients. My regard for teachers, particularly in the huge secondary school environment, is immense due to the glimpse I gained of the pressure they work under whilst I was a teacher for a week at Tapton. Two of us took sixteen, one hour and ten minute R.E. lessons at four year-group levels and came home shattered! My understanding of what mission is all about is growing and my conviction that we are all called to be a missioning church is deepening. Next term I will be working in Dronfield and Sunderland as well as producing a 12,000-word dissertation for which I am preparing a questionnaire. This will help me tremendously in identifying what people in the church today think and I will use the findings in my narrative. The questionnaires will be anonymous and will certainly not be used as 'evidence against you'. I will greatly value all responses and would be very glad if you would volunteer to complete one.

Thank you very much for supporting me and my family in your prayers and to those who have been able to contribute to the tuition fees fund. This remains open and I am very grateful to Neil Hayden for administering it. Maurice Snowdon would also be happy to discuss methods of contributing that benefit the church through recovery of tax.




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For nearly two years now I have been privileged to record the morning worship and some special evening services.

This began after our friends Cliff and Annette Job went to live in Austria. The services at their local church were spoken in German and they particularly missed the hymns we sing at All Saints'.



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#### FAITH IN WORDS AND ACTION

The Church Army is one of the charities which our Church supports. An example of their work in Sheffield was given in some recent publicity material and is quoted below:

The Anglican Cathedral in Sheffield is an example of a congregation coming to terms with helping the homeless. The Cathedral has long been a place of refuge and support for homeless and vulnerable people. For the last eight years this has been developed further through the Cathedral's Breakfast Project, which has become as much a part of the Cathedral's daily routine, as the Morning Prayer and Eucharist that precede it. There is a "breaking of bread" at both the high altar and the breakfast table. Staff and volunteers prepare a meal for 50 people each morning, as a gift of hospitality and universal acceptance. Later in the day, a small Day Centre, the Archer Project, also run by the Cathedral, opens about 200 yards down the road. This extension of the Breakfast Project provides laundry, showers, telephone, information and tenancy support facilities in a hospitable environment. People have the opportunity to explore their own skills and interests while working with staff in managing their own programme of educational workshops, sport and recreation. Both these projects which were set up and are run by Church Army Officers with other staff and volunteers whom they have trained, have gained the trust of the people they seek to serve; quietly and unobtrusively sharing their and the Cathedral's faith in words and action. The Church Army has many such officers working with vulnerable people aiming to express the Good News of the Gospel in very practical ways that empower some of society's poorest and most disenfranchised people. Their practical and evangelistic skills makes the Kingdom of God very visible.

#### FROM WHISTON TO ARGENTINA

Since we welcomed Gerardo Mackenzie to Whiston as part of the youth exchange between the Dioceses of Sheffield and Argentina three years ago, I have been writing to him and to several other members of the group. Knowing that I would be made very welcome if I went over there, I planned a trip which took place this summer.

I arrived in Buenos Aires after a thirteen hour flight from Gatwick and was greeted by Gerardo and Cristina Mackenzie whose family I stayed with in José Marmol (in the suburbs of B.A.). The family are members of the congregation of Holy Trinity Church, Lomas de Zamora where I shared in the youth group activities and took part in the Sunday services which are led by lay people as they have no priest at the moment. In the next few weeks I spent part of my time helping at the day-care centre in Lomas de Zamora, run by the Diocese. The centre is attended by children aged between 4 months and 4 years whose parents need to work but cannot afford to take their child to a nursery. I fed the babies, helped the older ones to draw pictures, supervised them playing in the garden and joined in with the various songs which were of a level of Spanish I could just about cope with!

I was fortunate to be able to travel around other areas of Argentina. I stayed in Rosario, with the Rev. Andy Lenton, his wife Evangelina and son, Tomas and Andy invited me to go with him on his monthly visit to his parishioners in Arias. I spent a weekend at an Estancia in Arias and I witnessed the first ever youth meeting in the village which was attended by ten young people. It was interesting to see the work of the Church in all its various aspects. From Arias I travelled to Cordoba, where I stayed in with Michael Lenton and his family. I was able to spend an evening with Jessica Hauber, one of the young people from St Paul's in Cordoba who was a visitor to Sheffield in 1996. The following days I spent at the Centro Allen Gardiner, a conference centre for the Anglican Church, which is situated in the mountains in the Province of Cordoba, as the guest of the new pastor, Juan Carlos Sosa, and his family.

I returned for the weekend to Cordoba, for an ecumenical "campamento", attended by approximately 120 young people. There I took part in Bible studies, group discussions and I talked to many people who came from all over of Argentina. It was different to anything I have been to before but it was an encouraging experience to be with so many young Christians.

During my final weekend in Buenos Aires I went to a Congreso attended by two thousand young Christians from all over Argentina. We listened to various speakers and sang and talked a lot. Again I was able to mix and converse with a wide range of people which showed me that the Church was very much alive in this part of the world.

My visit to Argentina was a tremendous experience for me and I wish that I could have stayed longer. During my six weeks there I discovered a new culture, witnessed a different way of life, and made a host of new friendships. I saw young people taking an active role in their Church and I found inspiration and encouragement in my contact with them. I think that the Argentine people are generous and welcoming and I very much hope to return in the future and build on the links which I have made.



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

#### From the Vicar ...

Dear Friends.

Do you get the February blues? Christmas is a distant memory and too much on the credit card bill, Spring has yet to arrive, Easter is anticipated as Lent begins - but seems a long way off, the days are still short, and often cold. February can feel in the middle of nowhere. There is, however, one special day, which the card -making industry keeps us aware of - Valentine's.

He's a rather vague figure, St. Valentine. There was a Roman church dedicated to him in the fourth century, so he must be ancient. There was a martyred bishop of that name a little later. Neither are known to have had anything in particular to do with choosing a partner of the opposite sex, let alone sending anonymous messages of undying love! It would seem that the link with any real figure in the past has long been forgotten by most of us - Valentine's day is more about rows of cupids on the cards in the newsagents.

Pity that we can link the word 'saint' so easily with such vague figures and festivals, and lose sight of what it really means. In the Bible it's a shorthand word for God's people, or followers of Jesus. Totley is full of saints. You may be one yourself. You may live next door to one. Maybe you yearn to be one, but aren't quite sure what to do about it. Some of us saints may not be honoured with special days in the years to come, but we've discovered that following Jesus, in a personal way that makes God a reality in our lives is the only way to live - in February or any other month of the year.

Why not aim for Totley to be the saintliest district in Sheffield, or Britain? It's got to be somewhere. And it can start with you and me.

We look forward to the next meeting of the P.C.C. which will be David's first amongst us. One of the resolutions of the P.C.C. in January was to thank Bill Bryer for his chairmanship of the Council during the interregnum. He was teased on the question as to whether or not he had kept us in order!

The first meeting of the P.C.C. in 1999 brought even grimmer news than previously about our financial affairs. Repairs to the church roof have been completed and paid for but now we face a large bill to ensure electrical safety. We await full accounts for 1998 but the forward prospect is such that a letter is going out to everyone on the electoral roll to show that unless we increase our income we are heading for further financial stringency. Read what out treasurer has to say about the situation and pray that we all may respond to the extent of our ability.

It was reported that the City Council planning officers had pointed out problems with our planning applications and so the housing proposals have been put aside for the time being. The application for the vicarage is being modified to suit the comments made and we expect that access to it will be from Sunnyvale Road.

We noted that 1999 will be the 75th anniversary of the opening of the church. A number of ideas are already being expressed about how this should be marked but there is room for further thoughts. We will be discussing it again in February so do grab your nearest friendly P.C.C. member and share your thoughts on this.

Hold on to your dreams that you focus on Him And He will protect you when your light seems dim. Remember He loves you and His life did give To make sure that sinners like us should all live.



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

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

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#### NUMBERS

Question:

When is a number not a number?

Answer:

When it is in the Old Testament, because then it is

often a symbol.

Here are some really special numbers:

**Seventy** meant "a lot" (seventy descendants of Jacob moved to Egypt to live with Joseph). As for seventy multiplied by anything, that could only mean "more than enough" - which may be why King Solomon was said to have had seven hundred wives!

Forty years was taken to be a fixed, but long, period of time. The Israelites were in the wilderness for forty years; all the best kings reigned for forty years. (David was thirty years old when he became King and reigned for forty years. Samuel 5:4)

Thirty represented the age of maturity. Joseph was said to be

Thirty represented the age of maturity. Joseph was said to be that age when he started working for Pharaoh.

**Twelve** is the number of completeness, like seven. The old Testament always talks of the twelve tribes as representing all Israel. One of the stops on the Israelites' journey to the Promised Land was at Elim where there were twelve springs (Numbers 33:9) that is, a perfect spot for water.

**Ten** was simply a nice round number. It was used, along with hundreds and thousands. When Samson struck down a thousand men (Judges 16:15) it may not have been exactly one thousand - but a lot! to be continued



# **YOUNG AT HEART**

For all kinds of reasons people find that life is messy. It is rarely neat, tidy and coherent and when it is it doesn't last long. That pearl of northern wisdom oft heard on a fine day - "but we'll pay for it" often comes true. It begins to take on a far more serious nature when we open our eyes to the fact that for many people, upbringing and circumstances make life a mess and often painful and bewildering.

The saddest thing of all is that children and young people are the victims of the kind of world that adults create for them and bequeath to them. Too many experience emotional as well as physical deprivation.

One of the Lambeth Conference Resolutions specifically addressed the needs of young people and its words were clearly echoed in a debate at our last Diocesan Synod on youth work 'From Youth Clubs to Youth Ministry'.

The Lambeth Resolution:-

"The Conference recognises and celebrates the work of God among young people and their infinite value in the human family.... As adults we confess with deep humility and sorrow that the adult has created children of war, children abused by neglect and sexual exploitation and children who are the victims of aggressive advertising... we affirm our apostolic commitment to all young people everywhere'.

The Lambeth Conference suggested that in order to give practical expression to this commitment, local churches should be urged to respond to the needs of young people and that in as many parishes as possible, teams of adults and young people should be trained for ministry to young people outside the church, so that God's love in Christ could be both seen and heard.

To do this we will first have to listen to young people to try to understand their concerns, attitudes, fears and hopes. When we do this we may find that our attitudes will be challenged and changed.

Great harm is being caused to children and young people by the poor environment in which they live and by the circumstances in which they are

raised. We may be moan the absence of young people from the church and grumble at some of their behaviour - but who is to blame? If life for young people is messy then our response can only be one of repentance and renewed active commitment to their well being and their future.

Our own Synod was unanimous in its commitment to an effective youth ministry in the parishes and life of the Diocese. Youth ministry should have its proper place; at the heart of our church's life. When the practical outworking of the Synod debate reaches your parish, how will you be prepared to respond and to commit your church to young people? Are we going to be part of their problem or can we become part of their hope?

#### Farewell to Archdeacon

The Diocesan Farewell to the Archdeacon of Sheffield, the Ven. Stephen Lowe, will be in the Cathedral on Sunday 7 March at 6.30 p.m. Bishop Jack will present to Stephen a cope and mitre from the people of the Diocese, and hopes every parish will be able to contribute to the gift. The Archdeacon has been appointed as Area Bishop of Hulme in the Manchester Diocese, and his consecration will be in York Minster on Friday 23 April.

Sheffield Diocesan Secretary Tony Beck says: "It has been suggested by the Precentor's secretary that I should issue red tickets for the general congregation and blue tickets for those robing. A supply of tickets will be sent to me a month before the event. I have to provide numbers by 22 March." So, would those wishing to attend the consecration please contact Mr. Beck at the Diocesan Office before that date. They will then receive the appropriate tickets in time for the consecration.

Meanwhile, the process for finding a successor for Archdeacon Lowe has already begun. The appointment is Bishop Jack's who is consulting widely to find the right person for the post.

#### Pilgrimage 2000

Bishop Jack has asked each parish to consider sending one person to accompany him to the Holy Land on the Diocesan Pilgrimage 2000. There they will give thanks for Jesus. "Each of us will take the prayers and thanksgivings of those we represent as we visit the sites associated with the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus," says the Bishop." The Diocese are also hoping to 'adopt' a Palestinian Christian school for deaf children in Gaza, among some of the most deprived people in that part of the world." The all inclusive cost will be about £1,100 per person and the Bishop has asked parishes to save up and each send one person.

Guests included the Bishop of Doncaster and representatives of other denominations. Eve spoke from the experience of her family and others of being made to feel like 'tenants' in this country and more particularly in the Church of England. As a white Briton, I was challenged by Eve's words to look more closely at how I might inadvertently contribute to the estrangement black people feel. I found myself questioning how non-racist I really am, and how guilty I am of assuming that a black person is a 'foreigner'. We all need to pay more than lip service to the truth that we are all made in the image of God and to recognise that the black people we meet are more than likely to have been born in the Northern General Hospital or Jessops. We all have a part to play in making sure the Church of England is Our Place.

#### **Church Urban Fund Grants Update**

- St. Aidan's Trust, the Manor, Sheffield has received a grant of £20,000 to kick-start the project in the first year.
- Doncaster Coalfield Communities Partnership involving Askern, New Rossington and Armthorpe.

Following representation by the Bishop, Church Urban Fund Trustees have agreed that the earlier grant made to the Partnership of £30,000 can be used over two years rather than three, but there will be an increased level of monitoring. The Partnership welcomes the sensitivity of the Church Urban Fund to the response of the parishes.

# South Yorkshire Churches' Contribution to Economic Regeneration and tackling Social Exclusion

It is hoped to create a new partnership between the South Yorkshire Churches, together with Industrial Mission in South Yorkshire and the Faith and Justice Committee, and Local Economic Partnerships by providing a New Project Team to:

- provide funding advice, information and support to groups of churches in Urban Priority Areas in each of Barnsley, Doncaster, Rotherham and Sheffield to facilitate their responses to local need through practical initiatives that tackle social exclusion and economic regeneration.
- 2. draw down structural funds to facilitate new and develop existing initiatives.
- inform and respond to local and regional consultations about policies and programmes, both directly and through the Churches' representatives on the local and regional partnerships.

The focus will be on Urban Priority Areas in the four local authority areas in South Yorkshire and will employ four Workers, one full-time equivalent in each local authority area. 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#### WINTER IN THE GARDEN





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

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# From the Vicarage:

Dear Friends,

For a week in the middle of February, all the vicars in the Diocese of Sheffield attended a conference in Bridlington - a kind of in-service training event. For most of the time we were there, it snowed. There were several inches of snow on the beach. Battling along the prom in nearblizzard conditions was a memorable experience. And the weather men were quite right. They had warned about winter conditions on the east coast and right on cue, there they were.

Most of us will have a few rule-of thumb ways of assessing the weather. "Red sky at night . . ." etc.

Maybe you have a barometer or another device in the home to give an indication.

Some people once approached Jesus and asked Him to give some sign as to who He was. He replied, "You know how to interpret the appearance of the sky, but you cannot interpret the signs of the times" (Mat. 16:3). You can predict the weather, but you cannot work out what it is that God is doing in your midst. Maybe we are in the same boat. There are computerised weather forecasts every day on the T.V. but how attuned are we to what God is saying to us personally or as a community?

A tower fell on some by-standers, who died. "Were they worse sinners than the rest of us?" Jesus was asked. "Not a bit of it," was His reply, "but take warning - if you don't turn from evil, then a worse fate awaits you." Do you understand

How God may speak to you, even through tragic events?

A lot of homes have decoder boxes on their T.V. sets these days, to interpret the signal. How are we doing on the spiritual front? God is a God who speaks. There are plenty of signals to tune in to. Let's be sure it's, "Message received and understood!"

#### P.C.C. UP-DATE

The P.C.C. meeting in February will not be until the 25th so it is not practical to give results of that meeting in this magazine. Instead, it might be useful to give a pre-view of the Annual Parish Church Meeting which will take place in the Hall on the 25th of March. This is the meeting at which anyone in the parish can learn about what is going on and express their views.


One of the important tasks at that meeting is to deal with all the elections. A notice on the Church Notice Board will give details before the meeting but it will include the election of Churchwardens and Deputy Churchwardens. The Wardens bear a responsibility for many things in and around the church and contribute to the smooth running of everything that the Church might do.

This year we have also to elect two representatives to the Deanery Synod (this is for a 3 year term). Our representatives are automatically members of the P.C.C. and contribute to our understanding of what is going on in the wider Church as well as making our voice heard in the Diocese.

Then, of course, there are elections to the Parochial Church Council. This also is for a 3 year term and we have a rotational system in which some members of the P.C.C. retire each year although they are eligible for re-election if they wish. The Parish Accounts for 1998 (which, by then,

should have been approved by the P.C.C.) will be presented for information and comment. Above all, however, the Annual Meeting should be a time for looking forward. In his address at the Installation of David Rhodes, Bishop Jack stressed that we needed to follow the paths that God is setting for us. It is important that we do this together and the Annual Parish Meeting is an important step in our discipleship.

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
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

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# Message from the Bishop

# LETTING GO IN LENT


A famous Baptist preacher announced to his congregation one Sunday morning that he was going to preach on the subject about which Jesus spoke more than any other. He had, he said, counted up the references in the gospels and discovered that it is the relationship between man and his possessions which is the most common theme in the teaching of Jesus.

Carlo Carretto, one of the most popular present day writers on spirituality, gives a hint as to why this should be when he says, "Possessiveness kills. It clings so closely to the creature that it loses sight of the creator."

If we judge ourselves and each other by what we possess, be it material goods or power or influence, or number of friends or spiritual attainments - we are, according to the gospel, on our way to death.

It is the letting go that brings life, the being in possessive control which destroys it.

A friend of mine, who is an experienced counsellor and sex therapist, advised that when counselling couples who are going through sexual difficulties, she says "Forget the sex and look for the power - for there is the heart of the matter".



We all of us like to be in control - human beings are incredibly manipulative. To own, to possess, to control, are the most powerful motivators in many people's lives. But it is not to be so with us.

Conscious of the fact that we are made in the image of God and are called to grow into his likeness, we must allow ourselves to become more Christlike and in Christ is the supreme act of letting go.

It is best summed up in the letter to the Phillipians Chapter II

"Have this mind among yourselves, which you have in Christ Jesus, who though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form he humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross. Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father".



God's letting go in Jesus Christ is life to us. Our letting go will take a different form for each of us, but I suspect that most of us have some inkling of that which we need to let go in order to become more Christlike.

Let Lent be about letting go.

### LAND OF SURPRISES

The small Palestinian village of Zababdeh is the last place you would expect to meet anyone as famous as Archbishop Desmond Tutu. But this is the land of surprises.

After all our wonderful experiences on this introductory visit to the Holy Land, I don't suppose we should have been too astonished when we went along to join the congregation at the local parish church morning worship to find the Bishop of Jerusalem presiding at the Eucharist and his quest, Desmond Tutu, preaching the

There were four bishops in our group, too, together with plenty of priests, and the whole village went wild with excitement as they greeted such a large company of visiting personalities.

It was an extra-special treat for us all - and what a moving occasion to hear the liturgy sung in two

Archbishop Tutu told the huge assembly, which filled

the small church and spilled outside: "This land is very important for us of the Christian faith because this is where it all began. It's an awesome privilege to preach where our Lord walked the earth."

Basing the sermon on the contest between Elijah and the prophets of Baal at Mount Carmel, and illustrating it with his experiences of apartheid in South Africa, the Archbishop assured the people that they were all precious to God.

"Others may think you are nothing; others may think you are not important; these others may trample on your dignity with hob-nailed boots. But know that God loves you with a love that will not let go. This God is allloving; this is a God of peace; a God of reconciliation. Injustice and oppression will never have the last word.



Our God, your God, is the same yesterday, today and for ever."

There was an opportunity afterwards to meet the Palestinian Christians over lunch, and to hear of the excellent service they are performing. The lively Roman Catholic priest at Zababdeh told how his school catered for 750 children from a very wide area, both Muslim and Christian. And a young girl sang a poignant song in her own tongue (a prayer for peace in Palestine).

The villagers were encouraged by our visit. In turn, we were heartened and inspired as we saw Christ still at work in his holy land. A memorable episode on a marvellous tour so efficiently organised by religious travel experts, McCabe, who will be arranging next year's

diocesan pilgrimage to mark the millennium (28 May to 8 June).

There were three of us from this diocese on the fact-finding visit - Canon Cedric Whiteman (co-ordinator of Pilgrim 2000). Canon Jane Sinclair (who will be responsible for the liturgy on next year's pilgrimage) and me, the Revd. Peter Gascoigne (Editor of the Diocesan News).

• More about our visit in the new diocesan newspaper which we will publish for the first time next month. Bishop Jack hopes every parish will send a representative on Pilgrim 2000 - and we can certainly commend the venture. The journey of a lifetime to the Land of Surprises.

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### NUMBERS

Question: When is a number not a number?

Answer: When it is in the Old Testament, because then it is often a symbol. Continued from the February issue of the magazine:

Seven the number of the day when God rested after the creation. It was symbolic of completion or perfection. The seventh day was the holy day, the Sabbath. All the great festivals lasted seven days. Hebrew slaves would dream of their seventh year - because then they were allowed to go free!

Five being the number of fingers on one hand, was used to represent a few - yes, a 'handful'! Similarly, five hundred meant a few hundred.

**Four** represented the world. Four seasons and, in the Old Testament, four kinds of living creatures: humans, domestic animals, wild animals and sky & sea creatures.

Three and a half was often used to indicate a period of time that was under the control of God. A drought in the time of the 'wicked' King Ahab was thought to have lasted three and a half years. Three is a special number in a lot of religions. Anything that the Israelites saw as the work of God was said to have taken three days. For example: Joshua told the Israelites before they entered the Promised Land: Get your supplies ready. Three days from now you will cross the Jordan and take possession of the land the Lord your God is giving you.

(Joshua 1:10)


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

# From the Vicarage:

Dear Friends,

Easter - what does it mean to you? I asked this question in a school assembly a year of two ago and was inundated with answers about chocolate and rabbits. If you're a parent it might have something to do with onset of school holidays. The same (with a different feeling) may be the case if you're a teacher! For a good number of us I suspect it evokes certain memories from a previous era in our lives where Easter may have played a fuller part in our national culture.

The very word has a rather an uncertain origin. Probably it comes from the name of a pagan (like a number of the names for days of the week) Anglo-Saxon goddess of Spring - 'Eostre'. The custom of giving eggs probably has a similar origin. Mind it must have been an obvious thing for the early Christians to link the pre-Christian interest in Spring and the reviving of life in the natural sphere, to the resurrection of Jesus from mankind and his subsequent history.

But what does it mean to you? Maybe it's an opportunity for an early holiday. An ironic thing in

many churches nowadays is, that on one of the most important days of the year - the day we celebrate the fact (yes, fact) that Jesus rose again from the dead, many regular worshippers are away. A little illustration of the mobile and fluid world in which we live to-day.

But, what does it mean to you? To me it's the cornerstone of how I understand life. Life can be awful: but in the middle of it, Jesus tasted the worst - and conquered. He says to you and me, "If you'll just put your trust in me, you'll find that same principle of resurrection will be at work in you too".

So what's your answer to the question? On the evening of Easter Sunday (4th April) at 6.30 p.m. in All Saints, there will be a lively celebration service when one or two ordinary folk from Totley will be sharing what Easter means to them. Why not come along and hear for yourself?

Living and dying in the 4th century AD, George has long since been overtaken by myth and imagination.

We can be sure of very little concerning this fine man, except that he was a true martyr who suffered and died at Lydda in Palestine, probably before Roman persecution of Christians ended with the coming of Constantine.

The Church believes that George's courageous allegiance to Christ cost him his life and honours his name and his memory. All else is uncertainty. A 12th century Italian fable gives to us the famous story of the slaying of the dragon. the rescuing of a king's fair daughter and the conversion of Libya.

Nevertheless, memories of the valour of George stirred Crusaders to adopt him as their patron saint, as had other Eastern soldiers centuries before them. It has become an enduring tradition — today George is patron saint not of England alone — but also of Portugal, Germany, Aragon, Genoa and Venice.

On 23rd April may we be thankful for St George and may we pray especially for England and the leadership and witness she yet can give to the world for Jesus Christ.

### P.C.C. UPDATE.

The P.C.C. has actually met twice since the last magazine report. The second time though, was only to approve the 1998 accounts so that they could be presented to the Annual Parish Meeting. It was however an opportunity to thank our Treasurer, Neil Hayden, for all the hard work that he has put in for several years.

The earlier meeting (25th Feb.) was the first one in which David Rhodes took the chair and we were very pleased to welcome him (again!). Much of the business will already be in the public eye because of the Annual Parish Meeting or Church Notices but it was good to note that the P.C.C. was very much together in the various issues that arose. For example, even though we had to agree that the Church should be locked after the vandalism last summer, most of the P.C.C. (perhaps all!) wanted have the Church open so that people could use it for private prayer or meditation. The possibility of vandalism, however, is still with us so we all need to be vigilant.

The major new item of future expenditure was identified as the need to renew a great deal of the electrical work in the Church and in the Hall. This work will be done as a matter of some urgency in the interest of safety but we hope that it will not lead to inconvenience for the three weeks that it will take to do the job. It was exciting to make plans for various events in the near future. Again these continued on page facing

will be detailed in other notices but it was encouraging that the P.C.C. agreed to spend a day together (Saturday May 1st), to pray about and discuss together the direction in which the Church should be going. Whatever may come out of that day, it will be interesting to share it all with the rest of the congregation on the following Sunday (May 2nd). This and the week of prayer for the whole Church which is planned for the week 12th to 17th April, clearly reflect the hope and the expectation that, whatever the future may hold, we should all be working closely together in our attempt to serve the Lord. We also discussed the possibility of establishing one of the upstairs rooms in the Hall as the Church Office. There are a number of issues to resolve about this and it will mean discussing the situation with everyone who uses the upstairs for any purpose but the aim is clear and we hope that it will be possible to achieve a start on this in the very near future.

There was also an idea to create a Church Fellowship Directory as an aid to better communication and fellowship within the Church. It is likely that you will be approached about this in the near future but if you don't hear anything soon, ask someone you know about it.

There were other issues too; notice boards; repairs in the Hall; news from Churches Together in S17 and other items were covered. Whilst some of these are very practical items, there can be little doubt that we are starting the next period in the life of the Church in Totley in great hope that the Lord will bless this time.

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

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

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

# **DEATH AND RESURRECTION**

The Sheffield Diocesan Clergy Conference at snow-bound Bridlington has been hailed a tremendous success.

The theme was set by Bishop Jack who stated that Christianity was about death and resurrection and not survival.

There were certain things we all needed to let go of and the pain of death was the pain of letting go.

"Whatever have we done to people when they come to equate the Gospel with bricks and mortar?" asked the Bishop. "We make our buildings and institutions into idols. We make our priests into idols and when they fail we lose our faith."

Bishop Jack said "If we have confidence in the death and resurrection of Jesus and if he has led us through death into new, resurrection life, our anxiety will fade away to the extent that we shall let go and let God. Jesus is Lord and goes before us into Galilee."

The theme was fully explored by some excellent speakers, including the Rt. Revd. Lord Sheppard,

who felt the conference had been "a marvellous experience"; Canon Cyril Ashton, Director of Training in the Blackburn Diocese, who rated it highly ("even the snow added to the success"); and Mother Barbara Claire, of the Community of St. Mary the Virgin, who felt it had been an excellent experience.

There was fun, too, at Bridlington, especially in the cabaret after the Conference Dinner - the sight of bishops, archdeacons and the diocesan secretary giving a line dancing demostration, or of clergy performing the Full Monty (in reverse) had to be seen to be believed!

There was deserved praise (and gifts) for the organisers and workers whose sterling contributions ensured the success of the operation.





# The Sheffield Book of Recipes For use in Day and Evening Schools

Among my mother's recipes I found this old book (no date) published by the City of Sheffield Education Committee, price one shilling. In the back I found her note on how to make 'Grandma's Parkin', (my grandma died forty years ago aged 83 years). Perhaps you would like to make (and enjoy) it as I have done. You will need the following ingredients:

6 oz. Plain Flour; 3 oz Sugar; 6 oz. Oatmeal; 3.5 oz. Lard (Margarine); 10 oz. Treacle; 1 teaspoonful Ground Ginger; 1 Egg and a half teaspoonful of Bi Carbonate of soda in a drop of milk (as this would be the raising agent, it would be unnecessary when using Self Raising Flour!).

Mix the dry ingredients in a bowl and add the melted fat and treacle, stirring well. Beat the egg, milk and bi-carb, and add to the mixture.

Make greaseproof lining for a tin approximately 9" square and spread the mixture evenly. Bake in a moderately hot oven for 1 and a quarter hours.

### . Envelopes.

David Rhodes made a very important statement about giving to the Church at one of the morning services in February. I was able to demonstrate weekly envelopes as one of the ways in which our giving can be regular. Whilst we may acknowledge that the amount of our giving should be determined in a thoughtful and prayerful way the practical problem of actually doing it remains to be done. Weekly envelopes are used by many of our congregation but others may wish to know about them.

The first thing to say is that the envelope scheme is very confidential. Only one person can work out how much is being given by any envelope user and that confidentiality is guarded very carefully. The stock of new envelopes is held by Maureen Allum and either she or myself can give you further information or put to rest any worries that you may have. The second thing to say is that regular giving to the Church is advantageous when it comes to budgeting. Knowing how much money in total is likely to come into the Church permits the P.C.C. to control its expenditure more confidently.

Of course, there are other ways of giving regularly such as by standing order. We have all the necessary forms and paperwork to deal with this if it applies to you.

Whether the giving is by envelopes or standing order it is possible to covenant the giving if you pay income tax. This has the advantage of allowing the Church to recover the tax, which you will have paid, at no extra cost to yourself. Again the necessary paperwork is easy and readily available.

In all these matters how much you give to the Church is entirely your decision and no one will pressurise you. Without any commitment at all I would be only too pleased to amplify any of this. You have only to ask!



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
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

Dear Friends,

### Keeping up with the Jones's.

Modern society almost demands that one should be connected to the Internet! Accordingly we have weakened to the extent that we now have a computer which will allow e-mails to be sent and received. Initially we had great fun (and trouble!) sending and receiving e-mails to the family but something rather special came through at the beginning of April. This was, through several different links, an e-mail from Pristina in Kosovo. There were three messages dated 21<sup>st</sup>, 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> March so by now events will have altered the situation.

The messages were from Christians asking for our prayers in the grim times which they were and are enduring. Even at that time the situation was dreadful:- "All Albanian schools and University are closed today. There will be no teaching anymore for some time. In other parts of Kosovo fights went on as worse as before. Many people are dying every moment. The situation is tragic..... There is no food left here in our humanitarian depots..... we send you an urgent plea to help us ... with food. Everything will be welcomed for us. We trust that this call won't fall on deaf ears."

Maybe we send news for the last time ... they may be send news for the last time ... they have there will be no phone lines so we won't be able to inform please carry on praying for us".

Whatever the future holds it will take a long time for this troubled area to settle down in peace. The fact that we have messages from these people who are our brothers and sisters in Christ should give us encouragement to persevere in our prayers and help in whatever way we can.

### AID AND TRADE

The plight of the refugees from Kosovo at the time of writing this article, has brought nearer to home than hitherto, the indisputable need for continuing humanitarian relief aid on a massive scale worldwide and it is purely coincidental that the marking of Christian Aid Week again this month reinforces the focussing of our thoughts on the multiplicity of situations and their causes, which give rise to such enormous and seemingly ever present needs.

Natural disasters are not preventable (though some of their worst effects may result from human factors), but the constant flow of requests through our letterboxes from deserving charities and the frequent media reports of cash shortages in many of our essential and social services in this country, also seem to be pointed reminders that something is very wrong with the world order, with the state of our Nation and perhaps with our own attitudes and priorities. Can anything be done to improve the situation?

Clearly, the response of any one individual in isolation can never be adequate, while violence, corruption and inefficiency often appear to seriously devalue assistance which is forthcoming. Nevertheless, a decision to give up trying can scarcely be an option for anyone with a conscience and experience shows that concerted support for worthwhile causes can produce significant results.

Equally and perhaps even more important than immediate relief aid, however, must surely be corresponding campaigning pressure for tackling the political, sociological and economic causes of poverty and deprivation. Pressure on government and powerful multi-national organisations is potentially the most beneficial, but the hardest to prove effective. In the meantime, support for charities like Christian Aid and organisations like the World Development Movement (WDM) and Traidcraft, which endeavour to /continued

promote longer term changes, can hopefully lead to at least some worthwhile improvements, while persistent prayer is probably the most important response of all!



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### A visit to Papua New Guinea.

At the beginning of August 1998, our daughter and her husband Bruce, left their posts as hospital doctors in Newcastle, to work for a year in Papua New Guinea. They work at a Health Centre and Hospital owned by the Anglican Church, although their posts are funded by Voluntary Service Overseas. In addition to the health Centre in Dogura, Milne Bay Province, they are responsible for five Health Sub-centres in outlying villages.

In early February this year we left to visit them and fortunately one of the advantages of being retired was that I could be away for five weeks (2 weeks longer than my husband). The journey involved us in six flights in each direction and ended with a two hour truck ride on rough mountain tracks and a two hour dinghy trip across the Soloman Sea. Travel in PNG is mainly by air and boat as there are few roads, owing to the mountainous terrain. Because air travel is so expensive, few locals have travelled further than the nearest town or village. Continued on opposite page

Mainland PNG is the eastern half of the second largest island in the world but also consists of many smaller islands in the Bismarck. Soloman and Coral Seas. It lies in the tropics just south of the Equator. Many of the four million population speak some English but small areas each consisting of a few villages have their own language with a total of eight hundred languages spoken. The temperature reaches 35 degrees centigrade on most days. We visited during the wet season which meant a very heavy rainfall most evenings. This had the advantage of providing running water for washing, piped from the river - on all but a few days, a W.C. which worked (there are only three houses in the village with one), and plenty of drinking water -

rainwater collected from the roof in a large tank. Dogura is an extremely beautiful village. Kate and Bruce's house is at one end overlooking the beautiful clear blue sea, which has superb coral reefs and islands, with deserted palm fringed beaches. At the other end of the village are the mountains and river

There is a poorly stocked trade store in Dogura but the nearest shops in Atatou (four to five hours journey each way) provide other foods flour, rice, pasta, tinned goods etc., orders are delivered by boat once a month. These goods are much more expensive than in England and out of reach of most local people.

Local villagers hold a market from 7.00 - 8.00 a.m. on Wednesdays and Saturdays, after travelling many miles to sell fruit and vegetables grown in their gardens and fish they have caught. In Dogura, most families have one wage-earner employed in the Health Centre or one of the two schools. However, in neighbouring villages, people live off the land and are very poor. There is a total lack of protein in the diet of the inland villages and people have little resistance to disease. We were extremely shocked by the low standard of living in the country.

Many of you will know that I am regularly fund-raising for the Health Centre in their desire to replace their current very dilapidated maternity unit. Members of All Saints' Church and School have given financial support. for which I am very grateful.

During my trip I was invited to pay an 'official' visit, as a retired headteacher, to St. Paul's Community School. This is similar to a Primary School in England, although the age range is 7 - 13 years. Some of the children have a two-hour walk to school where lessons begin at 8.00 a.m. and finish at 3.30 p.m. with an hour break for the children to eat their packed lunches. The classrooms are very basic. most made of wood, although two newer ones are built from breeze

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blocks. The morning worship and P.E./Games take place outside. The Teachers' salaries are paid by the state and each class is provided with a set of maths, text books and a set of English exercise books once every ten years! The parents have to pay a fee which is used to buy anything else.

Consequently the classrooms are extremely poorly equipped, especially when compared with our classrooms. However, I was impressed by the commitment of the teachers, the enthusiasm and good behaviour of the children and by the high standard of the children's work.

I was able to use my remaining money at the end of my visit to replace their broken battery radio/tape recorder (there is no electricity) and pay for a few books.

Sheffield Education Authority is sending an appeal to all Sheffield Schools for books in good condition which I will send to PNG for the school. If anyone at All Saints' Church would like to donate books, I would be very grateful. Please contact me at 41. Slayleigh Lane,



Salt and pepper kitchen foil



# The Holy Spirit won't be tamed

The Holy Spirit is not nice. The Comforter is not comfortable. The Spirit leads us where we would not go.

Jesus was driven into the wilderness after his baptism and Peter in the early Church was forced to change his mind on a number of significant issues against his will by that same Spirit.

We are walking on very dangerous ground if we think for a minute that the Holy Spirit is predictable, that we know what he is about to do and what the results of his activity will be.

Religious people have always tried to be in control of God. The religious instinct is probably the most powerful instinct in human nature and therefore to have religious power over other people is power indeed. If we could tame the Holy Spirit we would be the most powerful people in the World - In the World's sense.

The Holy Spirit, however, will not be tamed and will not allow us to be in control. We must allow the Spirit to blow where the Spirit wants to blow and never try to direct it.

Who knows where the Holy Spirit is leading us at this moment.

Could it be that we are about to enter a new age in a new millennium, a Spirit-filled age where huge numbers of people return to God and the Church is renewed as at a new Pentecost?

Or could it be that we are being led into a new dark age when the Church will be driven into the catacombs, when it will become poor and persecuted and thus maybe more Christlike?

A few hundred years of either of these are as nothing in God's eyes. God is in charge, of that there is no doubt. He is also in control.

Our part is to wait upon Him and to put ourselves into the way of being used by Him.

May I share with you the words of one of the great Anglican priests of this Century, Gilbert Shaw. In his last sermon he spoke of the Holy Spirit as follows:-

THE HOLY SPIRIT will never give you stuff on a plate - you've got to work for it.

Your work is LISTENING - taking the situation you're in and holding it in courage, not being beaten down by it.

Your work is STANDING - holding things without being deflected by your own desires or the desires of of other people around you. Then things work out just through

patience. How things alter we don't know, but the situation alters.

There must be dialogue in patience and charity - then something seems to turn up that wasn't there before.

We must take people as they are and where they are - not going too far ahead or too fast for them, but listening to their needs and supporting them in their following.

The Holy Spirit brings things new and old out of the treasury.

Intercessors bring the 'deaf and dumb' to Christ that is their part.

Seek for points of unity and stand on those rather than on principles.

Have the patience that refuses to be pushed out; the patience that refuses to be disillusioned.

There must be dialogue- or there will be no development.

We approach Pentecost with joy, but also in fear and trembling for we are no longer in control.

Statistics show that there are 12,000 cases of hearing disability in the impoverished Palestinian area of Gaza, mostly affecting children and senior citizens.

Inside the Atfaluna Society for Deaf Children's new building 150 profoundly and severely deaf children are eagerly learning, playing and being equipped for the difficult road ahead.

But a further 365 boys and girls fill the waiting lists, and funding is desperately needed to employ additional staff.

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### Beating the Bounds (A Walk Around Totley)

#### Saturday 8th May 1999 Meet in All Saints' Church Car Park at 9.30 a.m.

As part of the seventy-fifth anniversary of All Saints' Church, a walk which follows approximate parish boundaries will take place on May 8th. The walk is open to anyone in the parish who would like to join us in beating the bounds.

Children should be accompanied by a responsible adult.

Some parts of the route are muddy and steep and are not suitable for push chairs. Good boots would be an asset. Please meet at the Church Hall in time to set off at 9.30 a.m.

You should allow approximately 5 or 6 hours to complete the walk. Remember to bring your own lunch.

Here is a brief outline of the route with approximate times:

- 9.30 Leave All Saints' Church via Totley Hall Lane, Gillfield Wood, Woodthorpe Lane to the Spitfire.
- 10.00 Leave the Spitfire via Queen Victoria Road, Chemical Yard, Back Lane, Grove Road, Totley Brook Road to Old Hay Brook.

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#### A CHANGE OF WORK PATTERNS IN THE VINEYARD

When you read this we will have had our week of prayer, the P.C.C. 'Away Day' and the special service on May 2nd. Whatever the results of these activities, we can be sure that things are going to change. If nothing else, on May 2nd we will have two new church- wardens appointed at the same time. We live in a world that is constantly changing. We change as we grow older and the world around us changes at what seems to be an ever increasing rate. It is thought that the average young person leaving school this year should expect to have four different careers in their lifetime. The days of a secure job for life have long since passed.

Today, the pace of change is accelerated by technology. The latest video recorder, cam-corder, television, computer, camera and music centre is obsolete on the day you buy it. It is superseded by the latest modification. I now own a pocket calculator that is more powerful than the computer that I was using ten years ago. The world of communications is changing at an alarming rate. Satellite dishes, mobile phones, fax machines and the Internet along with an ever increasing number of television and radio stations, have over the last decade, made a tremendous impact on the lives of all of

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How different the world is now from what it was in 1924. The main source of information was a daily newspaper and for some, the newfangled wireless. Britain was essentially a Christian society with values that were disparate from the values that society holds today.

Today we live in a world where the official line can be challenged in an instant; where any point of view can be countered with the latest theories or statistical evidence. We are at war and yet each news bulletin gives us the enemy's propaganda along with our own. A world of freedom of information, even if the information supplied may have a particular spin in it.. Freedom of speech has been superseded by only expressing the 'Politically Correct' opinion. We live in a country where 2000 years of Christianity will be celebrated by a huge dome, the contents of which are, as yet, unknown and are unlikely to have much to do with Christian values. Unless it's 'the people's choice' it will not count. I often wonder who decides what the 'people's choice' is. Too often it is the media circus that creates the issues and then supplied us with the answers.

We are living in 1999 approaching a new millennium which begins on January 1st 2001. As Christians, we are called to spread the Gospel of Christ. Our task is so much more difficult that it was in 1924, when society was more open to receiving the Word of God. We are aliens in a foreign land. When Paul wrote to the early churches, he wrote to them in a language they understood, about the dilemmas they were facing in their everyday lives. He used metaphors they would be able to appreciate. When we read the Bible today, it is not always easy to understand what these problems or metaphors were. Indeed, to children of the second half of the twentieth century, many of Christ's parables are meaningless because they do not understand the agricultural references.

The much praised Alternative Service Book was produced in 1980 before most of the innovations in communications, I have referred to, were in everyday use. If we are to spread the word of the Lord, we cannot stay remote from the world. We must make sure that the ever increasing relevance of the Christian Faith is understood by people in our own community and country. This is bound to mean that we will have to change our Christian involvement in the local community and our Worship. It does not mean that we should change our beliefs. Our Faith should remain constant, even if we feel uncomfortable with some of the changes that will take place. Change is never easy or comfortable but change we must if we are to rise to the Great Commission in the twenty-first century. We must help each other and not dwell on what has changed but remain united in the common purpose of bringing others to Christ.

We are the first workers in the vineyard and as such, should be prepared to be last in order that those yet to come to the vineyard may be first. (Matthew 20: 1-16)

#### P.C.C. UPDATE.

At the April meeting of the P.C.C. there was a lot of business to get through but it proved to be a very useful and enjoyable meeting. We started off with a short informal Communion Service which no doubt helped us all to focus on the thought that, though we had to deal with many practical details, nevertheless our overall objective as a P.C.C. is to work for the Kingdom of God.

By the time that some of you read this there will have been a further meeting of the P.C.C. and a report from that meeting to the congregation at large (May 2<sup>nd</sup>). More of that in due course but this meeting did talk about the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Church and what we might do to mark that event. The main focus will be on Sunday November 21<sup>st</sup> when there will be a special service and also a social gathering. Other possible events that weekend include an exhibition, a musical event and even a celebratory dinner. Other events at other times might well include a choir concert, a walk and picnic and the "Beat the Bounds" walk which has already been advertised for May 8<sup>th</sup>. There was also talk of a Recipe Book, a Commemorative booklet, a tablecloth with embroidered signatures and other things. There is still room for other ideas but it all sounds quite exciting!

Then, of course, there was talk about what we might do locally about the Millennium (accepting that we are talking about the events near January 1st 2000). Flowers and an Exhibition featured in the discussion as well as parties and a proper recognition of the reason why we should note the Millennium anyway. Fuller details will be in the magazine later but ideas would be most welcome here too.

Of immediate concern is the first move to make the upstairs room in the Hall into a Parish Office. Of necessity there will have to be some restriction on the use of the upstairs room to allow it to be locked but there is a call out for the removal and disposal of anything stored upstairs in the Hall which is not wanted in the foreseeable future. The distinction between "junk" and "it might be wanted sometime" caused amusement to the P.C.C. but it is a real need to sort things out.

Amongst the appointments, Bill Bryer remains as Vice-Chairman of the P.C.C. (a recognition that he has done well in the past year!), Jane Lawry and Ann Powell are our representatives on the Deanery Synod. We heard with pleasure that All Saints' School will become Voluntary Aided from September 1st. We also heard that we are being asked to help keep Sheffield tidy. Some enthusiastic and community minded people have done "litter-picking" in the past. How much better if we could persuade people not to cause litter in the first place!

The date for the Summer Fair (or is it to be called Garden Party?) was fixed at July 3<sup>rd</sup> so there will soon be lists up asking for volunteers. This is seen as an important social event for the community as well as an opportunity to support some worthy charity. There was also a great deal of other business – all of it important and no doubt there will be noticeable effect in due course.

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

# From the Vicarage:

Dear Friends,

Have you ever been drunk at breakfast time? If you have, it may be a sign that you need help! What if you discovered a whole bunch of people who appeared to be drunk - perhaps laughing a lot, perhaps not standing up properly, maybe saying things that did not make a lot of sense, over the cornflakes? I think we would all be rather taken aback if we encountered anything like that.

Yet at 9.00 a.m. in Jerusalem. in the middle of the formal annual harvest celebrations, a group of ordinary Jews were behaving in such a way that accusations of drunkenness were levelled. Why? No doubt that was the only explanation that some could find for behaviour that was unusual. But it was not the right one. That was that God had poured out His Holy Spirit on His people so powerfully, that their physical behaviour was affected. In the Bible, "Spirit" and "wind" are the same word. I guess when we encounter a very strong wind, our physical behaviour is affected. No surprise if that happens when the creator of the wind shows up! But it was not just outward behaviour. It was inner certainty, faith and authority that were powerfully impacted on that Pentecost day. Peter, who so recently had been unable to even acknowledge that he knew

Jesus, preached spontaneously. He spoke of Jewish guilt in the crucifixion of Christ to a Jewish audience. He spoke of resurrection. He spoke of a need to repent and believe. He spoke of the need of and the availability of the Holy Spirit's work in the life of everybody. And 3000 believed there and then. When Jesus had told the disciples to wait for power from above, - the coming of the Spirit on Pentecost -He used a word "dunamis" - from which we get "dynamite". What happened that first Pentecost did not disappoint. Maybe some of us have memories of Whitsuntide walks. or new clothes, of tea parties and other such events. Whitsuntide, or Pentecost, has always been at the heart of Christian worship and the Christian year and has been celebrated in a variety of different ways. Whatever the Church and community may have done in the past, or may do in the future, the heart of it is the giving by God of the dynamite of the Holy Spirit to enable us to live as He wants us to. That's what it was all about two thousand years ago and that's what it needs to be about today. If we are apt to wonder what the coming of the Holy Spirit is all about, that's the heart of it. The early disciples knew that empowering was indispensable. They knew too that such empowering would need replenishing. Nothing has changed! Our need for God's power is no less today. And his provision is no different. May the same Holy Spirit fall afresh that God's reality and power may be understood anew by us in Totley this Pentecost season.

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Millennium year of Accompanied Prayer

Why? To mark the celebration of the 2000th birthday of Jesus Christ in a way that relates where we are to His life and purposes for ourselves and the world and enables us to better respond to His call. How?

- Using the book 'Landmarks' to stimulate personal prayer and reflection
- Monthly meetings of small groups of participants to share their experiences and reflections. A group leader will enable these groups. Participants can meet each month one-to-one with their group leader.
- Meetings of all participants will be held at the launch, during and at the end of the Year of Accompanied Prayer.

**Background:** The initiative for a Year of Accompanied Prayer has come from the Spirituality Centre at Westminster Cathedral and is being taken up in other parts of the country by groups of Christians and feel drawn to share the Millennium journey in a similar way. There are initiatives underway in the Trent Valley (from Stoke-on-Trent and Stafford to Nottingham and Derby) and the West Midlands.

#### Christians in Millennium muddle.

You would imagine that Britain's Christian leaders would be shouting from the rooftops the religious significance of the Millennium.

Instead, they seem at best embarrassed and at worst, positively ashamed of the fact that an unwanted guest - Jesus Christ - is gate crashing the great New Year's Party.

Take, for example, the Millennium Prayer drawn up by something called 'Churches Together in England' (CTE). In fact, it is not to be called a 'prayer' at all. That would be far too Christian. Instead, it is a 'Resolution' to be recited as the clock strikes midnight.

It makes no mention of God or Christ, nor even the merest hint of any kind of spirituality. By bending over backwards to avoid offending those of other

faiths, the committee has come up with a piece of insipid doggerel which amounts to little more than a bland exhortation for us all to be nice to one another. Christians could be forgiven for asking if the Millennium is not about Christ, then what exactly are we celebrating? Many are genuinely upset that they are being asked to pray to something other than God. But,

of course, it doesn't matter if they are offended - they are only Christians. Bill Snelson, secretary to the CTE says we must celebrate the year 2000 with 'an inclusive generosity rather than a doctrinaire exclusivism'. But it isn't doctrinaire to say confidently what you believe in and why it is important to you. And you don't need to abandon your beliefs in order to offer a warm and generous welcome to people of other faiths who may wish to join in the celebrations.

I suspect that instead of being offended, Jews, Muslims and Hindus would admire and congratulate Christians who had the courage of their convictions. Can you imagine a celebration of Mohammed's life which did not mention Allah?

I get the impression that if Jesus were to return to earth, He would be a great embarrassment to these 'Christian' leaders. He would no doubt go about spouting the Gospels in 'doctrinaire' fashion and causing no end of friction with other religious and political groupings. He would hardly be the inclusive style required in a multi-faith society. Much better to get rid of him. Much the same as 2000 years ago, in fact. See facing page!

The magic of our glorious National Park is that it caters for every type of visitor to enjoy their chosen leisure hobbies and pursuits.


Stanage Edge nearly bursts at the seams every weekend with rock climbers searching for still harder routes to conquer. Hang gliders soar over the Hope and Edale valleys. Horse riders thrill to the gallop around the Tissington and High Peak trails. Steam railway fans enthuse and dream about a return along the Monsal trail. The motor cycle trial rider can still open the throttle around tracks and disused quarry areas beyond Bradwell moor. The mountain bike has enjoyed supremacy along the Houndkirk Road and tracks of Totley Moss and Blacka moor.

Fell runners hardly seem to pause for breath as they charge through bogs and heather attempting to chip off seconds on a Marsden to Edale and Derwent Watershed race.

Water sports abound and yachts proudly command the waves on Ewden Valley and Dovestone Reservoirs. Anglers cast their line for that whopper in

glorious Dovedale and Ladybower dam.

Amongst all these goings on, the bird watcher can focus on a Buzzard or Hen Harrier on the heights beyond Mickleden Edge. The Botanist could trace a rare orchid in the hidden corners of Chee Tor. The caver exploring the depths of Eldon or Giants Hole could wriggle into a new chamber to delight the potholing world. Maybe the geologist, with his little rock hammer, could find a stone more precious than gold in "them thar hills". Sprinkle around all the ramblers crossing Kinder Scout and bound for the Pennine Way plus the thousands of tourists who visit the stately homes of Chatsworth and Haddon Hall and it presents a pretty crowded picture of our 542 square mile park. One could hardly imagine that there was any room left for more pursuits but the Peak has many strange secrets. /continued

Who could begin to imagine that lying rusting away in the elements lay many war-time aircraft wrecks. The high moorlands hold sentinel to over 50 crash sites. Stories are endless. The hobby known as wreckology will see enthusiasts scouring the countryside for crash sites, for over 2000 aircraft, hostile and otherwise, crashed on the hills of Britain during the last war. If on your travels you find any of these wrecks, please leave them intact for they are crown property. Permission to dig would have to be sought from the Air Ministry and individual Land Owners. Failure to do this could lead to a prosecution under the National Park Bye Laws (1949).

Always be prepared for weather changes on these high moorland slopes and observe the country code.

Enjoy the heritage of our National Park and who knows you may find a spot that is not so crowded!

#### A Web Site for All Saints'?

# The Gospel According to Baldrick



Those for whom the name Baldrick means nothing might be none the wiser if I told you that he was a character in a TV series.

Even those addicted to Blackadder might be surprised that his name should be linked to the word Gospel.

I should point out, however, that his role in the series was that of a servant whose lot in life could be summed up as 'suffering'.

What really brought him to mind in writing this June letter, was the fact that in each episode in every series the audience waited for the moment when, in some dire strait or another, Baldrick would announce to the world "I have a cunning plan".

Usually the most appropriate biblical response to his plan was that if carried out, the last state would be worse than the first.

This month Diocesan Synod will debate and be asked to accept the Diocesan Strategy document for 1999-2004.

Most people will be aware of the fact that consultation has been taking place throughout the diocese in recent months, in preparation for the Synod debate.

In March, Synod received the responses from around the diocese to the first consultative document and, following that debate in Synod, the final Strategy Paper will be put to the Synod for approval.

The first thing we all need to grasp is that the word strategy, in essence, means 'a thought through plan'.

It hardly seems worth mentioning that to live and act without thinking and without planning is not only disastrous, it is actually impossible.

A diocese and a parish actually does live and act with 'a plan'. To go on doing what we have been doing for the past five years is a plan, whether thought through or not.

To use our resources by giving them to those who ask first and loudest is a plan, whether conciously recognised or not.

To go on doing what we are doing regardless of the consequences in relation to God's love and purpose is a plan, however mindless or faith-less.



No one expects a new strategy for mission and ministry over the next five years to be universally acceptable in every detail and clearly some of its wider thrust might have been different if written by those with different perspectives on some issues.

What we should expect is that our strategy should be borne of the fruit of prayer, listening, wisdom, hard thinking and choices and, above all, an honest and deep desire to discern the heart and the mind of God as faithful servants and disciples of Christ and the Kingdom of God.

What we have the right to expect is indeed what we will be given at our Diocesan Synod. It will also be a strategy that is to be monitored and adaptable when new circumstances require it.

We have much to be thankful for and encouraged by in this diocese but we know that alongside such things, there are areas where we need to repent and to respond with joyful obedience to Christ's call to follow Him into the future which is his.

Rarely, if ever, was Baldrick's cunning plan met with enthusiasm or even approval; thus it ever was. Some objected and many thought nothing of another servant who said that the plan is -"I must go up to Jerusalem where I will be betrayed, arrested, condemned to death and crucified; afterwards I will rise again". But of course we know that, don't we?

#### The Oakes Christian Holiday Centre

The Oakes holiday centre is committed to communicate the Gospel of Christ to children and young people.

On Saturday May 15th, the Oakes held an open day to enable supporters and interested people to see the progress already made within the large house that has a scheduled opening date for taking residential children on July 1st 2000.

Major structural work has been done on the roof to preserve structural beams and it has been rewired. Some rooms have been plastered and plans are in hand to install central heating. The rooms are spacious and in some there are beds, chairs and all sorts of items that have been given, piled up high. Billie and Dan (who are expecting a baby in August) live on the top floor. The other volunteer staff also live there. The first floor has rooms that are in process of being plastered and decorated to take beds in dormitories for boys and girls with separate washing facilities. The downstairs has a large lounge that is already used for weekly Bible study.

Next year there will be four Gap-Year students living there and an American family who are being sponsored by their Church for a year.

The grounds are extensive and although initial cleaning has been done, it is obvious there is a long way to go with an overgrown lake and walled garden.

However, the vision and enthusiasm of the volunteers is undiminished. They are not afraid of hard work. They have a weekly Bible study evening and much of the work already achieved has been in answer to prayer.

They continue to rely on items and donations and have drawn up a current list of needs which I will place on the Church Hall notice board.

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#### Covenants.

At the Annual Parochial Church Meeting a question was asked about the Millennium Gift Aid. There has been some publicity about this and some of us have had a leaflet from the Inland Revenue pushed through our letter boxes. Enquiry has established that this arrangement only applies to a limited number of charities and the churches are not included in the list. Mostly, if not entirely, the charities favoured by this arrangement are those who directly provide overseas aid.

There remains however the Gift Aid scheme where the church can benefit if a lump sum of £250 or more is given to the church. Tax recovery is possible on this for the benefit of the church if the donor pays income tax.

All this does not alter the ordinary covenant scheme whereby the church can recover tax on weekly, monthly, annual or single donations of any amount. To qualify for this arrangement the donor must be a tax payer, must have completed a deed of covenant before the money is given and the church has to have a proper record of the payments so that the tax inspector can be satisfied.

If all this sounds complicated I will be only too pleased to answer any questions and also I can provide the necessary paperwork. As in other cases any such discussion and information provided will remain confidential


