

## From the Vicarage:



Dear Friends,

Since 1979 (I think), I have associated February with snow. It was in the February of that year that Sheffield was entirely cut off by snow, from the rest of the country, for something in excess of 24 hours. So much snow fell in that month that a special "snow minister" was appointed until things returned to normal.

Snow is one of those things to which one's attitude may well change as you age. To the child, all they see is unlimited opportunities for fun: sledging, hurling snow balls at unsuspecting others etc. etc. Even as children, it's hidden dangers may not be appreciated. Cries to go out and play may last only a quarter of an hour or so, when the reality of the temperature bites.

It can be deceptive stuff, as well. The beauty of the freshly covered hill-side can become the nightmare of the avalanche. The perfection of the undisturbed new fall, becomes the slithering misery of grubby slush a few days later. The thrilling elegance of the accomplished skier can become very painful when something goes wrong.

I would not necessarily associate snow with Israel. It's a bit hot for that, isn't it? However, it is a fact that snow is known in Israel today, indeed always has been and is alluded to by the writers of the Bible on a number of occasions. Usually, they use snow as a picture of purity (and occasionally, as a simile for leprosy!). So, after King David had come a considerable cropper in the area of personal purity, he wrote in Psalm 51, "Wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow".

In the world in which we live, personal purity is a precious commodity. Attacks on public figures in that area have become all too common. But, "There, but for the grace of God go l". I guess we can all acknowledge the fight it can be to maintain personal, and thus community, purity of thought and behaviour. And, I think that's where the grace of God comes in. Jesus said that he came, "to seek and to save what was lost". That might include the fight for purity. He came to rescue what was lost and He came because He is on our side. He's the one who will let the grace of God be a reality to us, in the area of purity or other battles that we may face. We might not have made such big mistakes as did David, but coming to the Lord, so that he can wash us and make that picture of pure snow reflect what He does inside us is something that can only be good for us all.

So wrap up and keep warm. Next month, we might be thinking about Spring!

#### A funny thing happened on the way to . . .

#### Melbourne (pronounced 'Melbun') by Anno Domini

Just before we touched down, a wet patch alerted the staff to a leaky toilet. Passengers using the opposite toilet were soon aware that it also had become blocked. Luckily, the Captain announced that the plane was about to descend into Bangkok airport and we were asked to return to our seats.

The plane landed safely and we, who were travelling on to Sydney or Melbourne, were allowed to leave the plane to visit the duty free shops and snack bar. I ask you, after all that food! Passengers were requested to be back on time. Honestly, there couldn't have been a bigger rush for the exits had the plane been on fire! The parents of the three children next to me passed our row of seats at the double but their daughter spotted them and nudged the two brothers, who immediately became wide awake and all three climbed over me to catch up with mum and dad. The whole plane had become a flying rubbish dump with the magazines, comics, cushions, blankets, drink cans and paper cups scattered all about. A group of pretty, tiny, Thai girls and youths would soon put this right. They came armed with cleaning apparatus. They picked up the rubbish, vacuumed and replaced the paper covers, cleaned the toilets and in no time at all the plane was spic and span again. I decided not to take the long walk to the duty free shops and chose to stand with the cabin crew at the top of the exit steps enjoying th last of the day's sunshine. The cabin crew were waiting for the replacement crew to arrive. They said it was very tiring work and that they would remove their make-up, wash their smalls and go to bed when they arrived at their hotel as they would have to be ready to take over next day when the plane returned from Sydney and work the twelve hour shift back to London. The job may appear glamorous from ground level but it is very hard work. They work non-stop for the whole journey, taking out drinks, meals, duty free sales one after another.

One of the replacement cabin crew arrived with a handful of flower buttonholes for the retiring staff. They were very pretty, exotic and smelled heavenly. He went away and returned with a nose-gay for me. He said he didn't want me to feel left out. A beautiful gesture.

Very soon the passengers returned to their seats laden with booty from the duty free shop. They were asked not to put heavy goods and bottles in the over head lockers but this request was ignored. During take-off, one over-full locker dropped open and a bottle of whiskey came hurtling out. Never have I seen a bottle fielded so well! Luckily, the man beneath saw it coming and caught it and then kept it. Could you blame him?

After supper had been served about nine o'clock, the lights were dimmed and most of the passengers settled down to doze - but not the three children beside me. I don't know what they had eaten at the Bangkok stop but they refused their supper and drinks and one by one they started to use their 'sick bags'. The boy next to me slept in between bouts with his head on my arm or in my lap and finished up with his legs across me again. After several hours of this performance, I got up to tell the parents. The father said they were always that way when they were tired and he was sure I could cope - if not. I could call the attendant!

When the plane touched down at Sydney, most of the passengers left, including the three children and their parents. I said 'goodbye' but was ignored. Perhaps they thought I was a 'whinging pom'! Another hour on the ground for refuelling and cleaning - this time by Australian men. The cabin crew bade us good night and left. When we took off again there were only a few passengers and one steward for the one hour flight to Melbourne.

An Irish lady came to sit beside me and commiserated with me about the Australian children. By the time we had touched down at Melbourne at 11.25 p.m., I had heard her life story and her 'troubles'. I couldn't get a word in edgeways and after twenty-nine hours on the plane. I was too weary to even try!







The chances are that like me you will do nothing with it in particular. It will be simply absorbed into the ordinary routine of working life. What a shame! Yet we can all use the extra day, even if we are busy on February 29.

Pick any date between now and December 31 as your extra day to do something with. Here are a few suggestions:

Follow the advice of the 85 year old Franciscan friar who, when asked what he would do differently were to live his life over again replied "I would pick more daisies". Give yourself a day of doing nothing.

#### **OUIET DAY**

You might be equally adventurous and give yourself a quiet day, a day of reflection and prayer. Many mean to do this, but never get round to it. You can do this alone or in a group. Your parish might arrange a quiet day led by someone who is used to this sort of thing, either in the parish or in some other place.

Others may want to use the gift of the extra day to visit someone to renew a friendship, to bring a little light and life into someone's lonely routine. You may even want to put right a relationship that has gone wrong.

Others, again, may work and decide to give a day's wage to some worthy cause; others may give a day to their local church by offering a day's labour in the graveyard or wherever seems appropriate!

It has always puzzled me that in these days of time saving devices we seem to make less and less time to take the initiative and do with our time what we really want to do; there is less of it to spare not more. Let's make an exception with the extra day this year.

#### **Education Sunday**



A brightly coloured banner, measuring 6m x 3.5m, has gone on display in Sheffield Cathedral thanks to a project commissioned by the Church Burgesses. Sheffield artist Coralie Turpin helped more than 300 children to make their sections of the banner as well as making one of the sections herself. Made during the 50 Day Artists in Residence project in 10 of the city's Church of England schools, the banner depicts history local to those involved and thus gives an overview of the city. During the eighteenth century, groups of Christians worked to influence government and change society
Christians called **The Clapham Sect** influenced the conscience

of the nation by their insistence on the standards taught in the Bible. Among their achievements were:

- Bear and bull baiting made illegal
- · Village schools built and poor children educated
- Prisoners visited and conditions improved
- Restrictions on publication of pornographic books
- Vaccination for people of London against smallpox

The revival of the Christian faith inspired men and women to understand the dignity of work and work towards a fair wage and the right to express themselves.

The Tolpuddle Friendly Society of Agriculteral Workers set to improve their wages from seven shillings a week. In 1834, five Methodists (including two lay preachers) and another were convicted of taking part in 'unlawful oaths' and were sentenced to seven years transportation to Australia. Their sacrifice inspired others.

By 1850, rural Britain had been transformed into the workshop of the world. Thousands of people lived in dire conditions. By 1890, one third of the population lived on less than one pound per week. The government did little to help the poor. A major force for social welfare was the work of:

William and Catherine Booth and the Salvation Army.

Along with the Christian message they also provided food, clothing, shelter and employment training.

Many churches started soup kitchens. Christians lobbied hard to control the hours and conditions of women and children working in the mines and mills.

Nearly three-quarters of all charity organisations were run by evangelical Christians, e.g. temperance movement; medical missions – providing free health care and medicines; Police court missionaries – the beginning of the Probation Service.

### **SAINTS IN FEBRUARY**

The 14th. February is one of the better known Saints days. However, the story of Valentine is far from clear. There was a church dedicated to him in Rome in the fourth century and there is a suggestion that a bishop of that name was martyred at Terni (Italy) in that era. More than that it is hard to say. Associations with romantic love seem to have more to do with pagan beliefs about the time of the year, than anything linked with a saint. Three days later, on 17th February, the church's calendar remembers Janani Luwum, a twentieth century Christian, martyred in 1977. He was converted as a Christian, as a young school teacher in the Ugandan village of Acoli. He was a gifted communicator and soon became known for his ability to share the gospel. He was ordained and by 1969 had been appointed bishop of Northern Uganda. Five years later, he had become archbishop of a Central African area that included Uganda. Rwanda, Burundi and Boa-Zaire. Whilst Janani was serving the Anglican church in these ways, Idi Amin rose to power in Uganda. Initially Amin sought to encourage friendship with Janani, perhaps hoping to improve his image in the west by so doing. However, these overtures did not last long, especially once Janani spoke out against the acts of corruption and brutality that became the norm in the Amin administration. In

1977, Janani, along with other bishops, was

summoned to see the president. After a very confusing day, the others were ordered at gun-point to go home. "The archbishop will follow". He never did. Stories were published in the press about a road accident but even these showed different vehicles in different reports. A celebration funeral was held, in defiance of the authorities. Although the archbishop's body was never produced, a huge crowd gathered around the open and empty grave prepared for him. His death preceded a further onslaught of persecution on the church - a persecution withstood with such courage, fuelled by the example of the martyr-archbishop.

The church in Uganda indeed illustrated the saying that, "The blood of the martyrs is the seed of the church", as the nineteenth century missionary bishop, James Hannington and his companions were murdered. Today, despite its turbulent history, Ugands has a church (of all denominations) of nearly 14,500,000. Here in the west, where the prospect of such outright attack on those of faith may seem remote, perhaps we have much to learn from brothers and sisters whose faith is sustained in far more difficult and even threatening conditions.






#### SAINT GEORGE

The 23rd April is St. George's day, although this year, because it coincides with Easter Sunday, in the church's calendar, it has been moved to the 2nd May. Patron saint of England, soldiers, the scout movement and the dedication of many church buildings, he has earned himself an enduring reputation. His cross is the red cross on the white background which is the flag of England and the fact that he is reputed to have slain a dragon is known by most. However, what are known facts about this most well-known saint? Unfortunately, the answer is "virtually none". He has been venerated as a soldier-saint from very early times, but no record of his life has been left. Scholars believe he was martyred at Diospolis (present day Lydda inland from Tel Aviv in Israel) at the end of the third, or beginning of the fourth century. This is as far as we can go, although by the beginning of the sixth century, he was being referred to as a good man, "whose deeds are known only to God." Mediaeval legends about him exist in various forms. "The Golden Legend" represents him as a middle eastern knight who rescued a maiden from a dragon in Libya, which resulted in thousands of people seeking baptism. Some have used the fanciful nature of George and his dragon-slaving as a reason to dismiss him as a real figure entirely. That would seem to be unfair. Earlier references to him make no reference of this - it seems to be the fruit of mediaeval imagination. continued ...

How he came to gain popularity in England is unclear. His name was known here before the Norman conquest, but returning crusaders in the centuries after 1066 probably increased his popularity, as they picked up references to him in the Holy Land and surrounding areas. He probably became our patron saint around 1348, when Kind Edward III established the Order of the Garter, under Saint George's patronage. In 1415 the church in England elevated his festival to count amongst the most important, although in 1960 the Roman Catholic church relegated him to the list of the minor saints.

So with George, we are on far thinner ice than David, Andrew or Patrick for the other patron saints of the countries in the U.K. But for many people, the remembrance of his day, as a scout or guide promise has been renewed, of a special parade has been undertaken, has been part of the rhythm of life. One of the helpful things about reflecting on the lives of the saints, is that it reminds us what God can do in the life of an ordinary person - flesh and blood like the rest of us. We might know a lot about George, except that in some way hundreds of years ago, such was the impact of the living God in his life, that he was willing to die for Him. We may not be called to do that. We are called to live for Him!

Elizabeth Fry was ahead of her time in thinking that prisons should prepare prisoners for life after their release. She saw the conditions in Newgate prison early in the nineteenth century. Women and children were living in a 'nightmare' situation where women were drunk and spitting tobacco, swearing and singing disgusting songs.

She started a school for the prison children in 1812. She gradually won the friendship of the women and taught them basic hygiene and child-care. Other prisons followed her example and they were changed into places of 'peaceful work'. She fought hard to change the laws which allowed women to be hanged for crimes as small as stealing socks or teaspoons. She went to Parliament to give evidence and said she believed the influence of the Bible could change even the most immoral women. She believed God could change the heart of criminals. Through their commitment to Jesus and the teaching of the Bible, many business people have looked after their workers. George Cadbury, Joseph Rowntree, William Lever and Titus Salt built model villages for their employees, taking them away from the slums. The houses had gardens, open spaces, sanitation and community halls, setting standards for new urban development. Care for the workers went beyond housing; for example. Titus Salt fitted smoke burners to his factory chimneys in Bradford. George Palmer of biscuit fame, introduced sickness benefit and a pension scheme. In 1872, Jeremiah Colman of mustard fame, appointed an industrial nurse and provided accident insurance. In 1902, Cadbury's factory had a resident doctor and by 1907. Rowntree provided free medical and dental services. In the same year, William Lever introduced the idea of a state Old Age Pension to Parliament, to be paid through the post office. W.H. Smith established his shops in 1828 and refused to open them on Sunday.

#### **Spanish Rice**

(from the old Favourite Recipes)

3 oz long grain rice

4 good tbsp. Grated cheese

4 tbsp. Tomato pulp or tinned tomatoes

1 tsp. Chutney or sweet pickle

1 tsp. Curry powder

1 chopped onion

1/2 oz margarine

To finish - 3 tbsp. Fried breadcrumbs \*, chopped parsley and red (paprika) pepper for garnish

Boil rice and strain. Fry onion in margarine, in a saucepan. When onion is cooked, add all other ingredients except cheese. Make very hot, add cheese and mix well. Season if required. Put into a deep hot dish, e.g. a pie dish, and spread fried crumbs on top. Garnish.

\* To fry crumbs:- Breadcrumbs should be dry. Melt one and a half ounces of margarine in a small frying pan. Add crumbs with a tablespoon until all margarine is absorbed and crumbs are light brown in colour and crisp. As an alternative, some crushed potato crisps could be used to finish.



ANTHONY de Mello tells the story about two monks on pilgrimage. Their journey took them a long way across fairly tough terrain.

Approaching a river, which they needed to cross, they came upon a very beautiful young woman who also needed to get to the other side.

However, the water was too high and the crossing too precarious for her to attempt it on her own. One of the monks offered to carry her on his back, which he did, and took her safely to the far riverbank.

His companion was shocked that he would allow himself to have such a close physical contact with a woman, and rebuked him for breaking the rules and bringing their Order into disrepute.

Had he forgotten he was a monk?

How dare he touch her and allow her into such intimate physical contact?

Do you know about The Wood-Sheppard Principles, launched by the two Bishops Wood and Sheppard?


Have you heard about the Race Equality in Employment Project that was founded to promote the Principles?

Some 200 employers were made aware of the conference in face to face meetings or by phone, and a significant number expressed positive interest with about 40 registering and 30 turning up on the day.

Phil Ward of Northern Foods was the main speaker with an excellent presentation about how his company had produced and implemented an Equal Opportunities Policy. "In the end it is all about making the most of all our employees", he said.

### P.C.C. UP-DATE.

The March meeting of the P.C.C. was "fun"! That might sound strange to some people but it is difficult to find a better word. There was some very serious business to be done but it was all achieved with a tremendous sense of fellowship and there was no doubt that we were seeking to do God's will for All Saints'

We were able to review the February meeting about Marriage and our attitude to the second marriage of divorcees in church. After a long debate we succeeded in approving unanimously a statement which will be given due publicity elsewhere. The problems stem from the desire of the Church to be compassionate to those whose marriage has run into difficulties and yet to strongly advocate the Christian teaching that marriage is a solemn promise before God and, as such, is a firm and necessary foundation for family life.

We were also able to review the progress which has been made towards a Youth Worker to be shared between the churches. There is no doubt that there is a lot of work to be done amongst the young people in our area and we recognised that their years are slipping by. We decided that we were able to assure the other churches that All Saints wishes to go ahead with the scheme. Of course there are a lot of problems to be encountered and overcome but there is no reason at present to suppose that any of the outstanding issues (money included) are impassable barriers. Both these discussions took quite a long time but it was good to see that everyone had a constructive attitude towards the issues.

The Treasurers report on the 1999 accounts was approved and the full report will be available prior to the Annual Meeting on April 9<sup>th</sup>. Neil Hayden has now resigned as Treasurer after a nine-year stint. He was warmly thanked for his work over that time as well as for the immediate report. Alan Burt has now taken over this most unappealing of tasks.

Is the investigation and description of creation the province of science or religion? Are science and faith in conflict, do they address different aspects of reality, or can one aid in an understanding or appreciation of the other? For anyone interested in exploring these issues, this is a very welcome little book.

The author has a PhD in cosmology and degree in theology, so has the ideal qualifications to discuss the relationship between science and the Christian faith. This book has grown out of lectures he has given to a variety of audiences on cosmology and creation. Its first few chapters give a non-mathematical summary of both the results and methodology of modern science, covering not only the formation of stars and galaxies but of matter, space and time themselves. The historical survey includes general relativity, red shifts and evidence for the big bang, quantum uncertainty and antimatter.

The second half of the book brings God into the discussion, and looks at the question of design – does the universe have to be the way it is, or did God have freedom to produce what he chose? Does the very existence of a universe capable of sustaining life prove the existence of a creator? If we are led to invoke God, is a deistic view adequate, or are we required to go further, closer to the theism of Christianity?

Overall, this is an informative and thought provoking book. In parts, I felt it was over cautious in presenting the scientific case – topics described as interesting ideas, I would regard as established theories! This may in part be because science has moved on in the six years since the book was published, but is more likely due to the author's quite reasonable reluctance to engage in technical details. For anyone who would like a popular but more rigorous account of the scientific issues, I would still recommend one of Paul Davies' books, such as "God and the New Physics" (though these leave it to the reader's judgement as to where, and what sort of, God enters the picture!). David Wilkinson's present book, however, is certainly well worth reading.



### A funny thing happened on the way to . . . . PHILIP ISLAND

However, I fear that in time the penguins will be driven away. There are pay booths and turnstiles which are only opened at dusk. 

### From the Vicarage:



Dear Friends,

Our family has two birthdays in June. That always seems to me to be the best month - after all, you separate major celebrations nicely so that one comes along every six months. Birthdays of course vary. Early on in life you long for it, not just because of the excitement, but also so that you can claim to be a year older. Later on, the excitement usually dims and you are not so keen on adding to your age! The big O's can even be the cause of considerable dismay.

Birthdays for us get celebrated in a variety of ways. In recent years, we have celebrated at a well-known take-away chicken outlet: at a pizza restaurant: at the skating rink; on the football field (in arctic temperatures); with games in the garden (and a lively hosepipe in rather better temperatures); at the gym and with a simple quiet meal at home. For a fairly recent big 0 of mine. I was given a surprise ride in a hot air balloon over the Derbyshire countryside. That really was one to remember! Some of us will find lots of other reasons for a celebration. Some of us love "an occasion", others hate the prospect. Recently I heard of somebody who had recounted the way in which her husband had organised a surprise party for her, with lots of unexpected guests. After her friend had listened to the tale, told with much excitement, she replied, "Well, if my husband does that to me, I'll kill him!" What some relish, is torture to others. I think though, for all of us, a party (suited to our tastes and temperaments) thrown in our honour, is a source of great joy and happiness. Usually it's a mark of love and respect and received as such.

Jesus frequently alludes to parties and celebrations as a picture

of heaven. They threw a party when the prodigal son returned home. When the shepherd finds his lost sheep he throws a party, as does the woman who retrieves her missing silver coin. That's just three examples all from the same chapter (Luke 15) in the Bible. In the previous chapter He told a story comparing the kingdom of God to a fabulous feast. Yes, that's it. The kingdom of heaven is like a party, the best party you can imagine, but far, far better. Luis Palau, who spoke at the Millennium Mission at the Arena in April, said frequently, "God is a good God". He is. And he wants us to experience His goodness and likens that to being present at a celebration. Somehow, some of us pick up images of God which are sombre and fobidding. He is a remote and over-severe Victorian Father. Not so. Jesus encouraged us to refer to Him as Abba (the Hebrew equivalent of "daddy") and told stories about parties at which there was great rejoicing, especially when people who had lost their way found their way back home. So, we'll do our best to enjoy June birthdays in the vicarage and in a small way will see them as a sign of the kingdom of heaven. There are many ways of looking at that, but one is to hear the divine invitation to, "Come and join the party".

The Government proposals affecting Tax Rebates to charities have meant a great deal of work for all who are concerned with the administration of the process. In simple terms "Covenants" are now a thing of the past, although all existing covenants are valid for the duration of their lives. The compensating factor is that the lower limit for "Gift Aid" has been abolished. This means that tax can be recovered from the Inland Revenue for any amount that may be given to the charity by a tax-payer. To enable this to happen, there are two important steps. Firstly, the donor to the charity must complete a Form of Declaration. This is quite a simple form and is now available to anyone willing to complete it. Secondly, the charity has to keep a trail through their books to be able to demonstrate that any particular donation has been paid by a tax-payer. To achieve the second step, everyone who has hitherto given to the church by covenant (either through envelopes or bankers order) is being asked to sign a Form of Declaration. (This is in hand now). Any other tax-payers are also invited to complete a form so that the church can obtain the benefit of tax rebate.

There are also some new envelopes available at the back of the church for tax payers who may wish to make occasional donations. This might apply if and when there are special appeals for emergencies or other good causes. It also applies if it is required to make a special donation to ordinary church funds. It is worth emphasising that strict confidentiality will continue to be observed. The new envelopes will only be opened by the Treasurer and so, even though your name is on the outside, no other person, apart from the Treasurer and the Gift Secretary, will know how much any particular person has given. Are you confused? I will be happy to talk anyone through the implications of all this. Just contact me if you wish.

A funny thing happened on the way to . . .

Como House by Ann O. Domini

All the shops in Melbourne city centre close at noon on Saturdays. At lunch-time the weather changed from sunny, warm and bright. The wind got up, black clouds gathered and it started to rain heavily so I decided to visit Como House, an old and truly colonial house, square and solid with a verandah all round supported with twisted wrought iron columns: built around 1854 for a Lancashire family named Armitage who had emigrated. The Armitages had made their money in the cotton mills and had gone to Melbourne to become merchants in the cotton trade. The house was situated on a hillside overlooking the city and the River Yarra. The garden had been planted with many English trees. Oaks, elms, sycamores and beeches which had flourished in their new environment so that the house was now surrounded by a small forest which hid it from the road.

The rooms were very small for a house of its size. All the rooms were furnished with their original furniture imported from England. Horsehair sofas and chairs; sepia pictures of royalty, the boar war and the Armitage family which had been quite large with several sons and daughters.

The kitchen equipment was similar to that in the home of my grandparents who married in 1854. The visitors that Saturday were mostly young Australians asking what this and that were for. Before I knew what was happening, I was conducting a guided tour of the kitchen, scullery and laundry and talking about the usages of those old kitchen devils / turn to page 24

which were familiar to my generation's childhood. One of the things which caused much amusement was a 'Patent Carpet Cleaner'. I said that we had had one of those things bequeathed to us in an old aunt's will (along with a lot of Victoriana) and how my sister and I used to quarrel about whose turn it was to stand on the platform and pump the handle which worked the suction bellows whilst the other one applied the nozzle on the end of a long flexible pipe to the carpet.

My young audience also wondered at the use of gopheringirons, crimping irons and the mangle with its great wooden rollers, the earthen-ware 'peggy' pots and the wooden sinks specially for washing delicate china and glassware.

This marvellous complete Edwardian home was bequeathed to the City of Melboure by the last of the Armitage sisters who, at the age of 83, had never been married and had been cared for by a family servant of similar age. Miss. Armitage had given her house with the proviso that none of the contents should be disturbed or sold. She had also left sufficient money to be invested for its upkeep which, with the admittance charge, ensured its preservation for posterity.

### Melbourne City

For two days it had poured with rain and thundered and lightened. I had visited Gemtech, producers of opal jewellery, and watched a film on the mining of opals. Not wanting to get wet through and feeling that I must get out of the hotel, I boarded a tram and went to see Captain Cook's house in Fitzroy Gardens. /turn to page 26

On my return to the hotel, I found that the American party had stayed indoors so I spent the evening chatting to them.

The shops and street names are mainly English in origin and give a feeling of not being so far from home. However, I must be moving on, otherwise my six months will have expired and I will not have completed my itinerary. During my conversations with my new American friends I learned that they were travelling to Echuca in their coach on the following day. They mentioned that they had several spare seats so I asked if I could come along. They made me very welcome. Soon after leaving Melbourne the sun came out. It was a truly great experience watching the scenery roll by as we sped along; everything, the trees, the flowers, even the colour of the earth, was so different from anything I had ever seen before.



### **Science for Society**

Many of Britain's scientists have openly claimed that their Christian faith was vital to their work.

Robert Boyle, born in 1627, was a pioneer in modern chemistry and physics. He gave us *Boyle's Law* and was the first scientist to insist on 'the scientific method' of careful experiments.

John Ray, also born 1627, laid the foundation for our sciences of ornithology, botany and zoology.

Michael Faraday (1791 - 1867) is considered by some to be one of the greatest scientists of all time. He pioneered the electric motor, the dynamo and the transformer. Think how we benefit daily by their existence!

Sir John Herschel was born 1792 and made an outstanding contribution to the physics of light and to the science of astronomy and astrophysics.

Lord Kelvin (born in 1824) laid the foundation of modern physics. He patented around seventy inventions including the first ship's compass. He must have saved many lives by doing this. He was knighted for making it possible for as strong signal to be sent along the length of the Atlantic Cable. Communication has come a long way since then but he started it off!

James Maxwell was born in 1831. His genius has been compared to that of Newton and Einstein. His work of electromagnetism laid the foundation for modern radio, television, radar and satellite communications.

Sir Ambrose Fleming was a pioneer in the development of the telephone, electric light and radio.

As a professor in Cambridge from 1826, Charles Babbage made a lasting contribution to the world of mathematics.

His many inventions that were used in factories, mining and bridge building. Babbage produced an early speedometer. However, he was especially noted for his design of the first

automatic digital computer. Long before the era of microchips, he had designed the basic elements of the present day computer. Charles Babbage claimed that careful scientific study is wholly compatible with a belief in the truth of the Bible and the Christian hope of life after death.

In 1991 British scientists and engineers built 'Difference Engine No. 2' (a simple computer) from Babbage's notebook specifications. It was accurate to 31 digits.

### And now to the new Millennium ....

It is true that not all good and humanitarian deeds have been done by Christians but true Christianity still offers our nation values that we must never lose. Values like respect for life, care for the weak and vulnerable, the importance of freedom and justice, the dignity of work, faithful relationships and personal responsibility.

Wherever there are people, there is a challenge to love and to serve the Lord.

### Sadhu Sundar Singh our June Saint

A Sadhu is a Hindu holy man. It is an honorific title.

On June 19th, the Anglican calendar remembers Sadhu Sundar Singh. A native of India, who died in 1929. So what is the Church of England doing, remembering a Hindu in this way? Sundar Singh was born in Rampur (Northern India) in September 1889. His family were wealthy Sikhs and as such was introduced to that religion. Hinduism and Islam. He was naturally draw to a religious life and mentally was very able. By age 14 he had immersed himself in the sacred books of Hinduism (The Veda) and had also read the Koran. He swiftly chose the lifestyle of a Sadhu, someone who devotes themselves entirely to his religion, forsaking all worldly pleasures. He remained single and jobless, donned a yellow robe and roamed India, relying on the charity of others to eat and sleep.

His mother had had some connections with British Christian missionaries and as a result, he had spent some time at a missionary school, where he violently rejected the Bible and Christian teaching. After his mother died, when he was 14, he even threw stones at Christian preachers and incited other to join him. However, in the midst of all this, inner peace eluded him to such an extent that he contemplated suicide. He prayed, "Oh God, if you do exist, show me the right way or I will kill myself". Very soon afterwards he saw a brilliant light, so bright he feared the house was on fire. A figure spoke to him saying, in Hindi, "How

much longer are you going to search for me? I have come to save you. You prayed for the right path. Why have you not followed it?" Sundar fell to his knees, with a deep realisation that Jesus was not dead but alive. The vision faded but peace and joy remained. Life was transformed. Against the wishes of his family, he was baptised on his birthday in 1905 and decided to become a Sadhu Christian, wholly dedicated to the Lord. He kept his celibate, simple life-style and yellow robe. He continued to travel much of the time. Now he did not even have the encouragement of his family who ostracised him because of his commitment to Christ.

His personal impact was immense. He spent two years at the theological college in Lahore, but it was his life that spoke volumes. An eyewitness reported the following incident:

Sundar sat on a tree and sang a song. The audience was not impressed by the song. A man came forward, pulled him from the tree and knocked him down. Silently, Sundar got up and began praying for these hostile people. He then told us about the love of Jesus who had died to redeem all sinners. Because of that, I repented and so did the attacker.

His wanderings took him to Tibet and Nepal, countries at that time quite hostile to the Christian faith. In Nepal he was arrested by the local Lama at Rasa (in 1914) and sentenced to death for spreading a foreign religion. He was thrown, naked, into a dry well. The top was sealed and locked. He spent two days without food or water, surrounded by the corpses of others who had

been executed in that way, when a man came along, unlocked the lid and helped him out. The stranger left without saying anything. When he was taken back to Lama, this man was astounded. There was only one key to the well, which the Lama had kept with him. Sundar was begged to leave the area on account of the awesome power of the God he served.

By the end of his life he had visited many countries: Malaysia, Japan, China and from 1920, many in the west. Though famous, his humility was never dented. His father repented of his earlier attitude to him. His attitude was always to follow Jesus' example, repay evil with kindness and treat enemies with love. Once a fanatic from another religion went up to him in a market place and struck him on the right cheek. Calmly, Sundar turned his left cheek to the attacker. The man left. Every summer he visited Tibet. He went in 1929 and was never seen again. He was a truly remarkable man who left his mark on every situation he was part of. Preaching in Madras in 1918, he said,

Jesus presence always brought astonishing peace to me, no matter how bad the situation I was in. Whenever I was in prison, he was always there for me. He transformed the jail into a heaven and the burdens became blessings. There are many Christians who do not feel his glorious presence as something real. Because of them, Jesus only occurs in their minds and not in their hearts. Only when someone surrenders their heart to Jesus can we find Him.

Sadhu Sundar Singh was a most remarkable man of the twentieth century. As he so manifestly followed the footsteps of Jesus, may he be an inspiration to us. 





### From the Vicar

(as from July 23rd 10.00 a.m.)



Dear Friends,

Writing this in mid-June, our recent healing weekend at All Saints is fresh in my mind. From the Friday evening until the Sunday evening, we looked at the principles and practice of Christian healing, in a variety of ways and in a variety of places - ranging from sitting round in a circle in the church hall, to a cheese and wine party in somebody's home, to our culminating healing service in the church on the Sunday evening.

It is a topic that raises various reactions, from scepticism to unbridled enthusiasm, with a lot of in-between of uncertainty, questioning and nervousness. Roy Lawrence, who with his wife Eira, led the weekend, started by saying, "Christian healing is not something weird". The more we considered it as the weekend unfolded, the more such fears were dispelled. Christian healing (seeking healing for broken lives, bodies and souls, however that may be necessary, in the name of Jesus) as opposed to faith healing (where the nature and object of the faith may be rather different) is really the church, the body of Christ, carrying out today what He did in the flesh two thousand years ago. It is hard to turn to a page in the gospels that does not refer to Jesus undertaking healing. Christian healing is simply Christians seeking to be open to Jesus to be a channel of that same healing today.

Roy Lawrence, somebody with much experience in healing, recounted the following conversation with a G.P. Roy: "I suppose when I pray for people, I see a third helped straight away, a third over a period of time and a third for whom there is no

apparent difference". G.P.: "Yes, I suppose it's about the same in my surgery".

Jesus came because God so loved the world. He wants our good in every way and is the author of goodness, so seeking and expecting healing is well within that.

Healing prayer is offered at most services at All Saints. I hope that our expectation and faith in this area will grow and that indeed, readers who are not in the habit of worship, will feel free to come on Sunday to seek healing.

I hope that these summer months will be a time of genuine refreshment and re-creation to you all and that many of us can discover anew the healing power and presence of Jesus in the midst of our normal lives.




On the week-end 22nd – 24th September, we at All Saints are very privileged to have Baroness Cox spending time with us.



### A funny thing happened on the way to . . . . by Ann O. Domini

#### **ECHUCA**

Australian coach drivers not only efficiently and carefully drive, they are also very entertaining guides. There is a microphone fixed in front of them and they give a running commentary when approaching something of interest. Our driver, Keith, said he would stop at Elmore for the passengers to get some lunch. Elmore turned out to be a one-horse town where the shops all closed for half-day closing, so it was Hobson's choice, Chinese sandwiches or go hungry. Everybody said the Chinese Spring Rolls were good so I bought two and found a seat by a fountain and the facilities and sat down to enjoy them. Big mystery. What was inside those spring rolls? Something not familiar to my palate... So I buried them whilst no-one was watching. I wonder if the gum tree grew there afterwards.

The State of Victoria and also South Australia are great fruit growing regions. All along the route one could see the drying racks where the grapes are hung up to dry in the sun to become currants, raisins or sultanas. Orange, lemon and grapefruit groves stretch right to the horizon and the air is heavy with the perfume from their blossoms.

At 5.00 p.m. we got to Echuca. Unfortunately the motel where coach parties usually stayed the night was full so on we went to Moama where we found accomodation at the Barham Bridge Motel. All the apartments faced the Murray River with woodland on the opposite

bank. Peaceful and picturesque. Just time for a dip in the pool before going to the Club for dinner. By now I was 'best friends' with most of the party. Walking back along the road to the motel, someone posed the question, 'Where is the Southern Cross' the group of stars featured on the Australian flag. Everybody knew what it should look like but no-one knew whether they were big stars or small ones, nor whereabouts in the sky we should look. We wasted a lot of time gazing heavenwards and walking backwards so that by the time we reached the motel, the steward was doing his rounds, collecting breakfast order cards from door-knobs and seeing that all was well and everybody home before he shut the main gate. We asked him whereabouts was the Southern Cross. 'Oh!', he said. 'You'll have to hang around until about 2.30 a.m. The Cross doesn't rise above the horizon until then and any-old-how, you won't see it from here because of the trees'. Well that was that so off we went to our beds, tired but happy and well fed.

It only registered with me whilst writing this account that we were too far south for the Southern Cross to be high in the sky. It compared with looking for a sight of the North Pole Star whilst walking along Sheffield Moor on Midsummer night. What a load of crackpots to be let loose in the out back.

The knock on my unit door awakened me and there was my breakfast outside the door, as ordered. I got back into bed to eat it before showering and dressing. Then I went to look for the bus to Echuca.

#### GIFT - AID

The Government proposals affecting Tax Rebates to charities have meant a great deal of work for all who are concerned with the administration of the process. In simple terms "Covenants" are now a thing of the past, although all existing covenants are valid for the duration of their lives. The compensating factor is that the lower limit for "Gift Aid" has been abolished. This means that tax can be recovered from the Inland Revenue for any amount that may be given to the charity by a tax-payer. To enable this to happen, there are two important steps. Firstly, the donor to the charity must complete a Form of Declaration. This is quite a simple form and is now available to anyone willing to complete it. Secondly, the charity has to keep a trail through their books to be able to demonstrate that any particular donation has been paid by a tax-payer. To achieve the second step, everyone who has hitherto given to the church by covenant (either through envelopes or bankers order) is being asked to sign a Form of Declaration. (This is in hand now). Any other tax-payers are also invited to complete a form so that the church can obtain the benefit of tax rebate

There are also some new envelopes available at the back of the church for tax payers who may wish to make occasional donations. This might apply if and when there are special appeals for emergencies or other good causes. It also applies if it is required to make a special donation to ordinary church funds. It is worth emphasising that strict confidentiality will continue to be observed. The new envelopes will only be opened by the Treasurer and so, even though your name is on the outside, no other person, apart from the Treasurer and the Gift Secretary, will know how much any particular person has given. Are you confused? I will be happy to talk anyone through the implications of all this. Just contact me if you wish.

#### THE SHEFFIELD PRAYER SYMPHONY

Together in Prayer - a new initiative for Sheffield

This initiative is based on the belief that God is calling His people in Sheffield to join in fervent and concentrated prayer for the city and that particular blessing ensues when God's people express unity in prayer. The Prayer Symphony idea is based on the "Prayer Concert" initiative which sprung up during the mid 18th century revival in Scotland. Some believe that we are still experiencing the blessings and fruit of that prayer today.

Jonathan Edwards described six elements to the idea.

- ⇒ Duty The call to do what needs to be done to achieve the required end (spiritual revival)
- ⇒ Priority Seek the Lord above everything else
- ⇒ Harmony A coming together of God's people
- ⇒ Urgency
- ⇒ Fruit Pleasing to God (John 15: 8) Christians in Sheffield are encouraged to make a commitment to pray for the city during the six months -1st July to 31st Dec. 2000 - during the hours of 7.00 – 9.00 p.m. on **Saturdays** and 7.00 – 9.00 a.m. on **Sundays** This would be for either the whole or part of those periods, either together with other Christians or individually. Prayers could be focused on specific areas of the city and information will sent to those taking part. Prayer Symphony members may take opportunities to gather together occasionally for prayer and teaching. Towards the end of the initial six month period we will seek God's will for the future. #### SAINTS FOR JULY

William Wilberforce was a Yorkshireman. He was born in Hull in 1759. His father died eight years later which resulted in him moving to live with his aunt and uncle. They were enthusiastic members of the burgeoning Methodist movement and sought to give him an upbringing influenced by Biblical principles. A family friend was John Newton (author of *Amazing Grace*). His mother was not happy with this and eventually brought him back home before sending him to Cambridge at the age of seventeen. He remained a thoughtful, if very witty young man during his career there, despite the overall morally lax atmosphere. He made one very significant friendship in the person of William Pitt, who later was to become Britain's youngest ever Prime Minister.

William entered politics as well, and in an era when elections were very different from today became the Tory member for Hull in 1780. Four years later he embarked on a continental tour, which was to prove life-changing. During the tour, he read Rise and Progress of Religion in the Soul by Philip Doddridge. The book and the discussions he had with travelling companion Isaac Milner, had a profound effect, brought him to a genuine and heart-felt faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and a deep appreciation of what He had done on the cross. In 1797 Wilberforce himself wrote a book that was a best-seller and one that influenced many in his day. It was an attack on the nominal and superficial Christianity prevalent in the Anglican church of the time.

In A practical view of the prevailing religious system of professed Christians, he wrote, "Their views of Christianity have been so cursory and superficial that they have little more than perceived those exterior circumstances which distinguish it from other forms of religion". Further on he commented on the common understanding of Christian principles and doctrines that, "... of the consequences, relations and practical uses of these principles, they have few ideas ... or none at all".

As a man of real faith, passionate social conscience and yet disappointed with the prevailing atmosphere in the Anglican Church as a whole, he was drawn to the growing evangelical wing of like-minded people. A group centred south of London, known as the Clapham Sect, sought to maintain Biblical principles in church and public life. William joined. His espousal of the anti-slavery cause was no easy journey. He was influenced by his child-hood hero. John Newton, himself an ex-slaver, as well as one Sir Charles Middleton, one of only two other evangelical Christian M.P.'s. Many Tories opposed Wilberforce's stance and thus when he presented his first formal bill to Parliament in 1791 to abolish the trade, it was defeated. In this year he was the recipient of the last letter written by John Wesley, encouraging him in the fight. "Unless God has raised you up for this very thing you will be worn out by the opposition of men and devils. But if God be for you, who can be against you? Are all of them together stronger than God? O be not weary in well-doing". Such encouragement was of great importance to William as he battled failing health as well as entrenched opposition in his fight. He persisted and won partial victory in 1807 when a bill to abolish the overseas trade was passed. Significant in this had been the support of Wilberforce's old friend, William Pitt, benearly the whole House stood and cheered Wilberforce who

been the support of Wilberforce's old friend, William Pitt, behind the scenes. When this act was passed, it is reported that nearly the whole House stood and cheered Wilberforce who remained seated, head bowed, tears streaming down his face. From that day, he became the moral leader of the western world.


The institution of slavery, however, remained legal. It was not until 1833 that the existence of slavery in any land under British rule was out-lawed. William had died a month before the final passage of the bill. As he lay on his death-bed, friends rushed to him with the news of the victory in the first and all-important vote. He died, knowing the fight had been won.

Other passions for William included support for missionary work in India, itinerant evangelism at home, encouragement of the

British and Foreign Bible Society which he helped to found in 1804 and improvements in such matters as child-labour and prison conditions.

Despite a life-time's fight which involved tackling vested interests and encountering bitter and vicious opposition, he never lost his charm and humour. He also managed to fulfil the law of Christ and love his enemies, though never weakening in his opposition to their support of slavery.

He is remembered in the Church's calendar on 29th July. His love of Christ led him to love people and to fight selflessly for those who were viciously oppressed, whilst at the same time, putting as much heart and commitment into the spread of the gospel. He is a man to inspire in any age and one to whom we in the twenty-first century still owe a tangible debt of gratitude.







## HAVING A CHILD BAPTISED AT ALL SAINTS

One of the things I have enjoyed, since our arrival here eighteen months ago, is meeting the families who come to enquire about christening or baptism. Being involved with families at what is usually a very special time in their life is a great privilege.

Baptism is, of course, a serious as well as a joyful matter. Its roots are right back in the New Testament and even earlier.
