



Dear Friends,

No, it did not happen in Totley but in many areas of the world, Christian believers face the threat of that and worse. Yet incredibly, it is in those countries that the church is mushrooming


On the week-end 22nd – 24th September, we at All Saints are very privileged to have Baroness Cox spending time with us.





HAVE YOU EVER WONDERED WHAT HAPPENS AT THE MEETING AFTER THE LIAISON LUNCH?

Or perhaps you didn't realise there was a liaison lunch!

The latest meeting provided information which I feel may be of as much interest to you as it was to me. Information about the Leonard Cheshire Services at Mickley Hall, Sheffield.

Mickley Hall was an orphanage until The Leonard Cheshire Trust took the building over to provide a home for disabled people, 27 years ago.

It is a registered nursing home where residents with severe physical disabilities live as independently as possible supported by caring staff and enabled by having a range of special aids and equipment.

Residents are usually within the age range 18 – 65 and often stay there for rest of their lives.

Most of the residents have MS and others have cerebal palsy, Parkinson's disease or have suffered a stroke. There are 37 residents and three rooms reserved for

respite care. Respite care is valuable to disabled people and their carers.

Five disabled people living in the vicinity are offered day care for up to three days each week, enabling them to enjoy leisure facilities and trips out to local amenities. Residents have an active involvement in the running of their home and have a bedsitting room of their own. There is a communal sitting room and a chef provides special diets for those who need them.

Residents enjoy cookery, crafts, painting and computers. The activities organiser aims to meet everyone's

interests.

There is a fundraiser who recently has accessed funding from Trusts to provide a new porch with automatic doors and a new minibus. The proceeds from the Summer Fayre paid for half of the cost of small vehicle to be used when taking one person out, for example, to the hospital.

The home has recently been redecorated and the garden has been renovated.

The fundraiser works hard to raise funds for the very expensive equipment needed to support the residents and is helped by friends and supporters from the local area by organising fetes, raffles, sponsored events, and car boot sales.

Another aspect of support is the Home Care Service which began in 1995 and is based at Mickley Hall. The service at present supports clients in their own homes. Their ages range between 12 and 103 years and they receive between one and 24 hour support. Social Service, GP's and hospitals refer clients for this service. About 130 clients are aided by 160 carers who support families as well as the client. Facilities vary in the homes of the clients and situations are often quite different to those in Mickley Hall where aids and equipment are more readily available.



Volunteers are welcome as are donations.

P.C.C. Update

The main topic for discussion at the July meeting of the P.C.C. was the introduction of Common Worship. This is a series of new services which will replace those in The Alternative Service Book 1980 (ASB). The Book of Common Prayer (BCP) is authorised permanently and so can continue to be used but the ASB was only authorised for a limited period and this period ends at the end of this year. The P.C.C. agreed to start using Common Worship on Advent Sunday as this is the beginning of the church year.

The main difference to the ASB is that there is more variety and choice. In looking at the service of Holy Communion, it was agreed to use 3 of the 8 Eucharistic prayers to start with - one of which is very similar to that used at present in the ASB, and two others. This does not rule out use of any of the other 5 from time to time but it was felt important not to have too much change all at once! "User friendly" service cards will be produced with alternative words and responses printed to make the service easy to follow.

As the 11.00 a.m. service is usually Holy Communion, the changes will be felt then. The informal nature of the 9.30 a.m. service will remain as at present with the Family Communion once a month also taking the form of Common Worship.

Other items for discussion this month included taking a new look at the rotas on Sundays, the Alpha supper planned for 28th September with the Alpha course starting a week later and a summary from the Treasurer on the current state of our finances. Jane Lawry

A funny thing happened on the way to ECHUCA by Ann O. Domini

In the late nineteenth century, the Port of Echuca on the Murray river was the farthest point inland that could be reached by sea-going vessels. River paddle steamers brought the bales of fleeces from the sheep stations

or ste Er Yo ind

up country to Echuca to be laden onto sailing ships and later, steamboats, to be brought to England to be woven into cloth in Yorkshire and also for the carpet industry.

After inspecting the souvenir shops and browsing round the museum, I made my way along to the wharf which, along with the river boats and genuine old buildings (including the prison) had been carefully restored to

been carefully restored to reproduce the atmosphere of more than 100 years ago when Echuca was the centre of the river-boat trade. This was the place where the TV series "All the Rivers Run" was filmed. I stood on the original landing stage. One could see the sludge marks many feet up the stout wooden beams where flood waters had reached. Apparently Australian wood is very hard and doesn't rot. I admired the restored paddle steamers moored along-side and watched the river flowing, slow and deep and quiet between its eucalyptus tree lined banks. The water was intensely muddy and glided sluggishly along without either ripple or eddy. It made me feel so very Lonely and so very far from home. Then the words of Jesus Christ came to me when he said to his disciples

"Lo, I am with you always, even unto the ends of the earth". I was comforted and no longer lonely.

I then moved on to the restored railhead where, quietly

steaming, stood an old tank locomotive once used for hauling logs. Also in good working order was a steam driven saw mill. An enormous tree trunk which must have been at least 10 feet across was laid over a saw-



pit partially sawn through by a push-pull saw in it. Any gentleman who showed the slightest interest was invited to try his hand by joining another man and attempting to saw the log. One had to jump down into the sawpit whilst the other stood atop. There were no takers that day - all the men apparently were wearing their best suits.

The day was very hot, 30 degrees centigrade, and dry with it, so after a cuppa at a roadside stall, I decided to



get the bus back to Moama and the motel and have a swim in the pool. Next day I would ask the American party leader, whose name was Vance, if I could join them for the coach ride to

Mildura. I was getting cheeky at inviting myself along. Well, you get nowhere if you wait to be asked, do you?





It is said that after dropping into a city church unexpectedly and listening to the sermon, Dean Inge summoned the curate who had delivered it and asked how he composed his sermons.

The first part, the curate confessed, was entirely my own work: he wrote it out carefully the day before. But the second part was quite different, he left it humbly to the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. He waited for the Dean to comment.

The Dean approached the matter cautiously but firmly. "I hope you will not think me blasphemous, Mr. So-and so, but I far prefer your part!"

THE SAINT FOR AUGUST

Ignatius Loyola

Ignatius is actually remembered on the 31st July, so I hope readers will feel that it is not cheating too much to include him in this month's magazine. He was born in Loyola, in northern Spain, around the year 1491, the youngest son of a noble family. His early career was that of a soldier, receiving quite serious wounds in a battle with the French. During his long convalescence (both legs had been injured – he walked with a limp for the rest of his life) he read widely, on the life of Christ and of the saints, which resulted in him dedicating himself wholly to the Lord's service.

He was a most thorough man and so determined to prepare himself, for whatever this may mean, as fully as possible. In 1523 he went on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem and then spent the next decade in study, which ranged from learning Latin with the schoolboys of Barcelona, to acquiring a Master of Arts from the Sorbonne. During this time, he often engaged in evangelism amongst the ordinary people and came under suspicion from church authorities in Spain. This was not only because such direct spiritual challenge was unusual in itself at the time, but doubly so when coming from a layman.

In Paris, Ignatius gathered some like-minded men around him and they pledged themselves to be missionaries to the Moslems of Palestine. Ten of them collected in Venice in 1537, intending to travel there for that purpose, but found that the politics of the day made such a journey impossible. Instead, they offered themselves to Pope Paul III in any capacity he wished. The result of that was that they were all ordained to the priesthood and encouraged to form themselves into a religious order, choosing a rule of life which would include a vow to be at the Pope's disposal at any time anywhere. Thus in 1540, the Society of Jesus (to be known as the Jesuits) was born. In the

next 15 years, directed by Ignatius in Rome, it grew from 10 to 1000 members. He placed a high value on remaining in contact with other Jesuits. He is known to have written over 7000 letters in his life, most of them during his last 15 years. Jesuits were active in missionary work, especially in the newly-discovered lands of the Americas, they were active in education at a variety of levels and also sought to encourage loyalty to the Roman Catholic church in the turbulent era of the Reformation. Interestingly, at a time when persecution was practised from Catholic to Protestant and indeed in the opposite direction too. Ignatius never approved of aggression. He urged his brothers to seek to encourage the loyalty he was pledged to, "Without hard words or contempt for people's errors".

Perhaps his most lasting mark on the church has been his "Spiritual Exercises". He was above all, a man of prayer and wrote about a particular way of developing a personal prayer life in his book. Today, it is not uncommon for people to undertake an eight day Ignatian retreat, based on these exercises. Indeed, this writer was recently at a meeting, where a talk was given on the way different personalities are likely to mean that we relate best to different approaches to our spiritual life. Of the four types spoken of, one was termed "Ignatian". Ignatius died in Rome in 1556 and was canonised in the Roman Catholic Church in 1662. He was a man of absolute yet gracious commitment. He was man who put his personal relationship with the Lord as a first priority.

He was a man who knew that service of the Lord also involved

hard work and the skills of organising. In an age when the Reformation had permanently tranformed the religious map of Europe, he is perhaps seen as a defender of the Roman Catholic cause. He was that, but far, far more - and has left a rich legacy for all Christians today.

A new Vicar and a happy day!

For those who did not realise that, until Sunday 23rd July, David Rhodes was the Priest-in-Charge and not the vicar. the news of the institution of a NEW VICAR for Totley may have been a shock!

However, the truth is: Rev. David Rhodes is now the Vicar of Totley.

The church was full on July 23rd to see David receive a rather splendid, shiny key from the Arch-deacon of Sheffield, Ven. Richard Blackburn.

David did comment that it wasn't like the one he had been using to get into the church for the past 18 months but the symbolic gesture now shows his status! David was then 'allowed' to ring the church bell which he did with great gusto - ringing far more times than the years he has left before retirement.

The social occasion afterwards - the Bring and Share lunch was enjoyed by all - even the dish washers!







SAINTS FOR SEPTEMBER

September 26th sees the name Wilson Carlile appear in the Anglican calendar. You may have heard his name in connection with the college named after him in Cavendish Street (behind the old Glossop Road baths) in town. It is the training college for the Church Army. In February of this year, we enjoyed a weekend mission, led by members of the college, at All Saints. Wilson Carlile was born in Brixton in 1847. At the age of 13, he entered his grandfather's haberdashery business and soon used his ability to learn languages to good effect. He became fluent in French, German and Italian and traded abroad successfully in the family business. However, when a slump hit in 1873, the firm went bankrupt. Wilson, too, became seriously ill, compounding a life-long problem. It was at this time that he began to take the Christian faith seriously, resulting in his conversion in that year.

His life was now set in a completely different direction and he soon felt drawn to ordination. He went to the London College of Divinity in 1878 and was ordained in 1880. Leaving college, he joined the staff of St. Mary Abbots, in Kensington. The Church of England worked differently in those days, as he was one of 13 curates at the same church! His passion for sharing the faith, especially with those who had little or no contact with the church, was immediately obvious. In the early 1880's the American D.L. Moody and associate Ira Sankey conducted missions in this country, with great effect. Wilson acted as organist for Sankey. However, his heart was always for the working classes, whom he saw alienated from the church and so in 1882, he resigned his curacy to found the Church Army. The Salvation Army had been established in 1878 and so he drew some inspiration from that, in his vision.

The Church Army was to be an outreach and service arm of the Anglican Church, with a particular concern for those in deprived areas. In the early years, social work for men and

women was established, as well as missions to prisons and work in parishes. In 1921, the first "Mission Sisters" were admitted, the first Church Army housing project was established in 1924 and the first overseas work (in the USA) established three years later.

Today, there are in excess of 300 officers (the men are known as Captains and the women as Sisters) in this country and branches in many overseas countries. The somewhat severe military uniform of a previous generation has given way to sweatshirts and blazer and tie. The link with Sheffield was established in 1992 when the training college moved from Blackheath to the purpose-built premises on Cavendish Street. Carlile died on September 26th, 1942, having remained active in the administration of the Army almost up to his death. There have been a number of General Secretaries since then (the current one is Philip Johanson), including Wilson's grandson, Edward, from 1949 to 1960. Today, the headquarters are in Blackheath, in a centre opened by the Queen Mother in 1980. Carlile was a man of vision, courage, compassion and had a real desire to serve. His legacy is a body of men and women who are often prepared to go to places others avoid and are committed to sharing the good news about Jesus in imaginative and relevant ways wherever they have opportunity. Not bad for a silk salesman who a hundred and twenty years ago was looking with dismay at the bankruptcy of his cherished business.

My grandson was saying his prayers while I stood by. He was speaking so quietly, I could hardly hear him.

I said, "Do speak up, I can't hear you". Solemnly he replied, "But I wasn't talking to you Granny".



CHURCH NEWS AND NOTES

From the Daily Mail August 4th 1900 (just over a hundred years ago !)

Why do not men go to church? This old, old question has once again come up and much the same reasons are again given for there being in most town congregations only one to ten or even twenty women. But now a new reason appears in the statement of a parish clergyman - that men will come to church if there is a special service for men alone; and what is more, he claims to have proved it by experience.

As to the working men, so conspicuous by their absence, the testimony of a working man is worth having: and he puts the absence of his class from church down to want of pastoral visitation in the parish, lack of cordiality of welcome to the few who find their way into the church, the difficult musical services, rendering it impossible for the congregation to join, the rapidity and indistinctness with which the prayers are run off and the difficulty the uneducated have in following many preachers. But he also has blame for the working man himself and considers that intemperance, the enormous development of gambling and the new and quenchless taste for amusement, all combine to keep man from church.

OATY APPLE CRUNCH

2 lbs. Cooking apples

2 oz. Caster sugar

4 oz. Margarine

8 oz. Porridge oats

1 tsp. Ground ginger

Peel and core the apples and cut them into thick slices. Arrange them in an ovenproof dish, sprinkling them with sugar. Melt the margarine in a saucepan and stir in the oats and ground ginger. Spread this mixture over the apples and bake the pudding in a cool oven (300 degrees F, 150 degrees C or Gas Mark 2) for about 40 minutes.

From the Vicar



Dear Friends,

"Seasons of mists and mellow fruitfulness Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun"

Keats' words have always summed up for me the feeling of autumn as summer gives way to the prospect of winter. A car ride in New England, years ago, remains an abiding memory. Wooden houses, carpets of yellow and the intense red still on the trees. A photo, I am pleased with recently, is one of the tree in the corner of Dore church yard, resplendent in its autumnal plumage. Autumn colours don't last long, the central heating put on, winter coats are pressed into commission and we dig out the snow shovel from the garage.

Perhaps you have a favourite season. For some there may be a dread of approaching winter, wondering how we will cope or whether our health will hold up. Some of us definitely feel more lively when the days are longer, while some will enjoy the variety and rhythm that the seasons bring.

The natural seasons are a good reminder to us that there are spiritual seasons too. For thirty years, Jesus was simply a member of his family household - awaiting the time of public ministry. For three years He was incredibly active. That ministry started with a six week period of testing in the desert. It culminated in a week of public acclaim and ultimate humiliation. At times in His ministry, He was besieged by adoring crowds. After He drove demons out of a man into a pig, they begged Him to leave the district. The apostle Paul's ministry began with three years of solitary preparation. At times in His ministry He was on the move, hounded by enemies. At other times he spent two or more years patiently teaching and building.

Read the Psalms and all human life is there. Exultant praise, feelings of anger, hatred and utter abandonment by God. There are sublime statements of trust. There are crude curses uttered against enemies.

Yes, there are seasons in the spiritual life. There are fruitful times, when God may feel close and real, and barren times when everything in life seems to go against you. No matter how hard you pray, nothing changes and it's all an uphill struggle. There are times of gradual dawning and awakening to a new dimension of God's love and there may be times of anger, frustration and rejection.

There are seasons. It's to be expected and just as in the natural seasons, much is happening in an unseen way that we will be grateful for in the future, so in the spiritual rhythm of life, God may well be doing much hidden work which will bear fruit in the future. Such seasons are to be entered into and reflected on rather than resisted or avoided.

So, as one season gives way to another naturally, why not spend some time reflecting on your own experience of God in this light and asking Him to give insight into the season you are in at the moment? His promise always to be with the believer is always true. The way we can expect to experience that will vary very widely.




Current Issues of Refugees & Asylum Seekers in Sheffield Speaker Adam Yusuf

Next morning we went down to the river as a group and boarded the 'Rochester', a restored paddle boat. It was really peaceful moving slowly down the river. A welcome change from the rush and noise of the coach. There were a lot of Australians on board and they created a marvellous holiday atmosphere whilst the boat glided along for about two hours. The woodland scenery on either bank was enthralling but in places there were areas of dead trees standing in stagnant water. When I asked the reason, thinking that the river may have overflowed its banks, I was told that it was the outcome of farmers settling the land, sinking bore holes for water for their animals and crops. The water table was not sweet water but salty and had poisoned the land.

The tickets for the boat trip included entrance to a leisure park where we eventually disembarked. Here there were many different kinds of animals and birds, peculiar to South Australia including some sad looking kangaroos and emus. Included in the fare was a 'barbie' luncheon. An enormous choice of meat, fish, chicken, salads and fruit. Oh! How quickly the time flies when one is happy. Too soon it was time to return to the river and the 'Rochester' for another two hour cruise to Mildura.

Adelaide

Next day we left for the journey to Adelaide. Whilst at the Settlers Hotel in Melbourne, I had 'phoned the Old Settlers Hotel in Adelaide and booked a room for a week. Unfortunately, when I arrived the room had been double

booked as it was Gold Cup Day when everybody from miles around arrives in Adelaide for the annual motor race round the streets in the city centre. Apparently every available bed gets booked on a first come first served basis. The hotel manager couldn't have been more apologetic. He invited me to lunch the next day, which was a Sunday, free of charge. He also arranged for a taxi to take me to a motel at Barossa Valley later that day after the racing was finished. So until it was time for the taxi, I went into the city to see the racing. The streets were so crowded with people and traffic, it was impossible to see much but more by accident than design, I found myself in the market place.

Christmas was not far away and the stalls were piled high with the most wonderful displays of fruit and vegetables. Everywhere was decorated for the season and the department stores surrounding the market were full of Christmas goods. Yet it did not feel like Christmas to me. The sun was high in the sky. The temperature was around the 35 degrees centigrade. Ladies and girls were wearing sleeveless dresses and men were bare to the waist. In the evening, after an exhausting afternoon in Adelaide, I went back to the Old Settlers, retrieved my suitcase and had a coffee whilst I waited for the taxi to Barossa.







A weekend with Baroness Caroline Cox

All of us, who were privileged to spend time during the sessions that Caroline led over the weekend, have felt the vibrant presence of an ordinary woman filled with an extraordinary passion for justice and human rights throughout the world. Christian Solidarity Worldwide is a charity that seeks to enter countries that have had borders closed to the regular aid charities, and by photographs and tape-recordings, return with evidence of the massacre, torture and slavery that is daily life for thousands of Christians in many parts of the world. She has spent nights in air-raid shelters in homes in the centre of bombing and met the survivors of massacres. Such people invariably request prayer before physical help; they also ask her to tell the world about them so they are not forgotten. She has purchased slaves in the Sudan at £40 a head (for women and children, the men having been killed) to expose the large-scale slave trade which is now exporting slaves to Europe. She is not afraid to speak out and ask questions in the House of Lords that can expose the hypocrisy of our representatives who profess to support human rights, but nevertheless will meet ambassadors and senior people from countries where Christians

What can we do?

Perhaps you could write a personal letter once a month to a country that has imprisoned a specific Christian Leader. (I have C.S.W. samples and Liz and Neil Hayden have offered to be C. S.W. church representatives) Perhaps you could send a regular donation to support an orphanage in Russia of other project. (If each Care and Share member put aside £1 a month, it would make a difference). But above all we should PRAY for the continued protection of Caroline and her team in their work and for the suffering people in places like Nogorno-Karabakh, the Sudan and Indonesia that are imploring us not to forget them.

A SAINT FOR OCTOBER

"A tall figure, slightly bent, with black hair, a thin hooked nose and an emaciated face." So wrote the chronicler Bede Paulinus, the first archbishop of York who is remembered on 10th October.

He was originally sent from Italy by the Pope in 601 to reinforce the work begun by Augustine. For the next twenty years, he worked in the south of the country, seeking to strengthen the emerging church there. As is often the case however, politics was to play a part in future events. In 625 Ethelberga, sister of the King of Kent travelled north to marry Edwin, King of Northumbria. A political link was being forged, but with this, a significant opportunity for the gospel opened up. Paulinus was to travel north, as her chaplain. He was consecrated bishop and then set out on what would have been a very unpredictable iourney.

On arrival in York, he found that Edwin was not a believer, but was very sympathetic. He encouraged Paulinus in his attempts to spread the gospel, which he did in a very energetic manner. Many became believers very quickly, including Edwin, who was baptised (with many of his nobles) on Easter eve 627 at York, in a wooden church especially constructed for the occasion

For the next seven years, Paulinus travelled constantly within Northumbria, encompassing present-day Lincolnshire, Notting-hamshire and Yorkshire. Baptisms in local streams were a frequent occurrence and a pagan kingdom was seeing a wide-spread planting of churches.

In 637, to honour his work, he was created archbishop of York by the Pope. Such had been the success of his efforts that he had already begun the first building of a stone church in the city. Emissaries were sent from Rome with the letter and special robes (pallium) instituting Paulinus. However, before they arrived, politics again took a hand. Edwin was killed in the battle of Hatfield Chase by the Mercian and Welsh forces. Faithful to Ethelberga, who had first taken him north, Paulinus

set out by sea with her and her children, to return them to Kent for their own safety. Here he remained, serving as Bishop of Rochester, until he died in 644.

Edwin's death was a blow to Northumbria. His was a reign of peace such that "a woman could carry her new-born baby across the island from sea to sea and suffer no harm.! (Bede) This peace, of course, enabled Paulinus to conduct his travels equally safely.

The church he had established fell apart without his leadership and the encouragement of Edwin, although James the Deacon tried to hold things together. Bede refers to the year 634 as "the disastrous year." Politics again, however, was to intervene. Edwin's nephew. who had been educated by monks on lona. was victorious in battle over Edwin's conqueror. Cadwallon. and so Oswald, a committed Christian became King of Northumbria. His first act was to send for monks from long to reverse the impact of the "disastrous year." Aidan was to come and establish himself at Lindisfarne. but that is another story! Paulinus is remembered as the first archbishop of York and an apostle to the north. In a very different world he displayed qualities of faith and faithfulness that we are in just as much need of today. He was also able to bring the gospel to a pagan land and had the joy of seeing many converted. In our post-Christian world, would not the ancient kingdom of Northumbria





From the Vicar



Dear Friends

I was once shown a map of the world in which countries with a fair degree of freedom were shaded green and those where that was not true were shaded red. It was very sobering indeed. There was not much red. Guy Fawkes and his friends, or course, feared an erosion of freedom. As I write this in mid October, I do so on the day that James Mawdsley was released from a Burmese prison.

Some countries make the headlines and others do so far less regularly. Burma is one of those. It is ruled by a small minority (who renamed the country Mianmar, in the face of popular disapproval), who wield power with ruthless brutality. Certain ethnic minorities are targeted for persecution and even destruction. One of these are the Keren people. James is a young Englishman of great courage who was prepared to accept imprisonment in order to bring the plight of these people before the world. One has to say that he has succeeded, but whether this will lead to any change in their conditions remains to be seen.

Here at home, huge freedom is something we are apt to take for granted. Guy Fawkes and his colleagues were tortured and executed for their pains. But then they did try and blow up the government of the day! Part of the legacy of more turbulent times in our history is a culture where contrary opinions, wide varieties of Religious worship, competing political opinions and the right to hold and publicise these views is basic.

We do well to appreciate and treasure this and us it positively. One remarkable fact of recent years is that in many of the green coloured countries, Christian churches have appeared to shrink, while in many of the red ones, they have grown immensely. When external freedom, by faith in Christ. Here we have the externals, but what about the internals? Here we have huge openness, do we use it to pursue the best or run with the crowd?

I have huge admiration for men such as James Mawd-sley. They challenge me about how easily I settle for a comfortable life in a free and affluent land. Is there a cause I need to take to heart as he has done? Jesus said I will only find my life when I lose it. No one is likely to take it from me in this country, but the challenge to lose it, to find it, remains.

Enjoy the fireworks



SAINTS FOR NOVEMBER

In the ASB his name appears on the 13th November whilst in the American church he is remembered on the day before. His name is Charles Simeon, who spent most of his life as the vicar of one Cambridge church. He was appointed to Holy Trinity in 1783 and remained its vicar until his death in 1836. On his arrival, he was universally vilified and vet when he died, he was one of the most respected men of his generation. The historian Lord Macaulay was of the opinion that he had more influence on the church of his day than any primate. He was born in Reading in 1759 and was educated at Eton and Cambridge, becoming a fellow of Kings College in 1782. He never married and so lived in rooms in the college until he died. The turning point in his life was the experience he had of the love of God, when preparing to receive Holy Communion, an obligation placed on him (as was the norm in that era) when he first became a student in Cambridge.

His appointment to Holy Trinity was unpopular on two counts. One (and probably the less unpopular) was that he was there because his father and the Bishop of Ely were good friends. The second was the nature of his message.

The eighteenth century had been an era of deism in the Church of England. God was depicted as entirely remote and impersonal. Generally the approach to worship reflected that. Whilst Simeon's preaching was always entirely thorough and well thought out, it was also always pointing people to a personal saviour, in Jesus, who rescued sinners by His grace. The impact of his preaching drew many hearers, but it was greeted with scorn by his parishioners. In his early years, bricks were often thrown through windows during his services. People locked their pews to prevent people hearing him and church wardens refused to unlock the church doors when he planned to hold evening services (an innovation at the time). He was pointedly ignored in the streets and insulted frequently in conversation and print. He had to endure this type of oppo-

sition for the first seven or eight years of his ministry. Most men would have wilted. Simeon won over these reluctant parishioners by unswerving love and generosity of spirit. Inside his pulpit, where only he could see it, were the words from John 12: 21. "Sir. we would see Jesus". It was his motto and quiding principle in public and private life. It was his reminder that people needed not to hear an eloquent preacher. but meet the One he preached about. He aimed always to. "humble the sinner. exalt the Saviour promote holiness". Opposition turned over the years to immense love and respect. He was a man of great personal discipline and independence of mind. His devotional habits were strict and regular. He rose at 4.00 a.m. for four hours of personal prayer, before undertaking daily liturgical worship (to which he was equally devoted). His conviction was that the inspired scriptures spoke about Jesus and his task was to illuminate that. Between 1819 and 1828. he wrote his "Horae Homileticae" (Homiletic Offices) seventeen volumes in which he annotated the entire Bible for preaching material.

His influence became far wider than Cambridge itself. Not only did many very able men come to the city as students and came under his influence, but people were drawn to travel considerable distances to hear him and then reflect that in their own ministries - for the many who were to be ordained. It is estimated that as many as 1100 clergy were influenced by him in their formative years. His regular question and answer meetings on Friday evenings, for undergraduates, became famous. His answers were often short and to the point. To the man who asked the meaning of 1Tim 4:10 ("God is the saviour of all men, especially to those who believe"), he replied, "Of all potentially: of them that believe, effectually". It was then on to the next question.

He was the founding father of the Church Missionary Society in 1799. One of the better known missionaries, who served abroad after being influence by Charles, was Henry Martyn, who was to lose his life taking the gospel to Persia. He also

was the founder of the British and Foreign Bible Society (in 1804) and established the Simeon Trust in 1833.

The nineteenth century was a period in which the pattern of patronage in the church was changing. Societies were being established to collect the patronage of churches as widely as they could, to preserve a particular style of ministry. This was to be particularly true among Anglo-catholics and Evangelicals. Simeon bought from his own money, the patronage of 29 parishes. The trust continues today with a total of around 140 parishes in its care. New trustees now receive the same charge that Simeon gave his original men. It includes a solemn undertaking to, "... elect no one who is not a truly pious and devoted man, a man of God in deed and in truth, who with his piety combines solid judgement and a perfectly independent mind". Beginning his ministry at a time of great indifference, he was to see the spiritual climate of England change, during what is known as the Evangelical Awakening. Simeon was, of course, a contemporary of such giants as the Wesleys, George Whitfield and William Wilberforce. He died on 13th Nov. 1836. Today, in the twenty-first century, Christians too face attitudes of indifference not unlike those he faced. He is an inspiring man of faith, generosity of spirit and perseverance in the face of much potential discouragement. If one value of looking at the lives of those who have served Christ in previous ages is to inspire us today, we have plenty to go on in Charles Simeon.

P.C.C. Up-date


The P.C.C. meeting in September was mainly concerned with out Sunday services.

A funny thing happened on the way to . . .

THE BAROSSA VALLEY and back to ADELAIDE by Ann O. Domini

The motel in the Barossa Valley proved to be the best one at which I had stayed so far. The rooms were in blocks of two-storey buildings around a central garden area with a very large swimming pool. The water in the pool was much warmer than previously experienced. I really enjoyed a swim at the end of day's exploring and appreciated my evening meal all the more for it. The evening meal was a 'barbie' in the garden. There were many different kinds of meat and fish, vegetables, salads and fruit and one could have as much as one could eat.

The Barossa Valley is a wine producing area where a colony of German settlers were growing the same variety of grapes they had grown in the Moselle Valley in Germany to produce an Australian version of Moselle Wines. After a tour of the vinery (which stretched to the horizon) there was a visit to see the wine presses and vats, then down into the cellars where the wine is matured in enormous casks. The object of the visit was a wine-tasting bar to encourage visitors to buy. One could sample as many of the wines, brandies and liqueurs as one pleased. Believe me, many walked the wibbly wobbly walk back to the coach and had to be helped aboard accompanied by the clinking of bottles. After a week in this idyllic place it was time for me to return to Adelaide to meet up with the American Party at the railway station for the journey on Australia's famous

XPT train across the Nullabor Desert to Perth - three nights and two days and 2663 Kilometres away. There should have been only one stop at Cook before Kalgoorlie and Perth but a lorry crossing the track had collided with the train causing a seven hour delay whilst a heavy lifting vehicle could arrive to move the lorry before the train could proceed. Can you imagine it - all that wide open plain - train visible for miles - and it meets up with a lorry. We arrived in Perth just after 6.00 p.m. on Sunday, having left Adelaide at 5.20 p.m. on Thursday.

Perth is a wonderful city, situated on the River Swan with its banks beautifully laid out with public parks and gardens and its flocks of black swans. The harbour contains many racing yachts, privately owned by the rich people of Perth and also the same at Fremantle. I had already completed three months of my six months' journey but there were more Funny Things to happen between here and Rottnest Island, Alice Springs, Ayers Rock, Cairns, Darwin, the tropical rain forest, Green Island and finally Sydney and its amazingly beautiful Opera House and Bridge.

I hope you have enjoyed my tale as much as I have relived my journey in the telling.

Although Ann's journey went on, this is the final Episode in our magazine.

Thank you Ann for sharing with us what must be called a 'holiday of a lifetime'.





Postscipt

Readers might be interested in some of the following information emerging from the meetings about One World issues previewed in last month's magazine:

In the opinion of the UNA meeting's speaker (a highly educated former Somalian refugee now with British citizenship) the vast majority of asylum seekers in the UK do not have this country's Welfare System Benefits as their prime incentive and many end up giving far more than they get, if given the chance.

- In this respect, volunteers to teach English or numeracy or to provide general support for 11/2 hours per week would be welcomed by the Refugee Education and Employment Project on Carver Street (details on Church Hall Notice Board)
- An Oxfam Director speaking at the WDM Conference on Disasters reported a 30% DECLINE since 1994 in worldwide funding for Refugee Aid, incorporating wide discrepancies in Appeal

Responses nationally, e.g. 200 dollars per head for displaced Kosovan refugees, but only 14 dollars per head for victims in Sierra Leone.

- As an illustration of the way in which the vulnerability of people trapped in poor living conditions affects our perception of Natural Disasters, the 1991 cyclone in Bangladesh resulted in 150,000 deaths, while a hurricane of similar intensity in Florida, produced approximately 150 recorded injuries.
- On a more positive note, many Christian and other humanitarian organisations continue to do much good work, one such little known organisation being Red R. which recruits highly qualified Civil Engineers willing to work overseas at short notice.

In conclusion. Vivien and I would like to thank those who made donations of more than £100 to Christian Aid at our recent Ruby Anniversary event and those who subsequently purchased Christian Aid/Traidcraft cards and goods.

SATURDAY 4th AUGUST 1900

My memory is not what it was and for this reason I have been unable to return an interesting facsimile of the Daily Mail dated 4th August 1900 to the person who lent it to me! (Do you know who it was?) However, not only did I use the 'Church news and notes' in a previous edition of the magazine but I have been reading the rest of the pages (whilst w.w.w.w - waiting for the world wide web!) and I found them enlightening.


The day of rest, or **hol**iday, appears to have given idle hands something to do. The heading reads: Sunday, the Assassin's Day.

It lists attempts on the life of King Humbert of Italy in 1878, 1893 and 1897. The final attempt was successful in July 1900! All on Sundays.

Senor Canovas, the Spanish Premier, was murdered on a Sunday in 1897 and in the same year a bomb exploded near the carriage of President Faure in Paris - on a Sunday.

His predecessor, President Carnot, was stabbed in the heart on Sunday June 24th 1894 and Sunday March 13th 1881, saw the Emperor Alexander II of Russia almost blown to atoms by a bomb.

(it notes that the murder of the Empress of Austria and the attempt on the Prince of Wales were **not** carried out on a Sunday!)

He would like to train to be a pilot with the R.A.F. or alternatively he may become a lawyer - contrasting jobs you'll agree!

When asked if he finds it difficult to tell people he is Christian, his answer was in the affirmative which shows his honesty. When asked if he thought he would be a church goer when he leaves home, he said he wasn't sure. It was obvious that he had given this some thought to this question and I felt he could not say yes with any certainty, again showing his honesty.

Music is an important part of this young man's life. He plays two instruments, the piano and the trombone, and likes to listen to both rock and dance music. He has enjoyed being a part of the Summer School which has taken place in the Church Hall for young people from various schools and playing various instruments. The concert, which followed the week of tutorials, was performed at the Merlin Theatre and obviously enjoyed by David Hayden, the other performers and the audience!

Since visiting the Millennium Dome, he has burning desire to fly a Euro fighter Jet. His 'wish' is that all the world should have equality in their standard of living.



From the Vicar



Dear Friends

I recently ran into a clergy colleague, who, somewhat quiltily admitted that he hates Christmas. For him it conjures up images of endless carol services, a lot of extra calls on his time and thus collapsing exhausted in front of the turkey on Christmas day.

Our attitudes to Christmas may well vary. For some it is a genuine, if not the supreme, highlight in the year. We are surrounded by family. The pressure is off with a week or so off work and we love all the activities that the family enjoy at Christmas. For others, it is a period to be got through. Family gatherings maybe difficult. Christmas may have associations and memories that are distressing. It can feel as if all the world is bathed in a special glow, which somehow has escaped us.

What is for sure is that the commercial pressure associated with Christmas becomes more obvious every year. For a good number of shops it is inescapable. They will expect to make a very large percentage of their annual profits in the Christmas season. A poor Christmas can mean very serious trouble. It's easy to decry commercial exploitation of the season. But it is, surely, merely just one symptom of a culture that puts a very high value on material wealth and personal gratification.

Values are very important to us. We all have them and they govern our lives, often at a sub-conscious level. The things we really hold to be important will determine our reactions to people and situations and choices we make. Encountering again the Christmas events - of a miraculous birth, spontaneously marked in a variety of unique ways, of the coming of a fragile and weak infant human life, in an obscure oppressed middle eastern province within the mighty Roman Empire - events which in a host of ways have left their mark on the entire world, invite us to think again about our values.

In Philippians 2 verse 5, the apostle Paul exhorts us to have the same attitude that Jesus had. An attitude of love and compassion to the broken and needy, of clarity and directness when faced with hypocrisy and hardness of heart, and of utter dependence on and obedience to His Father. All this was wrapped up in the swaddling clothes of 2000 years

ago.

Jesus entered the world, wrapped in swaddling clothes. Thirty years later, when they went to look for His body, the grave clothes were empty in the tomb. However you may feel about Christmas, as that time comes again, you may want to look again at the marvel of it all. As you look at Him, let Him look at you. And let Him put you in tune with the kingdom He came to establish, one not of this world, but one He invites us all into. A kingdom where His presence and values hold sway. A kingdom sung about by angels when they proclaimed,

"peace on earth amongst men".



THE ADVENT OF COMMON WORSHIP

The season of ADVENT begins on 3rd December. It traditionally has been the beginning of the church's year and is the period that leads up to the celebration of the coming of Jesus at Christmas. Frequently it is a time when consideration of His second coming, as promised many times in the New Testament, is taken up. This year, ADVENT will also see the advent of a new range of forms of service in Anglican churches, to be known as Common Worship. These services are likely to be widely used for a good number of years and form the culmination of a process that began in 1955. In All Saints, we will use Common Worship at the communion service at 11.00 a.m. on 3rd December and then proceed to get used to this, and various of the other forms of service, in the ensuing weeks. In fact all churches in the country are meant to have made the change by January 1st, although in the Diocese of Sheffield, Bishop Jack has given until Easter to make the change. Our P.C.C., however, wanted to get on with the job, so the 3rd December it is in Totley!

The Book of Common Prayer remains unchanged as the basis of Anglican worship from which others like Common Worship have developed. We will continue to use this at 10.00 a.m. on a Wednesday. Some understanding of how that came about may help us to understand how things have developed since.

The year 1662 was at the end of a very turbulent period in history. It was also in an era where religion and politics were very closely bound up and had huge impact on each other. The previous century had seen the upheaval of the Reformation, across the church of Europe. From that had emerged the Protestant churches, spawned initially by Martin Luther's protest against certain practices in the Roman Catholic church. Protestant churches sought to base their faith directly in the teaching of the Bible and to cut through the spiritual control wielded by priests, which was reinforced by the use of Latin in all worship services. In England, this resulted in Tynedale translating

the Bible into English and Thomas Cramer producing services in English. His express purpose, stated in the introduction to his prayer book, was that it should be, "In such language and order as is most easy and plain for the understanding both of the readers and the hearers".

With various amendments, these services were used until the time of Oliver Cromwell (who governed England from 1648 to 1658). His coming to power created a situation where puritan thinking held sway. Puritan concern was for a greater independence of congregation, as against a rigorous conformity to a prescribed order and an independence from state control. As might be imagined, their desire for independence could be just as intolerant as those who sought to enforce conformity. It was also the case that politics and national security were seen to be bound up with church practice. Thus, when Charles II came to the throne in 1660, he was very concerned to enforce a uniformity of church practice because he saw this as one means of establishing his authority in the country. So laws were passed. The act of uniformity became law in 1662. All clergy were to use the reinstated Cranmer Prayer book exclusively and take an oath to loyalty to the sovereign. Anybody failing to do so was to be ejected from their living. Some 2000 were deprived. That is why, if visiting an older church which has a board listing the incumbents. You may often notice a change in that year. have a volume of "Sermons from the great Ejection" - final words from a number of leading men who were so deprived. Further such non-conformists were subjected to the "Five mile Act". They were prohibited from coming within five miles of any city, or the parish they had previously served, unless they had taken a non-resistance oath. Such men could be informed on by a third party to a J.P., who was then empowered to imprison them.

The B.C.P. was highly significant political and legal instrument in its day - much more than simply a preferred way of conducting worship. (In its early days in the 1530's, a popular uprising in part defending the old ways, against these new services,

Resulted in the execution of 200 rebels at York!) It did not remain entirely unquestioned in the following two centuries. An attempt at a revision was presented to parliament in 1928 but was rejected (although some parts did come into use informally in some churches). Then in 1955, the archbishops of Canterbury and York appointed a *Liturgical Commission* to undertake a full revision of the Prayer Book.

From that flowed various experimental forms of worship, used in the 60's and 70's (some people may remember booklets known as Series 1, 2 &3) which culminated in the publication of the Alternative Service Book (known as the ASB) in 1980. Initially this was to be in use for 10 years, while further revision was undertaken. In the event, this ten became twenty, so the ASB thus lapses at the end of the year. to be replaced by the revised version known as Common Worship. The BCP remains behind it. (Thus the Alternative, in the title of the ASB. indicates that it is an alternative to the BCP). However, just as the ASB became the most commonly used form of worship, so we can expect Common Worship to occupy a similar place. Much, of course, has changed since 1662. The political pressures are no longer there. The form of worship in Anglican Churches is headly a vital matter in sustaining our national unity in the way it was then. Concerns for right doctrine and practice were utterly fundamental in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. They are today, but in that our world is rather different, they will be expressed differently. This is particularly to be seen in the emphasis in some of the services and the form overall of them.

Whilst the doctrinal basis or our church remains the *Thirty-nine Articles* (written during the Reformation and finalised in 1571. All clergy when inducted to their posts have to assent to them still) the emphasis of teaching implicit in some of the services is quite different now from the first days of the *BCP*. Some of this has to do with a change in society and some with a change in the way the framers of the services view things. Two examples will illustrate this here:

The baptism service in the ASB and Common Worship has as its starting point, the baptism of an adult believer. The baptism of a child is derived from that. In the BCP the baptism service assumes the candidate will be a child and makes provision for those who have slipped through the net by providing for the baptism of Such as are of Riper Years. The introduction to the marriage service in the BCP makes the first purpose of marriage "the procreation of children" and thirdly "mutual society and help". Twentieth and twenty-first century services reverse this order.

In terms of form, again, two comments will suffice here. Firstly, the service-framers have sought to continue Cranmer's philosophy of writing language that is easy and plain to understand by most people, in the day and age in which we live. Language has changed a lot since Cranmer's day! (He was burnt at the stake for his Protestant beliefs by Queen Mary in 1556) Also, the need to enforce conformity in the seventeenth century sense has long since disappeared. The principle of choice and freedom within a framework was very clear in the ASB and has been taken further in Common Worship. Thus in the BCP there is one prayer to be used at the consecration of the bread and wine at Holy Communion. In the ASB there are four alternatives, plus another for use with the sick. In Common Worship there are 8 with possible variations within them. BCP and ASB were both published in one book. Common Worship is not really expected to appear in the same form in every church. Whilst you can buy the book (basically in two volumes) churches are encouraged to produce their own customised orders of service, using modern technology. Various helps to do this have been produced along with the new services. Whereas local variety was seen as a threat in 1662, today it is welcomed and encouraged, so that each church may respond to the unique demands it faces in its own area. So, on 3rd December, we will use our own customised cards for the first time. Of the 8 eucharistic prayers, we have initially decided to use 3, two at 11.00 and one at the monthly 9.30

Communion. The form of service will feel very familiar, although at points I think you will say, "That's different". The PCC have chosen to use the forms we have produced until Easter, so that we give them a fair run and then review the situation. Don't make comments straight away, but if in say February, you want to pass on an opinion (of approval or criticism) please do so (nicely!) to a member of the PCC who can then bring that to the appropriate meeting.

At the end of the day, forms of worship are there to enable and encourage us in our worship - not just the words we may say on particular occasions, but the worship of all our lives, that they may bring glory to Christ. As we get used to a few new words, may our lives too change, to become more like Jesus. And may those two things feed each other.



JOHN WYCLIFFE

In our day and age, political controversy is never far away, be it concerning the adoption of the euro, the level of pensions, the quality of the NHS or the peace process in Northern Ireland. It has always been the same. It is just the precise issues that vary from age to age. In the fourteenth century, controversy raged around issues such as the wealth of the church, the right of Rome to levy taxes on the English church and sleaze (corruption and accepting payment for jobs done by others) among the clergy. A thinker, writer and most outspoken activist in all this was one John Wycliffe.

He was born in North Yorkshire, but for most of his life was associated with Oxford. After education there, he became Master of Balliol College in 1361. His main interest was theology and especially the state of the contemporary church. There was always a tension between his academic, political

and pastoral concerns. He thus accepted a variety of church livings and eventually was appointed in 1374 to the rectory of Lutterworth in Leicestershire. From then on the Doctor of Divinity found himself drawn into the political arena, meeting and negotiating with papal representatives.

He also began to move from more abstract theological thought, to very biting application to, and criticism of, the church of his day. He drew a sharp distinction between the invisible church — the company of true believers — and the visible church, in that day and age, centred heavily on Rome. Much in the visible church distressed him. Clergy received pay for responsibilities they did not fulfil. The strong teaching that in communion the bread and wine literally became the flesh and blood of Jesus he criticised as idolatrous and unscriptural.

He could be proud and vitriolic in print. But even his enemies regarded him as honest and genuine. His desire for the church to embrace a faith that was genuinely taught in the Bible, led him to embark on the first translation of the Bible in English. God's word, rather than a corrupt church was to be authority and available to all in their own language. The Bible throughout Europe at the time was only known in Latin. Wycliffe's translation was to be the first attempt to put it in a vernacular tongue for over a thousand years. He was far too much of an academic to spread his ideas in ways that the common man would appreciate and so itinerant preachers began to travel the country. They were known as Lollards and although heavily attacked by the authorities, their influence continued in some measure until the time of the Reformation over a hundred years later.

Wycliffe's emphasis on the authority of the Bible and the individual's personal response of faith, made him unpopular with the church authorities of the day, but also anticipated the teaching of Luther and others at the time of the Reformation in the early sixteenth century. He has thus become known as, "The morning star of the Reformation".

The Bible was translated in 1382. He died from a stroke two

years later. Such was the official antagonism to him and the Lollard preachers, that in 1426, the Pope ordered that his bones be exhumed and burned. His legacy, however, could not be burned. He paved the way for English people to have God's word freely available to them in their own language. Modern-day translators of Versions, such as the New International Versions, are undertaking a similar task, in seeking to put the Bible in language that is readily understood by most people in our own day and age.

Wycliffe's name lives on. There is a college to train Anglican clergy, in Oxford, named after him and an international body named the Wycliffe Bible Translators. This missionary organisation has made it their aim to translate the Bible into every tongue spoken by man. This includes some spoken only by a tiny number, which perhaps has never even been reduced to writing. Workers devote decades to living with people groups, learning the language, reducing it to writing, translating the Bible and then teaching people to read it. Often this is a massively daunting task. To put the Bible into English for the first time in a thousand years, when you knew the church authorities disapproved, was no less daunting. John Wycliffe deserves to be remembered and appears on the Anglican Calendar on 31st December.





Community Care Stepping up on Spirituality

Hidden in Sheffield's matrix of bars, business's cafes and retail outlets there exists an office. And this is no ordinary office. It is a centre of care.



Contrarily, unlike most business's this is not a place devoted to earning more and more money and climbing the corporate ladder, but a body that is concerned with the Community. It is an office that puts all of its energies into finding new ways to help struggling individuals. The office is one that brings together the employees of Sheffield Churches Council for Community Care.



Now you will probably be wondering what SCCCC is all about. Well, SCCCC is a charity that runs a

number of schemes to help elderly. disabled and other vulnerable adults in Sheffield. The charity is made of a small number of very dedicated people who head-up schemes among the community. SCCCC has been up and running since 1966 and has seen many changes throughout the years. They have advanced from year to year, struggled with the changes in the health service, witnessed great changes in the city's hospitals. They have progressed from scrap paper to a whole computer network, and still they are providing a great service in Sheffield's communities.

SCCCC's schemes range from THE GOOD NEIGHBOURS SCHEME (providing neighbourly help such as occasional shopping, escorting elderly people to appointments and visiting on regular basis.) to HOSPITAL AFTERCARE + A+E OUT OF HOURS. (This includes support for patients being admitted or discharged from Hospital, collecting clothes or personal items, cashing benefits/pensions, etc.)

The schemes cover a wide range of tasks and take up a whole range of experience. Jobs that may be seen as trivial by the health service or general public are taken upon with great motivation and skill. Employee Ann Hammond, has been with the charity for 22 years and has covered work with a very wide spectrum of people. Her job covers a great variety of tasks and

se states that 'it is the lovely mix that makes it what it is.'

SCCCC has a very large database of volunteers networked throughout Sheffield and it is these volunteers that provide the key to supplying help and care to a large City.

Although the charity has been going for some years now, they are constantly looking for new and innovative ways to improve their service. Adam Bradley a recent employee fresh from University heads up the Volunteer recruitment side of the charity and has provided an emergetic and enthusiastic addition to the service. He recently has targeted Sheffield's large and ever increasing Student body for new volunteers.

Whilst most of the schemes cover practical areas of community care, a new scheme currently being set up by Jo Airey (another recent employee) aims to look at the needs of the whole person. SCCCC has acknowledged the need for physical care and provides a service, but now the charity is looking deeper to provide care for the emotional, social and spiritual needs of older people living in residential homes.

Project co-ordinator Jo Airey will work alongside residents and carers to explore the kind of support needed in terms of social activity, emotional support and both religious and non-religious spiritual engagement. This will provide a package that will help elderly residents identify and incorporate the resources available to them in the community, thus enabling residents to find their niche within society.

A recent conference held at Christ Church, Pitsmoor, saw members of the clergy and residential home staff, identifying more practical ways of improving links between homes and the church. There was great success and positive feeling in sharing simple, yet vital techniques to serve the whole person more thoroughly. Consequently, SCCCC plan to host more of these conferences in conjunction with residential homes around Sheffield in the future.

This year, we have been following a set of comments written by J. I. Packer. A thought provoking example (from 30th October) is below.

All are welcome at "Start the day with Jesus".

Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners - of whom I am the worst. But for that very reason I was shown mercy, so that in me, the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display his unlimited patience as an example for those who would believe on Him and receive eternal life.

1Timothy 1:1-16

Comment

Those who are growing in grace increase in the spirit of doxology and worship. They are less and less self-absorbed and self-concerned. There is a kind of balance effect that operates here. If your pride and conceit are rising, your concern about praising God will be diminishing. But if your passion for praise is growing, then your sense of your own dignity will decline. You will be following in the footsteps of Paul who, writing to the Corinthians about AD 57 or 58, spoke of himself as the 'least of the apostles'; who, writing to the Ephesians about AD 65 or 66, spoke of himself as the 'worst of sinners'. These phrases show that his estimate of himself was going down. As a result, he increasingly breaks out into doxology, which shows how passionately his heart longed to exalt and praise God.

Nicholas was a poor fourth-century bishop of Myra, a city in Asia Minor. He was very generous to the poor.

Once, Nicholas heard that a man, who had become very poor, intended to sell his three daughters to a life of slavery. He went out by night, threw a bag of gold into the window of the sleeping father and hurried away.

Later, the father fell at his feet and said, "Nicholas, you are my helper. You have delivered my soul and my daughters from Hell".

The Emperor Justinian built a church in his honour at Constantinople about the year 340 AD. The Russian Church honours him more than any other saint. He is the patron saint of Russia.

St. Nicholas is also honoured as the patron saint of children. The words 'Santa Claus' come from his name.

He died at Myra in 342 AD. He has always been venerated in the Latin and Greek Churches. His relics can be found in Bari, Italy.
