

Our Daily Bread

The recent celebration of the 60th anniversary of VE Day reminded me of two events about bread. During the war nearly all food except bread, flour and



vegetables was rationed, to ensure that everyone had a fair share of the limited food



available. There was only one kind of bread and one kind of flour, which were both rather grey but nutritious. There were some people who abused the system, but on the whole it worked well; there was certainly no worries about obesity! After VE Day things changed and before long, bread and flour were rationed for the first time, not because they were in short supply, but because the British government accepted responsibility for feeding the hundreds of thousands of hungry, homeless and displaced people in Europe, some of them until recently our 'enemies'. There were no demonstrations or protests against this restriction which was imposed upon us and which continued for about two years. We shared our daily bread with others.

It was only on 5th May that it was announced that the next day would be a holiday, so any celebrations had to be spontaneous, there was no time for elaborate preparations. The general impression was that nobody would have to work on VE Day. However, this impression was not shared by the authorities at the Royal Marine barracks at Eastney, so I found myself

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in a small party sent to collect food from the Royal



Navy Victualling Yard at Gosport. There we loaded up our 3-ton truck with various foodstuffs, including a very large number of loaves and set off on the return journey. Almost immediately we

were surrounded by a crowd of angry women. They had discovered that the bakers were also celebrating and there was no bread to be had, at a time when many people bought bread every day. They were not interested in any of the other food on the truck. It was bread they wanted.

Our corporal was faced with a dilemma, but being a resourceful man (as all corporals are) he entered into negotiations with the most vociferous housewife, while quietly telling each of us to bring a few loaves. He then dropped them into



the women's outstretched arms and ordered the driver to drive on quickly, while the women fought for the bread. I am not sure what the moral of this story is. On our arrival at

Eastney we were released from further duties and were free to join the celebrations. Since most of the Home Fleet was in Portsmouth at the time, the celebrations were prolonged and noisy.

They danced, they sang, they chanted and they prayed. On the night of 15-16 April, an amazing 25,000 people packed the pavements around Westminster and Whitehall in central London to call for 'trade justice not free trade'.

The all night event kicked off in Westminster
Abbey with performances from artists including
Beverley Knight, Jools Holland and Pete
Postlethwaite and finished with a dawn procession
past Downing Street.

This was the climax of the Global week of Action.
Millions of people from more than 80 countries
took part in a week's historic campaigning. The call
for trade justice was sounded around the world.

The days running up to the Global Week of Action for Trade Justice saw a complete U-turn in the government's position on trade. In a series of announcements, it made clear that poor countries should not be forced to adopt free-trade policies.

NONE OF THIS WOULD HAVE HAPPENED WITHOUT THIS CAMPAIGN.

The following is a letter from Sir Bob Geldof: Hello.

By being part of the Make Poverty History campaign you've done a lot over the last six months to create the golden opportunity to change the world that is in our grasp now.

That's why I wanted to tell you about Live 8 myself. Let me start by saying, this is not Live Aid 2 - this time its not people's money we need, it's themselves. The five concerts taking place around the world are the starting point for The Long Walk To Justice, an event that will see hundreds of thousands of people heading to Edinburgh to tell the G8 leaders that the whole world is expecting them to deliver.

By doubling aid, fully cancelling debt, and delivering trade justice for Africa, the G8 have it within their power to change the future for millions of men, women and children. What we need to do is show them in our millions that we care and that we're watching.

Whether you're starting things off in Edinburgh on the Saturday at the vitally important Make Poverty History rally, or planning to head to the Scottish capital later in the week, the really vital thing is that you see your good work through and send a message loud and clear to those 8 men - now is the time, this is the year, you can make poverty history.

Heather had a problem recently but seems quite well now. We are looking forward to our holiday in August when she and Beth will be with us.



YOU MET THEM IN THE PAGES OF THE BIBLE

VINEYARD

Nobody in the New Testament has a name beginning with V, and just three or four very minor characters in the Old Testament do. This month we will look at a most significant plant, rather than a person - the vine, which is a symbolic thread throughout scripture, as well as a common plant in the land of Israel.

When the people of Israel first sent spies to explore Canaan (Modern Israel), after their flight from Egypt, they brought back examples of




the land's produce.

One item was a bunch of huge grapes. As the Old Testament unfolds, so references to vines, grapes and wine increase. Jeremiah lamented the ruin of the vineyards of Sibmah. Ezekiel refers to the export of wine to Tyre, whilst Amos, Hosea and others of the prophets describe the process of treading out and fermenting the wine. The fermented wine was stored in strong new goatskin bags (hence Jesus' reference to

new wine needing new wine-skins) or large pottery containers. Wine could be used as a means of currency, and for the discharge of debts. The trade of wine production was held to be of such importance that it earned exemption from military service. As well as in the making of wine, grapes were used in the Hebrew diet. Raisin cakes were commonly produced, and often used as gifts. The grapes would simply be dried on the rooftops in the hot sun. The eating of grapes as a fruit is also referred to in the Bible.

Symbolically the vine was used to represent God's chosen people from the early history of Israel. They had been taken from Egypt, and transplanted in a choice land.

They had been given all the attention that would enable them to produce choice fruit. Instead, they had produced only meagre




wild grapes. For this they were to be abandoned to the destructive power of their enemies. Nonetheless, the analogy of Israel as a choice vine was sustained. At the time of Jesus, on the doors into the temple there was the image of a vine, recalling that association.

Amongst the parables of Jesus in the gospels, no fewer that five relate to vines and their culture. Matthew, Mark and Luke all recall the parable of the wicked vineyard-keepers, who are entrusted with the vineyard while the master is away. When the master sends servants to collect his earnings they are beaten and killed. Eventually the owner sends his son, who suffers the same fate. The implication of the story for the leaders of Israel was immediately seen - and resented!

Jesus, of course, likened Himself to the true vine, as recorded in John's Gospel. True believers need to remain united to Him, just as the branch of a vine needs to remain united with the stem, if it is to bear fruit. By using that analogy, Jesus was taking the ancient use of the vine to represent God's people and saying that now that picture is completed and fulfilled in Him. No longer is it an analogy, it is a reality as the

believer becomes ioined to the Saviour, As the vine produces grapes, so believers will produce fruit from being



united with Jesus.

Vines growing in Israel

As Jesus broke bread and shared wine at The Last Supper, so the fruit of the vine took on the new significance. Its symbolic use in the Jewish Passover was extended to Christians for regular use in remembering the blood of Jesus, which was soon to be spilt on their behalf. Even on the cross, Jesus was offered a drink of wine vinegar - a product of wine that had become over acid.


The vineyard, its plants and produce would all have been very familiar to the people of Biblical times. As in so many instances, Jesus took the familiar, and used it to illustrate, teach and challenge. He took the ordinary, and revealed that which is extra-ordinary. Just as He may take ordinary humans, and as they become grafted on to Him, as a branch may be grafted on to the stem of a vine, so His extra-ordinary life may flow through them.



Exploring Psalm 139

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

From the Vicarage



Dear friends

For most of us life has a discernible rhythm. Some of that is forced upon us by the weather, or by family or similar constraints. Some of us make a positive choice for such rhythm; some perhaps wish that there was more variety, and a more discernible pattern to lives. As we enter different stages of life, then so those patterns and rhythms change.

I am writing this on the eve of setting off for a family holiday. With three members of the family still at school, holidays in August are a prominent part of the rhythm, as is the return to school and the new challenges that entails.

In July we held a party in the church to celebrate the 80th birthdays of twelve members, or recent members, of the family. It was a lovely occasion and I am sure for all of us acted as a reminder of the different stages of our lives, and the challenge we have to adapt to and embrace the changes that the different ages present us with.

In the Genesis account of man's creation, interestingly he was made on day 6, and thus started with a day of rest on day 7. The pattern of regular breaks for renewal and refreshment was built into our psyche from day 1. Some of us will know the damaging effect that insufficient time out can have. There is to be a weekly rhythm, and a longer-term rhythm. Thus Jesus from time to time departed from the crowds to spend time alone with His closest followers, or in a solitary way with His father.

From the earliest days of the church, a calendar whereby we celebrate certain festivals at specific times was established - another structure to help us embrace a healthy rhythm.

Regular rhythm and an ability to move from stage to stage are important individually. They are, too, in the life of a church. So at All Saints, we are more active from September to Easter, and then quieter from Easter onwards. At different times in the church's life, different emphases have been to the fore. That is a healthy thing, as we seek God's guidance to respond to changing situations around us.

This September sees us entering a new phase of the way things happen. There will just be the one, informal, service on a Sunday morning, now starting at 10.00 a.m. Traditional worship will take place at 6.30 p.m. on a Sunday evening (initially, with the timing open to review) and 10.00 a.m. on a Wednesday morning. As in other areas of life, for some this new approach contains the challenge of change from a familiar pattern. For others a new beginning gives the opportunity of making a fresh start, or renewing a faith and a link with the church that has been lost in the past.

What the days ahead hold, we have yet to discover. Whatever it is for you, may you find the right rhythm of activity, recreation and worship. Whatever your stage of life, may you be able to establish a wider pattern that enables you to put first things first, and make the most of the opportunities your specific circumstances offer. And as the worship pattern of All Saints changes on a Sunday, may the opportunity of doing things a little differently be a point of growth for those who currently are part of the family, and act as an invitation to come and see for other readers.

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

Through my Parishes Justice and Peace group, my awareness of the 'Drop the debt' campaign has been further encouraged by Cafod/Oxfam (debt relief to the poorer nations – mostly in Africa). At Birmingham 70,000 of us joined hands and with banners and whistles ringed the city centre in peaceful protest during the G7 conference held there in 1998. Sadly the violent protesters got most of the publicity encouraged by the media!! Bad news sells newspapers. We went on to London in 1999 'Break the chains of debt' slogans were paraded down the 'Embankment' between Westminster and Waterloo Bridges. Again a vociferous but peaceful protest by about 150,000 of us from all round the country. Again the 'violent brigade' got all the press attention....

Then came Edinburgh! Wondering whether my back could cope with a prolonged day of solidarity for this great cause of 'Debt relief' to Edinburgh and home again? I was unexpectedly encouraged by a 'Well-Heeled' individual from one of my Church's English Martyrs/All Saints - who said 'they couldn't be bothered with all this debt stuff'. A 46 seated coach (with toilet) was hired from Andrews of Tideswell by 'Our Lady & St. Thomas' church, Meadowhead and 'Holy Spirit' church, Dronfield through Angela Wood (Chairman of Outreach/Justice & Peace) and co-ordinators. Hilary, my wife, drove Janine Scott from All Saints' church and I to our pick up point at Woodseats Library at 5:10am. We got the front seats on the coach for our 'great journey' - wonderful!! We arrived in Edinburgh at midday and made our way to the Meadows, where we were greeted by a 'sea of white' (we were asked to wear white t-shirts etc.), the colour symbol of the event to 'Make Poverty History'.

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
All the colours of the rainbow making 'white light'. A white band around the centre of Edinburgh, about 25,000 of us... the main reason for the gathering was to lobby the G8 members at their forthcoming meeting at Gleneagles for 'Trade justice, better aid and drop the debt'.

Those who arrived in Edinburgh earlier than we did paraded through the streets in a two mile circuit. By the time we arrived the circle was complete. However, our banners, prayers, good wishes and symbolic chains of debt were displayed and carried with honour and reverence and the solidarity of the occasion was complete. It was a great event and had some impact on the world leaders of the G8 countries (the world's richest nations) Britain, America, Russia, France, Germany, Italy, Canada and Japan.

The event was just a stepping stone in this great campaign and we must continue to try to 'Make Poverty History. At about 5:10pm we left Edinburgh arriving back in Sheffield at 10:45pm. Hilary met us and we made our way back to our little home on the hill in Totley – with its running water on tap, gas, electricity, overflowing supermarkets/health/Social Security safety net systems, pensions and multiple employment choices, freedom and 'way of life'.......

Then came the London BOMBS!!

LISTEN! DO YOU WANT TO KNOW A SECRET?

You may recognise this title as the opening line of a pop song, from the sixties I believe. The sort of secret I have in mind is the secret of being a good listener.

I suppose that, basically, good listeners are people who are interested in other people and what they have to say. They are willing to see life from someone else's point of view without imposing their own beliefs. They are sympathetic to suffering, which encourages the speaker to go on talking, and they are not easily shocked.

Parents get a lot of stick these days when the papers carry stories of children as young as four or five creating mayhem in class and of older children committing acts of violence and generally being out of control. There has recently been a spate of television programmes showing experts teaching parents how to make their 'little angels' behave.

I am sure some parents can learn useful tips from these programmes and it must be heartening for some to see that there are children much more badly behaved than their own! However, life is usually more complicated than following a few guidelines, useful though they are, and parents whose sons or daughters have, say, taken to drugs may feel it's all their fault.

A recent survey reported that mothers nowadays get an average of three and a half hours' sleep a night, ninety minutes less than their own parents did. This leads to 40% becoming depressed and their jobs and sex lives suffering,

All of which brings me to the point of this article which is to appeal to anyone who is a good listener - you know who you are - to consider applying to join Parent Lifeline (Helpline for Parents). We urgently need men and woman volunteers to help us take some of the hundreds of calls we receive a year. We are running a free training course at Lawton Tonge House, Nether Edge, starting at 7.30pm on Monday 26th September and lasting two hours a week for ten weeks. The course will teach you to become even better listeners and to get some idea of the sort of problems callers are facing. Your capacity to offer emotional support and understating is most vitally needed.

Sheffield's Parent Lifeline started in 1978 as an attempt to support desperate mothers who might otherwise be driven to harm their children. It was felt that mothers of crying babies were most likely to need a helpline. Since then, we find we receive calls from parents of all ages about children of all ages, even grown-up ones. Despite the burgeoning of the number of helplines, Parent Lifeline still fulfils a need. It is not just a crisis line but gives parents a chance to talk over their worries and unburden themselves before problems become acute.



We are looking forward to being involved with the Oasis Esteem sexual health lessons again where we will once again be teaching young people and discussing with them about how maintain healthy relationships.

We have already spent time with the year 7's on their open day and in the primary schools and are looking forward to continuing those relationships.

We will also be continuing to work with JaM, our Christian group at school where we are looking at the possibility of an Alpha type initiative.

St Johns Youth

During this last year I have been working with two groups at St. Johns, an older and younger group. Our older group has been very busy in the last couple of terms revising for GCSE's and AS levels so hasn't been able to come very much, consequently we have been directing our efforts at the younger group. This group really excites me as the potential is massive with them in their solid growth and development, we are also hoping that some of the older group will help lead this group, thus learning how to lead in youth work.

All Saints Youth

I have also been working with an older and younger group at All Saints. The older group is peer led and is learning to meet together without adult supervision. Another adult and I do meet with them from time to time in order to support them and offer any help they might want. The younger group meet together to learn, discuss, worship and socialise together each week for an hour and then are Page 26

joined by their non-church friends for a youth group. We hope that their friends, in time, will decide to join them earlier for the meeting.

Rock Solid

We have just finished our 3rd year with Rock solid and have again enjoyed the success of this group very much. They have engaged with each other and the leaders on many levels socially and spiritually, seriously and relationally, in games and in discussion. Some young people hold it all lightly, some really enjoy it, some have chosen to ignore our Christian claims and some are accepting them. This year I am moving from Rock Solid leadership to Upper Level so that I can concentrate on encouraging and challenging this group in their growth.

Upper Level

This group has been running for the last year and all the young people have really enjoyed their time together. They went away together for the weekend and had a great time. They have heard about the fundamentals of the Christian faith and thought about some of the issues that arise from that. They have had opportunities to discuss their opinions with each other and the leaders. This year we will be continuing on this thread and I hope they will be inviting their friends to some special evenings as well as being involved with some activities outside Tuesday evenings.

The Goldmine

One of the activities I am hoping Upper Level might come to is the Goldmine, our monthly youth service that we run with Dore youth project. Young people attend this event from churches in this project as well as in Dore. It is a very important part of the youth work here and we will be working to continue, teaching, inspiring and challenging young people in this worship time.

YOU MET THEM IM THE PAGES OF THE BIBLE

THE WISE MEN

The visit of the Wise Men to the infant Jesus, bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh of course needs no retelling. Many of us will have memories of nativity plays and Christmas card images in our minds of kings mingling with shepherds and animals around a manger containing a baby.

Pinning down exactly who they were, and precisely what happened is not so easy. Their visit is only recorded in one of the gospels, Matthew. He describes a visit some time (perhaps a number of months) after the birth of Jesus, so we must assume Joseph and Mary had found different accommodation by then! They came "from the east", so their precise origin is very vague. The gifts are referred to, but the number of visitors is not - the three is simply a deduction from the number of gifts. The visit to king Herod, his reaction, and subsequent murder of all the boys in Bethlehem under the age of two is a violent introduction to the life of Jesus. It is, however, entirely consistent with Herod's character, who was known (as a number of sources outside the Bible confirm) as a morose, personally insecure and cruel ruler.


One of the apocryphal gospels, the Arabic "Gospel of the Infancy" opens with these words:


'And it happened when the Lord Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea at the time of King Herod the Magicians arrived form the east in Jerusalem, as Zoroaster had predicted'.

Early stories linked the wise men with Persia or Arabia both to the east of Israel. Persia in particular had a strong cult following the teachings of Zoroaster, a Greek

Some early Christian fathers looked back to Old Testament references and claimed they originated from Arabia. Both Tertullian and Justin Martyr referred to the passage in Isaiah 60 verse 6, which speaks of kings of Arabia and Saba bringing gifts of gold and incense. An Arab tribe known as the "Planeteers" in the early Christian period claimed that it was their ancestors who were the men in question.

Stories concerning the men grew up rapidly after Biblical times. Tertullian (second century theologian) refers to them as, "almost kings".

By the sixth century the names Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar were being used. In 1162, The Holy Roman Emperor, Frederick Barabarosa, claimed to have taken their relics to Cologne cathedral.

The wise men are sometimes referred to as "The Magi". The word is an Anglicisation of the Greek word used in the Bible. It can simply be translated as a wise man or a sage. The Greek historian Herodotus used it to refer to a particular Medean tribe who had a priestly function in the Persian Empire. Complementing this, Daniel in the Old Testament used the word to refer to wise men, or astrologers who interpreted dreams.

So who they were, where they came from, and what happened to them afterwards is all shrouded in mystery. What we can be sure of is that they were gentiles, who travelled westwards to arrive at Bethlehem, and who alerted Herod to a possible rival, thus triggering both slaughter in

Bethlehem, and the flight of Jesus' family to Egypt. Exactly what the star was, that is described in Mat thew, has long been a matter of de bate. Various suggestions have been made. Halley's Comet appeared in 11 BC. Chinese writ ings refer to an unusually bright star that was observed in 4 BC. The most likely astronomical event is the

conjunction of the planets Saturn and Jupiter in 7 BC, which would have been a most striking and significant event to those observing the sky. Their visit in the Christian calendar has been commemorated on the day of Epiphany (6th January) since the fourth century. In a number of countries and traditions this is the day for exchange of presents. However, there is no suggestion that this is the date the wise men visited Bethlehem. The date has developed form the festival of Jesus' baptism, and has been a convenient day, soon after Christmas, to remember them. So what exactly is their significance? Much is often made of the nature of the gifts, indicating both the royalty and divinity of Jesus, and pointing the way to His crucifixion. It is also very significant, that Matthew, writing his gospel very much for a Jewish audience, should recount this visit of Gentiles right at the outset. He then closed the gospel with Jesus commission to His followers to, "make disciples of all nations." Jesus came for all nations, races, colours and types of men and women. Matthew is at pains to demonstrate that at the outset, and thus invite us to drop prejudices which we may carry, and respond to Jesus' call to be his emissary to the people's of the entire world.

Harvest Appeal: Reaping change in Bangladesh

This Harvest as you celebrate the variety and abundance of God's provision, Christian Aid invites you to compare England with Bangladesh; a country whose beauty, diversity and potential to sustain its people has been threatened by international trade. Hear Sharhabanu Begum's story and be inspired by God's call to be a caretaker of the world and its people.

Sharhabanu's story

Like 85 per cent of Bangladesh's population, Sharhabanu and her family depend on the land to survive. But several years ago things went badly wrong. Sharhabanu's family was persuaded to use foreign seeds that needed chemical fertilisers. These were marketed by private companies after the World Bank lifted restrictions on imports to Bangladesh. Many farmers accepted these seeds, and bought the fertiliser required to grow them, because the private companies gave them credit.

However, the seeds didn't grow well, and the chemicals in the fertiliser were bad for the environment. Sharhabanu was desperate: 'Our soil became hard and unhealthy. Our situation was bad. We couldn't even buy our children clothes.'

Thanks to Christian Aid's partner UBINIG and the introduction of organic farming methods, Sharhabanu and around 120,000 other farming families in Bangladesh

are reaping the benefits of better harvests and sustaining local seed varieties for the future.

Sharhabanu explains: 'We switched from chemicals to composting and began trying to save more of our local seed. Now we get four crops a year and our children can go to school.' Sharhabanu now harvests a range of vegetables and sixty different varieties of rice! Help other poor communities by supporting Christian Aid's 2005 Harvest appeal.

wission Aviation Fellowship

Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) is a Christian organisation whose mission it is to fly light aircraft in developing countries so that people in remote areas can receive the help they need. They have been running since 1946.



Every three minutes, an MAF plane is taking off or landing somewhere in the world. These flights enable crucial work by many development and aid agencies, missions, local churches and other national groups. Medical care, adequate food, clean water and Christian hope are reaching countless thousands of men, women and children. Connect Befriending Scheme

eoff and Vanessa Kirby are the Church Army couple working in Pitsmoor (where Frank and Catherine's son is the Vicar) currently supported by All Saints'. We print here an excerpt from their last Prayer letter (written in June), the full text of which is displayed on the church hall notice board. Geoff and Vanessa hope to visit us some time in the autumn to tell us more about their work.

"This time last year we had just begun the first training sessions for eight volunteers — we now have 14! Within this team there is a rich diversity of age, background, culture and life experience. We have been approached recently be a few people who have expressed an interest in the training and so we are looking at the possibility of a third round of training in the autumn. Before this takes place we feel it is important that our current volunteers have all began befriending so do pray that in the coming weeks this might happen. Over the months it has become clear that some of the volunteers are in need of befriending themselves as they struggle with the demands of life.

Eight volunteers are visiting people at the moment and two new referrals are currently being processed. We have receives many other referrals but these have been inappropriate for the scheme either because they have been out of Connects geographical area or because the individuals needs have been too severe or complicated for our volunteers.

Our referral network is now widening having started with the local District Nursing Team and GP Surgery we are now working with Nomad, a local housing support scheme, a local drugs project and Sheffield Carers Centre.

Connect Coffee was set up in the spring for Befrienders to gather together once a month for a chat and to encourage one another. We now have guest speakers (District Nurses and other working in the Care sector in the community) coming along to chat to us which has proved very popular."

What Price Fresh Water?

with the end of summer term a BBQ was planned after the morning service. It was a weekend when the team of evangelists that David had been involved with for the Walk of 1,000 Men (and Women!) were staying for the weekend using our church as a base for teaching and fellowship.



The sun shone. It was hot.

The service started, and the Cell group who was preparing the coffee ready for the end of the service found that the water flow from the taps had stopped. With the extra guests and BBQ this was especially disconcerting. However, it was especially appropriate, since there was a special offering for us to Gift Aid money to a Water Project in Naisoya, in Kenya, where Davis and Steve and the others in their team had been in January when helping Pastor David Koreto who works with the Massai Mara. £14,000 is needed to dig a well to provide ready water rather than a three mile journey to a muddy stream, and although a small amount had been raided we hoped to increase the amount. How apt it was that three of us spent the service carrying up water from the tap in the

crypt to the church hall, in a variety of

containers to provide water to drink and to flush the toilets.

How good it was to learn afterwards that we had raised over £3,500 to help the project which has already started.

I would not wish to be a permanent water-carrier in a hot African climate. It was bad enough to be one for part of a morning on a hot English day in Totley. As for our church water, at the end of the day it transpired that someone had inadvertently turned off the stop-tap, so all was well. Nevertheless it was a lesson through experience, and I remain grateful for my clean water.

The Purpose Driven Church Conference led by Rick Warren

Six of us attended this three day conference in July with 1,000 delegates from 30 countries. Rick reminded us of the themes in his book "The purpose driven life."

- Why am I alive? What is my purpose? Does my life matter?
- Everything was started by God and finds a purpose in Him.
- God made us for his pleasure.
- He loves us, and knows us.
- In response we are here to worship Him and obey his commands.
- This means to take the Great Commission seriously.

Therefore we need to go out and tell the world about the sacrifice of His Son, who he sent to die for us upon the cross, for our sins, so that we may know eternal life. The eternal life will be with Him, and those who have accepted Jesus, His son into their lives. Those will be the only people there. Our life on earth is just a practice for our life in eternity, but the only difference for those of us that go there, is that the only people who will be there are the ones who have heard the Good news about Jesus. What will we say when we are asked have you told anyone about my son? There will not be people to tell in heaven. We need to use our time here doing this.

How to be a Purpose Driven Church

We need to be an outward looking church where people know and love God and wish to share that love with the world. We must share The Great Commission to go out and tell others, not just to keep this knowledge to ourselves. Those of us who know Jesus, and who attend church need to understand that there are so many that do not, and that our mission is to them. Is church for us to sit in a cosy huddle, and feel the comfort of similar people around? Or is it for each and every one of us to set out to create such a place of love and welcome that we take the words of Jesus' Great Commission and go out and tell the world seriously? (This can be uncomfortable and difficult).



But what does this mean in reality?

The world has moved so fast in the last few decades. Many have never heard of Jesus, never mind the stories of healings and parables that older people were taught in school. For many the actual building of a church is more unfamiliar than going abroad. Jesus wants us to go out and meet people where they are, and to bring them in to an environment that is not to alien for them. They need love and fellowship.

What do we do?

- We need to be welcoming and loving.
- We need to keep jargon to a minimum.
- We need to use the sort of music with which they are familiar, but - with Christian lyrics.
- We need to have a clearly structured programme that will provide for their needs and those already within the church family.
- We need all the church family to understand that this is what we are doing.
- We need to pray that God will bless our church.

Some key thoughts about this: Jesus died for people not buildings.

- You must build your people before you build your steeple.
- Activity and productivity are not the same.
- Different kinds of churches reach out to different kinds of people.
- Every member is a minister (one of our cell values.) Some churches that are succeeding in reaching out and serving the Lord within the community have opened their doors between 11pm and 3am with people serving coffee and providing a listening ear. We are not an inner city church here on Totley, so this is clearly not our role, (thank goodness do I sense you think!) However, we need to be clear about how we aim to grow and to nurture those we welcome. The change of service pattern in September may be one of the opportunities we can use. Many of us will be looking at what else we are doing and asking if this is what God wants us to do or not.

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

We have yet to hit the era of photographic digital technology, so still enjoy the anticipation of waiting for the prized photos to be developed and returned. Imagine our chagrin, when we opened the envelope. When changing a film I had managed to reinsert the used film in the camera, and thus we had sent off one film that had been exposed twice, and one that had not been exposed at all. Human error once again.

"To err is human, to forgive is divine." We all will and do make mistakes, great and small. Even the most efficient of us are not faultless. It is because of the human tendency to err, that the importance of forgiveness is so high. It can be hard enough sometimes, to forgive somebody else's unwitting error, that has had an impact on us. When we suspect malice or vindictiveness, rather than folly or weakness, the stakes are a lot higher. When we have suffered profoundly because of somebody else's deliberate act, then we may be faced with impossibility. Except that with God, nothing is impossible.

Jesus taught us to ask in prayer, that we might be forgiven to the extent that we forgive others. Quite a challenge. Something we will only achieve this as we allow Him to master our hearts, and the ways we react to others.

Two practical implications of his are :-

Allow others to make mistakes. It's part of life, and how we learn. G K Chesterton said, "If a job is worth doing, it's worth doing badly." Honour and encourage honest endeavour which may be less than perfect.

Be great at forgiving. Hold no grudges. Treat others as you want the lord to treat you. Be great at forgiving.

To the people you want us to be

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

Millions face food shortages in Niger

any thousands of families in the south of Niger are teetering on the brink of catastrophe without food aid and sufficient rainfall.

As the leading UK charities launched a nationwide appeal for Niger and surrounding countries because of drought and last year's locust plague, Jeff Woodke, of Tearfund's partner Jemed, said he was witnessing families eating grass to survive.

Speaking by satellite phone from the parched lands around Abalak in the south of Niger, Jeff Woodke reported: "Today we have been distributing 57 tonnes of rice to nomadic families in the bush. But it just isn't enough and we must urgently get more food aid into people's hands. I have seen women out collecting grass to take home to cook for their families. We are still facing a critical situation."

Jeff added that rain was desperately needed in the next few weeks to provide food for livestock. "So many cattle have died in the drought. There was some rain in this region a few days ago, but it wasn't enough. We have to hold on and pray that we get more rain and get it soon," he declared.

In neighbouring Burkina Faso the situation is also acute, say Tearfund partners. Kouka Sebego, a widow and mother of seven children told Tearfund aid workers: "When we eat we wait two days before we eat again, so that we don't use up what we have bought. And we eat it with leaves so it lasts longer. I am worried."

Fifty-year-old Kimpoko Ouedraogo, one of thousands of people who will hopefully receive emergency food aid from Tearfund partners in Burkina Faso, Development Organisation of Evangelical Churches (ODE), said: "We are anxious because we do not know how long we can keep going because the needs are enormous and our resources are shrinking."

Donations can also be made by going into any high street post office or bank. You can also help by praying for more food aid to reach the families and for rain to provide water for the cattle and people.


YOU MET THEM IN THE PAGES OF THE BIBLE

ARTAXERXES

In our alphabetical journey through the Bible, we have arrived at "X", and not surprisingly there is no suitable candidate or topic whose name begins with that letter. However, the Persian king whose name appears above is close (i.e. the name Xerxes, with a suffix), and so he is this month's subject.

Tying the biblical record to other historical records from other nations is not always easy. However, Artaxerxes does give us an opportunity to do just that, albeit some-

what tenuously. Judea was conquered by the Babylonians, under Nebuchadnezzar (of hanging gardens fame), and many of the people were taken to Babylon (modern Iraq) as captives. Jerusalem, its walls and temple were left in a state of ruin. All this took place between 598 and 585 BC.

However, Babylon itself

was then over-run by the Persians (Modern Iran) under the emperor Cyrus in 539 BC. The Jews were still in captivity in Babylon when this happened. The policy of the Persians, though, was to restore religious idols etc. to the countries that the Babylonians had removed them from. In the case of the Jews, this could not be done, because there were, of course, no idols. For them, restoration meant rebuilding Jerusalem, in particular the temple. An edict to this effect was issued, but progress was very spasmodic.

Enter Artaxerxes. The were several Persian rulers by this name. The first reigned in Persia from 465 to 423 BC, and the second from 404 to 358 BC. The Biblical references to the Persian king of this name are a little ambiguous, but it is pretty clear that it is Artaxerxes who is referred to.

This general background is known from secular historical sources. The exact impact of the man on the people of God is amplified in the Bible.

He was the son of Xerxes of historical record, probably referred to as Ahasuerus in the Bible. We also know that he was raised to the throne after the assassination of his father (although he himself was not involved) and that his reign was largely peaceful. He was nick-named "Long-handed" because one of his hands was longer than the other. It was under his reign that Nehemiah

was given permission and resources to return to Jerusalem to rebuild the walls. Ezra, the priest, had returned to re-establish proper worship under Ahasuerus. The account of Esther, in the biblical book by that name, is set in the reign of Artaxerxes' father, as was the ministry of the prophet Malachi.

The attitude and actions of Artaxerxes were directly instrumental in the return of the Jews from Babylon, and the re-establishment of the nation, centring around temple worship. It was this re-established nation, that evolved over the next three centuries into the Roman province into which Jesus was born.

The books of Ezra and Nehemiah describe the return of the exiles and the rebuilding of the city. The writings of the Old Testament go no further historically, and so there is a three or four hundred year gap before the events described in the New Testament, although other sources do provide information about that period.

Artaxerxes, then merits a couple of passing references in the books of Nehemiah and Ezra. We can presume that the actions he took would have been quite insignificant in his own life and career. Yet they were of immense significance for the history of the Jewish people, and ultimately the advent of the Jesus. Apparently insignificant actions can have profound effects, as is, of course, the case for us.

It is also interesting to realise that this man was not either a Jewish or Christian believer, and yet what he did was vital in the divine plan of salvation. God invites us always to be conscious disciples of His Son, but is well able to use and over-rule the actions of those who do not acknowledge Him.

As is so often the case with people referred to in the Bible, we would love to know more about them, and their own spiritual journeys. In this man's case there is little. What we can take form him though, is that we should look for the Lord's handiwork in all circumstances, not just, "religious" ones. And realise that what may be of immense significance for us may appear trivial and mundane at first sight.

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
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Youth work news for \$17 churches

It is better to do and fail than to not do at all.

The first American steamboat took thirty-two hours to go from New York to Albany and people laughed. The horse and buggy passed the early motorcar as if it were standing still. (It usually was.) People laughed. The first electric light bulb was so dim people had to use a gas lamp to see it. People laughed. The first aeroplane came down fifty-nine seconds after it left the ground. People laughed. But where would we be today without those inventions? The people who criticised are soon forgotten but the person of action is remembered.

If you are one of those who aim is to fulfil God-given dreams and goals you may have already experienced discouragement, criticism and ridicule. It is far too often the reaction society gives.

It may be that you achieved your goal and quickly the criticism turned into praise or it may be that you are still working hard to complete your aim.

Maybe you have given up, maybe you haven't dared to start?

One thing that is for sure is that if no one steps out in faith and exploration then we will never move forwards.

The Bible tells us in James, 'But someone will say, You have faith; I have actions. Show me your faith without actions and I will show you my faith by what I do'.

It goes on to say 'As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without actions is dead.'

I constantly struggle with the fear of failure; failure as a husband and as a dad, failure in the youth work growing and progressing, failure in the young people in our churches growing up as committed followers of Jesus.

But I step out and give all I have, sometimes I fail and sometimes I succeed. What is important for me and anyone involved in leadership within any capacity, is that we are supported and encouraged whatever the results. As without it our heads go down and we start to lose our vision and stumble and fall.

I would like to encourage you and urge you to follow your dreams, step out in faith and live out your dream, it is better to do and fail than to not do at all.

Theodore Roosevelt said, 'It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, and comes short again and again, because there is not effort without error and shortcoming. But who does actually strive to do the deeds? Who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly.'

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

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

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

Parish Weekend

There is no way that the parish weekend in September can be adequately reported. You had to be there to get the full flavour. However I have been asked to write a few words. Nick Dawson, vicar of Owlerton, led us and on Friday evening gave a moving talk about the amazing love of God. He made the very important point that when we love we are changed. Thus when we pass on the love which God, in His mercy showers on us, we are changed and become more filled with the Holy Spirit. If we are to be obedient to God's commands we have no option but to pass on that love and so we have no option but to recognise that we are constantly being changed. This renewal, which is God's command, is a continuous process so we have never "arrived"! Also Nick pointed out that we cannot know the truth of this process until we experience it for ourselves. The line of the hymn "Will you come and follow me and never be the same" is very appropriate for us and we should understand the personal commitment involved.

On the Saturday morning we had two sessions when we considered the question of God's grace. It is by the grace of God that we are touched by His love. We acknowledge that we are imperfect, sinners, even dreadful people, but God can and does use us for His purposes. YOU MET THEM IN THE PAGES OF THE BIBLE

YAHWEH

We have nearly completed our journey through the Bible, taking one character for each letter of the alphabet. Next month we will conclude the series with Zechariah. There are no Biblical characters whose names begin with Y. However, the term Jehovah, or Yahweh, is used thousands of times in the Old Testament, either alone, or in conjunction with other words, so this month we will look at this word.

In the Hebrew text of the Old Testament, Yahweh is one of three words used as directly referring to the Lord. EI, and Elohim are also very common. Used in slightly different ways, they all carry the meaning of "I am who I am". Most famously, when Moses asked at the burning bush who it was that he should say had sent him to deliver the people from Egypt, the reply was, "Say this to the people of Israel, Yahweh (I AM) has sent you". (Exodus 3: 14)

Initially for the people of Israel, the name of God was too sacred to vocalise. Also, the original Hebrew contains no vowels, so the letters YWHW were transposed to, "my Lord." (or "adonai"). Later vowels were added, and by the twelfth century AD this was being rendered "Jehovah." However, the word Yahweh was certainly known to the early Christians, as there are some Greek forms of it in Christian literature from the first three centuries of the church.

In conversation with the Pharisees in John chap 8, Jesus famously said, "Before Abraham was, I am" (v58) Their reaction was to attempt to stone Him. Why? He was unmistakably taking upon Himself the divine name and being contained within the sacred word, Yahweh.

Back in the old Testament the word is at times combined with others, to further expand the nature of the Lord.

When God provided a ram for Abraham to sacrifice when he had been challenged to sacrifice his son, Isaac, God is referred to as "Jehovah-Jireh" - or, "The Lord will provide." After a victory over the Amalekite tribe, Moses erected an altar and named it "Jehovah-Nissi" meaning, "The Lord is my banner". Gideon spoke of "Jehovah - Shalom", (The Lord is peace), Jeremiah of "Jehovah - Tsidkenu", (The Lord is our righteousness) and so we could go on.

How we refer to God can be very revealing of our view of Him, and relationship with Him. When asked how to pray by His disciples, Jesus told them to begin, "Our Father" - not a denial of the truth of eternal existence implied in, "Yahweh", but adding an intimate and personal aspect that Jesus Himself taught, modelled and invited people to enter into. He also, said, very bluntly, that He is the unique way to getting to know the Father. The "I am, and always have been and always will be" - Yahweh - of the Old Testament, has become approachable and knowable, on a personal level, as that same God revealed Himself in the person of Jesus. The invitation to us is not just to know about Him in our minds, but to know Him at a personal level at the heart of our beings.

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

Christian Aid

Thank you for your donation from All Saints' church Harvest Festival and also for your continued support for Christian Aid's relief, development and campaigning work.

Each of these three prongs to our work are important, sometimes quite literally matters of life and death. The most recent crisis to hit headlines was in Niger, where a combination of drought and a locust swarm had pushed hundreds and thousands of people to the edge of starvation. Our charity does not have on-going work in Niger, so most of the money we receive will be spent via two 'umbrella' church relief organisations, Action for Churches Together and the Lutheran World Federation. However, neither weather nor insects are any respecter of national boundaries, and several other countries which, like Niger, border the Sahara desert were affected. We do have programmes in some of these, for example Burkina Faso, and so we shall be working with local people to help make their food supplies more secure.

All of us know, however, that all the charity in the world won't bring help to the more than one billion people living on less than 60p a day. Government policies on aid, trade and debt **must** be changed as well. And as the great rally at Edinburgh for the G8 showed, ordinary folk will turn out in their hundreds of thousands for such

a cause. Agencies like ours do, though, need to educate their supporters about the issues and provide them with the resources to campaign. Another use for your money!

The total raised at Harvest was £179.50 which will of course be increased by those who gift aided their donations.

TESTIMONY

By Paul Kent

I've lived in Sheffield all of my life working full time as a rubber stamp maker. I had a pretty normal childhood and was brought up to believe that God existed but I only went to church sometimes, mainly because I went to the local church school. When I was twelve I got friendly with a lad who lived near me and his family were Christians. They used to take me to Sunday school and I went to Sunday school camp a couple of times.

As I got into my teenage years other things suddenly seemed a lot more important than going to church on a Sunday morning. For a start there was the Sunday League football and then the essential drinking in the pub afterwards. Like a lot of the lads that age, my weekends basically consisted of going to the pub Friday night, going to the pub Saturday lunchtime, going to the match if United were at home, going back to the pub in the evening, playing football Sunday morning and then going to the pub for the rest of the day.

This was my life for quite a lot of years, even after I married my first wife. It was probably part of the reason our marriage ended in divorce after only a short time.

In March 2000, I met Joy. Joy was divorced and bringing up Christopher, our eldest son on her own. We started living together very soon after we met and in July 2002, Jacob was born and we married that October. About this time Joy decided to start going to church

with our next door neighbour Gail. It was great, I really looked forward to Sunday mornings because she took both of the children with her and I got to stay in bed and watch 'Match of the day', enjoying the peace and quiet. I very occasionally went with her, just to stop her nagging really and although I probably wouldn't have admitted it I did actually enjoy it. I didn't have a problem with Joy getting involved with things at church but no way did I want to be dragged into it.

After I'd been to church a few times Gail invited us round for a meal one evening, she also invited another couple (Matt and Janine Conant). We had a pleasant evening but I remember saying to Joy when we went home, he seemed like a nice bloke but it's not normal for a lad his age to be into all of this 'God stuff', he should be down the pub at the weekend. (Matt is now one of my closest friends and together we run the youth group at church).

In February 2003, Joy started doing the *Alpha* course, she came home every week absolutely full of it. I could tell this was having a really big affect on her and to be honest I was a bit worried about where it would all end. When Joy was about half way through the course, life suddenly went downhill when my mum died of cancer. Although she had been very ill it was a massive shock. She was only 55 and it didn't seem possible that she was gone. The following Sunday it was Mother's Day and Joy asked me to go to church with her. She thought I would get some comfort from it and because I didn't know what else to do I went. It was quite a

strange experience and people I had never met before came up to me to say how sorry they were. I found I did get some comfort from being there and after that I did go to church occasionally with Joy.

In June 2004, the church held a mission week and Joy put my name down for the men's breakfast on a Saturday morning. The ladies at our church cook the most fabulous breakfast so it was well worth getting out of bed for. I was really surprised to find that the men were normal! I don't what I expected really but I really enjoyed it and a lot of what was talked about seemed to make sense. We also went to the Memorial Service the next day so I could remember my mum which was quite a turning point.

A lady I didn't know from another church, stood up at the front and gave her testimony. She spoke of her mum dying of cancer suddenly and everything she said seemed very much the same as what had happened to me. She told us how she had turned to God and He had helped her through it. Up till then I hadn't thought much about God but that day I said to David Rhodes that I would do a short course that the church was running called the 'START' course. I enjoyed that and got a lot out of it.

In September that year the church held a weekend away at Scarborough and we decided to go. We were both a bit nervous about it because we had no idea what to expect. It turned out to be one of the most amazing weekends of our lives. It is really hard to put into words what happened that weekend but I know

that while I was there God really reached out and touched me. I lost all of the doubts I had about becoming a Christian and I knew that this was the only way to live my life. I invited God that weekend to come into my life and as I stood there and was prayed for, I really felt that He was actually in the room with me. It was a life changing moment and we both came back knowing that God wanted us to follow him and that we needed to bring our children up to know and love Him.

When I got back to Sheffield I realised that if this was going to be my way of life I needed to learn more about it. So I went on the *Alpha* course, got involved with the youth at church and am now in a cell group full of ladies!

The church now plays a really important part in my life. In fact I couldn't imagine my life without God in the middle of it. I've got a much better relationship with my wife because I don't spend all of my time and money in the pub and my children enjoy good quality time with me. My values and priorities have changed completely, I have some really great friends who I know will always be there for me and most of all I know that whatever happens in the future, God will be there to help me through it. Now when I sit in church on a Sunday morning with my family I just can't believe how God has blessed me.



From the Vicarage



Dear Friends

October was the warmest on record. November seems to have started in a similar vein, so I wonder if the predicted hard winter will ever arrive. Global warming does seem to be an incontestable fact. I recently saw a spectacular picture of a rocky mountain, which had been covered in ice and snow permanently until just recently. So I expect most of us believe in the phenomenon, although we might debate the precise causes, and the exact responsibility that we have.

Belief in other realms is more questionable. Where are you in relation to the Loch Ness monster, the yeti, life on other planets, the effectiveness of alternative medical therapies or the best way to arrange our educational and health services? Belief can be a very subtle matter, and yet it actually underpins our day-to day lives.

We have beliefs about the reliability of our gas and electric supplies, such that we depend entirely upon them.

We have beliefs about how other people view us and are likely to treat us, which effects our behaviour. And so we could go on. I was recently introduced to a "Sat Nav" - route finding device in a car. Its owner, a total stranger to Sheffield, believed in it implicitly, and preferred its instructions to my local knowledge - and indeed it worked out fine!

So belief and behaviour are closely linked. As is belief and reasons for it. My friend with the Sat-Nav had used it successfully before, so was going to do so again. So what about Christmas? How do you approach it? It raises very important questions of belief.

Is the Christmas story an engaging fable for the end of December, something around which to hang an annual family celebration? Is it somehow valid for children, but not so for adults? Or is it real? Are the events rehearsed each year actually true? Did God become flesh, was He born of a virgin, and did His coming really have implications for all mankind? If we believe that this is true, then we need to act on it - in allowing that same Jesus to shape our lives.

If you warn me that my house is on fire, and I believe you, I will act on it. I need to do the same with the Jesus of Christmas!

HOLA PERU!

As many of you will have seen me around, you know I'm back. Thank you for your prayer support for my Christian Aid supporter trip. It was a wonderful experience, which I'll never forget, nor will I forget all the dedicated people I met working with the disadvantaged and marginalised people of Peru. The projects we visited included, youth work in the shanty towns of Lima, the Minka fair-trade centre, whose items are for sale in the U.K., the "Casas de la Salud" health houses, which we would call clinics, but cover a much broader spectrum than our clinics, the ladies who voluntarily run the "Glass of Milk Clubs", providing nourishment for the poor 3-5 year olds, a kindergarten, TB sufferers who are helped to grow vegetables at one of the clinics and thereby have access to fresh vegetables, a guinea-pig farm", 1 male and 7 females, so the owner could sell some in the market, pass them on to other unemployed people and have a source of food, but the most disturbing visit was seeing the plight of the asparagus workers in the fields. This I cannot go into in detail it would take far too long and we are not sure of the correct way to handle the issue. Hopefully I will have my slides back soon and am then happy to talk to any interested group.


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

'Figures moving in the right direction'

New statistics show that the Diocese of Sheffield is one of the most thriving regions in the Church of England, with rising attendance levels and giving figures.

They reveal that the diocese is one of eight that has seen increased attendance levels for children and young people, and is one of the 23 dioceses to have seen a rise in adult attendance levels.

In total the average weekly attendance for 2003 is up to 21,200 from 20,100 in 2002, an increase of 1,100.

The Bishop of Sheffield, Rt Rev Jack Nicholls, said: "These figures are hugely encouraging and endorse all the good work that is happening throughout the diocese.

"It shows that Church is an important part in the lives of local people and devalues much of the bad news that we hear so often."

The diocese also continues to show increasing levels of giving, with the amount given through the Gift Aid Scheme in 2003 being £11.36 per giver per week; this figure is up from £11.16 in 2002, and places the diocese as the second most generous in the Church of England.

Nick Hutton, diocesan giving director, welcomed the statistics by saying: "We should celebrate these figures and all the work in parishes that they represent."

The Barnabus Fund

The Barnabus fund seeks to provide for Christians throughout the world in minority situations. Many Christians are persecuted in their faith and in many situations where natural disasters occur Christians are the last to receive help, if any. The following extract from a recent letter from the Barnabus Fund illustrates.

"We are in direct touch with ministry and church leaders in Pakistan who have reported hundreds of Christians are amongst the homeless as their houses have collapsed. Many are sleeping in the open. Church buildings in the region have been damaged. Although the Pakistani Government will be giving help. Christian leaders fear that corruption means little will reach their community. A senior church leader told us that earthquake victims are already moving to cities like Islamabad; he expects they will take the jobs of the Christians there. We have sent a first grant for immediate aid for Christians affected by the earthquake. As a despised minority, regularly discriminated against, they need assistance from their Christian brothers and sisters around the world at this time. With the help of gifts we will be able to keep sending assistance, including for longer term needs and the knock-on effects such as job losses which are expected."

Barnabus Fund is a registered charity and was established in 1993 and channels aid to projects run by national Christians in more than 40 countries.



I guess the best way of summing things up would be to say that a few weeks ago I commented to Dawn that I was probably happier before we moved house, work, school and church, but that overall I thought it was more worthwhile being here. Which is another way of saying that although we still miss you all a lot, we have work to do here and it'll be a year or two more before we know if we're making any real progress.

Good and bad events in the last year have included the sun setting over Blencathra; dismantling, transporting and then re-erecting Dawn's studio-sheds (only possible thanks to the Tozers and Giles); Christmas visitors; January floods and storms; the septic tank/open sewer escapade (enough said); two weeks without a water supply; Noah moving school (again); being accused by a senior vicar of "sinister behaviour" at work (I had to look that one up in the dictionary to be sure I wasn't dreaming); the Abba tribute band at the school's summer fundraiser; and, at last, a couple of recent evening services at the local church where we really felt God was with us.

When times have been tough we've looked back on being in Totley as preparing us for being here – without that time or your love and prayers since, we would probably have gone under.

As far as our everyday lives go, Connie is at the village school (3 miles away), while Noah is now at school in Penrith (11 miles away) having been unable to settle in the village school. This makes for some interesting logistics. As a result, Dawn is working part-time unpaid as the family taxi service, and part-time paid for the national youth advocacy service helping make sure children's views are heard as part of e.g. care proceedings. She is still working at turning her metalwork into a job rather than a hobby.

It was wonderful in the summer to meet up with some of you at New Wine. The four of us took enormous encouragement from the week there and it seems to have spilled over into things locally, with a small group of us feeling inspired to try organising an informal evening service at our local church. Ultimately we decided it was no good moping around feeling sorry for ourselves because All Saints Calthwaite isn't All Saints Totley, and once we got stuck in we found that there are a surprising number of like-minded people (Maurice and Margery will know at least two of them). We feel a great sense of hope and expectation that God will touch the hearts of people in this place.

If any of you are passing or would like to visit, we'd be delighted to see you — either for a cup of tea, a bed for the night or a field for camping. We really enjoy it when we have visitors and it's great to catch up on people's news. Please keep it touch and please pray for all of us and for our vision for the local church. We will keep you in our prayers.



YOU MET THEM IN THE PAGES OF THE BIBLE

ZECHERIAH

Identifying the natural family of Jesus from the Bible is not entirely straightforward. Matthew 12: 47 refers to Jesus' "Mother and brothers". Mary and Joseph made the journey to Bethlehem because that was where their family hailed from, so one can guess that there would have been relatives there. During her pregnancy Mary visited Elizabeth, wife of Zechariah, and mother of John the Baptist. Luke 1: 36 refers to Elizabeth as Mary's relative. The precise nature of the relationship is not clear, but on the basis of that, Jesus and John have been viewed as cousins, with the blood-line running via Mary and Elizabeth.

The circumstances of John's birth are remarkable. Zechariah was a member of the priesthood, from the family of Abijah. They were clearly devout in their practices, but getting on in years and childless. Zechariah belonged to the twenty four families responsible, by rotation, for service within the temple. Each day, two individuals were chosen by lot from amongst these families to tend the incense brazier that was kept burning immediately in front of the Holy of Holies. The occasion came when Zechariah was chosen. As he entered the sanctuary to tend the brazier, so the congregation remained outside. Preparing himself to perform this sacred office, he received a vision.

An angel, standing on the incense altar, appeared to him. He was overwhelmed by the experience, but was able to receive a mind-blowing message from the angel. He and Elizabeth would at last have a child, who was to be called John. He would be great before God, filled with the Spirit even in the womb, never to touch alcohol, and would turn

many back to the Lord. He would prepare the people to receive the Lord. Zechariah protested. The upshot was that Gabriel revealed his name to him, and said that because of his unbelief he would be struck dumb until the events predicted occurred. When he returned to the people, his demeanour and appearance

spoke of as mighty encounter - but as the angel had said he was totally dumb.


Six months later Elizabeth conceived. It was not until after the boy's birth, and Zechariah's written confirmation as to his name (not a family name) that the power of speech returned. Filled with the Spirit he then prophesied with words that have been used in Christian worship ever since. They are found in Luke 1:67 - 79, and since the days of the Latin prayer book have often been known as "The Benedictus." In beautiful and powerful words he speaks of his son's role in revealing God to the people, and paving the way for the one who would follow - his cousin, Jesus.

Tradition has it that these events took place in a village near Bethlehem, known as "Ein Karem" meaning "Gracious Spring.". Today this is a suburb of Jerusalem. Now there is Franciscan monastery there, centred on a cave, which, it is claimed, was John's birth place. Nearby there is a hollowed

rock, that mediaeval tradition asserts was a place Zechariah hid his family from Herod, when that brutal ruler ordered the slaying of all the young boys in the region. The Biblical account of Zechariah closes after the Benedictus. Tradition has it that he was later murdered in the temple at the command of Herod. Both Matthew and Luke record Jesus making reference to a Zechariah, who was murdered in the temple, so this may well be the fact.

As with many Biblical characters, he appears briefly, and then we know no more. However, in his case he has bequeathed a hymn of worship that has been loved by millions down through the centuries. Zechariah had a life that was unspectacular, and devout. It was this training and acquiring of holy habits that allowed him to respond to the Lord (albeit with some protest!) in the way that he did when the moment came.

As we may pray, "Your kingdom come, Your will be done", we too are asking the Lord so to govern the mundane details of our lives, that we are prepared for the unknown challenge or opportunity when it comes. There is no substitute for quiet faithfulness.

6 months in Kenya by Jennifer Booth



On the 5th of January I am leaving from Heathrow airport and, after an 11.5 hour flight, will arrive in Jomo Kenyatta International airport in Nairobi, Kenya. I will be spending 6 months based in Nairobi working with a Christian organisation called South West Youth Ministries. During this time I will be working with the underprivileged children, carrying out work in the slums, with the street children, in orphanages, schools and churches. There may also be a chance for me to travel to Tanzania and Uganda and carry out work there.

I am really looking forward to this amazing opportunity to help those who are less fortunate then us and although I know there will be times when it is hard I am sure this experience will really build me up in my faith as well as allowing me to experience the different ways people from other cultures live.

I am so excited about being able to go out and work with the young children over there, sharing my faith with them through music, teachings, helping them to learn English (as well as them teaching me Swahili so I can communicate in their language too) and possibly doing some sports coaching.

Apparently even though the children have so little they are always happy and smiling and really grateful for what they do have. I am sure I will have so much to learn from them as well!

I would like to thank all of you who have supported me financially enabling me to carry out this work that I have felt called to do. While I am in Kenya I would really appreciate prayer support for all the work we will be carrying out so that we all have the courage, the knowledge and the ability to help those we are working with.

Having had my first Swahili lesson I feel *slightly* more prepared for going away but I still find it hard to believe how soon I will be leaving! Although really looking forward to going to Kenya, I am also feeling quite scared about being away from home, and everyone I know and love, for so long. I think that homesickness will be one of my main struggles so lots of prayer support for this too please!!

It has been suggested that we take gifts, such as pens or pencils, to leave for the children there so if anybody has any spare ones lying around that they'd like to donate it would be much appreciated!




