

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS,--

A Happy New Year to all readers!

May I remind all concerned that in order to be entitled to vote at the annual meeting which elects the Church Council for the coming year, names must be placed upon the Electoral Roll by filling up the necessary form. The form can be obtained from Mr. Huntley and should be signed at least 14 days before the meeting.

The date of the Parochial Church Meeting will be Tuesday, Jan. 25, at 8 p.m. in school. The Vestry Meeting will precede it at 7.45 p.m. It is hoped that there will be a good attendance. It is important to remember that no nomination can be accepted unless either the candidate is present at the meeting or the proposer can guarantee that his candidate will stand if elected. All candidates must be on the Electoral Roll and be communicants of 21 years of age.

A hopeful beginning has been made in the forming of a communicants' guild, and it is hoped that all those who have helped in the formation of it will become a strong force for good in our parish. The object of the guild is to set a higher standard of Christian life by living it, and it is with this object that the rules of the guild have been drawn up. At present we have admitted no members at all, for nobody can actually become a member until he has joined on probation for 3 months, and at the end of that time can conscientiously undertake to keep the rules, having already kept them during his probation.

This arrangement is intended to prevent the membership of those who are not

whole-hearted and really keen.

Cards will shortly be distributed to intending members containing the Guild Prayer and the Rule of Life.

Mrs. Barrick (New Totley) has been appointed to act as secretary.

An old friend of mine in Repton, who is the Derbyshire secretary for the Oxford Mission to Calcutta, has asked for our prayers and our help for that mission on Jan. 6 (Epiphany). At the 7.30 celebration of Holy Communion on that day we shall therefore make special mention of this work, and I hope to be able to send a contribution to the funds. Anyone who cannot be present at the service may send me a small donation to forward with the collection.

#### OUR SISTER PARISH,

Referring to 2 donations sent from Totley to All Saints', Watrous, the Rev. B. J. Pasterfield writes :-

"Thank you very much for it. I have paid it over to our Mortgage Fund, and with the proceeds of our sale of work we have been able to clear off the mortgage. It is really wonderful how well things are going. We opened a Fund here for the stuccoing of the church and have passed the 500-dollar (about £100) mark, and with that we have built a porch, a small vestry for my use, and another for the organ on each side of the chancel and stuccoed the whole building. We are waiting for some more money to come in, and then we shall be able to finish the interior of these additions. Next year we hope to stucco the vicarage, which will make it a good deal warmer. . . I think that I will hold this second amount you have sent, and if we are able to get all we want from the Parish to complete the work I think I will use it and the next amount also for Riddels \* for the altar."

\* (Riddels are curtains such as we have round our own altar in Totley.)

Mr. Pasterfield concludes:—

"With all good wishes to you and your people and many thanks for the help they are sending so regularly."

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

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS, By the time this letter is published the Annual Meeting will have taken place, and the Church officers for the new year will have been elected, and so first of all I must welcome them into office and express the hope that all will do their best to deserve the trust which has been placed in them. I know that most of these positions are concerned largely with the business side of Church life, but it must be remembered that this is not the most important side of it, and that a Church officer's first duty is to set a high example in the parish. I should like to see all Church officers this year not only regular in attending meetings and carrying out their specific duties, but also giving a clear lead in such matters as Church attendance and regular communion:

As previously announced, the Bishop of Derby will hold a Confirmation in Totley Church early in May, and the names of all intending candidates should be sent to me at once. It will be three years before another Confirmation can be held in our own Church, and there must be a good number who will wish to take this opportunity. I hope to arrange a class for adults at a time which is convenient for them to attend as well as a class for younger candidates. It is very important that all should attend the whole series of classes, as otherwise the course of instruction is broken and really important subjects omitted. May I also remind any who are not quite decided about being confirmed that they can come to the classes and make up their minds nearer the time. As to the right age for Confirmation much depends upon the individual, but I am sure it is a mistake to allow a child to leave school before being confirmed. Evidence from many quarters is showing that early confirmations actually result in a greater number of regular communicants. At the same time I hope no one will hold back on the ground that he is too old, for it is a fine witness for Christ when a grown-up person shows the sincerity and courage necessary to take this step.

I ask all members of the parish to remember in your prayers all those who are preparing for this great Gift, and also to give them the encouragement of your own example in being consistent and regular in the use of your Christian privileges.

Sunday School Stall.—The Sunday School teachers organized and carried out a Sale of Toys, etc., in School, on Monday, December 20. We owe our thanks to them for their enterprise, and also for their very excellent work during the year and their untiring interest in all that concerns the welfare of the children of the parish.

#### ITEMS OF LOCAL INTEREST.

Sheffield Hospitals.—"Penny in the £ Fund." The Whist Drive held on Thursday, December 2, was a successful function. During the evening Miss Gillott, a member of the Hospital's Council, gave an illuminating address on the needs of hospitals, especially dealing with the new Women's Section at Norton Park. The amount of money wanted for purchasing the linen will be at least £1,000, towards which a special effort is being made in Sheffield and district. The profit from the Whist Drive was £8, and this will be credited to the Linen Fund.

The annual public meeting of the Totley and District Branch will be held in Totley School on Wednesday, February 16, at 8 o'clock. Contributors and supporters of Voluntary Hospital work will be most welcome. The election of the Committee for the ensuing year will take place, and the hope is expressed that many keen and willing helpers will come forward and help in this most desirable work.

Totley Allotment and Horticultural Society. It is to be regretted that the Show held last August had a deficit of about £60. The Committee are working very hard in various ways to clear it off, and would welcome any financial help towards this end.

Totley Football Club.—The Carnival Dance on Boxing Night, December 27, proved a great attraction. The attendance was large, and the financial result, viz. £13 1s. 9d. profit, a very welcome addition to the funds.

Through the kindness of Miss Anderson, Dore Road, a splendid hut has been acquired at a very favourable cost for the Totley Cricket and Football Clubs. By permission of the Parish Council it has been fixed on the Recreation Ground, Totley Bents, where it will meet a great need for the two Clubs.

Meetings are being held by the various Totley Sports sections with a view to amalgamation. There will be a united meeting in February, when the final issue will be decided.

It is proposed to hold a Sports Carnival on August Bank Holiday Monday, to raise money towards a Totley Sports and Social hut or building.

The Lending Library is increasing in its usefulness. There are now over sixty books taken out every week. Distributing night, Saturday, time 6.15 to 7.30. We thank Mr. Meredith, of Totley, for numerous bound volumes of the Engineer, Engineering, etc., etc.

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



#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS.-

Once more we are on the threshold of Lent and I hope that all of us will try to make this season a time of real spiritual progress. It is impossible to lay down a uniform rule for keeping Lent which would meet the needs of everybody, but at least the Church can and does direct us all to use it as a time of abstinence from some of the things which we allow ourselves to enjoy at other times. The purpose of this is to help us to fix our thoughts more earnestly upon the things that matter—the things of God and the

things of the spirit.

I therefore invite you to come to the special services in church on Wednesday evenings which in past years have been fairly well attended. As usual during Lent all parochial entertainments, dances, etc., will be discontinued, and in order that our various funds may not suffer I invite you to join a Lent offering scheme which last year met with a generous response. The scheme is as follows: We ask for promises of not less than I day's income to be given to any of the Church funds. If less than forty promises are received the scheme will not be put in operation at all, and so it is in your hands to make sure that the forty names are forthcoming.

Each contributor may allocate his gift to whatever purpose he prefers—some will, no doubt, wish to help the Choir stalls fund, others the Vicarage, others again may prefer to help our Sunday School or our sister parish. But the principle is the same—it is a free gift to God. The names of subscribers will not be published.

Again I hope that parishioners who wish to borrow books of a serious nature for Lent reading will make use of any that I can lend them.

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

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

May I draw your attention to the services arranged for Holy Week and Easter,

and express the hope that you will all make the most of this holy season.

It is now just over a year since the Mission, and we shall do well to call to mind the lessons we learnt and the resolutions we made at that time. I cannot help thinking that if all those resolutions were being faithfully kept, we should see a far larger number of communicants each Sunday than is actually the case. It is easy enough to be carried away by the novelty and the special interest which a Mission creates, but the real test of the sincerity with which we received our message is found in the perseverance with which we follow it up afterwards. The good seed of the Word was undoubtedly sown in Totley during that memorable week. Some fell on good ground and has grown, and is still growing; but some also must have fallen by the wayside, among thorns or in stony places, or there would have been more fruit by this time.

I suggest that during these closing days of Lent we should all remember the Mission, its lessons and the resolves we made, and step out again upon the road with fresh

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

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

The event of outstanding importance this month is the Confirmation Service which will take place on Friday, May 6, at 7.30 p.m. This service is one which concerns the whole parish, for a parish is a family, and a Confirmation is the "coming of age' of a number of the members of it. I ask you all, therefore, to remember in your prayers those who are to be confirmed. I hope all the members of the choir will try to be present at the Confirmation Service, and that a good congregation will also be This will probably be the last official visit of the Lord Bishop of Derby, though we all hope to have him with us many times again.

Next I would point out the services for Ascension Day (see Calendar). Children's Service will be held primarily for the Day School, but there will be room in Church for a few others; and we invite parents and friends to come if they can.

The Church Council have asked me to make a request that regular members of the congregation will try to remember to bring their own Prayer Books to Church, especially on Sunday evenings. The supply of books at Church is too small to go round, and it will be an expensive matter to provide sufficient for everybody. We have so little money to spare for anything except the most pressing needs that I hope, with your help, to avoid adding to our burdens, at least for some time.

It is important that everyone should understand the financial position of the parish. It is true, of course, that the Church is paid for, but that does not mean that the parish is "a going concern." The question of a vicarage is very urgent indeed, for it must be made quite clear that the house which I occupy is merely rented privately and is not the property of the parish. Before another vicar can be appointed it is absolutely essential that there should be a house for him. It was only as a temporary measure that the late Bishop permitted me to provide my own house, and on the clear understanding that the vicarage scheme should be pushed on as quickly as possible. I sincerely hope to have the pleasure and privilege of being your vicar for many years to come, and it doesn't matter very much whether I ever live in a permanent vicarage or not, but it is my business to see that the scheme is complete at least during my incumbency, and to raise the necessary money to do this even in a few years means that we must set to work as hard as we did for the building of the Church.

So far as the choir stalls are concerned we still need a little over £100 before they can be completed; and also it is being found necessary to open a fund for certain serious alterations to the action of the organ which has never been entirely satisfactory,

From this you will see how essential it is that all of us should help in every way we

can to increase our revenue and to keep down every unnecessary expense.

Before I close I should like to express my deep appreciation of the kindness and sympathy which I have received from so many of you in my recent trouble. Your faithful friend and servant,

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

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

On Whit-Sunday we hope to welcome those of our congregation who have recently been confirmed to their first Communion, and I hope that you will all remember them in your prayers at that time. Remember, too, that nothing is so likely to help them to become regular and devout communicants as the example and encouragement given to them by others, especially by their own friends. So, too, nothing is so likely to hinder them and keep them back as the slackness of others. Example is infectious, whether it be good or bad, and it is your example that will count in helping or hinder-When we find so many young communicants falling away ing these children of God. the reason is not far to seek. It is generally because they are content to do as their parents and elder brothers and sisters do. You can either give a helping hand or your neglect cause one of God's little ones to stumble.

There will not be another Confirmation in our Church until 1930, but that does not mean that those who wish to be confirmed must wait so long. I shall be glad to receive the names of any candidates (especially adults) who would like to begin their preparation in the coming winter and be confirmed at a neighbouring church next year. It is important that names should be sent in in good time and not after a course of instruction has begun.

It is with deep regret that we record below the death of Mr. Thomas Pearson, who has been our Verger since the consecration of the Church. He was one of the earliest supporters of the Mission and a regular member of the Mission Choir. He served on the Building Committee and on the Church Council, and has, in fact, been a keen worker at every stage in the history of this parish. 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

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS,-

As most of you know, the scheme for dividing our diocese is now practically complete and in a very short time we shall find ourselves part of the new Diocese of Derby. We ask for your prayers that a "faithful and true pastor" may be appointed to rule over us and that the blessing of God may rest upon this new venture.

I should also like to commend to all earnest Churchpeople the thoughtful study of the Revised Prayer Book. There is every indication that it will be accepted by the Church of England generally, and it is quite right that the laity should be familiar

with the proposals which it contains.

People who have never read it and who have made no serious attempt to understand it are not in a position to criticize or take sides upon a matter like this, and therefore I suggest that every one concerned and particularly members of the Church Council should get to know at first hand the contents of the book, and not allow their opinions to be formed for them by the correspondence columns of the daily press. It is hardly to be expected that any one section of thought in the Church of England will find in it exactly what they would like, but it is at least an honest and sincere attempt to meet the devotional needs of reasonable people and should be given respectful and patient consideration.

The extract from Mrs. Pasterfield's letter which is printed below will help to remind us of the great need of the Church abroad for our constant prayers and support. In order to encourage a deeper interest in the work of overseas missions I hope to circulate a missionary magazine in the near future, and shall be glad to receive the names of all who would like to take one. #### OUR SISTER PARISH.

#### Extracts from Mrs. Pasterfield's Letter.

"I am so thankful to be able to tell you that my husband is recovering from his illness. He was in the hospital five weeks and then went to Victoria on Vancouver It was essential that he got away from the altitude of the prairie and to sealevel. The doctor has said he is to do no work for six months, and as the diocese has granted him leave for two, our present prospects are quite vague.

"You would like to know how the parish is getting along. Of course there is no such thing as a spare priest—our Archdeacon came up to look into things at the beginning of my husband's illness, early in Lent, and we had a visit from the Rural Dean, but those are the only times we have had Holy Communion. However, we have a man living in Watrons who was once a student at Emmanuel College, Saskatoon

... he has consented to take Evensong every Sunday until June (when he will be too busy) so that the Church has not been closed altogether, which is a great deal to be thankful for... I must tell you how the altar, which has been put in place of the rough temporary one we had, has improved the chancel, and soon we hope to have the riddel posts up, which have been almost entirely paid for by your kind gifts to us. It should be possible to get a photograph taken when it is finished, and you will see how it looks."

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

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS.-

I write this month to invite the help of all parishioners and friends in a determined effort to push on the work of our Church. In past years we have held annually bazaars, summer fairs and other similar ventures. This year the Church Council have decided to try a bolder experiment. It is simple enough. We want to ensure that the collections on November 6, which is the Sunday after All Saints' Day, shall total not less than £200. And this is how we think it can be done. We ask everyone who would have helped at a bazaar to work out how much a bazaar would have cost them, and to give that sum in the collection on November 6. Think of the money you usually spend in equipping a stall, think of the small sums you would spend in teas, whist tickets and also the money you would spend at a bazaar (often on things which you don't really want), and you will find that it is quite a handsome total. That is what a bazaar would have cost you, and that is what you are asked to put on our side before All Saints' Day.

As you know, we still need £100 to complete the Choir Stalls, but we have decided not to wait for it, but to put the work in hand as soon as possible, so that it may be actually finished in time for All Saints' Day. It is a venture of faith. We believe that the money will be forthcoming because we rely upon you and your generosity. I think there will be a good many of you who will agree that this is a far better and easier way of giving than to spend months in working for a bazaar and then having all the risk and all the expense which a bazaar always involves.

all the risk and all the expense which a bazaar always involves.

We therefore ask everybody who reads this letter to help as they have always done, to give as they always give, and to smile as they have always smiled when they have made sacrifices in past years.

I have no doubt that we shall do as much and perhaps more than we have set out to do.

This parish is more fortunate than many in possessing a Church Day School. This is a very valuable asset, one which we are bound to hold fast, in order that Church teaching may be given to the children. It is a department of Church life, and as such becomes our responsibility as Churchpeople. During the last year or so the revenue of the Managers has greatly decreased, mainly because that income is derived from the letting of the buildings for entertainments, etc., which are now being held elsewhere. To help to meet this deficiency the collections in Church on the first Sunday in September will be given to the School Managers, and I hope that you will all respond to this important appeal.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

I hope you have read carefully my letter last month and have resolved to do all you can to forward our scheme for raising £200. The Church Council have decided to issue to all churchpeople special envelopes in which to put by their offering between now and November 1, and it is hoped that all these envelopes will be handed in to a church officer, or (better still) placed in the collection in Church at the services of our All Saints' Festival. Arrangements will be made to call for the envelopes if desired. Many of our congregation live outside the boundaries of Totley parish and they are asked to obtain their envelopes at Church. 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

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

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

In a few days we shall be keeping our festival of All Saints. Think of it as the beginning of a new year—a birthday. Try to make it the beginning of a better year in which you yourself are going to be a more wholehearted member of Christ, the King of Saints.

I want you to think of the things that have happened during these first three years of the history of your church, especially of the things that have happened to you. Have you any progress to record during that time. You are three years older you have three years more experience of God and His ways—you have had three years full of opportunity. What have you got to show for those three years?

Some of you have been confirmed during those years. Most of you had the experience of that wonderful week of the Teaching Mission, and at least seventy of you still possess (if you have not lost it) the little card which you received from the Missioner to remind you of a solemn resolution by which you offered yourself afresh to the service of God.

And where do you stand?

Are you still as regular at Holy Communion as you were at first; are you still keeping the resolutions you have made; are you still always in your place in church? You, I mean, who once upon a time scarcely missed a single service?

And if not, am I not right when I tell you that you are not nearly as happy as

you were then?

Please do not think that I am pessimistic. On the other hand, I have plenty of evidence that real progress has been made; I know by unmistakeable signs that there are some who are growing in grace and nearness to God; but I know, too, that there are others who have begun to let go, at first only in little things, but who are slowly drifting and falling back. You yourself know best whether this is true of your own case, and if it is true of you, then no one knows better than yourself how much you have lost of the happiness that really counts.

Let us go to the root of things. When we fall away from God and become slack and lazy and indifferent there is always a reason. Something has come between us and God. Sometimes it is a fancied grievance, sometimes it is some worldly interest on which we have set our hearts, and we cannot serve two masters or worship two gods; sometimes it is some deeper darker thing than any of these—some unrepented, unforgiven sin of which we know but which we will not own. It is for one of many reasons that good people with high ideals—people called to be saints and wanting in their hearts to obey the call-yet find themselves letting go and falling back.

There is always a reason, and generally a perfectly simple reason, when churchgoers cease to go to church and communicants give up their communions; but it is always something in ourselves—never the fault of God. The blessings we once enjoyed are still there—waiting.

This Festival is our birthday-our time of fresh beginnings. If you have fallen away God wants you back. If you have never fairly begun God is saying "Follow Me."

Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward.

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
