

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

A Happy New Year to all readers.

I hope that all who are eligible have taken the necessary steps to place their names on the Electoral Roll. The Annual Meeting for the election of officers for 1928, together with the Vestry Meeting, will be held in Totley School on Tuesday, January 31. This year every parish will elect its own representative on the Diocesan Conference as well as to the Ruri-Decanal Conference. This is made possible by the creation of the new Diocese of Derby.

I hope that all qualified electors will be present and use their votes to secure the best possible Church Council for the new year.

There is no doubt that the keenest Churchpeople make the most efficient councillors and officers, and I sincerely hope that you will bear this fact in mind when exercising your votes.

The principal purpose of all Church organizations is to further the spiritual work of the Church and it is therefore essential that all who are elected should be those who will really try to lead by their own example.

I have mentioned recently that there will be Classes this year for adult candidates for Confirmation. I now announce that they will begin on January 18 (Wednesday) in Church at 8 p.m. Any person who has not made up his mind to be confirmed is invited to the classes and in no way commits himself by coming.

But there is one point that should be made quite clear. Confirmation is not just a matter of form—it is a very serious step and should only be contemplated by those who are prepared to take it seriously.

It is no use being confirmed unless you really intend to be a regular communicant and churchgoer afterwards. Confirmation is a gift from God, but it is a gift which you are meant to use when you have got it. The classes will not only help you to understand, but they provide a test of earnestness. Those who cannot make time to attend the classes would probably find that they could not make time for their communions too and so I make no apology for the length of the course of instructions. I can only present to the Bishop those who are really sincere in their desire for this Gift of God and who show their sincerity by their regular attendance at the classes. It will be necessary for all candidates to attend one evening a week for many weeks and to put other engagements on one side. In this way the classes will help them to test whether the things of God are the first and biggest things, and if they are not, it is much better to defer this important step.

Since my last letter I have heard from our friend, Rev. B. J. Pastorfield, that he has left our sister parish of Watrons and is taking up new work at Holy Trinity, Kamsack. We are all sorry that his health has made this necessary and our prayers and good wishes

go with him. We welcome in his place as Vicar of All Saints, Watrons, Rev. R. C. Matthews. I have written to Mr. Matthews and hope shortly to publish a message from him to his well-wishers in Totley. Please remember him and his parish in your prayers.

May she rest in peace.

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

You will find elsewhere in this number the names of the church officers elected at the annual meeting. To them I extend in your name a hearty welcome, and express the hope that they may find plenty to do and a real joy in doing it.

Attention has been drawn to the fact that this Magazine does not pay its way. About 200 copies are in circulation, and the advertisement page brings in a small additional revenue. The total proceeds are not nearly equal to the actual cost price. This of course is nobody's fault, but the fact remains that the Magazine does not and cannot pay at 1½d. per copy. We do not want to raise the price, because by so doing we might possibly reduce the number of copies sold and narrow the circle of readers; as an alternative to this, we appeal to the generosity of those who would be prepared to raise their own subscription. It is hoped that a number of readers will voluntarily give an extra shilling per year as a donation to the fund, and so help to reduce the annual loss which we can so ill afford.

You will notice that the collections on Hospital Sunday were slightly larger than last year. As a matter of fact, the sum collected last, had to be made up considerably from other church funds, whereas this year it was unnecessary to do so. This is very encouraging, especially in view of the unkindness of the weather on the day in question. The work of our hospitals is one which appeals to all Christian people, and it is good to know that the local hospitals' committee has made very sound progress during the year. If there are any of our readers who would like to help in a very practical way, there is now room for one or two additional collectors under the "Penny in the £" scheme, and I know that our excellent secretary (Mr. Crookes) would be very glad to hear of volunteers.

This is not exciting work, but it is very useful and very Christian, and I hope that some will see in it a call to service, and answer it.

The total proceeds will be noted in our next number.

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

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

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

It occurs to me that possibly some of you who read this Magazine may have been disturbed in your minds by the recent statements made by Sir Arthur Keith and freely discussed in the daily press, and I feel that a word or two on this subject might be of help.

Sir Arthur Keith is a great scientist, he knows a great deal more than you or I about his own subject, and therefore, when he speaks about his own subject, we should listen to him with respect; but when he begins to discuss another subject which lies quite outside the province of scientific investigation, then his opinions are of very slight importance.

He tells us that he can find no scientific evidence for the survival of the soul after death. Personally I should be very much surprised if he or any other scientist did find any such evidence. Christian people do not look for it, because it belongs to the realm of things which are past man's finding out. But we believe in the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come because we believe that our Lord Jesus Christ rose Himself from the dead and is alive for evermore. The Christian is the man who believes that and acts upon it. Jesus Himself is the Foundation Stone of our belief. S. Paul admits that "if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain," and that "If the dead rise not, then is not Christ raised."

If you ask me, then, what evidence I have for believing in immortality, I can only answer that Jesus is the only evidence. If Jesus really rose again, the unbelief of Sir Arthur Keith and any other scientists, however eminent, is beside the point. This, then, is my advice to you, if your belief in the future life is made difficult and you begin to doubt the truth of it.

Turn to the Gospels and read over again the accounts of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Remember that the men who wrote those accounts are men who were ready to die for their belief in Him, and that they wrote down, not their opinions, but the plain story of things they had seen themselves.

They were witnesses giving their evidence. S. Paul speaks of more than five hundred brethren who had seen the risen Jesus. S. Peter says, "Witnesses chosen of God, even unto us, who did eat and drink with Him after He rose from the dead."

If you want evidence of the resurrection you have witnesses in plenty, witnesses whose sincerity you cannot doubt. If these witnesses are speaking the truth, if the Apostles and those five hundred brethren really saw Jesus after His Resurrection, if S. Peter and others really did eat and drink with Him after He rose from the dead, then, in spite of his great learning, there is still something left for Sir Arthur Keith to learn.

There are things which are hidden from the wise and prudent, but which God has revealed unto babes, and there is no need for panic because the wise and prudent cannot see them.

And then, lastly, there is one more kind of evidence for the resurrection, perhaps the strongest of all, and it is the fact that Jesus is a living Power in the world to-day.

If there is no life after death, Jesus is dead and His power is at an end; and if

Jesus is dead, how do we account for the lives He is changing, the weak He is strengthening, the prayers He is answering, the miracles He is working every day? A dead Christ cannot do these things, and yet they are being done.

They are the signs that follow them that believe—signs, proofs, evidence that Jesus who was crucified is not dead, but living.

It is not my custom to preach sermons in my letter to the Parish Magazine, but perhaps you will forgive me this time, especially if these few thoughts should prove useful to any reader who may be in need of the help they are intended to give.

Please Note that the Vicar hopes to be away for a few days from June 18 (Monday).

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

You will remember that last year we made a special appeal on the first Sunday in September for the funds of our Day School. The Church Council has again agreed to devote the collections on the same Sunday this year to this purpose. It is also intended to circulate this appeal among the parents of the children attending the school, and the envelopes should be returned on or before Sunday, September 2, either to the head-master or myself, or put in the church collection. I do not want to frighten you by exaggerating the financial position of the school, but it is necessary that all who value the great privilege of this spiritual asset to the Church and village should know that it is very necessary to have a reserve fund to meet the reasonable demands of education authorities.

I would remind you that the Roman Catholics have not only never lost a school, but are fast building new ones, because they know the importance of the religious training which can be given to children. The Church of England has fallen far behind and neglected this great opportunity—many Church schools have been allowed to fall into disrepair and so have been condemned, and many are going the same way. I am very anxious that this shall never happen here; but it will happen, and perhaps before long, unless the managers are put in a position to keep it up to date and thoroughly efficient.

The Derbyshire Church Schools Association is trying to raise a large fund to meet emergencies such as this; but even if it is successful in so doing the only schools which can reasonably expect assistance are those which have seriously tried to help themselves.

Our income from the letting of the school is going down steadily through no fault of ours, and therefore the loss must be made good from other sources, and the only source available is the generosity of those Totley people who are determined to make sacrifices rather than lose their Church school.

If you want the children to be taught the faith of the Church you must give generously each year to the collection on Day School Sunday. Let us try to get not less than £25 this year. Don't count on the other fellow doing his share—very likely he won't—but do yours and a bit over to make up for what the other fellow won't do.

It is God's work and a privilege to be able to do it, so let us just shoulder our burdens and do the best we can.

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

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

You will remember that last year we made a special appeal on All Saints' Day and the Sunday following for a collection large enough to take the place of a Bazaar. It is my hope that this will be repeated at our Patronal Festival this year too, and I want to ask you to begin now to prepare for it. Last year we collected £100, a very fine response from the members of our congregation, and we must try to do as well or better this year. It is a great encouragement to know that the Ecclesiastical Commissioners have already given us £200 to supplement a similar sum sent to them for the Vicarage Fund, and I have every reason to believe that they will continue to help us in the same way.

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

You must please forgive me for writing again upon the subject of our special appeal in November. It is only by keeping it in mind that we can hope to make it successful.

The Church Council have agreed to issue collecting envelopes to all church-people, and it is hoped that every one of them will be used. I cannot point out too strongly that the success of the appeal depends on each one of you. We are not expecting anything to be done for us, except just what we do ourselves. As you know, the Church people in Totley are only a small proportion of the population, and if the £200 for which we are asking is to be raised, every penny of it will have to come from this number. It is, therefore, important that we should face the question in a spirit of determination. We have shown once what we can do when we mean to do it—we collected last year £100 amongst ourselves with practically no assistance from outside, and I hope we are going to show that we are able to beat our own record this year. Let us begin now to put on one side what we can afford and do it week by week. There are some of us who can afford much more than others, there are some who will have to make a very real sacrifice to give even a small sum, but God measures the gift by the sacrifice and does not despise the smallest offering if it is the best we can do. I hope each one of you will say to yourself "We are out for £200 and it is not going to be my fault if we get a penny less."

* * * * *

A new venture is being launched in the parish which I hope will be greatly blessed—namely, the forming of a Missionary Guild for young people. I have written about this in a previous Magazine; but by the time this number is published the first meeting will have taken place.

At present we are forming a class for girls only and inviting those between the ages of 14—21. The meetings are held in the Church room and are under the direction of Miss Dakin, to whom application for membership should be made.

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

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

My first remarks must be about our All Saints' Festival which we celebrated last month. In many ways it was a very happy and encouraging time, but I cannot help feeling that it is not yet what a Patronal Festival ought to be. I think if it were fully recognized by all that this event is our annual Family gathering, the congregations at all services would be larger and the number of communicants much greater. I still hope to see some day a Patronal Festival in Totley when every communicant will make his communion and every churchman will come to church.

I cannot express too strongly my appreciation of the work of the choir in their rendering of the services and of the hours of practice which they so willingly gave beforehand.

I must also thank all those who gave their services in distributing the Appeal envelopes. With regard to the latter I cannot help thinking that a large number have been overlooked. I wish I were as optimistic about them as the lady in the old nursery rhyme: "Let them alone and they'll come home and bring their tails behind them!"

The result of our special appeal was a total of £72. Many thanks to all who had a share in this, but I do hope that those others, whose envelopes have not been returned, and who have not made their contribution, will remember that this effort was intended to take the place of a Bazaar, and that good as it is, it has not nearly done so. Next I want to mention that on the three Wednesdays in Advent, viz.: December 5, 12, and 19, there will be a service in Church at 7.45 p.m. It will consist of Evening Prayer with Intercessions and a short address (no hymns or other music), and I hope some of you will try to come.

Lastly, I regret to have to record the loss of three parishioners who have passed away during the last month. We extend our deepest sympathy to the relatives of Mrs. S. V. Green, Miss Esther Blake, and Miss Laura Hardy, all of whom were well known to most of us. For some years Miss Blake has been intimately connected with the management of our Church School, and her many kindnesses to the children will be long remembered. Miss Hardy was one of those whose connection with church work dates from the days of the Mission, and only her failing health has prevented her from being one of our most regular worshippers and helpers in parish work. May they rest in peace, and may God comfort and bless those they leave behind.
