



#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

You will see from the calendar above that there will be special weekday services on Wednesdays in Lent. These services have been fairly well attended in past years, and I hope you will all try to take advantage of them again. As usual, all entertainments, dances, etc., in connection with the church will be discontinued in order to mark the penitential character of the season, and I hope you will try to enter into the spirit of Lent and make full use of its spiritual opportunities. Lent should be for all Churchpeople a time of quiet thoughtfulness and renewal. We should take ourselves more firmly in hand, and learn something of the art of "doing without." We should try to make more of our prayers, find more time for Bible study and devotional reading, and above all find time to think deeply and earnestly about those things that are so important but which it is so easy to forget in the hurry of a busy life.

I shall be glad to help you by lending suitable books or by advising you of

books to buy.

Especially I recommend a series of little books by Father Vernon which are simple and to the point. Here are the title of some of them. (1) Happiness. (2) The Heart of Religion. (3) Self Expression. The last mentioned deals mainly with prayer, and is probably just what many of you are wanting. (Any of these will most likely be in stock at Messrs. Walker's, Division St., Sheffield. All are quite inexpensive.)

Another matter must now be mentioned. For a long time there have been a few members of Totley parish attached to the S. John's branch of the Mothers' Union. Arrangements have now been made to form our members into a subsection. They will still continue to meet together with the S. John's branch and will be part of it, but from now onwards this section will be a regular part of our own parish organization and new members are invited to join. The enrolling member for the branch is Mrs. Davenport (Dore), but names of intending new members may be given to Mrs. Crowther (New Totley), who will forward them.

Again I ask for your prayers on behalf of the parish of All Saints', Watrous, Canada. Another change has taken place there. The Vicar (Rev. R. C. Matthews) has written to say that he has been appointed Rector of Raymore, and that a new vicar (Mr. Hewitt) has come to Watrous. I am writing to the new vicar and hope to continue our connection with his parish as before.

I understand that the new chancel at Watrous is now paid for and that only a small debt on the vestry remains. You will see from the statement below (Vicar and Wardens' Fund) the sums contributed by Totley Church in 1928 to help our sister church.





#### VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS,-

I am glad to be able to tell you a piece of welcome news; namely, that the Ecclesiastical Commissioners have again granted us the sum of £200 to meet a similar contribution from our funds towards the Vicarage. This means that we have now £800 in the Bank of England. It is my hope that each year we may be in a position to apply for a grant until this necessary job is complete, and so I venture to ask you to continue to give your generous support to all our Vicarage Fund efforts in view of the encouraging fact that we are about half-way there.

I was extremely sorry to have to cancel so many of the Holy Week Services. I am very grateful to Mr. Foulstone and to the Sheffield Cathedral clergy, who

very kindly stepped in and kept things going.

It will interest some of you to know that a Cricket Club is being formed for the choir-boys of our Church. 



MY DEAR FRIENDS,-The date of the special thanksgiving for the King's recovery is not yet decided, but we have reason to hope and expect that it will not be long delayed. The Church Council has decided that an opportunity shall be given to our congregation to make a thankoffering through the collection at the 11 o'clock service and that it shall be sent to the Sheffield Joint Hospitals. It is hoped that every one will make a point of being present and giving generously and thankfully.

It is still early to begin to speak of the events of next year, but I think it is not too soon to mention that we are expecting the Bishop to hold a confirmation in Totley Church in 1930. There should be a large number of young people ready to offer themselves for confirmation, and I hope also to have a class for adults.



MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

Which reminds me of the old story about the holiday-maker who was bidding farewell to the hotel proprietor at the end of a week at the seaside. 

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

Those of you who have heard or read the recent Pastoral Letter from the Archbishops will have noticed that in it great stress is laid upon the need for "sacred learning" in our church. The letter appeals to us all to take steps to meet this need. Churchpeople in general do not know nearly as much as they ought to know about their Church and their Bible, and as a result many of them are very easily thrown off their balance by the things they read in newspapers and other popular literature.

Their faith is shaken simply because they do not know how solid are the foundations upon which our religion rests. If they did know, it would take

much more than it does to disturb their faith.

"Let every parish be a school of sacred learning"—that is the appeal from our leaders, and I hope you will try to help me to make our parish a school of sacred learning. As a first step may I remind you of the existence of our Communicant's Guild. It is at present very small, but it is none the less very much alive, and it has been the aim of this guild to do this very thing which the Archbishops are asking us all to do. We meet every month in church, we begin with a short service of intercession, then comes about half an hour's study of some portion of scripture, or some definite religious question, and then we close with a few minutes' devoted to preparation for Communion on the following Sunday.

There are a certain number of enrolled members who have definitely promised to observe a simple rule of membership, but there are others who come to our meetings who have made and intend to make no such promise, but who prefer simply to associate themselves with the work of the Guild and to share in its

services and opportunities of study.

I can see no better way of acting upon the spirit of this Pastoral Letter than to ask more of you to join us at our Guild meetings. Come next time and if you are not interested you need not come again; but I think if you come once you

will probably find that you will want to come again.

There are questions that puzzle you. I can't preach about them because I don't know what they are; but you can ask that your question shall be the subject for study at one of our meetings and then every member will be given a month to think it over and study it, and it will be discussed as fully and helpfully as possible.



My DEAR FRIENDS,-



#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

Before this letter is published the bills announcing the services in connection with our Patronal Festival will be posted up, and I hope you will note the times of the services and make a special effort to come to them.

Again we appeal to all supporters and friends to make this an occasion of

a special thankoffering.

In order to help you to make up your mind what you ought to give let me remind you that we want £200. This is not simply a fancy figure—it is exactly what we are seriously asking for. Last year and the year before we were able to send to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners sums of £200, which were immediately doubled by grants and placed to our credit in the Bank of England.

I want to send a similar sum this year and get that doubled, too.

Another point is this. We are sparing you the trouble and expense of a Bazaar, but can only continue to do so if this annual £200 is forthcoming.

Quite frankly, I don't want any more Bazaars, but this is the only way to

avoid them.

It is a No-Bazaar effort, and if it does not take the place of a Bazaar then I see no alternative but to inflict one upon the parish.

With this dreadful threat hanging over us let us make a big push this time

in the hope that such a calamity may not overtake us!

I appeal specially to those readers who have not attended Church as regularly as they might have done to remember that we need their help, and that there have been many Sundays when their contribution has been missed.

Please count up these Sundays and include in your offering something at

least for each of them.

You will see from the Calendar that there will be special preachers on Friday, November 1, and on Sunday evening (November 3), and also, that there are alterations of Holy Communion during our Festival at times which should allow communicants to be present.

Let us try this year to have more communicants and larger congregations than we have ever had, and so make our birthday the occasion of a real family

gathering in the Church we love.



#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

You will see that the first of December is the first Sunday in Advent, the beginning of the Christian year. Advent is a season of preparation for the Christmas message and I hope you will try so use it in this spirit.

I believe that it is an old custom to begin to prepare the Christmas pudding at the beginning of Advent-a custom which was intended to remind us of the much more important duty of preparing our hearts for God's Christmas message.

There will be a special service in Church on Wednesday evenings in Advent at 7.45, with a series of short addresses, and I hope that a good number of you will try to come. Please make a note of it and arrange to keep those Wednesday evenings free from engagements.

I was very sorry that our old friend Canon Henson was not able to come on November 3, he was prevented at the last moment by illness. We were glad to make the acquaintance of a new friend on All Saints' Day, namely, Rev. H. Sherlock (S. Oswald's) who very kindly came to preach at our Festival service.

Church-goers will have noticed a considerable improvement in the tidiness of the churchyard. The church council have taken the step of appointing a paid gardener because it has proved impossible to keep pace with the task by voluntary labour. Naturally this means another tax upon our "Church Expenses" fund, and I hope that those who appreciate the improvement will remember that it can only continue so long as the collections for church expenses are sufficient.

May I once more remind you of the activities of our Communicants' Guild and invite those who have no intention of becoming members to come occasionally to our meetings. The December meeting will be held at 8 p.m. on Monday, December 2. (The special subject for study and discussion will be Acts ii, beginning at verse 14).

At our last meeting the Guild undertook as part of its work to provide the necessary funds for the washing of altar linen. For some time past the Guild has had a small fund for occasional gifts of flowers for the altar, and since more than enough for this purpose is being contributed they have decided to use the balance in the way mentioned.

Lastly I must speak of the Confirmation which is to be held in May.
