

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

We have come to the beginning of another year, and it is right that we should begin it first with the thought of God's goodness to us during the year that is gone, and then with a prayer for His blessing upon the days before us. A new year is always an adventure, it is like a voyage into the unknown; but for Christian people there is one certainty about it which sends us on our way hopeful and confident. We do not go alone, but with Jesus as our Leader and Companion all the way. "I am with you always." Let this be our thought for New Year's Day, and let our prayer be that we may keep closer to our Guide and Friend this year than we have done in the years that are past, for there will be no false steps if we follow Him.

Next I want to acknowledge with gratitude the kindness of a number of friends.

First, all those who have sent additional contributions to our November Appeal Fund, but whose names, of course, I may not mention. Secondly, those who have been responsible for various successful efforts on behalf of the Vicarage Fund. Two whist drives have been held in private houses—one by the kindness and enterprise of Mrs. Porter, and the other of Mrs. Partington and Mrs. Thompson. The proceeds were £3 17s. and £4. A further contribution of 17s. has been derived from the sale of artistic button-holes made by Miss Jean Lake, and I hear that Mrs. Ford is busy making and selling chutney in aid of the same fund. May I add to these all who have helped so generously and successfully in other parochial efforts during 1929 and express my thanks to them all.

I have applied once more to the Ecclesiastical Commission for a grant towards our Fund, and shall be able to send them £150 if our application is successful. In two previous years the Commissioners have doubled our contributions, and we have £800 in the Bank of England; if we are among the lucky parishes this year our Fund in June should have reached the respectable total of £1,100.

Once more I invite all those who wish to be confirmed this year to send me their names. The classes will begin on Sunday, February 2, in Church after the evening Service, and if there are any candidates who cannot attend on Sunday evenings I will make special arrangements to meet their case.

OUR SISTER PARISH. ALL SAINTS', WATROUS, CANADA.

I have received a long letter from Rev. J. Hewett (Vicar of Watrous), together with photos of his Church, which I propose to hang up in the porch. These views show the recent improvements and renovations to which we have contributed from our "Vicar and Wardens' Fund."

Mr. Hewett writes:

"During the summer I have almost lived in my car. I have been out visiting the country people and since the end of April I travelled 6,100 miles. The people are very kind and do appreciate a visit. In many parts of the province

there was practically no crop—the season was so dry and the crops were burnt up, but in this district we have been more fortunate. The crops were not big, but the farmers got a better price for their grain. The Harvest Thanksgiving

services here were splendid.

Taking things all round the parish is doing very well. The congregation is rather better than a year ago and people seem more interested and keen. . . We are building a small church at Manitou Lake, three miles from here. It is a summer resort, and during July and August there are easily 2,000 people at the Beach. . . . They have built a factory there . . . and they are also going to build a large sanatorium, so it is quite possible that there will be a number of people there all the year round. We had a site given to us, and the building firm who are erecting the sanatorium put in the foundation for our Church free of cost.'

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

On Sunday (February 2) the first of the series of Confirmation classes will be held in Church after the evening service. Up to the present I have not received a very large number of names, but am still hoping that one or two more

will be given to me before the classes begin.

I am also hoping that some of you who have been confirmed will think it worth while to attend these instructions, with a view to renewing the memory of your own confirmation and being reminded of the things "a Christian ought to know and believe to his soul's health." I am more than a little anxious about the "soul's health" of a good many of those who should be regular communicants. There are some who used to be much more regular than they are, and I cannot think that they are any happier in their own minds about it.

There is always a reason of course. Sometimes it is a good reason—a genuine obstacle such as ill-health or something equally unfortunate. But that is not the commonest reason. The reason which is most general is really that people

have somehow "cooled off" and are not as keen as they once were,

Just think what it means to be less keen about your communion. It means nothing less than that you are less keen about going to meet your Lord and Saviour, less keen about obeying His plain command, less keen about eternal life, less keen about seeking His kingdom and His righteousness.

There is no kindness in not speaking plainly about things like this, and I should be less your true friend than I wish to be if I did not say that the real reason why you are not as keen about your communion as you used to be is simply that you are losing your hold on God and eternal life.

And if you do not pull yourself together before the disease of spiritual paralysis has got a firm hold, you will certainly find that you have lost God Himself.

Religion without effort, sacrifice, and self-discipline, soon degenerates into

mere easy sentimentality, which is worse than useless.

The road to heaven is littered with people who have started out in high spirits and soon got tired, and now they are sitting by the roadside waiting for someone to give them a lift, and nobody ever will.

The only people for whom there is any hope of getting a lift are those who are on their feet plodding along. The others can sit where they are till the day

of judgment for all the help they will get.

I sometimes wonder what some of us will answer on the last day when we are asked, "What did you do for the kingdom of God; what effort did you make to obtain eternal life?" It won't be much of an answer if we have to be quite honest and say, "I sometimes sat by the fire in my armchair with a pipe in my mouth and listened to a broadcast sermon from S. Martin's-in-the-Fields." And really, when you come to think of it, there won't be much more

for some of us to say.

Religion isn't just "feeling good," it is nothing whatever to do with feeling; it is concerned with doing things; doing things that take a lot of doing; giving what takes a lot of sparing; giving up what costs a lot to give up; going on when you are ready to drop, and fighting when you are ready to give in. "To him that overcometh a crown of life shall be." Not least among the things we have got to overcome is this soul destroying inertia of the spirit, which is the

deadly enemy of all travellers on the heavenly road.

I hope my remarks will not be taken in any other spirit than that of sincere friendship; it is not my desire to offend, but simply to hold out a hand to a fellow traveller and say, "Come along, brother, I've seen you do better than that; get up and try again."

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

We have a few days only to make up our minds what we are going to do about MY DEAR FRIENDS,-Lent, and I would suggest that we should think of it as a special opportunity of reviving our spiritual life. We are largely creatures of habit and most of our faults and shortcomings are the result of slipping into a wrong groove and being too easy-going

to get out again.

The real purpose of Lent is to help us to get out of ruts and to break the power The only way to change a habit is to live by rule. The disciples of Jesus asked Him why they couldn't cast out an evil spirit, and He replied: "This sort goeth not out but by prayer and fasting." The secret of real spiritual power is a disciplined life. S. Paul says: "I keep under my body and have it in subjection," and he certainly means that he had to be severe with himself and make himself do many things which he did not find easy. We are not naturally inclined toward righteousness and holiness of life. We are fallen creatures with a strong tendency to do wrong. Our own inclinations have a downward pull, and we can only resist this downward pull by unceasing effort of the will assisted by the grace of God.

There are, then, two ways of living—only two—living by habit and living by rule. Following our own natural inclinations, or being led by the Spirit of God. And Lent is a six-weeks course of spiritual exercise intended to strengthen the spirit of man

to rise above his own inclinations You must make your own rules for Lent. I can offer suggestions, of course, such as setting yourself the definite task of reading some really helpful book or setting aside a fixed time for prayer, or definitely denying yourself some amusement or luxury, but the mainthing is to make a rule which breaks the habit of doing just what you feel like doing and helps you to conquer your own inclination.

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS, Please note carefully the times of services for Holy Week and Easter given in

the Calendar above.

Churchpeople should not need to be reminded of the solemn duty of all communicants to make their communion at the Easter Festival, and I hope that if there are any in this parish who for adequate reasons cannot do so at any of the services mentioned, they will let me have the opportunity of arranging other services for them.

With regard to the three hours' service on Good Friday, it should be remembered that it is so arranged that those who cannot stay for the whole of it may come in or go out during the singing of the hymns. If, therefore, you cannot spare three hours try to come for a part of the time.

On Sunday, March 16, Christian people all over the world united in prayer for their Christian brethren in Russia, and I feel that as your Vicar I ought to say something

about the situation there.

Whatever our political sympathies may be, we cannot escape the plain fact that the present rulers of Russia have decalred war upon God. They themselves are making no attempt to disguise this. Bolshevism, on its own showing, is the avowed enemy of God; its aim is to overthrow everything for which the Christian religion stands, and to build a new earth in which the name God shall be unknown.

No believer in Jesus Christ can doubt for one moment that such a campaign must No believer in Jesus Christ can doubt for the gates of Hell shall not prevail against ultimately fail, for we have His promise that the gates of Hell shall not prevail against ultimately fail, for we have here many attempts to stamp out the Spirit of Jesus. They His Church. There have been many attempts to stamp out the Spirit of Jesus. They have always failed and must always fail; but the power which has overcome them has always been the same—the power of the prayer of faith and the power of sacrifice.

God is calling our fellow Christians in Russia to prove once again the power of suffering, surely He is calling us to prove once again the power of prayer.

Nineteen hundred years ago the powers of darkness crucified Jesus and God raised Him from the dead. To-day the same powers of darkness are crucifying Him afresh in His followers; but we know Him and the power of His resurrection. Read and think

over the words of Acts xii. 5:

"Peter therefore was kept in prison, but prayer was made without ceasing of

the church unto God for him.

Peter suffered and the Church prayed, and all the chains and bars and gaolers were powerless against those prayers.

"We wrestle not against flesh and blood," so S. Paul said long ago, and his words are just as true to-day. Spiritual enemies must be met with spiritual weapons-all others are useless.

"If God be for us who can be against us." In this spirit, then, let us continue

to offer the prayer of faith for the Church in Russia.

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

On Friday, May 16, the Bishop of Derby will hold a Confirmation in our Church, and I hope that all who can come will make a point of being present. I ask this for two reasons. First, because this is the first occasion on which our Bishop has preached in Totley Church and it is right and fitting that we should all come to welcome our Father in God, and secondly, because it will be the occasion of the "coming of age" of a number of God's children, and your earnest prayers for them are a Christian duty.

There is a third reason too, especially for those who have already been confirmed, namely, that we may be reminded of our own confirmation, and receive

a fresh impetus in our own religious life.

Readers will be interested to know that the Ecclesiastical Commissioners have made us a grant of £150 towards the Vicarage Fund, thus doubling the

sum of £150 raised during the past twelve months.

We have therefore £1,100 to the credit of the fund in the Bank of England, and a small balance in our treasurer's account. I should very much like to raise a further £200 during this year, and there are two efforts already fixed for this purpose. The first is a Jumble Sale on May 10, (referred to below.) The second is to take the form of a "Village Market" on October 4. About this I shall have more to say later.

When it is remembered that we shall receive a substantial interest upon our invested capital, and also make our usual All Saints' appeal in November, it

should not be beyond our power to realize the sum suggested.

May God grant to him eternal peace, and to them the comfort of the "sure and certain hope."

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS,-

There is a special temptation and also a special opportunity which belongs to the summer months and I hope you will pardon me for reminding you of them. I refer to the effect of fine weather upon Church attendance, and the best way of approaching the whole subject seems to me to be to emphasize two things about the observance of Sunday. Sunday is the Lord's Day. It is a Holiday or Holy Day. Every Christian should observe Sunday by worship and by witness. The world is steadily ranging itself into two camps—those who are Christians and those who are not—and Sunday presents a unique opportunity of witnessing before men to the reality of the faith we profess.

Ouite apart from the benefits which your spiritual life receives, it is your bounden duty, as a Christian, to join in public worship as an act of witness to

your faith and allegiance.

If the attraction of a fine Sunday is sufficient to lure you away from this plain duty can you wonder if the careless and thoughtless begin to think that religion doesn't really mean very much after all to those who profess it?

There is something really convincing in the example of the man who is seen Sunday by Sunday, wet or fine, going to Church. It is this kind of witness which does more to spread the kingdom of God than the preaching of many sermons, and the more temptation you have to stay away, the more valuable is your witness when you resist the temptation.

The two watchwords of a well-spent Sunday are "worship" and "witness." It is not true to say that religion is something which concerns only a man and his God. Our Lord has made it plain that part of the duty of a disciple is to confess Him before men, and it is exactly what we do when we join together

in public worship.

I know how tempting it is to take out the car or motor-bike instead, especially when the sun is shining. I know how pleasant it is to spend a lazy Sunday after a busy week, and I know how easy it is to find excuse for doing so. But where is Christ to look for witnesses if His own disciples fail Him? and there are not so many of them that any can be spared.

Isn't it true that the unbeliever points to the empty seats in Church and says, "Look at all these evidences of the powerlessness of Christ and His Gospel"?

You can answer him if you will, by filling one more of those seats.

"Ye shall be witnesses unto Me." Those are our Lord's own words, and one way at least of obeying them is to make each Sunday a weekly public demonstration of loyalty to the King whom the world still depises and rejects, but whom you are ready to proclaim as the Lord of Life.

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

You will notice that on the first Sunday of the month there will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 7 a.m. This service has been added to meet the need of some of our new communicants (recently confirmed) who find it difficult to come at 8. I think we shall find that many others will welcome the additional service, but if it should prove more useful to change the time to 6.30, this can easily be done. Those concerned are invited to say which of these times best meets their need.

It has been arranged by the Church Council to hold a village market on Saturday, October 4. This is still a long way ahead, but it is not too soon to begin to think about it.

It is to be a sale of useful household goods, and we invite every one to give something to sell, and to let the committee know beforehand what their gifts will be. The kind of goods required are:—

1. Eatables of all kinds—especially home-made cakes, fruit, vegetables, jam, pickles, etc.

2. Brushes, pans, kitchen cutlery, crockery.

3. Aprons, dusters, handkerchiefs, household linen.

4. Practically anything except expensive and fancy goods.

The important thing to remember is that nothing should be sent which is likely to be difficult to sell. It is hoped that there will be nothing left unsold.

The Choir Sunday this year will be July 20. The Collections at all services will be for the Choir Fund; the Archdeacon of Chesterfield has kindly promised to preach at the evening service. The annual choir outing is being arranged for the following Saturday. Those boys who have put in a satisfactory percentage of attendances during the year will be invited to go free of cost, but those who have not reached the required standard will be allowed to go only if they pay some part of the expense themselves. The treat is a recognition of services rendered, and it is obviously unfair to make no distinction between those who have attended regularly and those who have not.

It was a great pleasure on Whit-Sunday to have with us in Church the officers and men of the R.A.M.C. (territorial) who were encamped on the Rifle Range.

This was the first time since the parish was formed that any of the soldiers encamped in Totley have paid a visit to the Church, and we hope that others will follow their example.

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-My letter this month is being written under difficulties in the midst of our removal to new quarters. By the time this number of the Magazine reaches you I hope that we shall be comfortably settled.

Perhaps I had better explain my reasons for taking this new house. Firstly, because I must leave my bungalow at rather short notice; and secondly, because I hope that the Ecclesiastical Commissioners will permit the

parish to purchase my new home instead of building another vicarage.

I have therefore arranged with the owner to rent this house for five years on the understanding that if the authorities consider it suitable, the parish will buy it outright when sufficient money has been collected. We shall need a further £400, half of which I hope the Commissioners will provide, and if we make a real effort between now and December we ought to be able to complete the purchase in 1931.

This would ease considerably the annual drain on the parochial pocket, and would enable us to face another problem which is becoming very urgent. I refer to our Church School. It is very important that we should keep our school, and to do so we are obliged to keep it in good repair and meet a number

of expensive demands.

We shall have to spend a considerable sum this year in sanitary alterations

and shall probably have to borrow money for that purpose.

I hope the parish will support the school managers and save the school. It is of the greatest spiritual importance that the Church should not lose her hold on the children. There is, after all, no guarantee that religion of any kind will always be provided in the State schools. The time may come some day when a Government decides to drop all religious instruction, and when the denominational schools are the only ones where any form of Christianity is taught or where any religious atmosphere is maintained. It is in view of such possibilities that we must not allow a single Church School to be lost.

On two Sunday evenings in August (viz. the 10th and 17th) the services will be conducted by the Vicar of Ridgeway (Rev. N. F. Partridge).

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

VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS,-

Last month I referred to the great importance of maintaining our Church School and to the immediate need for funds to carry out certain necessary alterations. Since then I have spoken about the same matter from the pulpit, and feel sure that our people have only to understand the position to come to the help of the managers and enable them to proceed with the work. I am glad to say that each of the six managers has kindly lent or promised to lend £5 for this purpose. That is to say—one-third of the necessary money is already available. Will others who are prepared to lend sums of £1 or more please let me have their names (preferably at the foot of a cheque) before September 15. We need about £30 in loans or donations before we can order the work to be begun.

In the meantime I am in touch with the National Society and am trying to get either a grant or a loan from them, but we must not count on any help from outside—if we get it so much the better: but we must be prepared for the possibility of disappointment. The collections on Sunday, September 7, will also be given to the School Fund, and I hope every one will make a special point of being recklessly generous on this occasion.

Since my last letter I have had a visit from the Diocesan Surveyor. He has expressed his opinion that the Commissioners will approve the purchase of my new house. This is good hearing, and I hope will encourage everybody to complete as quickly as possible the last lap of this enterprise.

Will all friends in the parish and others on whose generosity we have no claim please give one more good push and ensure the sum of £150 before December 1.

This will enable us to apply for a final grant from the Commissioners and to complete the purchase.

It is not a pleasant task to be for ever asking for money, especially for an object which cannot fail to appear to benefit chiefly myself. But a little reflection will show that it is to the interest of the parish to secure a permanent parsonage house, and that the parish is not a going concern until this has been done.

If at the end of our first seven years as a separate parish we can say that we have built a Church, bought a Vicarage, and saved a Church School, we may be perhaps excused if we feel a little proud of our record.

That is looking ahead, we haven't done it all yet, but I hope we are going to.

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

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

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

My first duty is to pass on to you some very good news. I am now able to say definitely that the money required for the work at Totley School has all been obtained,

and that we can now give orders for it to be carried out.

The Derbyshire Church Schools Association has lent (without interest) £50, to be repaid in two years. The National Society has given us a grant of £10, and the remainder has been given or lent by several kind friends in response to my appeal.

We are very grateful indeed to all these friends, and also to others whose offers of

loans have been received since the fund was closed.

Next I must record the great success of our Village Market. This effort has brought in nearly £34, and I thank all those who have worked and helped and given, and also those buyers who so quickly cleared the stalls.

I have made an application for a final grant of £100 to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and we only require a very few pounds to make up the £100 which we must send to them in order to qualify for the grant.

It will, however, be necessary to have in hand at least £20 over and above the

purchase price of the Vicarage, to cover certain legal expenses.

If no unforeseen hitch occurs there should now be nothing to hinder this matter

from being completed in June.

In view of our recent effort (the Village Market), I have not said much about our annual appeal on November 2, but I hope that all will do their best once more.

If, as I hope, the collections on that day provide more than we need for the Vicarage Fund, I shall ask the Church Council to devote the balance to the School Fund, to help to repay the first instalment of the money we have borrowed.

We shall indeed have special cause for thanksgiving at our birthday festival of All Saints this year. "God hath done great things for us already, whereof we rejoice."

I regret to announce the impending departure of two members of the School Staff

Miss Foulstone, who has been with us for a long time and whose work among the children has been consistently excellent, is leaving us for duties of another kind, and we all wish her every possible blessing in her new venture.

Miss Bond, who has not been on the staff very long, but who has also won our good opinion, is also leaving to take up work in a school nearer her home. She, too,

carries with her our good wishes.

With regard to our old friend, Mr. Foulstone, I cannot bring myself to believe that he is really leaving us, and until that calamity actually occurs shall go on hoping (like Mr. Micawber) that "something will turn up" and make him decide to stay.

We all offer our sincere sympathy to Mrs. Newbould in her great sorrow. Mrs. Webster has been a very regular member of our congregation, and in spite of her failing health has set an example to us all. In her last illness her one desire was to be able to come home and go to Totley Church again.

Also we extend our sympathy to the relatives of Mrs. Ward, who passed away after

a short illness.

May God grant unto them eternal peace and to those who mourn His strength and comfort.

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
