

VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS,-

No sooner is the Christmas season fairly over than we find ourselves thinking of Lent. You will notice that this year Lent begins on February 18. If you look in the introductory pages of your prayer book you will find (under the heading of "Tables and Rules") that the Forty Days of Lent are ordered to be observed, but with the exception that they are days of Fasting or Abstinence no special directions are given for observing them.

In other words, it is left to the conscience of each of us to observe those days, and each has to decide for himself in what way he will observe them. It is not an easy question, and it is quite obvious that we cannot all follow exactly

the same rules.

But there are certain general principles which do apply to all of us. Here they are :=

(1) Pray. (2) Fast. (3) Give.

Your rule for keeping Lent should include those three principles.

First, Lent is a time of prayer. A time to pray more and a time to pray better. Will you try this Lent to give, say, five more minutes than usual to your daily prayers? And under this heading I would include the quiet reading of the Bible-if only a verse or two each day. Read them carefully and thought-

fully as the Word of God. God's Word spoken to you.

Then Fasting. It is the practice of "Going without." It is a very practical idea really. You are asked to "go without" something in order to make more room and more time for God. All of us find it difficult to find time for everything we want to do, and it is only too easy for us to make room for other things by leaving out the things of God. In Lent we must try to make more room for God by going without something else. Also the idea of Fasting is bound up with that of penance. We are to deny ourselves and discipline ourselves in order to prove our willingness to make what reparation we can to God for our many offences against His goodness.

We are debtors and the least we can do is to "show willing" to pay, even

though we know that we never can pay our debt in full.

And lastly—Giving. We are all of us too much occupied with ourselves and our own concerns. In Lent we have an antidote to selfishness.

Give a little more, and if you are afraid you cannot afford it, trust a little more and risk it. That is faith.

Once more I invite those who would like to borrow books for serious reading to come and see whether I have anything on my shelves which will help them.

(1 particularly recommend to thoughtful readers a little book by Bishop Carey called Evolution and Redemption. It is quite inexpensive and not at all difficult to follow.)



VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS.-

This magazine should be published before the beginning of April, and contains particulars of the services in Holy Week and on Easter Day. Some of you will no doubt be considering the question "Where to go at Easter," while others will spend the holiday at home, but whichever you are going to do there is one obligation binding upon all confirmed churchpeople and that is to make their Easter Communion. If you are at home I hope you will try to come on Easter Day. If you can't do that, try to come on Monday or Tuesday or the following Sunday. If you are away from home I have no doubt there will be a very nice church not far from where you are staying and it will be an easy matter to find out the times of the services there.

If it is a long time since your last communion it will be all the more necessary for you to make an earnest and careful preparation for it. Our Catechism tells us just what to do. "To examine themselves whether they repent them truly of their former sins, stedfastly purposing to lead a new life, have a lively faith in God's mercy through Christ, with a thankful remembrance of His death, and be in charity with all men.

There is a parable of Jesus in the Gospel which tells of a King who made a great supper and how "when the King came in to see the guests, he saw there a man which had not on a wedding garment." That man had made no attempt to make himself ready to meet the King.

There is no blessing promised to those who come to the Lord's Supper without first putting on the wedding garment of real repentance and the sincere desire to be a better soldier and servant of Christ.

The King comes in to see the guests. He comes to dwell in us if our hearts are ready and fit for His Presence—but if not He can only say "How camest thou in hither?"

You will notice that on Sunday, April 26, we are to have a visit from Captain Shirt, who will preach at both morning and evening services about the work of the Church Army. I hope everyone will try to come and also that you will give very generously to the Society.

We offer our sincere sympathy to Mr. B. B. Booth and his family in their great loss. Mrs. Booth was one of the first worshippers in Totley Church and a member of the congregation of the mission before the church was built. She

was one of those confirmed at the first Confirmation to be held in Totley. May she rest in peace, and may God comfort those who mourn with the sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life.



VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

It was extremely cheering to see so good an attendance at the Good Friday and Easter Services. Nearly 130 people made their Communion on Easter Day or on one of the week-days after the Festival.

I want to tell you briefly about an event which has been arranged for next

month (June).

A small party of Church Army Crusaders will pass through Totley on their way to conduct a seaside mission at Rhyl. They will spend a day in this village, arriving at Totley Church about 11.30 a.m. on Thursday, June 11. There will then be a short service of welcome, and after that they will devote the whole day to Mission work in our parish. There will be a Women's Service in the afternoon, probably a visit to the Day School if that can be conveniently arranged, and a Mission Service in Church in the evening

The following morning they will attend Holy Communion at 7 o'clock, and

after breakfast set out on the next stage of their march.

Please make a note of the day—Thursday, June 11—and look out for posters and other announcements of this one day's mission. I hope that the services will be well attended, and that the visit of the Crusaders will bring a real message from God to all.

May I ask for a few names of people who would like to offer to entertain

one or more Crusaders for tea in their homes?

I have already made arrangements for all other meals, but I should like each of the men (nine in number) to be invited to somebody's house for tea and a short rest before the evening service (8 p.m.).

Further notice of this mission will reach you in due course, but in the meantime please begin to think about it and to pray for God's blessing upon it.

You will be glad to know that the Ecclesiastical Commissioners have granted us the final £100 which completes the purchase money for the Vicarage. I have already put the matter in the hands of the Diocesan authorities and have every hope that very soon the parish will possess a recognized Vicarage house.



VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS,-

On Thursday, June 11, a detachment of Church Army Crusaders will visit Totley and spend a day here on their March to Rhyl, and the programme of their visit will be as follows.

Thursday, 11.30 a.m. Short Welcome service in Church.

3.0 p.m. Women's service.

8.0 p.m. Mission service.

Friday, 7 a.m. Holy Communion.

In addition to these services I have arranged for a visit to the Day School, and also during the afternoon some of the Crusaders will visit the parish.

I am very anxious that there should be a good attendance at the services at 3 and 8 o'clock.

It is very unfortunate that another engagement will prevent several of our most regular worshippers from coming-but I hope that everyone who can will try to be there.

A great deal depends upon ourselves. If we really want this mission to bring a blessing to our village and to ourselves we must do our utmost to be ready

These men come to us in the name of our Master and they bring a message from Him to us. If we are ready for His message God will put His words in their mouths and we shall hear them and know that God has sent them; but we must make ready for the message. Think of the parable of the Sower and the Seed. Some fell on good ground and some didn't. It was all good seed of the Word of God and yet it only brought forth fruit when it fell on good ground —that means *prepared* soil. If you want a message and a blessing from this mission, begin now to pray God to send you one. If you want this short visit of these soldiers of Christ to be like a breath of new life to you and many others, begin now and pray God to prosper this work that His message may find its way to many hearts and His Word may not be spoken in vain.

"According to your faith be it unto you." It is only when we expect big

things from God that we find out what big things God can do.

There is just one other thing that you can do. There will be some notices or posters advertising the services. Lots of people will never read them and will never know anything about it unless you tell them, and even when you have told them they will probably need reminding again when the day arrives.

If everyone who reads this letter will try to bring two or three friends to one of these services he will have done a bit of Gospel work well worth doing.




