

VICAR'S LETTER.

My DEAR FRIENDS,-

It is early yet to begin to talk of Easter, and yet it is not too soon to begin to prepare for it, in fact one of the purposes of the season of Lent is to give us

a suitable preparation for Easter.

No loyal Churchman will need to be reminded of his duty to receive the Holy Sacrament on Easter Day, and I hope that all will do so. But it is of vital importance that we should not come unprepared like the man in the gospel who ventured into the king's presence without a wedding garment. What this wedding garment means is best described by the words of our Prayer Book, "Ye that do truly and earnestly repent you of your sins and are in love and charity with your neighbours and intend to lead a new life."

Every Communion should be a new start in life, and our Easter Communion especially should send us forth "risen with Christ" from the dead life of past

sin to seek afresh His kingdom and His righteousness.

The spiritual value of our Easter Communion must depend very largely upon the use we make of this time of preparation.

Jesus did not ordain this Sacrament for people who feel good. He gave

It to feed starving souls.

We have only to turn to any page of the gospel to see what sort of people got the greatest blessings from Him—sick people, lepers, blind and deaf, hungry, sinful and unhappy people—these came to Him and were helped, but those who felt good enough never got a blessing at all.

The Vestry meeting and Parochial Church Meeting in January resulted in the re-election of the whole Church Council and all officers for another year. To all of them I should like to offer my thanks for their help during the past year, and to express the hope that a year of good work and real progress lies before them.



VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

The great event of this month will be the Confirmation on Monday, April 18, by the Lord Bishop of Derby. On that day a number of young people will come to their Father's House to offer themselves afresh to His service and to receive His blessing—the gift of the Holy Spirit—by the laying on of hands.

The gift they will receive is the same as that given to the Apostles on the Day of Pentecost and we know what followed in the case of those first Christians. We know how they went forth filled with the power of God to bear their witness in the name of Jesus.

The gift is still the same, the power is still the same, and the thing that.

matters is that those who receive the gift should make full use of it.

God's gifts do not work by themselves, they must be used, and it is one of the sad things about Church life that so many come to receive God's blessings and then go away and lose them.

There is a parable in the Gospel about some people who were entrusted with their Lord's money. 

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

I must use this letter to explain to you the purpose and working of the

new scheme of finance which the Parish has now adopted.

The purpose of the scheme is to ensure that the weekly expenses incurred in maintaining your Parish Church shall be met by a steady income derived from weekly contributions from all who would consider themselves members of the congregation.

The sum of £3 per week would cover heating, lighting, cleaning and salaries, and also would go a long way towards paying our Annual Quota to the Diocesan Fund. It is hoped that in time the Choir Treat and Christmas Boxes for the

boys may also be covered without recourse to special collections.

Then the working of the scheme:

1. Each member receives a packet of 52 numbered envelopes and returns one each week containing his regular contribution. Put the envelope in the bag in Church at collection time. If you come twice on the same Sunday, as many do, either use two envelopes (dividing your weekly gift between them), or put in your envelope at one of the services and let the bag pass you at the other.

2. If you cannot come every Sunday, either ask a friend to take your envelope to Church, or bring it next time. (If you have been absent for, say, three Sundays,

and present on the fourth, you would bring four separate envelopes.)

3. Don't use the envelopes at the early services, because the offertory at the 8 o'clock Communion always goes to charitable purposes and not to Church

4. On Sundays when a special collection is given, viz. Hospitals, Church Army, etc., bring your envelope as usual containing your usual contribution,

and give separately (not in the envelope) your gift to the special object.

In deciding the amount of your weekly contribution, please bear in mind these special occasions, and let your weekly offering be such that it leaves you something to give when they come round.

5. The main feature of the scheme is regularity. This is more important than the amount given.

We shall welcome promises of subscriptions from \(\frac{1}{2}d. \) per week upwards,

so that even the children may join and feel that they are doing their bit.

6. Every few weeks the ledger will be inspected and a reminder sent to all

6. Every few weeks the ledger will be inspected and a reminder sent to all members whose envelopes have not been received, but it should be the aim of everyone to see that no such reminder need ever be sent to him.

7. In the case of subscribers who cannot come to Church at all, arrangements can be made for their envelopes to be collected monthly, quarterly or annually.

Finally, the scheme is everybody's business, because the Church is open to all. If you are interested in keeping it open, then you ought to join the scheme. You may not be a very frequent worshipper, but you may want a church some day to be married in, and you may want a church to have your children baptized in. Well—somebody has to maintain it all the year round, and we ask you to help to do so.

Remember! The only person who will know your number and how much you give will be myself, and as long as your subscription comes in regularly,

even I shall never need to look it up to see who is in arrears.

That is the Freewill Offering Scheme; let us hope it will be as infectious as measles and influenza, and it will be a very healthy epidemic.



MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

right solution to the difficult problem of Church Finance.



VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

Members of the church council are asked to note that there will be no meetings during the months of June, July, or August. If there should happen to arise any urgent business of such a nature that the standing committee cannot deal with it a special meeting will be called, but it is not expected that this will be necessary.

There are two Sundays in July for which special events are being arranged. The Choir Festival is fixed for July 10, on which occasion there will be an Anthem

at both morning and evening services.

In view of the satisfactory response of the Free-Will Offering Scheme we shall not make any urgent appeal for the Choir Fund. The church council are of opinion that as the number of weekly contributors increases it will be possible to reduce the number of special collections and to cover the expenses of the choir by a grant from the general Fund. That will mean that the loose cash in the collection on July 10 will be used for choir purposes, but that thosewho are giving through the envelopes will not be asked to increase their gift.

The following Sunday, July 17, is the date fixed for a musical recital after the evening service. Mr. Alan Morton, whose delightful programme of violoncello selections was so much appreciated some weeks ago, is coming again and other

items are being arranged.

There will be a retiring collection to cover the expenses of the recital, and

the balance of the proceeds (if any) will go to the choir fund.

Several people have mentioned to me that they much regret the discontinuance of the dances which at one time were so successful and have asked whether I propose to have them again next season. The answer is that I shall be only too happy to arrange a dance if some means of guaranteeing its success can be devised. But it is quite useless to do so unless at least 50 people will promise to take tickets. The expenses are considerable, as is the difficulty of catering for an entirely unknown number.

If a few enthusiasts will take the matter up it may be possible to do some-

thing in October.


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PAROCHIAL NOTES.

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

During the past month most of us will have felt that events of more than ordinary importance have been taking place in the world. Every newspaper has had something to say about the Lausanne Conference on Reparations, and I expect most of you know as much as I of the subject. It is early yet to prophesy what the outcome of such an event will be, but the Christian must feel in his heart that something worth doing has been done and that the Hand of God and the Holy Spirit has been at work pointing the way to peace and sanity. The spirit of goodwill is the only spirit in which anything of permanent value can ever be achieved, and we may well thank God for the evidence of that spirit at Lausanne.

Another event which has come rather suddenly upon us is the War Loan Conversion. Every newspaper has had plenty to say about this too, and I don't know enough about high finance to discuss it. But I would remind you that many charitable institutions whose income is partly derived from this source have converted their holdings, and therefore will be in receipt of smaller incomes. This is a point of the kind which sometimes is overlooked. If you have to effect economics to meet hard times, don't begin by cutting down your contributions to hospitals or missions whose difficulties are great enough already.

There is now on sale in Totley a useful blotting-book which costs 2d. Everybody wants a blotter sooner or later, and therefore you cannot do better than buy one for yourself and send one to your friends. The entire proceeds of the buy one for yourself and send one to your friends. sale will be given to the fund for re-seating the Church.



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

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
PAROCHIAL NOTES.

VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

This month brings us to another anniversary of the consecration of our Church. Most of you will remember that event, but eight years have brought many new-comers to the parish who may be interested to know that the Church was consecrated by Bishop Hoskyns of Southwell, on November 15, 1924.

We keep our birthday festival, not on that date, but on November 1, All Saints' Day, because of its dedication as All Saints' Church. There will therefore be special Services (see calendar) on November 1 and on the Sunday following, and I hope that you will do your best to make this a real family gathering in thankfulness to God for His blessings during another year.

On November 5 (Saturday) the combined Choirs of nearly all the churches in the Deanery will sing Evensong in the Parish Church of Hope. The music will be under the direction of Dr. Staton. This is an experiment which it is hoped will become an annual event and be of great value in stimulating interest and keenness in Choir work.

I should like to thank all who so kindly helped with the harvest decorations and all who sent gifts. The fruit and vegetables were sent to the Orphanage, and the matron has asked me to express her appreciation of your kindness.





VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

Please accept my very best wishes for a Happy Christmas.

It is the Birthday of Him who is "the Hope of all the ends of the earth." In the Gospel which we shall read on Christmas Day we find the words "He was in the world and the world knew Him not," and they are still true. Christ is in the world and the world does not know Him yet as the Saviour who alone can solve the problems which perplex its wisest heads. "A little child shall lead them."

Let us try again to follow more closely the steps of the Little Child of Bethlehem. He says to-day as He said long ago: "I am the Way"—" Follow Me."

I should have liked to see a much larger attendance at Church at our Patronal Festival on All Saints' Day and the following Sunday, and particularly at the Holy Communion the number was very disappointing.
