

### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

A very happy New Year to all readers.

The New Year brings with it a considerable increase in the circulation of this magazine, and I hope that all new readers will note carefully the times of church services, and become regular members of our congregation. I should like also to convey my special thanks to all who have so kindly helped in the various departments of Church work during the year. Our parish has suffered a great loss in the past month by the removal of Mrs. Milner to her new home at Baslow. There is no need to remind Totley people of how much she has done for the Church and village, but we are well aware that her place will not easily be filled. She takes with her our gratitude for many years of kindness, and the sincere good wishes of us all.

Early in 1932 we adopted the Freewill Offering Scheme, and although we have not completed the first year of its working, the experiment has been successful in enabling the Treasurer to meet our liabilities as they occur. But I would remind you that the continued success of the scheme depends upon the addition of new subscribers, and I hope that new-comers will not hesitate to ask to be enrolled and supplied with the necessary weekly envelopes. After all it is the fairest and soundest method of supporting your Church for each member to contribute with unfailing regularity, and it is the easiest way too, because it soon becomes a habit.

Since the beginning of the scheme 132 people have joined, and with about four exceptions, have faithfully done what they undertook to do. I have still not lost faith in those four!

Four members have left the parish and so cease to be regular contributors. Subscriptions are received each week, varying from one penny to five shillings, and a glance at the table of collections published in this magazine will show that the weekly income of the Church is now a steady one, and does not depend upon the weather.

During the coming year we hope to see the beginning of the new seating of the Church which so many of you desire, and the first (February) meeting of the newly elected Church Council will consider estimates for the first instalment of the work.



#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

Will you please try to imagine that this letter is written specially to you

and that it requires an answer.

Will you also imagine that the envelope in which it comes is marked "Urgent and Immediate," because the subject with which it deals is of the greatest importance.

I want to talk to you seriously about your attendance at Holy Communion. Are you quite happy about it and (what is more important still) is God satisfied with the way you are carrying out what you set out to do on your Confirmation Day?

Our Lord says "No man having put his hand to the plough and looking

back is fit for the Kingdom of God.'

If you have been confirmed you have most certainly "put your hand to the plough," you yourself know whether you are "looking back."

And if this is true the only thing to do is to turn round and look forward again, which is just what I want you to do. Perhaps I can help you, at any rate

I'm going to try.

My suggestion is very simple. I am not going to ask you to join the Communicants' Guild unless you are prepared to keep all the rules, and some of you might not be willing to promise quite so much. But what I ask is that you will allow me to include your name in a list of monthly communicants. The only promise I shall require from you is that if you fail to come to Holy Communion at least on one Sunday each month you yourself will come and cross out your name from the roll.

I can think of no simpler rule than that—you will pledge yourself to nothing that you cannot easily perform. You will make no new promise at all except that you will put your pen through your own name if requested to do so. This little plan may seem stupid and childish to some—if so, take no notice of it and think of a better one for yourself, but if you think it would help you, as I think

it may, let me have your name and we will make a beginning.

We have proved this year that a simple scheme like the envelope system helps us very effectively in our duty of Christian giving. Perhaps the little plan I have outlined will prove itself equally helpful in this still more important matter.



# VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

You will find in the Calendar above a list of the services for Holy Week and

Easter.

May I remind you also of the rule of our Church (in the Prayer-book) " that every parishioner shall communicate at the least three times in the year, of which Easter to be one."

I shall be glad to make arrangements for a private Communion for any sick persons who will send me their names. (It will of course be necessary for

such services to be held on a week day in Easter week.)

I hope also that those who spend the holiday away from home will make their Easter Communion in the church of the Parish where they are visiting.

The afternoon service on Good Friday will follow the usual lines and those who cannot stay for the whole three hours are requested to enter or leave during the singing of one of the hymns which divide the sections of the service.

I shall be very grateful if readers will inform me at once of the names and addresses of new-comers to the parish. I have already called at nearly all the houses on the new estate, but have reason to believe that since my visit there have been further changes. It is a very great help when someone sends me word of these and similar changes, and enables me to pay a call much earlier The same also applies in cases of illness. than is otherwise possible.

We shall be glad to welcome a few new boys in our choir. We have recently lost two valuable voices, namely, Wilfred Coates and Geoffrey Salt (whose services have been acknowledged by the presentation of a hymn-book), and we need some new recruits. They should be at least 9 years old and quick readers. Any boy who wishes to join should come to the choir practice (on Thursdays at 7.30).


#### PAROCHIAL NOTES.

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

This month brings us once more to Ascension Day, and we shall be reminded again of our Lord's last charge to His disciples. "Go ye into all the world once again of our Lord's last charge to His disciples. and preach the Gospel to every creature." First He had said to each disciple Come," now He says "Go."

Jesus is the Light of the World-and none of us can deny that the world to-

day needs His light.

There is no real hope for the world until it is a Christian world from end to

And so I want you to think seriously about what we call missionary work. It isn't just one of the minor activities of Church life—it is the chief purpose of the Church of Christ on earth.

If you are not a missionary at heart you are no friend of Jesus. "Why

call ye me Lord Lord and do not the things which I say?"

It ought to be a matter of the deepest concern to each of us that "millions yet have never heard "the "tidings sent to every creature." It ought to be our first aim as Christians to do all we can to extend our Master's kingdom.

The difficulties of the times have imposed a great strain on the resources

of all our Missionary Societies both at home and overseas.

There are mission stations which cannot be maintained and may have to be abandoned; there are fresh fields of opportunity which cannot be undertaken for want of men and money; there are missionaries wearing themselves out because they have no one to relieve them.

All this is our business because it is our Master's business. Can we as a parish do something more than we have done?

I was glad to see a fair congregation at the afternoon service on Good Friday. but the attendance in the evening was rather disappointing. The number of Communicants on Easter Day was 114, and I was very glad to see among them some of those who have recently come to live in Totley.

I should like to express my thanks to the Choir for their very excellent rendering of the Easter services.

# PAROCHIAL NOTES.

Reseating of the Church.—The Parochial Church Council have decided not to proceed with the scheme for providing new seats in the Church until the Seating Fund is sufficient to equip the whole of the two middle blocks in the The cost of this will be in the neighbourhood of £200. The sum available for this purpose at the moment is about £40, and it is proposed to arrange certain efforts in the near future to augment it.

Missionary Fund.—The offerings contributed at the Wednesday evening services in Lent, together with the collection on Good Friday, and part of the

Easter Day collections were allocated to Overseas Missions.

Musical Recitals.—We hope to arrange a series of short recitals after evensong on certain Sundays during the summer. They will be contributed by members of the choir and others, and will each last about 20 minutes. first will be on April 30.

Collections at Children's Services.—In future the collection at the Children's service on the First Sunday in each month will be given to the "Waifs and Strays This society provides Christian homes for orphan and homeless children, and it seems right and fitting that our own children who enjoy the privilege of good homes should help their less happy brothers and sisters.

#### THE FREE-WILL OFFERING SCHEME.

Just over a year ago this parish adopted a new system of finance, and the results have justified the experiment.

For the benefit of those who have joined our congregation recently, here

is a brief explanation of the scheme.

Each member of the congregation is invited to take a packet of envelopes (numbered). One of these envelopes is to be used every week and put in the


collection-bag.

If he is absent he brings next Sunday the envelope representing the Sunday on which he was away. The weekly contribution may be from a penny upwards, but should be always the same every week. The envelope contributor is not expected to put in the collection any coin except that contained in his weekly envelope, nor to increase his subscription even on special Sundays. This does not apply to the 8 o'clock Communion Service, where the offerings are always used for charitable purposes and are entirely separate, but with this exception the envelope contributor is asked to give nothing to church funds except his regular weekly contribution.

The first year's experiment has proved that the scheme really works, pro-

vided that the whole congregation take it up.

We have lost a few of the original members and we want some new ones. Please send your name to the Vicar, and he will send you your envelopes. It is the easiest, simplest, fairest, and most businesslike way of supporting your Church.

#### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

For many years it has been our privilege to hear the children's Whitsuntide hymns sung on the lawn at Totley Hall. This year, unfortunately, we shall not be able to do so and therefore it is hoped that those who wish to hear these hymns will attend the Children's Service on Whit-Sunday afternoon at 3 p.m.

We shall of course follow the usual Whit-Monday programme, and the children will sing in the village and have tea in school and games afterwards in a field kindly lent by Mr. Tym.

At the Diocesan Conference we were asked to draw the attention of all Churchpeople to a book entitled "With one Accord." This book is published by the Missionary Council of the Church Assembly and contains a clear statement of the needs of all the Missionary Societies of the Church of England to enable them to continue their existing work in the present year. It is a book which gives us something to think about and makes it clear that the need is very urgent.

The Missionary Societies are not asking for funds to undertake new work but for the bare minimum on which the work they are now doing may be maintained, and although the missionaries themselves have voluntarily accepted drastic cuts in their meagre salaries it is shown in this book that some of their work will have to be abandoned unless we at home can increase our missionary contributions by 10 per cent.

The best thing each of us can do is to get this book and read it, and then we shall see how real is this challenge to the Church and how important it is that our parish should increase its missionary contribution.

The only reason why good Christian people sometimes fail to do as much as they might to obey the command of Jesus to "go into all the world and preach the Cospel to every creature," is that they simply do not know what the Church abroad is doing. If they did know they would want to have a hand in it.

Read this book and you will know. The book is "With one Accord"—



New boys wishing to become choristers may come to any Choir practice (Thursdays at 7.30) and report to the Choirmaster with a view to enrolment.



#### VICAR'S LETTER.

#### MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

This month I am going to begin my letter with a text. "A certain man made a great supper and bade many . . . and they all with one consent began to make excuse." If you study the parable in which these words occur you will see that the excuses they made were all good excuses, but you will also find that none of them was considered good enough by the man who made the supper. He had invited his friends to meet him and when they did not come he knew that the real reason was because they were wanting in friendship toward him.

Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ has made a great Supper—a "rich banquet of His Flesh and Blood" and He also has bidden many—your name is on His list of invited guests. You are invited Sunday by Sunday by Christ Himself to meet Him in His Holy Sacrament.

Are you one of those who come or one of those who make excuse?

It seems to me that one of the great truths for which the Holy Sacrament stands is that Jesus is offering us His friendship and that when we do not come we are telling Him more plainly than any words could say that we do not want it. "He that hath my commandments and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me."

Christ says, "Do this in remembrance of Me," and if we are His true friends we shall do it. I have never yet found anyone who really wanted to be a regular

communicant who did not manage to get there somehow.

When our best friend asks us to meet him at a certain time and place most of us can contrive to be there. Of course we have to put some other things on one side and put up with a little inconvenience, but we don't seem to mind a little extra trouble because of the joy of meeting our friend.

If we don't care very much for our friend we just send him a postcard and say that we have a previous engagement: and our friend knows how much

our friendship is really worth.

The Christian religion is really a matter of friendship. Friendship with Jesus the Son of God Who loved us and gave Himself for us. He asks us in the name of Holy Friendship to meet Him in His House on His Day, and He knows what to think of our loyalty and friendship if we do not come. There will no doubt be people who will say: "I can live a Christian life without coming to communion," but it is not very likely that those who cannot obey Christ's plain command to do a simple thing will ever be faithful soldiers and servants of Christ in any more severe test of loyalty and devotion.

Simon Peter protested that he would die willingly for Jesus. Within a few hours Jesus asked him to watch and pray for one hour with Him and he could not do it. Soon after that he was afraid to own that he had ever been a friend of Christ at all.

I suppose he didn't keep awake and pray for that one hour because he didn't think it really mattered, but it did matter because if he couldn't do a little thing for Jesus it was certain he couldn't do a big one.

Let us face the truth that there is no such thing as Church life except that which centres round the altar and draws all its strength and inspiration from

fellowship with Jesus.

A little group of devout and regular communicants who regarded their Sunday communion as the most important of all their weekly engagements, and

Sunday communion as the most important of all their weekly engagements, and who resolved faithfully to let nothing but sickness keep them away, would do more for the cause of real religion than all the organizations and societies that were ever invented.

The soul cannot live on anything except the Bread of Life and if this simple fact is ignored all other so-called "Church organizations" are of no value whatever.

"O let Thy Table honoured be,
And furnished well with joyful guests;
And may each soul salvation see,
That here its sacred pledges tastes." (Hymn 317.)

Choir Sunday.—We congratulate the Choir and Choirmaster upon the excellent rendering of the special music on Sunday, July 16.



### VICAR'S LETTER.

#### My DEAR FRIENDS,-

One of the consequences of the rapid growth of our parish is to be seen in the increased number of Baptisms, and therefore I want to say something about the office and responsibility of those who come to church as godfathers and godmothers. It is not "just as a matter of form" that the Prayer Book requires that children shall have godfathers and godmothers. The Prayer Book says:—
"It is your parts and duties to see that this infant be taught, so soon as he shall be able to learn, what a solemn vow, promise, and profession he hath here made by you." "And chiefly ye shall provide that he may learn the Creed, the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments and all other things which a Christian ought to know and believe." "Ye are to take care that this child be brought to the Bishop to be confirmed."

In view of these undertakings it will be seen that a godfather or godmother has no easy task. It is plain also that these duties should not be undertaken by

anyone who is not very much in earnest about his religion.

Only a keen Christian can teach a child to be a keen Christian, and only a person who has himself been confirmed by the Bishop and who is a regular communicant is likely to bring a child to be confirmed and to Holy Communion. It is example which really counts, and no one who is not prepared to do these things himself ought to dream of coming to the font as godparent and promising what he has no intention of carrying out. The Church admits to membership children too young to know what membership means, but does so only on the clear understanding that they shall be taught so soon as they shall be able to learn. The godparents accept this solemn responsibility.

I should like to express my thanks and those of the congregation to Mr. Wolstenholme and Mr. Lowe, who have kindly played the organ during Mr. Linfoot's holiday.

Several people have asked me whether there was any hope of reviving the dances which were so popular some time ago and so I have engaged Green Oak Hall for a Dance on October 25. This Dance is to help the Sunday School Fund and the tickets will be 2s. 6d. including refreshments. But please note

that unless I have at least 30 tickets definitely guaranteed by October 1, the Dance will not take place at all. This is necessary to ensure against a loss on the expenses. If this experiment proves to be popular other dances will follow, but it is quite useless to incur the heavy cost without some certainty of support. As soon, therefore as I receive the 30th promise to buy a ticket the arrangements will proceed and I hope that the dance will be as jolly and successful as others have been.



### VICAR'S LETTER.

#### My DEAR FRIENDS,-

This month the Church of All Saints', Totley, celebrates its 9th birthday, and although the actual date of its consecration was November 15 we keep the Festival on All Saints' Day and the following Sunday. I hope that all of you will help to make this a real Family Festival and especially that all Communicants will try to be present at one of the celebrations on All Saints' Day, or the Sunday following.

I should like to see all those who have been Confirmed in Totley Church, all who have been married there, all who have ever received any special blessing there, gathered together to thank God for His goodness and to pray for His blessing on this church and village. This of course is not possible because so many of our family are scattered and some have passed away, but I hope that all who can come will come and join in "the voice of praise and thanksgiving among such as keep holy-day."

The Church Council has found it necessary to open a fund for the renewal of part of the organ. Many of you will know that our organ has never enjoyed robust health from the beginning, but we are assured that the whole trouble has been due to the faulty construction of one part of the mechanism. What we propose to do is to replace the faulty section, which operation will make our organ really reliable and efficient.

The cost of this work is £70 and we hope that you will all help to raise it

by supporting the various efforts organized for this purpose.

A beginning will be made by holding a "Village Market" on Saturday, November 11, at 3 o'clock.

This will follow the lines of previous markets and will be a sale of necessary household commodities. We ask first of all for gifts of garden produce, provisions, game and poultry, flowers, plants, kitchen utensils, etc., and, secondly, we ask you to look in and buy something.

Everything on sale on November 11 will be something you want—so come

and buy it at the Village Market.

Every penny you spend will be a contribution to the organ fund because the expenses of the sale are practically nil.

I have just received the generous offer of a wheel-chair for the use of invalids in the parish and have gratefully accepted the gift. The chair will be lent out to responsible people on application to me and should be of great benefit to convalescents and others. Many thanks to the kind donors of this welcome gift.

It is hoped that we shall be able to say a bit about our first Deanery Meeting at Grindleford and also tell you of our new arrangement in the schools in


the next issue.

### VICAR'S LETTER.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

I was a little disappointed by the attendance at the Services on All Saints' Day and the following Sunday, and I cannot help feeling that there should have been many more communicants than there were on such an important occasion as the Anniversary of the birthday of our Parish Church.

On the general subject of churchgoing I should like to say that unless it is

first a matter of duty it will never become a habit.

Unless you go to church simply because as the catechism says, "My duty towards God is . . . to worship Him," your churchgoing will always be of the "go-when-you-feel-like-it" variety and you will probably find yourself feeling less like it until you give up going at all.

An old friend of mine, the rector of a parish, was once told by a lady that she had a good reason for staying away from church. My friend's reply was this, "If your reason is good enough for the Day of Judgment it is good enough

for me."

It is a pretty good answer and I think a good many Totley people would

do well to think it over.

Those who have been confirmed, those who used to come once upon a time but rarely come now, I wonder if their reason is "good enough for the Day of Judgment."

We are very grateful to all those who supported our Village Market, whether as helpers, contributors or customers. The proceeds amounted to more than £10 and were allotted to the organ fund. We still need about £20 to complete the sum required for this purpose, but it is hoped that with the help of the various efforts which are being arranged, the whole amount will soon be available.

The members of the Free-Will Offering scheme will soon receive their new

envelopes for 1934.

These will be issued in the form of a booklet and each weekly envelope will be dated. This will help contributors to see at a glance whether their subscriptions are up to date. I shall be very pleased to hear of new members who would like to join the scheme in the New Year. It is no longer an experiment but a proved success; but in order that this success shall continue we need a steady increase in our membership to replace those who have left the district.

The Dance organized by the Sunday School was an enjoyable affair, but not a great success financially. It involved a lot of work and generosity on the part of the helpers for which we are duly grateful, but it has made it clear that these Dances cannot be continued. I am sorry, because they have been very jolly functions, but the demand for them is not sufficient to justify the expense.

The Sunday School propose to augment their funds in another way. On Monday, December 11 at 7 p.m., there will be a "Second-Hand Sale" in the School. This "Second-Hand Sale" is really a small Jumble Sale, but one in which all the goods offered will be in really good condition. There will be no rubbish.

We invite gifts of good clothes, boots, etc., and I shall be happy to call for them if you will send me a p.c. We hope to get enough to stock one really good stall and to realize enough by the sale to pay for the Children's Christmas treat and prizes.
