



### THE VICAR WRITES: ACTION

There are no magic crystal balls at the Vicarage, and I have no idea what 1963 will bring. I hope with you all that 1963 will bring peace, joy, and prosperity to the world. Whether it does or not depends on us. We can make 1963 what we want it to be. So don't think that when we've said our prayers on New Year's Eve. and asked God for His blessing in the New Year, that we can sit back and put our feet up and let God get on with it. Praying is sharing. We pray that we may share in the will and the power of God. We learn what we have to do, and we are given the strength and courage to put our knowledge into action.

#### **KEYWORD: ACTION**

This year will be a year of tremendous opportunity for us in this parish. Every year is the same. Every year God gives us the opportunity for action. Every year we are free to selze the opportunity or ignore it. In this parish there are hundreds of families who never enter church from January 1 to December 31. Many of these families are our friends, Here is your opportunity. Just ask them to come with you next Sunday to church. This invitation is your opportunity, and your responsibility. Every person in the parish is our responsibility. In 1963, in our private lives, in our home, in our work, in our church clubs we will have the opportunity to bring people to meet God. How they re act is their responsibility. Our responsibility is to arrange the meeting.

There will also be material opportunities that we can seize or ignore in 1963. There are essential jobs waiting to be tackled in the

existing Church buildings. There is the challenge of extending our buildings so that they may serve adequately the large population of this parish — young and old alike. Opportunity, challenge—God leaves it to us to act or not, and whether we act or not, we are responsible.

### A CHEAP CHRISTMAS

Perhaps the most basic opportunity God gives us in 1963 is the opportunity to witness, to advertise our faith by regular church going. The wonder of our Christmas. services will be cheap and tawdry sentiment, absurd as Christmas decorations that are left up too long, if 1963 does not see us every Sunday as part of God's family in God's house on God's day. The Christian who stays at home because the weather is bad, because the church is draughty, because the television programmes are fascinating, and his fireside chair so comfortable denies the Christian religion in a much more effective and evil way than any atheist. We proclaim to the world and to our neighbours, and maybe to our families that our religion is something for our personal amusement when the weather is better, or the television programmes boring.

#### FACE TO FACE

Make this your resolution for 1963. Every Sunday I will be in God's house, a member of the family of God on God's day. Resolve that nothing save a reason that is urgent and compelling will let you break this promise. Pray to God for help to keep this promise. If you are not in church every Sunday don't worry about looking me in the eye next time we meet. Just remember, as I have to remember, that one day,

### COMMUNICATION THE CHURCH'S LIFELINE COMMUN

IT IS SURELY AN accepted fact that the Church must be concerned with communications.

What goes on in Fleet Street and behind the scenes of radio and television programmes is a mystery to most of the people who enjoy the end result. It is a highly competitive world.

In television there are already thirteen independent companies in the country in addition to the B.B.C. There is intense competition between the producers within the B.B.C. and between the B.B.C. itself and every independent company.

H H Newspapers can only publish what is of interest and importance to their readers to maintain their circulation. The same applies to television and radio programmes. These get "on the air" and stay there solely on the interest shown in them.

Wastage of material is large. More than 80 per cent, of the material reaching a large national newspaper is discarded.

The speed of transmission of news increases all the time. An important news item originating in London can be transmitted through the interlocking system of Press agency teleprinters to every newspaper office in the world served by that agency within five or ten minutes!

How can the Church integrate its mission with such erratic, dangerous, volatile and yet immensely powerful organisations? The answer is closer to your parish church than many realise...

The provincial Press is the

training ground for most young journalists and script-writers. It is from the provincial Press and your local paper that a good deal of the "news" is obtained which goes to the national papers and on to the news programmes of the B.B.C. and independent companies.

There should therefore be a close bond of friendship and understanding between the parish church and the local paper or papers within whose orbit it comes. Let it not be a business relationship, but a relationship which incorporates within it all the Christian principles of friendship.


Nor should any opportunity be lost to welcome into the Church, and into the homes of those who go to the Church, young journalists starting on their careers in your particular paper. Here is the opportunity and time to teach some young man about his Faith, so that in the future when perhaps he reaches his goal in Fleet Street and becomes an important contributor, news editor or even editor of a large and influential paper, he is a man whose heart "has been touched by God."

The Church will then be reported truly and with an understanding.

HAVE YOU EVER COME across the word ecumenical? It is constantly cropping up these days in religious news. A little over a year ago at a Conference held at New Delhi by the World Council of Churches it was used a great deal. Now it has been recurring in news about the Vatican Council.

"Ecumenical" comes from a Greek word OIKOUMENH, meaning "the whole inhabited world"! You will see the word in the symbol of the World Council of Churches, surmounting a boat carrying a cross.

The Ecumenical Movement, then, is the effort of Churches throughout the world towards reconciliation and unity. The Ecumenical Council, as the Roman Church calls the present Vatican Council, is a conference of their leaders from all parts of the world.

The phrase "Ecumenical Council," however, has a more particular meaning in Church history. It was a General Council of the leaders of the whole and then undivided Church.

Councils to decide some problem facing the Church or ways of overcoming a particular crisis have been recorded since New Testament times.

The first recognised Ecumenical



Council took place at Nicaea, in Turkey in 325 A.D. One, Arius, was causing division in the Church by arguing that Jesus was not fully Divine. The Council answered this dispute by drawing up an official summary of the Christian Faith, later known as the Nicene Creed. This we use to this day in the Communion Service.

The next three Councils, at Constantinople in 381, Ephesus in 431, and Chalcedon in 451, all again in what is now Turkey, were held to settle points of the Church's teaching.

These four Councils, as well as the three following them, were called not by the Bishops of Rome, who were not even present, but by the Roman Emperors, who then lived at Constantinople! And the language used was Greek, not Latin. These Councils were truly ecumenical—because they were attended by bishops from every part of the Church.

In 1053 came the Great Schism. The Eastern Orthodox Churches broke away from the Western Church, then very much led by the Bishop of Rome. Later came the Reformation, which split asunder the Western Church. So for 10 centuries —half its total history—there has been no one whole Church nor any body which can claim to represent the whole Church.

Other branches of the Church also have their great conferences. In 1961 there was a Pan Orthodox (i.e. Eastern Church) Conference in Rhodes, and every ten years our own Bishops meet at Lambeth.

The historic conferences of the modern Ecumenical Movement were the 1910 Edinburgh Interdenominational Missionary Conference, out of which grew the International Missionary Council; and the Amsterdam Conference of 1948, when the World Council of Churches was born. These two bodies in turn became one at New Delhi in 1961. The World Council of Churches are joined Churches of all lands and peoples and denominations except the Roman Church.

So these days in Christian history are very exciting. Who knows, but some day a Vatican Council may join with the World Council to make once more a true Ecumenical Council. We at least should be ecumenically concerned as Our Lord prayed, "that they might all be one, that the world might believe."



### THE VICAR WRITES: HAPPY FAMILIES

On March 3rd, the first Sunday in Lent, our Sunday morning worship is going to have a new look. The main service on Sunday morning will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 9.30 a.m. It will be a family service. We want you to come as families to this service, to kneel as families at the altar, to pray for God's blessing on your family. There is nothing new in this. The Church is a family each congregation should be bound together in love, and its worship should show this. In many Churches throughout the world the central service on Sunday morning is the Family Communion.

#### COOKING THE DINNER

Another reason for our new look is that, in a parish like this, where many of us have young children and the Sunday dinner to prepare, it is difficult for a family to be united in their worship at 11 o'clock. We hope that the new time of 9.30 a.m. will enable you all to come as families, and return home secure in the thought that the Sunday roast has not been ruined by the length of the sermon!

#### FIRST THINGS FIRST

A third reason is the motor car. It is not sinful or wrong for families to seize every opportunity of being together, and in the summer months it is right and good that they should take advantage of fine weather and sunshine for their recreation. Our new arrangements make it possible for us to begin Sunday with our worship, putting first things first, before we escape to the country or seaside for our fun in the sun.

### WHAT HAPPENS?

Now what will happen at this service? We want you to come to

church with your children-

"Don't send those kids to Sunday School,

Get out of bed and take 'em." are words from a once popular song. Children sent to Sunday School are children who grow up to regard church, worship, and Christianity as things for children, because they never see their parents in church with them. If your children church with them. Come to church as a family with your children. Do not worry if they cry, laugh, or make a noise! I am certain that our Lord wants to hear the voices of children in His church-"Suffer the little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not".

When you make your communion they can kneel beside you at the altar, and they will see how important this act of worship is in your life.

After the service there will be an opportunity for us to meet and greet each other over a cup of tea in the church room. (Until we have our Church Hall, it may be rather cramped and crowded!)

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL

The family Communion Service will last from 9.30 to 10.30 a.m. and at 11 o'clock there will be Sunday School in the church.

Some of you will be asking, "What about the other services on Sunday mornings — Mattins, Sung Eucharist, or the celebration of the Holy Communion at 8 o'clock?" There will be a celebration every Sunday morning at 8 a.m., and Mattins will be sung at 9 a.m., as a preparation for the Family Service. We hope that many of you who do not have the problem of getting young children ready for church will be able to come along to this preparation, and also those of you

who have to work on Sunday morning may find it possible to attend this act of worship.

There will also be Sung Eucharist on certain Sundays at 11 o'clock, for those who cannot manage to attend at 9.30 a.m., and these celebrations will be announced in the magazine and in church. This service will be held at least once each month. In March this service will be on the third Sunday, March 17th.

These, then are our plans for our new look in Sunday Worship. We hope that this is the answer, and that we will discover, through worshipping together as families, new joy, new happiness, and a new understanding of the Christian life. May God bless us all.

I WONDER WHETHER YOU read some time ago of the courageous and sacrificing act of Dr. David Spencer, who, doing a "locum" for a dangerously ill doctor, offered one of his kidneys in the hope of saving the other's life. It was an intricate and dangerous operation followed by weeks of weakness and anxiety. But when admirers praised him for his deed he exclaimed "What is all the fuss about?"

I was tremendously impressed, so I wrote to enquire about him. He is one of twins in a family of seven, six brothers and a sister. They were brought up during the war by their mother, their father being away in the Army. David wanted to be a doctor from the age of four if not earlier and after leaving Canford School proceeded to Trinity College, Dublin, where he duly qualified.

He has a delightful wife, Spanish by birth, nurse by profession. She has recently been received into the Anglican Church.

Dr. David Spencer's name has been entered in the B.M.A.'s Book of Valour, and he has been presented with an illuminated copy and a citation.

David Spencer's sense of duty and service has a parallel in the story of his twin, Peter. He for years lacked his brother's sense of direction. He left Canford at sixteen; went to an art school with ideas of being a sculptor; was called up and then discharged almost immediately on medical grounds. Disliking the poor prospects of sculpture he turned to studying farming and after nine months knew "I certainly was not meant to be a farmer!"

"I knew that somewhere there was some particular work I was called to if only I could discover what it was." He decided to join the Navy, where he could think things out, and see something of the world at the same time.

"All this time religion had meant very little to me," he writes, "and I only went to church at the major festivals if I couldn't get out of it!" But while in the Navy he began to read religious books, C. S. Lewis, J. B. Phillips and so on, and to go to church again. Then the Bishop of Winchester sent out a leaflet about vocations to the Ministry, and one way and another "it gradually dawned on me that I was meant to be a priest."

He had five years to serve in the Navy. However, after a great deal of trouble the authorities gave him leave of absence for a year to study for G.C.E., and on his passing and being accepted by C.A.C.T.M. he was discharged and went on to Lichfield Theological College. Last Michaelmas he was made deacon by the Bishop of Winchester. He married during his training.

These stories seem to me to show how ordinary men can be called by God and used by God for His good purposes—both to body and soul when the individual will respond to that call—"Here am I, use me."





### THE VICAR WRITES: TO THE CHILDREN

Dear Boys and Girls,

We hope that we shall see many of you in church with parents at your Family Communion Service, and this is to tell you what will happen when you come to Church.

As soon as your parents are in their places they will kneel down.

#### KNEEL

with them, and thank God for all the wonderful things He has given you — Parents, brothers and sisters, friends, everybody whom you love; for your homes, the good food you eat, your clothes, toys, books; most important of all, say "Thank You" to God for the birth of His Son, Jesus, who is King of all.

In these moments before the service begins we can think of all the things we have done wrong in the past week, so that when we say the prayer of confession God knows that we are really sorry.

Then say the Lord's Prayer.

When you have finished, sit quietly with your parents, and look up in your hymn book the first hymn. This is called the "Introit Hymn"—the introduction hymn.

#### KNEEL

when you have sung the hymn, and you will hear the Vicar quietly saying the Lord's Prayer and the Collect for Purity, on page 286 of the red prayer book.

Then the Vicar will say the ten commandments, on pages 286 to 288, your ten rules for living, or the two rules Jesus gave us which sum up the ten commandments, or we will sing—

Lord, have mercy upon us, Christ, have mercy upon us, Lord, have mercy upon us,

which is a way of saying how much we need God's help to be good soldiers for Jesus.

Then the Vicar will tell you on what pages to find the Collect, Epistle and Gospel for the day. The Collect is a special prayer for the day.

When the prayer is over

### SIT

for the Epistle, which is usually taken from one of the letters written by St. Paul, St. John, St. James, St. Peter or St. Jude. When the Epistle is ended

### STAND

for the Gospel hymn, but keep the page in your prayer book so that you can follow the Gospel when it is read.

As we sing the hymn, you will see the Gospel Procession to show how important the Gospel is; it is the "good news" about Jesus. We will stop half way through the hymn, the Gospel will be read, and then we will sing the second part. Then

#### STAND

turning to page 289 in the prayer book for the Creed, which we all say together and which tells what a Christian believes.

#### SIT DOWN

and the Vicar will talk for a moment or two.

#### STAND

for the offertory hymn, during which we say "Thank You" to God for all that He has given us. We give Him some of our money, and you will see this being carried to the Vicar at the altar. A family will take the bread and wine that will be used in the service, and it will all be offered to God as we offer Him our lives, so that He can use us to build His kingdom.

When the hymn is over we continue to

#### STAND

for the great prayer for everybody in Christ's Church (this is on page 293).

We pray first that all Christian men, women, boys and girls may be united in serving Jesus; then for the Queen, the government, judges, policemen, soldiers and sailors, and everyone who has rule over us; and for the Church—for all bishops and vicars, and especially for Geoffrey, Bishop of Derby; then we pray for ourselves, and for all who are in trouble.

After each part of this prayer the Vicar will say

"Lord, hear our prayer" and we say

"And let our cry come unto

The prayer finishes with our remembering all the men, women and boys and girls who have served the Lord Jesus here on earth and are now with Him in the life after death: especially we thank God for everybody who worked so hard to build our lovely church.

The Vicar will then invite your parents to make their communion, and we

#### KNEEL

and say with them the Confession, on page 300 of the prayerbook. After this, the Vicar tells us that God has forgiven us for all the things that we have done wrong, and we hear some words of comfort that Jesus, St. Paul and St. John say in the New Testament.

Then we

#### STAND

because the most important part of the service is about to begin, when we ask God to come and be very near to us. The "preface", as we call it, is on pages 302 to 304, and there are some special parts of

it that we sing on very important days.

When this first part is over we

#### KNEEL

and tell God how unworthy we are to be so close to Him here in church, and we say the prayer on page 304 that starts "We do not presume to come to this Thy table.

Still kneeling, we listen to the prayer that Jesus used the first time this service ever happened—the Last Supper He had with His disciples.

Now we are to be very quiet, and remember that Jesus is here We

#### GO TO THE ALTAR

with our parents and kneel with them. They will share in eating the bread and drinking the wine, as we shall one day, but until then we bow our heads and remember that we are all part of a great family of Christians here on earth and with Iesus in heaven.

When everyone has been to the altar, we say the prayer that Jesus taught us (on page 306). Then the Vicar says one of the prayers on page 307, and we

#### STAND

to sing our "Thank You", which starts with "Glory be to God" on page 308.

When we have finished the Gloria we

#### KNEEL

for the Blessing, and then we

#### STAND

to sing the final hymn.

After the service we will have a short Sunday School in church until 10.45 a.m., and then we will join our parents at breakfast in the Church Room. See you Sunday.

## WHAT ARE CATHEDRALS FOR?

There is considerable controversy within the Church as to whether cathedrals are serving their right purpose and playing their full part in the Church of 1963.


These noble and enormous buildings demand and devour vast sums in maintenance, men and upkeep.

Is this justified?

This issue of "Church News" provides two points of view. The Provost of Bury St. Edmunds' recent outspoken comments were nationally reported.

We are grateful for his defence and explanation of cathedrals today.

The second article, by the Editor of "Church News," represents the critical point of view, together with certain proposals.

A FEW MONTHS AGO I HAD an opportunity we parsons rarely get of seeing the religious offering the Telly provides for those who stay home on a Sunday evening. The subject was "Why Cathedrals?" The programme nearly caused me to "blow my top" as the participants had a very dim idea of the exciting things cathedrals exist to do. They had hardly a good word to say for them, apparently considering them very expensive "white elephants".

Thank goodness, my hot protest to the B.B.C., joined no doubt by others, led to a second programme which aimed at balancing the previous destructive programme. Nevertheless, to use a modern phrase, "the public image" of a cathedral is undoubtedly still Trollopian, and regards cathedral dignitaries as elderly scholarly gentlemen who know nothing of ordinary life; the Cathedral Close as a quiet haven far removed from the bustle of modern affairs; and the cathedral building as a museum, a splendid piece of architecture hopelessly expensive to maintain, playing little part in the evangelistic work of the Church.



THERE WAS A T.V. L programme not long ago when a group of young people heavily criticised all on efforts of clergy and youth organisers in running youth clubs.

The parson appealed to one boy from his own district: "We've a splendid

leader, haven't we?" The club was all right, he was told, but the girls weren't allowed to sit on the boys' knees, or kiss and cuddle, and "That's what we want." Another said he had only slashed cinema seats once, but felt quite justified as it was merely revenge for being turned out.

> It was no good at all having clubs run by parsons, who had been to Oxford, and simply didn't understand how young people felt about things. "Why not start your own clubs then?" someone asked, only to be told scornfully "You can't, on your own."

> All in all, the programme was pretty disheartening. The youngsters' attitude of negative resentment could be roughly summed up as "Most people are against us, and we don't want the help of those that aren't. We want excitement, but we don't know where to find it."

There is, happily, another side of the coin. These are pictures of youth clubs where the members enjoy themselves and do so in a creative and

interesting way.

Canteen The Woodston Church Army Youth Centre, Peterborough, recently had a "facial uplift." The members clearly have a flair for interior decoration in the 'teenage mood. The Club's News Sheet, produced by the members, has a circulation of 700.



Another youth club, East Ham Church Army Youth Centre, recently built its own chapel.

If you are seeking fun, the secret seems to be that the more you do for yourself the



#### THE VICAR WRITES: EASTER JOY

#### A "HOLY" ROW

I would like to emphasize again that this is a family service, and there is nothing to worry about if we hear the sounds which we associate with family life. The keynote of this service is happiness, and I am sure that everybody who has experienced the joy and wonder of this Family Communion will never again assume reverence must mean silence. The Christian religion is a religion of happiness and light, not of darkness and sadness.

#### GOOD FRIDAY AND AFTER

At this time of year this is particularly true, as we prepare for Good Friday and Easter. Our Lord's pain, suffering, agony on the cross and death have to be seen in the light of the victory of Easter Day. Without Easter, the Christian faith would be a sad one — would witness to the fact that man had killed God; had killed goodness, truth and love; but Easter tells us that man cannot kill God—that pain, suffering and death are transient — that goodness and love are the

ultimate realities. It is this truth which makes it possible for a Christian, ill and in great pain in a hospital ward, to transform those around him by his conviction of the ultimate truth that nothing can separate us from the love of God; that the sufferings of the moment do not compare with the glory that is to come.

CAN I Believe? I AM SURE MANY, MANY PEOPLE TODAY, either sadly or gladly, accept the view that science and the scientist and outer space and all the rest have really shattered religion and religious beliefs.

Many would hate to admit it. At heart, they wish it wasn't true. Occasionally they still take cosy comfort in Christmas and Easter, at little Jane's baptism or favourite aunt's funeral. But its real content has disappeared—like the Empire—and we are so much worse off now both have vanished! But it was inevitable, and the future is bleak as even the last pleasant aroma of both disperses . . .

I cannot help you about the Empire—but if you are feeling the end of religious faith is coming, you are wrong.

I have been noticing a most interesting thing about scientists, some of whom are very vocal negatively against religion and the Christian Faith. But note carefully, they are by no means all so agreed. Indeed, like the rest of society, some are against religion, some don't know or are not sure, and some are for! Now in England where the atmosphere religiously is pretty uncertain and negative, this is reflected in scientific opinion.

Go East to Eastern Europe and Russia where religion has been politically but not intellectually and spiritually killed—scientists and thinkers who are allowed to be known internationally reflect the Party atheism, which I have no doubt they honestly believe.

Go West, to America, where religion has been finding new strength over the past 20 years, and you will find many leading scientists and thinkers—and there they are at liberty to hold religious views or none—who openly and avowedly hold religious beliefs, while others find no objection in science to such belief.

Let me quote top scientist George Beadle, President of Chicago University, who told a gathering of Christian laymen in Chicago recently, "The answer to the question of creation still remains in the realm of faith. In early Biblical times... it was believed as a matter of faith that man was created as man. Since then, science has led us back through a sequence of evolutionary events in such a way that there is no logical place to stop... until we come to a primeval universe made of hydrogen. But then we ask 'Whence came the hydrogen?' and science has no answer. Is it any less awe-inspiring to conceive of a universe created of hydrogen with the capacity to evolve into man than it is to accept the creation of man as man? I believe not."

I LISTENED IN MY YOUTH to conversations between grown-up people through which there breathed a tone of sorrowful regret which oppressed the heart.

The speakers looked back at the idealism and capacity for enthusiasm of their youth as something precious to which they ought to have held fast, and yet at the same time they regarded it as almost a law of nature that no one should be able to do so.

Grown-up people reconcile themscives too willingly to a supposed duty of preparing young ones for the time when they will regard as illusion what now is an inspiration to heart and mind.

Deeper experience of life, however, advises differently.

#### Youth's Ideals

It exhorts us to hold fast, our whole life through, to the thoughts which inspire us.

It is through the idealism of youth that man catches sight of truth, and in that idealism he possesses a wealth which he must never exchange for anything else. Grow into your ideals, so that life can never rob you of them. If all of us could become what we were at fourteen, what a different place the world would be!

The ideas which determine our character and life are implanted in mysterious fashion. When we are leaving childhood behind us, they





begin to shoot out.

When we are seized by youth's enthusiasm for the good and the true, they burst into flower, and the fruit begins to set.

In the development which follows the one really important thing is how much still remains of the fruit, the buds of which were put out in its springtime by the tree of our life.

You cannot find what is really good in any particular religion. There is no direct answer. There must be a fundamental notion of good, and good is reverence for life. The Churches may make laws but goodness lies inside.

Life is the secret of itself. All living things are sacred. We do not need bombs now, but humanity. I have seen the influence of reverence for life on the African in my time.

Believe all living things are sacred. One must never kill a fly in thoughtlessness. The most important thing in life is a reverence for life.

The great secret of success is to go through life as a person who never gets used up.



#### The Vicar writes: The Secret Weapon

Treason is headline news these days. The world of James Bond seems very real indeed and we open our papers wondering what new spy sensation we will read about. This month I want to write about treason.

#### NO SENSATION

The treason that concerns us is not sensational, it attracts no headlines, no special tribunals of enquiry. It is the treason that is commonplace. It is the way we betray Christ and His Kingdom.

#### A CLICHE?

May 23rd is Ascension Day. It is the day when we celebrate the feast of Christ the King. It is a fine phrase, a theological truth, a divine fact. Christ is King of that there is no doubt. He is King of all God's creation. But there is a difference between the kingship of Jesus and the rule of Jesus. If Christ rules His world, He does so by ruling our lives.

Admitedly Ascension Day falls on a Thursday. Many of us are hard at work in all the clamour and conflict of life in our industrial city. Perhaps for just that reason we can easily forget that the coming of the Kingdom of God, depends on our loyalty to the Kingship of Christ.

#### BETRAYAL

Our loyalty must be seen in our personal lives. Before we put the world to right, we must put ourselves to right, we must start in our homes. How much do we demand of our family, and how little do we give? Have your own treason enquiry this month. Ask ourselves whether our conduct, our language, our thoughts in the privacy of our homes is worthy of Christ, or do we betray the Christian gospel in our own homes by our bad temper, selfishness and laziness.

Do we betray Christ as King by our willingness to compromise in our place of work, in our school, in our conversation with our neighbours? The opportunities for betrayal are as numerous as the opportunities for loyalty.

#### NO ESCAPE

There can be no escape from the question is Christ King in our own lives. Every contact we have with any other person is an opportunity. Either they will recognise us as Christians or as traitors, as individuals who build the Kingdom of God, or who undermine its foundations by our hypocrisy.

# FREUD and CHRISTIANITY

VERY LARGE NUMBERS OF Churchmen still think of Freud, the founder of psychoanalysis, as an enemy of the Faith, and this is perhaps not altogether surprising, since that was how he saw himself. Yet in fact he did much for which any true servant of Christ should be grateful.




His ostensible attack upon religion was really a profound judgment upon the Christianity of his day. In many ways, indeed, it was identical with the attacks which prophetic souls all down the ages have always made upon entrenched religious conservatism. Of course, the great prophets thundered against religion which had gone bad in the name of true religion itself, whereas Freud's attack was purely negative, but this was mainly because he had no evidence that religion could ever be anything other than the poisonous, life-frustrating thing he found continually driving neurotics into his consulting-room. It ill becomes churchmen to blame him for not seeing further than this, or for accepting too readily the "materialistic" philosophy of the nineteenth century. The blame lies equally at the door of the Church itself, which had so failed in its witness that he never saw properly what genuine Christianity could be.

He attacked religion as a form of obsessional neurosis, based on a continuance into adult life of a childish attitude of "dependence on father". This has seemed to many Christians to be a fundamental desceration of the central Christian belief about God, but in fact Jesus Himself made very much the same criticism of the religion of the Pharisees. They worshipped a "father", He said, who was simply not the same being as the God He called "Father". Since His God was the only true one, their God must really have been just an illusory father-image—precisely Freud's concept.

The impression that Freud was an enemy of the Faith rests on more than his technical atheism, however. He is widely regarded as far worse than atheists like Bradlaugh because, over and above his claim to have explained God away, he also claimed to have "debunked" conscience, while on the positive side he put forward a theory of human personality which traced back all positive motivations to sex. These two things have scandalised many Christians, yet in fact they should have been welcomed by the Church.

So what age are you, who read this page, if any? I like to think you are about 16-17.

It may surprise you if I tell you honestly, as a somewhat older person, that I am both glad and sad for young people today! Glad that you are able to enjoy wonderful experiences, that you have a great deal of freedom, that you have more pocket money than did your parents at your age.

Nevertheless, whilst this may be an age for young people, and whilst you may have a great deal more spending money and freedom, for this very reason young people are preyed upon and exploited. The wrong things are made to look exciting; the right things and the good things are overlooked. I am all for young people having a good time and enjoying themselves, but should this be the main object of living?

I believe that there are three duties which every young person must carefully face if he is going to make his life useful and worthwhile and thereby enjoyable. For I have no doubt that anyone whose life is not worthwhile and useful will lack enjoyment.

First we must establish ourselves. This means that we must take our schooling and our training for whatever work we hope to take up, enthusiastically and devotedly. Our first aim must be to succeed to the

best of our ability. This may well lead to the curtailment of our pleasure and freedom, but it is the foundation of all our hopes that we may grow up to be healthy and happy and not suffer from what are so common—frustration and disappointment.

I am sure also that if we are to succeed we must realise the place of faith in Jesus Christ and obedience to God and we should never let these slip from us, but hold on to the Christian way of life. Then, I believe, we can have confidence in the future, as we come to face the other two duties.

The second one is the establishment of a home. For most of us this will mean in due course marriage and children; for some not. Nevertheless, somewhere and somehow we shall have to establish our own domestic situation. If we have won through in the first duty, we can have good hope that we can win through in this.

Thirdly comes the establishment of our place in the community. And this means being involved with other people and organisations and groups, offering what we have to them and receiving a very great deal from them in return.

Well, I wish you good luck! Do not be too mesmerised by tinsel and glamour. Stick hard to the real things in life, and by God's grace you will win through and be immensely thankful.



#### THE VICAR WRITES: ELEVEN PLUS

A few days ago many anxious parents in our parish were waiting for the result of the 11-plus examination. Now in many homes there is jubilation, because a son or a daughter has been selected; in others, there is anxiety and perhaps anger. I think we must try to put this examination into perspective. It was originated, by the 1944 Education Act, as a means of selection, in order that each child should benefit from the type of education best suited to his or her interest and ability. Because of parents' opinions, and - I think bad teaching the 11+ has become an examination to separate the sheep from the goats, or the "haves" from the "have nots". Its not selection but rejection at 11+.

#### **HAPPINESS**

All parents must want happiness for their children. Happiness means fulfilment; fulfilment means having the opportunity to use all the aptitudes and all the gifts of character and personality that God has given us. If a child is over coached for the 11-plus, and then finds himself in a school or job just beyond his ability or aptitude, the resulting heartache and unhappiness is obviously tremendous and often irreparable.

#### IMPROVEMENTS

Our energies should be devoted to making sure that the system is improved, and this means tackling the problem without political prejudice or bias. Obviously what we all desire is what is best for our children. Whatever is done in Sheffield or nationally about the 11-plus examination (and all educationalists seem to be agreed that it must be altered), I hope it will not be in such a way that one solution is imposed on a city or a nation.

We need to experiment in a variety of ways, in order that what is eventually decided upon will not need painful alteration in another 20 years' time.

#### CHURCH SCHOOL

It was because of this need for variety and freedom that in our educational system that we were so delighted with Canon O'Neill's speech at the parish meeting on June 12th. He is Director of Education for the diocese, and has promised that modernisation of our Church School shall be treated as a top and urgent priority, and that representations will be made to the Ministry of Education for the immediate carrying out of the work.

#### WHY?

The Managers of the school and the Parochial Church Council have three reasons for being determined to modernise the school —

- 1. The Church has been engaged in education in Totley for well over 100 years, and traditions of the past are not lightly disregarded and discontinued. There was a time when the Church was the pioneer and major partner in education, and -though the position is now reversed and the State takes the greater responsibility (and rightly so) - nevertheless by remaining active in this field the Church can exercise great influence. The slavish preservation of tradition would not be sufficient reason for the maintenance of a Church School in Totley, though ultimately this will be the only aided church school left in S.W. Sheffield.
- It must be the aim of Managers and Staff of Church Schools to make them the finest possible

schools. They are the conscience of the educational system, a means of preserving the standards and ideals of the State schools, and I believe that our local County Primary School is better for the presence of the Church School in Totley.

3. The third reason is that though the Education Act of 1944 makes religion an essential part of the curriculum, it is obvious that the decline of moral standards in our society is due in some part to the fact that the Christian religion is not being taught with enthusiasm and conviction in the schools of the land. It is not enough to educate some children to enter grammar schools; it will certainly not be enough when we

have made our selection and can offer all children the education which will utilise their aptitudes and abilities: the child who leaves school without any moral sense can be of little use either to himself or to the society in which he lives. Our Church School in Totley is in the forefront of the battle to revive in the next generation the standards of morality and faith which are evidently lacking in our own time, and which are essential for the wellbeing and greatness of our nation.

For these reasons I urge all of you who have to choose schools for your children to think over these things,

the Archbishop's dining-room come the sounds of hammer and chisel on stone, stones being shaped by Arab masons for the final courses of the new Anglican theological college in Jerusalem. The building, with rooms for twenty students, was ready by Christmas.

Inside the Archbishop's dining-room 21 ordinands are listening to a lecture by Professor John Trevor from Ohio, on the Dead Sea Scrolls, which he was first to photograph. They are listening on other days to the Principal (Canon Felix Boyse), to Canon Edward Every on the Churches of Eastern Christendom, to Mr. Issa Boullata on Islamics, to Mr. Robert Lapham on the refugees, to Dr. K. Carmichael on the new radio project at Addis Ababa sponsored by the Near East Christian Council.

### **Dead Sea Strolls**

Visits to the Holy Places are combined with longer expeditions to Qumran, Jericho and Jerash, to Samaria and Jacob's Well, to excavations in progress at El Jib (Gibcon), to refugee camps. Smaller groups make their own way to the various patriarchates, and attend liturgies of the Eastern Rite in different languages. A few have made the desert journey to Petra, and a bathe in the Dead Sea by moonlight is being salted by others.

## ANGLICAN ADVENTURE

by Dr. SYDNEY EVANS Dean of King's College, London

"IT IS SINFUL TO USE THE mind or body on the Sabbath Day." So said a bishop 180 years
 ago to his clergy, discouraging them from starting Sunday Schools.

In the 18th and early 19th century most children went out to work from the age of six. Many worked twelve hours a day and six days a week. Sunday they were spared, because of the strict Sabbatarian laws, which banished work on Sundays.

The trouble was, however, nothing positive was offered them on their one free day. And so, as most of them were extremely poor and almost entirely illiterate they spent their Sunday idling, fighting, thieving.

It was this state of affairs which caught the attention and concern of a wealthy Gloucester printer and editor, Robert Raikes. As a Christian man he was distressed by the tragedy and uselessness of existing conditions with regard to Sunday and these impoverished and ignorant children. So began "Raikes' Ragged School," as it was sneeringly called. By offering sweets and pennies he gathered around him a dozen boys. He read the Bible to them and told them simple stories. He began truly to

get alongside them. Numbers grew, girls joined in as well.

And so before long the odd spectacle could be seen in Gloucester on Sunday mornings of the tall, immaculately dressed Raikes with velvet coat, silver buckled shoes and high hat preceding a mob of rowdy children to Raikes' Sabbath School.

His efforts gained support and helpers.

He began to teach reading and writing. He printed small booklets with alphabet and bible verses. Classes were run from 10 o'clock till noon, and in the afternoon his pupils went to church and were instructed in the catechism.

The children were expected to come with clean hands and faces and hair combed. He supplied combs for those who had none—and clothes for those who had nothing decent to wear.

As the movement grew, the churches were appealed to for support. Opposition developed, and the attitude of the bishop I mentioned at the beginning was by no means uncommon. Raikes went forward undaunted. He painstakingly corrected their speech and demonstrated common courtesy and gradually saw his pupils grow orderly and responsive to his care.

Within five years—by 1785, Raikes estimated that 250,000 children were attending Sunday schools all over England and Wales. John Wesley enthusiastically supported him. William Wilberforce won the support of numerous important men.

Raikes went on from Sunday Schools to night schools and then championed the reduction of children's working hours to make them possible. Before he died in 1811 he saw this come to pass. And the Sunday School Union, formed in 1803, helped eventually to bring about the Education Act of 1870, which compelled local authorities to provide day schools for all children in the British Isles.

As Robert Raikes himself wrote, "Perhaps what we have started will some day far exceed our first expectations." The debt to him of Church and of young people in this country is immeasurable.



### THE VICAR WRITES: REPAIRS

At the moment, builders are swarming all over the Vicarage; due to gifts from the Parish, the Diocese and the Church Commissioners, some essential work is being put in hand, so do not be surprised if — during the next six weeks or so — you see my wife, David and myself looking rather harassed. When the workmen eventually depart, the Vicarage will be a much more comfortable place to live in, and for this we are most grateful.

#### A PARABLE

I think there is a parable here which teaches us a lesson, both in the life of the Church and our individual Christian witness. The house was built in 1916, and bought for a Vicarage in 1924. when Mr. Hutton was the first Vicar. From time to time essential repairs have been done to maintain the fabric in good order, but now the time has come to make more far-reaching improvement to bring the house up to modern standards. All of us have had to face a similar problem recently, when we were involved in the upheaval of Totley becoming a clean air zone; old grates were torn out and modern fire places put in.

### PATCHING UP NOT ENOUGH

When we look at the life of the Church, it seems that we go through periods when all that is necessary is a coat of paint here, a face-lift there, a tile replaced, something else patched up. Then comes a time when patching up won't do any more; when there has to be a more radical reconstruction, from which the Church emerges with a new vision, a new vitality and a new understanding of the truth of the gospel.

### TWO REPAIRS ?

There are two areas of repair in the life of the Church in the world which particularly affect us this month. The first is obvious it is our involvement in the Stewardship Campaign; acknowledging that all we have comes from God: that we are trustees-stewards-of our lives, with the abilities and talents, the time and treasure that God has given us. Stewardship is not new. The first man created by God was a Steward. In the earliest time of the Church, in the Old Testament, we can see the people of God acknowledging their dependence on Him, and giving thanks for what he has done for them. In the first book of the Chronicles, chapter 29, we read that the people of Israel gave thanks for all that God had given them by building a great temple at Jerusalem. "For all things come of Thee and of Thine own have we given Thee". The ancient standard of the Jews was that one-tenth of all they had should be given to God for the work of His Church, and constantly our Lord emphasized the fact that material things are given us for God's work. From time to time. of course, this truth was neglected. glossed over and partially forgotten, but during our own times we have witnessed one of the periods of radical reconstruction in the life of the church; of re-discovery of the truth of stewardship, of trusteeship, I know that many in this parish have already re-discovered and deepened their witness to their Christian calling, and I have no doubt that, from our Stewardship Campaign, the Church in this parish will emerge stronger and with a new vision of responsibility to build the kingdom of God, in the world, in the diocese, in the parish, with all the materials, all the abilities, that God has given us. This is one major repair in the life of the Church in this parish.

#### YET ANOTHER REPAIR

It would be very pleasant if all existing things that are happening in the Church today could be separated into watertight compartments, so that we could deal with one problem at a time. But the power and inspiration of God, which have led us to the re-discovery of stewardship, has led us to the realisation of the urgent need to repair the broken unity of Christ's Church, In our campaign we shall talk about Christianity reconciling men to each other; of our concern for the sick and hungry thousands of miles away; of our concern for the work of the Church in our new housing areas and our concern with the needs on our doorstep problems that the Church, i.e. vou and I are faced with here in Totley. Yet there is a frightening waste of effort and resources because of the disunity of the Church. Disunity weakens and corrupts our vision of the Christian gospel.

Each Sunday— God's day—in this parish, Christians visibly witness to the fact that the love of Christ has not yet reconciled us to each other, visibly proclaiming that so far we are content to waste our God given time, talent and treasure in maintaining our apartness from each other, instead of uniting to build the Kingdom.

But before there can be any unity, there must be the desire for it. We must pray for a deepening of the realisation that disunity is sin; pray for humility, and charity, for understanding of the traditions of worship of other communions,

and with the certainty that if we allow ourselves to be instruments of God then the division will be healed and Christ's Church — His Body—will be one.

We are particularly concerned this winter with repairing the breach between the Methodist Church and ourselves.

There are three things which must be done —

- 1. We must pray for unity EVERY DAY.
- We must attend the meetings which will be held to explain and discuss the implications of the Report.
- 3. We must read the Report, Yours sincerely,



## THE NEW AFRICA



THE AVERAGE CHURCH MEMBER SEES AFRICA probably through missionary reports: a native church in the bush, a mission hospital, a small primitive school. The new Africa, of swift political, economic and social development—of urgent nationalism; of the cry for African unity; of vociferous and vigorous leaders like Nkrumah, Kenyatta, Banda; of modern cities

and vast industrial projects like the Volta Dam; of technological colleges and universities—may be something we are aware of through the Press. But where do we relate it to our knowledge of missions as being also under God's purpose?

A resume by the Editor of a fine article in "The Coracle" by David Carmichael, who has held important posts in education in and for these emergent nations.

Yet how great has been the force of Christian mission in this political, social and economic upsurge! Consider the effect of the Bible. Africa was a land of story and legend but no written authoritative word. Into this gap came the Bible, a word of authority, permanence and power. Forty years ago it was written: "It is hard for people in Europe to realise how great and various are the effects of the publishing of the New Testament in the common speech of a people with no other literature... All natives of intelligence fasten on what is the central doctrine of the New Testament . . . that every Christian is a child of God, a King's son, the heir to all the world, a partner by right in the equal fraternity of all Christians".

So to this day the common speech in West Africa is coloured by the Authorised Version. "Seek ye first the political kingdom and all the rest shall be added unto you," cries Dr. Nkrumah, This is not intended to be blasphemy, but a natural use of a word with power.

There is much feeling that many leaders in Africa do not appreciate what the West has done for Africa. Their memories are seen to be short. But maybe our memories are short. It has been estimated that 40 million Africans were shipped away as slaves in the 250 years of slave trading, whilst African chiefs were





A FRICA AS WE all know is a vast and tremendous continent. From time immemorial it has had a fascination for people of other climes and coun-

tries. Two thousand years ago a Roman writer said, "There is always something new out of Africa". For a period in the early Christian centuries, along its Mediterranean coast it was the scene of great and successful Christian effort. Four centuries ago it became the centre of the terrible and terrifying slave trade.

Later the greater European nations fought over it and divided it up among themselves as extensions of their power, and as a source of useful raw materials. Now over the past quarter century in every part Africa has been regaining her independence.

If there have been many ignoble deeds perpetrated on and in Africa, there have been many which have been splendid. Of all famous names associated with Africa probably the most renowned is David Livingstone.

Born at Blantyre, Scotland, 150 years ago, he educated himself from the age of 10 whilst working as a spinner at a loom. Eventually he qualified as a doctor. His restless ambition for exploration and service led him to "the dark continent," as it was then called.

In three pioneer African journeys Livingstone covered 29,000 miles and mapped a million square miles of previously uncharted territory! So accurate was he that he was the only missionary of whom it is said, "You could go to any point across the entire continent along Livingstone's track and feel certain of your position".

He found and named the world's greatest waterfall, the Victoria Falls,

on the Zambesi, and he was the first white man to traverse the world's longest lake, Tanganyika.

Tremendously exciting and exhausting all this must have been, and great was his service to geography and natural history, yet his care and love for the people was equally outstanding. Never did he forget that he was a doctor. "I have an immense practice," he once wrote. "Patients walk 130 miles for my advice. This is the country for a medical man, but he must leave fees out of the question."

Livingstone was concerned with more than physical healing. He sought to expose and stamp out the slave trade at its source and to bring order and good government among the tribes. He preached and practised the Gospel wherever he went, and as a direct result of a speech in the Senate House at Cambridge one of the great Anglican missionary societies, the Universities' Mission to Central Africa, was formed.

The story is well known of how Livingstone penetrated so far on his last journey that no news of him reached England for over a year, and of how the American journalist, H. M. Stanley, eventually found him at Ujiji on Lake Tanganyika, with the famous greeting, "Dr. Livingstone, I presume?" But he declined to leave Africa and on May 1st, 1873, he died—on his knees beside his bed. His faithful servants carried his body 800 miles to the coast. It was brought to London for burial in Westminster Abbev.

Within three years of his death the great slave market at Zanzibar was closed on the Sultan's orders and the organised Arab slave trade was dead. So much was largely the work of this one humble but great and courageous man. And Africa still needs such men.

### PARISH CLUB

Mrs. Vaughan could not ignore the please of the senior girls, who wished to restart the Guide Company, but as she is not a qualified Guider, she feels that it is a terrible pity that there seems to be nobody in the parish who has the qualifications and time to run the Company. I do hope that, through the Stewardship Campaign, somebody will take on this very worth-while and essential work.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL

After much heart-searching and consultation with the Parochial Church Council and the parents of our Sunday School children, we have decided to return to Sunday School in the afternoon for the winter months. It will be held in church for a common act of worship, and then the kindergarten children will go to their class in the church room, whilst the seniors stay with their teachers in church.

It was wonderful to see so many children at the Harvest Festival Services, and we hope that the good numbers will continue. Certainly they enjoy their Sunday School and their instruction in the Christian faith, and with encouragement from parents I have little doubt that we shall soon have a very fine Sunday School indeed. However, I hope that parents will realise that sending children to Sunday School is no substitute for bringing them to the Family Service at 9.30 a.m. Sunday School is meant to complete the children's act of worship by instruction, but those who are sent, and never see their parents in church, grow up to think that the Christian religion is something for children, a habit one grows out of, instead of growing into the faith.



was to hear the report of the Finance Committee on the proposals for financing the building of the Church Hall. Alderman Kirkman told us that

The Council unanimously expressed its sincere gratitude to Alderman Kirkman for the magnificent start he has given to our Hall Building Fund, and — on the advice of the Finance Committee — gave the Vicar and Wardens authority to borrow a sum of not more than £7,000 for the building of the Hall.

The Vicar explained that it would be necessary to have guarantors if the money were borrowed from the Bank, and fourteen members of the Council immediately signified that they were prepared to guarantee a sum of £100 each. Will any members of the congregation prepared to act as guarantors please tell the Vicar or Churchwardens.






